Tariq Francis joins the Scarlet Knights for the 2025-26 season with two years of eligibility remaining following a standout career at NJIT in the America East Conference. He brings a strong reputation for excellence on both ends of the court, particularly on offense.

At NJIT:

- Played in 27 games, starting 26, and led the America East Conference with an average of 19.2 points per game. Also averaged 4.3 rebounds, 34.6 minutes, along with 97 assists and 28 steals.
- Recorded 14 games with 20+ points, shooting 84 percent from the stripe, 50 percent from the field, and 32 percent from beyond the arc.
- Holds an active streak of 45 consecutive games making at least one three pointer.
- Delivered a standout performance with 27 points, seven rebounds, six assists, and four threepointers at UMBC.
- Had a five-game stretch with 23-plus points, including a season best 29 points and careerbest six three-pointers in a season finale win at Binghamton.

Jamichael Davis is a 6-foot-2, 175-pound point guard returning for his Junior season in 2025-26. Davis is known for playing hard at all times when on the court, facilitating the ball to his teammates, and being a lockdown defender.

2024-25 Season:

- Played in all 32 games (seven starts), averaging 18.0 minutes per game with 55 assists and 29 steals.

Angelino "Lino" Mark is a 6-foot-2, 185-pound point guard known for his speed, explosiveness, and high basketball IQ. Bringing a strong winning pedigree from the West Coast, Mark arrives in Piscataway this fall ready to make an immediate impact.



A father of four, Steve Pikiell has led the resurgence of Rutgers men's basketball both on and off the court. Entering his 10th season as head coach of the Scarlet Knights in 2025-26, Pikiell guided Rutgers back to the NCAA Tournament in 2021, its first appearance since 1991. The team returned in 2022, marking the first consecutive NCAA appearances since 1976. In 2022, Pikiell surpassed Tom Young for the most ranked wins in school history (17). Pikiell's 147 wins at Rutgers are third all-time in school history.

Pikiell has coached some of the greatest players in Rutgers history, including the school's 11th All-American in Ron Harper Jr., National Defensive Player of the Year and all-time steals leader Caleb McConnell, and Big Ten Medal of Honor winner Geo Baker. In 2024-25, Pikiell led the recruitment of the highest-ranked players in school history, Dylan Harper and Ace Bailey, who became the highest NBA clarft picks in program history in 2025. Pikiell welcomes the fourth-best recruiting class in the Big Ten Conference and the 30th in the nation in 2025-26.

With 35 years of coaching experience, the Bristol, Connecticut, native is under contract to remain at Rutgers through the 2030-31 season. As the 19th head coach in school history, Pikiell has been instrumental in program turnarounds throughout his career, achieving conference championships and NCAA Tournament berths. He celebrated his 100th career victory at Rutgers and his 300th career victory overall during the 2022-23 season.

The 2024-25 Season

Led Rutgers to its highest-scoring offense in 32 years, averaging 76.6 points per game. Freshmen Dylan Harper and Ace Bailey set Rutgers records for freshman scoring and became the highest NBA draft picks in school history (Harper: 2nd overall, Spurs; Bailey: 5th overall, Jazz). The 2024-25 recuiring class was ranked as high as No. 2 in the nation. the highest in school history, including the No. 2 and No. 3 players in the country in Harper and Bailey, respectively. Continued home sellout streak of 78-straight games at Jersey Mike's Arena.

The 2023-24 Season

Maintained one of the nation's best homecourt advantages, finishing 12-5 at home and selling out every home game. Secured a 16th-ranked win with a 78-56 victory over No. 9 Wisconsin. Achieved the school's first-ever win at Michigan and a four-game conference winning streak. Center Clifford Omoruyi averaged 2.9 blocks per game (third nationally) and earned All-Big Ten First Defensive Team honors. The Scarlet Knights sold out of season tickets during the summer, marking the quickest home slate sellout in school history. Collected 16th-ranked win with a 78-56 victory over No.9 Wisconsin on Feb. 9 in Piscataway. A fourgame winning streak during conference play started with the school's first-ever win at Michigan, a 69-59 victory at the Crisler Center on Feb. 3. Jeremiah Williams was awarded the Scarlet Knights' third-ever Big Ten Player of the Week during that stretch. Center Clifford Omoruyi finished as one of the best rim defenders in the nation with 2.9 blocks-per-game good for third in the nation and first in the Big Ten. Also, Omoruyi was honored with All-Big Ten First Defensive Team Honors, All Big Ten Honorable Mention and All-Met Third Team honors.

The 2022-23 Season

Guided Rutgers to three straight postseason berths for the first time in school history. Notched a 14th-ranked win over No. 8 Indiana and a victory at No. 1 Purdue. Celebrated his 100th Rutgers win and 300th career win. Caleb McConnell earned the Lefty Driesell National Defensive Player of the Year and ESPN National Defensive Player of the Year honors. Picked up his 100th career victory at Rutgers and 300th career victory overall during the 2022-23 season. Led RU to three straight postseason berths for the first time in school history.

Had all five starters get Big Ten Postseason Award recognition for the second-straight season. Had his second Lefty Driesell Na-tional Defensive Player of the Year in Caleb McConnell, and McConnell went on to win the ESPN National Defensive Player of the Year. Signed No. 20-ranked (247 Sports) Gavin Griffiths, the highest-ranked recruit in his tenure as head coach at Rutgers. The 2021-22 Season Rutgers earned 12 Big Ten wins-the most in school history-and made its second consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance. The Scarlet Knights achieved program firsts, including victories over a No. 1 ranked team (Purdue), Michigan, and Wisconsin, as well as back-toback wins over ranked opponents. Rutgers became the all-time leader in ranked wins under Pikiell. Caleb McConnell won the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year award. Ron Harper Jr. was named the 11th men's basketball All-American in school history.

The 2020-21 Season

Pikiell received the Peter A. Carlesimo Award from the Met Basketball Writers Association for the second straight season (fourth overall). Led Rutgers to its first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1991, defeating No. 7 seed Clemson for the program's first NCAA win since 1983. Rutgers went 16-12 despite the nation's second-toughest schedule and finished with 10 Big Ten wins over two seasons. Guided the Scarlet Knights to an opening round victory over No. 7 seed Clemson that marked RU's first NCAA Tournament win since 1983. The Scarlet Knights' win over No. 7 seed Clemson in the opening round marked the highest-seeded team defeated in the NCAA Tournament since 1979, before falling to an eventual Final Four team in No. 2 seed Houston.

While facing a strength of schedule ranked as the second toughest in the nation by ESPN.com, Rutgers went 16-12 overall, ensuring back-to-back winning seasons for the first time in 29 years. Under Pikiell's leadership, Rutgers won 10 Big Ten Conference games and has earned 21 Big Ten wins over the past two seasons. RU finished tied for sixth in 39the nation's top-rated conference. The team spent 11 weeks nationally ranked or receiving votes



in the AP Poll, peaking at No. 11 in the nation. In the regular season, RU earned wins over five teams that qualified for the NCAA Tournament - No. 1 seed Illinois, No. 4 seed Purdue, No. 10 seed Maryland, No. 11 seed Michigan State and No. 11 seed Syracuse.

The 2019-20 Season

Recipient of the 2019-20 Jim Phelan Award, presented annually to the nation's top Division I coach, and Peter A. Carlesimo Award, presented by the Met Basketball Writers Association to the top coach in the Metropolitan Area. Was one of 15 coaches on the Naismith Coach of the Year Late 2020 Season Watch List. Rutgers joined the rankings for the first time in 41 years, since the final 1978-79 AP Poll (No. 18). The Scarlet Knights were No. 24/25 & No. 25/25 in the Jan. 20 & 27 polls, respectively. RU was ranked or receiving votes for eight weeks. RU captured its first 20-win regular season in 37 years, since 1982-83, and first 20-win season overall since 2003-04, and had its first winning season in 14 years, since 2005-06 (19-14). Led Scarlet Knights to most conference victories (11) in 29 years, since 1990-91 (14-4; A-10), while also posting its first winning league record in

Secured the most home regular-season wins in the nation (18) and set a program record for home wins in a season. Tied for fifth in the Big Ten Conference, the nation's top-rated league per Ken Pomeroy, after being selected 12th in the preseason media poll. Earned RU's first opening round bye in a conference tournament in 25 years, since the 1995 Atlantic 10 Championship. Opened the RWJ Barnabas Health Athletic Performance Center to help further the mission of bringing winning back to Piscataway. The 307,000-squarefoot, four-story sports facility and parking deck held its grand opening on Sept. 12, 2019, and provides state-of-the-art practice facilities, training areas, locker room, and office space for men's basketball. Has welcomed four-star signees from New Jersey in three consecutive classes, with Cliff Omoruyi (2020) joining Paul Mulcahy (2019) and Ron Harper, Jr. (2018) in electing to stay home.

The 2018-19 Season

Rutgers was recognized as the nation's Most Improved Team by Sports Illustrated. The Scarlet Knights improved 70 positions in the KenPom.com rankings, best among all Power conference programs. Led Rutgers to seven league victories, its most in conference play in 13 years, while competing with a roster ranked 330th in experience. Projected to finish 14th in the preseason, Rutgers tied for 10th in the Big Ten standings. Rutgers' schedule ranked 31st nationally in difficulty per Ken Pom, toughest among all New York Metro programs. 61 percent (19/31) of games were against opponents that earned 2019 NCAA Championship (15) or National Invitation Tournament (4) berths. Rutgers concluded its season 75th in the KenPom ratings, the program's best rank since concluding its 2005-06 campaign at No. 71.

With wins over No. 16 Ohio State and at No. 22 lowa, the Scarlet Knights enrned victories over two ranked league opponents for the first time since 2007-08. Rutgers had five sellouts at the RAC, its most since 2004-05 (7), and average attendance improved

31.1%. Welcomed a four-recruit signing class that included multiple four-star players for the first time at Rutgers since 2008.

The 2017-18 Season

Rutgers advanced to the Big Ten Conference quarterfinals at Madison Square Garden via wins over Minnesota and five-time national champion Indiana. It marked the first time RU won two conference tournament games since 1998. Despite playing the second toughest conference schedule in the Big Ten according to Ken Pom analysis for the second straight year, Rutgers ranked 17th nationally in both scoring defense (64.8) and offensive rebounding (13.15), while placing 27th in 3-point FG% defense (27.0).

The Scarlet Knights ranked among the top three in the Big Ten in eight statistical categories, including leading the league in offensive rebounding and 3-point FG% defense. RU accomplished these improvements while playing 10 games against programs that advanced to the round of 32 in the NCAA Tournament. Defeated No. 15 Seton Hall 71-65 before 8,318 fans at the RAC on Dec. 16, 2017, in the annual Garden State Hardwood Classic, Rutgers was honored as the NABC D-I National Team of the Week for its win over the Pirates. Rutgers enjoyed multiple home sell-outs at the RAC in the same season for the first time since 2011. The 8,325 attendance vs. Purdue (Feb. 3, 2108) was the largest at the RAC in 15 years.

The 2016-17 Season:

Began tenure with a 9-1 start, the best head-coaching debut in Rutgers men's basketball history. The Scarlet Knights more than doubled their overall win total, while tripling their conference victory total. Rutgers achieved a plus117 rank improvement in RPI, as well as major NCAA ranking improvements in rebound margin (+299), scoring defense (+272), three-point FG defense (+247), offensive rebounds (+244), rebounds (+232), field goal percentage defense (+226), and blocks (+114). The Scarlet Knights ranked among the top 100 in 10 NCAA statistical categories, including among the top 50 in seven, after ranking among the top 150 in just two statistical categories in 2015-16.

Posted an undefeated home mark in nonconference play and jumped out to a 6-0 record, the sixth-best undefeated start in the 110-year history of the program. Played 17 games, 52% of its schedule, against programs that earned NCAA (13) or NIT (4) bids. Rutgers out-rebounded opponents in 11 of 18 conference games, after winning the boards in just three league contests the prior year. Ten Big Ten games were decided in single digits after suffering 15 conference losses by double digits in 2015-16.

Prior to Rutgers

Pikiell led Stony Brook to six postseason appearances in seven years, winning four America East regular season championships and earning America East Coach of the Year four times. He served as an assistant at George Washington (2001-05), Central Connecticut State (1997-01), Yale (1992-95), and began his career at UConnecticut State (1997-01), Yale (1992-95), He also had a stint as interim head coach at Wesleyan and played professionally with the New Haven Skyhawks (USBL, 1992).

As a player

Was a four-year letterwinner and two-time team captain at Connecticut from 1987-91 under head coach Jim Calhoun, Pikiell was one of the first recruits to join Calhoun at UConn, kickstarting the career of one of the best coaches in college basketball history. After placing ninth in the Big East with a 4-12 record in his freshman season, UConn won its first Big East title and advanced to the Elite Eight and Sweet 16 during the two years he captained the Huskies. As a senior, helped No. 11-seeded UConn to a 79-62 win over Shaquille O'Neal and No. 6 seed LSU in the round of 64.

Played in 106 career games and averaged 8.2 points a game. Was the recipient of the UConn Club Senior Athlete Award for outstanding contributions to UConn Athletics. Enjoyed a storied career at St. Paul Catholic High School. A three-time all-state selection, he had his No. 21 jersey retired by the school and ranks among its all-time leaders in points, assists and steals. Was inducted into Bristol's Hall of Fame in 2006.

Pikiell and his wife, Kate, have four chidren: Brooke (a Northwestern basketball/graduate student at Rutgers), John Patrick (a Rutgers graduate), Olivia (current Rutgers women's lacrosse player/ former UNC lacrosse player), and Kevin (Sacred Heart men's basketball player). A 1990 graduate of UConn with a degree in finance, Pikiell was a four-year letterwinner and two-time team captain. He enjoyed a distinguished high school career at St. Paul Catholic High School, with his No. 21 jersey retired and induction into the Bristol Hall of Fame in 2006



Brandin Knight enters his fifth season as Associate Head Coach of Rutgers men's basketball in 2025-26 and his tenth overall with the program, having joined Rutgers as an assistant coach on April 18, 2016. A New Jersey native, Knight is recognized as one of college basketball's rising coaching talents, with 12 NCAA Tournament appearances to his credit—ten as a staffer and two as a student-athlete—including four Sweet Sixteen appearances.

Knight has been instrumental in recruiting and developing NBA-caliber Scarlet Knights, including Dylan Harper, Ace Bailey, Clifford Omoruyi, and Ron Harper Jr. In 2024-25, he played a key role in bringing in Rutgers' highest-ranked recruits in school history, Dylan Harper and Ace Bailey, who became the highest two draft picks in program history in the first round of the 2025 NBA Draft. During the 2024-25 season, Knight helped guide the Rutgers offense that scored 76.6 points per game, the best at the school in 32 years. During the 2023-24 season, Knight helped Rutgers maintain one of the nation's strongest homecourt advantages, finishing 12-5 at home with sellouts for every game. In 2022-23, Rutgers became the first team in school history to achieve four consecutive winning seasons and reached postseason play for the third straight year.

Knight's impact extends beyond recruiting. He is central to game-planning, opponent scouting, and the development of Rutgers' backcourt and perimeter players. Rutgers has signed four-star recruits from New Jersey in three consecutive classes, including Cliff Omoruyi (2020), Paul Mulcahy (2019), and Ron Harper Jr. (2018), highlighting the Knights' recruiting presence. He was named to The Athletic's "40 Under 40: Rising Stars' list in 2020.

Under Knight's guidance, Rutgers earned its first NCAA Tournament bid since 1991 in 2020-21, defeating Clemson in the opening round—the Scarlet Knights' first NCAA Tournament win since 1983. Rutgers posted its first winning season in 14 years in 2019-20 (20-11), including 18 home wins—the most in the nation and a program record. That season, Rutgers tied for fifth in the Big Ten and achieved its most conference

victories in 29 years, earning an opening road bye in the conference tournament for the first time in 25 years.

Rutgers has achieved multiple historic milestones with Knight on staff, including double-digit wins over ranked opponents, a 20-point victory over Seton Hall in the Garden State Hardwood Classic, and recognition by Sports Ilustrated as the nation's Most Improved Team in 2018-19. The Scarlet Knights also improved 70 spots in the KenPom. com rankings—the largest jump among Power Conference programs—and posted seven league victories, the most in 13 years, with a roster ranked 330th in experience.

Knight began his tenure at Rutgers after an accomplished career at the University of Pittsburgh, where he served as assistant coach from 2008-16, director of basketball operations in 2007-08, and program assistant/video coordinator in 2006-07. During his time at Pitt, the Panthers went 252-101 (.714), reached the postseason in all 10 seasons, won the 2008 Big East Championship, earned two NCAA No. 1 seeds (2009, 2011). and captured the 2011 Big East regular season title. Knight played a key role in the development of All-America selection Sam Young and all-league guards Levance Fields, Ashton Gibbs, and Tray Woodall

As a student-athlete at Pittsburgh (1999-2003), Knight was a standout point guard who helped lead the Panthers to consecutive Big East regular season titles (2001-02, 2002-03), two Sweet Sixteen appearances, the program's first Big East Tournament title (2003), and three consecutive Big East Tournament finals (2001-03). He earned numerous honors, including 2003 Wooden All-American, 2002 Associated Press All-American, two-time All-Big East honoree, Big East co-MVP (2001-02), and Most Improved Player (2001-02), Knight concluded his career with 1,440 points, 785 assists (school record), 492 rebounds, and 298 steals (school record), along with career marks for assists per game (6.2), 3-point field goal attempts (261), minutes played in a season (1,284), and consecutive games with at least one assist (91). His No. 20 jersey was retired by Pitt on March 4, 2009, and he was inducted into the Pitt Athletics Hall of Fame in 2020.

Following college, Knight played two seasons with the NBDL's Asheville Altitude, winning back-to-back league titles in 2003-04 and 2004-05. He signed with

the Houston Rockets in 2005 but suffered a knee injury. During rehabilitation, he began coaching AAU teams, including a squad that won the Under-16 Pittsburgh Jamfest title in 2006. Knight's brother, Brevin, was a 12-year NBA veteran and consensus All-America point quard at Stanford: the Knights are one of only eight brother combinations in NCAA Division I history to earn All-America honors. Knight is the son of Brenda and Melvin Knight, the latter a former Seton Hall assistant coach and athletic director at Essex County College (N.J.). He earned a degree in History from Pittsburgh in 2005. He and his wife, Michelle, are proud parents of two children, Kylah and Brandin Jr.

T.J. Thompson enters his fifth season as an assistant coach at Rutgers in 2025-26 and his seventh season overall with the Scarlet Knights. A First Team All-Atlantic 10 selection and four-year starter at George Washington University under head coach Steve Pikiell, Thompson has quickly developed a reputation as one of college basketball's rising coaching talents.

Since joining Rutgers, Thompson has cultivated strong relationships with players and has become an integral part of recruiting, player development, and program growth. During the 2024-25 season, Rutgers recorded its highestscoring offense in 32 years, averaging 76.6 points per game. In 2023-24, the Scarlet Knights maintained one of the nation's best homecourt advantages, finishing 12-5 at home with sellouts for every game. In 2022-23, Rutgers became the first team in school history to achieve four consecutive winning seasons and reached postseason play for a third straight year.

Thompson played a key role in Rutgers' return to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in consecutive seasons since 1976 during the 2021-22 campaign. He has also established himself as one of Rutgers' top recruiters, securing the program's first five-star recruit under Pikiell, wing Gavin Griffiths. Thompson has helped identify talent nationwide, contributing to the recruitment of players including point guard Geo Baker (New Hampshire), forward Antwone Woolfolk (Ohio), and forward Antonio Chol (Buffalo).

Pikiell said the following on Thompson's hiring:

"We are very excited to welcome T.J. and his wife Ilima to the Rutgers family," said Pikiell on the date of his original hire. "I was fortunate to coach T.J. for four years. His basketball knowledge,

combined with his experience at both the collegiate and professional levels, will be a tremendous asset. He's been through the battles as a player and was instrumental in helping us build up our program at GW. He loves basketball and has a passion for the game. T.J. will fit in seamlessly with our staff, as we add yet another high-character and quality individual to the program."

Thompson began his Rutgers tenure as the Scarlet Knights' Director of Basketball Administration for two seasons. In that role, he assisted the support staff with day-to-day program operations, including academic support, media relations, player development, film breakdown, player analysis, and oversight of university and community outreach initiatives.

Before Rutgers, Thompson co-founded the D.C. Blue Devils New Hampshire non-profit and AAU program, serving as program director and head coach for six years. He oversaw operations for seven teams, managed coaching staff, led practice and player development sessions, and implemented mentoring and academic tutoring programs to support student-athletes' off-court success.

More than 50 players, including current Rutgers captain Geo Baker, advanced to NCAA programs under his guidance.

A native of Germantown, Maryland, Thompson was a four-year starter and two-time all-conference selection at George Washington. He helped lead the Colonials to their first Atlantic 10 Tournament title as a senior captain in 2004-05, totaling 22 wins—the most since 1997-98—and earning an automatic NCAA Tournament bid. Thompson still holds the GW career record for three-pointers (229) and ranks fifth in assists (484) and eighth in steals (158). Thompson earned a Bachelor of Arts in Sociology in 2005 before competing professionally in premier European leagues for 10 years. He also participated in the Boston Celtics Las Vegas Summer League squad in 2007.





Marlon Williamson enters his third season as an assistant coach for Rutgers men's basketball in 2025-26. He joined the Scarlet Knights ahead of the 2023-24 season after serving as an assistant coach at Central Michigan University from 2021-23. Known as a toptier recruiter with deep ties in Detroit, throughout Michigan, the Midwest, and the East Coast, Williamson brings over 20 years of coaching experience to Rutgers.

Prior to Central Michigan, Williamson spent four seasons as an assistant at Long Island University-Brooklyn (2017-21) under head coach Derek Kellogg, helping lead LIU to an NCAA Tournament appearance in 2018—the program's first in five seasons. He previously served two seasons at the University of Pittsburgh under head coach Jamie Dixon, including an NCAA Tournament appearance in 2015-16.

From 2012-14, Williamson was an assistant at the University of Massachusetts under Derek Kellogg, where the Minutemen compiled a 45-21 record and made back-to-back postseason appearances. In 2013-14, UMass earned its first NCAA Tournament bid in 16 years as a No. 6 seed, finishing 24-9 overall and 10-6 in Atlantic 10 Conference play

Pikiell on Willamson's Hiring:

"We are very excited to welcome Marlon to the Rutgers men's basketball family," head coach Steve Pikiell said. "Marlon is an awesome family man and brings all the things that I love to our program. He's a hard worker who's worked at some great programs and made them better. He has a proven winning pedigree and has grinded his way to the NCAA Tournament with many of those programs."

"Marlon has an excellent eye for talent and has really helped recruit with tremendous ties to the AAU scene," Pikiell added. "We have added another great former college basketball player to our staff and a coach who can develop our players. Marlon is another high charac-

ter individual that will fit right in with our program. Rutgers men's basketball got better today with the hiring of Marlon Williamson."

"I'm so blessed to receive this opportunity at Rutgers. I could tell right away this is a special place, and I am excited to work under Coach Pikiell's leadership. I look forward to bringing my experience from the MAC Conference to help Rutgers compete in the Big Ten. From the moment I came in for my interview, I felt the love and passion from everyone on staff. This isn't a job for me—it's what I love to do."

Williamson joins a Rutgers staff featuring prominent former college players, including head coach Steve Pikiell (UConn), Associate Head Coach Brandin Knight (Pittsburgh), and Assistant Coach T.J. Thompson (George Washington).

Prior to his collegiate coaching career, Williamson spent nine years with The Family, a Detroit-based AAU program, serving as head coach and president of Youth Operations. In that role, he oversaw scouting, scheduling, academic progress monitoring, and player counseling. He also coached multiple age-level teams, helping student-athletes advance academically and athletically.

As a player, Williamson was a four-year letter-winner and point guard at Youngstown State University (1999-2003). He was named team MVP, served as captain, and earned a spot on the Horizon League All-Defensive Team as a senior. Over his collegiate career, he scored 379 points, recorded 199 assists, and made 45 three-pointers in 99 games. Williamson also starred at Detroit's Cass Tech High School.

Williamson holds a Bachelor of Arts in Global Studies from Youngstown State. He and his wife, Angela, have a daughter, Marli.

Jay Young returns to Rutgers in 2025-26 for his second year as an assistant coach in his second stint with the Scarlet Knights. A respected veteran with 37 years of coaching experience, Young returned to Rutgers in 2024-25 after four seasons as head coach at Fairfield University.

"We are thrilled to welcome Jay Young back home to Rutgers," said head coach Steve Pikiell said at the time of his hiring. "Jay is one of the hardest workers I have been around in my 30-plus years of coaching. He helped build winning programs from the ground up at Stony Brook and Rutgers and brings an outstanding wealth of knowledge to all areas of our program."

Young added, "It's special for my family and me to be back with Coach Pikiell after 14 great years together. I value being around great people and a tremendous university. During my previous tenure at Rutgers, I met so many remarkable people, and now to be reunited with them, I couldn't be more excited. I am as hungry as ever to get back to coaching."

Young has guided programs to eight national tournament appearances, including two at both the Division I and II levels and four at the Division III level, highlighted by an NJCAA Final Four berth.

During his first tenure at Rutgers, the Scarlet Knights set new standards for Big Ten wins, recorded their first Big Ten postseason victory in 2017, and reached the Big Ten Tournament Quarterfinals for the first time in 2018. In 2019-20, KenPom.com ranked Rutgers as the most improved JAY YOUNG

Power Six conference program in the nation, jumping 71 positions from the previous season. Following Young's departure, Rutgers reached the NCAA Tournament for the first time in 30 years in 2021 and returned in consecutive seasons for the first time since 1976.

Before returning to Rutgers, Young served as Associate Head Coach at Stony Brook University under Steve Pikiell. Hé helped guide the Seawolves to their first NCAA postseason berth in Division I history in 2016, after winning the America East Tournament and Regular Season Championship, and also earned three NIT appearances. Young was instrumental in recruiting Jameel Warney, a threetime America East Player of the Year and Stony Brook's all-time leader in points, rebounds, and blocked shots, as well as three of the Seawolves' top four all-time leading scorers.

Previously, Young served as head coach at the University of New Haven, leading a program with just one winning season in the prior eight years to back-to-back NCAA postseason appearances in 2003-04, including the school's first national-stage victory since 1988. He posted a 78-66 (.542) record over five seasons, culminating with four consecutive winning campaigns.

Young began his head coaching career at Newbury College in the junior college ranks, earning NJCAA Regional Coach of the Year honors twice and 1995 NJCAA District VI Coach of the Year. He guided the team to three straight postseason appearances, highlighted by a trip to the 1995 NJCAA Division III Final Four. His assistant coaching experience also includes stops at Northeastern, Salem State, and Fitchburg State.

Young began his coaching career as an assistant at Fitchburg State (1987-88), followed by Salem State (1988-90) under Jim Todd, helping the Vikings win consecutive MASCAC titles and reach the NCAA Division III tournament twice.

A 1986 graduate of Marist College with a bachelor's degree in Political Science, Young resides with his wife, Janet.

Steve Hayn, who brings over 29 years of collegiate leadership experience—including 17 seasons as a head coach—was elevated to an assistant coaching role with Rutgers men's basketball heading into the 2023-24 season. After serving as Chief of Staff for two seasons, Hayn returned to the court full-time, working individually with players and leading practice sessions, while maintaining his responsibilities as Chief of Staff. In his dual role, he contributes to recruiting, game planning, scouting, practice coordination, and overall program support.

Hayn was first appointed Chief of Staff prior to the 2021-22 season, during which he helped lead the Scarlet Knights to a fourth-place finish in the Big Ten—the highest in school history. In this capacity, he oversaw every aspect of the program, coordinated scheduling, and served as a liaison to the academic advisor.

Pikiell on Hayn's Hiring:

"After meeting with many qualified candidates during a broad search, the best person for the position was right next door. Steve Hayn has been a successful head coach at the collegiate and high school levels, specializing in the development of big men. His skills and relationships are a perfect fit for our program as we continue our work toward postseason success."

Hayn initially joined Rutgers as an assistant coach on June 4, 2019. A Long Island native, he was named the 2014 Metropolitan Basketball Writers Division II Coach of the Year and previously served as Rutgers' Senior Advisor for three seasons.

As an assistant coach, Hayn has been instrumental in developing the Scarlet Knights' frontcourt players and offensive execution. He helped lead Rutgers to its second consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance for the first time since 1976, including the program's first NCAA Tournament win in 38 years. During this period, Rutgers was ranked as high as No. 11 in the AP Poll in 2020-21 and recorded its first 20-win season in 37 years during 2019-20.

In his first season as an assistant, the Scarlet Knights tied for fifth in the Big Ten Conference—the nation's top-rated league per Ken Pomeroy—posting an 11-9 league record, earning their most conference victories in 29 years, and securing the first opening road bye in a conference tournament in 25 years.

Prior to Rutgers, Hayn served as head coach at the United States Merchant Marine Academy (2014-16), achieving notable success including multiple wins over top 25-ranked teams. Across four head-coaching stops, his programs collectively averaged 7.75 more wins in his final season compared to his first. At Dowling College in 2013-14, Hayn led the team to a 22-7 record, earning East Coast Conference and Met honors.

Hayn and head coach Steve Pikiell previously served as assistants together at Central Connecticut State under Howie Dickenman, helping turn a four-win team into a school-record 19 victories and a Northeast Conference Tournament finals appearance. Hayn began his coaching career at Port Jefferson (N.Y.) High School (1993-95), then moved to Genesee

Community College, leading the team to a 26-6 record and Region III semifinals appearance. He later served as head coach at SUNY Fredonia (1999-2001) and Stevens Institute of Technology (2001-06), achieving multiple program turnarounds and postseason successes

At Dowling College, Hayn led the Golden Lions from a 6-22 record in 2006-07 to a 22-7 mark in 2013-14, while maintaining team GPAs near 3.0.

Hayn is a 1991 graduate of Stony Brook University with a bachelor's degree in liberal studies and earned a master's degree in Special Education from C.W. Post in 1993. Prior to his coaching career, he worked as a special education teacher from 1991-95. He is the proud father of two children, son Zachary and daughter Sophie.

Mike Larkin returns for his seventh season with the Scarlet Knights in 2025-26, serving as Director of Basketball Operations for head coach Steve Pikiell's program. Larkin originally joined Rutgers for the 2019-20 campaign as Special Assistant to the Head Coach before being promoted to his current role.

A native of Patchogue, New York, Larkin arrived "On the Banks" after serving seven seasons on the coaching staff at Saint Michael's College, including four as Associ-ate Head Coach. During his tenure at Saint Michael's, he guided the Purple Knights to back-to-back 18-win seasons and the program's first NE-10 Semifinal appearance in 14 years. He helped develop four players who went on to professional careers and was instrumental in recruiting under-valued talent, including three Northeast-10 All-Rookie honorees, highlighted by the 2019-20 NE-10 Rookie of the Year.

"Mike is a very talented and dedicated individual who makes Rutgers Basketball better," said head coach Steve Pikiell. "He brings a track record of meeting challenges and achieving success at the Division II and III levels. Most importantly, he is a character person committed to a winning culture."

Larkin oversees a wide range of program operations, including film breakdown and analysis, opponent scouting, facility management, practice planning, and recruiting support. He provides executive-level support to Coach Pikiell

and coordinates all aspects of the men's basketball schedule, practices, events, and media needs. Since his arrival, Rutgers has experienced a program renaissance, including postseason play in three consecutive seasons. Notably, in 2020-21, Rutgers earned its first NCAA Tournament bid since 1991, with a first-round victory over Clemson—the program's first NCAA Tournament win since 1983.

Prior to Saint Michael's, Larkin served as a graduate intern at Rutgers-Newark for two seasons and as an assistant coach at Bard College, focusing on in-state recruiting and developing the Scarlet Raiders' backcourt players.

Larkin is a Jacob Albright Scholar and a member of the Spanish Honor Society at Albright College, where he helped the Lions to 17-9 records as a junior and senior while earning a Bachelor of Arts in Spanish and a Bachelor of Science in Mathematics in 2009. He completed his master's degree in Public Administration at Rutgers-Newark in 2012. Larkin and his wife, Margaret, reside in Hillsborough, New Jersey.

Scott Scherer was hired as the Director of Basketball Administration in August 2022 and enters his fourth season in the role and tenth with the Rutgers men's basketball program. He previously spent two years as a graduate assistant and four years as a student manager, serving as head manager for his final two seasons.

In his current role, Scherer works closely with the coaching and support staff in all aspects of the program, including film break-

down, opponent scouting, practice execution, and administrative operations. He also manages and oversees content and social media across all Rutgers men's basketball platforms daily.

Scherer has been a key behind-the-scenes contributor to the Scarlet Knights' success over the past decade. During his tenure, Rutgers returned to the NCAA Tournament in 2022, marking the first time the program earned consecutive NCAA appearances since 1975-76. The 2020-21 Scarlet Knights made history as the first RU team since 1990-91 to clinch an NCAA Tournament berth and the first since 1982-83 to reach the Round of 32 with a victory over Clemson.

Scherer earned his undergraduate degree in Finance from Rutgers University in 2020, graduating with a 3.57 GPA and Dean's List honors. He also holds a Master of Education (M.Ed.) in Adult and Continuing Education and Teaching. He gained additional experience as an NCAA camp manager at the 2019 UConn NCAA camp, as head runner for Team Tournaments with Hoop Group, and as a coach at the Super Soph Camp.

A native of Manalapan, N.J., Scherer played varsity basketball and was a member of the National Honor Society at Manalapan High School.

"Rob brings great experience and a strong understanding of what it takes to build and sustain successful programs," said Pikiell. His blend of basketball experience, key relationships and fundraising efforts will make him a key contributor to our staff going forward."

"I'm so excited about the addition of Rob Sullivan to our programs," said Washington. "Rob's infectious energy and experience in the general manager space is going to have a strong impact on Rutgers Basketball."

Sullivan brings a blend of traditional basketball experience as well as

expertise in today's college basketball landscape with the involvement of NIL.

"In this new era of college athletics, I'm all-in and fully understand the importance that NIL plays in the recruitment and retention of players and crafting a roster for success and sustainability. I want to be a resource for Coach Washington and Coach Pikiell to win games and I know how crucial revenue share and NIL directly impact the team's success on the court."

Sullivan began his administrative career at Saint Joseph's, serving 10 seasons as Director of Men's Basketball Operations before joining Cornerstone Management, a sports and entertainment agency specializing in athlete marketing and development. He returned to Saint Joseph's in 2019 as Senior Associate Athletics Director for External Affairs before transitioning into the General Manager role.

"I'm energized and excited to take on this opportunity," Sullivan added. "I have learned to thrive in an ever-changing and adaptive environment. I'm nimble, forward-thinking, and strategic, but I also bring a blue-collar work ethic that's been instilled in me both personally and through the basketball world. It's a blend of strategy and grit. I'm as competitive as they come, and I want to win. I'm fired up to be a part of Rutgers basketball."

A 2006 Saint Joseph's graduate, Sullivan was a member of the Hawks' men's basketball team that advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight in 2004 and the NIT Championship game in 2005.

"I had the opportunity as an undergraduate to play at St Joe's for Coach (Phil) Martelli, had some awesome team success, including that special Elite Eight team in 2004. Coach Martelli gave me my first shot in the business. After graduation, I became the director of basketball operations, and the beauty of that position at St Joe's is I literally learned the business from the ground up."

Sullivan's teammate in college, and current assistant general manager of the Philadelphia 76ers, Jameer Nelson, has been impressed with Sullivan's adaptability in the ever-changing world of college athletics, going back to his playing days.

"The dynamic of being able to communicate effectively with the coaches, players, and donors is something he does exceptionally well," Nelson, who played 14 seasons in the NBA, said. "The main thing about him is he's real. In this business we all work in, being real is a huge characteristic that you need when working with people, and he has that." A two-time team award recipient for leadership and spirit, he also excelled academically, earning honors on both the SJU Athletic Director's and Atlantic 10 Commissioner's Honor Rolls.

Current New York Knicks Senior Vice President, Head of Player Development and former head coach of the St. Joe's men's basketball team (2019-25), Billy Lange, said Sullivan pioneered the General Manager position, aiding a vision that re-booted a brand and built a culture during critical changes to the college basketball landscape.

"Rutgers basketball made a great hire in Rob Sullivan," Lange said. "Rob has unique skills due to his varied experiences in the college hoops landscape. Sullivan will begin his role on Monday, Nov. 10 and work closely with the basketball staff and Rutgers Athletics leadership.

At Rutgers University, the men's basketball staff places as much emphasis on each player's academic success as it does on his athletic achievement. The staff takes an active role in players' academic progress. Each coach keeps a daily account of their assigned players' class and tutor schedule, when assignments are due and when tests are approaching, thus offering continued focus and support.

As part of the staff's commitment to academics, the Scarlet Knights have a full-time academic advisor who oversees all areas of the team's academic life. Assistant Director of Academic Services for Student-Athletes Randi Larson works closely with the student-athletes, coaches and instructors to facilitate and enhance academic progress.

Larson's role with the basketball team includes help with scheduling, study skills and time management plus providing tutors and services necessary for top academic performance. Through effective and constant communication with student-athletes, coaches, instructors, college deans and other university administrators, Larson is able to anticipate the needs of the student-athletes and provide support and structure for the fulfillment of each player's academic goals.

In order to meet the needs of the Scarlet Knights during the season, Larson travels to away games, facilitating study hall while on the road. She also works closely with the Leadership Development and Strategic Partnerships program, which strives to provide growth in four areas: personal enhancement, community engagement, Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and career development.

The men's basketball program entered the Fall 2020 semester with a 3.122 cumulative grade point average. In the NCAA Graduation Success Rate (GSR) report, the team achieved a score of 82. The team's Academic Progress Rate (APR) score was 969, which ranked seventh among Big Ten programs.

Richard Campbell enters his seventh season with the Rutgers University sports medicine staff as the athletic trainer for the men's basketball team. He has spent the past nine seasons, including two at Stony Brook, working with head coach Steve Pikiell to ensure the well-being of men's basketball student-athletes.

Working closely with Assistant Athletic Director of Strength and Conditioning, David VanDyke, Campbell has made a significant impact on the health and wellbeing of men's basketball student-athletes. In their initial three seasons, men's basketball players were sidelined a total of just 17 combined games due to injury. The Scarlet Knights had three total games missed among players in 2018-19, 11 in 2017-18 and three in 2016-17.

Campbell now has the benefit of best-inclass facilities at the RWBarnabas Health Athletic Performance Center. He resides in the 1,252-square foot "Guilliano Family Basketball Treatment Center," while utilizing sports medicine and hydrotherapy areas featuring two plunge pools. A 6,450-square foot high performance nutrition café and the 6,950 square-foot Platek Family Strength and Conditioning Area' featuring a 40-yard inlaid turf track, cryotherapy chamber, and individualized student-athlete monitoring technology are also utilized to enhance performance.

Rutgers strives to implement the latest technologies to benefit its programs and student-athletes. In that effort, men's basketball utilizes Sparta Science, Catapault, Polar Team Pro and GymAware. Sparta Science provides an objective measure of how players react to gravity with validated scientific assessments and provides evidence-based training prescriptions. Catapault replaces laboratory-based performance testing with microtechnology to obtain actionable data in real time regarding performance. Polar Team Pro provides real-time heart rate data to make objective decisions. GymAware is the gold standard Linear Positional Transducer (LPT with angle measurement) for measuring performance, implementing Velocity Based Training and monitoring

power.

Before and after every season, men's basketball welcomes BAM (Basic Athletic Measurement) to the RAC to conduct player testing. A team of strength and conditioning coaches and technology professionals who utilize the most reliable methods and precise measuring tools, BAM has conducted the NBA Draft combine since 2009. Results are registered to a BAMScoreTM, a proprietary index for reliably measuring athletic performance, and placed in a requisite category. As a result, players receive the information necessary to gauge personal and professional aspirations.

Before Stony Brook, Campbell's primary responsibilities were at the University of Texas at San Antonio where he oversaw all sports medicine needs for baseball and volleyball student-athletes by designing and implementing athletic training policies and rehabilitation programs.

Prior to his time at UTSA, Campbell spent a year as an athletic trainer intern for the Arizona Cardinals, where he assisted with the daily operations for the teams athletic training needs. From 2009-2011, Campbell worked as a graduate student at Stephen F. Austin State University, working specifically with the Lumberjacks' football and basketball teams. The 1975-76 season won't be easily forgotten. Neither the excitement of the undefeated regular season, nor the appearance in Philadelphia among the nation's top four teams. Memory will retain the constant pressure applied both offensively and defensively in Tom Young's intense style of play.

From the beginning, a Scarlet stage was set that would be a perfect forum for a style of play fans and players enjoy. The constant pressure applied would dictate an opponent mistake and a quick capitalization with a long pass and an open layup. It happened too many times to be accidental - Sellers to Dabney to Jordan - a blur of uniforms streaking toward the hoop.

The Scarlet strength was evident early, the quickness on offense, the tenacious pressing defense.

A romp over visiting Bentley in the season opener got the Knights flying and quick wins over Purdue and Seton Hall set up a big match with Boston College. When Rutgers ran away from the highly respected Eagles on the road by 23 points, people began to take notice. The Knights were for real.

Prepping for the Christmas foray into South Carolina and Florida, Rutgers dispensed with Penn, Connecticut and Temple, each time scoring better than 95 points. In the opening round of the Poinsettia Classic, the Scarlet defeated The Citadel to go into the final against Georgia Tech. The tough Yellow Jackets posed a threat, but Rutgers went on to win its first holiday tourney in history.

Then, it was on to Stetson, where the Scarlet Knights completed the southern swing with a win over the Hatters who lost very infrequently on their home court.

Back at home, Rutgers defeated Fordham on regional TV to push the record to 11-0 in the first week of the new year, and talk of going all the way began to be heard. Following a win over Columbia, Young's confident club went on a tear, scoring over 100 points in games with Bucknell, Lehigh, Lafayette and Pitt, setting up a classic matchup with Princeton, one of the nation's top defensive teams. The hare raced past the tortoise by a 75-62 count, but would meet again when the race would be closer

The season wound down with four home games and two dates in Madison Square Garden. Averaging 93.5 points over the six-game span, Rutgers raised the record to 23-0. Recognition poured in from all points and Rutgers was becoming a household word.

A pair of 100-point victories, over LIU and William & Mary, brought the record to 25-0. It came down to a Monday night in March, with 5t. Bonaventure the upset-minded visitor. The bold Bonnies held a scary lead with two minutes to go, but Cinderella-like, Rutgers would not be denied. A clutch 85-80 win caused the fans to mob the court and then take to College Avenue to honor their heroes. It was perfection!

What many felt to be the "real season" began with a second victory over LIU and a hard-fought win over St. John's - games which brought Rutgers its second-straight ECAC Metropolitan crown and a bid to the NCAA tournament. The road to Philadelphia was shortened.

By draw, the Scarlet would face Princeton again in Providence. Close all the way, the game was closer at the finish. Pete Maloy's missed foul shot and Mike Dabney's recovery with four seconds remaining gave the Scarlet a 54-53 celebration and sent the Knights off to Greensboro for the Eastern Regionals.

Connecticut, a team which had fallen to Rutgers by 13 points in the season's sixth game, was the first-round foe. The Huskies were pesky, but the Scarlet Knights prevailed, 93-79. A winner over DePaul in first-round action, VMI became the 31st victim, succumbing to a rare Rutgers height advantage. The Keydets faded after a fast start, falling, 91-75.

The dream fostered back in October had become a reality, and the reality was named Michigan, Indiana, and UCLA.

Rutgers had not played a "bad" game all year long. There had been individual failures, but never a day when all had gone sour together. It would happen, unfortunately, against the Wolverines, who also predicated their game on quickness and pressure. Sadly, silently, suddenly, the winning streak came to an end in an 86-70 loss. The bubble burst. Rutgers came back with a valiant effort against UCLA in the consolation game, but was unable to contain the big Bruins at the end, losing 106-92.

The season did not end there. Following a short layoff, the squad flew to Italy to take part in the City of Rome International Basketball Tournament. Even in that historic city, the Scarlet Knights' achievement had been well-told. It will be told again and again.

James Bailey broke into the Scarlet Knight lineup in the fifth game of his freshman season and remained entrenched in the lineup for 121 games and in the minds of admiring Rutgers fans, who came out en masse February 8, 1993 to honor him on the night his jersey number 20 was retired. He joined Bob Lloyd and Phil Sellers as the only players to have their jerseys taken out of service.

At the end of his freshman season in 1976, Bailey and his teammates had put together an undefeated regular season, had won 31 consecutive games, and had earned a trip to the Final Four. By the end of his four-year Rutgers career, he had helped amass a 95-28 record, which included a 50-3 mark at home.

During his fabulous career, Bailey had not only picked up several appropriate nicknames, but had also put his name in the third spot among the all-time scorers, and in second place in rebounds, steals and blocked shots.

Known as "King James," "JB," and "Jammin' James," and given lessendearing titles by non-plussed opponents and coaches, he earned All-America honors in 1978 and 1979. He was also a member of both the U. S. World University Game championship squad and the World International Tournament titlist team in 1978. In nine NBA seasons, which included stops in Seattle, New Jersey, Houston, New York and Phoenix, he scored nearly 5,000 points and 3,000 rebounds. He also played parts of three seasons in Italy before his knees sent him the sad message to cease and desist.

"Jammin' James" was drafted in the first round by the Seattle Supersonics in 1979, the sixth player selected.

At Rutgers, Bailey averaged 16.8 points and 8.7 rebounds a game for 2,034-point and 1,074-rebound totals, which stand third and second, respectively, on the all-time lists. His career field goal percentage of .545 is fourth-best all-time and he also holds the record for field goals in a season (312 in 1978). The 6-9 Bailey had an amazing 178 steals (only Eddie Jordan had more), blocked 304 shots and scored 849 field goals.

Bailey surely has to be credited with helping make the dunk off the lob one of college basketball most exciting plays. Rutgers statisticians were pressured into keeping dunks in 1977-78 and his final total was 116, far more than most teams in the country were able to

throw down. That junior season was, perhaps, his greatest.

"King James" literally exploded onto the national scene that season. He scored 730 points for a 23.5 average and led the Scarlet Knights in field goal percentage (.585), rebounds (290), steals (.56), blocked shots (72) and dunks. Honors abounded. He received the Widmer Trophy as the best player in the East. He was the Eastern Eight's most outstanding player. The NBA coaches put him on their All-American First Team and United Press International made him a Second Team All-American. Many felt he was bypassed for the prestigious Haggerty Trophy as the metropolitan area's top performer because he was only a junior.

Among his outstanding games that season were the Penn State game, when he scored 37 points and pulled down 11 rebounds; the Manhattan game in which he scored 39 points and had 15 rebounds; and, the William & Mary game, with 43 points and 13 rebounds, four blocked shots and at least a dozen "intimidations."

A local sportswriter described Bailey's performance in that William & Mary game as "like sticking a slot machine in front of an addicted gambler. And all the numbers came up right for Bailey, who slammed and jammed and alley-ooped at will."

Bailey, who keeps his competitive juices flowing by drag racing at sites such as nearby Englishtown, was the recipient of the Donald Leslie Coursen Trophy as the top male athlete in the senior class in 1980.

The night in his honor stands high on his list of favorites. Twelve of his former Scarlet Knight teammates joined in the welcome and the overwhelming applause provided the proper exclamation point to his exemplary career.

"The timing of it is just so perfect," he said. "It's tough for an athlete to let go, but having a night like tonight means - the heck with it. Now I feel that I can let go because the people who cared about me then still care about me enough to do this for me."

That night was further punctuated by the return of the 1966-67 Scarlet Knight team, the first Rutgers basketball squad to play in a postseason tournament. Lloyd, who captained that celebrated team, was present, and, among those who were on hand to honor Bailey, was Sellers. Those three, whose numbers 14, 12 and 20 will not be worn again, combined for 6,478 points, while Bailey and Sellers collected a combined 2,162 rebounds.


Overheard that night was a compelling question.

"How would you like to coach a team with those three guys in their prime?"

The answer was a resounding "Yesss!"

Bailey went on to have one of the best NBA careers in Scarlet Knights basketball history from 1979-1988 playing for five teams (Seattle Supersonics, New York Knicks, New Jersey Nets, Houston Rockets, and Pheonix Suns).

In 595 career games, Bailey averaged 8.8 points-per-game and 5.0 rebounds-per-game. He amassed 5,46 career points and 2,988 career rebounds.

Scan the Scarlet record book and players in the late seventies and early eighties dominate the lists. One name, however, dating to the sixties, holds prominence in a number of categories.

Check career scoring and free throw percentage, season points and scoring average, and single game scoring and free throws. The name dotting the record pages is Lloyd.

The first Scarlet Knight basketball All-America, Lloyd became the first Rutgers athlete to have his jersey retired, on February 2, 1987, an afternoon, ironically, when his 22-year old single game scoring mark of 51 points was equaled by Eric Riggins.

Lloyd tossed in 51 points at the beginning of his junior season against Delaware on a night he hit 19 of 22 free throws. The 19 free throw conversions remain at the top of the record list, tied only when he canned 19 of 19 against NYU in his senior year.

For his three-year career, Lloyd scored 2,045 points, a mark which he held until Phil Sellers scored 2,399 between 1972-73 and 1975-76. His scoring average for his 77 games was 26.6, still the top figure in the Rutgers books. In fact, his consecutive 25.0, 26.5 and 27.9 averages for his career all rank in the top four of the single season scoring averages. As a sophomore, Lloyd scored 601 points, added 635 a year later and closed out his career with 809, which ranks second in school history.

Lloyd hit 60-consecutive free throws during his career and missed just 62 in his 605 attempts for a record .898 percentage.

Lloyd, who teamed with roommate Jim Valvano to form a backcourt which contributed a combined career total of 3,167 points, led the Scarlet to a third place finish in the 1967 National Invitation Tournament, Rutgers' first NIT appearance. An all-tourney choice, he would later receive first team All-America honors from UPI, N.E.A. and Look Magazine with second team recognition by the Associated Press. The 22-7 record under Bill Foster was the highest win total and held until the 1974-75 Scarlet squad posted the same mark in 1974-75 for Tom Young.

Lloyd remains in close touch with his older brother Dick, a former Scarlet Knight coach and a former analyst on the team's

radio broadcasts. In fact, on the day of his jersey's retirement, he left before the end of the Rutgers/Penn State game to watch his nephew, Rick, play at Rutgers Prep.

While crediting his brother, his coach and his teammates for his incredible success at Rutgers, Lloyd remembers that he shot about 200 jump shots a day.

"There's a saying in our family," he said. "Shooters drive Mercedes and playmakers drive Fords and I hope that sinks in with Rick"

He also recalled the days with Valvano in the Rutgers backcourt.

"Jimmy was a great player. To score over 1,000 points in just three years when I was scoring 2,000, and playing great defense - which I didn't play - he had to be great. You couldn't get the guy to shut up, whether you were on the court or in the dorms. I used to say back then that the guy's going to be another John Wooden. It was like living with Henny Youngman."

Lloyd says that his business sense is derived from his days at Rutgers.

"I want my people to know how to win, how to lose, how to compete and how to benefit from all those experiences. Those are the biggest things I got from my experience at Rutgers."

Also with the same grace with which he accepted the award that went with his jersey's retirement.

"When you think of the other guys who played here - Alex Knoll, Jeff Torborg, Phil Sellers - and what great athletes they were, the decision to make mine the very first number to be retired is really a big honor for me. I told my family that having this done when I was 21 would have been nice, but 20 years later, it's especially nice."

It is especially nice also to have number 14 now in its proper place.

Lloyd was the first Rutgers All-American in 1967 (UPI first-team and AP second-team) and was the first Scarlet Knight to score over 2,000 points, this in an era when varsity athletes were limited to three seasons.

Averaging an astounding 26.6 points a game for his career, he amassed 2,045 career points and led the nation in free throw percentage (.921) in 1966-67. He and fellow Hall of Fame inductee, Jim Valvano, led the 1966-67 Scarlet Knights to a third-place finish in the NIT. His number 14 was the first to be retired, in 1987, in Rutgers basketball history.

After basketball, Lloyd went on to become a successful businessman. He was the president and CEO of Data East, Incorporated before becoming the chairman and CEO of Mindscape, a publisher of consumer software.

Since 1994, he has served as chairman of the board for The V Foundation For Cancer Research, which was started by his friend and teammate Jim Valvano as he was battling cancer which ultimately claimed his life.[2] Lloyd has helped raise over \$70 million since that time.[3] Today, Lloyd is retired besides his work at The V Foundation and resides in Los Altos Hills, California.

These testaments were generated when Phil Sellers became the second men's basketball player to have his jersey retired at Rutgers. They came from his coaches and teammates and attest to his unsurpassed talent and his uncompromising toughness.

Add another dimension of the man forwarded by another of his coaches, Joe Boylan.

"He was always great with kids and would always spend time with them."

That fills the portrait and brings the picture into clear focus. We're talking about an Atlas of an athlete, one who could do it all - drive the lane or baseline, hit the jumper, grab a rebound and break out of the pack, see the court and make impossible

passes to his teammates. A player who, when the chips were down, demanded and got the ball, driving hard to the basket and getting two or a shot at the free throw line. Challenging the opponent's toughest player to a game of one-on-one. Taking on an official who sometimes didn't see things his way. Begging his roommate (Eddie Jordan), asleep after a game, to pass the hall

Phil Sellers could walk into Madison Square Garden and attract hordes of admiring fans, could silence hostile road court crowds with his style. His scowl was often a ploy and gave way to a smile if it worked to his advantage. But, now to some numbers.

A two-time All-American, Phil the Thrill scored 506 points as a freshman, 602 in his second season, 657 as a junior and 634 in his final year when he led his team to 31-consecutive victories and into the 1976 Final Four. He pulled down, in inimitable fashion, 264, 242, 272 and finally, 337 rebounds over the four remarkable seasons on the Banks. Add the season points and boards and you have the school records of 2,399 points and 1,111 rebounds.

Scoring points and grabbing rebounds was hardly all he did. His 293 assists, including 106 helpers his senior year, ranks him 13th place on the all-time list. He had 62 steals in 1975-76 and blocked 19 shots. His career totals of 557 free throw conversions and 757 free throw attempts are records and he was once credited with taking seven charges in a game. He could literally take over a game, and, as Conlin has said, it "was a thing of beauty".

"Sellers turned the Garden into his own playground," wrote Joe Valerio of the Scarlet Knights' victory over St. John's, the 28thconsecutive win in 1975-76.

"He went one-on-one, or one-on-five, depending on your allegiance. First, he connected on an alley-oop drive, fired from the hip and banked high off the glass...the next time downcourt, he gave his defender four head fakes before he hit from the foul line. And the very next time Rutgers had the ball he connected on another drive, 64-59, RU."

On the March 1, 1976, St. Bonaventure led the Scarlet, 75-69 with 6:15 to play in the season finale in the College Avenue Gymnasium. Sellers, Mike Dabney and Hollis Copeland scored lay-ups to bring Rutgers within a point and Sellers then scored on another lay-up to give the Scarlet Knights a one-point lead with 2:21 to go. His jumper preserved the lead and Rutgers went on to complete the perfect season with an 85-80 victory. At the time, only 18 other teams had pulled off perfect regular seasons.

Playing at 6-5, 200, Sellers averaged 19.5, 23.2, 22.7 and 19.2 points in his four years. He also averaged, in order, 10.2, 9.3, 9.4 and 10.2 rebounds between 1972-73 and 1975-76.

Phil became the first Rutgers basketball player to receive First Team All-America honors from the Associated Press in 1976 (with Scott May, Kent Benson, Adrian Dantley and John Lucas). Drafted by Detroit in the third round, he played one year for the Pistons and then played in the Netherlands for one season after which he was a part-time assistant at Rutgers for four years.



1919-1920 NATIONAL AAU FINALIST TEAM

The first Rutgers basketball team to play in a postseason tournament, the team finished with an 11-4 record, playing a schedule against opponents that won nearly 70 percent of their games. The regular season was highlighted by a home win over Princeton, the program's first win over the Tigers, and the second win by a Rutgers athletics team over Princeton since the inaugural college football game in 1869. The team was invited to participate in the National Amateur Athletic Union basketball tournament in Atlanta, Georgia, the lone national postseason tournament at the time. The event was a 16-team tournament held over four consecutive days, which Rutgers would play with just five players and without a coach. The Scarlet Knights defeated the University of Georgia, the University of Utah and the Young Men's Organization of Detroit to advance to the championship game, where the squad fell to NYU to finish as the tournament runner-up. The five-man lineup included leading scorer Leland Taliaferro, team captain senior Calvin Meury, sophomore Walter French, junior Art Hall and Edward Benzoni. A freshman on the 1920 team, Benzoni finished his career with 693 points, which stood as a Rutgers record for 26 years.

THE 1975-76 NCAA FINAL FOUR TEAM

The story of the 1975-76 team has been told and re-told for over 30 years. The number of people who claim to have been in the 2,800-seat College Avenue Gym on March 1, 1976, the night RU sealed the perfect season with an 85-80 win over St. Bonaventure, is in the hundreds of thousands. As was the case so many times before, paint chips fell from the ceiling that night, caused by the tremendous, vibrating noise and the heat generated in the building. The names on that team still resonate within the minds of all Rutgers fans; Sellers, Dabney, Copeland, Jordan, Bailey, Anderson and on and on. That team pressed and ran opponents right out of the gym on a nightly basis. In an era without the three-point shot, the team broke the 90-point barrier 25 times, the century mark on 11 occasions. The constant defensive pressure applied would often dictate an opponent mistake and an ensuing long pass and, ultimately, an open layup. Sellers to Dabney to Jordan - A blur of uniforms streaking to the hoop. That team won its first 31 games, made an appearance in the NCAA Final Four in Philadelphia, featured a National Coach of the Year and included five of the six leading scorers in Rutgers history. It was a magical time, a magical season. The achievements of that team have been well-told. They will be told again and again.



AL ADLER

Al Adler, a 1931 Rutgers graduate, played for the Scarlet Knights from 1928-1931. He was the second-leading scorer on the 1928-29 team, which compiled a 10-5 record. Known as an aggressive defensive player, the Bayonne, N.J. native was one of the top players for Rut-

gers in the 1920's. In fact, the current Rutgers defensive player of the year award is named after Adler. Adler was a member of the 1928-29 team, which was the first Rutgers team to defeat CCNY, a team that was coached by the legendary Nat Holman. Following his playing career, Adler became a prominent fixture in the Rutgers athletic scene. He served on the Board of Trustees for 20 years, was a member of the President's Council, was president of the Rutgers Alumni Association and served as the treasurer of the class of 1931.



ABDEL ANDERSON

Abdel Anderson enjoyed a brilliant Rutgers career from 1975-79. In his four seasons, Anderson played on teams which made two NCAA and two NIT appearances. Those teams were a combined 95-28, the best four-season mark in school history. He was an unsung contributor as a freshman to the Scarlet

Knights' magical 1975-76 season. Coming off the bench as the sixth man, the lithe 6-7 Anderson averaged 9.4 points per game during that 31-2 season when the Scarlet Knights won their first 31 games and finished the season ranked fourth in the nation. Anderson, employing a distinctive and unorthodox jump shot, was the consummate team player. As a sophomore, he tallied 15.2 points per game when the Knights went 18-10 and made the NIT. His junior year, the Belleville, N.J. native averaged 12.3 points an outing in helping to lead the Scarlet Knights to a 24-7 record and to a third-place finish in the NIT. He capped his career by averaging 11.8 as a senior, second on the team to All-American James Bailey, as the Knights compiled a 22-9 record and a berth in the NCAA Tournament. Anderson's 1,459 career points ranks him 13th on the all-time Rutgers University scoring list.



GENE ARMSTEAD

Eugene Armstead was an imposing and productive force on both ends of the floor throughout his Rutgers career. The first high school All-American to play basketball at Rutgers, the 6-9 Armstead was, at the time, the tallest player in Scarlet Knight history. At the conclusion of his career, Armstead, was ranked first in RU history in blocked shots,

second in rebounding and 10th in points. His .555 career field goal percentage was a Rutgers record that stood for 29 years. Nicknamed "the dominator" because of his ability to intimidate the opposition around the basket, Armstead poured in 1,046 points in a three-year career as freshmen were not eligible to play varsity in his era. The Media, Pa. native helped lead Rutgers to three winning seasons, an overall record of 45-29 and an appearance in the 1973 NIT. Armstead was the second-leading scorer on the 1970-71 team with a 16.1 average and pulled down a team-leading 11.8 boards in helping RU achieve a 16-7 record. He averaged 13.4 points and 11.8 rebounds in helping to lead the 1971-72 team to a 14-11 mark as a junior. He then averaged 13.7 and 9.4 rebounds per game his senior year for the 1972-1973 team which finished with a 15-11 record.



JAMES BAILEY

James Bailey is number three on the Rutgers all-time scoring list (2, 034), and just behind Phil Sellers in rebounding (1,047). The 6-9 Bailey was the freshman center on the 1975-76 Final Four team and went on to capture All-America honors from UPl and The Sporting News in 1978. Bailey, whose number 20 was retired in 1992, played nine NBA sea-

sons with the Seattle Supersonics, New Jersey Nets, Houston Rockets, New York Knicks and Phoenix Suns. Known as "Jammin' James," he was the recipient of the prestigious Coursen Award and the Widmer Trophy.



IOHN BATTI F

John Battle enjoyed a brilliant Rutgers career from 1981-1985 before going on to a long and productive career in the NBA. Battle, a 6-2 guard from Washington D.C. came to Rutgers as a lightly-recruited player who was the sixth man on his high school team as a senior. He played sparingly in his freshman year and then saw his role begin to

expand late in his sophomore season, as he provided a spark which helped the 1982-83 Scarlet Knights gain a berth in the NCAA Tournament. That Rutgers team, which featured 1995 RU Hall of Fame inductee Roy Hinson, defeated Southwestern Louisiana in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. Beginning in his junior year, 1983-84, Battle exploded, averaging 21 points per game in both his junior and senior seasons. A tremendous leaper and dangerous three-point threat, Battle scored 608 points in his senior year, 1984-85, and finished his career with 1,385 points. That point total places him 16th all-time at Rutgers (it was 10th when he graduated). Battle was a fourth-round draft pick of the Atlanta Hawks in 1985. He played with the Hawks from 1985-1991 and played for the Cleveland Cavaliers from 1991-96. In the NBA, Battle scored more than 5,000 points and dished off more than 1,200 assists.



HOLLIS COPELAND

Hollis Copeland was a standout on the great Rutgers teams of the mid-1970's. This uncommonly graceful 6-6 forward is the fifth-leading scorer in Rutgers history with 1,769 points. His 850 rebounds is sixth-best on the all-time Rutgers charts. Possessor of a lithe physique which featured extremely broad shoulders, this high-jumping native of Ewing Township enjoyed his best statistical

season as a junior, when he averaged 16.1 points per game, to go with 8.1 rebounds per outing. His career average was 14.6 points per game and 7.0 rebounds an outing, As a sophomore, he played a significant role and was an integral member of the 1975-76 Final Four team. His teams qualified for post-season play in all four of his years "On the Banks," with a pair of NCAA and NIT appearances. An honorable mention All-American in 1977, Copeland was a third-round pick of the NBA's Denver Nuggets. His 93-game NBA career also included a stint with the New York Knicks.



MIKE DABNEY

Mike Dabney, who played at Rutgers from 1972-76, was a silky, smooth guard who starred for the great Rutgers teams of the mid 1970's. The East Orange native was the second-leading scorer on the Scarlet Knights' Final Four team in 1975-1976. That season, Dabney aver-

aged 19. 1 points per game and was named honorable mention All-American. Teaming with backcourt mate Eddie Jordan, Dabney led the team in steals with 110. He was known for his grace and quickness on the court. The image most Rutgers fans have of Dabney probably centers around his many fast break layups, many of which came off steals. The 1976 Rutgers graduate is the fourth-leading scorer in school history with 1,902 points. He was a third-round draft choice of the Los Angeles Lakers.



OUINCY DOUBY

Quincy Douby scored 1,690 points, the sixth-highest total in Rutgers history, in three seasons. The Brooklyn native averaged 25.4 points per-game as a junior in 2005-06, setting the school record for points in a season (839), to lead the league in scoring en route to becoming RU's only First Team All-Big East selection. He made a school-record nine three-pointers to score a Carrier Dome

opponent record 41 points at Syracuse on February 1, 2006. The Haggerty Award winner as the Metropolitan Player of the Year and an All-American in 2005-06, Douby is a mong the Rutgers career leaders in every offensive category. The sleek shooting guard burst upon the scene as a freshman in 2003-04, scoring 35 points in an NIT semifinals victory, while earning Big East All-Rookie and Met Rookie of the Year accolades. Douby was selected with the 19th pick in the first round of the 2006 NBA Draft by Sacramento, becoming the first Rutgers player drafted in the first round since Roy Hinson in 1983.



BILL FOSTER

Bill Foster ushered in the first truly successful era in Rutgers basketball history. His eight teams posted a 120-75 record, following a 22-7 mark in 1966-67 with a 21-4 mark in 1968-69. That 1966-67 team earned a third-place finish in the NIT, becoming the first Rutgers basketball team to reach post-season play. Eight of his players are currently in the top 50 in all-time scoring, including Bob

Lloyd, Rutgers' first All-American, first 2,000-point scorer, and the late Jim Valvano. Both were members of the inaugural Hall of Fame class. In 1971-72, Foster became the head coach at Utah and then went on to Duke where he led the Blue Devils to the 1978 NCAA Championship game. Foster also had head coaching stints at South Carolina and Northwestern and has served as the associate commissioner of the Southwest Conference. His commitment and dedication epitomizes the true meaning of college basketball and he was honored by his colleagues as president of the National Association of College Basketball Coaches in 1976-77. Foster also served as the first vice president of the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame.

LARRY GORDON



Larry Gordon scored 1,213 points in a three-year period, which places him 21st on the all-time list. When he graduated from Rutgers, Gordon was second on the all-time list. Gordon's 19.0 ppg. scoring average is still the fifth highest all-time, his 321 converted free throws are ninth all-time and his 534 free throw attempts is sixth best all-time. A veteran of the U.S. Army, Gordon became a top executive in the international petroleum

research area at Shell Oil Company, where he was employed from 1956-1991. A native of Elizabeth, N.J., he was an All-State selection at Thomas Jefferson (now Elizabeth) High School before becoming a Scarlet Knight.

BOB GREACEN



Bob Greacen was a dominant player during a career which saw the Scarlet Knights soar to previously unprecedent-ed heights. The 6-7 native of Merchant-ville played a prominent role on the 1967 team, which earned a third-place finish in the NIT. An excellent leaper, Greacen is 25th all-time in scoring with 1,154 career points. He averaged 21.3 points per game on the 1968-69 team, the 10th-best single season average in



school history. That 1968-69 team went 21-4 and beat NYU in the first round of the NIT. Greacen was a second-round draft choice of the Milwaukee Bucks and was a member of the 1970-71 Bucks' NBA Championship team.



"BUCKY" HATCHETT

William F. "Bucky" Hatchett was Rutgers' first 1,000 point scorer. Hatchett is still ranked 19th on the all-time list with 1,245 points. His scoring record stood until 1965-66. He averaged 12.6 ppg. in his freshman year, 18.3 ppg. as a sophomore, 17.2 ppg. as a junior, and averaged 14.4 in his senior year. A 1991 inductee into the Rutgers Football

Hall of Fame, Hatchett won 10 letters in three sports (football, basketball, track). After graduating from Rutgers, Hatchett became a legend in the Eastern Professional Basketball League. During his pro career, he served as an executive with RCA.



FRANK HILL

The late Frank Hill (head coach, 1915-43), recorded a 223-165 record. During much of this same period, he also coached at Seton Hall and St. Benedict's Prep, where he was 191-80 (18 seasons) and 209-28 (16 seasons), respectively. He also enjoyed a long and successful career as an official and worked 16 Final Fours. His Rutgers squads posted

19 winning seasons and his 1919-20 squad was a finalist in the National AAU Tournament. He is the grandfather of five Rutgers graduates.



ROY HINSON

Roy Hinson was a dominating defensive force throughout his Rutgers career, which spanned from 1979-1983. The 6-9 Hinson, who graduated from nearby Franklin High School, came to Rutgers as a raw, thin athlete and left as a firstround NBA draft choice.

Hinson is the Scarlet Knights' second all-time leading shot-blocker with 356. The 1983 Rutgers graduate added a little bit to his game each season at Rutgers, improving his scoring averages from 9.7 as a freshman to 16.6 as a senior. His 1,521 career points are 11th on the all-time list and he is the fifth-leading rebounder in school history with 860. Hinson was a first-round draft choice of the Cleveland Cavaliers. He averaged 14.2 points per game in an NBA career, which included stints with the 76ers and Nets. His NBA career ended after the 1991 season due to a knee injury.



EDDIE JORDAN

Eddie Jordan was the point guard and catalyst of the great Rutgers teams of the mid-1970's. "Fast Eddie" was the on-court general for the 1975-76 Scarlet Knights, who fashioned a perfect 26-0 regular season mark, reached the Final Four, and wound up with a record of 31-

2. Jordan's name remains prominent in the RU record books. He is the all-time assist leader with 585 and steals leader with 1,632 points. Drafted by the Cleveland Cavaliers in the second round of the 1977 NBA draft, Jordan was later a member of the 1982 Los Angeles Lakers' NBA Championship team. In a career which also included stints with the New Jersey Nets and Portland Trailblazers, Jordan played in 420 NBA games, scored 3,414 career points and had a per-game average of 8.1. Jordan served five seasons as an assistant coach at Rutgers before later serving as head coach of the NBA's Sacramento Kings, Washington Wizards and Philadelphia 76ers. He served as Rutgers Head Coach from 2013-16.



AUSTIN "BUS" LEPINE

Austin "Bus" Lepine played in a highly successful era of Rutgers basketball. A 1937 graduate, Lepine was a catalyst and floor leader on the great 1936-37 team, which, to that point in history, was the most successful and decorated Rutgers team ever. An All-State selection at New Brunswick High School, Lepine averaged a team-best 11.8

points per game for the 13-2 Rutgers team of 1936-37. Lepine was also the leading scorer on the team as a junior, and second-leading as a sophomore. Lepine played for coach Frank Hill, a member of the inaugural Rutgers Basketball Hall of Fame Class of 1993. Rutgers raced out to an 8-0 start in 1936-37 before dropping a pair of late season game one of which was a 39-38 decision to national power NYU.



BOB LLOYD

Bob Lloyd was the first Rutgers All-American in 1967 (UPI first-team and AP second-team) and was the first Scarlet Knight to score over 2,000 points, this in an era when varsity athletes were limited to three seasons. Averaging an astounding 26.5 points a game for his career, he amassed 2,045 career points and led the nation in free throw percent-

age (.921) in 1966-67. He and fellow Hall of Fame inductee Jim Valvano led the 1966-67 Scarlet Knights to a third-place finish in the NIT. His number 14 was the first to be retired, in 1987, in Rutgers basketball history.



DICK LLOYD

Dick Lloyd served the university in many capacities for 50 years, including the 23 seasons (1992-2015) in the booth as men's basketball radio analyst. Lloyd arrived as an assistant coach in 1965 under Bill Foster, worked as head coach from 1971-73, and served with the Rutgers University Foundation and Alumni Relations for many years. Lloyd

directed the freshmen and was the assistant varsity coach under Foster from 1965-71, before serving as head coach for two seasons. With his brother Bobby and Jim Valvano manning the backcourt, he helped the Scarlet Knights to a 22-7 record and a third place finish in the NIT in 1966-67. As head coach, he compiled a 29-22 mark with Dick Vitale and John McFadden as assistant coaches and recruited the freshmen class that would eventually lead the Scarlet Knights to the 1976 Final Four.



GEORGE MACKARONIS

George Mackaronis was a fixture on the Rutgers men's basketball scene for more than 50 years. An All-State player at New Brunswick High School, he became one of the best college players in the East, competing well against All-Americans the likes of NYU's Dolph Schayes, Seton Hall's Bobby Wanzer and Princeton's Butch Van Breda Kolff, to name a

few. In 1942, due to World War II, he became the first Rutgers freshman to ever play on the varsity team. From 1943-45, he served in World War II, was involved in the D-Day invasion and earned five battle stars. He returned to Rutgers in 1946 and started every game over the next three seasons, leading the 1945-46 team in scoring with as 15.0 average. The team captain in 1948, Mackaronis was the winner of the Loyal Son

Award and was considered to have one of the best set shots in Rutgers history. A leader on various committees, Mackaronis founded the Court Club in 1956 and served as president for 30 years. He was the first president of the Rutgers Basketball Play-




ers Association and sponsored the Rutgers Basketball Scholar-Athlete Award, which is named in his honor.

DOUG PATTON

Doug Patton was one of the most prolific scorers in Rutgers basketball history. The 6-0, 165-pound native of Red Bank, N.J. became just the fourth Scarlet Knight to ever score 1,000 points, a feat

even more impressive given that he played in an era where athletes could only play three varsity seasons. At the time of his graduation in 1961, Patton was the third-leading scorer in school history. In his first varsity season, as a sophomore in 1958-59, Patton averaged 15.1 ppg. In his junior season, he scored a careerhigh 495 points and averaged 19.8 per game, which was the second-best figure in school history upon his graduation. He was a first-team All-East selection as a senior in 1960-61 when he averaged 18.3 ppg. Behind Patton's leadership, the 1960-61 team fashioned an 11-10 record, becoming the first Rutgers team in 12



years to record a winning season. In addition to his prolific scoring, Patton led Rutgers in steals three years in a row

ERIC RIGGINS

As his career progressed, Eric Riggins developed into a virtually unstoppable offensive force. The extremely quick 6-8, 205-pound Riggins blended an assortment of crafty, low post moves with an uncommonly soft touch. He

scored 1,604 career points, which ranks ninth on the all-time Rutgers scoring list. In 1986-87, his senior season, Riggins put together one of the finest offensive seasons in school history. That year, he averaged 24.7 points per game, fifth all-time in RU history. He scored 20 or more points in a game 21 times that season, eclipsed the 30-point mark eight times and finished his RU career by scoring 20 or more points in 14 consecutive games. His 245 made field goals in 1986-87 are sixth all-time. His 200 free throws made and 256 attempted are both second all-time. On the afternoon of February 21, 1987, he poured in 51 points vs. Penn State at the RAC, to tie fellow Hall of Famer Bob Lloyd for the most points ever scored by a Rutgers player. His

19 made field goals that day also tied a school record.



PHIL SELLERS

Phil Sellers was the leader of the 1975-76 Final Four team. This aggressive athlete set the tone for the 31-2 Scarlet Knights that season. Sellers is Rutgers' all-time scoring and rebounding leader with 2,399 points and 1,115 rebounds. A 6-4 forward,

Sellers was a two-time Haggerty Award winner as the Metropolitan New York area's top performer. He was a first-team AP All-American in 1976. He later returned to Rutgers as an assistant coach for four seasons. His number 12 was Rutgers' second to be retired in basketball history, in 1988

GEORGE "SWEDE" SUNDSTROM

George "Swede" Sundstrom is recognized as one of the greatest rebounders in Rutgers basketball history. Swede's career average of 17.1 rebounds per game is the all-time best for the Scarlet Knights, and at the time of his induction into the Rut-



gers Basketball Hall of Fame, his 942 rebounds over his 55-game career spanning three seasons is No. 3 all-time. The 6-foot-5 Sundstrom averaged 20.6 rebounds per game as a senior in 1953-54, after pulling down 17.3 per contest as a junior the previous season.

KELVIN TROY

Kelvin Troy was a 6-5, 195-pound forward at Rutgers from 1977-

1981. During that period, the Scarlet Knights posted a record of 76-46, which included a 24-7 record in 1977-78 and a third place finish in the NIT, and a 22-9 mark in 1978-79 and an NCAA



Sweet 16 appearance. In his junior year, 1979-80, Troy posted team-leading numbers in points (18.9), rebounding (8.3) and steals (51) and was an Honorable Mention All-American. In addition, he earned All-Eastern Eight, All-Metropolitan Area and All-New Jersey honors. Upon his graduation, Troy was eighth all-time in scoring at Rutgers (he is now 14th) with 1,458 points in 119 games and seventh

all-time in rebounding with 703 (now 11th). For his career, he averaged 15.9 ppg. and 5.9 rpg. A fifth-round draft pick of the NBA's Milwaukee Bucks, Troy played professionally in Ireland.

JIM VALVANO

The late Jim Valvano co-captained the 1966-67 squad with



Bob Lloyd and was known as "Mr. Defense." Named the Rutgers Senior Athlete of the Year in 1967, Valvano scored 1,122 points, then the sixth-best scoring figure in history. Following two seasons as an assistant at his alma mater, this charismatic personality later held head coaching positions at Johns Hopkins, Bucknell and Iona, before moving on to North Carolina State. He guided the 1982-83 Wolfpack squad to the national

title. The recipient of the Rutgers Medal in 1983, Valvano owned a 346-212 record for his 18-year head coaching career. His final triumph came toward the end of his glorious life when he announced the formation of The V Foundation for Cancer Research at the 1993 ESPY Awards. Founded by ESPN and Jim Valvano, The V Foundation was established to carry out Jim's final, unmet dream—to soundly defeat cancer.




TOM YOUNG

Tom Young, the winningest coach in Rutgers men's basketball history, presided over the greatest era in Scarlet Knight basketball history. From 1973-1985, his teams won 239 games and lost just 117. The pinnacle of his career was the 1975-76 season when the Scarlet Knights raced out to a perfect 26-0 regu-

lar season, eventually going 31-0 and reaching the Final Four. The final record of 31-2 is the best in RU history. He was the 1975-76 UPI National Coach of the Year. He led Rutgers to four NCAA Tournament and five NIT's. His 1978-79 team reached the round of 16 in the NCAA Tournament and his 1977-78 team reached the Final Four of the NIT at New York's Madison Square Garden. He coached eight All-Americans at Rutgers and recruited seven of them. Twelve of his players, including 11 that he recruited, were drafted by the NBA. He coached 10 of Rutgers' top 11 all-time scorers and 15 of the top 50.

WILLIAM F. TATE IV 22nd PRESIDENT OF RUTGERS UNIVERSITY

William F. Tate IV, an award-winning scholar, took office as the 22nd president of Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, on July 1, 2025.

He also serves as a University Professor and Distinguished Professor. Prior to accepting the Rutgers presidency, he served as president of Louisiana State University (LSU) and held faculty and leadership roles at the University of South Carolina, Washington University in St. Louis, Texas Christian University (TCU), and the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Previous Roles

As chief executive officer of both the LSU system and its flagship campus, President Tate oversaw a public research institution with over 60,000 undergraduate, graduate, and professional students; 3,000 full-time faculty; an estimated economic impact of over \$6 billion; and more than 200 licenses, while holding faculty appointments in sociology, psychiatry and behavioral medicine, epidemiology, and public health. In recognition of his record-setting tenure at Louisiana State University, Dr. Tate received a U.S. Congressional Commendation, along with formal resolutions from the Louisiana Senate and House of Representatives. President Tate served as executive vice president for academic affairs and provost, while holding the Education Foundation Distinguished University Professorship, at the University of South Carolina. Prior to that, he served as a department chair and dean of the graduate school and vice provost for graduate education at Washington University in St. Louis. In addition, he held the Edward Mallinckrodt Distinguished University Professorship in Arts and Sciences. Prior to joining Washington University in St. Louis, he served as the William L. and Betty F. Adams Chair at TCU and as a tenured faculty member at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Academic Background

President Tate is an elected member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and the National Academy of Education. In addition, he is the recipient of numerous research recognitions including being elected to fellow status in the American Educational Research Association (AERA) as well as association-related honors including an Early Career Contribution Award, Presidential Citation, Distinguished Scholar Award in Mathematics Education, and Distinguished Contributions in Education Research Lifetime Achievement Award-Division G.

He was awarded the Anna Julia Cooper Postdoctoral Fellowship to study social and public policy at the University of Wisconsin–Madison. He later completed a second postdoctoral fellowship at the Washington University School of Medicine, where he earned a Master's in Psychiatric Epidemiology (M.P.E.).

Prior to his postdoctoral training, President Tate earned a Ph.D. in mathematics education with a cognate in human development from the University of Maryland, College Park, where he was a Patricia Roberts Harris Fellow. He also holds an M.A. in mathematical sciences education from the University of Texas at Dallas and a B.S. in economics with a minor in mathematical sciences from Northern Illinois University.

He is married to Kim Cash Tate and they have two young adult children. Kim Cash Tate is an author, Bible teacher, singer/song-writer, and YouTuber. She aerned a B.A. from the University of Maryland, College Park, and a J.D. from the George Washington University Law School.





Keli Zinn, a collegiate athletics leader with over 20 years of power conference experience and a proven track record of transforming championship-level programs, enters her first season as Rutgers Director of Athletics. In her two decades as an athletics administrator, Zinn has played key roles in departments that have amassed a combined 16 national championships and 34 conference championships.

Zinn arrives 'On the Banks,' following her stint as the executive deputy athletic director and chief operating officer at Louisiana State University. Zinn oversaw all external and internal affairs of the athletics department, working closely with University leadership, senior athletics administration and campus and community partners. Her work included supervision of all 21 varsity programs with direct oversight of football and gymnastics, revenue generation, capital projects and strategic initiatives.

Zinn was instrumental in advancing LSU's Name, Image, and Likeness (NIL) strategy, forging a partnership to produce The Money Game, a documentary series following Tigers student-athletes, which launched on Amazon Prime Video. Her innovative approach secured

NIL agreements and fundraising growth across multiple sports, positioning LSU as a national NIL leader.

Zinn helped drive a significant growth in revenue, renegotiating the Tigers' multimedia rights and apparel partnerships, securing record setting increases in value. She was instrumental in boosting ticket sales, merchandise revenue and donor support during her time at LSU. In 2024, football surpassed its highest number of season tickets since 2017, with a total of 71,250 tickets sold.

At LSU, Zinn helped lead the Tigers to unprecedented success: four national championships (gymnastics, women's basketball, and baseball twice), three SEC titles including women's track and field and women's gymnastics, and a top-10 finish in the Director's Cup for the first time since 2008-09.

The football program completed one of the biggest turnarounds in college football during Zinn's first season in Baton Rouge in 2022, posting a 10-win regular season and the SEC Western Division title before winning the Citrus Bowl. In her three years with the Tigers, football won 29 games, with a 3-0 record in bowl games, and celebrated numerous first round NFL Draft picks, including 2023 Heisman Trophy winner, Jayden Daniels.

Prior to her time at LSU, Zinn spent 12 seasons at her alma mater West Virginia. While there, she served as deputy athletics director and chief operating officer of the department from 2016-2022. A native of Petersburg, West Viriginia, Zinn was appointed the school's interim Director of Athletics, becoming the first

woman to lead the department.

Zinn joined WVU in 2010 as associate athletic director for compliance and governance and in 2014, was elevated to executive senior associate athletics director. In her oversight of the day-to-day operations, Zinn helped guide the athletic department through its transition into the Big 12 in 2012.

In Nov. 2021, Zinn was selected as West Virginia Executive Magazine's cover recipient of the 2022 Young Guns Class, representing a generation of leaders who have accomplished great things through their careers in the business world and in their communities.

A 2020 inductee into the WVU College of Physical Activity and Sport Sciences Hall of Fame, Zinn has twice received national recognition from the Sports Business Journal, being name to their Forty Under 40 honors in 2019, and selected as one of SBJ's Game Changers in 2016.

She earned a bachelor's degree and master's degree in sport management from West Virginia University.

Zinn began her career in collegiate athletics, serving as a compliance assistant with the Big East (2003-2004) before joining the University of Maryland as an assistant athletics director for compliance (2005-2010).

Zinn and her husband, Nathaniel, married in 2017.
