- Born May 23, 1959, in Philadelphia, PA
- Graduated LaSalle High School, 1977
- Undergraduate degree from Pennsylvania, 1982 (Bachelor of Science in Economics, The Wharton School)
- Graduate degree from Lehigh, 1985 (Master of Education)
- Head coach at Lehigh, 1985-88. Posted a record of 49-39 and made an NCAA Tournament appearance in 1988.
- Assistant coach at Notre Dame, 1988-99. Recruited current NBA players Pat Garrity and Troy Murphy. Both were Big East Players of the Year.
- Assistant coach at Lehigh, 1983-85.
- Assistant coach at Penn, 1982-83.
- Married to the former Margaret Nowlin (Notre Dame, '92, '99) on July 4, 1997. She is a former Notre Dame star (ranked 12th on Notre Dame's all-time scoring list entering this season) and played professionally overseas. The two began dating while she was serving as an assistant coach on Muffet McGraw's staff.
- Two sons, Connor John, born July 13, 1998, in South Bend, IN, and Patrick Dickerson, born March 20, 2000, in Greensboro, and a daughter, Marit Katherine, born August 14, 2002, in Greensboro.
- Father worked in The Palestra as Fran and his brother Jack grew up.
- Brother Jack is a sportswriter in the Philadelphia area at the Delaware County Daily Times, covering the city's professional teams.

## Historical Overview of Siena Basketball

- Siena has participated at the NCAA Division I level since the 1976-77 season
- Siena's record over 28 years of Division I play is 482-362 (.571)
- Siena posted winning records in 11 straight seasons, three under John Griffin (1983-86) and eight under Mike Deane (1986-94)
- Siena has appeared in eight Division I postseason tournaments including three NCAA Tournament appearances (1989, 1999, 2002) and five NIT appearances (1981, 1991, 1994, 2000 and 2003)
- The winningest coach in Siena history in terms of wins is Dan Cunha (246) and in terms of percentage is Paul Hewitt (.709). Mike Deane garnered the most Division I head coaching wins with 166.
- Siena has won 20 or more games 14 times; Dan Cunha accomplished the feat four times; Mike Deane, four times; Paul Hewitt, two times; John Griffin, two times; Louis Orr, one time; and Rob Lanier, one time. Lanier, Orr, Hewitt, Deane and Griffin all posted 20-win seasons at the Division I level.
- Siena plays in the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC). The Saints were crowned Tournament Champions in 1999 and 2002, and regular-season champions in 1999-2000. The school also shared the regular-season title in 1990-91, 1998-99 and 2000-2001.
- The record for most wins in a season is 27 set in 1949-50 under Dan Cunha. Siena won the National Catholic Invitational that season, defeating St. Francis (NY) in the final. Paul Hewitt and Mike Deane led Siena to 25 wins in 1988-89, 1990-91, 1993-94 and 1998-99.
