On June 1, 2010, Shorter College became **Shorter University**, a two-year journey that resulted in the 138-year old institution becoming Rome's only university. Shorter continues to pride itself on being a Christian University committed to excellence in academics. Shorter also continues to pursue its mission to inspire students to make commitments to lifelong learning, personal spiritual values, responsible citizenship, community and social leadership and global awareness.





PRESIDENT, DR. DONALD DOWLESS



Dr. Donald V. Dowless became Shorter University's 19th president effective June 1, 2011.

"Dr. Donald Dowless has strong credentials in the areas of Christian commitment, higher education administration, fundraising, and ministry," said Shorter University Trustee Chairman Dr. Nelson Price in announcing his appointment.

"The integration of faith and learning is the foundation of his accomplishments as he has risen through the academic ranks," Dr. Price added. "He knows academia inside and out, and what is most impressive about Dr. Dowless is his love for the Lord and his desire to honor Him with all his heart, soul, and mind. His passion for seeing students grow strong in the Christian faith and for knowing their academic disciplines is evident.

"We are grateful for the progress Shorter University made under Dr. Newman's leadership, and we are sure to keep the momentum of success under our new leader, Dr. Donald Dowless."

Dr. Dowless came to Shorter from North Greenville University, where he served for five years as vice president for academics.

Having earned the Doctor of Philosophy degree from Baylor University in 1989, Dr. Dowless began his academic career as an assistant professor of religion at Charleston Southern University.

He rose through the ranks by becoming chair of the Department of Religion, then dean of the College of Humanities and Social Sciences, and then associate provost. In June 2006, he was named vice president for academic affairs at North Greenville University.

At both North Greenville and Charleston Southern, Dr. Dowless served on SACS Reaffirmation of Accreditation leadership teams and helped lead the two institutions through successful 10-year reaffirmation processes.

He also helped acquire the largest single scholarship endowment at Charleston Southern, approximately \$500,000 from Charleston Heights Baptist Church. Throughout his career, Dr. Dowless has supported athletic programs as avenues for education and ministry.

Dr. Dowless holds the Master of Divinity degree from Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary and the Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

In December 2009, he earned the Certificate in Non-Profit Management from Duke University with an emphasis in fundraising and marketing.

In Spring 2011, he received an honorary Doctor of Christian Leadership from North Greenville University.

An ordained minister, Dr. Dowless has served as a supply pastor, as a pastor, and as a guest speaker at Baptist Pastor's Conferences and at Baptist Associations.

He and his wife, Teresa (pictured with Dr. Dowless on left), are dedicated to global missions and have led mission trips.

He has taken part in mission trips, study tours and travel experiences in Mexico, Romania, Hungary, England, Scotland, Canada, Germany, the Caribbean, Guatemala, Costa Rica, France, and the Czech Republic.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS, BILL PETERSON

Bill Peterson enters his fifth year as Shorter University's Director of Athletics. Since being named Director of Athletics in 2007, Peterson has guided Shorter's athletic department into unprecedented levels of success. His decision-making and expertise have propelled Shorter to record finishes in the NACDA-Learfield Director's Cup in each of the last four years, including a program-best third place finish following the 2010-2011 academic year.

Peterson was named the Southern States Athletic Conference Athletic Director of the Year in 2010 and is currently spearheading Shorter's exciting transition to NCAA Division II.

Since 2007-2008, Shorter has won five national championships and 19 conference championships.

Last year, Shorter won the NAIA Men's Indoor and Outdoor Track and Field national championships -- the first two NAIA national championships in school history -- while the competitive cheerleading program completed a three-peat at the NCA Cheerleading National Championships in April.

In Peterson's tenure, Shorter has had 263 All-Conference honorees and 128 student-athletes honored as All-Americans. While the athletic achievements are numerous, the academic accomplishments and track record of community involvement of Shorter's student-athletes clearly embodies his vision of excellence.

Shorter's number of NAIA Scholar-Athletes has grown from five in 2007-2008 to a record 28 in 2010-2011. Overall, 71 Shorter student-athletes have earned the title of NAIA Scholar-Athlete over the past four years while a total of 345 have been named to their respective Conference All-Academic teams.

Shorter has boasted the Southern States Athletic Conference's Female Honor Student-Athlete in each of the past three years -- Becca Thomas (2009), Whitney Tucker (2010) and Kelly Ellison (2011) -- and have seen Tucker and Ellison named the NAIA's National Emil S. Liston Award winners as the nation's top female basketball players on account of playing ability, scholarship and character.

The Shorter athletic department has become increasingly involved in the Greater Rome and surrounding communities, helping to raise tens of thousands of dollars for a variety of charitable organizations and causes including breast cancer research, childhood cancer awareness, financial support of Mal's Pals, Inc., and the support of military service men and women.

Shorter has been recognized nationally for its community service efforts as a Shorter team has been honored by the NAIA as a National Champions of Character Team Award winner in three of the last four years -- Softball (2008), Baseball (2010) and Women's Basketball (2011).

In January 2008, the NAIA announced that Peterson, Shorter University and Rome-Floyd County had been awarded the bid for the 2008 and 2009 NAIA Football National Championship to be held at the Hawks' home football facility, Barron Stadium. Because of the rampant success of the 2008 and 2009 championship games, Peterson and the Rome Host Committee not only hosted the 2010 championship contest, but also inked a long-term deal with the NAIA to host the Football National Championship through 2015.



Prior to taking the helm of the Hawks' athletic program, Peterson served three years in the position of recruiting coordinator for the Shorter University football team. He came to Shorter from Mount Paran Christian School in Kennesaw, Ga., where he served as head baseball coach. In 2005, Peterson led Mount Paran to a school record 24 wins and a berth in the state finals while being named the *Atlanta-Journal Constitution* Coach of the Year.

Prior to coaching, Peterson was President and Co-Founder of Horizon Medical Products (HMP), a publicly traded corporation headquartered in Atlanta.

Peterson played collegiate football at Texas Lutheran College where he was a member of the 1974 NAIA national championship team coached by the legendary Jim Wacker. He finished his college career at Florida State University where he graduated in 1978 with a degree in Accounting.

Peterson's father, Bill Sr., is credited with bringing the professional passing game to college football. Bill Sr., coached at Florida State from 1960-70, at Rice University in 1971 and for the Houston Oilers of the National Football League (NFL) from 1972-73.

Peterson and his wife, Joanna, have four children: Will, Molly, Ben and Sam. Will was a senior tight end for the 2008 Mid-South Conference Western Division champion Shorter football team and Ben is a sophomore offensive lineman for the 2011 Football Hawks.

2011-12 OUTLOOK

THE HIGHEST NATIONAL RANKING ever for the program, a record-setting start, a pair of NAIA All-Americans and 23 wins – the accomplishments went on and on for the Shorter University men's basketball team last year.

In 2010-11, the Hawks racked up just about every accomplishment imaginable save one – a berth in the NAIA National Tournament. That lone shortfall has become a unifying mission for the Hawks as they begin the 2011-12 season with a loaded and experienced lineup determined to make this year complete.

"There were plenty of positives for us last year," said Shorter fifth-year head coach Chad Warner, who last season led the Hawks to a 23-8 record and saw his team climb as high as No. 12 in the national poll after winning a record 10 consecutive games to open the season. "But to be honest, we felt disrespected. We were the only team in the country with 23 wins that did not make the tournament, and on top of that, we beat four Top 25 teams.

"The bottom line is that you have to take care of business," Warner added. "Respect has to be earned. We have to take that next step to be respected."

This year's squad may have the tools necessary to take that next step as eight seasoned players, including four starters, return from last year's team that averaged nearly 80 points a game and held opponents to under 69 points per.

Even better, Warner says, is the fact that the Hawks have developed into the type of team that a coach dreams about – one that has grown together as a family through faith.

"I'm really excited about this team, but what's most exciting is the way they've worked," Warner said. "They compete harder in practice than any team I've coached. They seem to play for each other and for Shorter instead of themselves."

The one noticeable absence from the roster is Marqise Wright, who closed out his remarkable two-year career at Shorter as a two-time NAIA All-American and All-Southern States Athletic Conference performer. Despite that loss, the Hawks welcome back two of the league's premier players.

6-foot-5 junior forward Walter Hill returns after leading the Hawks in scoring and steals and ranking second on the team in rebounding last year. The Gainesville native put up 17.5 points, 7.6 rebounds and 1.7 steals a night while shooting a blistering 52 percent from the floor on his way to SSAC Newcomer of the Year, first team All-SSAC and NAIA All-America honors.

Senior point guard Eric Nix also returns to the lineup after the southpaw from Ider, Ala., ranked No. 2 in the nation last season at 6.5 assists per game. Nix, whose 202 assists in 2010-11 are the third-best single-season total in school history, also contributed to a balanced scoring effort by chipping in 6.7 points a game.

Nix is not alone at the guard position, where Shorter's balance and depth is most visible. Expected to join Nix in the backcourt are senior veteran Darius Steger and junior transfers C.J. Davis and Kenny Leverette.



2010-11 NAIA All-America selection Walter Hill leads a talented Shorter roster into battle this season. Hill led the Hawks in scoring at 17.5 points a game last year.

Steger is back for his third and final season with Shorter having proven himself on and off the court. On the hardwood, the Huntsville, Ala., product that came to Shorter after one season at NCAA Division I Coastal Carolina University, averaged more than five points a game off the bench last season. His work in the classroom resulted in an SSAC All-Academic honor.

Davis, who will become eligible in December, joins the Hawks after transferring from Union University where he was not only an All-TranSouth Athletic Conference pick in 2010-11, but also earned NAIA honorable mention All-America honors after leading Union in scoring (14.6 ppg) and steals.

Leverette transferred to Shorter last January from Southwestern Illinois, where the O'Fallon, Ill., native, previously played with Walter Hill. At Southwestern, Leverette captured All-Region and All-Conference honors after averaging 10.1 points and ranking second on the team in assists and free throws made.

Sophomore Braylon Williams rounds out Shorter's guard corps after spending his freshman year at Shorter as a jumper on Shorter's national championship track team. The 6-2 athlete from Marietta was a prep hoops standout at Walton High where he averaged more than 10 points and three assists a game.

The small forward position is another area where Shorter feels it has plenty of talent and depth. While Hill will no doubt draw plenty of attention, the Hawks have other weapons to cope with at the three spot in senior Willie Woodard and sophomore Tyler Burse.

Woodard emerged as a key contributor for the Hawks last year averaging 5.7 points and 3.2 rebounds, while Burse averaged 4.1

points as a true freshman and is being counted on to take his game to the next level.

Shorter has plenty of power, muscle and athleticism in the paint this season in the form of senior Jonathan Crawford, junior Dante Harvey and junior transfers Anthony Banks and Devance Harris.

Crawford, a former SSAC Freshman of the Year during his time at Berry College that transferred to Shorter last year from Wallace State (Ala.), provided immediate help for the Hawks in 2010-11 by averaging 8.6 points and five rebounds.

6-foot-8 inside-outside threat and Atlanta native Harvey came to Shorter after playing at Tennessee-Chattanooga and immediately produced, averaging 7.2 points and 3.6 rebounds.

There's little question that Banks and Harris have the tools to contribute right away as both arrive at Shorter after making their mark elsewhere.

A native of Boynton Beach, Fla., the 6-7 Banks will become eligible in December after making the move to Shorter from NCAA Division I Atlantic Sun Conference member Florida Gulf Coast University. There, Banks led the team in scoring (14.6) and rebounding (6.4) in 2010-11.

The closure of Lambuth University this past spring led to the arrival of Harris on Shorter's campus. In what wound up being Lambuth's final season, the 6-7 Memphis native averaged 10.4 points and led the team in rebounding at 7.1 per game.

In addition to the upperclassmen experience, Warner signed four freshmen guards to be a part of Shorter's future.

Rounding out this year's roster are Joe West (Cartersville/Excel Christian), Jay Davis (Huntsville, Ala./Sparkman High), Seth Houston (Bowdon/Oak Mountain Academy) and Matson Keiser (Maxeys/Washington-Wilkes).

"We have talented players returning and have hopefully added talent as well," said Warner. "To this point, this team has been easier to coach than any other team I have coached. This team has personality and a competitive fire that you hope to see when you build a team."

Warner's staff has undergone some changes from last year, but each member brings vast knowledge and a love of the game.

Tyler Murray, who has been beside Warner for the past four years and played for Warner when the Hawks' head coach was at Hampden-Sydney College in Virginia, takes over as Shorter's top assistant.

Richarde McCray, a two-time SSAC All-Conference performer at Faulkner where he helped the Eagles to two national tourney appearances, fills the other assistant coaching position. A former standout at Wheeler High in Marietta, where he was part of back-to-back state title teams, McCray spent the past three seasons as an assistant at Southern Poly.

Former Shorter standout Tyler Watkins, who closed out his career with the Hawks last year, remains involved with the program as a graduate assistant and Charles Warner, Chad's dad who is lovingly referred to by the players as "Coach Pop," reassumes his role as an assistant coach and mentor.

Although the Hawks have a strong and experienced team and coaching staff, Shorter's head coach knows that there is always a

mountain to climb in the form of another rugged SSAC schedule.

Once again as members of the SSAC's East Division, the Hawks will square off twice each against the three teams that were the SSAC's only representatives in last year's national playoffs – division champion Lee, tournament winner Emmanuel and Southern Poly.

If that isn't tough enough, the conference will now recognize the six crossover games between the East and West Divisions as counting to each program's SSAC record.

"The conference has been good every year I've been in it," Warner said. "You've got to be prepared every night. We'll play the same style we've been playing – aggressive and fundamentally sound. If we do that, winning takes care of itself."

So will respect.

HEAD COACH, CHAD WARNER

Rome native Chad Warner returns for his fifth season as Shorter University head men's basketball coach having set a clear course for excellence for the program. In his first four seasons on The Hill, Warner has guided the Hawks to 74 victories, the highest four-year win total for the men's basketball program in 43 years. It is also the first time in that same time span that Shorter has posted four straight seasons of 15 or more wins.

The Hawks enjoyed their most successful campaign so far under Warner in 2010-11, winning 23 games after a school record 10-0 start and wins in 13 of their first 14 games. Shorter climbed as high as No. 12 in the NAIA Top 25 Coaches Poll, the highest ranking ever achieved by the men's basketball program, and the 23 victories were the most for the program since 1997-98.

Warner came to Shorter in 2007-08 and immediately transformed Shorter into a winner. He took a team that went 6-20 the previous season and guided the Hawks to a 19-12 record while helping Shorter advance to the Southern States Athletic Conference Tournament semifinals. The next season, Shorter posted a 10-8 record in SSAC play, good enough for a No. 4 seed and the best SSAC finish in program history.

In four seasons, Warner has coached four NAIA All-Americans, six All-SSAC selections, two SSAC Newcomers of the Year, 17 Academic All-Conference picks and four NAIA Scholar-Athletes. Five of Warner's former players have gone on to sign professional contracts overseas.

Warner came to Shorter from Hampden-Sydney College in Virginia, one of NCAA Division III's most successful basketball

programs, where he served as assistant coach and recruiting coordinator. At Hampden-Sydney, Warner was involved in all aspects of the program, including recruiting, strength and conditioning, scouting and player development.

Warner helped guide the 2006-07 Tigers to the Old Dominion Athletic Conference (ODAC) championship, the school's 10th conference title and seventh in the previous 11 years. That year, Hampden-Sydney advanced to the second round of the NCAA Division III Men's Basketball Championship.

His previous coaching experience includes two years as an assistant coach at The College of William & Mary under accomplished head coach Tony Shaver and a previous stint at Hampden-Sydney in 2003-04, when the team ascended to the national No. 1 ranking and captured another ODAC championship.

Warner spent the 2002-03 season as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, the University of Georgia, under legendary head coach Jim Harrick. He spent the previous four years as associate head basketball coach at the Darlington School in Rome.

Warner graduated from UGA in 1998 with a Bachelor's degree in Public Relations. At Georgia, Warner played basketball for head coach Hugh Durham. In high school at Darlington, Warner was an All-Area and All-State performer on the hardwood while also running track, where he finished second in the state in the 800 meters during his senior year.

Warner and his wife, Karin, have three children, Aly (5), Caroline (4) and Jack (21 months).

HAWKS IN THE PROS

In four seasons as Shorter University head coach, Chad Warner has seen five of his former players sign contracts to play professional basketball overseas. The Hawks have one of the top programs in arguably the best NAIA men's basketball conference in the country and Warner, along with his assistant coaching staff consisting of Tyler Murray and Rich McCray, have a proven track record of identifying and developing top talent.



Marqise Wright

Wright (left) is the latest Shorter men's basketball alumnus to sign a professional contract. A two-time NAIA All-America selection, Wright inked a deal with SCM CSU Craiova of Romanian Basketball Division A following a stellar senior season during which he averaged 15.6 points and 8.7 rebounds a game. He had 10 double-doubles to pace the Hawks and posted career-highs in field goal percentage (46 percent), free throw percentage (76 percent) and three-point percentage (33 percent). Wright's career with the Hawks was one of the best the program has ever seen. He departed Shorter with 930 points and 617 rebounds in just two seasons. He averaged a double-double of 15 points and 10 rebounds for his career and set a new Shorter record with 29 career double-doubles. In his first year with the Hawks in 2009-10, Wright captured SSAC Newcomer of the Year honors after posting 19 double-doubles and leading the country in rebounding.



Jerrenda Wheeler

Wheeler (right), a native of Gainesville, Ga., signed a professional deal with BK Inter Bratislava of the Slovakian Extraliga -- the country's top league -- after averaging 14 points and six assists for the Hawks during the 2009-10 season. The 6-foot-2 combo guard averaged over 18 points, four rebounds and four assists per game in his first season with the club before injury spelled a premature end to his rookie season. Wheeler made the most of his opportunity, especially during Inter's 89-88 win over Komarno when he poured in a season-high 31 points in 38 minutes.



Tomas Pranciliauskas

A former All-American for the Hawks in 2007-08 and a two-time SSAC All-Conference selection, Pranciliauskas (left) returned to his native Vilnius, Lithuania to lace up for Sakalai Vilnius. Pranciliauskas, who transferred to Shorter after two years at Pepperdine University, scored in double figures five times for his professional club, including a season-high 21 points with the help of 4 of 4 shooting from beyond the arc in a win over Suduva. At Shorter, Pranciliauskas averaged 14.9 points in two seasons and was a career 39 percent three-point shooter. He also shot 88 percent from the foul line for his career while his free throw percentage of 94.9 percent (112-118) in 2007-08 is a Shorter single-season record.



Qavotstaraj Waddell

The 6-foot-11 Waddell (above) signed to play professional ball in Romania after ending his career with the Hawks. Waddell, who transferred to Shorter from the University of Tennessee-Chattanooga for his senior season in 2008-09, averaged nearly eight points and eight rebounds per game to go along with 2.3 blocks per outing.



Mantas Leonavicius

Leonavicius (above), who came to Shorter from Hofstra University, continued his basketball career in Italy with Basket San Vincenzo. In his first season with the club, Leonavicius, an SSAC All-Academic selection, averaged just under eight points and nine rebounds.

2010-11 REVIEW



Chad Warner

- Fourth-year head coach Chad Warner and the Basketball Hawks produced the first 20-win season since 1997-98, going 23-8 in 2010-11 to match Shorter's highest single-season victory total in 45 years.

- The Hawks' upward trend on the hardwood continued -- since Chad Warner arrived in 2007, Shorter has won 74 games, the most wins over a four-season span in 44 years when Shorter won 94 games from the 1963-64 campaign through 1966-67.

- Shorter raced out to the best start in the program's history, winning its first 10 games to open the season and emerging victorious in 13 of its first 14 outings. The Hawks were rewarded for their strong early season play, appearing as high as No. 12 in the country and remaining in the NAIA Top 25 Coaches' Poll for most of the season. Shorter ended the year receiving votes and the No. 12 ranking was Shorter's highest ever.

- Shorter swept cross-town rival Berry College for the first time since the 2006-07 season. The Hawks won 62-58 at Berry and 72-63 at the Winthrop-King Centre.

- The Hawks established themselves as one of the most complete teams in the country, combining a potent offense with a stingy defense. Shorter ranked No. 14 in field goal percentage defense, holding opponents to 40 percent shooting, and despite being relatively undersized, ranked 16th in the NAIA in blocked shots at just over 3.8 per game. The Hawks also rebounded the ball very well, pulling down 28.2 defensive rebounds per game to rank 10th in the country. On the offensive end, Shorter up-tempo, read and react offense paid dividends as the Hawks ranked 11th in the assists per game (16.2) and 21st in scoring offense (78.9). A guard-oriented team, Shorter shot an impressive 46 percent from the floor as a unit to rank 32nd in the NAIA.

There was no better 1-2 punch in the SSAC than Shorter's Gainesville, Ga., Connection of senior **Marqise Wright** (above left) and sophomore **Walter Hill** (above right). The childhood friends teamed up give the Hawks a potent inside-outside threat that produced 33.1 points and 16.3 rebounds a night. Wright, the nation's leading rebounder as a junior in 2009-10, picked up his second straight All-America nod by averaging 15.6 points and 8.7 boards per game. He finished his career averaging a double-double of 15.2 points and 10.1 rebounds. In his first season with the Hawks, Hill garnered SSAC Newcomer of the Year accolades -- a distinction won by Wright the previous year -- and NAIA All-America honors by leading the Hawks in scoring (17.5 ppg) while collecting 7.6 caroms per outing.

- The Hawks tested themselves against the best the country had to offer. Shorter recorded three wins over Top 25 opponents in Lee, Southern Poly and perennial Mid-South Conference power University of the Cumberlands. The Hawks led second-ranked Georgetown College by seven on the road in the second half before falling by two to the Tigers, a Fab Four participant in 2010-11. Of Shorter’s eight losses, five came against ranked opponents.

- Sophomore Walter Hill was named SSAC Newcomer of the Year after he led Shorter in scoring at 17.5 points a game, reached double figures in 27 of his 29 appearances, posted seven double-doubles, shot 52 percent from the floor and led the Hawks defensively with 1.7 steals per game.

- The Hawks were recognized at the conclusion of the 2010-11 season for their scholarship off the court in the form of sophomore Justin Gentry, junior Darius Steger and senior Tyler Watkins, a trio that earned SSAC All-Academic honors. Gentry and Watkins were recognized as NAIA Scholar-Athletes as they finished the academic year with cumulative grade point averages of 3.5 or better. Both Gentry, who made nine appearances in 2010-11, and Steger, who averaged 5.1 points a game and shot 33 percent from the 3-point line in 31 appearances last season, are set to return to the team in 2011-12. Watkins, who graduated in May with a degree in Sports Management after playing in 48 games in two seasons with Shorter, will become a graduate assistant coach with the Hawks.



Junior point guard Eric Nix led the Southern States Athletic Conference and ranked No. 2 in the country in assists per game.
