ABOUT THE PSAC

Originating in 1951 to administer and promote men's athletics, the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference has evolved into one of the NCAA's most heralded intercollegiate conferences.

The first major step came in 1977, when based on a growing interest, the league reorganized to provide a structure for its women's programs. Only three years later, lacking a standard competitive division, league voted to reclassify the entire conference to NCAA Division II.

Among its recent enhancements the PSAC expanded its membership with two full-time members twice during a five-year span. The first occurred during the 2008-09 academic year with the addition of Gannon and Mercyhurst Universities. Then, in the summer of 2013, Seton Hill University and the University of Pittsburgh at Johnstown joined the league as full-time members. Long-known as the NCAA's largest one-state conference, the PSAC now consists of 18 institutions located within the Commonwealth, making the PSAC the largest NCAA conference regardless of state borders or classifying division. The league is also distinguished as the largest football-playing conference in the NCAA, and, with 23, the conference that sponsors the most championships at the Division II level.

Highly competitive on a regional and national level, PSAC schools annually combine to send nearly one-third of its teams into NCAA postseason play. Ultimately, the membership's success has yielded 46 NCAA team and 255 individual title winners.

While proud of its athletic accomplishments, the league also has evolved into one of Division II's finest from an academic standpoint. In each of the past five years, nearly one-third of the PSAC's student-athletes are honored each academic year as "Scholar-Athletes" for maintaining a grade-point average of 3.25 or better - a total that has tripled since PSAC Scholar-Athletes were first recognized in the mid-1990s.

Although all 18 current institutions are members of Division II, five league schools also compete at the Division I level in select sports. PSAC schools enroll over 134,000 students and claim approximately 750,000 alumni, including over 550,000 who reside in Pennsylvania.

The PSAC is governed by the presidents of the 18 member institutions. It employs a commissioner, two associate commissioners, and a director of media relations at its headquarters in Lock Haven, Pa.

Shippensburg University shapes its athletic program to fit within the overall academic goals of the university—maintaining a balance between athletics and academics.

Since 1984, the university's Office of Institutional Research has monitored the progress of our athletes in the classroom. The original study found that Shippensburg was ahead of many institutions in meeting the standards of Propositions 48 and 64—two NCAA resolutions designed to set minimum educational levels in collegiate athletes.

Proposition 64 of the NCAA established a minimum score of 700 in the SAT and a 2.0 grade point average in 11 core curriculum courses in high school. Proposition 48 carries these minimums even further and outlines availability of scholarships to freshmen athletes based on their school performance.

Incoming freshmen athletes show preparation levels comparable to those of all incoming students. In 2009, the average SAT score for incoming freshmen athletes was 993, only slightly below the SAT average for new incoming students of 1013. Both groups average in the upper two-fifths of their graduating high school classes.

Shippensburg's athletes continue to show high six-year graduation rates. Sixty-two percent of those receiving athletically related financial aid graduate within six years of enrolling. The 2009 NCAA Graduation Rate Report found that nationally, among public Division II schools, the graduation rate was 47 percent with athletes graduating at 55 percent. Retention studies by the Office of Institutional Research and Planning show male athletes at Shippensburg graduated at 58 percent and those receiving athletically related financial aid graduated at 57 percent. In addition, female athletes graduated at 74 percent and those receiving athletically related financial aid graduated at a rate of 80 percent.

Since 1975, 57 athletes have earned Academic All-America honors, including 11 in just the last two years. Six athletes have earned NCAA Postgraduate scholarships. Many more of Shippensburg's fine athletes have been nominated for regional and national honors.



2013 Spring Semester Student-Athlete Academic Summary

This summarizes the academic performances of the 449 student athletes on official athletic rosters during the Spring 2013 Semester.

- The semester QPA for all student athletes was 2.90.
- The semester QPA for female student athletes was 3.14.
- The semester QPA for male student athletes was 2.70.
- Women's Swimming achieved the highest semester QPA at 3.45. Twelve (12) other teams achieved a semester QPA of 3.0 or greater. They were: Women's Soccer (3.39), Women's Cross Country (3.38), Women's Tennis (3.26), Women's Softball (3.23), Men's Soccer (3.20), Women's Field Hockey (3.18), Women's Volleyball (3.16), Men's Swimming (3.12), Men's Cross Country (3.05), Women's Track & Field (3.03), and Women's Basketball (3.02).
- 52% (233) of all student athletes earned a semester QPA of 3.0 or greater.
- 26% (118) of all student athletes earned a semester QPA of 3.5 or greater (Dean's List).
- 5% (21) of all student athletes earned a semester QPA of 4.0.

Shippensburg University established the Office of Academic Support Services for Student-Athletes to provide the best possible resources for enhancing the academic experiences of student-athletes. Through the coordinator, a variety of academic assistance services are available, including academic advising support, academic progress monitoring, academic counseling and referral, and assisting graduating student-athletes in researching and pursuing employment and/or opportunities for graduate education.

The Office of Academic Support Services for Student-Athletes has strong links with the Learning Center and other campus-wide programs to support the academic well being of student-athletes.

All student-athletes have the opportunity to participate in the NCAA Student Athletic Affairs. This program is committed to promoting excellence in academics, athletics, career and personal development, and community service. In addition, all incoming first-year student-athletes have the opportunity to voluntarily participate in the PACES program. PACES (Personal, Academic, and Career Exploration Seminar) is open to all incoming undeclared first-year student-athletes who want to gain greater insight into campus majors, possible careers paths, campus resources, technology, scheduling concerns, and wellness issues.

The office provides information and informed advice about academic matters to all student-athletes, and all student-athletes are strongly encouraged to use the services.

Jeff Michaels

Director of Athletics

Jeff Michaels begins his fifth academic year as Shippensburg University's director of athletics in 2013-14.

Michaels served as Shippensburg's acting director of athletics for the 2009-10 and 2010-11 academic years before a permanent appointment to the position on July 1, 2011. His previous four years (2005-06 through 2008-09) were spent as the university's associate director of athletics.

Shippensburg University athletics has achieved significant success at the conference, regional and national levels during Michaels' tenure. In four years as Shippensburg's athletic director, Raider athletic programs have won 22 Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) championships.

SU finished eighth in the final standings for the 2012-13 Learfield Sports Directors' Cup, marking the best national finish in the history of Raider athletics. Thirteen of SU's 20 intercollegiate athletic programs recorded points in the 2012-13 Directors' Cup standings.

Michaels earned his bachelor of arts in mass communication and political science from Lycoming in 1992 and his master's degree in athletics administration from Slippery Rock in 1993. In May 2009, he earned a master's degree in sport management from California University of Pennsylvania.



Carrie Michaels

*Associate Director of Athletics/
Senior Woman Administrator*

Carrie Michaels begins her fifth academic year as the associate director of athletics at Shippensburg University in 2013-14. She also serves the university as its senior woman administrator (SWA).

Michaels was the acting associate director of athletics from June 2009 through November 2011 before being permanently appointed to her position. She was SU's assistant athletic director for the 2008-09 academic year.

Michaels has been a valuable member of the athletic administration – particularly in the management and maintenance of the department's budget. She is also responsible for the promotion, supervision and management of fund-raising activities.

Another aspect of her work is the coordination of community service projects and community engagement initiatives. SU was honored by the NCAA three consecutive years for its community engagement.

Michaels arrived at Shippensburg in September 2006 and worked for two years as the interim coordinator of Academic Support Services for Student-Athletes.

Michaels earned her bachelor of arts in psychology and criminal justice in 1995 at Duquesne. She earned her master's degree in sport management at Slippery Rock in 2001.



Ashley Grimm

Assistant Director of Athletics

Ashley Grimm enters her fourth year as the assistant director of athletics at Shippensburg University in 2013-14.

Grimm was the acting assistant director of athletics for the 2010-11 and 2011-12 academic years before a permanent appointment to her post on July 23, 2012.

At Shippensburg, Grimm is especially active in the maintenance and enforcement of NCAA rules compliance and interpretation. Her additional responsibilities with the athletics department include game management and administrative roles. Grimm has also been an integral advisor to Shippensburg's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC).

From 2009-10, Grimm was an athletic department assistant and a graduate assistant women's basketball coach at her alma mater, Clarion University. She was a four-year starting point guard on the women's basketball team at her alma mater and graduated as Clarion's all-time assists leader with 569.

A four-time PSAC Scholar Athlete, Grimm graduated summa cum laude from Clarion in 2008 with a bachelor's degree in biology while enrolled in the honors program. After receiving a NCAA postgraduate scholarship, Grimm received her MBA from Clarion in 2010.



Matt Jones

*Head Coach
Slippery Rock '95
8th Season*

Shippensburg University head baseball coach Matt Jones enters his eighth year with the Raiders in 2014 having directed

his teams to 190 wins, two Atlantic Region titles, a conference title, division title and two Division II College World Series appearances along with five PSAC tournament appearances.

The 2013 campaign was certainly a memorable one for Jones and the Raiders, as SU won four consecutive games out of the loser's bracket at the Atlantic Regional Championship to claim the title and advance to the Division II College World Series in Cary, N.C.

Baseball, the oldest of SU's intercollegiate teams (1874), has reached Division II's "World Series" just five times in its history. Two of those appearances have come in the last seven seasons with Jones in the dugout.

In SU's three Atlantic Region Tournament appearances under Jones – the Raiders have posted a 9-4 record and won two regional championships.

Despite a 2013 schedule that was deemed the most difficult in the Atlantic Region, SU managed 32 victories for the second consecutive season. The Raiders

were ranked as high as No. 12 in the Baseball News coaches' poll during the season and six players were recognized with All-PSAC accolades.

Three players — Pat Kregeloh, Michael Douglas and Marcus Shippey — earned ABCA All-Region honors. Kregeloh, who led the PSAC in homers and RBIs and also paced the Raiders in innings pitched, was named to three All-America teams and the Capital One Academic All-America Third Team, becoming SU's first baseball Academic All-American since 1995.

In 2012, the Raiders recorded its most wins in five seasons (32-21) and finished among the final four teams in the PSAC tournament. SU finished up as the No. 5 seed in the Atlantic Region, but lower-seeded teams Shepherd and Winston-Salem State received tournament berths by virtue of their conference championships out of the WVIAC and CIAA, respectively.

The 2012 squad marked the second consecutive year that SU has reached the PSAC tournament as the Eastern Division's No. 2 seed. The Raider batting average (.283) was identical from 2011 to 2012, but the team's ERA improved by nearly two-and-a-half runs. SU also swept a home doubleheader over national champion West Chester and took the Golden Rams to extra innings in the PSAC tournament.

In the final home doubleheader of the 2012 regular season (April 27, 2012), Jones surpassed the 300 career wins mark spanning 13 seasons as a collegiate head coach (six at Shippensburg, seven at Elizabethtown). Jones has compiled a career coaching record of 338-315-2.

SU has also become known for outstanding defense with Jones as the head coach. Shippensburg led the PSAC in fielding percentage during the 2007 and 2008 seasons while ranking second in 2009. The team averaged just 63 errors per season from 2007-09, an average of just 1.1 per game, while succeeding with at least 96 percent of their chances during that time. SU has also had eight regional "Gold Glove" award winners over the last four seasons.

Following the 2011 season, outfielder Eric Herman was one of just nine players in the nation to receive a 2011 ABCA/Rawlings Division II "Gold Glove" award. Herman was the only player selected from the Atlantic Region. He was honored for not committing an error in 83 outfield chances or 48 infield chances to set the school record for the most defensive chances in a season without committing an error (131).

After guiding his 2008 squad to the fourth Division II College World Series appearance in school history and first since 1996, Jones was named the 2008 ABCA/Diamond Sports Company NCAA Division II North Atlantic Region Coach of the Year and the 2008 NCBWA North Atlantic Region Coach of the Year.

Shippensburg finished the 2008 regular season as the champions of the PSAC Western Division with a 14-6 conference record that helped voters select Jones as the PSAC Western Division Coach of the Year. Through 12 seasons as a collegiate head coach, Jones has received a total of six coach of the year awards.

That season, Jones' program broke 12 single-season school records, 11 individual season records and 11 career records. Five players were named to an All-

North Atlantic Region squad while the American Baseball Coaches Association (ABCA), Daktronics and the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association (NCBWA) named Matt Wright the North Atlantic Region Pitcher of the Year.

The Raiders nearly swept the all-conference awards as well, as the team took home the division player (Justin Garber) and pitcher (Wright) of the year awards in addition to Jones' award. The team also had seven All-PSAC Western Division selections.

Four Shippensburg players coached by Jones have been selected in the Major League Baseball player draft, including Matt Wright and Justin Garber in 2008. Ross Buckwalter and Eric Perlozzo were drafted in 2007.

The 2007 season was the first at Shippensburg for Jones and he wasted no time guiding the team to its first conference championship in four seasons and first NCAA Tournament appearance in three years. Jones also set a benchmark with 28 wins in one season that was shattered in 2008 with the team's 39 victories.

Jones is one of three SU coaches (since 1922) to win a conference title in his first season.

Five of his players earned National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association (NCBWA) honors for the 2007 season and were also selected to the All-PSAC Western Division squads.

Jones, a 1995 graduate of Slippery Rock, was named the 11th head baseball coach at Shippensburg on Oct. 23, 2006 after serving as Elizabethtown's head coach for seven seasons, where he posted a career record of 148-126-2 and turned the team into a perennial contender for the Commonwealth Conference title.

At Elizabethtown, Jones captured three conference championships and appeared in the conference title game five times while participating in the conference championship tournament in each of his seven seasons. He also led the Blue Jays to three NCAA Regional appearances.

During his tenure with the Blue Jays, Jones was named conference coach of the year in 2000 and 2001. They compiled a 77-56 regular season conference record. Many of Jones' players earned individual awards, as 34 players earned all-conference honors and six players were selected to the NCAA All-Mid-

Atlantic Region team during his tenure. He also coached three conference rookies of the year, two conference pitchers of the year and one NCAA Division III All-American.

Overall, Jones has coached in 45 conference tournament games, 21 NCAA regional tournament games and five College World Series games, totaling 33 postseason wins.

Jones currently lives in Mechanicsburg with his wife Leslie, a 1997 graduate of Shippensburg. They are the proud parents of a young boy, Connor.



Adam Sheibley

Assistant Coach
Elizabethtown '09
2nd Season

Adam Sheibley enters his second season as the team's primary assistant coach in 2014. Sheibley serves as the team's

recruiting coordinator and works with hitting and base-running in addition to instructing the infield.

Sheibley, a Landisburg native, previously served two seasons as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Elizabethtown College. E-Town achieved 39 victories with Sheibley on staff.

With the Blue Jays, Sheibley was active in player development, scouting and recruiting while focusing his instruction toward hitting, fielding and base-running. He also developed off-season conditioning programs for each player.

His additional coaching experience includes work with instructional camps and showcases at Bucknell, Virginia, Delaware and Shippensburg and for companies such as Baseball Factory and Elite Baseball.

As a player, Sheibley (2006-09) finished his career as E-Town's career leader in runs scored (162), triples (23), stolen bases (95), games played (158) and at-bats (568). He also ranks second in Elizabethtown's record books for career RBIs (115) and hits (178).

Sheibley led the country in stolen bases (51) and stolen bases per game (1.16) during his senior season in 2009. As a freshman in 2006, a season in which Matt Jones was his head coach, Sheibley hit 12 triples in 43 games – which tied for sixth-most in a season in NCAA history.



Billy Funk

Assistant Coach
Bluefield '11
1st Season

Billy Funk joins the Raider coaching staff as a volunteer assistant coach for the 2014 season.

Funk arrives at Shippensburg after spending the 2013 season as an assistant coach at Rappahannock Community College. Funk began his collegiate playing career with the Gulls, winning the 2008 Virginia Community College System Championship as a first team all-conference selection.

A native of Mechanicsville, Va., Funk spent the 2011 season as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Bluefield College. Prior to coaching, Funk spent two seasons as a player for Bluefield and helped lead the Rams to the 2009 National Christian College Athletic Association National Championship.

Funk's additional experiences include work as a hitting instructor for the Baseball Performance Academy and holding various positions at the minor league level within the Toronto Blue Jays and Baltimore Orioles organizations.

Funk graduated from Bluefield College in May of 2011 with a bachelor's degree in Sports Management.

The Shippensburg University baseball team enters the 2014 season coming off its second consecutive 32-win season and its fifth trip to the Division II College World Series after winning the Atlantic Region Championship for the second time since 2008.

The Raiders – ranked as high as No. 12 in the ABCA “Baseball News” poll during the season – snuck into the Atlantic Region Tournament as the No. 4 seed despite failing to qualify for the PSAC Tournament. The Raiders won four straight elimination games at regionals to become one of just eight teams remaining in the country to earn a trip to Cary, N.C.

While Shippensburg began and finished the 2013 season playing well, head coach Matt Jones knows the Raiders need to play four consecutive months of solid baseball this season – from February through May – to repeat last year’s success.

“We didn’t play well in conference last year and it took a perfect storm of scenarios to get us into the NCAA Tournament,” Jones said. “We didn’t have a complete season last year. We played very well out of conference and in the regional, but the way we played in conference was a letdown and that is our motivation heading into this season.”

Shippensburg is ranked No. 10 in the Collegiate Baseball Division II Preseason Poll – the highest ranked Atlantic Region team in the poll – and enters the season returning five of its nine offensive starters from a 2013 lineup that ranked second in the PSAC with a .309 batting average. The Raiders also return three starting pitchers – their No. 1, 3 and 4 starters from 2013 – as well as two of the best relief pitchers in the PSAC.

Chief among the returners is senior Pat Kregeloh, whose value comes from his heavy bat as the team’s cleanup hitter and from his right arm as the team’s ace. Named to three All-American teams last season, Kregeloh leads a strong senior class that includes fellow right-handed starter Shawn Patterson, left-handed reliever Austin Bartley and a pair of impressive transfers from a year ago in center fielder Michael Douglas and third baseman Cal Hogan.

Jones returns for his eighth year at the helm, and through 14 years as a collegiate head coach, has amassed a record of 338-315-2, with 190 of those victories coming in a Raider uniform. Adam Sheibley returns for his second season as the primary assistant coach while Billy Funk joins the coaching staff as a second assistant.

Thirteen newcomers enter the fray this season – 12 freshmen and one junior transfer. With holes to fill at catcher, designated

hitter and the corner outfield spots after the departure of several key pieces from a year ago, several Raiders newcomers will be relied upon to make an immediate impact.

Seventeen players return from last year’s squad, including the aforementioned group of five seniors as well as five juniors and seven sophomores.

“We have some very good leaders on this team, guys who are very motivated to compete at a high level again,” Jones said. “They did a very good job with the new players and got them in the mix right away.”

Among the key returning cogs to the offensive lineup include Kregeloh and Douglas, a pair that earned their way onto the ABCA All-Atlantic Region First Team last year. Hogan and sophomore shortstop Mike Marcinko also return after being named to the All-PSAC East First Team in their first seasons at SU.

When not at first base, Kregeloh will be on the mound along with returning starters Patterson and junior southpaw Nick Massetti as well as sophomore right-hander Marcus Shippey, an ABCA All-Atlantic Region Second Team pick as a rookie relief pitcher who will be moving to the starting rotation this season. The bullpen will again be highlighted at the back end by the left-handed Bartley, who will pose problems for opposing lineups.

"We were very happy with the depth of arms this fall, we return some guys who pitched a lot for us last year," Jones said. "On the field we practiced pretty well this fall overall, and we did a lot of work in the weight room, too. I know we'll be ready to go."

Pitching

Shippensburg loses one of its top starters from last season in Tom Bush, but returns three other starting arms to go along with an experienced bullpen.

Senior **Pat Kregeloh** will anchor the pitching staff in 2014 after leading the unit last season in wins (9, third-most in the PSAC), ERA among starters (3.47), strikeouts (68) and innings pitched (93.1, third-most in the PSAC). Kregeloh started 13 games with five complete games and held opponents to a .222 batting average.

Senior **Shawn Patterson** will again be counted on to eat up innings as SU's No. 2 starter after putting up a 4.27 ERA with 41 strikeouts in 65.1 innings last year. The Raiders went 8-4 in his 12 starts.

Sophomore **Marcus Shippey** makes the move to the starting rotation after an impressive debut season in which he was one of the top relievers in the conference. An All-PSAC East Second Team

pick, Shippey recorded a team-best 1.93 ERA in 18 appearances (28 innings) and earned three saves and struck out 20 while walking just three.

Junior **Nick Massetti** earned seven starts last season – fourth-most on the team – and appeared in relief in five others. Massetti will be relied upon again in 2014 after posting a 4.46 ERA in 38.1 innings of work as a sophomore last season.

Senior **Austin Bartley** will again be key in Shippensburg locking down victories late in games. A left-hander with 23 strikeouts, Bartley set the single-season school record last year with 25 appearances while flashing a 2.00 ERA and a team-best four saves.

A pair of sophomores also returns for their second season looking to again make a difference either as a starter or in the bullpen. **Rich Michaud** impressed in his rookie campaign with his four starts and eight relief appearances totaling 34.1 innings and a 4.19 ERA.

Michaud threw 4.1 innings of relief and allowed just one run to get the win vs. Winston-Salem State in the Atlantic Region Tournament.

Southpaw **Kyle McClintock** – who pitched two innings of clean relief vs. Seton Hill on the final day of the Atlantic Region Tournament – earned a 3.81 ERA last year in 28.1 innings with 12 total appearances, including three starts.

A pair of freshmen right-handed arms – **Mark Curtis** and **Josh Kutchev** – stood out in the fall and will likely pitch significant innings this season. Curtis is a Phillipsburg-Osceola graduate who was named First Team All-State as a senior. Kutchev hails from Frederick, Md., where he recorded a career 2.27 ERA for Walkersville High School. Curtis will likely be in the starting rotation while Kutchev will be relied upon in the bullpen.

Junior **Kevin Richter** enters his second season at SU after transferring from Frederick Community College while **Thomas Swartz** and **DJ Kinna** are two right-handed sophomores also hoping to see some relief innings in 2014.

A junior transfer from Harford Community College, **Sal Purpura** joins the SU pitching staff after striking out 25 batters in 23 career appearances in his first two collegiate seasons.

Freshman **Dan Bowman** is a Central Cambria graduate who posted a 2.41 ERA and struck out 44 in his senior season. Bowman will redshirt this season.

Catching

The team's biggest hole that needs filled this season will be behind the mask as two-time All-PSAC East catcher Tyler Shover departs.

Jones brought in a pair of freshmen catchers that will compete for playing time. A First Team All-State pick as a senior at Coatesville High School last season, **Jake Kennedy** will get first crack at manning the backstop.

A native of Halifax, **Matt Osenbach** had an impressive high school career but was injured during the fall. He will eventually compete for innings at catcher.

Sean Arrell (New London) and **Clint Leslie** (Coatesville) are a pair of additional rookie catchers who will provide depth at the position.

Infield

The Raiders return their entire starting infield – a starting quartet that includes three All-PSAC East First Team selections last season.

When not on the mound, senior **Pat Kregeloh** will man first base. The All-American is coming off a season in which he led the PSAC in home runs and RBIs with nine and 60, respectively. A three-time All-PSAC East performer, Kregeloh fell one RBI short of matching the single-season school record while also leading SU with 66 hits, a .591 slugging percentage and 110 total bases.

Kregeloh, in fact, enters his senior season on a 16-game hitting streak. If he hits safely in the first six games of the season, he will tie the school record for the longest hitting streak (22, set by both Chad Stecker (2004) and Tyler Redick (2008-09)).

Junior **Jimmy Spanos** enters his third season as the team's everyday second baseman. Spanos was fourth on the squad last season with a .328 batting average and 62 hits – a total that includes a team-best four triples.

Sophomore **Mike Marcinko** impressed in his debut season at shortstop en route to an All-PSAC East First Team selection. Marcinko batted .331 with 55 hits and 32 runs and displayed both power (19 RBIs) and speed (11 stolen bases).

Marcinko and senior **Cal Hogan** made up SU's All-PSAC East First Team left infield as the junior transfer manned the hot corner at third base and the No. 2 spot in the lineup. Hogan batted .312 and added 59 hits, 36 runs and 23 RBIs while flashing one of the more impressive gloves at third base in the conference.

Sophomore **Cody Ezolt** will likely back-up Kregeloh at first base and man the bag when Kregeloh is pitching. Ezolt started 16 career games over his first two seasons, with 11 coming at first base and the five others at designated hitter.

Freshmen **Ryan McMillen** (New Bloomfield) and **Hunter Szaflarski** (Greencastle) are a pair of athletes that could make their way into the lineup. Fellow freshmen **Tyler Betz** (Dillsburg) will redshirt this season.

Outfield

Senior **Mike Douglas** will lead the group in the outfield after an All-Region campaign in his first season at Shippensburg in 2013 after transferring from Pittsburgh. SU's leadoff hitter, Douglas flashed a rare combination of elite power and speed: he was second in the PSAC with 51 runs, third with 24 stolen bases and tied for sixth with five home runs. Douglas was second on the team with 38 RBIs and recorded just two errors in the outfield despite starting all 54 games.

The Raiders will need to break in two new starters in the corner outfield spots, however, with the departures of Simon Beloff and the former All-Region Gold Glove winner Cody Kulp.

Junior **Austin Allison** appeared in just seven games in his redshirt-freshman season in 2013 while fellow senior **Trent Bond** appeared in four games in his first season at SU.

After an impressive fall, freshman **Vince Careghini** will likely assume a starting outfield role this season. The Central Bucks East graduate batted .368 as a senior last season and stole 27 bases.

Another freshman, **Isaac Stern**, will also look to crack the lineup in the outfield. A native of New Enterprise, Stern comes to SU after being named an Altoona Mirror All-Star for Northern Bedford High School last season.

Shippensburg won 32 games for the second year in a row and was ranked as high as No. 12 in the ABCA "Baseball News" poll in mid-March, but with an 11-13 PSAC record, the Raiders failed to qualify for the PSAC Tournament come May.

Despite missing out on conference postseason play, the 2013 Raider baseball season was not yet over.

Far from it, in fact.

Shippensburg snuck into the Atlantic Region Tournament as the No. 4 seed but dropped its regional opener – its first game played in nearly two weeks – to No. 3 seed Seton Hill, 4-1, to kick off the double-elimination tournament.

From that point, SU had no choice but to win – and win, it did. The Raiders stayed alive the next day with a 4-1 defeat of top-seeded Millersville. Senior outfielder David McKolosky ended the game with a sensational diving catch in left field that gave SU its first NCAA postseason win since 2008.

Shippensburg capitalized on more theatrics the following day in another do-or-die game against tournament host school and No. 2-seed Winston-Salem State. Down to its final two outs in the ninth, SU had eight consecutive batters reach base to transform a two-run deficit into a remarkable 7-4 come-from-behind victory. The Raiders scored five times in the ninth with none of the runs scoring on a ball hit out of the infield (two bunt singles, a fielder's choice and a walk).

The Raiders' momentum continued the following day with a pair of 10-3 and 3-2 victories in a rematch with Seton Hill to advance to the Division II College World Series for the first time since 2008.



Questioned by its pundits and peers both regionally and nationally, Shippensburg more than validated its deserved selection into the regional tournament with four consecutive elimination-game victories and subsequent defeats of the region's No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3 seeds in the process.

Senior catcher *Tyler Shover* was named the 2013 Atlantic Region Tournament MVP after going 10-for-20 in the series with two home runs, two doubles and six runs while throwing out 4-of-7 base runners in five games. He was joined on the All-Tournament Team by senior starting pitcher Tom Bush and freshman shortstop Mike Marcinko.

Junior *Pat Kregeloh* earned his ninth pitching victory in Game 1 and launched his ninth home run in Game 2. Pitching on two days rest in the opener, Kregeloh allowed three runs in the first inning but responded with six shut-out frames after that — throwing 124 pitches in seven solid innings of work. In Game 2, and SU

trailing 2-0 in the sixth, Kregeloh launched a round tripper over the left-center field fence that proved to be the difference.

The Griffins entered the tournament ranked No. 8 in the country in batting average (.342) but were limited by Raider pitching to a .215 clip (20-for-93) in three tournament meetings. Overall, SU hit .282 at the regional, scored 25 runs and allowed just 14 as its pitchers combined for a 2.45 ERA.

The miracle postseason run gave Shippensburg its fifth trip in school history to the national baseball finals – the Division II College World Series in Cary, N.C. – as one of the final eight teams in the country.

Despite a two-hit effort from *Kregeloh* in 7.2 innings of work, No. 17 Shippensburg dropped a 1-0 pitcher's duel No. 11 Franklin Pierce in the opening game. Kregeloh fanned four in a 106-pitch effort and gave up just one run off an RBI single in the eighth inning. The right-hander didn't

allow a runner to reach second until the seventh inning, retired 14 consecutive batters during one stretch in the middle of the game.

The impressive NCAA postseason run came to an end two days later on Memorial Day, however, when the Raiders totaled 13 hits but dropped their elimination game to No. 14 Grand Valley State, 8-4.

Despite going 0-2 at the national tournament, the Raiders finished the 2013 season with the second-highest batting average in the PSAC (.309), six All-PSAC East honorees, three All-Atlantic Region honorees and a pair of All-American plaudits for first baseman/pitcher Kregeloh (Daktronics Second Team, ABCA Third Team).

Shippensburg had an up-and-down regular season despite playing a strength of schedule that was deemed to be the most difficult in the region and one of the toughest in Division II.

After the first weekend of PSAC East play in mid-March, SU was 16-5, ranked atop the NCBWA Atlantic Region poll and ranked No. 12 nationally. Beginning with a Friday afternoon series at Kutztown on March 29, though, SU limped to a 12-14 record over the season's final six weeks – a run that included an 8-12 mark in PSAC Eastern Division play.

Of SU's 20 regular season losses, 10 were by just one run – including eight in PSAC Eastern Division play.

Despite being ranked No. 5 in the Atlantic Region missing out on the PSAC Tournament, the Raiders moved up a spot to No. 4 to qualify for regionals, holding off fellow conference foes California (Pa.) and Kutztown – two teams that made the PSAC Tournament but went a combined 5-9 to finish the season. (East Stroudsburg and Concord earned the region's No. 5 and No. 6 seeds for winning the PSAC and WVIAC championships, respectively.)

The baseball team was founded in 1874, just three years after the school opened, making it the oldest intercollegiate team on campus. The first recorded mention of baseball at the university was in the News-Chronicle of May 31, 1874, when Shippensburg lost to Mercersburg Academy 17-5. From that humble beginning the team has become one of the most successful programs at Shippensburg University.

Here are a few highlights; compiled by former SID John Alosi:

In 1875, Shippensburg posted its largest known run total as it downed the Shippensburg Centennial Club by a score of 55-35.

The 1900 team posted an undefeated season under Coach Ezra Lehman (6-0). Lehman later served as president of the college from 1913-1931.

In 1903, the team beat the Linder Club, the top amateur team in Central Pennsylvania by a score of 10-5 behind star pitcher Ira Mellinger. Mellinger became the first Shippensburg player to sign a professional contract.

In 1906, the team played against the Carlisle Indian School team featuring the legendary Jim Thorpe in center field. The Indians won 6-2.

The 1910 team set a school record for wins in a season, going 11-3. The record stood until 1956

In 1915 and 1916, the team was led by pitcher Clyde Mellinger, who struck out 18 batters against Kutztown, and third baseman Clyde Barnhart, the only Red Raider ever to play in the major leagues. Barnhart played third base and outfield, hitting .295, for the Pittsburgh Pirates from 1920 to 1928.

In 1922, the team traveled south for the first time, but rain spoiled the trip as they were only able

to get in two games. Star pitcher Lefty Mellot struck out 13, 12, 15, 10, and 7 batters in five consecutive starts.

That season, in an exhibition game against the Chambersburg Yankees, Coach A. J. Shariden took the mound and fired a no-hitter, leading the Raiders to a 2-0 win.

In 1927, the Cumberland Valley Normal School became Shippensburg State Teacher's College and a four-year degree-granting institution. The team won the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference title in 1941 under coach Ed Gulian, as Dick Kepner went 7-1 and Dean Bergstresser hit .400.

Tom Crist took over the coaching reins in 1950 and coached the Raiders to conference titles in 1954 and 1958. In 1956 the team

set a university record with a 12-6 mark. The 12 wins remained the record until 1971.

The Art Fairchild era began in 1966 and saw the Raiders reach new levels of achievement. The team posted winning years from 1969 to 1989, 21 seasons in a row. In 1973, the team made the NCAA playoffs for the first time and since then has been in the hunt for the national championship 13 more times.

The 1973 team featured Denny Arnold, who was 4-0 with a 2.62 ERA, while Mark Givler batted .348 and hit safely in 15 straight games.

The 1974 team led Division II with a sparkling 1.79 ERA. The Raiders finished 14-13.

In 1977, the Raiders went 32-11, winning the Mid-Atlantic Regional and playing in the

Division II College World Series for the first time. Steve Schaaf, who went 6-1 with a 1.85 ERA on the year, pitched 12.2 scoreless innings against Valdosta State in the CWS before giving up two unearned runs.

In 1987, under interim coach Bill Rickenbaugh, the Raiders went 39-11 for a .780 winning percentage. Shippensburg made it all the way to NCAA North Central Regional, placing third. The Red Raiders had won three PSAC titles in four years.

In 1991, the team participated in the NCAA Division II World Series in Montgomery, Ala. Catcher Bill Dolbrosky, who hit .399 with a university-record 22 doubles, and second baseman Andy Brookens who hit .351 with eight homers and 41 RBI were selected in the Major League draft by Milwaukee and Kansas City respectively.

In 1996 head coach Bruce Peddie added to the winning tradition by guiding the Red Raiders to another berth in the NCAA Division II World Series. Led by shortstop Brian Dallas, they won the PSAC and North Atlantic Region championships and finished the season with a 34-19-1 overall record. Dallas hit .346 and set numerous university career records.

In 2000, the Red Raiders won the PSAC title for the 12th time in team history. Jamie Eichelberger led Shippensburg with a .404 batting average with 12 doubles and three homers. He raised the career record for homers to 25.

After rebuilding in 2002, the Red Raiders won the PSAC title again in 2003. Catcher Matt DeSanto was the Eastern Division Player of the Year. Shippensburg had its

first All-Americans since 1995 in 2004 and that squad broke the school record for wins in a season with with a 43.

In 2007, first-year head coach Matt Jones guided the Red Raiders to their first PSAC Championship since 2003 and became the fourth consecutive head coach to lead Shippensburg to a conference championship. The '07 squad made the team's first NCAA Tournament appearance in three years, and duplicated the feat in 2008 with a North Atlantic Region Championship.

Since Shippensburg became a four-year school, the program has over 1,200 victories and a winning percentage over .600. It has also won 20 PSAC Championships and made 19 NCAA regional championship appearances.

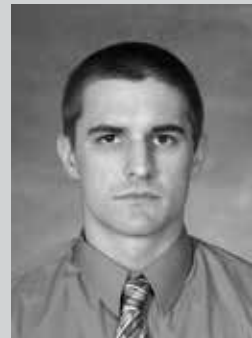

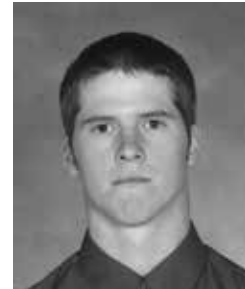

On April 29, 1995, the Red Raiders' home field was named the G. Arthur Fairchild Field in honor of head coach Art Fairchild, who retired at the end of the season. The field was originally named University Field before its dedication.

Fairchild Field, on the north side of campus, has been the home of Red Raiders baseball since 1973. Prior to that, the team played its home games at Eckels Field on the south side of campus. The team first played on Fairchild Field in 1971, but played at Eckels in 1974 before returning in 1975.

The field is one of the best in the PSAC, with outstanding infield drainage. It is diligently maintained by the campus maintenance staff throughout the year. There are no lights at Fairchild Field. Bleacher seating is available surrounding the backstop with additional room to watch games on the hill outside the right field fence and along the first-base side of the complex.



The field underwent major renovation in 2006. The outfield fence was rebuilt. The fence was also moved out and deeper with 330 feet down the foul lines and 400 feet to center field. The new fence is eight feet high all the way around the outfield. The dirt baselines were removed prior to the 2010 season and replaced with natural grass. A batter's eye was installed and in place for the 2011 season.

The Raiders enjoy considerable success in their home park. In 1981, the team posted a 16-0 mark enroute to the PSAC championship. In the 1986, the Red Raiders were an incredible 20-2 as they took the title again.

Fairchild Field has also been the home to numerous PSAC championship tournaments and PIAA championship games over the years, particularly in the 1970s and 1980s. Several future major leaguers and countless prospects have played at Fairchild Field in its history.
