- Rutgers is set for its second road game of the season at a ranked opponent. It will be the Scarlet Knights' first contest in 2019 versus a Big Ten East counterpart.
- Rutgers has played the most games in college football history (1,352), while Michigan is third (1,334) behind Navy (1,338).
- Rutgers has limited negative-yardage plays on offense, ranking first in the Big Ten and third nationally with only 2.67 tackles-perloss surrendered per game. In addition, the team leads the conference and sits seventh nationally with just 0.67 sacks permitted per game. RU's 18 sacks allowed since the start of the 2018 season are the fewest among Big Ten teams.
- BTN Tailgate will be on site in Ann Arbor starting at 10 a.m. Hosted by Dave Revsine, Gerry DiNardo, Howard Griffith and Michelle McMahon, the program is the home for Big Ten football fans on Saturday mornings.

To assist in your coverage throughout the year, please read the media information on this page. All interview requests must be directed to and arranged through the Athletic Communications Office at least one day (24 hours) in advance. Coaches, players and support saff are prohibited from participating in any interviews without prior authorization from the Athletic Communications Office.

MEDIA CREDENTIALS

All media credential requests must be submitted to credentials@ scarletknights.com via email. Admittance to the SHI Stadium press box is limited to working media members only. Credential requests must be made formally to the credential email address.

Requests for game day credentials must be received at least two weeks in advance of the date of the contest to provide sufficient time for processing and mailing. Media credentials which cannot be mailed will be left at the West Gate Media Will Call (Media Entrance) beneath the press box at SHI Stadium.

Working space in the SHI Stadium Press Box is allotted on the following basis: (1) daily newspaper writers covering for next-day publication covering Rutgers or the current game opponent; (2) sports editors of newspapers in New Jersey, New York and Eastern Pennsylvania; (3) radio personnel for broadcast originations; (4) official school student daily newspaper; (5) approved special coverage; (6) press and TV working photographers; (7) weekly press representatives; non-originating radio representatives of AM news stations; and Internet writers for sites affiliated with established, nationally-recognized media outlets will be considered on a game-by-game basis as space permits. Visiting freelance and amateur photographers are not eligible for media credentials.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Sideline photographers and media members must follow NCAA guidelines, which prohibit entry to the bench areas.

PARKING

Media parking is located in the RWJMS Lot on Hoes Lane West, near the Rutgers Golf Course. Pre and postgame shuttle service will be provided to transport media members from the RWJMS Lot to the drop off point near Athletes Glen. There is no parking pass requirement for this lot.

PRESS BOX SERVICES

Complete NCAA statistics, play-by-play and quote sheets from both teams are all regular services on game day. Upon your arrival, you will receive information with a game program, flipcard, updated stats and game day notes.

The press box has wireless internet access. Login information will be provided on the day of game.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS

All player interviews must be arranged through the Athletic Communications Office at least one day (24 hours) in advance. Players are available in person following practice on Tuesday and Wednesday, pending class schedules.

Please consult with Hasim Phillips regarding availability as it will vary from week to week. A time mutually convenient for the player and media member can be set up by the Athletic Communications Office. During a traditional game week, there will be no player interviews after Wednesday until following the game.

COACH ASH INTERVIEWS

All interview requests for Rutgers head coach Chris Ash must be arranged through Hasim Phillips. In addition to post-practice media availability, coach Ash will be available to the media every Monday morning at his weekly press conference in the team meeting room of the Hale Center.

POST PRACTICE INTERVIEWS

On Tuesday, select offensive coaches and players will be available to the media post practice, while select defensive coaches and players will be available on Wednesday. Head coach Chris Ash will address the media following practice on Thursday.

ASSISTANT COACH INTERVIEWS

Assistant coaches are available to the media following practice with the offensive staff conducting interviews on Tuesdays, while the defensive staff meets on Wednesdays. The offensive and defensive coordinators will be available at the weekly Monday press conference in the team meeting room of the Hale Center.

PRACTICE COVERAGE

The use of social media (Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat or Periscope) is strictly prohibited during practice sessions. Live reporting is NOT permitted during practice. Live video/audio broadcast of any kind is also NOT permitted. This includes the use of social media platforms such as Facebook Live, Instagram, Snapchat or Periscope. All reports must be filed at the conclusion of any open media practice windows.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

Head coach Chris Ash and select players, following the designated cooling off period, will be made available for interviews after each game. Following home games, the press conference for coach Ash will take place in the team meeting room on the second floor of the Hale Center, which is located on the east side of the stadium opposite the press box.

With approximately five minutes remaining in the game, members of the media will be escorted across the field towards the Hale Center.

The visiting team's press conference will be held in the cornerbacks meeting room on the second floor of the Hale Center.

Live video/audio broadcast of any kind will not be permitted during the weekly press conference. This includes the use of live video features on social media platforms such as Facebook Live, Instagram, Snapchat, Twitter or Periscope.

RUTGERS RADIO NETWORK

All Rutgers football games will be broadcast over the Rutgers Sports Network from Learfield IMG College to 50,000 watt WOR 710-AM in New York City and Central Jersey's WCTC 1450-AM.

Play-by-play announcer Chris Carlin is well known to sports radio fans throughout the State of Rutgers. Carlin is in his 19th year on Rutgers broadcast, including his 16th as the play-by-play voice of Rutgers football. Carlin, who has 20 years of experience in radio and television, is an afternoon host on WFAN in New York City. He began his career as producer with Mike & The Mad Dog on WFAN and later hosted joined SNY hosting "Loud Mouths," "Geico Sportsnite," as well as New York Mets pregame and postgame shows.

Former Rutgers standout quarterback Ray Lucas begins his 11th season as the color analyst on the Rutgers broadcast. The seven-year NFL veteran has also been an analyst for SNY on its New York Jets programming since 1996 and won a New York Emmy for best analyst in 2010 for his work on SNY.

Anthony "Fooch" Fucilli returns for his 16th season as the sideline reporter. Fucilli has also worked as a field producer and reporter for MSG Network since 1989.

Marc Malusis is back for his 11th year as the pre-game and post-game host. The pre-game shows starts one hour prior to kickoff while the post-game show stays on the air one hour following the game

Former Rutgers defensive lineman Eric LeGrand begins his ninth season on the broadcast, providing insight and commentary on the pre-game show, halftime report and post-game.

THE BIRTHPLACE OF COLLEGE FOOTBALL

- Rutgers University and its neighbor, Princeton, played the first game of intercollegiate football on Nov. 6, 1869, on a plot of ground where the present-day Rutgers gymnasium now stands in New Brunswick, N.J. Rutgers won that first game, 6-4.
- In celebrating the upcoming 150th anniversary of the first game, Rutgers has announced several new details for the year-long festivities. "An anniversary like this deserves a season-long celebration with many elements and that's just what



we've planned. There's only one Birthplace and it's right here 'On the Banks,'" said Director of Athletics Pat Hobbs.

THE FIRST GAME

- The game was played with two teams of 25 men each under rugby-like rules, but like modern football, it was "replete with surprise, strategy, prodigies of determination, and physical prowess," to use the words of one of the Rutgers players.
- William J. Leggett, captain of the Rutgers team, who later became a
 distinguished clergyman of the Dutch Reformed Church, suggested that
 rules for the contest be adopted from those of the London Football Association. Leggett's proposal was accepted by Captain William Gunmere
 of Princeton, who later became Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of
 New Jersey.
- At 3 p.m. on that memorable afternoon, the 50 combatants and about 100 spectators gathered on the field. Most of the assemblage sat on a low wooden fence and watched the athletes doff hats, coats and vests and use suspenders as belts. To distinguish themselves from the bareheaded visitors, 50 Rutgers students, including players, donned scarlet-colored scarfs which they converted into turbans.
- The teams lined up with two members of each team remaining more or less stationary near the opponent's goal in the hopes of being able to slip over and score from unguarded positions. Thus, the present day "sleeper" was conceived. The remaining 23 players were divided into groups of 11 and 12. While the 11 "fielders" lined up in their own territory as defenders, the 12 "bulldogs" carried the battle.
- Each score counted as a "game" and 10 games completed the contest. Following each score, the teams changed direction. The ball could be advanced only by kicking or batting it with the feet, hands, heads or sides.
- Events leading up to the game were described by John W. Herbert, Rutgers '72, who was one of the players: "To appreciate this game to the full you must know something of its background," Herbert wrote in 1933. "The two colleges were, and still are, of course, about 20 miles apart. The rivalry between them was intense. For years each had striven for possession of an old Revolutionary cannon, making night forays and lugging it back and forth time and again. Not long before the first football game, the canny Princetonians had settled this competition in their own favor by ignominiously sinking the gun in several feet of concrete. In addition to this, I regret to report, Princeton had beaten Rutgers in baseball by the harrowing score of 40-2. Rutgers longed for a chance to square things."
- Rutgers got Columbia University started in the grid sport the following season and in a few years most of the colleges and universities in the East were represented on the gridiron.

VERSUS MICHIGAN

- Rutgers will play Michigan for the sixth time since joining the Big Ten in 2014. The programs did not previously meet.
- In one of the more memorable games in Rutgers football history, the Scarlet Knights earned a 26-24 victory over Michigan on Oct. 4, 2014 in a home night game to pick up the program's first league win as a member of the Big Ten Conference.
- QB Gary Nova led RU with 404 passing yards (third-most in RU history) and three touchdowns, while PK Kyle Federico kicked two field goals. The game was sealed with 3:01 remaining in the fourth quarter when DL Kemoko Turay skied above the line to block a potential go-ahead 56-yard field goal.
- The sellout crowd of 53,327, the third-largest in Rutgers history, stormed the field to celebrate the win.
- The attendance mark of 111,213 in the 2017 Rutgers-Michigan game in Ann Arbor signaled the largest crowd to ever witness a Rutgers football game.
- Both the longest rushing (Pacheco 80-yard touchdown in 2018) and passing (Nova to Turzilli 80-yard touchdown in 2014) play for Rutgers in conference play against a Big Ten opponent came against Michigan.
- Freshman DL Devin Baldwin is from Southfield, Michigan.
- Sophomore LB Drew Singleton spent his first two seasons at Michigan, playing in seven games in 2018.
- Defensive coordinator Andy Buh and Michigan head coach Jim Harbaugh were both on the Stanford coaching staff from 2007-09.
- Offensive coordinator John McNulty started his coaching career as a graduate assistant coach at Michigan from 1991-94.
- The next meeting is set for Nov. 14, 2020 at SHI Stadium.

LAST SEASON'S MEETING

- Rutgers ended the first quarter tied with No. 4 Michigan, but the Wolverines scored the last five touchdowns of the game to win, 42-7.
- Against a defense that entered the week leading the nation in total defense, Rutgers posted 193 rushing yards with an average of 5.8 yards per carry. Michigan had been allowing only 93.9 rushing yards per game and 2.8 yards per carry in its previous nine games. The 193 team rushing yards are the most for Rutgers against a top-five opponent since recording 251 versus No. 5 Penn State in 1994, a span of 13 games.
- RB Isaih Pacheco ripped off an 80-yard touchdown run. It was the longest rush by a freshman in Rutgers history, longest offensive play of the season for Rutgers, longest against Michigan's defense all year and the longest rush by a Scarlet Knight in a conference game since joining the Big Ten.
- Pacheco finished with a season-high 142 rushing yards in the game for his second time reaching the century mark. The 142 yards are tied for third most for a Scarlet Knight against a ranked opponent in a game, following 181 by Ray Rice (2007 versus No. 2 USF) and 158 by Terrell Willis (1993 at No. 11 West Virginia) and matching the 142 by Ray Rice (2007 versus West Virginia).
- Rutgers did not allow a sack. It was one of two games that Michigan, who averaged 2.62 sacks per game, went without recording a sack last year.

- Rutgers is set to play its second ranked opponent of the season, also traveling to No. 20 lowa on Sept. 7. The team last started with multiple trips to ranked foes in 2016 when beginning the away slate with No. 14 Washington, No. 2 Ohio State and No. 4 Michigan.
- Since 1977, the Scarlet Knights have played at least one team appearing in the AP poll every season except 2012.
- Saturday's game marks the 17th contest for Rutgers against a ranked Big Ten opponent since the beginning of the 2014 season.
- Rutgers is set to play three other Big Ten programs listed in the latest AP poll: No. 5 Ohio State, at No. 12 Penn State and No. 25 Michigan State.

LAST TIME OUT

- Rutgers took a 10-7 lead in the second quarter, but Boston College answered to claim a 30-16 win at SHI Stadium. It was the 27th all-time meeting between the former Big East foes and first since 2004.
- QB Artur Sitkowski made his first start of the season and topped 300 passing yards for the first time in a 304-yard performance. He went 23-for-33 (69.9 percent) for his personal-best passing completion percentage in a game.
- Sitkowski and RB Raheem Blackshear connected a 74-yard touchdown pass in the first quarter for the longest scoring pass play for the Scarlet Knights since 2016. Blackshear finished with 130 receiving yards on nine receptions.
- PK Justin Davidovicz connected on all three field-goal attempts, including a 50-yarder. It was his second career make of at least that distance.
- LB Tyshon Fogg (15), DB Avery Young (11) and DB Jarrett Paul (10) all reached double-digit tackles on defense to set career highs.

BIG TEN OPENER

- Rutgers fell to then-No. 20 and now-No. 14 Iowa, 30-0, on Sept. 7 at Kinnick Stadium. The Scarlet Knights have now played in 12-of-14 Big Ten stadiums, having not traveled yet to Purdue and Northwestern.
- P Adam Korsak was named the Ray Guy Award Punter of the Week after averaging 47.6 yards on 10 attempts, finishing with a net of 46.5. The Australian had seven punts downed inside the 20, five inside the 10 and four inside the 5. That included a season-long 69-yarder, tied for the seventh-longest in program history, that settled at the 1.
- RB Isaih Pacheco led the team with 67 all-purpose yards, while LB Tyshon Fogg and LB Drew Singleton both had seven tackles defensively. In addition, DL Willington Previlon had a career-high two tackles-for-loss.
- Rutgers held lowa to 2-of-13 on third down and had six tackles-for-loss.

OPENING WIN

- Rutgers scored 41 unanswered points to wipe away an early 14-point deficit in a 48-21 season-opening win over Massachusetts.
- Rutgers scored 38 points in the first half, its most in a half since having that amount in the second half versus Howard in 2016 and the most in a first half versus an FBS opponent since racking up 49 versus Louisville in 2008. The Scarlet Knights scored 31 points in the second quarter, the first 30-point quarter since having 32 versus Howard in 2009 and first against an FBS opponent since recording 35 (second quarter) in the aforementioned 2008 game against Louisville game.
- RB Isaih Pacheco became the ninth player in Rutgers history to have four rushing touchdowns in a game. Johnathan Lewis last did it versus Morgan State in 2017 and Ray Rice was the last running back to reach the mark in the 2008 International Bowl. Finished with a career-high 156 rushing yards with a long of 57.
- QB McLane Carter threw scoring passes to WR Bo Melton and RB Raheem Blackshear. Totaled 340 passing yards for the most by a Rutgers quarterback in his first start for the team since Mike McMahon had 386 at Army in 1997. First 300-yard passing game by a Rutgers quarterback since Chris Laviano had 344 versus Maryland in 2015.
- Rutgers totaled 554 yards of total offense, the most under head coach Chris Ash and most in a season opener since collecting 563 versus Buffalo in 2007. It was the most in any game since picking up 596 at Indiana in 2015. That game was also the last time the Scarlet Knights had at least 300 passing yards (348) and 200 rushing yards (206) in a game, both a 100-yard rusher (Pacheco) and receiver (Melton) in the same game and had at least eight offensive plays gaining 20 or more yards.
- Rutgers has now won nine of its last 10 home openers.

PRESEASON HONORS

- RB Raheem Blackshear was named to the Paul Hornung Award watch list. The honor is given annually to the most versatile player in major college football. He led the team with 586 rushing yards, 367 receiving yards and 1,136 yards last season.
- P Adam Korsak is on the Ray Guy Award watch list, which is given annually to the best punter in major college football. He helped Rutgers to a 40.1 net punt in 2018, the best in school history.
- OL Michael Maietti earned a spot on the Rimington Trophy watch list. The award is bestowed to the top center in college football. He had 21 career starts at center entering the season.
- WR Cole Murphy was listed on the Mortell Holder of the Year watch list. The award is presented annually to the nation's top field goal holder. Murphy is set for his second season at holder after Rutgers went 9-for-12 in 2018.

TEAM CAPTAINS

• During spring practice, Chris Ash announced senior OL Zach Venesky and juniors RB Raheem Blackshear, LB Tyshon Fogg and LB Tyreek Maddox-Williams as the Scarlet Knight captains for the 2019 season. It marked the earliest captains were selected in Ash's tenure as the group led the team through summer workouts.

ASSISTANT COACH NOTES

- Head coach Chris Ash announced the additions of Andy Buh, Pete Rossomando, Jay Valai and Kolby Smith to the staff this offseason.
- Buh took over as defensive coordinator and also coaches the linebackers. Rossomando took over the offensive line, Valai works with cornerbacks and Smith coaches the running backs, with Nunzio Campanile moving to the post of tight ends coach.
- Vince Okruch continues to coach special teams and also made the switch from tight ends to outside linebackers coach.
- John McNulty is in his second year as the offensive coordinator for the Scarlet Knights and continues to coach the quarterbacks. He is in his second stint at Rutgers, previously serving in the same capacity from 2006-08. He piloted one of the most prolific offenses in Rutgers history in 2007 with the Scarlet Knights becoming the first program in the FBS to have a 3,000-yard passer (Mike Teel), 2,000-yard rusher (Ray Rice) and a pair of 1,000-yard receivers (Kenny Britt and Tiquan Underwood) in the same season. At the time, the 2007 squad was one of just eight teams in the 138 seasons of football at Rutgers to score 300 points in a season. The Scarlet Knights set school records for scoring (426), first downs (294) and total offense (5,841) in 2007.

TRANSFERRING IN

• Rutgers welcomed in the following transfers to the program: QB McLane Carter (Texas Tech, graduate), QB Johnny Langan (Boston College, 4 years to play 4), TE Kyle Penniston (Wisconsin, graduate), TE Matt Alaimo (UCLA, 4 years to play 4), LB Drew Singleton (Michigan, 3 years to play 3). Langan, Alaimo and Singleton are New Jersey natives.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

- Rutgers returns 19 student-athletes who earned a spot on the Academic All-Big Ten list (3.0 GPA or higher) last season: RB Raheem Blackshear, DL Brendan Bordner, OL Owen Bowles, PK Justin Davidovicz, LB Tyshon Fogg, WR Hunter Hayek, WR Mohamed Jabbie, OL Mike Lonsdorf, LB Tyreek Maddox-Williams, OL Michael Maietti, OL Zach Miseo, WR Cole Murphy, OL Jim Onulak, LB Aslan Pugh, LB Austin Rosa, OL Kamaal Seymour, LS Billy Taylor, DL Mike Tverdov and WR Everett Wormley.

SHI STADIUM

- The Rutgers Department of Intercollegiate Athletics and SHI International Corp. announced on July 19 a multi-year partnership, making the IT solutions provider the official naming rights partner of Rutgers Stadium.
- As part of the agreement, SHI (pronounced using the initials S H I) will enjoy significant brand exposure through signage in and around the stadium, including exterior stadium signage, scoreboard signage, campus directional signage and logo placement on the field. Additionally, SHI will receive promotion through a variety of print, digital, radio and television assets.
- SHI International Corp., a Somerset-based company, is a global provider of technology solutions and products with over 20,000 customers in the United States. Founded in 1989, SHI is the largest minority and woman-owned business enterprise in the country. From software and hardware procurement to deployment planning, configuration, data center optimization, IT asset management and cloud computing, SHI offers custom IT solutions for every aspect of the business environment.

EXPANDED BEER AND WINE SALES

- Rutgers Athletics announced in February that it will expand beer and wine sales at department-managed venues beginning in the fall of 2019. Revenues from the sales will serve to off-set scholarship costs, which support the State University of New Jersey's more than 600 student-athletes and exceed \$16 million annually.
- The expansion will include general seating areas for events at SHI Stadium, the RAC, Yurcak Field, as well as at baseball and softball.
- Division I universities are permitting alcohol sales with greater frequency inside athletics venues. A recent peer review revealed that 51 of the 129 NCAA Division I Football Bowl Subdivision programs allowed in-stadium alcohol sales to the general public. In addition, the NCAA Executive Council recently approved alcohol sales at NCAA Championship events.

OFFENSE

- •Rutgers has limited negative-yardage plays on offense, ranking first in the Big Ten and third nationally with only 2.67 tackles-perloss surrendered per game. In addition, the team leads the conference and sits seventh nationally with just 0.67 sacks permitted per game. RU's 18 sacks allowed since the start of the 2018 season are the fewest among Big Ten teams.
- Rutgers finished second in the Big Ten and 19th nationally in 2018 with only 1.33 sacks allowed per game. Opponents have had one or less sacks in 19 of the last 27 games dating back to 2017.
- Rutgers has 699 passing yards through three games, an increase of 305 yards compared to the same point last season. Total offense is 228 yards ahead of the 2018 pace.
- Rutgers' 48 points versus Massachusetts were the most against an FBS team under head coach Chris Ash.
- Rutgers had eight offensive plays gaining 20 or more yards in the season opener, the most in a game since having nine at Indiana in 2015. The team had multiple plays of 50 or more yards (Pacheco 57-yard rush, Carter to Melton 52-yard pass) in the same game last in 2016 versus New Mexico.
- Rutgers returned 68 percent (1,096/1,609) of rushing yards and 66 percent (1,053/1,586) of receiving yards from 2018.

Quarterbacks

McLane Carter

- Threw for 340 yards in debut for Rutgers against Massachusetts, most ever by a left-handed quarterback in program history.
- Marked the first 300-yard passing game by a Rutgers quarterback since Chris Laviano had 344 versus Maryland in 2015.
- Also the second-best starting debut for a Rutgers quarterback by yardage since 1990, only topped by Mike McMahon's 386 yards at Army in 1997.
- Tied career high with two touchdown passes, also doing so in 2018 for Texas Tech against Baylor.
- Became the first left-handed quarterback to start a game at Rutgers since Ralph Sacca on Nov. 9, 1996 versus West Virginia. The Scarlet Knights had started a right-hander the previous 268 games. The last lefty to start a season opener was Corey Valentine on Aug. 31, 1996 versus Villanova.
- Earned undergraduate degree in university studies from Texas Tech and immediately eligible as a graduate transfer. Enrolled in the labor studies and employment relations master's program at Rutgers.
- Played in nine games with three starts the previous two seasons at Texas Tech.
- Started the 2018 season opener against Ole Miss and completed four passes for 49 yards before leaving due to injury. Also started the season finale versus Baylor and went 21-for-37 for 247 yards and two touchdown passes.
- Named Academic All-Big 12 in 2018.
- Earned first FBS start against Texas in 2017, finishing 16-of-37 for 237 yards, also rushing nine times in the come-from-behind victory.
- Competed at Tyler JC as a freshman in 2016 and threw for 3,226 yards and 30 touchdowns in nine games. Breakout game came against Navarro, throwing for 578 yards on 39 completions with six touchdowns. Earned Conference MVP and Offensive MVP honors.
- Did not see action as a freshman at Incarnate Word in 2015.

Johnny Langan

- Made Rutgers debut against Massachusetts with one pass completion and two rushing attempts.
- Redshirted 2018 season at Boston College. Transferred to Rutgers for spring semester and ruled eligible for 2019 season after appeal.

Artur Sitkowski

- Threw for a career-high 304 passing yards, his first collegiate game reaching 300, against Boston College. Fourth time notching at least 200 passing yards in a start.
- Went 23-for-33 (69.9 percent) versus Boston College for best career passing completion percentage in a game. Has four games with 20 or more completions.
- Owns 12 career starts. Became the third Rutgers true freshman quarterback to make double-digit starts last season, joining Tom Savage (11 in 2009) and Ryan Cubit (all 11 in 2001). Just one of 11 true freshmen to start at quarterback for the Scarlet Knights since 1945.
- Had career bests with 29 completions (most by a RU quarterback since Mike Teel had 32 versus Connecticut in 2007), 46 attempts (most by Rutgers in a game since versus Cincinnati in 2013) and 267 passing yards against Illinois. Utilized eight different receivers and had a stretch of 12 consecutive completions, including 9-for-9 on a touchdown drive to close the second quarter. The 267 passing yards rank as ninth-most by an RU true freshman in a game.
- The 134 completions on the season ranked second in a season among RU true freshman quarterbacks all-time and 1,158 passing yards ranked sixth.
- Went 20-for-30 in first collegiate start, the best passing completion percentage by a RU true freshman in their first start and the best among freshmen quarterbacks during week
- Became the first Rutgers true freshman to start the season opener at quarterback since Ryan Cubit in 2001. The previous true freshman to start any game behind center for the Scarlet Knights was Gary Nova in an overtime win over USF on Nov. 5, 2011.
- Originally from Old Bridge, N.J., and played for Old Bridge High School for three seasons, earning All-GMC Red Division by *NJ.com* and *Gannett NJ* in 2016, before attending IMG Academy in Bradenton, Fla., as a senior. Helped the team to a 9-0 record in 2017 by finishing 45-of-79 for 370 yards and two touchdowns.

Running Backs

Raheem Blackshear

- Earned a spot on the Paul Hornung Award watch list before the season.
- Recorded a career-high nine receptions in games against Boston College and Massachusetts. Owns three career games with 100 or more receiving yards adding in the career-high 162 at Wisconsin in 2018.
- Leads all running backs nationally with 80 receiving yards and 7.3 receptions per game. Receptions mark sits 12th in the country overall and third among Big Ten players, while yardage is fifth in the league.
- Picked up eight first downs via the pass.
- Enters week eighth in the conference with 100.67 all-purpose yards per game. Has 10 career games with at least 100 all-purpose yards. Has led the team in all-purpose yards 12 times.
- Leads the active roster with 205 career carries, 901 rushing yards, 73 receptions, 755 receiving yards, 2,173 all-purpose yards and 12 touchdowns. Also leads with 29 career plays gaining 20 or more yards.
- Has recorded a reception in 16 consecutive games dating back to 2017.
- Named honorable mention All-Big Ten in the coaches' vote and to the Academic All-Big Ten list in 2018.
- Became the first Scarlet Knight since Albert Smith in 1985 to lead the team in rushing (586) and receiving yards (367) in a season.
- Also led team with 43 first downs picked up (26 rushing, 17 receiving).
- Was the only player in the country to accumulate at least 40 receptions, 350 receiving yards and 575 rushing yards in 2018 (BTN).
- Ranked 13th in the Big Ten with 94.67 all-purpose yards per game. Had a career-high 200 all-purpose yards at Wisconsin (162 receiving, 38 rushing).
- The 162 receiving yards at Wisconsin were the most ever in a game by an RU running back in program history. The previous best was 113 by Jim Cann at Temple in 1989.
- Has three career games with 100 or more rushing yards: 2018 vs. Penn State, 2018 at Kansas, 2017 vs. Morgan State.
- Owns 12 career touchdowns (six rushing, six receiving). Has three games with multiple scores.
- Named a team captain in 2019.

Isaih Pacheco

- Scored four rushing touchdowns in the season opener against Massachusetts (2, 57, 2, 7), most among all players nationally during week one. Had three touchdowns for the season in 2018.
- Rushed for nine first downs, including four times on third down.
- Totaled career highs with four receptions and 31 receiving yards at Iowa.

- Ranks fifth in the Big Ten with 79.7 rushing yards per game. Also ninth in the league with 5.2 yards per carry.
- Ran for 156 yards versus Massachusetts. Now has three career 100-yard rushing games (142 vs. Michigan and 107 vs. Maryland in 2018).
- Ranked sixth among Big Ten freshmen and 26th among all freshmen nationally with 45.9 rushing yards per game in 2018.
- Finished second on the team with 910 all-purpose yards (551 rushing, 348 kickoff return, 11 receiving) as a true freshman.
- Picked up 22 rushing first downs on the season.
- Had the longest rush by a freshman in Rutgers history with an 80-yard touchdown run against No. 4 Michigan.
- Finished with a season-high 142 rushing yards against the Wolverines, tied for third-most by a Scarlet Knight in a game against a ranked opponent. Totaled a game-high 213 all-purpose yards with 71 on kickoff returns.
- Ranked ninth in the Big Ten with 19.3 yards per kickoff return.
- Is 2-for-4 passing for 58 yards. Was a quarterback in high school.

- Had career highs with three receptions, all for first downs, and 44 yards versus Massachusetts. Matched three receptions versus Boston College.
- Nephew of Mohamed Sanu of the Atlanta Falcons.

Shameen Jones

• Totaled 15 receptions for 155 yards and one touchdown (against Indiana) in 2018.

Bo Melton

- Ranks fifth in the Big Ten with 20.67 yards per reception this year.
- Picked up either a first down or touchdown in 8-of-9 receptions. Has two catches on fourth down for conversions.
- Had a career-long rush of 21 yards versus Boston College.
- Recorded a career-high 127 receiving yards on six receptions against Massachusetts. Five of the six catches went for either a first down or a touchdown with an average of 21.2 yards per catch.
- First Rutgers wide receiver with over 100 receiving yards in a game since Jawuan Harris (118) versus Indiana in 2016 and most yards since Leonte Carroo recorded 183 against Maryland in 2015.
- Scored first collegiate touchdown on a 33yard reception against Massachusetts.
- Averaging 12.5 yards per reception on 41 career receptions. Second on the team with 245 yards in 2018.
- Picked up 12 first downs receiving plus one rushing last season.

• Has led the team in receiving yards six times in career.

Daevon Robinson

- Played in all 12 games with four starts at tight end in 2018. Transitioned to wide receiver in the offseason.
- Recorded eight receptions for 62 yards as a true freshman.

Isaiah Washington

- Hauled in career highs with three receptions for 52 yards versus Boston College.
- Started at Iowa to become first true freshman to start for Rutgers this season.

Tight Ends

Matt Alaimo

- All four catches have gone for a first down this season.
- Had two receptions for 32 yards in collegiate debut against Massachusetts.

DEFENSE

- Rutgers held lowa to 2-of-13 on third down and holding opponent to 18-for-48 on the season (38 percent).
- Rutgers ranked 19th nationally with 186.7 passing yards allowed per game in 2018. That was an improvement of 30.1 yards per game compared to 2017.
- Rutgers had 60 tackles-for-loss last year after having 50 in 12 games in 2017. The unit has had at least five in seven games.
- Rutgers implements the rugby-style tackling technique.
- Rutgers had two players drafted from the secondary in April, Saquan Hampton (sixth round, New Orleans Saints) and Blessuan Austin (sixth round, New York Jets). - Tied for the team lead with eight tackles in the season finale at Michigan State.
- Had an interception against Morgan State in 2017
- A Big Ten Distinguished Scholar last year.

Tyreek Maddox-Williams

- Named a team captain.
- Has 22 games of starting experience at linebacker to lead the position group.
- Totaled 48 tackles with four for a loss in 2018. Added a forced fumble.
- Missed 2017 season after suffering an ACL injury in summer camp.

Secondary

Tre Avery

- Broke up a pass and recorded first collegiate interception against Massachusetts.
- Ranks third in the conference with 23 yards per kickoff return.

Damon Hayes

- Leads the active roster with 38 collegiate games played, 145 career tackles, four interceptions and 20 pass breakups.
- The 24 career passes defended are 30th-most among active FBS players.
- Transitioned back to cornerback after starting 12 games at strong safety in 2018. Played in 23 games at cornerback as a freshman and sophomore.
- Tied for the team lead with 10 pass breakups in 2017. Tied for 10th in the Big Ten with 0.9 passes defended per game to earn honorable mention All-Big Ten (media vote).
- Had a 55-yard pick-six at Minnesota in 2016.

Jarrett Paul

• Leads the team with eight tackles against the pass this season.

Avery Young

- Recorded first collegiate interception against Massachusetts.
- Has 12-of-16 tackles this season against the run.
- Played in all 12 games with starts in the last 11 games at cornerback as a true freshman.

- Led the secondary with 66 tackles with 35 against the run, 30 in pass coverage and one on special teams in 2018. Added 10 pass breakups.
- Returned nine punts for 61 yards for an average of 6.8 per attempt (long of 22 yards).

SPECIAL TEAMS

- Rutgers is first in the Big Ten and eighth nationally with a net punt of 44.63 yards per attempt. Set a school record with a net punt average of 40.1 yards in 2018.
- Rutgers is 12-for-12 combining field goals (5) and extra points (7).
- Since 2009, Rutgers has blocked 52 kicks (field goals, extra points & punts) on special teams, nine more than any team in the NCAA during that span. Breaking down the blocked kicks since 2009, Rutgers has swatted 23 punts, 23 field goals and six extra points. The Scarlet Knights have scored directly nine times after a block, picking up eight touchdowns and one safety. Rutgers has blocked at least two kicks every season from 2002-18. The Scarlet Knights have 87 rejections overall in that period.
- Rutgers finished seventh in the nation with 16.4 yards allowed per kickoff return in 2018.
 The 41.6 net average placed second in the Big Ten.
- Kessawn Abraham and Tyshon Fogg led the team with four tackles each on special teams last year. Christian Izien has three so far to pace the team in 2019.

Justin Davidovicz

- Went 3-for-3 on field goals versus Boston College to improve to 5-for-5 on the season and 14-for-16 career. Is 24-for-24 career on extra points.
- One of 25 perfect kickers (on field goals) across the country this season entering the week
- Previous Rutgers kicker to make first five attempts in a season was San San Te in 2011. Last to start 6-for-6 was Ryan Sands in 2001.
- Is 10-for-10 career on attempts inside 40 yards.
- Owns two makes of at least 50 yards (50 vs. Boston College in 2019, 52 vs. Indiana in 2018) in as many attempts. Career-high 52-yarder tied for the longest by a Big Ten kicker last season. That kick against ranks as the longest in stadium history (since 1938) and tied for the fourth-longest in Rutgers history.
- Converted two field goals and six extra points for a career-high 12 points versus Massachusetts.
- Part of unit with long snapper Billy Taylor and holder Cole Murphy, a member of the Mortell Holder of the Year watch list.
- Averages 61.0 yards per kickoff with 36 career touchbacks (37 percent).
- Named honorable mention All-Big Ten in the coaches' vote in 2018.

 Served as kickoff specialist as a freshman before adding place-kicking duties as a sophomore.

Adam Korsak

- A member of the Ray Guy Award watch list. Named to the Ray Guy Award Punter of the Week following the last two games.
- Earned first Ray Guy Award Punter of the Week on Sept. 10 after averaging 47.6 yards on 10 attempts at lowa, finishing with a net of 46.5. Had seven punts downed inside the 20, five inside the 10 and four inside the 5. That included a season-long 69-yarder, tied for the seventh-longest in program history, that settled at the 1.
- Pinned all five attempts inside the 20-yard line against Boston College to make it 12-for-16 this year. Has no touchbacks this year.
- Has 14 career boots of at least 50 yards.
- Helped Rutgers to its best net punt mark in school history last year at 40.1 yards (17th nationally) in first season playing football at any level.
- Named honorable mention All-Big Ten by the coaches and media.
- Set the school record, which had stood since 2006, with a 79-yard punt against Northwestern, which tied for the fourth-longest punt in the nation last season.
- Averaged 42.7 yards, sixth in the Big Ten, on 78 attempts, which ranks third-best in a season in the RU record books.
- Pinned 23 inside the 20-yard line and only has three touchbacks. Downed an attempt at the one at Wisconsin.
- Twenty-one punts were fair caught, with 55-of-78 not returned last year.

LIFE BEYOND THE GAME

• Rutgers head coach Chris Ash instituted the "Life Beyond the Game" program, designed at preparing football players for their careers after their college playing days have ended. "The percentage of our guys going to the NFL is very small," said Ash. "Even if you do go to the NFL, your lifespan there could be very short and then what are you going to do for the rest of your life? Universities have programs set up to help the general students population with alumni, but I think it's our obligation to help student-athletes in their life after football."

THE HUNT

• Throughout the Rutgers football facilities are signs that read "The Hunt." "The Hunt' is really the theme of the team," said Ash. "We're basically chasing the other teams in the Big Ten. We can't make any secret about that. To chase them, we gotta go hunt every single day. Whether it's in the weight room, out in the indoor (bubble) with our special workouts or in practice."

HEAD COACH CHRIS ASH • FOURTH SEASON



Chris Ash took over the helm of the Rutgers football program, his first season as a head coach in 2016, culminating a nearly 20-year career as an assistant coach.

A coach with a national championship pedigree, Ash enjoyed a decorated and accomplished career prior to arriving "On the Banks," including five years in the Big Ten Conference (four as a defensive coordinator) with four Big Ten championships.

Ash built a reputation as a relentless and tireless worker throughout his various stops. Upon becoming the 30th head coach in the 147-year history at the Birthplace of College Football, Ash made clear his vision for the Scarlet Knights program.

"I want to build a first-class program here, a program that the University, the State of New Jersey, high school coaches and high school players can be proud to say that this program is theirs and they want to come here and be a part of it."

Ash has embarked on outlining the plans to complete that vision, which includes a mission to create an environment to develop student-athletes mentally, physically and spiritually to reach their full potential and to be successful in life after football.

The 2017 season was one marked by improvements for the Scarlet Knights as the team matched its program record for victories in Big Ten play, tying a league win total from 2014, the first year in the conference. Rutgers defeated Illinois on the road for its first road league win in two seasons and topped both Purdue and Maryland in front its home crowd.

In his previous post before Rutgers, Ash served as co-defensive coordinator and safeties coach at Ohio State and helped lead the Buckeyes to the 2014 national championship.

In his five seasons as a defensive coordinator, Ash pioneered four groups ranked in the top 25 statistically, including a top-10 defensive unit in 2015. As the defense coordinator at Wisconsin in 2011 and 2012, the Badgers put together back-to-back seasons ranked 15th overall in total defense. The 2011 squad was 13th in scoring defense while the 2012 team turned in a 17th-place ranking.

Ash was hired by Ohio State head coach Urban Meyer in January 2014 to improve a Buckeye defense that placed 112th in pass defense and 47th in total defense in 2013. In his first season, OSU's defense ranked 19th nationally in total defense and 29th in pass defense. The Buckeyes also ranked fourth in the country with 24 interceptions en route to Big Ten, Sugar Bowl and national championships.

In 2015, the Ohio State defense continued its strides under Ash, ranking second in scoring defense nationally and ninth-best in total defense. The Buckeyes earned a berth in the Fiesta Bowl, finishing the season with a 12-1 record after defeating Notre Dame in the bowl game.

The 2016 NFL Draft saw numerous players from Ash's defensive unit selected, including the first overall defensive player in Joey Bosa, who was picked third by the San Diego Chargers. In all, the draft featured six defensive players taken from Ohio State with three in the first round.

Prior to taking over the OSU defense, Ash held the defensive coordinator post and coached the secondary at the University of Arkansas in the Southeastern Conference in 2013 under head coach Bret Bielema. He helped improve Arkansas' pass defense in his one season in Fayetteville, with the Razorbacks' defense finishing 72nd nationally in passing yards allowed after ranking 113th in 2012.

Ash was first promoted to the defensive coordinator role in the Big Ten while at the University of Wisconsin, where he spent three seasons with the Badgers. His 2011 defense led the Big Ten (conference games only) in total defense and pass defense efficiency, and it ranked fourth nationally in fewest passing yards allowed (163.6), 13th in scoring (19.0) and 15th in total defense (316.4). In 2012, the UW defense ranked 15th nationally in total defense (322.5), 17th in scoring (19.1), 18th in fewest passing yards allowed (193.6), 22nd in pass efficiency and 24th against the run (128.9).

Ash began his coaching career as a defensive graduate assistant at his alma mater, Drake University, in 1997. He was promoted to defensive coordinator for the next two seasons before moving on to Iowa State University in 2000. Ash spent eight seasons over two different stints in Ames, including the 2009 season, during which current Texas head coach Tom Herman was also on the staff. Ash progressed from graduate assistant with the Cyclones in 2000-01 to defensive backs coach for a total of six seasons.

Ash spent the 2007 and 2008 seasons at San Diego State University as the defensive backs coach and recruiting coordinator under head coach and College Football Hall of Fame inductee Chuck Long.

Ash has produced numerous instructional videos, including a three-video series -- "Aggressive 4-3 Defense" -- that includes shutting down the passing game and stuffing the run segments. He has coached 34 different players that have gone on to sign NFL contracts.

A native of Ottumwa, Iowa, Ash earned his undergraduate degree from Drake in 1996, and was a two-time letterwinner at defensive back for the Bulldogs. He is one of three from that era of Drake football who became a FBS head coach, joining Dave Doeren (NC State) and Charlie Partridge (formerly with Florida Atlantic). Ash completed his master's degree in education from Iowa State in 2005.

Ash and his wife, Doreen, are the parents of a son, Brady and daughter, Alexis. Ash also has a son, Tanner, and a daughter, Jacey.
