

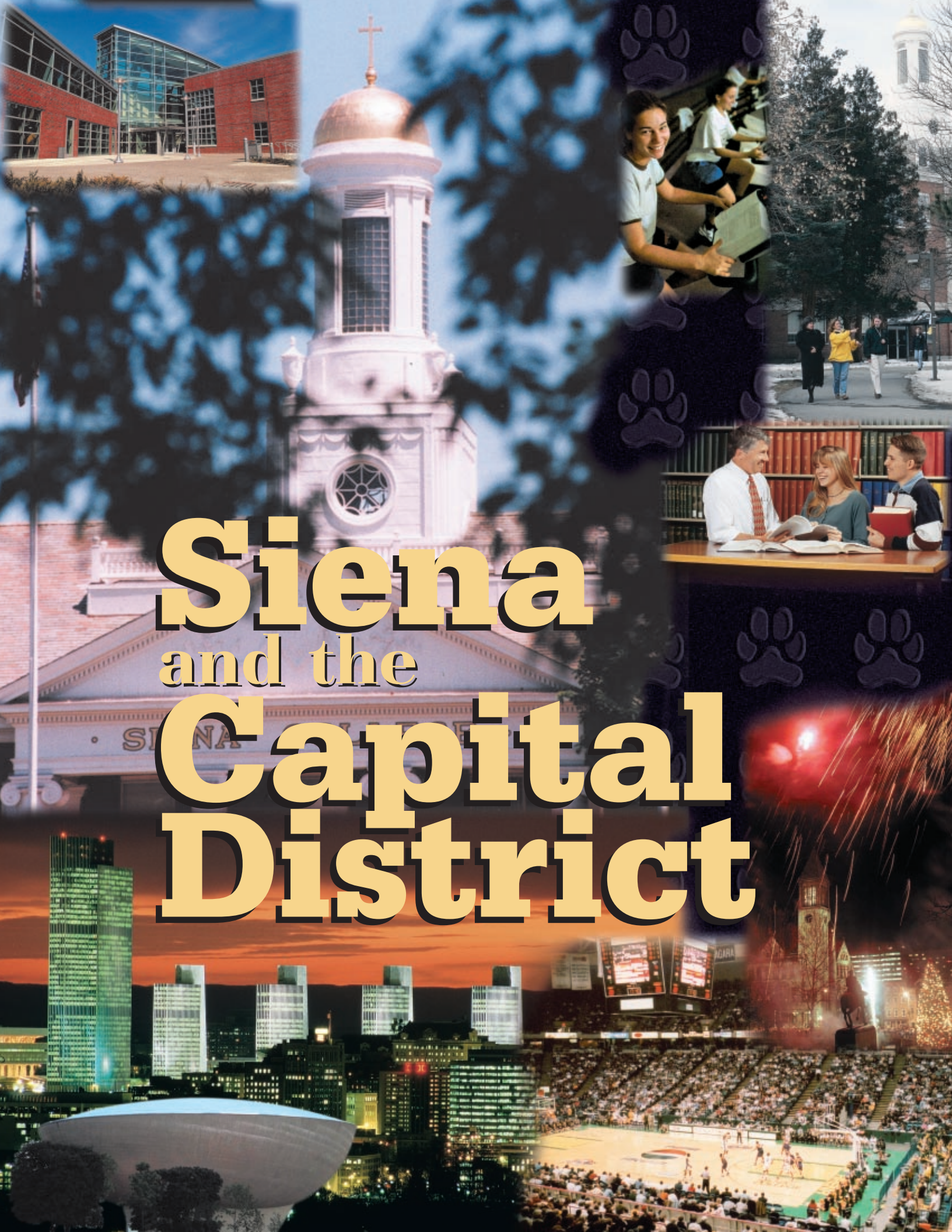

Under the supervision of Sports Information Director Jason Rich and Assistant Sports Information Director Jennifer Valore, the Siena Sports Information Office strives to serve as the intermediary between Saints' athletics, the media and the general public in the most cooperative and professional manner possible.

## Credentials

Outlets holding credentials for the 2002 Siena College home football season need only contact the Siena Sports Information Office via telephone to renew for 2003.

First-time requests should be made in writing on appropriate letterhead as soon as possible, but no later than three days before the desired game. The sports information director reserves the right to deny requests made past that time restraint. If the request is received early enough, passes will be mailed.

Direct correspondence to Jason Rich, Sports Information Director, Marcelle Athletic Complex, 515 Loudon Road, Loudonville, N.Y. 12211-1462.

Every effort will be made to mail credentials, so wading through the "will call" line on game-day can be avoided.

## Mid-Week Practices

Generally, the Saints practice from 4-6 p.m., Monday through Friday. All practices are open to the media. Players and coaches are usually available for brief interviews after practice.

## Mid-Week Interviews

Siena College head coach Jay Bateman asks that all interview requests with coaches and student-athletes be channeled through the sports information office for the convenience of all.

Interviews will not be arranged the day prior to the game or on gameday (until after the game). No interviews will take place during scheduled practice, study hall or class time.

## Interviews with Jay Bateman

The best time to reach Jay Bateman is between 8 a.m. and noon. All interviews must be channeled through Sports Information Director Jason Rich.

## Road Game Credentials

Requests for credentials to Siena road games should be made through the sports information office of the host school. Jason Rich should also be notified of your travel intentions in order to confirm credential requests with opponent sports information directors.

## Christian Brothers Academy Press Box

The press box at CBA is located on the sideline opposite the opposing team bench. The press box phone is 518-542-7240.

## Will Call

"Will Call" for Siena home football games is located at the main ticket gate at CBA. It opens one hour before kickoff.

## Press Box Services

The Siena College sports information office will provide all statistical information in the Saints' press box.

A game program, along with statistics and pre-game notes, will be provided before the start of each game.

The normal play-by-play account, half-time statistics and final statistics will be distributed.

## Photographers

Sideline access is restricted to working photographers from media outlets according to NCAA rules.

Photographers are asked to stay along the sideline and must display both their credentials, as well as their gameday pass. Photographers not displaying credentials will be asked to leave the field area.

## Postgame Interviews

Interviews with head coach Jay Bateman and requested student-athletes will take place outside the Siena locker room or on the field. Interviews will take place after a brief "cooling off" period following the conclusion of the game. Those seeking interviews with the opposing coach and student-athletes should contact the visiting sports information director.

## Telephones

Phones will be made available for media use inside CBA. All telephones are for credit card or collect calls only. In addition, pay phones are located in the CBA lobby.

## Radio Coverage

Robert Lee will call the play-by-play for the Saints for the fourth consecutive fall. Lee, a 1999 graduate of Syracuse University, also handles the Siena men's basketball play-by-play duties in the winter. All games will be broadcast on Today's Hit Music 88.3 The Saint as well as SienaSaints.com.

## The Value of a Core Curriculum

The Core Curriculum at Siena

- Foundations Sequence 1 and 2
- Disciplinary Requirements (six courses, 18 credits):

Students are required to complete:

**English:** Literary Perspectives

**History:** The Shaping of the Contemporary World

**Philosophy:** Philosophy and the Human Being

**Religious Studies:** One class chosen from: Religion and Western Culture, Introduction to Biblical Studies, Experience of the Sacred or An Introduction to Religious Thought.

- Creative Arts: (1 course, 3 credits): One course from Art, Music or Drama
- Area Requirements (two courses, six credits)

Students also must choose two or more courses from the above four areas; the two courses must be from different areas.

- Social Science Perspectives (2 courses, six credits): Two courses drawn from the areas of Economics, Political Science, Psychology or Sociology.
- Natural World and Quantitative Reasoning (3 courses, 9-12 credits, depending on number of course): At least one course chosen must be from the natural sciences, and at least one course must be from the quantitative reasoning fields.

Natural World courses are drawn from the areas of Biology, Chemistry, Physics, or Environmental Science. Quantitative Reasoning courses are chosen from the areas of Mathematics or Quantitative Business Analysis.

# Siena College Administration

## Fr. Kevin E. Mackin, O.F.M.

Fr. Kevin E. Mackin, O.F.M., is beginning his eighth year as the ninth president of Siena College.

A member of the Franciscans of Holy Name Province, he came to Siena from New York City. He has held several executive positions with the friars, including member of the Board of Directors, education chairman, director of Development and Public Relations and director of St. Anthony's Guild. He also served as president-rector of Christ the King Seminary in Western New York.

He previously served at Siena College from 1970-82 as assistant and associate professor of religious studies, as chair of the department for two years, and as guardian of the friary.

Fr. Mackin has studied and lectured on a variety of topics, including the Bible, Jesus and the Gospels, Christian theology, and contemporary Catholic and Protestant thought. His writings include the book *In Search of the Authentic Christian Tradition*.

He earned a bachelor's degree from St. Bonaventure University in 1960, and a master's degree in history from Siena College in 1967. He also holds four degrees from the Catholic University of America, including a doctorate in theology.

He has extended his religious and professional education at the Instituto Mexicano Norteamericano in Mexico City, Laval University in Quebec City, Georgetown University in Washington, D.C., the National Society of Fundraising Executives, Indiana University Center of Philanthropy, the Institute of Charitable Giving and the Harvard Institutes of Higher Education. He has chaired reaccreditation teams for the Middle States Commission on Higher Education, and was a member of papal visitation teams of seminaries in the United States.

Fr. Mackin is affiliated with several professional organizations, including the Catholic Theological Society of America, Council for the Advancement and Support of Education, National Society of Fundraising Executives, and International Who's Who of Professionals.

He also shepherds Siena's membership in the Association of Catholic Colleges and Universities, the Association of Franciscan Colleges and Universities, the Albany-Colonie Chamber of Commerce, the Association of Governing Boards of Colleges & Universities, Center for Economic Growth, Commission on Independent Colleges & Universities, Hudson Mohawk Association of Colleges & Universities, and other associations.



## Fr. James Toal, O.F.M.

Fr. James Toal, O.F.M., enters his seventh year at Siena as vice president/office of the president, after serving as president of Quincy University in Quincy, Ill. for 14 years.

As vice president, Fr. James is responsible for assisting Fr. Kevin with college operational matters, coordinating special projects of the college, as well as overseeing Siena's department of athletics. Under his leadership, the College has made an increased commitment to athletics each of the past six years.

While at Quincy, Fr. James' leadership was integral in the acquisition of major funding from the Ameritech Foundation, the initiation of gradu-



ate programs in business administration and education, and the renovations and additions to the school's North and Main Campuses. The grant money received from the Ameritech Foundation enabled Quincy to create the Ameritech Center for Communications, enhancing the University's integrated writing program.

Prior to his position at Quincy, Fr. James served as executive vice president at St. Bonaventure University from 1976-83. While at St. Bonaventure, Fr. James was active on several committees, chairing the University Finance Committee, the Long-Range Planning Team and the Athletic Advisory Committee.

A native of New York, N.Y., Fr. James received a bachelor's degree in English from St. Francis College in Brooklyn in 1956. He moved on to earn his master's in English from St. John's in 1966 and a Ph.D. in college administration and supervision from Fordham University in 1976. Fr. James was ordained to the Franciscan priesthood in 1975.

## John D'Argenio

John D'Argenio was appointed director of athletics on April 21, 1993, after serving as the acting director of athletics for the 1992-93 academic year. In the nine years many new initiatives have been set forth and much progress has been made in the athletic department.

The department's first academic advising office was created and a full-time advisor was hired to work with all of Siena's student-athletes. The academic office has been responsible for implementing a tutoring program, developing educational programming and producing a student-athlete population whose combined grade-point average is higher than that of the general student body. In recent years, Siena's student-athlete graduation rate has ranked among the best in the country.

As part of the college's efforts to address gender equity, the women's sports programs have expanded immensely in the last decade. With the addition of golf, women's swimming and diving, women's water polo and the elevation of lacrosse from club to varsity status, Siena now sponsors 11 Division I women's sports.

In the past nine years, Siena has also made major strides in the marketing of its programs. An active corporate partners program has emerged on the heels of the recent decision to move all of Siena's home men's basketball games to the Pepsi Arena. The move to the state-of-the-art downtown Albany facility culminated in Siena and the Arena signing a five-year contract and most recently a four-year extension. Since the move, both the men's and women's basketball programs have seen their attendances soar to the top-80 nationally.

Athletic Development has increased over the past eight years as well. Saints Alive!, the department's athletic development organization, was initiated in 1998 to formalize and bring structure to the department's fund raising efforts and its membership has grown each year since. Over a quarter of a million



dollars is raised annually and distributed directly to services that benefit the College's student-athletes.

Siena teams have enjoyed conference-wide as well as regional and national success. In 1994 the men's basketball team made a memorable run through the National Invitation Tournament, ending with a trip to Madison Square Garden to play in that Tournament's final round. The Saints made their third NCAA Tournament appearance in

2002, marching off with an opening round victory. The women's basketball team has captured six regular-season Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference titles and in 2001 advanced to its first NCAA Tournament in Nashville, Tenn. Siena has registered four MAAC volleyball championships and the 1995 squad became just the second Siena team to earn a trip to the NCAA championship tournament. Baseball has excelled as well, capturing four MAAC Championships and advancing to the 1999 NCAA Regionals. The women's soccer program turned in a sensational 2001 season finishing as the eighth most improved team in the nation.

In 1995, D'Argenio served as Tournament Director for the 1995 NCAA Men's Basketball Championship First and Second Rounds at the then-Knickerbocker Arena. He again assumed those duties this past March, as Siena served as the host institution for the 2003 men's basketball East regional at Pepsi Arena after co-hosting the NCAA wrestling National Championships in March of 2002. The Saints have hosted numerous NIT and Women's NIT games as well, including a remarkable six this past season.

Prior to his appointment to director of athletics, D'Argenio served as Siena's sports information director from 1985-1992.

D'Argenio earned a bachelor of arts degree from the University of Dayton in 1982 and a master's of science degree from North Dakota State University in 1985. He is a native of Rome, N.Y.

## HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER

### Greg Dashnaw

enters his 19th year as head athletic trainer at Siena College. He is responsible for the prevention, treatment, and rehabilitation of injuries to Siena's athletes. Dashnaw is responsible for 19 intercollegiate athletic teams and approximately 400 athletes.

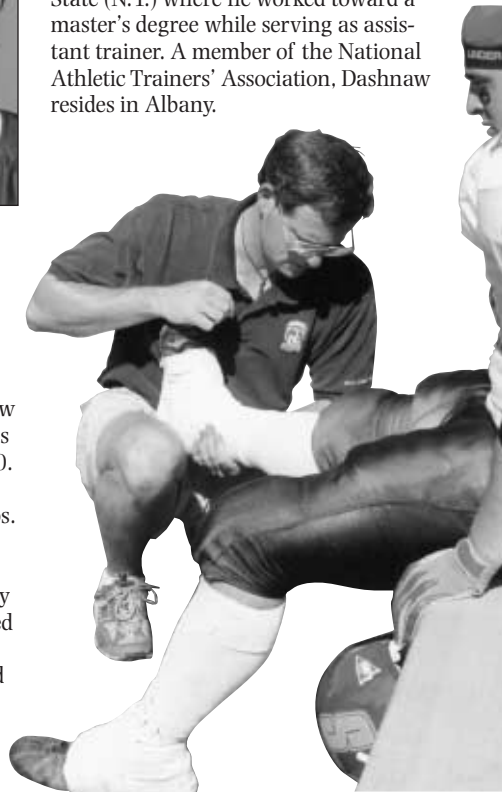


He has helped the Albany Patroons (Continental Basketball Association) and Albany Capitals (American Soccer League) in the training and treatment of their athletes. He also served on the medical support staff at the Empire State Games from 1980-1990. Dashnaw also served as a trainer for the Albany Firebirds of the Arena Football League from 1995-2000.

During the summer, Dashnaw serves as the head athletic trainer for the Siena sports camps. The camps, which run for eight weeks, attract over 2,000 campers.

Four year's ago, Dashnaw was recognized by Siena's student-athletes, when he was presented with the initial Student Athlete Advisory Committee award. This distinction is presented to the person, who in the opinion of the student-athletes has had the most positive impact on their athletic life at Siena.

A Harrisville, N.Y. native, Dashnaw was the first recipient of the Howard J. Tucker Award for outstanding contribution to Siena basketball. He received an undergraduate degree from Plattsburgh State in 1981. At Plattsburgh, he served as student trainer for varsity sports. From Plattsburgh, Dashnaw went to Albany State (N.Y.) where he worked toward a master's degree while serving as assistant trainer. A member of the National Athletic Trainers' Association, Dashnaw resides in Albany.



## ATHLETIC ACADEMIC ADVISOR

### Michelle Bronner

begins her third year as athletic academic advisor at Siena.

As athletic academic advisor, Bronner is responsible for an array of tasks related to the educational development of Siena's student-athletes.

In that capacity, she monitors the academic progress and eligibility of all student-athletes, conducts study hall and provides any support services (ie. tutoring, laptops, etc.) student-athletes may need.

Bronner has also been actively involved in the NCAA's Champs/Lifeskills program, bringing in guest speakers to address pertinent issues, as well as setting up class opportunities for personal and career development. She also serves as the supervisor of Siena's Student Athlete Advisory Committee.

This year, Bronner will look to get the S.A.I.N.T.S. (Supporting athletes in their success) program off the ground, an initiative intended to promote academic, athletic and social success among Siena's 400+ student-athletes.

For the two years prior to her coming to Siena, Bronner worked with student-athletes at the University of Tennessee. In that capacity, she tutored students in English, history and political

science and became acquainted with the NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills program, among other duties. Bronner also worked as a graduate teaching assistant in the physical education department and volunteered her time as an assistant softball coach while in Knoxville. A 1992 graduate of the State University of New York at New Paltz, Bronner received a bachelor of arts degree in secondary education. She began her academic career at the United States Military Academy at West Point and recently completed her master's degree in human performance and exercise science from the University of Tennessee.



## SPORTS INFORMATION DIRECTOR

### Jason Rich

enters his fifth year as the Siena College sports information director.

Rich served as the marketing/sports information assistant prior to his promotion in November 1999. He oversees all publications and promotional efforts of Siena's 19 Division I varsity sports. Rich also serves as the chief editor for all athletic publications and media releases while handling the maintenance of the department's website.

A 1998 graduate of Siena with a degree in finance and concentrations in English and marketing/management, Rich studied overseas at Oxford (UK) the summer following his junior year, where he earned certificates in international com-



merce and the European Union. He began his career in athletics as an undergraduate intern with the Siena baseball team. Upon graduation, he accepted an internship with the Albany-Colonie Diamond Dogs of the Northern League where he handled many of the media relations responsibilities.

In 2001, Rich was recognized for his dedication to the department by Siena's student-athletes, when he was presented with the Student Athlete Advisory Committee award.

An active member of both CoSIDA (College Sports Information Directors of America) and ECAC-SIDA (East Coast Athletic Conference), Rich served on the 2001 ECAC-SIDA

Workshop Organizing Committee and is a member of the 2003-2004 CoSIDA Ethics Committee.

A native of New Hartford, N.Y., Rich currently resides in Watervliet.

# Support Staff



## STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COACH

### Justin Livizey

is in his second year as the strength and conditioning coach at Siena College. Livizey graduated from West Chester University (Pa.) with a degree in health and fitness education (kinesiology). Upon earning his degree, he accepted a strength and conditioning internship with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, where among other responsibilities, he implemented one-on-one strength programs for each athlete.



Shortly after he completed the one-year internship in January of 2000, Livizey was appointed as the head strength and conditioning coach for the St. Petersburg Devil Rays—Tampa Bay's Single-A minor league franchise. In that capacity, he oversaw all conditioning manors for each athlete, traveling with the team on road trips.

Following the season, Livizey began his collegiate sports coaching career, accepting an assistant strength and conditioning coaching job at Villanova University. With the Wildcats, Livizey was the primary strength coach for baseball, field hockey, women's soccer and women's volleyball, while also assisting in each of Villanova's other 18 varsity sports programs. He remained at Villanova for just over two years, resigning his position after being offered the job at Siena.

"Justin brings a great amount of experience and energy to the important position of strength and conditioning coach," Athletic Director John D'Argenio noted. "Each of our 19 sports teams rely on the position immensely for the physical development of each student-athlete, and we are confident Justin is up to the task."

# Head Coach

## Jay Bateman



Jay Bateman was named the 10th football coach of the Siena football program on April 25, 2000. At age 30, he is the youngest head coach at any level of college football.

Bateman came to Siena in April of 1999 from Hampden-Sydney College in Virginia, where he served as an assistant coach in 1998. He was responsible for the linebackers and defensive line during his time with the Tigers. Bateman also served as the head strength coach and recruiting coordinator for the football program.

"Coaching Division I football has always been a dream of mine, and I am very happy to have the opportunity so early in my career," said Bateman upon accepting the head coaching position at Siena. "The student-athletes at Siena are hard-working and goal-oriented, and I feel privileged to have the opportunity to

develop them as football players and as people."

One thing Bateman brings to the program is dedication and commitment. He is a proven recruiter and has already brought in three of the school's most heralded classes in this, his fourth year.

A 1995 graduate of Randolph-Macon College in Richmond, Va., Bateman began his professional career as an assistant coach at Benedictine High School in Richmond before taking a spot as a graduate assistant coach at Hampden-Sydney in 1997.

Bateman, who earned a bachelor's degree in political science, played linebacker at Randolph-Macon. As a senior, he served as the team's captain and was named a second-team Division III All-American. In addition, he was a three-year starter and twice earned All-Conference honors.

As defensive coordinator at Siena in 1999, Bateman's defense ranked 11th in Division I-AA in total defense. Last year, the Saints ranked 8th in the nation under his direction.

This season, he will look to an improved offensive unit to lead the Saints climb up the MAAC ladder.

Bateman, and his wife, Heather, live in Troy.

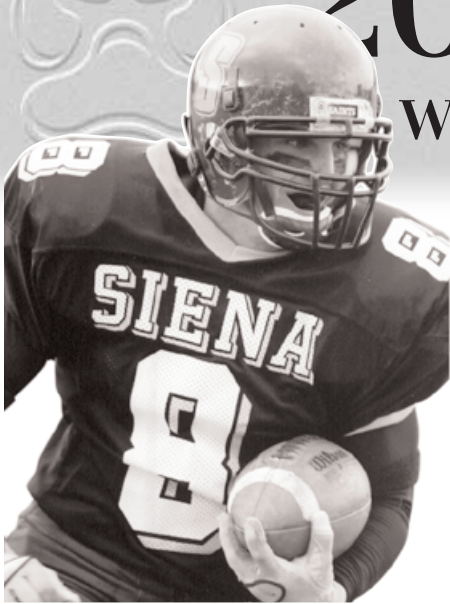

# 2003 Outlook

## What's going to make this year different?



Head Coach Jay Bateman has heard this question buzz around Siena's Loudonville campus since his arrival. When you inherit a team that has managed just one winning season in the 10 years prior to your arrival, it's natural to expect some skepticism. Bateman, however, has taken the right approach. Rome, he knows, wasn't built in a day.

"We are committed to build a successful program here, and that takes time," Bateman notes. "Each year we have been dedicated to improving, and I'm confident we're on the right path."

In fact, the Saints have made some major strides in Bateman's three years at the helm, including a 2002 campaign in which they tripled their win total and vaulted to a sixth place finish in the Metro Atlantic

Athletic Conference Football League (MAACFL) with their most conference victories in five years. Now the table is set for the next jump to be made.

Bateman and staff have a team consisting entirely of their own recruits for the first time and standout veterans (including perhaps the best defensive player in the league) at several key positions. In turn, people are starting to take notice of the progress that's been made.

"We have played a lot of catch-up the past few seasons," Bateman says. "Now, I believe we are ready to make some noise. It's difficult to teach a winning mindset to players who haven't had much success in the past, but now we have a frame of reference as to how good we need to be. The kids realize we have been knocking on the door the past couple of seasons and now they have the urge to break that door down."

Maybe it's this optimistic mindset that will make this season different. Or, perhaps the vastly improved talent of the student-athletes coming to play football at Siena will make the difference. One thing is certain. There's a new buzz circulating New York's Capital Region this off-season and a new question is being asked. Many are beginning to wonder: Just how good can this Siena football team be?

### Defense

For the past two seasons, the answer to that question has resided squarely on the shoulders of senior linebacker **Dan Smacchia**. Smacchia, a two-time I-AA All-American as

selected by *Don Hansen's Football Gazette*, anchors the stringent Siena defense from his middle linebacker post. Coming off back-to-back 100+ tackle seasons, Smacchia will again look to lead the Siena defense to the top of the I-AA ranks (the Saints finished eighth nationally a year ago).

"Dan may be the best defender in our league," Bateman claims. "He is a sure tackler with great instincts and as tough a player as you will find at our level."

**Terrance Kehayas**, who finished second on the squad with 67 takedowns last season will flank Smacchia at one linebacker spot. Kehayas bulked up in the off-season and emerged as one of the team's hardest workers in this, his penultimate season with the Green and Gold.

The other linebacker spot is wide open as the Saints look to replace last year's captain Steve Graziano. It will be a difficult task to find a worthy predecessor, as Graziano was among the team's leading tacklers in each of his final three seasons. **John Maes** saw some quality time last season and figures to have the best chance to get the opening day call. Anticipating Graziano's departure and preparing for Smacchia's graduation, the coaching staff focused its recruiting efforts in this area and is confident in the abilities of several rookie linebackers. The recruits will test a talented core of returnees in an attempt to solidify the deepest part of the Siena team.

The unit up front also figures to be solid, if not as deep. Second Team All-MAACFL and honorable mention Don Hansen All-American **Ed Pietrowski** again is the main worry for opposing offensive coordinators. The senior tallied 50 tackles and a team-high six sacks a year ago, and is widely considered among the elite linemen in

the MAACFL. Classmate **Ray Toohey**, considered to be the strongest member of the 2003 Saints, joins Pietrowski on the line. Bateman bestowed the captain title upon Toohey, who will be called upon for leadership on and off the field when camp breaks. **Mike Miller** and **Marc Perez** saw action last season

and again could be among those fighting for one of the four starting spots.

The Saints return nearly their entire secondary as well, where senior **Khalid Rice** seems in full strength. Rice could make the most noticeable difference on the Siena defense, as he figures to match up with the opposition's top receiver each week. Despite playing in just three games last year, he again led the squad in interceptions, thanks in

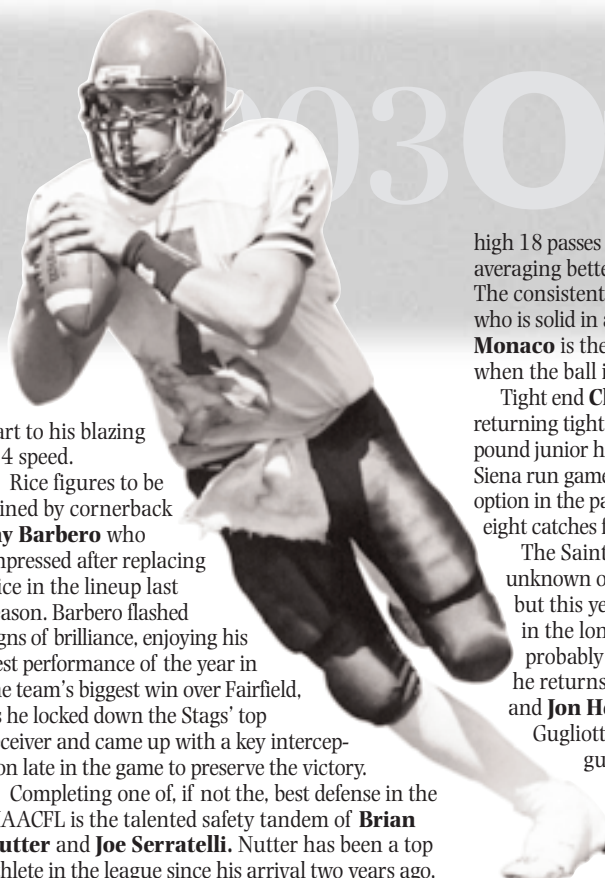

part to his blazing 4.4 speed.

Rice figures to be joined by cornerback **Jay Barbero** who impressed after replacing Rice in the lineup last season. Barbero flashed signs of brilliance, enjoying his best performance of the year in the team's biggest win over Fairfield, as he locked down the Stags' top receiver and came up with a key interception late in the game to preserve the victory.

Completing one of, if not the, best defense in the MAACFL is the talented safety tandem of **Brian Nutter** and **Joe Serratelli**. Nutter has been a top athlete in the league since his arrival two years ago, and now is beginning to parlay his natural abilities with a solid understanding of his position. Serratelli exploded onto the scene last season as a freshman, finishing fourth on the team with 63 stops and second in sacks (4.5), interceptions (2), pass break-ups (6) and solo tackles (32).

Consistency has been the key word on this side of the ball since Bateman's arrival, and the program's increased success has relied on its solid defensive foundation. Frustrations have abounded on offense, however, where the Saints have struggled to move the football.

## Offense

Senior **Christian Karolus** has started the last three seasons as the Saints' signal caller and will likely get the opening day nod behind center. Karolus averaged 81 yards through the air and 21 on the ground per game last season, and has the size and experience to navigate the Siena offense efficiently. He figures to be tested by two highly touted recruits. **Jon Logan** transfers in from Army after a stellar pre-college career at O'Neil High School and **Alex Conlon** was a First Team All-State selection at St. Anthony's in Long Island.

If the Siena offense had a bright spot last season, it was the arrival of a pair of talented tailbacks who gained valuable experience as true freshmen in the backfield. **Pat Heenan** led the Saints with 318 yards rushing, including an 81-yard, two-touchdown performance at LaSalle. **Sal Jeraci** checked in second with 268 yards from scrimmage (3.5/carry) on the season. Heenan is an undersized yet shifty runner, who explodes between the tackles. Jeraci, who garnered MAAC Rookie of the Week honors after scoring the game-winning touchdown in the St. John's win, is more of a power runner. The duo combine to form a formidable young presence for years to come in the run-oriented Siena offense.

When the Saints do go to the air, senior **Pat McCormack** has been on the backend of the majority of pass plays. McCormack reeled in a team-

high 18 passes for 203 yards (11.3/game) last season averaging better than 20 yards receiving per game. The consistent receiver is a precision route runner who is solid in all aspects of the game. Senior **James Monaco** is the likely choice to flank McCormack when the ball is first snapped this fall.

Tight end **Charles Reese** is perhaps the best returning tight end in the MAACFL. The 6-4, 230-pound junior has the size to secure the corner for the Siena run game and the dexterity to act as a primary option in the passing game. Last season, Reese had eight catches for 106 yards and a touchdown.

The Saints begin play with a relatively unknown offensive line. Three starters are gone, but this year's corps may have more potential in the long run. Junior **Tony Sakellariou** is probably the best of the bunch up front and he returns with classmates **Nicolas Gugliotti** and **Jon Hernandez**. The 6-5, 310-pound Gugliotti shifts from tackle to his natural guard position where he figures to be more effective. **Jim Olivetto** crossed the trenches in spring ball and was effective enough to secure the coaching staff's confidence in his ability to land one of the starting spots. He will couple with junior **Daniel Foppiano** to provide a measure of veteran leadership to the front quintet.

Time will again dictate whether sufficient progress has been on offense as the Saints need to be much more productive with the football should they continue their steady improvement. The injection of some new blood and new direction may just be enough to spark the Siena offense.

## Special Teams

An area of surprising content for Siena followers last season, appears in good form as camp breaks. Place kickers **Charles Conklin** and **Andrew**



**Mangini** return and will again vie for the starting job. Conklin has been the starter the last two seasons and he figures to have the opening day edge after converting five of his eight attempts (including a 41-yarder in the week 3 win at Canisius) last season.

Rice will again handle the majority of the return duties for the Green and Gold, where his speed can change the momentum of a game in an instant.

## Schedule

Siena kicks off the 2003 campaign on September 6 with a 7 p.m. home game against Iona. The Saints travel to Stony Brook and Marist the following two weeks before returning to host Central Connecticut on September 27. October's lone road contest—a date at three-time defending champion Duquesne precedes a unique five-game home stand featuring Sacred Heart, Wagner, Saint Peter's, St. Anselm and LaSalle from October 11-November 8.

"Obviously, the schedule is as ambitious as any we have played at Siena," Bateman said. "We lost three members of the MAAC Football League in the off-season, and have replaced them with I-AA powers (Central Connecticut, Stony Brook and Florida Atlantic). These games will have us well-prepared for the opposition we will face in our league."

# The MAAC Football League



In January 1993, the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference took a bold step forward, taking six schools with strong traditions in Division III football to form the nation's newest Division I-AA conference, the MAAC Football League.

Six schools—Canisius College, Georgetown University, Iona College, St. John's University, Saint Peter's College and Siena College—were the original members of the league, which commenced play in September 1993. Duquesne University and Marist College were granted membership in June 1993 and began league action in September 1994. Fairfield University, which fielded a varsity team for the first time, joined the League in the fall of 1996 and eight years after its inception the MAAC Football League shows no signs of slowing down. The league expanded again in June 1998 when it was announced that La Salle University would be joining the MAAC Football League for the 1999 season. Now, as the league celebrates its 10th anniversary, the conference includes charter members Iona, Saint Peter's and Siena along with Duquesne, La Salle and Marist.

With NCAA reclassification looming, the MAAC brought together these schools that were similar in both academic and athletic philosophy. The MAAC Football League is a Division I-AA conference, there are no athletic scholarships, just need-based financial aid, much like the Ivy League and Patriot League.

The concept of this type of league has become a model for other I-AA programs—highly competitive football without massive spending. All the MAAC members, save La Salle, enjoyed a solid tradition in Division III football, and have all made a smooth transition to the I-AA ranks.

Speaking of tradition, these schools have enjoyed long and storied histories, but there were many additional positives to come out of the first nine years of the MAAC Football League. These include:

- Great competitive balance within the league, as five different teams have captured the MAAC Championship Trophy in the first nine years—Iona in 1993, Marist in 1994, Duquesne in 1995, 1996, 1999, 2000, 2001 and 2002, Georgetown in 1997 and Fairfield in 1998.
- St. John's and Duquesne won the ECAC Intercollegiate Football Conference Bowl Game in 1994 and 1995, respectively, as both finished with sterling 10-1 records and the top spot nationally in Don Hansen's non-scholarship I-AA poll.
- Former Siena College standout Reggie Greene concluded his career in 1997 as Division I-AA's all-time leading rusher with

5,415 yards. His ground-gaining total ranks among the top 10 all-time in Division I annals behind the likes of Heisman Trophy winners Tony Dorsett, Charles White, Ricky Williams and Ron Dayne. Additionally, Greene was a three-time Associated Press All-America



Siena has been a member of the MAAC since the 1989-90 academic year.

In 1993, the Saints became charter members of the first-year MAAC Football League.

Former Siena standout Reggie Greene concluded his career in 1997 as Division I-AA's all-time leading rusher with 5,415 yards. His ground-gaining total ranks in the top-10 all-time in Division I annals behind Heisman Trophy winners Tony Dorsett, Charles White, Ron Dayne and Ricky Williams, as well as Division I-AA standout Jerry Azumah.

selection and was the recipient of The Sports Network and Walter Camp Football Foundation Career Achievement Awards.

- Numerous other individual post-season honors, including first-team honors on the GTE Academic All-America team for Anthony Russo of St. John's, who as one of the leading rushers in NCAA history, also earned the prestigious National Football Foundation postgraduate scholarship. Georgetown's Steve Iorio has also been named to the GTE Academic All-America team during his career. A number of other student-athletes have earned district honors on the Verizon Academic All-America team. Canisius' Aaron Fix became the first MAAC player to gain first-team honors on The Sports Network I-AA All-America team. In the fall of 2000, Fairfield University defensive back Steve Dogmanits earned a spot on the Associated



Press Division I-AA All-America squad.

MAAC Commissioner Richard J. Ensor states, "The MAAC Football League is a well-established success story, combining quality academics and athletic competition. This success has been developed in a need-based environment that includes prohibition of athletic financial aid in any form to the student-athletes. The athletes compete because of their affinity for the game and this leads to close competitive contests every weekend."

Ensor also says, "Additionally, football is helping the overall marketing effort of the MAAC. We have a very competitive league which stresses academic, as well as athletic, achievement."

The MAAC, which moved into its new headquarters in Edison, New Jersey in May 2000, has four primary officers other than Ensor, who was named Commissioner in August 1988. In the 2002-2003 academic year, the President of the MAAC is Dr. Dennis Murray, the President of Marist College. The Vice President will be Dr. Mordechai Rozanski, the President of Rider University. John D'Argenio, Siena College Director of Athletics, chairs the Committee on Athletic Administration while Juli Peterson, Assistant Athletics Director for Compliance and Senior Woman's Administrator at Saint Peter's College, will serve as vice chair.

## Reggie Greene All-American

**The greatest football player ever to wear the Green and Gold**

The greatest football player ever to wear the Green and Gold and arguably the best player in the history of the MAAC Football League,

Reggie Greene graduated from Siena in 1998 as the NCAA's I-AA all-time leading rusher. When he finished his career, his 5,415 career yards on the ground placed him third among all-time running backs at any level – behind only Tony Dorsett and Charles White. Greene also graduated with the single-best rushing performance in NCAA history, running for 379 yards on the ground against St. John's (1996).

Greene is the only associated press All-American in the history of the College's football program, being named to the elite team during each of his last three years with the Saints. He was the MAAC Player of the Year as a sophomore, junior and senior, after leading the nation in rushing each season. In recognition of

his amazing achievements, Greene was a finalist for the Walter Payton Award (presented to the nation's top I-AA player) three times and as a senior he received votes for the Heisman Trophy.

In 2000, the *Hartford Courant* selected Greene as one of Connecticut's top 100 athletes in the 20th Century. On the honor, Greene said: "When I left high school, there was no way I would have been considered on such a list. It is nice to see that the people on the panel recognized what I did at Siena and realized that maybe I wasn't too small to succeed – maybe I deserved a chance."

Renowned for his speed and vision as a back, Greene battled the odds and the critics while in college, but those who watched him play knew of his true gift as a back. Bob Byrnes, the assistant director of college personnel for BLESTO (an NFL scouting combine), commented when asked about Greene: "People will ask what he's like when he gets hit. But I've seen him, and watched film on him, and he never gets hit."

The last few years, Greene played professional football overseas, most recently in Italy. A member of the Bolzano Giants, Greene led the League in rushing in 2000, again defying the odds in a battle toward his lifetime dream of playing in the NFL.

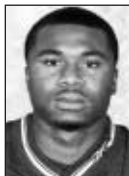

# Siena Athletics

They started out as the Golden Warriors. That proved too long for headlines, so soon Siena became the Indians. In the late 1980s, they became the Saints.

There was a time, not long ago, when the majority of Siena's student-athletes hailed from homes in the Capital Region, and athletic teams' scheduling requirements could be met by jumping in a van and travelling to Saratoga, Troy, Schenectady and Albany.

In 1976, however, Siena's athletics program was elevated to NCAA Division I status. With that move, the College committed itself to upgrading its program and making all teams competitive.

After stops in the ECAC Metro and North Atlantic Conference, Siena moved to the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC), where it has made its mark.

Since its move to full Division I status, Siena Athletics has continued to grow. Two years ago, the program added women's water polo, giving it eight men's programs and 11 on the women's side.

## The Program

Siena sponsors 19 sports that compete at the NCAA Division I level. Eighteen Saints' sports teams compete in the MAAC, with field hockey playing in the Northeast Conference.

The Saints pride themselves on excellence on and off the field. In the most recent NCAA graduation report, Siena placed 12th nationally among Division I schools in percentage of student-athletes graduated. This past year, the student-athletes at Siena averaged an astounding 2.95 grade point average—a mark far higher than the average of the regular student-body. A record 73 student-athletes were placed on the MAAC honor roll.

On the field, the Siena baseball team has won four of the last nine MAAC Championships and advanced to the 1999 NCAA Tournament. Head Coach Tony Rossi, entering his 35th year at the helm of the Saints, has continually developed student-athletes who have performed both on the field, and off. In the spring of 2002, he won his 500th game.

The men's basketball team has also carried the torch for Siena in the MAAC. Last season, the Saints won 21 games and advanced to the second round of the NIT—their fourth postseason appearance in the past five years. In 2002, Siena caught the nation's attention with an improbable leap into college basketball's biggest stage—the NCAA Tournament. The Green and Gold continued its improbable run with a nationally televised opening round victory over Alcorn State before falling to eventual national champion Maryland before 20,000 fans at the MCI Center in Washington. It was the team's third postseason Tournament appearance in the past four years and its third trip to the "Big Dance."

Under the direction of Gina Castelli, the women's basketball team has grown into one of the top programs in the region. The Saints reached the postseason for the second consecutive year this past season after cruising to their second straight MAAC regular-season crown. Junior Liene Jansone was named the conference's Player of the Year and Latvian countrymate Gunta Basko was selected as a finalist for Kodak All-American consideration as Siena received its third invite to the Postseason Women's National Invitation Tournament. In 2000-2001, the team earned its first MAAC Tournament championship and initial NCAA berth.

The men's and women's soccer programs have experienced recent success and growth as well. Men's coach Charlie Curto, in his 20th season at the helm, guided the Saints back to the MAAC Tournament last season. Women's Head Coach Steve Karbowski was recognized as the Northeast region's Co-Coach of the Year after orchestrating the nation's eighth best turnaround in 2001. The women's team also qualified for the four-team MAAC Championships this past fall.

The volleyball team has one of the richest histories for success, having qualified for 11th straight conference championships. The team won four-straight MAAC titles from 1993-96 and reached the 1995 NCAA Tournament. In April Garvey Pierre took over as the program's first full-time coach as the Saints look to make the leap to the next level.

In just its fifth season, the women's swimming and diving team came just one day short of capturing the MAAC Championship this past winner. As it turned out, the Saints were a strong second and the future looks even brighter with several key components returning.

Sister act Kim and Michelle Milton have guided the cross-country program's renaissance, as each captured All-MAAC honors for the second straight year this past season. The junior duo placed

in the top-10 at the conference championships as the women surged to a third place overall finish.

Women's tennis star Nikki Mayer brought new attention to her sport after crushing 12 school records in her stellar career. Mayer led the Saints to a second place finish in the MAAC Championships after a 10th place showing when she entered the program as a freshman. The team returns five of six starters this year as they look to claim their initial conference championship.

Junior linebacker Dan Smacchia has brought a new enthusiasm to the gridiron. He helped the football team triple its win total last season and for his efforts was named to Don Hansen's Football Gazette I-AA Mid Major All-American Team for the second straight season.

In all, last year, 41 Siena student-athletes earned All-Conference honors (the most ever), while 69 (up from 15 in 1999) earned All-Academic recognition.

## Facilities

Most Siena teams make their homes on-campus, playing on the seven grass fields located behind the Marcelle Athletic Complex.

Inside the Marcelle Athletic Complex, Siena student-athletes have all the amenities to ensure their abilities to compete at the Division I level. This season, many of the student-athletes will enjoy the benefits of a state-of-the-art expansion to the field house. The expansion (completed last winter) features four new "team rooms," and a theater to watch video. The men's and women's locker rooms have also been restructured as part of the project.

The women's basketball and volleyball teams play their home contests at the 4,000-seat Alumni Recreation Center.

Siena's men's basketball team makes its home at the Pepsi Arena in downtown Albany. The Pepsi Arena is a regionally acclaimed 15,500-seat facility. Since its full-time move to the Pepsi Arena, both the men's and women's basketball team's attendances have soared into the top-100 in the country.

The Siena football team plays its home games at the 2,000-seat Christian Brothers Academy.

## Academic Support

Siena also offers a full-time academic advisor for its student-athletes. The academic advisor provides assistance for student-athletes, assisting in class scheduling and tutorial services. Last year an assistant advisor has been hired to assist with the NCAA's Champs Life Skills initiative—known as SAINTS (Supporting Athletes in Their Success) at Siena.

A study lounge, located on the first floor of the Marcelle Athletic Complex is available for all student-athletes. Included in the study lounge are two computers and a quiet area to study and work during the academic year, as well as during summer sessions. The technologically advanced J. Spencer and Patricia Standish library, which opened in 2000, serves as a scenic back drop to the baseball field and is a short walk from any point on campus.
