St. Francis Brooklyn and the Northeast Conference continue to revolutionize the way its fans follow and interact with their favorite teams and the student-athletes who comprise them.

The 10-member NCAA Division I conference launched NEC Front Row in 2012, an online digital network with multi-platform access.

Developed and launched in partnership with Pack Network, NEC Front Row features a rich set of content, including live events, on-demand video, highlight packages, coaches shows, features, original programming and access to the league's extensive digital library, all of which is free of charge to users. The network gives fans free inside access to the stories from across the Northeast Conference and its student-athletes on the field, in the classroom, across campus, and in the community.

"We are thrilled to continue our partnership with Pack Network to unveil the NEC Front Row," said Noreen Morris, NEC Commissioner. "This state-of-the-art online digital network provides NEC fans with the opportunity to follow their favorite teams, coaches and student-athletes through a high-end, interactive viewing experience. Our membership continues to be excited about NEC Front Row and the **limitless possibilities to enhance the brand and exposure of the NEC.**"

The centerpiece of the digital network is the video streaming of hundreds of live events from across the Conference. Nearly every Northeast Conference basketball game is available along with a majority of NEC football contests. NEC members will have the ability to stream any sport they choose, along with special events from across campus.

NEC Front Row will be available on-the-go, providing fans the ability to watch live events on any mobile device. In the coming weeks, the online digital network will also have its own iPhone/iPad application that can be downloaded by fans at no cost. All mobile content, including live content, will be free of charge.

The widespread availability of live NEC events is only a slice of what NEC Front Row will provide to fans.

The online digital network features a state-of-the-art Game Viewer that will enhance the way fans follow the action. Users have the option to watch up to six live events simultaneously and a host of interactive fan components - including in-game chat, Twitter feeds, Facebook posts and Instagram photo sharing - to provide a rich in-game social media experience.

Following the conclusion of live events, recorded broadcasts (in their entirety) are available in the NEC Front Row on-demand archive.

Along with live programming, fans can interact 24/7 with their favorite NEC institution on each school's "Social Media Mashup" wall. On-demand content can be sorted by school, as well as by sport and type of clip.

"NEC Front Row has been a long time in the making and throughout the entire development of the Front Row site, our main focus has been on the fans of the Northeast Conference," said K.J. Cardinal, Pack Network Co-Founder. "We will continue to work with the NEC and its members to deliver a unique game-day experience that will serve as an interactive community for those watching games online and in the arena. The fact that fans can also view enhanced live video productions on their computers and on the go, all for free, is a testament to the commitment of the NEC to better serve not only its fans, but also its membership. 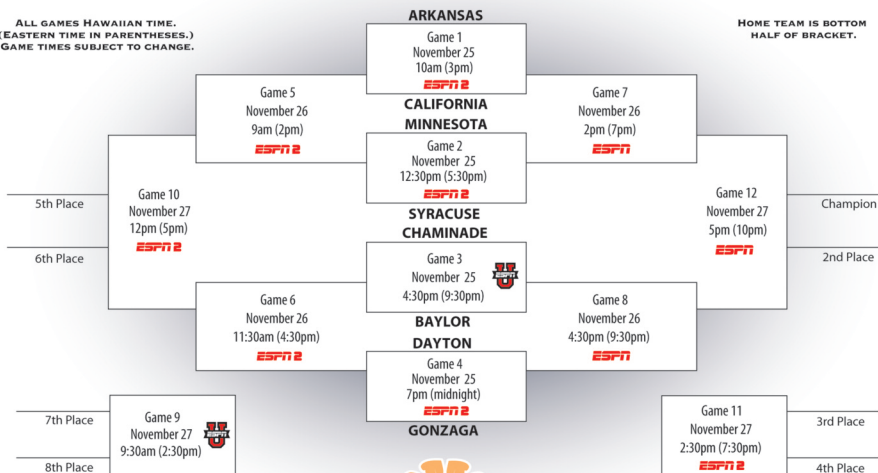

Last season, The St. Francis Brooklyn Terriers earned a berth in the Northeast Conference Tournament for the third time in three seasons under head coach Glenn Braica. However, the Terriers were certainly not satisfied with that feat and are poised to challenge for an NEC Championship in 2013-2014.

"Last year was an up and down season for us," said Braica. "We had some very good wins and some very difficult losses. I think we have addressed some of our deficiencies in the off-season and we now have more athleticism and depth to play the way we would like. It will be a challenge to get a rotation down because we do have a lot of guys that can play. How quickly the new guys can adjust and how the returning guys acclimate to different roles are the biggest question marks entering the season."

The current group certainly does not lack for talent as Braica will return four starters and has added several talented newcomers to the mix. The most glaring loss will be the departure of graduated forward/center **Akeem Johnson** (10.5 ppg., 5.8 rpg.), who has signed a professional contract in Finland.

"I really like the composition of this team and I think the guys are hungry," Braica stated. "Our returning players have all worked very hard over the summer to become better players, and I think the new guys are talented and are excited about being here. I also think that our exhibition trip to Canada this past summer was very helpful in our preparation for the upcoming season."

THE FRONT COURT

Junior forward **Jalen Cannon** is widely regarded as one of the top returning players on the circuit after earning Second Team All Northeast Conference honors last season. The bruising power forward paced the Terriers in scoring (14.7 ppg., rebounding (8.8 rpg.) and field goal percentage (.556) after earning All-Rookie Team honors as a freshman in 2011-2012.

"Jalen has been a terrific player for us and he's still getting better," Braica explained. "I think he just needs to continue to progress in all areas of his game. He's worked a great deal on his outside shot this summer and it looks really good. Obviously, he's a great rebounder and he's put up big stats in rebounding and scoring. Last year he was able to guard some people that he probably couldn't have his freshman year so I think he's made strides in all aspects of his game. I have also seen a change in respect to his leadership and I expect him to continue to grow in that area."

Uber athletic junior wing **Kevin Douglas** (7.4 ppg., 3.4 rpg.) was showing flashes of developing into an upper echelon player in the NEC until he fell awkwardly on his hand in the third conference game of the season against Mount St. Mary's. The injury, which came as Douglas was trying to prevent a break-away dunk, cost him 14 games and was a major blow to the Terriers, particularly on the defensive end where the Bronx native does his best work.

"Kevin's injury really hurt us in the long term last year," Braica admitted. "Where it really affected us was with our perimeter defense because he gives us a certain athleticism. Kevin has the ability to guard some really good players and guys that have size. He was also making big strides on the offensive end and was shooting well. He's worked hard over the summer, is healthy, and we look for him to have a very good year."

Senior **Matt Milk** (5.3 minutes per game) and junior **Lowell Ulmer** (7.6 mpg.) are the only other returners in the Terriers' frontcourt. Milk will have an opportunity to compete for the starting role in the middle. Ulmer played in a career-high 24 games last season and provided a huge spark on several occasions. His effort in the road win at Wagner was contagious as the native Staten Islander turned in several outstanding hustle plays that inspired his teammates in a difficult road environment. He also played extremely well against LIU Brooklyn, in a game that was televised live on MSG Network.

"Both Matt and Lowell can really help us," Braica said. "Matt gives us a lot of intangibles. He provides solid post defense, can rebound, and is a decent scorer around the basket when he gets the ball deep. Lowell was given a chance to get more playing time last season and I thought he responded. He can play a couple of positions for us and brings a lot of athleticism. He gives us versatility defensively because he can guard multiple positions. I would think that his confidence should grow off of what he did last season."

Two newcomers who are expected to play big roles up front this season will be freshman **Wayne Martin** and junior transfer **Amdy Fall**. Martin helped lead South Shore to a 17-9-1 record and a berth in the PSAL quarterfinals in 2011-2012. He averaged 12.1 points and 8.3 rebounds per game for the Kangaroos as a senior. Fall helped lead the College of Central Florida to the 2013 NJCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship. The Senegal native averaged 7.6 points and 5.2 rebounds per game last season. He shot 50.8 percent from the floor and led the team with 46 blocks. Prior to enrolling at the College of Central Florida, Fall helped lead Wings Academy (Bronx, NY) to the PSAL semifinals in 2010-2011.

"Wayne is tremendously talented and is adjusting to the level of play and the intensity of each possession," Braica stated. "But I have seen a change in his early-season workouts as opposed to last June when we were preparing to go to Canada. If it all comes together for him he could have a really good freshman season. Amdy gives us a dimension that we haven't had here, a shot blocker inside who can protect the rim and is a good rebounder. He's got a great motor and plays very hard. He also brings experience as an older guy that played for a national championship team."

THE BACK COURT

Senior guard **Ben Mockford** (11.1 ppg.) will spearhead the backcourt this season. Mockford is one of the top shooters in the conference and will be looking to build on a campaign that saw him convert at a sensational 45 percent clip from behind the arc in NEC competition.

Overall, the native of England splashed 82-of-206 long-range attempts (.398), which put him third in the league with 2.73 treys per game.

"Ben did a great job of shooting the ball last season," Braica said. "His three-point percentage was outstanding. This year we would like him to be more physical, tougher, and better defensively. He needs to do some more intangible things such as picking up loose balls, and not just be a shooter."

Three players can end up seeing time at the lead guard spot. The question will be who gets the starting nod on opening night in Coral Gables. Junior **Brent Jones** (6.0 ppg., 4.2 assists per game) is the incumbent after making 28 starts last season but will be heavily challenged by sophomore returner **Anthony White** (12.6 mpg.) and freshman **Yunus Hopkinson**.

Jones has enjoyed some big games during his two-year career, and is one of the quickest players in the NEC. Last season, he came up with a game-winning steal and layup on the road at Quinnipiac. White, a combo-guard, displayed a penchant for getting into the lane but needs to improve his outside shooting in order to keep the defense honest.

"We are looking for Brent to be a lot more consistent this year," Braica admitted. "He played very well as a freshman but he never seemed to get comfortable last year. He did a good job of getting in the gym and putting shots up in the off-season so that he can become a better shooter. We also need for him to be more of a leader as a point guard, not always looking for the home run play. But I certainly don't want to take away his aggressiveness because we want him to make plays."

"I thought Anthony had a very good freshmen year," Braica said. "He's a smart player and has a very good feel. In addition, he's a good passer, has excellent size for a guard and can play with the ball in his hands or off the ball. His defense improved as the year went on but we still need it to get better. If he can develop his outside shot I think he can have a very good career for us."

There is tremendous excitement about the two newcomers in the backcourt. **Sheldon Hagigal** is a strong guard who prepped for two years at West Oaks Academy (Orlando, Florida), where he was a member of an outstanding team that went 18-4 and 7-0 in the conference in 2011-2012. Hagigal averaged 13 points, 2 assists, 5 rebounds, and played a huge role for the Flames. Prior to enrolling at West Oaks, he recovered from a leg injury to help lead Westbury High School to the 2010 county championship title, as they topped Elmont in the Nassau Class A boys basketball final at Hofstra University.

"Sheldon has a chance to be a very good player," Braica stated. "He also gives us a dimension that we didn't have last year in a sense that he can shoot, create his own shot, and can get to the rim and make opponents foul him. He's a very physical guard and possesses excellent body balance and strength to guard the ball. Once he adjusts to this level he can be an excellent defender in addition to being a very good offensive player."

Hopkinson, a pure point guard, prepped at Lee Academy in Maine in 2011-2012. Prior to enrolling at Lee Academy, Hopkinson was the eighth leading scorer in the city and finished second-best in the PSAL's 'AA' division in 2009-2010, averaging 28.3 points per outing for West 50th Street Campus (Food & Finance). That season, he scored a game-high 31 points, 16 of them in the deciding fourth quarter to lead the 17th-seeded Seahawks past No. 16 Gompers in the opening round of the PSAL Class AA playoffs.

"Yunice is a tough kid who is very physically strong and gives us a lot of quickness in the backcourt," Braica stated. "He's got the ability to break down a defense and he can hit the three. Another strength is his ability to pressure the ball on the defensive end."

Senior shooting guards **Aleksandar Isailovic** and **P.J. Santavenere** will also compete for playing time at the shooting guard or small forward position. Isailovic made 15 starts after Douglas went down with an injury and played 17.7 minutes per contest. Known as a good shooter, the Serbian native should feel more comfortable this season with a year under his belt on Remsen Street. Santavenere can also provide a spark and provided 11.0 minutes per game off the bench last season. He enjoyed a memorable game at the Barclays Center, hitting all six of his field goal attempts en-route to 16 points in 20 minutes off the bench.

"Alex had a decent first season and is a better defender than we thought he would be," Braica said. "We would like him to be more of a consistent shooter and if he can do that he can add a lot to our team. PJ gives us energy off the bench. He can shoot the ball and is athletic. We need him to improve defensively this year. He can really help us if he gets back to playing the same way he did defensively."

THE SCHEDULE

The front portion of the schedule will not be easy as the Terriers will play eight of their first nine contests away from Remsen Street, beginning with an opening-night tilt at Miami on November 8 and a battle at Florida Atlantic three days later. An appearance in the EA Sports Maui Invitational Mainland Bracket (at Coastal Carolina) will be sandwiched in between road contests at Dayton, Syracuse, Stony Brook, and Army. The Terriers will finally play in front of their home fans on November 27 against Mount St. Vincent.

It's a very challenging schedule," Braica admitted. "We have numerous games on the road to start the season against very good teams. However, if we are tough and can learn from it, then we will benefit from the schedule. We will see different styles of play in difficult environments that can really prepare us for the conference season."

LIU-Brooklyn is the defending NEC champion but the depth throughout the conference continues to be impressive. "The league is very good and has gained a lot of respect," Braica claims. "There are very good players that have a lot of talent. The coaches in the NEC are excellent so we have to be ready to play every night."

Brooklyn native **Glenn Braica** was named the 17th head coach in the history of the St. Francis College men's basketball program on May 20, 2010. Under his tutelage, the program has qualified for the Northeast Conference Tournament in three straight seasons.

"I'm extremely excited to be the new head coach at St. Francis College," Braica said at his press conference. "I would like to thank Irma and the administration for giving me this opportunity. I believe that the experience I have gained in all facets of coaching has prepared me for the challenge of re-establishing St. Francis as one of the best programs in the Northeast Conference. It's my desire to work with people of high integrity who understand the importance of academics and the values of St. Francis College. I will build a program that properly reflects the institution's high expectations of its student-athletes in the classroom, on the court and in the community."

"With Glenn we get a true Brooklynite; someone who has spent his entire career making connections within the New York City basketball community," added AD Garcia. "He's someone who cares about his student-athletes not just when they play for him, but years later. He is their mentor for life."

When St. Francis Director of Athletics Irma Garcia introduced Braica to the campus and media she said, "This is a great day for St. Francis College basketball. Glenn was a solid coach for us when he was here the first time. Now with six years in the Big East under his belt, he's coming back with incredible experience that will give our program a huge lift toward the upper echelon of the Northeast Conference."

In his first season on the sidelines in 2010-2011, Braica led the Terriers to a 15-15 campaign and the No. 5 seed in the Northeast Conference Tournament. It was the program's best record since the 2003-04 season when St. Francis finished 15-13 and won a share of the NEC regular-season title. Under Braica, the Terriers increased their scoring by more than six points per game from the previous season and were one of the best teams in the country in taking care of the basketball, averaging a conference-low 13.3 turnovers per game. The team also led the circuit with 7.80 steals per game.

In 2011-2012, St. Francis hosted their first home conference tournament game since 1997 after placing fourth in the league standings. Braica's focus on defense is certainly paying off. That season his squad was one of the best in the nation at defending the three-point line. The Terriers ranked second in the NEC and 17th in the country in defensive three-point field goal percentage. Braica was rewarded by being named the Jim Phelan NEC Coach of the Year as well as the NABC Division I District 18 Co-Coach of the Year.

In his first stint at St. Francis, Braica patrolled the Terriers' sidelines for 15 years and was the Associate Head Coach from the 2000-01 season to 2003-04 under Ron Ganulin. During Braica's last seven years at St. Francis, the Terriers posted a 118-83 record, including an 88-42 mark in the NEC and captured two regular season titles. They finished with a .500 or better record in the league seven-straight years, at that time the longest active streak in the conference. They also reached the NEC Semifinals five times and had two championship game appearances in Braica's last five seasons. Braica helped

Ganulin orchestrate the Terriers' offensive system, which ranked first or second in the NEC in each of the last five seasons he was on staff. During his tenure the squad emerged from the league's lower tier and went on to become one of the conference's marquee programs. From 1998-2004, the Terriers had one player named the league's Player of the Year, six first-team All-NEC selections, five second-team All-NEC honorees, two players that led the league in scoring, two NEC Rookies of the Year and a NEC Defensive Player of the Year. Braica recruited and coached several student-athletes that would go on to pro basketball careers during his time with the Terriers.

Following his first span at the college, Braica spent six seasons as an assistant at St. John's under Norm Roberts. When Roberts became head coach at St. John's, Braica, a teammate at Queens College, was his first hire. He is a proven recruiter, scout and strategist, and was instrumental in helping St. John's rebuild its program.

"I truly believe that Glenn has the whole package," said Roberts. "He brings experience, tremendous coaching ability as well as the personality and demeanor to promote and elevate St. Francis College to the top of the Northeast Conference."

Braica was also praised by Roberts for his ability to reach out to the community and Red Storm alumni, bringing former players back into the fold. He was also one of the co-directors of the Norm Roberts basketball camp, helping to increase enrollment from 75 campers in 2004 to 260 kids per session in 2009.

While at St. John's, Braica recruited and helped develop First Team All-Big East guard Dwight Hardy and Sixth Man of the Year Justin Burrell. He also worked with D.J. Kennedy and Cedric Jackson, who both played in the NBA for the Cleveland Cavaliers.

From 2001-03, Braica was the head coach for the Empire State Games New York City men's open team, which won gold medals in 2001 and 2002, as well as a silver medal in 2003. The team included former Terriers Cliff Strong, Sean Dantzler, Damien Herard, Devon Neckles, Karl Sanders, and Tristan Smith as well as current NBA player Royal Ivey. Braica has also coached numerous players that participated in this past year's NBA Summer League, including Dwight Hardy (Miami Heat), Justin Burrell (Golden State Warriors), D.J. Kennedy (Cleveland Cavaliers), and Paris Horne (Charlotte Bobcats).

Braica attended St. Agnes High School and Bishop Ford High School in Brooklyn in the early 1980s and graduated from Queens College in 1989. Braica began his coaching career at New York City Tech as an assistant in 1988. He also served as a teacher at The Reece School and in the New York City Board of Education from 1989-1994.

Bentick earned four letters on the Golden Griffin basketball team from 1997-2001. The New York City native finished 15th in the MAAC in scoring (13.6/gm) and fifth in assists (4.03/gm) as a senior. That year, he was named a MAAC Third Team All Conference Selection, and was named to the MAAC All-Tournament Team after leading the Griffs into the MAAC Championship contest, a run that included a 26-point effort and the game-winning bucket in a semifinal victory over Niagara.

Bentick graduated ranked 39th on the Canisius all-time scoring list with 840 points and sixth in assists with 354. He recently received honorable mention honors on the Canisius College Post-1970s All-Century Team. In addition, he was a finalist for the 1998 NCAA Sports Person of the Year Award.

He earned his bachelor's degree in Business Management and Marketing from Canisius in 2001 and graduated from Canisius with a Master's Degree in Sports Administration in 2006. Bentick spent one season at D'Youville as an assistant coach under Brian Miller. He also served as an assistant coach at Catholic Central Junior High and worked the Eastern Invitational Basketball camp in 2004.

Former Terrier head coach Ron Ganulin will return to Brooklyn Heights under his former assistant Glenn Braica. Ganulin served as the head coach of the Terriers for 14 seasons dating from 1991 through 2005. During his tenure, Ganulin accumulated over 200 wins and was twice named the Northeast Conference's Coach of the Year. Other notable accomplishments during Ganulin's time at St. Francis include finishing with a .500 or better record in the league eight straight years, at that time the longest active streak in the league. The squad reached the NEC semi-finals five times and had two championship game appearances. From 1998 through 2004, St. Francis posted a 78-36 conference record, which was tops in the NEC. During that span, Ganulin guided the Terriers to two Northeast Conference Regular Season Championships as well as their second best single-season record in school history.

Prior to his first arrival on Remsen Street, Ganulin reached the pinnacle of the college basketball world as an Assistant Coach with UNLV helping the team capture the 1990 NCAA National Championship. During his four-year stay in Las Vegas, the Rebels enjoyed a 126-23 record.

After St. Francis Brooklyn, Ganulin served as the coordinator of player development for the NBA's Washington Wizards during the 2005-06 season and then served as an Assistant Coach at Manhattan College for two seasons under former Jaspers' head coach and St. Francis Brooklyn alum Barry Rohrssen.

Throughout his career, Ganulin also served assistant coaching stints at Old Dominion University, Saint Peter's College, New York Tech, and C.W. Post.

Most recently, Ganulin was coaching the boys Junior Varsity, as head coach, and assistant coach for Varsity basketball, at the Yeshiva University High School for Boys in Uptown NYC.

Before he began his coaching career, Ganulin played collegiate basketball at Long Island University, where he graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in 1968. During his senior season, the Blackbirds advanced to the Division II National Collegiate Semifinals. From 1973-1976, he coached on Kibbutz Gan Shmuel in Israel, winning a championship in the country's second league.

Former Terrier standout Jamaal Womack will be entering his first season on the sidelines at his alma mater this season.

Womack coached the local AAU power house Team Scan in the Bronx, New York from 2009 through 2011. While coaching for Team Scan, Womack guided his 2016 class to a third-place finish in the 2012 AAU Nationals and ended the year second in the national rankings. He also assisted the 2015 class this past season and coached several division 1 caliber players while competing on the competitive Nike EYBL circuit. Womack also coached at Brooklyn Friends High-School from 2011 through 2013.

The Bronx, New York native is a member of the Terriers' 1,000 Point Club, finishing his four-year career with 1,153 points. He is also fourth on the program list with 220 career three-pointers, eighth in steals (148), and is 10th in assists (226).

Womack once scored 31 points against Robert Morris, drilling nine treys on February 17th, 2007. He averaged a career-best 12.1 points as a junior in 2007-2008, and converted 72 trifectas that season.

Prior to arriving on Remsen Street, Womack enjoyed a standout two-year career at Our Savior Lutheran High School, averaging 32 points, six assists, and four rebounds per game as a senior. He won his second consecutive PSAL MVP Award that season. He also led his team to a conference championship as a senior and was the first player in school history to reach 1,000 points in a two-year span. He was selected to the NY Daily News Second Team All-City squad and was a First Team All-State selection (A Division).

After graduating, Womack spent the 2009 preseason playing in Finland's 1st Division. He went on to compete in southern Italy in the C-series for VIS Reggio Calabria. Womack flourished there, leading the league twice in a row in scoring.

While averaging over 27 points per game in his second season, Womack led the club to a league championship which moved them up to a higher division. Womack also took home League MVP honors for the championship series.

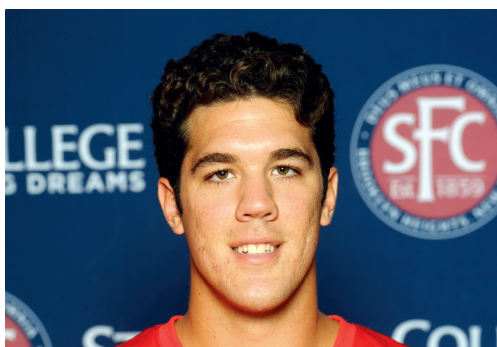

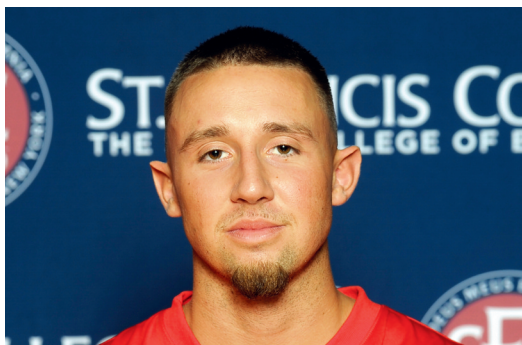

In 2007, he was the top scorer in an international tournament in France averaging 13 points and six assists with England's U-18 team. In 2008, Mockford starred for Great Britain's Under-20 European Championships team and was the youngest player on the squad at age 18. His two breakout efforts included a 6-for-9, 18-point performance from behind the arc against Norway and 7-of-10 with 29 points vs. Ireland. In 2009 in the same tournament in Macedonia, he averaged 12.6 points and drained 13 three pointers in his team's five games.

History of the Men's Basketball Program

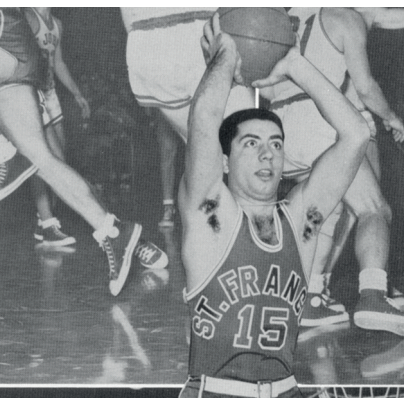
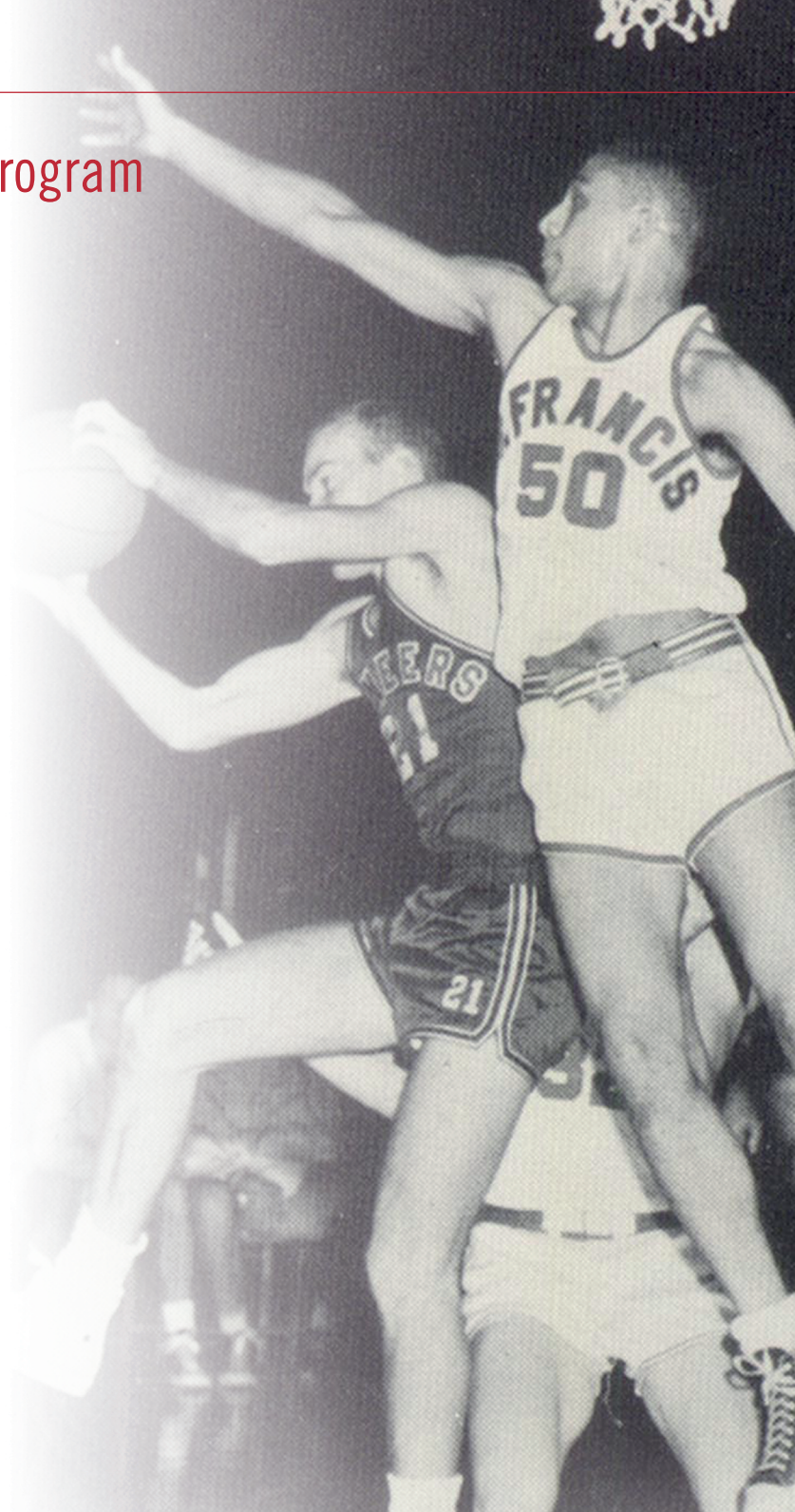
St. Francis College boasts the oldest basketball program among New York City's colleges, putting its first players on the court in 1896 only five years after Dr. James Naismith invented the game. The College's first recorded game came in 1901 against Brown University. The boys from Brooklyn finished the 1901 season with a 13-1 mark.

St. Francis was a major player on the sports scene during the City's college basketball glory days of the 1940s and 1950s. The 1942 squad averaged 59 points per game and in 1949 the Terriers became the first team in the New York City area to have its games broadcast on television. St. Francis defeated Seton Hall in the inaugural telecast on WPIX. In the '50s the team competed in the National Invitation Tournament (NIT) several times and was ranked second in the nation in 1955, a season in which the Terriers strung together 18 consecutive wins.

In the 1953-1954 season, the Terriers accumulated the highest win total in the 105-year history of St. Francis basketball, 23 wins and 5 losses. That year, the St. Francis College Terriers participated in the NIT for the first time in school history, losing to Holy Cross in the quarterfinals. In 2003, the Terriers participated in the Preseason NIT for the first time in school history, losing to the University of Massachusetts in the first round.

The 1998-1999 team, had their first 20-win season in 43 years. Prior to the 1998-99 season, the last St. Francis team to surpass the 20-win mark was the 1955-1956 team led by head coach Daniel Lynch, with an overall record of 21-4.

The Terriers have come close to winning their first Northeast Conference championship and earning an invitation to their first NCAA basketball tournament. Over the past decade, the Terriers won two NEC regular season titles – including a share of the crown in 2003-04 – and has made five NEC Tournament semifinal and two championship game appearances.



Remembering **THE TERRIERS' 1963** N.I.T. Team

A half-century ago, before the NCAA Tournament exploded into the colossal event known today as “March Madness,” the National Invitational Tournament (N.I.T.) was perhaps the premier event in college basketball.

On March 16, 1963, the St. Francis Brooklyn Terriers, coached by **Daniel Lynch '38**, were a major player in their sport. In fact, the Terriers nearly pulled off a tremendous upset when they took the nation's leading scoring team, the Miami Hurricanes, down to the wire in the opening round of the N.I.T. in Madison Square Garden.

Confronted with the daunting task of facing one of the most dominant players in the country, 7-foot-1 center Mike McCoy and sophomore sharpshooter Ricky Barry, the future NBA legend, the Terriers were backing up their fourth in the nation defensive prowess. The Frankies, as they called them, led the Hurricanes 24-21 at halftime and had Miami on the run for most of the second-half.

“Miami thought they could just walk on the court and role us over with ease,” said 1,000 point scorer **James Raftery '63**. “But we never backed down from them and believed that we could win the game.”

Indeed, the Hurricanes were in for a fight the entire duration against the gritty Terriers. Except for McCoy, a lithe big-man who scored from outside (and did for most of his 29 points), the Hurricanes shot poorly and handled the ball worse against the Terriers' aggressive defense that was steered that night by Raftery and backcourt ace **Ray Nash '63** (14 points). With Raftery driving off a high post for 23 points and **Tom Kurowski '67** pouring in 17 more, St. Francis was ahead 66-65 with 3:38 to play. Then Raftery, who also garnered 10 rebounds, fouled out, and Miami went on to win 71-70 on McCoy's layup.

“We gave Miami a great game in front of 10,000 fans on St. Patrick's Day in Madison Square Garden,” Raftery recalled. “Even though we lost it was a special day for our team and for the college.”

The Terriers, who were selected among 12 teams to compete in the N.I.T., finished the season with a record of 16-7. Four of their losses were by a margin of one point. Kurowski (15.8 points per game) and Raftery (15.2 ppg., 7.0 rebounds per game) were the stars of the squad, and were supported by talented players such as Nash, **Ted Kotch '66**, and **Richie Alexander '64**.

“It's like time has stood still whenever we get together,” Raftery said. “Although we don't see each other as often as we used to, we are like brothers and there will always be that connection. I love St. Francis College and consider those times to be some of the best of my life. The school gave all of us our head starts and that's something I will never forget.”

Other team members included: **Charlie Novak '63**, **Frank Pascuzzi '65**, **Jack O'Boyle '64**, **Jim Rishe '64**, **Paul Buckley '64**, Lou Boggiano, **Rich Marquardt '66**, **Ed Lein '65**, and **George Steinman '66**.



2013 “BATTLE OF BROOKLYN” at the Barclays Center

Beginning in the 1975-76 season, an annual “Battle of Brooklyn” game was dedicated in tribute to William “Buck” Lai and the late Danny Lynch, former athletic directors at LIU and St. Francis, respectively. The “Battle of Brooklyn” has been a tradition between the two schools in men’s basketball for 38 years. Each year a Most Valuable Player trophy, named in honor of the two men, is awarded at the conclusion of each contest.

The 2012-2013 Battle of Brooklyn was contested at St. Francis Brooklyn last season with LIU coming out on top, 78-68. The Blackbirds shot a sizzling 75 percent (18-of-24) in the second-half, including 7-for-11 (63.6 percent) from behind the arc and outscored the hosts by a 57-35 margin in the stanza. The Terriers led by a score of 33-21 at the break.

Terriers sophomore forward **Jalen Cannon** paced the squad with 21 points and 10 rebounds, his eighth “double-double” of the campaign. Sophomore guard **Brent Jones** added a season-high 14 points and eight assists and classmate **Lowell Ulmer** chipped in with a career-high 10 points.

St. Francis now has a Battle record of 16-22 against LIU.

The 39th annual Battle of Brooklyn will be held on February 16th at the Barclays Center.

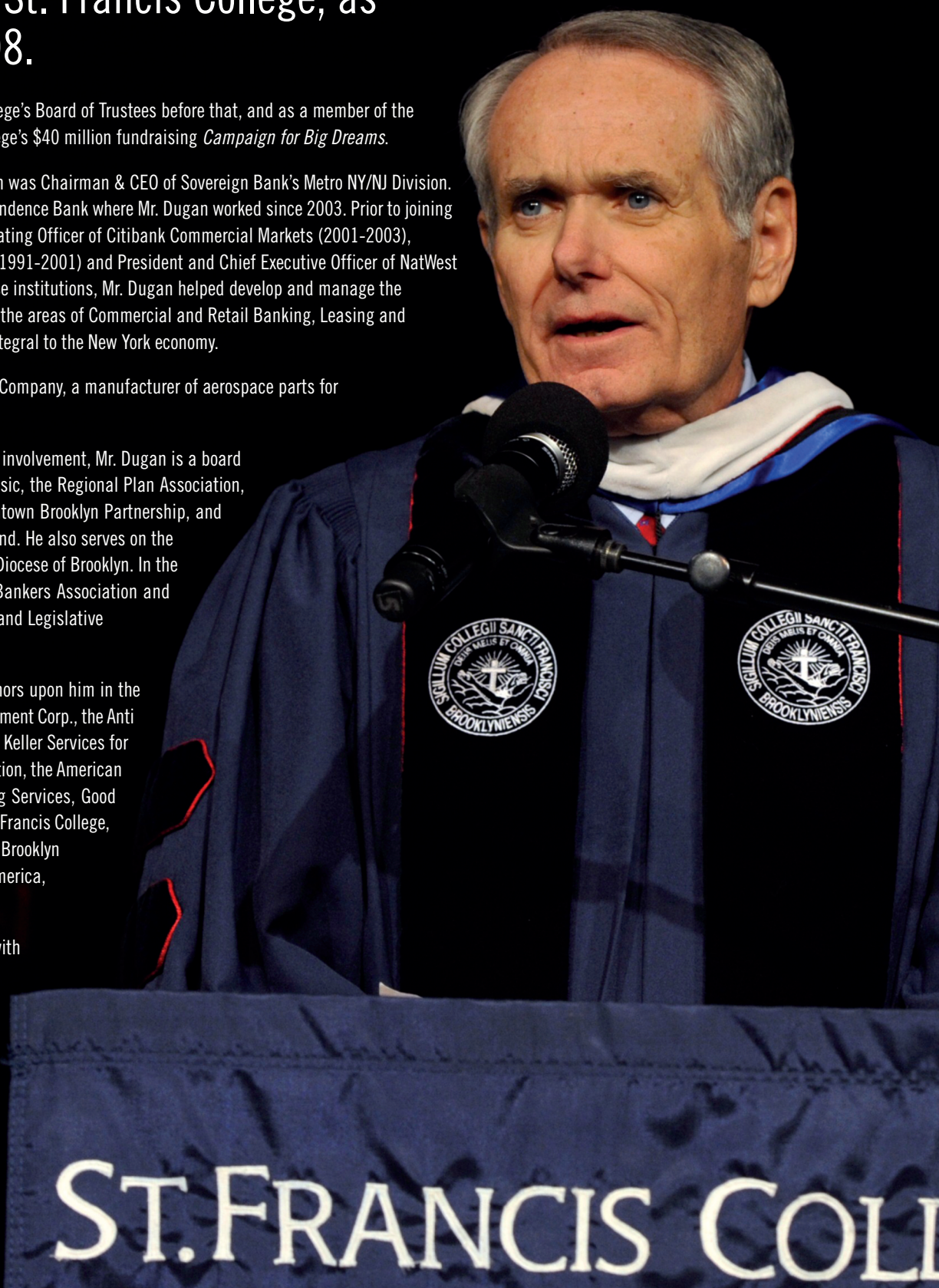

He resides in Carroll Gardens, Brooklyn with his wife, Barbara.





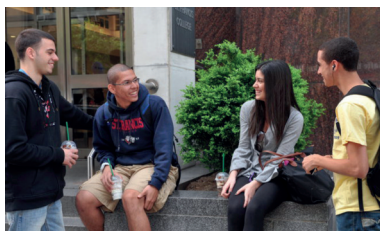
St. Francis College was founded in 1859 as St. Francis Academy by a group of newly arrived Franciscan Brothers from Ireland. The Brother's mission was to educate young men from working-class families in the Brooklyn Diocese. St. Francis Academy provided a sound education with a rigorous curriculum and personal support, all for a modest tuition, characteristics that endure today.

In 1884, St. Francis College received its Charter from New York State establishing a literary college which could award diplomas, honors, and degrees. In 1926, St. Francis College built a larger campus near its original site in Cobble Hill, where it remained until the 1960s when the College relocated to its current site on Remsen Street in Brooklyn Heights. The new location and opening the College's doors to women for the first time led to an influx of students from all five boroughs of New York City and beyond, doubling the student population.

The cornerstone of the St. Francis College experience is academics. All students complete a core curriculum that offers a foundation for intellectual and professional growth; once completed, they choose from one of more than 70 majors, many in the liberal arts and others geared to specific professions, including Master's degrees in Accounting and Psychology as well as a graduate certificate in Project Management. An honors program serves students of high achievement and a broad scholarship program supports those who are likely to perform well academically.

An NCAA-Division I institution, St. Francis College offers students the opportunity to play for any of 19 varsity men's and women's athletic teams, including its men's basketball team, whose program is among the oldest in New York City. Teams compete in many well-known New York City venues such as the USTA National Tennis Center, home of the U.S. Open, Madison Square Garden, Barclays Center, and Brooklyn Bridge Park, our new home for men's soccer.

Today, first-generation college-goers and students of all backgrounds are among St. Francis College's diverse population. Its Catholic-Franciscan heritage, central to life at the College, allows faculty and administrators to embrace, support, and encourage all students as they pursue fulfillment of their dreams.



ACADEMIC ENHANCEMENT CENTER

The Academic Enhancement Center is a resource for all students to help them get ahead in the classroom. Professional and peer student tutors help guide students in a variety of ways to get them on the right academic track. The center offers workshops, intensive reading and writing courses, one on one and group tutoring, computer resources and pre-collegiate summer programs to help incoming freshman make the transition from high school to college.

FRANCISCAN EDUCATION

Around the year 1224, St. Francis of Assisi gave permission to a young and learned Brother, St. Anthony of Padua, to teach theology to the Brothers "as long as such study did not extinguish the spirit of prayer and devotion." In the century that followed, a "Franciscan School" of scholars developed a Christ-centered theology and philosophy based on the life and teachings of St. Francis. The outstanding Franciscan scholars of that period are St. Bonaventure and Blessed John Duns Scotus. They followed the intentions of St. Francis that learning be placed at the service of living as Christ did; in other words, the quest for knowledge was not to be an end in itself, but a quest to live more authentically within oneself and morally within the world community.

In the early nineteenth century, Franciscan Brothers in Ireland began schools for poor and ordinary people. Following that spirit, Brothers came to Brooklyn in 1858 to educate the large numbers of immigrants arriving in America. Those Brothers opened St. Francis Academy in 1859. The institution officially became St. Francis College in 1884 when New York State granted the school a charter. Following the Franciscan tradition, the College has always emphasized development of the whole person. Study of the liberal arts, combined with preparation in specific fields of study, has remained a means of following the quest for truth and personal authenticity. This is the Franciscan Spirit that leads our students to take their place in the world as ethical persons committed to nurturing the Divine goodness within every human being and all that God has created.

The Franciscan Brothers of Brooklyn have been serving the Church in New York for nearly 150 years.

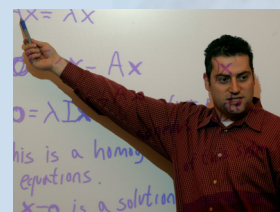
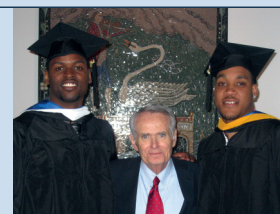

Freshman Seminar (SFC 1001)

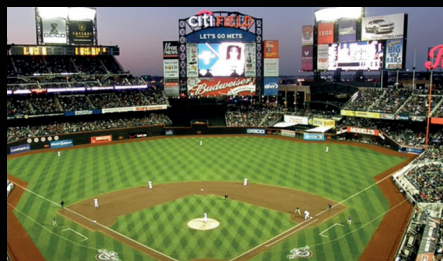

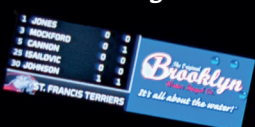

IRMA GARCIA, *Director of Athletics*



Throughout her past thirty-seven years in sports, Irma Garcia has been known and revered as a trailblazer in college athletics. Named the Director of Athletics for St. Francis College in 2007, Garcia became the first Latina to lead a NCAA Division I athletics' department and is one of only a few women to head a Division I program. Garcia's leadership, compassion and dedication to sports and St. Francis College has set the stage for her to oversee ten women's teams and nine men's teams as the college's Athletic Director. Throughout her life as a collegiate student-athlete, coach and administrator, Garcia has touched and inspired many and dedicated much of her time to ensuring that young women have the resources and opportunities to blaze their own trails.

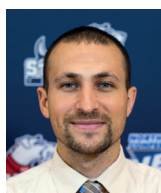
From 1976 - 1980, Garcia was a top student-athlete for St. Francis as a basketball player for the college's Hall of Fame Coach, Diane Nolan. After graduating, Garcia started her career as a coach for the girls basketball team at St. Joseph by the Sea High School in Staten Island, New York. In 1988, Garcia was named the eighth women's basketball coach in St. Francis College history. During Garcia's 11-year tenure, her players and teams received many individual and collective honors. Under her guidance, 12 of her women's basketball players were honored on post-season Northeast Conference (NEC) teams (four NEC First-Team All-Conference Players, two NEC Second-Team All-Conference Players, five NEC All-Rookie Team Players, and one Newcomer of the Year). Five former players were inducted into the St. Francis College's Hall of Fame. Notably, Garcia's women's basketball teams were also among the NCAA elite in the classroom. Her 1998-99 team was honored by the WBCA for having the 4th highest team grade-point-average among nearly 300 Division I women's basketball teams in the country, and the 1997-98 team ranked 23rd in the nation in team grade-point-average. Garcia also coached the first St. Francis women's basketball player recruited to play professional basketball, Carolyn Harvey. After the 1997-98 season, Garcia was honored by her colleagues as the Northeast Conference Coach of the Year. Garcia earned a master's degree in Sports Administration from Brooklyn College in 2001. She is an active member of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA), the National Association of Collegiate Women Athletic Administrators (NACWAA), Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU), the Minority Opportunities Association (MOAA), Board member of the Public Schools Athletic League, and sits on the NCAA's Minority Opportunity and Interests Committee (MOIC) as well as the Ethnic Minority and Women's Enhancement Scholarship Committee.

Garcia has recently been featured as a female pioneer in publications such as USA Today, New York Daily News, Diversity Magazine, CAA News, and ESPN.com. She has also appeared on American Latino, a nationally syndicated TV show as well as ESPN Deportes and ESPN Sports Center.

Garcia was inducted to the St. Francis Hall of Fame in 2005 and has been the recipient of many well-deserved honors and awards. In May of 2012, Garcia was honored by the Women's Sports Foundation as a member of the 40 FOR 40 list, which consists of 40 women who have made a significant impact on society after playing high school or college sports during the forty years of the Title IX era. Brooklyn Borough President Marty Markowitz honored Garcia in the fall of 2010 at Brooklyn's Borough Hall during Latin Heritage Night. In April of 2010,

Garcia was recognized as one of the recipients of the 2010 "Mujeres Destacadas Award" by El Diario La Prensa, the premier publication serving New York-area Latinos. She was the recipient of the ECAC's 2009 Katherine Ley Award, which honors an ECAC woman athletics administrator who exemplifies the values and characteristics displayed by Katherine Ley. Garcia was also honored on October 1, 2008 at the White House, in Washington, D.C., as a 2008 Las Primeras Award Recipient by MANA, a national Latina organization, for becoming the first Latina to run an NCAA Division I athletic program.

ANTHONY KURTIN, *Associate Director of Athletics*



Anthony Kurtin was promoted to Associate Director of Athletics in the summer of 2011. In his role as Associate AD, Kurtin fulfills all duties of the Director of Athletics in her absence. His day-to-day responsibilities include managing all aspects of the approved athletics budget and consulting with each coach on travel and budget accommodations.

He has strong ties to the College. As a former member of the track & field team, Kurtin was team captain during his junior and senior years. During his junior year, he was named MVP for the Terriers' cross-country squad and received the Coaches Award during the outdoor track & field season. As a senior, he garnered a second-straight Coaches Award for cross-country. Upon graduating from the College, Kurtin was hired to lead the St. Francis College Track & Field program, making him one of the youngest coaches in the nation at that time.

In addition, Kurtin began teaching and coaching at Bishop Ford High School in Brooklyn. He also worked and coached with City Parks track & field camps, PAL, NATS Kids, and during the summer of 2005 was named Empire State Games head coach for the New York City track & field squad.

Kurtin also holds a Master's Degree in Guidance and Counseling from Brooklyn College. He and his wife, Laurie, reside in New Rochelle along with their two children, JD (6), and Addison (3).

CARL QUIGLEY, *Assistant Athletic Director*



Cathal "Carl" Quigley's long time association with St Francis College began in 1971 as a freshman student athlete of the class of 1975. He graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Sociology and is a member of the Dun Scotus Honor society. Upon graduating from St Francis College in 1975, Quigley was hired as the Water Polo's coach by athletic director Dan Lynch Sr. and Dean of Students John Clifford. He started out as a part-time coach but then in 1976, he was elevated to head coach.

He continued his education at Long Island University where he received his MS degree in Adapted Physical Education and Rehabilitation with a concentration in Developmental Disabilities in 1979. Carl founded and organized the St. Francis Youth Water Polo Club that year as well. Under his guidance, the club has been most successful when it comes to providing countless children with the opportunity to play water polo at the local, state (Empire State Games) and national competitions. In this program, Quigley has guided one of the members of this group to play in three Olympic competitions. Carl participated at the Empire State Games as a player, coach and State Chairman from 1985-2002. In 1991, for his accomplishments as a swimmer, water polo player and coach, St. Francis College inducted Quigley in the

College's Hall of Fame. When Carl is not around St. Francis and the pool, he served as an Adjunct Faculty member at Long Island University (1999-2002) and also currently at his alma mater. In 1999, he was hired as Assistant Athletic Director and Director of Aquatics. His responsibilities included overseeing the men's and women's water polo teams. Among his accolades, Carl was named "Educator of the Year" by the Brooklyn Heights Enrichment Program. Carl served as the President of the Collegiate Water Polo Association Board of Directors from 2001-2002.

As a coach, the men's water polo team has won six CWPA Northern Division Championships and the last five ECAC (Eastern Collegiate Athletic Association) Championships. The team also advanced to the NCAA National Championship Final Four in 2005. He has coached 17 All Americans here at the college and during that time and most importantly the men's water polo team led the nation academically sporting the highest GPA among men's water polo teams four times from 2000-2007 of the last eight years. Of note, two members of those teams have won the prestigious NCAA Post-graduate Scholarship award namely Tamas Katona and Gergely Fabian. Lastly two players we selected Graduation day valedictorians Tamas Bakacs in 2000 and Andrija Vrdoljak in 2006. Currently, Carl is the Sports Administrator for Women's Volleyball and Men's and Women's Cross Country and Track & Field. He is responsible for coordinating the use of the College's pool to some forty community groups that include CHSAA, PSAL, and CYO swim teams, local summer camps and special groups like the Brooklyn Special Olympics, the Young Adult Institute and the American Red Cross.

Administratively, he has served on the NCAA Rules and Championship Committees from 2002-2006 and currently serves on the Northeast Conference Game Management and Northeast Conference Swimming Committees.

Quigley is married to St Francis alumnus Christabel class of 1975 and they live in Belle Harbor with their two sons Bryan and Matthew.

MEGHAN O'BRIEN, *Director of Athletic Marketing & Senior Woman Administrator*



Meghan O'Brien is entering her seventh year as a member of the senior athletic administrative staff at St. Francis Brooklyn. In her current position as the Director of Athletic Marketing and Senior Woman Administrator, O'Brien oversees all marketing and communications aspects for the Athletic Department. This includes special events, sponsorships, contracts, the athletic communications office and ticket office.

O'Brien has orchestrated many successful events for the department, which include Athletic Alumni Day, Shoot for a Cure and the Athletic Awards Banquet. During her time at St. Francis, O'Brien has built relationships with various alumni groups and rebranded the Terrier Club. In the fall of 2012, O'Brien spearheaded the ongoing athletic logo rebranding efforts for the college.

O'Brien and her team are instrumental in fan engagement and all promotional activities for men's soccer and men and women's basketball.

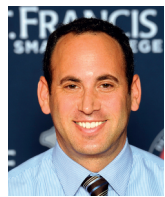
As a senior staff supervisor, O'Brien oversees the athletic communications office and the publicity for all 19 Division I teams and helps develop and implement new digital content for the department website www.sfcathletics.com, and the Terrier Sports Network.

As Senior Woman Administrator, she ensures gender equality for women's athletics in compliance with Title IX and is the sports administrator for men and women's swimming and women's water polo. Currently O'Brien is the co-chair of the NEC Sport Management Committee and is the liaison to outdoor track and field.

ST. FRANCIS ATHLETIC DEPARTMENT

In addition to her work in marketing, O'Brien is responsible for managing the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC), which developed a partnership in 2009 with the New York Road Runners. Annually SAAC helps to wrap and distribute over 200 pairs of sneakers to young NYRR members. In November, St. Francis Brooklyn will be participating in the 2013 ING NYC Marathon (sponsored by the NYRR), taking ownership of Mile 11. Prior to being promoted to Director of Athletic Marketing and SWA, O'Brien began as an administrative assistant upon graduating from SUNY Oneonta in 2006. David Gansell was hired as Director of Sports Information on August 15, 2007. Since arriving, new efforts have been made to enhance the department's new media efforts and Terrier athletes and staff have been featured prominently in the local and national media.

Gansell oversees the day-to-day content of SFCathletics.com, web streaming, and the department's social media sites. Interest in covering the athletic program from students at the college has grown dramatically, and this year, an athletics communications club has taken off with the help of NEC Front Row, the conference's new media initiative.

Prior to arriving at St. Francis College, Gansell served as the Assistant Director/Director of Media Relations at the City University of New York Athletic Conference (CUNYAC) for four years. In addition to his role of assisting with the conference's daily operations, he was responsible for overseeing the entire media relations efforts of the league. He managed the conference's website, issued weekly press releases, produced publications, handled championship administration, publicized student-athletes and teams, and assisted with sponsorship, advertising, and promotions. Gansell also played a key role in the conference's television and internet radio efforts, and was instrumental in securing a partnership with Time Warner Cable (TWC). 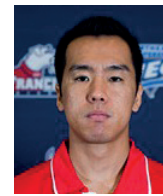
ANDREW CORNICELLO, *Head Athletic Trainer*

THE POPE PHYSICAL EDUCATION CENTER:

Home of Men's & Women's Basketball Teams:

- The Pope Physical Education Center is located between Court and Clinton Streets, within St. Francis College. The arena has a capacity of 1,200 seats. It is home to the St. Francis Terriers basketball teams. The basketball court, Peter Aquilone Court, is named after Peter Aquilone, the son of former Athletic Director and St. Francis alumnus Edward Aquilone, '60. The court was dedicated to Peter Aquilone on December 1, 2004, after he passed away.

THE ANTHONY J. GENOVESI CENTER:

Home of Women's Volleyball Team:

- Named for former State Assemblyman Anthony J. Genovesi, the 10,000 square-foot facility was built in 2003 to meet the growing demand by students for access to more athletic facilities. Finding space for a new gym in the middle of New York City is not easy, so St. Francis went with the logical solution and built the multi-purpose facility on the roof of the Generoso Pope Athletic Complex.
- Now the Genovesi Center is regularly used for everything from Intramural Football and Basketball to home Volleyball games, Career Fairs and even parties, dances and Winter Commencement.

SFC AQUATICS CENTER:

Home to the Men's & Women's Swimming & Diving & Water Polo Teams:

- The St. Francis Aquatics Center houses a competition sized pool (6 lanes by 25 yards) that hosts home games for the Division I, Nationally Ranked Men's Water Polo team as well as the Women's Water Polo team and home meets for the College's Swimming and Diving Teams.
- The pool is open to students, as well as for use by senior citizens and is rented to local organizations, schools, summer camps, and teams for competition, instruction and recreation.
- Feature movies and TV shows like Across The Universe, starring Evan Rachel Woods and an episode of the HBO series, The Flight of the Conchords have also set up shop poolside at SFC.



BROOKLYN BRIDGE PARK – PIER 5

Home to the Men's Soccer Team:

- Pier 5 is the Park's first space dedicated to active recreation. The 650-foot-long pier features playing fields capable of several configurations to adapt to various sports including soccer, lacrosse, rugby, cricket, flag football and ultimate Frisbee. Twenty-six shade sails line the northern and southern sides of the pier to provide shade. Players and spectators can watch the game from the bleachers and benches situated along the sidelines. Sports netting also surrounds the fields to ensure that the East River stays free of stray balls, Frisbees, or footballs.

DYKER BEACH GOLF COURSE

Home to the Men's & Women's Golf Teams:

- Dyker Beach Golf Course is a beautiful 18-hole championships course located in the heart of Brooklyn, New York, below the shadows of the Verrazano Narrows Bridge. Come experience lush, green fairways and top-notch greens set amidst the hustle and bustle of Brooklyn.
- Dyker Beach Golf Course is convenient to get to, located close to both the Belt Parkway and the BQE. If you are using public transportation, we are just four blocks from the R Train Station and across the street from a Manhattan express bus stop.

USTA BILLIE JEAN KING NATIONAL TENNIS CENTER

Home to the Men's & Women's Tennis Teams:

- In 1978, USTA President W.E. "Slew" Hester spearheaded the move of the US Open from the West Side Tennis Club to the newly constructed USTA National Tennis Center in Flushing, New York. The facility, which featured the 20,000-seat Louis Armstrong Stadium as its centerpiece, was financed by the USTA (with no public funding) and built on the grounds of the 1939 and 1964 World's Fairs.
- In 1997, the USTA opened Arthur Ashe Stadium as its main stadium and expanded the tennis facility at the USTA National Tennis center. The construction increased the number of courts on the grounds from 25 to 45 and saw the acreage more than double to 46.5 acres.
- In 2006, the USTA renamed the entire facility the Billie Jean King National Tennis Center in honor of one of tennis' finest ambassadors and a product of public courts in her native Long Beach, California.

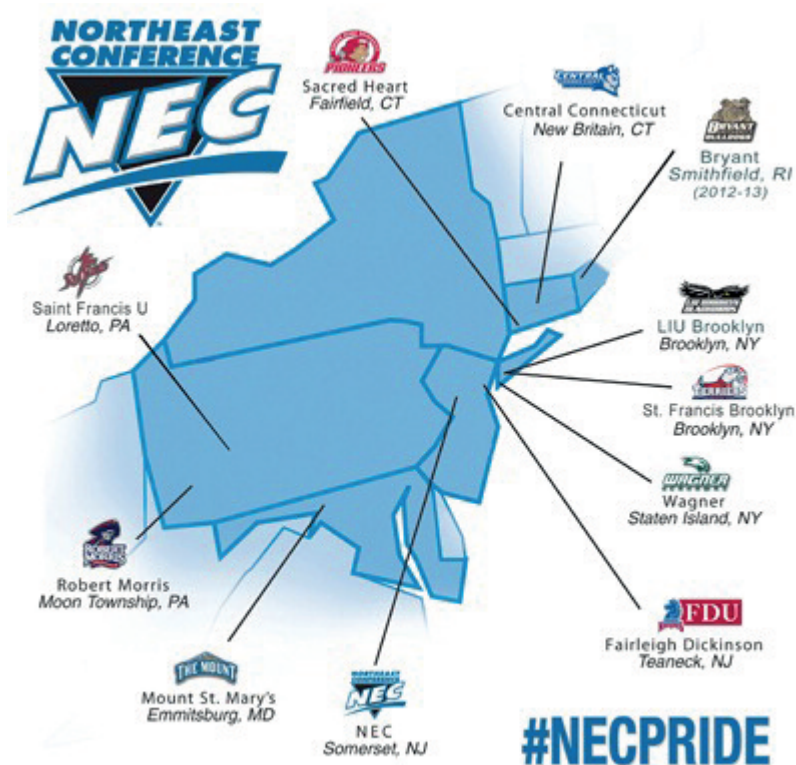
