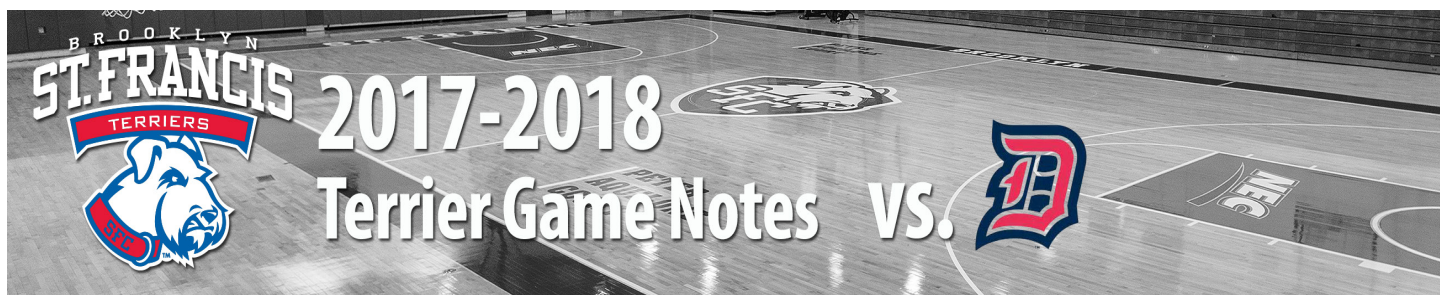

## ABOUT THE COLLEGE

St. Francis College, often referred to as St. Francis or SFC, is a private, coeducational college located in Brooklyn Heights, New York, in the United States. The campus comprises five interconnected buildings, occupying half of a city block in Downtown Brooklyn. It was founded in 1859 by friars of the Order of Servants Franciscans, a Franciscan order, as the St. Francis Academy and was the first private school in the Roman Catholic Diocese of Brooklyn. St. Francis College began as a parochial all-boys academy in the City of Brooklyn and has transformed into a small liberal arts college that has 19 academic departments which offer 72 majors and minors.

St. Francis College is a predominantly undergraduate institution, yet does have graduate programs in accounting, project management and psychology. St. Francis has been ranked nationally and regionally by Forbes magazine, Washington Monthly and U.S. News and World Report as one of the top baccalaureate colleges. St. Francis is set in an urban environment and is considered a commuter college. As of 2016, there are 2,700 undergraduates (10% part-time) and 66 graduates (45% part-time). The student to faculty ratio is 18:1 and 43.6% of classes have 20 or fewer students. The 2,900 students that attend St. Francis College come from over 80 countries. St. Francis College has been ranked by the New York Times and Forbes as one of the more diverse colleges in the United States.

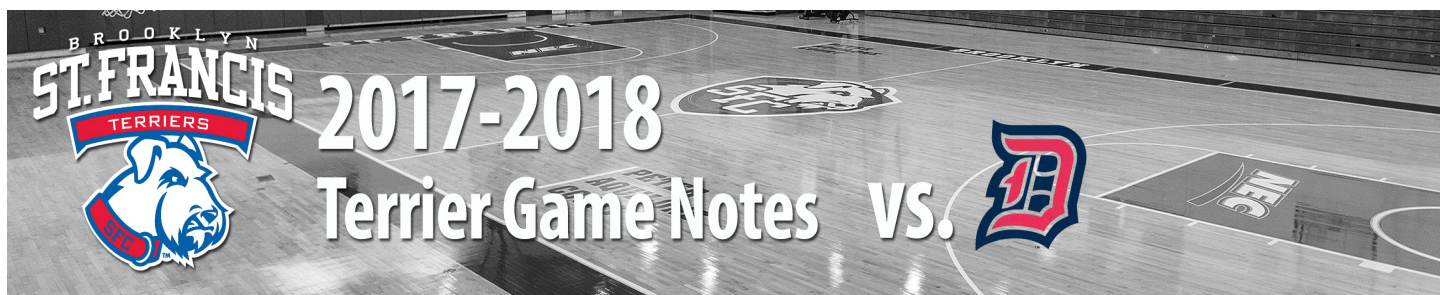

## St. Francis Brooklyn Men's Basketball History In a Nutshell

The Terriers are one of five original Division I schools NEVER to play in the NCAA Tournament (Northwestern, Army, William & Mary, Citadel) since it began in 1948. The school has played in four NIT Tournaments (1954, 1956, 1963, 2015).

Founded in 1896, the St. Francis men's basketball team is the OLDEST collegiate program in New York City.

With an enrollment of 2,700 and a facility that holds just 1,000 fans (4th smallest in D1), St. Francis Brooklyn is one of the smallest schools in all of NCAA Division I.

St. Francis Brooklyn is a Franciscan college located in downtown Brooklyn. Most are shocked that there is a D1 basketball facility inside the building, which is located on Remsen Street in Brooklyn Heights.

### Post-Season Heartbreak "I know we are Franciscan but this is a bit much"

St. Francis Brooklyn is the lone NEC charter member that has yet to win an NEC title. The Terriers have also played the most games in NEC Tournament history (38) without winning a championship. St. Francis Brooklyn is 10-28 all-time in the NEC Tournament.

The Terriers reached the NEC semifinals five straight seasons from 1999-03. St. Francis reached the league championship game in 2001 (losing to Monmouth, 67-64) and 2003 (losing to Wagner, 78-61). The Terriers won the 2014-2015 NEC regular-season but lost to Robert Morris in the NEC Finals on their home court.

St. Francis Brooklyn last won 20 games in 1998-99 but lost to Mount St. Mary's, 68-66, in the semifinals of the NEC Tournament.

The Terriers won the Northeast Conference regular-season title in 2000-2001 but lost in the championship game to Monmouth despite holding a 20-point lead with 14 minutes to go in the contest.

St. Francis Brooklyn won a share of the NEC regular-season crown with Monmouth in 2003-04, but lost to Central Connecticut State in the NEC quarterfinals.

In the 2014 NEC quarterfinals, the Terriers led Mount St. Mary's by 17 points in the second-half but eventually lost on a 3-point-er at the buzzer. To make things worse, the Mountaineers put 6 players on the court by mistake and stole an inbounds pass which led to a basket with less than 30 seconds left. The officials never caught the violation. Mount went on to win the conference championship game and play in the NCAA play-in game.

## 2017-18 Season Outlook

Ever since Head Coach Glenn Braica took over the St. Francis Men's hoops program in May 2010, Terrier basketball has become synonymous with aggressive, in-your-face, man-to-man defense. And it's been that intense defensive effort, coupled with relentless rebounding and physical and mental toughness, that had propelled St. Francis to the upper tier of the Northeast Conference.

The Terriers had three of the top 25 scorers in the Conference last season, but managed to finish last in the NEC in both Scoring Offense (62.0 points per game) and Scoring Margin (-11.7). They also finished last among Conference teams in Assists (only 9.26 per game). A bright spot in an otherwise disappointing season was that the Terriers took better care of the basketball than most of their opponents. They led the Conference in Turnover Margin, averaging 12.2 turnovers per game against 14.0 turnovers by the opposition.

Before last year, that "Brooklyn Tough" formula had resulted in a solid six-year run that had averaged 16 wins and 11 Northeast Conference wins under Coach Braica's direction. The 2013-14 season saw the win total balloon to 18 victories, and the following year the Red and Blue matched the program's high-water mark for victories with 23, capping off an incredibly productive season with an NIT appearance. Those Terrier teams produced a remarkable six players who graduated and went on to play professionally overseas. In addition, three other talented members of those teams took home Conference honors before deciding to put the basketball away and embark on other post-college career paths.

Since the two-time NEC Coach of the Year has a proven track record for New York City's oldest



collegiate basketball program, St. Francis fans are hopeful that last was merely one of those occasional bumps in the road that most college teams eventually experience. The firm belief throughout the Remsen Street campus is that the Terriers will soon be clawing their way back toward the top of the Conference under Braica's guidance.

"I think that we addressed those areas during the offseason where I felt we underperformed last year and where I believe we needed improvement" Braica said candidly. "We strengthened the frontcourt with the addition of two talented forwards who should be productive players for us and I think that having center Cori Johnson back with us this season will be a plus," he said. "We've also improved our speed, ball-handling, and play-making by adding three outstanding





guards who we're really excited about. And all of these guys can score the ball," said Braica.

A set of late-August exhibition games against some strong Canadian college programs should also help speed the Terrier ascent back toward the top of the Conference standings. Although St. Francis won only one of their three contests in Canada, Braica was extremely pleased to get in two weeks of practice time much earlier than usual and to have the opportunity to assess his roster against top-level competition. Those opponents included the reigning Canadian champion, Carleton University.

"The trip was a definite plus," said Braica. "It gave us a head start and gave us a foundation for the entire team going into this season," he said. "Four years ago, this trip was really productive and propelled us into a good season. I'm hoping that will happen again this year."

The Terriers welcome back eight veteran players from last year's team, while adding those six new faces Coach Braica and his staff are extremely excited about. The fact that the Terriers return their top two leading scorers, Rasheem Dunn and Glenn Sanabria, will certainly help to get the team back on track. That dynamic back court duo combined for almost 26 points and over 7 rebounds a game last year, while recording 123 assists and 80 steals between them.

The well-regarded Dunn had a break-out freshman year after joining St. Francis out of Brooklyn's Thomas Jefferson High School, the 2016 Class AA New York State Champions. The 6-2 Sophomore combo guard worked his way up from a reserve player and was rewarded with 11 starts late in the year. Incredibly, Dunn led the Terriers last season in both scoring (13.1 points



per game) and rebounding (5.1 per game) as a true Freshman. By season's end, Dunn ranked among the top 20 players in the Conference in several statistical categories -- Scoring, Rebounding, Steals and Defensive Rebounds. It was that solid effort that landed the hard-driving competitor a spot on the NEC's All-Newcomer Team last season and labelled him as a player to watch.

Sanabria, Dunn's more seasoned backcourt partner, further cemented his status as one of the Terrier's cornerstones last year, while being recognized as one of the Nation's top student-athletes. Sanabria was named to the 2016-2017 National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) Honors Court for his academic efforts. Although he played through a series of nagging





injuries for a good portion of last season's schedule, the heady 5-11 Junior from Staten Island led the team in assists (74), finished second in scoring (12.4 points per game), and remained St. Francis' top three-point threat, nailing 68 triples from deep. He was also one of the conference's top performers in scoring and in three-point field goals made. During St. Francis' Canadian exhibition trip, Sanabria led the Terriers in scoring, highlighted by a 4 for 8 long-range outburst against McGill University.

Gone is former Third Team All-Conference selection Yunus Hopkinson, the sole Senior on last year's squad. A dynamic outside scorer and effective distributor for the past two years (11.2 points per game, along with 67 assists and 31 steals, in 2016-2017), Hopkinson left the Remsen Street campus with his degree in May. Although the 5-10 Manhattanite's leadership will be missed in the backcourt, there are a number of candidates among this year's group vying to fill his starting slot. It's a situation that Coach Braica was in the process of sorting out during the team's pre-season practices.

Senior Gunnar Olafsson, a forward-guard from Reykjavik, Iceland, has always managed to play much bigger than his 6-3, 195-pound frame. He finished second on the team with 5.1 rebounds per game, while starting in 25 of his 27 games. But he probably saw more minutes at the forward spot than Coach Braica would have preferred. Olafsson is not a player who has piled up points in his career (4.4 points per game in 2016-2017), but he brings a certain toughness and a defensive mindset to the lineup, traits which Coach Braica values. Olafsson was recognized for his efforts in the classroom as well, by being named to the NABC Honors Court for the 2016-2017 season.

Keon Williams, a 6-4 junior forward, also brings



those same intangibles to the St. Francis roster. A starter in 21 of the Terriers' 31 games, the Kentuckian often teamed with Olafsson in a very undersized frontcourt tandem, which had to rely on toughness and effort to battle much bigger opponents on a nightly basis. Although Williams only 3.5 points per game, he showed an intensity on the boards -- 4.3 rebounds per contest. His quickness also allowed him to swipe 23 steals.

Last season, 6-5 Darelle (DJ) Porter arrived on Remsen Street as an All-Conference First Team selection from Polk College in Florida. The former Pittsburgh Public High School Player of the Year often came off the bench to see action as a forward for the Terriers in 26 games. Porter averaged 2.8 points and 2.2 rebounds, while registering 15 steals and recording 10 blocked shots, third on the team in that category. Coach Braica is anticipating a bigger role for the talented





senior this year, his second with the program. "Tony Jenifer had the same sort of transition experience two years ago coming out of junior college, then played extremely well for us in his second year" Braica noted. "I hope the same thing could happen with DJ," he explained. That may indeed be the case. Porter's performance in Canada was noteworthy – an average of 7.7 points, 5.0 rebounds and 2.3 assists while playing about 19 minutes per game.

Jagos Lasic, 6-8 senior forward from Belgrade, Serbia, did not play much as a sophomore after transferring in from the New Mexico Military Institute junior college program two years ago, but seemed to find his niche in the second half of last year. Exhibiting some impressive post moves, good passing skills, and an ability to run the floor and hit the outside shot, Lasic established himself as an integral part of the frontcourt rotation for this season. He averaged 2.1 points and 1.3 rebounds per contest in 2016-2017, and earned two starts later in the year. Lasic was also named, along with Terrier teammates Glenn Sanabria and Gunnar Olafsson, to the NABC Honors Court for his academic efforts during the 2016-2017 season.

Perhaps the largest impact on this coming season, both figuratively and literally, may come in the presence of 6-9, 260-pound Cori Johnson, who's finally ready to see action in a Terrier uniform after two consecutive years on the sidelines. The imposing Johnson, who played at Brooklyn's South Shore High School, sustained a season-ending injury before the Terriers' schedule ever got under way last year, after having sat out his first year at St. Francis. Most observers of the program see Johnson's post presence as a real match-up problem for most of St. Francis' Conference opponents. However, it's likely that Braica eases Johnson slowly into the frontcourt



rotation, given the sophomore's extended absence from the hardwood --- he did not play during any of the Terriers' three games in Canada. As a high school senior, Johnson averaged 15.1 points and 10.8 rebounds per game in a New York City PSAL division generally recognized as one of the Nation's most-competitive scholastic leagues. His size and talent could make him a real difference maker for the Terriers, who need an improved level of frontcourt play in order to return to the Conference's top tier.

Another St. Francis returnee is 5-10 walk-on guard Sam Harris. The Florida native saw limited playing time with the Terriers last year, appearing in 12 games. An All-Hillsborough County Honorable Mention selection while starring for Tampa Catholic High School, the Senior originally transferred into the Terrier program from





St. John's and provides Braica with an extra ball-handler and hustle off the bench.

Coach Braica is anticipating that the five new faces joining the program will have a real impact. What he saw of their effort and production during the Canadian exhibition games did nothing to change his optimism.

Based on his three starts for the Terriers on that late-August exhibition trip up North, Freshman Jalen Jordan might have the inside track on that third guard spot. The newcomer recorded 7.3 points, 3.7 rebounds and 1.7 assists per game, averaging 23 minutes against high-quality Canadian competition. Jordan also showed an ability to score from distance. He hit three of his six three-point attempts. A slender 6-3, the Conyers, Georgia, resident was an All-County First-Teamer and the Georgia Regional 6A Player of the Year two years ago at Rockdale County High School. Jordan signed with the Terriers after spending a post-grad year at the high-profile National Top Sports Institute (NTSI), where he racked up per game totals of 18.2 points, 7.1 rebounds, and 5.0 assists. He is believed to be the first Terrier recruit ever to be signed out of the Peach State.

Chauncey Hawkins, a 5-8 freshman out of St. Joseph's Regional High School in Montvale, New Jersey, is another guard who impressed the coaching staff during the Canadian trip (8.0 points, 2.3 rebounds, 2.3 assists, and 1.7 steals) and who seemed to play better with every successive game up North. The speedy, cat-quick point guard from upstate Spring Valley, New York, opened some eyes by scoring 12 points in the Terriers' win over Concordia University in Montreal, while adding 4 rebounds and hitting all 4 of his free throws. The North Jersey All-Star was recognized by many scholastic observers as the catalyst behind St. Joseph's rise in the Gar



den State's hoops standings the past two years.

The 1,000-point scorer averaged 19.2 points, 4.9 rebounds, 4.1 assists and 3.4 steals per game as a high school senior.

However, a player, who may have been overlooked because of his late addition to the roster, could wind up impacting the Terrier program just as much as his heralded Freshman classmates. Josh Nicholas, a 6-2 shooting guard from Melville, New York, scored 19.1 points per game for St. Anthony's High School in Long Island two years ago, before sitting out on Remsen Street last year. Nicholas, once described by MSG Varsity as one of the most athletic players on the Island, was named the Most Valuable Player of the 2016 Nassau-Suffolk Catholic League championship game. Nicholas may have shown enough offensive potential in Canada to force his way





into the backcourt picture, averaging 7.0 points in 16 minutes of play per game up North. In addition to Cori Johnson, there will be a couple of new faces in the frontcourt --- two 6-6 underclassmen who should shore up that area of play this season.

Milija Cosic, a native of Belgrade, Serbia by way of Frank Phillips College in Texas, comes to St. Francis with three years of NCAA eligibility remaining. Braica likes the forward's all-around game and his ability to score inside and out. On the Terriers' recent summer exhibition trip to Canada, Cosic showed some toughness, especially on the boards. During the tour, Cosic averaged 7.0 points and 3.7 rebounds. At Frank Phillips, he averaged 6.9 points and 4.2 rebounds during an injury-shortened 15-game season. He shot almost 50% from the field and over 85% from the free throw line last year, the sort of efficient scoring the rebuilding St. Francis frontcourt could use.



Freshman Yaradyah (Yaya) Evans sat out last year, joining fellow South Shore alum Johnson on the sidelines. Evans has an intriguing skill set for a big man and his guard skills and ball-handling ability could allow him to fill in at multiple positions for the Terriers. His scoring ability during the Canadian exhibition games proved to be one of the surprises of the tour, as he hit almost 60% from the field (7 of 12) and was successful on 50% of his three-point attempts (3 of 6). As a senior at South Shore, Evans recorded 15.4 points, 7.5 rebounds and 1.3 assists per game.

Although the Terriers won't be looking at the sort of buzz-saw start they experienced last season (road losses to major programs North Carolina State, Virginia and Providence in their first three games), Coach Braica still sees the team's 2017-2018 slate of games as having several

early-season challenges. "We're again looking at another tough non-Conference schedule this year," he cautioned. "There are some tough road games in there, especially our trip out to Notre Dame. Hopefully, with so many new faces, we'll have learned our lessons early in the season and be better prepared for our Northeast Conference games," said Braica.

Knowing Coach Braica's established track record for putting competitive teams on the court, it likely won't be long before the Terriers' bark is back.





Glenn Braica was named the 17th head coach in the history of the St. Francis Brooklyn men's basketball program on May 20, 2010 and is already the fifth winningest coach at the school. Under his tutelage, the Terriers have opened some eyes both locally as well as on the national scene.

Braica has recorded a terrific 67-57 mark in league contests.

In 2015-2016, the Terriers went 11-7 in the NEC and tied for second-place in the standings. Three players earned All-NEC honors and Amdy Fall won his second consecutive Defensive Player of the Year Award.

St. Francis Brooklyn tied a school record with 23 victories in 2014-2015 and won their first NEC regular-season crown since the 2003-04 campaign. The Terriers earned a berth in the National Invitation Tournament, the program's first post-season appearance since 1963. Jalen Cannon, one of Braica's first recruits, was named the NEC Player of the Year and was a First Team All Metropolitan Sports Writers Association selection. In addition, Brent Jones earned First Team All-Conference accolades and Amdy Fall was named the NEC's Defensive Player of the Year. It came as no surprise that Braica earned NEC Coach of the Year honors and was the Metropolitan Sports Writers Association's Co-Coach of the Year.

Braica has developed a reputation as one of the good guys in the industry and was named a finalist for the prestigious Skip Prosser "Man of the Year" Award in 2013-2014 and 2014-2015.

On the court, Braica's student-athletes exude the same intensity as their leader does on the sidelines and it's easy to tell why recruits sign up to play for him. A born-and-raised Brooklynite, Braica has spent his entire career in New York City, which began after his playing days at Queens College. He was an assistant at St. Francis Brooklyn for 15 years before a stint at St. John's, returning in 2010 as the program's head coach. That experience has helped Braica navigate through a crowded recruiting scene to thrust the Terriers back in contention to win an NEC championship each season. The current roster includes six players who hail from New York City.

"The New York guys have been good to us," Braica said. "It's a lot of long-standing relationships, coaches I know and like and they trust us with their kids. 'We never used to tell people 'We're from Brooklyn,' Braica admitted. "But now we advertise it because it's really the place to be."

The Pope Center was the place to be for perhaps the most exciting week in school history in March of 2015. Playing in front of sold out and boisterous crowds, the Terriers hosted three NEC Tournament contests, including the championship tilt in front of a national ESPN 2 audience.

"Although we came up just a bit short of qualifying for the NCAA Tournament, we still had a phenomenal year and excited our students, alumni and the local community," said Braica. "The effort was there the entire season and I'm happy that they were rewarded with post-season play. It was a huge accomplishment and one that they can be proud of."

The prior season in 2013-14, the Terriers shocked the country by defeating the Miami Hurricanes in Coral Gables. In the process, Coach Braica and his staff delivered the program's first victory against an Atlantic Coast Conference team.

"This is one of the biggest wins, if not the biggest in the history of our school," Braica told the media during his press conference. "They are the defending ACC champs and are such a great program. I was particularly impressed that our guys had enough left at the end to pull this out after Miami had tied it up to force overtime. To have that kind of mental discipline is not easy so it's a credit to our guys that they were able to hang in

there and win the game."

After another impressive victory at Florida Atlantic, Braica's group again had the college basketball world on the edge of their seats just ten days later as they carried the lead against national power Syracuse until the final minute in the Carrier Dome. Despite the heartbreaking defeat, the Terriers bounced back quickly and went on to tie a Northeast Conference record with nine victories during their non-conference slate. A last second triumph at America East regular-season champion Stony Brook was yet another statement victory for the program.

St. Francis Director of Athletics Irma Garcia was on the money when she introduced Braica to the campus and media for the first time in 2010 saying, "With Glenn we get a true Brooklynite; someone who has spent his entire career making connections within the New York City basketball community. He's someone who cares about his student-athletes not just when they play for him, but years later. He is their mentor for life."

It didn't take long for Braica to get the program back on track. In his first season on the sidelines in 2010-2011, Braica led the Terriers to a 15-15 campaign and the No. 5 seed in the Northeast Conference Tournament. It was the program's best record since the 2003-04 season when St. Francis finished 15-13 and won a share of the NEC regular-season title. Under Braica, the Terriers increased their scoring by more than six points per game from the previous season and were one of the best teams in the country in taking care of the basketball, averaging a conference-low 13.3 turnovers per game. The team also led the NEC with 7.80 steals per game.

In 2011-2012, St. Francis hosted their first home conference tournament game since 1997 after placing fourth in the league standings. Braica's focus on strong defense certainly paid off. That season his squad was one of the best in the nation at guarding the three-point line. The Terriers ranked second in the NEC and 17th in the country in defensive three-point field goal percentage. Braica was rewarded by being named the Jim Phelan NEC Coach of the Year as well as the NABC Division I District 18 Co-Coach of the Year.

In his first stint at St. Francis, Braica was with the Terriers for 15 years and was the Associate Head Coach from the 2000-01 season to 2003-04 under his current assistant coach Ron Ganulin.

During Braica's last seven years at St. Francis, the Terriers posted a 118-83 record, including an 88-42 mark in the NEC and captured two regular season titles. They finished with a .500 or better record in the league seven-straight years, at that time the longest active streak in the conference. They also reached the NEC Semifinals five times and had two championship

game appearances in Braica's last five seasons. Braica helped Ganulin orchestrate the Terriers' offensive system, which ranked first or second in the NEC in each of the last five seasons he was on staff. During his tenure the squad emerged from the league's lower tier and went on to become one of the conference's marquee programs.

From 1998-2004, the Terriers had one player named the league's Player of the Year, six first-team All-NEC selections, five second-team All-NEC honorees, two players that led the league in scoring, two NEC Rookies of the Year and a NEC Defensive Player of the Year. Braica recruited and coached several student-athletes that would go on to pro basketball careers during his time with the Terriers.

Following his first span at the college, Braica spent six seasons as an assistant at St. John's under Norm Roberts. When Roberts became head coach at St. John's, Braica, a teammate at Queens College, was his first hire.

Glenn is a proven recruiter, scout and strategist, and was instrumental in helping St. John's rebuild its program," said Roberts. "I truly believe that Glenn has the whole package. He brings experience, tremendous coaching ability as well as the personality and demeanor to promote and elevate St. Francis College to the top of the Northeast Conference."

Braica was also praised by Roberts for his ability to reach out to the community and Red Storm alumni, bringing former players back into the fold. He was also one of the co-directors of the Norm Roberts basketball camp, helping to increase enrollment from 75 campers in 2004 to 260 kids per session in 2009.

While at St. John's, Braica recruited and helped develop First Team All-Big East guard Dwight Hardy, Sixth Man of the Year Justin Burrell as well as D.J. Kennedy and Cedric Jackson, who both played in the NBA for the Cleveland Cavaliers.

From 2001-03, Braica was the head coach for the Empire State Games New York City men's open team, which won gold medals in 2001 and 2002, as well as a silver medal in 2003. The teams included former Terriers Cliff Strong, Sean Dantzler, Damien Herard, Devon Neckles, Karl Sanders, and Tristan Smith as well as current NBA player Royal Ivey. Braica has also coached numerous players that participated in the NBA Summer League, including Dwight Hardy (Miami Heat), Justin Burrell (Golden State Warriors), D.J. Kennedy (Cleveland Cavaliers), Paris Horne (Charlotte Hornets), and Justin Brownlee (NY Knicks & Charlotte Hornets).

Since taking over as the Terriers' head coach, a large number of Braica's student-athletes have gone on to sign professional contracts on the international circuit. Akeem Bennett '11, Ricky Cadell '11, Alex Harrinton '11, Stefan Perunicic '12, Akeem Johnson '13, Alexander Isailovic '14, Ben Mockford '14, Kevin Douglas '15, Jalen Cannon '15, Lowell Ulmer '15, Chris Hooper '16 have all enjoyed success overseas.

Braica attended St. Agnes High School and Bishop Ford High School in Brooklyn in the early 1980s and graduated from Queens College in 1989. Braica began his coaching career at New York City Tech as an assistant in 1988. He also served as a teacher at The Reece School and in the New York City Board of Education from 1989-1994.

Braica and his wife, Christine, live in Brooklyn.

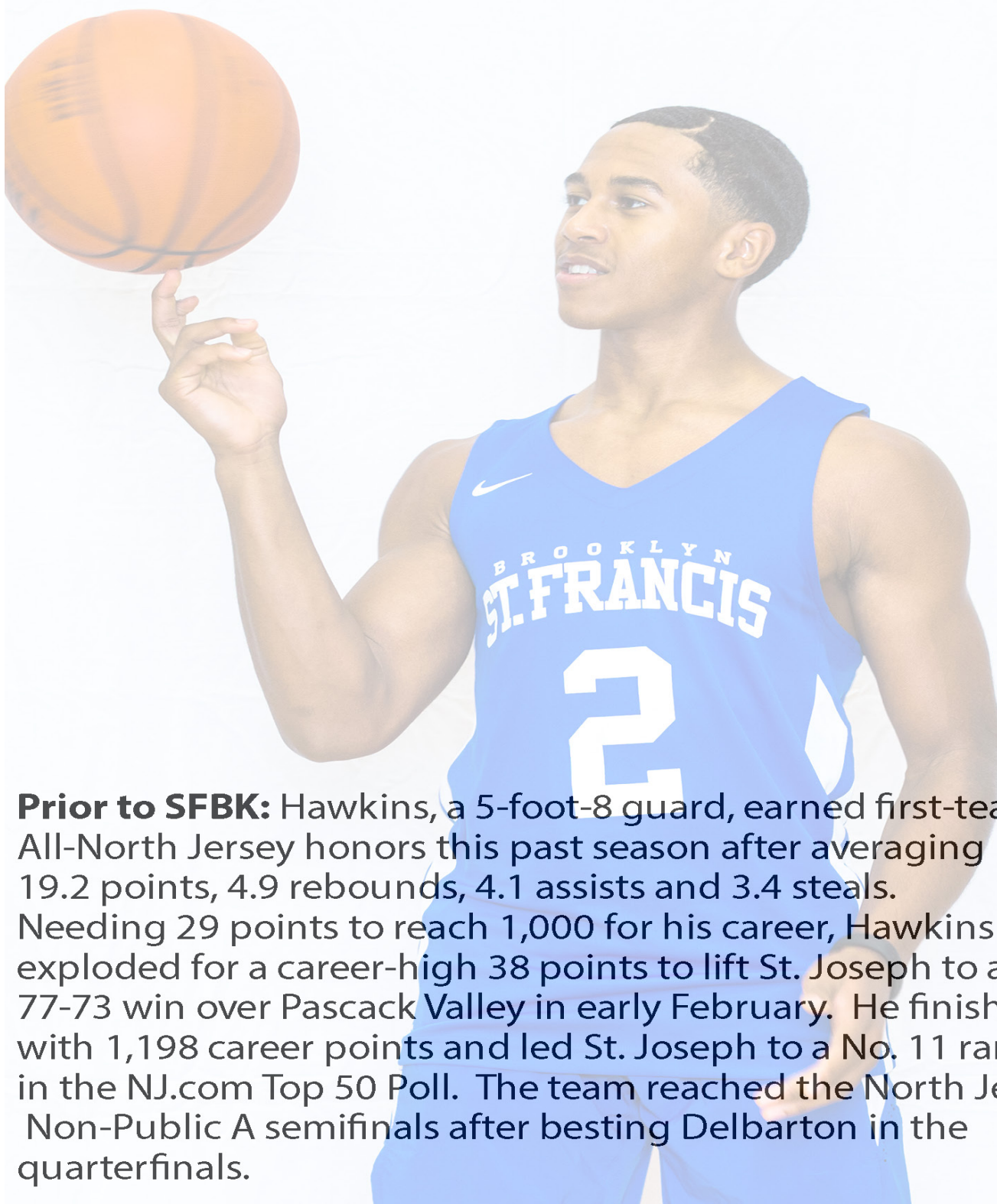

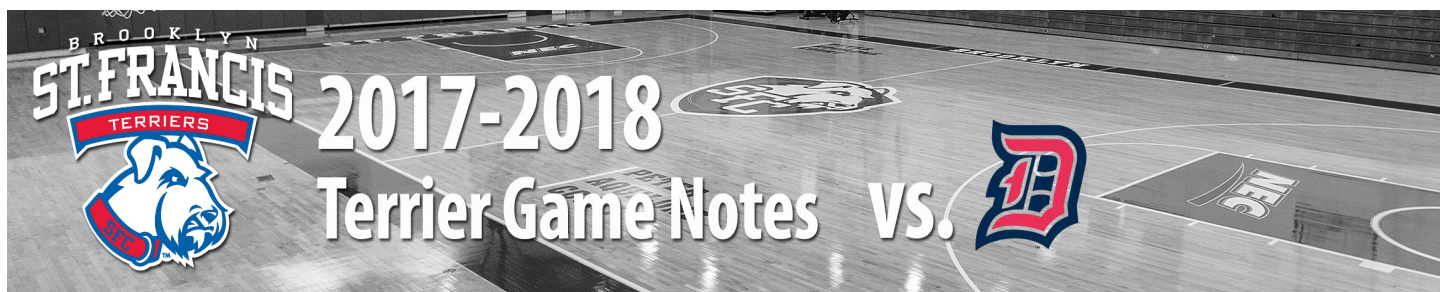

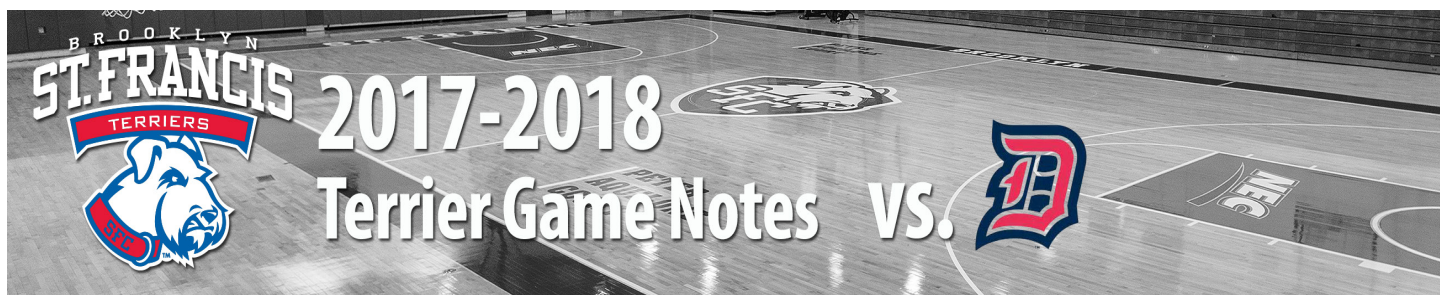
