NOTABLE

- Rutgers, coming off its second open weekend of the season, is back at SHI Stadium to host No. 2 Ohio State in a game presented by RWJBarnabas Health. This is the first season since 2014 with two bye weeks.

THE BIRTHPLACE OF COLLEGE FOOTBALL

- Rutgers has played the most games in college football history (1,358), while Ohio State has played 1,298 games since 1890. A series of events to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the first game in 1869 were held Nov. 6.
- Starting off at Old Queens, captains Tyshon Fogg, Tyreek Maddox-Williams and Zach Venesky joined Gil Greenberg, who at 97 is the oldest living Rutgers football letterwinner, chancellor Christopher Molloy and director of athletics Pat Hobbs to ring the bell. The bell, gifted to the University from Colonel Henry Rutgers in 1826, is reserved to mark significant occasions university-wide. The Rutgers Glee Club also performed for the crowd in attendance.

RUTGERS ATHLETIC COMMUNICATIONS

The Rutgers Athletic Communications Office is committed to assisting members of the media with their coverage of the Rutgers football team. Hasim Phillips serves as the primary contact for the football program with support from Jimmy Gill and Brad Derechailo.

The Athletic Communications Office is located on level one of the press box at SHI Stadium. For information regarding credentials, interviews, statistics, press conferences, etc., please call the Athletic Communications Office at 732-445-7028, visit CollegePressBox.com or e-mail Hasim Phillips at hphillips@scarletknights.com.

To assist in your coverage throughout the year, please read the media information on this page. All interview requests must be directed to and arranged through the Athletic Communications Office at least one day (24 hours) in advance. Coaches, players and support staff are prohibited from participating in any interviews without prior authorization from the Athletic Communications Office.

MEDIA CREDENTIALS

All media credential requests must be submitted to credentials@scarletknights.com via email. Admittance to the SHI Stadium press box is limited to working media members only. Credential requests must be made formally to the credential email address.

Requests for game day credentials must be received at least two weeks in advance of the date of the contest to provide sufficient time for processing and mailing. Media credentials which cannot be mailed will be left at the West Gate Media Will Call (Media Entrance) beneath the press box at SHI Stadium.

Working space in the SHI Stadium Press Box is allotted on the following basis: (1) daily newspaper writers covering for next-day publication covering Rutgers or the current game opponent; (2) sports editors of newspapers in New Jersey, New York and Eastern Pennsylvania; (3) radio personnel for broadcast originations; (4) official school student daily newspaper; (5) approved special coverage; (6) press and TV working photographers; (7) weekly press representatives; non-originating radio representatives of AM news stations; and Internet writers for sites affiliated with established, nationally-recognized media outlets will be considered on a game-by-game basis as space permits. Visiting freelance and amateur photographers are not eligible for media credentials.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Sideline photographers and media members must follow NCAA guidelines, which prohibit entry to the bench areas.

PARKING

Media parking is located in the RWJMS Lot on Hoes Lane West, near the Rutgers Golf Course. Pre and postgame shuttle service will be provided to transport media members from the RWJMS Lot to the drop off point near Athletes Glen. There is no parking pass requirement for this lot.

PRESS BOX SERVICES

Complete NCAA statistics, play-by-play and quote sheets from both teams are all regular services on game day. Upon your arrival, you will receive information with a game program, flipcard, updated stats and game day notes.

The press box has wireless internet access. Login information will be provided on the day of game.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS

All player interviews must be arranged through the Athletic Communications Office at least one day (24 hours) in advance. Players are available in person following practice on Tuesday and Wednesday, pending class schedules.

Please consult with Hasim Phillips regarding availability as it will vary from week to week. A time mutually convenient for the player and media member can be set up by the Athletic Communications Office. During a traditional game week, there will be no player interviews after Wednesday until following the game.

COACH CAMPANILE INTERVIEWS

All interview requests for Rutgers interim head coach Nunzio Campanile must be arranged through Hasim Phillips. In addition to post-practice media availability, coach Campanile will be available to the media every Monday morning at his weekly press conference in the team meeting room of the Hale Center.

POST PRACTICE INTERVIEWS

This week's remaining schedule will be announced at a later date.

ASSISTANT COACH INTERVIEWS

Assistant coaches are available to the media following practice with the offensive staff conducting interviews on Tuesdays, while the defensive staff meets on Wednesdays. The offensive and defensive coordinators will be available at the weekly Monday press conference in the team meeting room of the Hale Center.

PRACTICE COVERAGE

The use of social media (Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat or Periscope) is strictly prohibited during practice sessions. Live reporting is NOT permitted during practice. Live video/audio broadcast of any kind is also NOT permitted. This includes the use of social media platforms such as Facebook Live, Instagram, Snapchat or Periscope. All reports must be filed at the conclusion of any open media practice windows.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

Interim head coach Nunzio Campanile and select players, following the designated cooling off period, will be made available for interviews after each game. Following home games, the press conference for coach Campanile will take place in the team meeting room on the second floor of the Hale Center, which is located on the east side of the stadium opposite the press box.

With approximately five minutes remaining in the game, members of the media will be escorted across the field towards the Hale Center.

The visiting team's press conference will be held in the cornerbacks meeting room on the second floor of the Hale Center.

WEEKLY PRESS CONFERENCE

Live video/audio broadcast of any kind will not be permitted during the weekly press conference. This includes the use of live video features on social media platforms such as Facebook Live, Instagram, Snapchat, Twitter or Periscope.

RUTGERS RADIO NETWORK

All Rutgers football games will be broadcast over the Rutgers Sports Network from Learfield IMG College to 50,000 watt WOR 710-AM in New York City and Central Jersey's WCTC 1450-AM.

Play-by-play announcer Chris Carlin is well known to sports radio fans throughout the State of Rutgers. Carlin is in his 19th year on Rutgers broadcast, including his 16th as the play-by-play voice of Rutgers football. Carlin, who has 20 years of experience in radio and television, is an afternoon host on WFAN in New York City. He began his career as producer with Mike & The Mad Dog on WFAN and later hosted joined SNY hosting "Loud Mouths," "Geico Sportsnite," as well as New York Mets pregame and postgame shows.

Former Rutgers standout quarterback Ray Lucas begins his 11th season as the color analyst on the Rutgers broadcast. The seven-year NFL veteran has also been an analyst for SNY on its New York Jets programming since 1996 and won a New York Emmy for best analyst in 2010 for his work on SNY.

Anthony "Fooch" Fucilli returns for his 16th season as the sideline reporter. Fucilli has also worked as a field producer and reporter for MSG Network since 1989.

Marc Malusis is back for his 11th year as the pre-game and post-game host. The pre-game shows starts one hour prior to kickoff while the post-game show stays on the air one hour following the game.

Former Rutgers defensive lineman Eric LeGrand begins his ninth season on the broadcast, providing insight and commentary on the pre-game show, halftime report and post-game.

THE BIRTHPLACE OF COLLEGE FOOTBALL

• Rutgers University and its neighbor, Princeton, played the first game of intercollegiate football on Nov. 6, 1869, on a plot of ground where the present-day Rutgers gymnasium now stands in New Brunswick, N.J. Rutgers won that first game, 6-4.



• In celebrating the 150th anniversary of the first game, Rutgers announced several new details for the year-long festivities. “An anniversary like this deserves a season-long celebration with many elements and that’s just what we’ve planned.

There’s only one Birthplace and it’s right here ‘On the Banks,’” said Director of Athletics Pat Hobbs.

THE FIRST GAME

• The game was played with two teams of 25 men each under rugby-like rules, but like modern football, it was “replete with surprise, strategy, prodigies of determination, and physical prowess,” to use the words of one of the Rutgers players.

• William J. Leggett, captain of the Rutgers team, who later became a distinguished clergyman of the Dutch Reformed Church, suggested that rules for the contest be adopted from those of the London Football Association. Leggett’s proposal was accepted by Captain William Gunmere of Princeton, who later became Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of New Jersey.

• At 3 p.m. on that memorable afternoon, the 50 combatants and about 100 spectators gathered on the field. Most of the assemblage sat on a low wooden fence and watched the athletes doff hats, coats and vests and use suspenders as belts. To distinguish themselves from the bareheaded visitors, 50 Rutgers students, including players, donned scarlet-colored scarfs which they converted into turbans.

• The teams lined up with two members of each team remaining more or less stationary near the opponent’s goal in the hopes of being able to slip over and score from unguarded positions. Thus, the present day “sleeper” was conceived. The remaining 23 players were divided into groups of 11 and 12. While the 11 “fielders” lined up in their own territory as defenders, the 12 “bulldogs” carried the battle.

• Each score counted as a “game” and 10 games completed the contest. Following each score, the teams changed direction. The ball could be advanced only by kicking or batting it with the feet, hands, heads or sides.

• Events leading up to the game were described by John W. Herbert, Rutgers ’72, who was one of the players: “To appreciate this game to the full you must know something of its background,” Herbert wrote in 1933. “The two colleges were, and still are, of course, about 20 miles apart. The rivalry between them was intense. For years each had striven for possession of an old Revolutionary cannon, making night forays and lugging it back and forth time and again. Not long before the first football game, the canny Princetonians had settled this competition in their own favor by ignominiously sinking the gun in several feet of concrete. In addition to this, I regret to report, Princeton had beaten Rutgers in baseball by the harrowing score of 40-2. Rutgers longed for a chance to square things.”

• Rutgers got Columbia University started in the grid sport the following season and in a few years most of the colleges and universities in the East were represented on the gridiron.

- The gathering then moved down to the College Avenue Gym with a Rutgers drum-line procession to uncover a new plaque that commemorates the first game. Donated by Devco and the City of New Brunswick, the inscription is titled "The Birthplace of College Football."
- Later on, the Empire State Building was lit up in alternating sides of scarlet and orange to celebrate the anniversary.
- The day-long festivities wrapped up with a special event to highlight the growth of college football from its inception in 1869 through present day. "A Celebration at the Birthplace: 150 Years of College Football," hosted by BTN's Dave Revsine, featured a panel of speakers who shared stories and experiences around college football. In addition to Revsine, noted college football historian Ron A. Smith was on hand to discuss the early years of college football. The panels included appearances by former Scarlet Knights Marco Battaglia, Brian Leonard and Mike Teel, in addition to director of athletics Pat Hobbs and Wisconsin athletics director Barry Alvarez.
- In addition, fans are encouraged to visit the Alexander Library to view "Rutgers Football from the Vault: Celebrating 150 Years," an exhibition that celebrates Rutgers' legacy as the birthplace of the first intercollegiate football game and covers the entirety of Rutgers' football history. Walk from the first game versus Princeton on Nov. 6, 1869 all the way through Rutgers joining the Big Ten. Each case covers a decade of Rutgers history providing a window to view the teams and players as well as the campus and student fans through each time period. The gallery is open Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m.

VERSUS OHIO STATE

- Saturday will mark the sixth meeting on the gridiron between Rutgers and Ohio State and third in Piscataway.
- No. 4 Ohio State won last season's meeting, 52-3, at Ohio Stadium in the Big Ten opener for both teams. PK Justin Davidovicz connected on a 41-yard field goal on his first collegiate attempt. LB Trevor Morris led the defense with 11 tackles, including a sack.
- Two Scarlet Knights are from Ohio: RB Kay'Ron Adams (Warren) and DL Brendan Bordner (Columbus).
- RU has two assistants who previously worked at Ohio State: special team coordinator/outside linebackers coach Vince Okruch (2014-15) and head strength and conditioning coach Kenny Parker (2012-15).

RANKED OPPONENT

- Rutgers is set to play its fourth ranked opponent of the season, previously traveling to No. 20 Iowa and No. 20 Michigan and hosting No. 20 Minnesota. This will be the sixth season playing four ranked opponent (AP Poll) in a year to tie for the most in program history, joining 2017, 2016, 2007, 2002 and 1994.
- Rutgers will be hosting a top-five opponent (AP Poll) for the 14th time and a top-two opponent for the sixth time (2015 vs. No. 1 Ohio State, 2007 vs. No. 2 USF, 2002 vs. No. 1 Miami, 1981 vs. No. 1 Pittsburgh, 1980 vs. No. 1 Alabama).
- Rutgers last played an opponent that was 9-0 on Nov. 12, 1988 versus No. 4 West Virginia at Giants Stadium.
- Ohio State has been ranked No. 13, No. 1, No. 2, No. 11 and No. 4 in the five previous meetings. The last time Rutgers played the same opponent that was ranked in six-straight seasons was Virginia Tech from 1998-2003.
- Since 1977, the Scarlet Knights have played at least one team appearing in the AP poll every season except 2012.
- Saturday's game marks the 19th contest for Rutgers against a ranked Big Ten opponent since the beginning of the 2014 season. The Scarlet Knights have played at least three ranked Big Ten opponents each year since joining the conference.
- Rutgers has one other ranked Big Ten program remaining on the schedule in No. 9 Penn State.
- The Scarlet Knights own nine victories over AP-ranked opponents with the highest ranking knocking off being No. 2 USF in 2007: 11/2/46 at No. 17 Harvard, 13-0

LAST TIME OUT

- Rutgers scored the last 10 points of the second quarter to even the game heading into halftime, but Illinois posted three touchdowns in the third quarter on the way to a 38-10 win on Nov. 2 at Memorial Stadium.
- With RU down 10-0 in the second quarter, WR Mohamed Jabbie scored his first collegiate touchdown on a 31-yard pass from QB Johnny Langan on a third-and-13. Jabbie finished the game with a career-high 64 receiving yards on three catches. On the ground, RB Aaron Young averaged 5.2 yards per carry with a season-best 67 yards on 13 attempts. Langan added 41 yards after running the ball 23 times.
- Both DL CJ Onyechi and DL Julius Turner registered sacks on defense. DB Christian Izien recorded a team-high nine tackles.
- PK Justin Davidovicz converted a 25-yard field goal for his fourth-straight successful attempt.

LIBERTY WIN

- Rutgers scored points on 8-of-9 possessions, including touchdowns on its first three and 5-of-6 to start, and held Liberty to three points in the third quarter to pull away for a 44-34 victory in the first meeting between the programs.
- Rutgers posted season highs with 25 first downs, 55 rushing attempts, 271 rushing yards, 76 offensive plays and three sacks.
- Rutgers also did not commit a turnover for the first time this season and went 12-for-17 (70.5 percent) on third down for its highest percentage with double-digit conversions since ending 10-for-14 (71.4 percent) at USF in 2008.
- The Scarlet Knights improved to 105-67-1 when playing an opponent for the first time and knocked off a team entering on a five-game winning streak for the first time since defeating No. 17 Pittsburgh on the road on Oct. 25, 2008.
- QB Johnny Langan (118) and RB Isaih Pacheco (107) topped 100 rushing yards to make it the first game two Scarlet Knights reached the century mark on the ground since Josh Hicks (113) and Robert Martin (102) versus Kansas on Sept. 26, 2015.
- DL Elorm Lumor and LB Rashawn Battle collected solo sacks, while DL Mike Tverdov and LB Tyreek Maddox-Williams teamed up for a third RU sack.
- DB Lawrence Stevens forced a fumble on special teams that was recovered by LB Aslan Pugh for the only turnover in the game.
- PK Justin Davidovicz went 3-for-3 on field goals and converted all five extra points for a career-high 14 points.

RUTGERS ATHLETICS ANNOUNCES CHANGE IN FOOTBALL LEADERSHIP

• Director of athletics Pat Hobbs announced Sept. 29 that head football coach Chris Ash and offensive coordinator John McNulty were relieved of their duties, effective immediately. Tight ends coach Nunzio Campanile is serving as interim head coach/offensive coordinator for the remainder of the season.

• “We appreciate Chris’s dedicated efforts on behalf of our football program, our department and our University,” said Hobbs. “This change is especially difficult because of the steadfast commitment that Chris and his family have made to our student-athletes. Progress has been achieved in many areas, but, unfortunately, that progress has not been realized on the field of play. As such, it is in the best interest of the program to make a change.”

• The terms of Ash’s and McNulty’s contracts will be honored by Rutgers Athletics, exclusively using department-generated funds.

• A national search for a new head coach is underway.

• Rutgers announced Oct. 14 the retention of Ventura Partners, a leading executive search and talent management agency with a diverse range of consulting and intelligence services. Among the services and deliverables to be provided by Ventura Partners are leadership identification, market mapping and intelligence, outreach, internal search assistance, reference review, staff development, and industry consulting.

• “We are excited to be working with Ventura Partners,” said Hobbs. “They provide a unique range of services, including talent acquisition and development. We will begin working together immediately to ensure excellent leadership for our football program. They will also be working with us throughout the engagement on strengthening our human resources and providing market data and intelligence.”

OPENING WIN

• Rutgers scored 41 unanswered points to wipe away an early 14-point deficit in a 48-21 season-opening win over Massachusetts.

• Rutgers scored 38 points in the first half, its most in a half since having that amount in the second half versus Howard in 2016 and the most in a first half versus an FBS opponent since racking up 49 versus Louisville in 2008.

• RB Isaih Pacheco became the ninth player in Rutgers history to have four rushing touchdowns in a game. Johnathan Lewis last did it versus Morgan State in 2017 and Ray Rice was the last running back to reach the mark in the 2008 International Bowl.

• QB McLane Carter threw scoring passes to WR Bo Melton and RB Raheem Blackshear. Totaled 340 passing yards for the most by a Rutgers quarterback in his first start for the team since Mike McMahon had 386 at Army in 1997.

• Rutgers totaled 554 yards of total offense, the most in a season opener since collecting 563 versus Buffalo in 2007. It was the most in any game since picking up 596 at Indiana in 2015.

• Rutgers has now won nine of its last 10 home openers.

• As part of the agreement, SHI (pronounced using the initials S H I) will enjoy significant brand exposure through signage in and around the stadium, including exterior stadium signage, scoreboard signage, campus directional signage and logo placement on the field. Additionally, SHI will receive promotion through a variety of print, digital, radio and television assets.

• SHI International Corp., a Somerset-based company, is a global provider of technology solutions and products with over 20,000 customers in the United States. Founded in 1989, SHI is the largest minority and woman-owned business enterprise in the country. EXPANDED BEER AND WINE SALES

- Rutgers Athletics announced in February that it will expand beer and wine sales at department-managed venues beginning in the fall of 2019. Revenues from the sales will serve to off-set scholarship costs, which support the State University of New Jersey’s more than 600 student-athletes and exceed \$16 million annually.
- The expansion will include general seating areas for events at SHI Stadium, the RAC, Yurcak Field, as well as at baseball and softball.
- Division I universities are permitting alcohol sales with greater frequency inside athletics venues. A recent peer review revealed that 51 of the 129 NCAA Division I Football Bowl Subdivision programs allowed in-stadium alcohol sales to the general public.

OFFENSE

- QB Johnny Langan had 310 yards of total offense versus Liberty to become the third Rutgers quarterback with 300 or more this season (McLane Carter 336 versus Massachusetts, Artur Sitkowski 304 versus Boston College).
- Rutgers posted season highs with 25 first downs, 55 rushing attempts, 271 rushing yards and 76 offensive plays versus Liberty.
- Rutgers had eight offensive plays gaining 20 or more yards in the season opener, the most in a game since having nine at Indiana in 2015. The team had multiple plays of 50 or more yards (Pacheco 57-yard rush, Carter to Melton 52-yard pass) in the same game last in 2016 versus New Mexico.

Johnny Langan

- Up to 242 rushing yards, the most by a Rutgers quarterback in a season since Jabu Lovelace (332) in 2007. Total ranks fifth among Big Ten quarterbacks this season.
- Rushed for a team-high 22 first downs, including 12 times on third down and twice on fourth down.
- Rushed for 118 yards in the win over Liberty to become the first Rutgers quarterback to reach the century mark in a game since Sam Mudie (105) versus Lehigh in 1961. Named Big Ten Co-Freshman of the Week after the performance.

- Reset personal-best completion percentage in a game in last two starts. Finished 17-for-24 (70.8 percent) at Michigan after going 23-for-33 (69.9 percent) versus Boston College. Owns a 70.1 completion percentage (40-for-57) as a starter this season.
- Has four games with 20 or more completions.
- Owns 13 career starts. Just one of 11 true freshmen to start at quarterback for the Scarlet Knights since 1945.

Isaih Pacheco

- Owns 1,092 career rushing yards. Reached 1,000 yards on 218th carry.

Defensively, linebackers Olakunle Fatukasi, Tyshon Fogg and Drew Singleton all had six tackles. Junior classmates Elorm Lumor and Rashawn Battle added solo sacks, while sophomore defensive end Mike Tverdov and junior linebacker Tyreek Maddox-Williams teamed up for a third RU sack. Junior defensive back Lawrence Stevens forced a fumble on special teams that was recovered by junior linebacker Aslan Pugh.

Football Kicks Off 150th Season with 48-21 Victory over UMass

PISCATAWAY, N.J. – Rutgers (1-0) kicked off the 150th anniversary of college football with a 48-21 win over Massachusetts (0-1) on Friday night at SHI Stadium, “The Birthplace of College Football.” The Scarlet Knights finished the game strong, scoring 41 unanswered points to close out the victory.

Senior quarterback McLane Carter totaled 340 passing yards, throwing two touchdowns. Overall, Carter was 21-for-31 in his first start as a Scarlet Knight.

Sophomore running back Isaih Pacheco recorded a career-high four rushing touchdowns. Junior wide receiver Bo Melton and junior running back Raheem Blackshear both added a receiving touchdown as well. Junior kicker Justin Davidovicz tacked on two field goals in the win.

Junior linebacker Tyshon Fogg led the defense with 11 total tackles in his first collegiate start. Junior defensive lineman Elorm Lumor assisted on a pair of sacks with linebacker Olakunle Fatukasi and redshirt freshman linebacker Jamree Kromah. Junior Tre Avery and sophomore Avery Young both registered an interception in the secondary.

INTERIM HEAD COACH/OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR NUNZIO CAMPANILE



Nunzio Campanile is in his second season on the Rutgers coaching staff and has served as the interim head coach and offensive coordinator since Sept. 29, 2019.

Campanile spent his first season (2018) "On the Banks," coaching the running backs before moving to tight ends to start 2019.

A graduate of Paramus Catholic, Campanile spent the previous eight seasons as the head coach at Bergen Catholic, including winning a state title in 2017, after working as offensive coordinator at Don Bosco Prep from 2000-09.

Campanile compiled a 60-28 (.681) record leading the

Crusaders from 2010-17 as a perennial top-100 football national power. The team capped off the 2017 season by capturing the Non-Public, Group 4 title, the first state championship for the program since 2004, with a 44-7 triumph over St. Peter's Prep that featured over 400 yards of total offense. Bergen Catholic went 10-2 overall with a nine-game winning streak to end the season, finishing 10-0 against New Jersey competition to earn the No. 1 ranking in the state.

The Crusaders saw seven all-state quarterbacks under Campanile's watch and averaged over 35 points per game during his tenure. Numerous prospects signed scholarship offers across the country.

In 2012, Campanile was selected by USA Football to join the coaching staff for the US Under-19 National Team that competed in the third annual International Bowl in Austin, Texas.

Prior to arriving in Oradell, Campanile worked under legendary coach Greg Toal at Don Bosco Prep. The Ironmen won six state titles in 10 seasons with Campanile as the offensive coordinator with a 112-6 record, claiming the national championship in 2009. He mentored quarterbacks Mike Teel and Gary Nova during that time, who would both go on to set passing records at Rutgers.

Campanile also previously served as the head wrestling coach and athletic director at Don Bosco Prep, winning the 2010 Non-Public A state title on the mat. He has additionally worked as a history and physical education teacher.

Campanile comes from a football family, having played quarterback and safety for his father, Mike, at Paramus Catholic. His brothers, Vito, Nick and Anthony, are coaches as well.

A 1999 graduate of Montclair State University, Campanile also attended Amherst College for two years. He has been married to his wife Heather for 16 years and the couple has two children, Michael and James.
