Sixth Season



Glenn Braica was named the 17th head coach in the history of the St. Francis Brooklyn men's basketball program on May 20, 2010 and is already the fifth winningest coach at the school. Under his tutelage, the Terriers have qualified for the Northeast Conference Tournament in each of his five seasons, and have opened some eyes both locally as well as on the national scene.

Under Braica's direction, St. Francis Brooklyn tied a school record with 23 victories last season and won their first NEC regular-season crown since the 2003-04 campaign. The Terriers earned a berth in the National Invitation Tournament, the program's first post-season appearance since 1963. Jalen Cannon, one of Braica's first recruits, was named the NEC Player of the Year and was a First Team All Metropolitan Sports Writers Association selection. In addition, Brent Jones earned First Team All-Conference accolades and Amdy Fall was named the NEC's Defensive Player of the Year. It came as no surprise that Braica earned NEC Coach of the Year honors and was the Metropolitan Sports Writers Association's Co-Coach of the Year.

Braica, who has guided the Terriers to a 41-26 record over the past two seasons, has developed a reputation as one of the good guys in the industry and was named a finalist for the prestigious Skip Prosser "Man of the Year" Award the past two years.

On the court, Braica's student-athletes exude the same intensity as their leader does on the sidelines and it's easy to tell why recruits sign up to play for him. A born-and-raised Brooklynite, Braica has spent his entire career in New York City, which began after his playing days at Queens College. He was an assistant at St. Francis Brooklyn for 15 years before a stint at St. John's, returning in 2010 as the program's head coach. That experience has helped Braica navigate through a crowded recruiting scene to thrust the Terriers back in contention to win an NEC championship each season. The current roster includes seven players who hail from New York City.

"The New York guys have been good to us," Braica said. "It's a lot of long-standing relationships, coaches I know and like and they trust us with their kids. "We never used to tell people 'We're from Brooklyn,'" Braica admitted. "But now we advertise it because it's really the place to be."

The Pope Center was the place to be for perhaps the most exciting week in school history last March. Playing in front of sold out and boisterous crowds, the Terriers hosted three NEC Tournament contests, including the championship tilt in front of a national ESPN 2 audience.

"Although we came up just a bit short of qualifying for the NCAA Tournament, we still had a phenomenal year and excited our students, alumni and the local community," said Braica. "The effort was there the entire season and I'm happy that they were rewarded with post-season play. It was a huge accomplishment and one that they can be proud of."

The prior season in 2013-14, the Terriers shocked the country by defeating the Miami Hurricanes in Coral Gables. In the process, Coach Braica and his staff delivered the program's first victory against an Atlantic Coast Conference team.

"This is one of the biggest wins, if not the biggest in the history of our school," Braica told the media during his press conference. "They are the defending ACC champs and are such a great program. I was particularly impressed that our guys had enough left at the end to pull this out after Miami had tied it up to force overtime. To have that kind of mental discipline is not easy so it's a credit to our guys that they were able to hang in there and win the game."

After another impressive victory at Florida Atlantic, Braica's group again had the college basketball world on the edge of their seats just ten days later as they carried the lead against national power Syracuse until the final minute in the Carrier Dome. Despite the heartbreaking defeat, the Terriers bounced back quickly

and went on to tie a Northeast Conference record with nine victories during their non-conference slate. A last second triumph at America East regular-season champion Stony Brook was yet another statement victory for the program.

St. Francis Director of Athletics Irma Garcia was on the money when she introduced Braica to the campus and media for the first time in 2010 saying, "With Glenn we get a true Brooklynite; someone who has spent his entire career making connections within the New York City basketball community. He's someone who cares about his student-athletes not just when they play for him, but years later. He is their mentor for life."

It didn't take long for Braica to get the program back on track. In his first season on the sidelines in 2010-2011, Braica led the Terriers to a 15-15 campaign and the No. 5 seed in the Northeast Conference Tournament. It was the program's best record since the 2003-04 season when St. Francis finished 15-13 and won a share of the NEC regular-season title. Under Braica, the Terriers increased their scoring by more than six points per game from the previous season and were one of the best teams in the country in taking care of the basketball, averaging a conference-low 13.3 turnovers per game. The team also led the NEC with 7.80 steals per game.

In 2011-2012, St. Francis hosted their first home conference tournament game since 1997 after placing fourth in the league standings. Braica's focus on strong defense certainly paid off. That season his squad was one of the best in the nation at guarding the three-point line. The Terriers ranked second in the NEC and 17th in the country in defensive three-point field goal percentage. Braica was rewarded by being named the Jim Phelan NEC Coach of the Year as well as the NABC Division I District 18 Co-Coach of the Year.

In his first stint at St. Francis, Braica was with the Terriers for 15 years and was the Associate Head Coach from the 2000-01 season to 2003-04 under his current assistant coach Ron Ganulin.

During Braica's last seven years at St. Francis, the Terriers posted a 118-83 record, including an 88-42 mark in the NEC and captured two regular season titles. They finished with a .500 or better record in the league seven-straight years, at that time the longest active streak in the conference. They also reached the NEC Semifinals five times and had two championship game appearances in Braica's last five seasons. Braica helped Ganulin orchestrate the Terriers' offensive system, which ranked first or second in the NEC in each of the last five seasons he was on staff. During his tenure the squad emerged from the league's lower tier and went on to become one of the conference's marquee programs.

From 1998-2004, the Terriers had one player named the league's Player of the Year, six first-team All-NEC selections, five second-team All-NEC honorees, two players that led the league in scoring, two NEC Rookies of the Year and a NEC Defensive Player of the Year. Braica recruited and coached several student-athletes that would go on to pro basketball careers during his time with the Terriers.

Following his first span at the college, Braica spent six seasons as an assistant at St. John's under Norm Roberts. When Roberts became head coach at St. John's, Braica, a teammate at Queens College, was his first hire.

Glenn is a proven recruiter, scout and strategist, and was instrumental in helping St. John's rebuild its program," said Roberts. "I truly believe that Glenn has the whole package. He brings experience, tremendous coaching ability as well as the personality and demeanor to promote and elevate St. Francis College to the top of the Northeast Conference."

Braica was also praised by Roberts for his ability to reach out to the community and Red Storm alumni, bringing former players back into the fold. He was also one of the co-directors of the Norm Roberts basketball camp, helping to increase enrollment from 75 campers in 2004 to 260 kids per session in 2009.

While at St. John's, Braica recruited and helped develop First Team All-Big East guard Dwight Hardy, Sixth Man of the Year Justin Burrell as well as D.J. Kennedy and Cedric Jackson, who both played in the NBA for the Cleveland Cavaliers.

From 2001-03, Braica was the head coach for the Empire State Games New York City men's open team, which won gold medals in 2001 and 2002, as well as a silver medal in 2003. The teams included former Terriers Cliff Strong, Sean Dantzler, Damien Herard, Devon Neckles, Karl Sanders, and Tristan Smith as well as current NBA player Royal Ivey. Braica has also coached numerous players that participated in the NBA Summer League, including Dwight Hardy (Miami Heat), Justin Burrell (Golden State Warriors), D.J. Kennedy (Cleveland Cavaliers), Paris Horne (Charlotte Hornets), and Justin Brownlee (NY Knicks & Charlotte Hornets).

Since taking over as the Terriers' head coach, several of Braica's student-athletes have gone on to sign professional contracts on the international circuit. Akeem Bennett '11, Ricky Cadell '11, Alex Harrinton '11, Stefan Perunicic '12, Akeem Johnson '13, Alexander Isailovic '14, and Ben Mockford '14 have all enjoyed success overseas.

Braica attended St. Agnes High School and Bishop Ford High School in Brooklyn in the early 1980s and graduated from Queens College in 1989. Braica began his coaching career at New York City Tech as an assistant in 1988. He also served as a teacher at The Recte School and in the New York City Board of Education from 1989-1994.

Braica and his wife, Christine, live in Brooklyn.

Glenn Braica Q & A

Interview conducted By Dan Barry '69

Observers of the college basketball scene have said over and over that, no matter how good a coach may be, he can't win without talent. A successful coach must be able to find, recruit and develop quality athletes in order to compete night in and night out at the college level. And those athletes must be students as well, or they won't be able to play, no matter how talented they are.

On May 20, 2010, Glenn Braica was named as the 17th Men's Head Coach in St. Francis history and, since that time, he has continued to lead the Terrier program to heights not seen since the 1950's and 60's. A total of thirty new faces have joined the Terrier ranks since 2010, beginning with Coach Braica's initial recruiting effort to prepare for the 2010-2011 season. Not surprisingly, half of those newcomers have been native New Yorkers, with representation from each of the five boroughs: Brooklyn (4 recruits), The Bronx (3), Manhattan (3), Queens (2), and Staten Island (3). Three recruits had also come to Remsen Street from nearby Long Island, further adding to the Program's heavy local flavor.

However, despite the obvious New York-centric roster, Coach Braica and his staff have managed to lure additional talent from five other States and four countries among those thirty new faces. Recruits hailing from hometowns in Connecticut, Illinois, Kentucky, Maryland and Pennsylvania have been joined by newcomers from Canada, England, Iceland and Serbia. In fact, there have been multiple recruits from both Iceland (two) and Serbia (three). The international component of the Terrier men's program should not come as a surprise to anyone, as it reflects the status of New York as a global destination, where the exposure to one of the World's great cities is an integral part of the educational experience at St. Francis.

Of those thirty newcomers who have entered the Remsen Street program since 2010-2011, almost two-thirds (19) joined the roster as freshmen. Of those freshmen, nine came directly out of high school, eight redshirted for a year at St. Francis before beginning play with four years of college eligibility remaining, and two "walked on" as non-scholarship players. Of the recruits who began their playing careers with advanced class standing during that same period, nine transferred in from junior college programs, having either two or three years of eligibility left, and one was a sophomore "walk-on". Oddly, only one of the recruits to come to St. Francis since 2010 was a transfer from another NCAA Division I program.

Recently, we had a chance to chat with Coach Braica about the Terrier recruiting process, and how he's able to meet the challenge of replacing talented graduates year after year.

Q: What did you assess the program's needs were for the 2014-2015 recruiting period?

Coach Braica: Although we obviously lost a lot of talent and leadership, we feel pretty good about who we have coming back. We are also adding a couple of guys to this year's roster

who were already in school. So, even though they haven't been on the court for us yet, these newcomers are familiar with what we're doing within the program and what we expect. And that's a bit of an advantage for us. Primarily, we were looking to recruit some additional athleticism on the wings. We're confident that we'll see improvement on the inside from the seasoned big men we already have in the program, so our frontcourt wasn't as much of a concern. We also wanted to add another guy who was capable of handling the point guard position. That's the one spot where you always need depth.

Q: Can you give us a brief assessment of the recruiting season you recently completed to prepare for the 2015-2016 season?

Coach Braica: We think we've addressed those areas we were concerned about. You try to bring in as many newcomers as possible who you think have the ability to make the jump to Division I. New guys will always need a little time to adjust. The ultimate goal is that they all progress and develop into solid Division I players at some point. Some guys get it before others. You can't ever really be sure who's going to respond to coaching and be able to help right away. Only time will tell, but we feel very good about each of the six new guys we have joining us this year. As you know, the new people are: 6-9 freshman forward Joshua Nurse from Queens; 6-1 freshman guard Dagur Jonsson from Iceland; 6-8 junior college forward Jagos Lasic, who's originally from Serbia; 6-4 freshman guard Marlon Alcindor, also from Queens; 6-4 freshman guard Keon Williams from Kentucky; and 6-4 junior forward Jon Doss, who's from the Chicago area. As I mentioned before, the last three, Alcindor, Williams and Doss, were in school last year, so

they should have a bit better understanding of the program and what we expect.

Of course, we'll be counting heavily on the core guys we have coming back. Tyreek Jewell has outstanding athleticism and really surprised us with his defensive ability last year. I truly believe he can blossom this year into an all-league type player. Both Chris Hooper and Amdy Fall have established themselves in our Conference as incredibly solid players and we're looking for Glenn Sanabria to continue developing the talent he showed in his first year with us. Yunus Hopkinson, Antonio Jenifer and Gunnar Olafsson all played key roles last season. We look forward to them stepping into bigger roles and further establishing themselves in the NEC. We're looking for all of the guys coming back to continue to raise their game another level and really step up this coming year.

Q: The tallest members of last year's Team topped off at 6-7, and generally Terrier frontcourt players in the recent past seemed to have been in that 6-5 to 6-7 height range. There are apparently two frontcourt recruits coming in this year who have some size. Is this a change in recruiting emphasis -- that you're actively seeking more size in the frontcourt than you've had in the past?

Coach Braica: No, not particularly. We look for players that we feel can fit the program, both athletically and academically. Both of these players were identified to us early on in the recruiting process and we were very happy to get both of them to commit to us. Jagos Lasic can run the floor and has an outside touch at 6-8. He may be able to stretch opposing defenses for us. Both of these big guys appeared to us to be pretty good passers. We're really excited about Josh Nurse's long term potential – he's got a very high ceiling. To be honest, there haven't been too many other 6-9 recruits walking into our building the last couple of years, so we're happy he agreed to join us. Overall, I sense that we'll be a better shooting team than we were last year.

Q: Although St. Francis has always been known as a New York-centric Program, there seems to be more Terrier recruits coming in from out of state and internationally. Is St. Francis looking to aggressively expand its recruiting beyond the metropolitan area or have these non-local opportunities merely resulted from occasional referrals by high school coaches and friends of the program?

Coach Braica: Although we managed to pick up some guys from a couple of different States, I think our basic focus will continue to be New York City and the surrounding areas. Our New York City area contacts and the local coaches have been very good to us in helping us identify potential college-level talent and highlighting quality student-athletes. Although we don't look to recruit nationally, we don't close any doors, either. On occasion, we'll go after guys from outside our usual recruiting area if we believe they're very talented and they appear to be a good fit for the program. We're also interested in international players. The draw for kids from overseas is New York City and we emphasize our location if we have a prospect we've identified from another country. Generally, international players we've had enjoy their situation here, love the City, and stay with the program.

Q: The coaching staff at St. Francis has gotten the reputation over the years of finding relatively undiscovered or under-recruited student-athletes and building a pretty solid program with these surprisingly high quality recruits that other colleges overlooked. Why do you think the Terriers have been so successful?

Coach Braica: I'm very grateful that we've had some success at St. Francis and we have a good retention rate. I think that our entire coaching staff has shown a pretty good eye for talent. And we have a lot of contacts who continue to provide us with quality leads. We can't always be right 100% of the time, but we try to recruit the right type of hard-working kids to fit the program. We're extremely proud that the guys we recruit for our program continue to grow athletically and academically here at St. Francis, and go on to graduate. We just try to do the right thing for our guys and I think that a lot of people see that and trust us. We don't generally go for the high-profile recruit. The players we target are usually being recruiting by only one or two other schools. We work hard with the players in the program each year and help them develop and optimize their skills and abilities. Of the guys who just recently graduated, Jalen Cannon kept expanding his game and has the awards each year to show for that progress. Brent Jones got much better throughout his career and developed into an all-league first-teamer this past year. Low-ell Ulmer developed into a good all-around player, especially defensively, during his four years here. Kevin Douglas had real potential coming in from high school, but some untimely injuries throughout his career slowed his development. Although he had a very good career, I really thought that he could have been an all-league player if not for the injuries.

We have an urban campus here on Remsen Street, but it's in one of the most desirable neighborhoods in New York. In fact, Brooklyn Heights is pretty much known worldwide as one of the "now" places to be. We talk to the recruits and tell them that, if they want to develop athletically and personally, have a memorable college athletic experience, and get a good education in a great environment, then St. Francis should be an excellent place for you, because that's what we're about. We are what we are – a small, friendly, close-knit community within a large, metropolitan center. It's a great place to be and really gives you the best of both worlds. And if you work hard, you'll reap the success of that hard work.

Q: How much has the availability of online video changed the recruiting process? Has it made it any easier to find that high school or junior college athlete who could possibly be a fit for the program?

Coach Braica: The online resources help a bit. However, everybody looks like an all-star in those player highlight videos. Full-game videos give a much more valid picture of a potential recruit's skills. I still prefer seeing a player in a "live" game in order to fully assess his ability on the court in all areas: shooting, rebounding, ball-handling, defense and overall basketball smarts. You only get that total picture by being at one of his games. The internet is a powerful tool and, going forward, I think that we'll try to expand telling our own story a little bit better by using the internet and social media.

Q: St. Francis has had a lot of success mining talent at the mid-level schools of the New York PSAL. Why have the Terriers been able to do that so well?

Coach Braica: There's still a lot of talent here in New York City, but there's an incredible number of PSAL and CHSAA programs to cover, as well as all of the high schools in the surrounding metropolitan area and the AAU programs. [Writer's Note: The programs referred to are the New York City Public Schools Athletic League, the Catholic High Schools Athletic Association, and the Amateur Athletic Union.] Some of these high schools are smaller and, because of that, some of the recruiters from the high major programs outside New York likely aren't that familiar with them. They're more familiar with the traditionally better-known high school programs and I think they tend to center on those. In a lot of ways, New York's a bit under-recruited. There's still a lot of talent around. You have to remember, too, that, since out-of-town prep schools often attract some of the more high profile talent away from their original City high school programs, the focus on recruiting New York City isn't what it was. We think the talent pool in the City is still very good for our level. We're interested in all levels of the PSAL and CHSAA. However, recruiting involves both timing and opportunity. There has to be a fit all around.

Q: In looking at possible recruits who might be able to flourish athletically, would you consider taking a player who is pretty much just a quality high-volume scorer, with the intention that you can eventually teach him to defend effectively, or must possible candidates have shown some defensive ability for St. Francis to be interested in them?

Coach Braica: Make no mistake about it – the ability to defend on the perimeter is really important. We'd rather take a kid who has already shown that he can defend, but a lot depends

on your immediate needs for that particular year. Next year, we'll consider ourselves successful if we can land a couple of big men and an athletic guard during the recruiting period. We look to get the best possible players we can and then try to pull it all together. If you get the right, hard-working guys in the Program, you can get it to work. But if a talented player is only concerned about offense, that's not going to be effective within our system.

Q: What type of recruit would you be most interested in: a high-school senior with some solid potential who may be able to contribute down the road during his four years in the Terrier program, or a junior college player who likely will be able to contribute right away but who will only have two years of eligibility left?

Coach Braica: We'd certainly consider taking either one of them if we believe that they have the talent and the academic ability, given the recruiting need we're trying to meet. We're really looking for the right people for our program – trying to assess whether they can succeed as students and players. Are they willing to work hard and sacrifice for the team? Do they have the focus and commitment to be successful?

Q: Based upon the success of the program over the last several years, do you find that a higher level of recruits and their coaches are now starting to initiate contact with the program, rather than the Terriers solely chasing those type of recruits?

Coach Braica: Yes, I'd agree that we've been successful over the last couple of years and we try to develop character, toughness, and work ethic. We hope that's what the program has become known for: a team that comes ready to play hard and is physically and mentally tough. I guess the best way to

say this is: if a high school basketball player is thinking about committing to us, the student's coach is now more likely to confirm to the student that St. Francis is a good choice. We want to be considered a bit higher now in the pecking order than we were in the past.

The buzz we generated over the last several years as a program has helped quite a bit. The exposure that the local television, radio and print outlets have given us, the national-level stories that most recently appeared in the New York Times, the USA Today, the Wall Street Journal and the Washington Post, and all the other media exposure, put the spotlight on us and gave the program some real credibility with the public. People were interested in telling our story and were very good to us. All the attention was certainly appreciated. It helped the College and the program.

Q: Although it has come close a couple of times, St. Francis men's program still has yet to make the NCAA's "Big Dance". Does the coaching staff use the "come and help us seize the brass ring" approach in trying to recruit higher level players who might finally be able to put the program into NCAA March Madness?

Coach Braica: Yes. Unfortunately, that still remains a selling point for us – "Come and help us do something historic". That's definitely something we point out to potential recruits. The opportunity to do something that no one has done before is always a great incentive. And, yes, we do use that "big fish/small pond" approach a bit, as well. However, we have to remain realistic in our recruiting. We need to find and add the right players – not the most recruited players – who will fit our program.

The emergence of Jalen Cannon is an excellent example of what can happen. His loyalty and commitment to the program really paid off, as he continued to be one of the prime factors in the program's growth with his overall leadership skills and great character, as well as with his athletic ability. The Team continued to progress, made the NIT, and became quite a story in a lot of places. And Jalen became the all-time number one scorer, as well as the all-time number one rebounder, for a school which began playing college ball well over 100 years ago and which has had a truly rich basketball history here in New York. Now, he's looking at a possible pro career in Europe. That can certainly happen again.

Q: What could be considered a reasonable standard of success on Remsen Street? Would it be 18-20 wins a year or would there be some other standard that would be more appropriate?

Coach Braica: I really don't like to measure the success of a season strictly by wins and losses. The measure that I try to use is whether or not we continue to improve as a team and reach our potential. We try to approach the entire season like that. We just want to keep improving as a group and play better than our last game. In fact, that's the approach we used throughout the conference playoff games, the NEC Championship Game and the NIT game last season. Play better than you did last time out and there will be positive results. Winning is great, but, unfortunately, it sometimes provides additional challenges for teams at our level. Let me explain that

a bit. It used to be that you could schedule lower tier teams in the high major conferences in order to get your "guarantee games." However, once your program starts winning some games, or comes close to springing an upset or two, those lower tier teams in the major conferences don't want to schedule you anymore. And that's also true for mid-major conferences like the MAAC and the Patriot League. Then, you have to start playing teams in the upper tier of conferences in order to get your "guarantee games." And that's when your schedule starts to become more and more difficult, as you have to play much tougher teams on the road. Even though your program may be even better than the year before, it may not show up in your win-loss record because of the schedule you have to play. It's just generally difficult to get home games for the non-conference portion of the schedule. No one wants to play you at your place. We'll just try to keep doing what we're doing, with the high-quality type of people we have in the program, and keep plugging away. Good results will be there at the end of the year, if we do it right.

Q: Overall, you sound pleased with the way things are going so far. Any predictions?

Coach Braica: Yes, I'm pretty happy with the way things are going and, to be honest, I can't wait for the season to get started. I also can't say enough about the guys I have on my coaching staff. They bring an incredible level of experience, knowledge, teaching ability, energy and commitment to the Program. That's why the players in the program continue to develop year after year. I trust every one of my assistant coaches. They always put the program before their own personal goals.





Assistant Coach Clive Bentick Ninth Season

Clive Bentick begins his ninth season as an assistant coach with St. Francis Brooklyn. A New York City native, Bentick is recognized widely as one of the top up and coming assistants and works specifically with the Terriers' backcourt players. In addition, he plays a large role in the development of offensive and defensive strategies, the scouting of opponents and on-court coaching.

Bentick has helped guide the program to five straight NEC tournament bids. The 23 wins last year tied a school record and the team made their first post-season appearance since 1963.

Additionally, Bentick has played a major role in player development. Last season, guard Brent Jones became St. Francis Brooklyn's all-time leading assists leader. Four players under Bentick's tutelage have received All NEC Conference distinction in Akeem Bennett, Rickey Cadell, Brent Jones, and Jalen Cannon. Bennett and current senior Amdy Fall were also honored as NEC Defensive Player of the Year winners. Further, Bentick coached three players that were named to the NEC Rookie Team in Stefan Perunicic, Jalen Cannon and Wayne Martin. He also coached six 1000-point scorers in Jamaal Womack, Stefan Perunicic, Rickey Cadell, Akeem Johnson, Ben Mockford, Brent Jones, and Jalen Cannon. Cadell graduated as the program's second leading all-time scorer until Cannon surpassed his mark in 2014-2015. All went on to play professionally in Europe. Cannon finished his career as the NEC's and SFBK's all-time leading rebounder.

Before joining the Terrier program, Bentick served one year at Le Moyne College (2006-07) as an assistant coach under former Head Coach Steve Evans. Prior to his arrival at Le Moyne, Bentick spent 2 years coaching at his alma mater, Canisius College (2004-06) as an assistant coach under former Griffin Head Coach Mike MacDonald.

Before embarking on his coaching career, Bentick earned four letters on the Canisius Golden Griffin basketball team (1997-01). In

his senior year he finished 15th in the MAAC in scoring (13.6/gm) and fifth in assists (4.03/gm). That year, Bentick was named a MAAC Third team All-Conference selection, and was named to the MAAC All-Tournament team after leading the Griffins into the MAAC championship contest, a run that included a 26-point effort and game-winning bucket in the semi-finals against Niagara.

Bentick ranks 40th on the all-time scoring list with 840 points and seventh in assists with 354. He recently received honorable mention honors on the Canisius College Post-1970's All-Century Team. In addition, he was a finalist for the 1998 NCAA Sports Person of the Year Award.

Prior to playing at Canisius, Bentick prepped at A. Phillip Randolph High School under Ted Dorsett.

Bentick received both bachelor's in Business Management and Marketing (2001) and Master's in Sports Administration (2006) from Canisius College.





Assistant Coach Ron Ganulin Third Season

Former Terrier head coach **Ron Ganulin** returned to Brooklyn Heights in 2013-2014 under his former assistant Glenn Braica.

Ganulin served as the head coach of the Terriers for 14 seasons dating from 1991 through 2005. During his tenure, Ganulin accumulated over 200 wins and was twice named the Northeast Conference's Coach of the Year. Other notable accomplishments during Ganulin's time at St. Francis include finishing with a .500 or better record in the league eight straight years, at that time the longest active streak in the league. The squad reached the NEC semi-finals five times and had two championship game appearances. From 1998 through 2004, St. Francis posted a 78-36 conference record, which was tops in the NEC. During that span, Ganulin guided the Terriers to two Northeast Conference Regular Season Championships as well as their second best single-season record in school history.

Prior to his first arrival on Remsen Street, Ganulin reached the pinnacle of the college basketball world as an assistant coach with UNLV helping the team capture the 1990 NCAA National Championship. The team also returned to the Final Four in 1991. During his four-year stay in Las Vegas, the Rebels enjoyed a 126-23 record.

After St. Francis Brooklyn, Ganulin served as the coordinator of player development for the NBA's Washington Wizards during the 2005-06 season and then served as an assistant coach at Manhattan College for two seasons under former Jaspers' head coach and St. Francis Brooklyn alum Barry Rohrsen.

Throughout his career, Ganulin also served assistant coaching stints at Old Dominion University, Saint Peter's College, New York Tech, and C.W. Post.

Before he began his coaching career, Ganulin played collegiate basketball at Long Island Uni-

versity, where he graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in 1968. During his senior season, the Blackbirds advanced to the Division II National Collegiate Semifinals. From 1973-1976, he coached on Kibbutz Gan Shmuel in Israel, winning a championship in the country's second league.





Assistant Coach Jamaal Womack Third Season

Former Terrier standout **Jamaal Womack '09** is entering his third season as a member of Glenn Braica's staff.

With Womack on board, the program has enjoyed back-to-back outstanding campaigns. The 23 wins last year tied a school record and the team made their first post-season appearance since 1963. In 2013-14, the Terriers tied an NEC record with nine non-conference victories.

Womack is quickly earning the reputation as a young and energetic recruiter, having played a major role in helping the Terriers bring in several talented recruits. Womack has worked extensively with the frontcourt players over the past two seasons. His hard work has aided in the development of several frontcourt players, including forwards Jalen Cannon and Amdy Fall. Cannon was named the 2014-15 NEC Player of the Year and Fall earned the NEC Defensive Player of the Year a season ago.

"Jamaal is a sharp young guy who is really motivated to help us build a great program," Glenn Braica stated. "He's got the intelligence, work ethic and knowledge to be successful in the business."

Prior to joining the Terriers' sideline Womack served as a coach for local AAU powerhouse Team Scan in the Bronx, New York from 2009 through 2011. While coaching for Team Scan, Womack guided his 2016 class to a third- place finish in the 2012 AAU Nationals and ended the year second in the national rankings. He also assisted in the tutelage of the 2015 class during the 2012-13 season, and coached several high Division 1 caliber players while competing on the competitive Nike EYBL circuit. Womack also coached at Brooklyn Friends High School from 2011 through 2013.

After graduating, Womack spent the 2009 preseason playing in Finland's 1st Division. He later signed a contract to compete in southern Italy in the C-series for VIS Reggio Calabria. Womack flourished there, leading the league twice in a row in scoring.

While averaging over 27 points per game in his second season, Womack led the club to a league championship which helped moved them up to a higher division. Womack also took home League MVP honors for the championship series.

A fiery leader on the court, Womack was a starter all four of his seasons playing with the Terriers and served as captain for three seasons (06-09). Womack is a member of the Terriers' 1,000 Point Club, finishing his career with 1,153 points which ranks 16th in the history of the program. Known for his outside shooting Womack ranks 4th on the all-time list in three-pointers made, is 8th in steals, and 10th in assists.

Womack's career collegiate high was 31

points against Robert Morris, drilling a Terrier record nine treys on February 17th, 2007. He averaged a career-best 12.1 points as a junior in 2007-2008, and converted 72 trifectas that season.

A leader off the court as well, Womack was voted as President of the student Body in 2008-09. This marked the first time in school history a student-athlete held this prestigious position. Womack was also selected to attend the NCAA Student Leadership Conference in 2008 as he represented the entire Terrier athletic department.

Prior to arriving on Remsen Street, Womack enjoyed a standout two-year career at Our Savior Lutheran High School. During his junior campaign he averaged a staggering 41.0 points per game, which included a career high 60 points. That mark is tied for the 18th highest output in New York State history. During his senior season, Womack averaged 32 points, six assists, and four rebounds per game. He won his second consecutive PSAL MVP Award that season. He also led his team to a conference championship as a senior and was the first player in school history to reach 1,000 points in a two-year span. He was selected to the NY Daily News Second Team All-City squad and was a First Team All-State selection (A Division).
