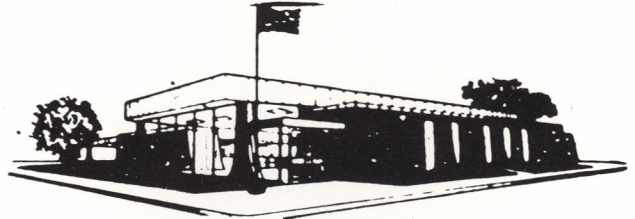

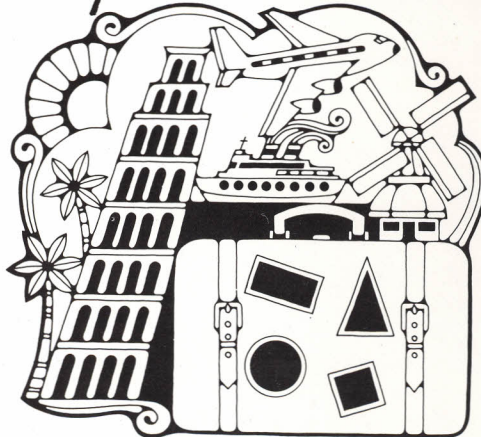

Three weeks after undergoing a triple-by-pass open heart surgery, Bob Guelker joined his 1979 version of the soccer Cougar squad on their west coast tour. In their first four games, the team posted a 2-2 record. They captured their last two games in California and finished the tour with a 4-2 record. After that trip and subsequently dropping out of the top twenty ranked teams, Guelker and his able assistant, Rick Benben, led the Cougars to a skein of 18 more games without a loss for a total of 20 consecutive matches without a loss for a new school record for one season. It was a storybook ending with the toughest schedule in the country, including victories over five of the strongest opponents in the NCAA tourney to capture the NCAA Division I championship and to finish the campaign as the #1 ranked team in the nation.

By virtue of this remarkable and amazing success in 1980, Coach Guelker added the following accomplishments to his already long list of achievements:

1. Won more NCAA Division I soccer titles than any other soccer coach in history (six). At St. Louis University (five) - 1959, 1960, 1962, 1963, 1965 and at SIU-Edwardsville (one) in 1979, and
2. Won more NCAA soccer titles than any other soccer coach in history of championships which began in 1959 - total of seven. Five at St. Louis U. and two at SIU-Edwardsville. (Division II in 1972 plus the 1979 title).
3. Became the only soccer coach in NCAA history to capture both a Division I and Division II title at the same school. It is believed Coach Guelker is the only coach in NCAA history of all sports to accomplish this feat.
4. Became the fifth coach in the history of NCAA coaching of all sports to win a Division I Championship at two different schools.
5. In 1978, Guelker became the only coach to be able to claim his squad, the Cougars, as the **only** team to have finished in the final top ten rankings since the beginning of the national ranking system in 1969. By finishing first in 1979, he is still the only coach to achieve this distinction.

Honors bestowed on Coach Guelker 1979-80

1. He was inducted into the United States Soccer Federation "Hall of Fame"; 2. Soccer America Magazine, "Coach of the Year"; 3. Recipient of John E. Wray Award from St. Louis Baseball Writers Association for achievement in sport other than baseball; 4. Recipient of Carl O. Bauer Award from the Missouri Athletic Club for Amateur Sports Personality of Year.

When Don Ebert was drafted by the Cosmos as the #1 Draft Choice of the NASL, he became the second Cougar player to attain this honor in three years. SIUE's Greg Makowski, another Rosary High School product, was the #1 Draft Choice after the 1977 season. Makowski is now with the Seattle pro eleven.

Six Cougars were drafted in the first two rounds in the NASL draft last year to create a record for one school.

Guelker is a past President of the United State Soccer Federation; a former Chairman of the NCAA Soccer Tournament Committee; and, he is a former Pan-Am and USA Olympic Soccer Coach and guided the team to the 1972 Olympics in Munich and became the winningest coach in Olympic soccer history, which began in 1924. He has been honored by the National Soccer Coaches Association as the recipient of that organization's first "Coach of the Year" award in 1973 and was given their highest "Honor Award" in 1977.

One other previous distinction that Coach Guelker has accomplished that can never be duplicated is the fact that his teams have won the very first Division I Soccer Championships ever held (St. Louis U. 1959) and the very first Division II Soccer Championships ever held (SIU-Edwardsville, 1972).



Assistant Coach Rick Benben

Rick Benben is now entering his fifth year as assistant coach at SIUE. He has had a winning record as a player and as a coach.

In his final (1972) year as the outstanding goalkeeper for the Cougars, he helped SIUE in its march to the school's first NCAA national championship, the winning of the inaugural Division II championship in a 1-0 thriller over the University of New York at Oneonta.

He was a member of the 1969, '70, '71 and '72 SIUE soccer squads. In 1976, he was keeper for the Dallas Tornado. In '73 through '75 he served as graduate assistant coach and the past two years as fulltime assistant coach.

He has proven himself very effective with younger players.

In 1975 and then in 1977, he was coach of the Ruiz Junior soccer program and took U-19, U-17 and U-15 youth teams to Europe in both years.

The Outlook For 1980

After playing the toughest schedule in the country last year, and capturing the coveted NCAA Division I Crown as well as finishing as the #1 ranked team in the nation, it will be most difficult for Coach Bob Guelker and his 1980 edition of the SIUE Cougars to repeat such a performance.

However, once again Guelker has put together another tough 19-game schedule and he has a good nucleus of players returning that should help them put up a strong try to defend their title.

There are five players returning from last year's squad that finished as starters: Matt Malloy, Tim Guelker, Joe Howe, Pat Malloy and Terry Trushel, plus the two goalkeepers Mark Downar and Ed Gettemeier who shared the starting position in goal.

Matt Malloy and Guelker are the only two remaining SIUE members who started on the Cougars 1977 team which finished third in the NCAA playoffs and as the #3 ranked team in the nation. Malloy, a winger, scored all three goals in the championship final last year at Tampa and Guelker, son of the coach, got two of those assists in the final game and scored a goal in the semi-final match. Matt Malloy has tallied 18 goals and 16 assists for a total of 34 points in three years for the Cougars.

Guelker has played midfield and striker in his three years with the Cougars, but because of his experience he is expected to be switched to the sweeper position for the current campaign. Guelker has totaled 17 goals and 15 assists for 32 points.

Matt Malloy, Guelker and Joe Howe were voted captains for the 1980 Cougar Year. Howe was an All-American at Florissant Valley Communities College before joining SIUE last year. He did an outstanding job at defensive midfield in the championship games, and Coach Guelker is considering moving Howe to the stopper position or leaving him at midfield.

Terry Trushel was a reserve on the 1977 team, played stopper in 1978 and last year finished the season at right fullback where he is expected to finish out his senior year in 1980.

Pat Malloy, Matt's younger brother, started last season as a sophomore at left fullback and is expected to hold down that position this season. Pat is known for his long throw-ins, which Coach Guelker is hoping to be an offensive weapon again this season.

With Downar and Gettemeier doing a remarkable job in sharing the goalkeeper duties as a sophomore and freshman last year, Coach Guelker is set in the goalkeeper position for some time. These two players rotated every game last year including all NCAA tournament games. It is doubtful that this has ever been done before in NCAA soccer history. Guelker is hoping that the goalkeeper situation in 1980 will be a valuable asset in rebuilding a championship team.

Also returning from last year's squad and hoping to break into the starting lineup is Tom Groark, sophomore back, who saw some action as a starter last year, but was hampered with a leg injury. Steve Schell, sophomore winger, Mike Twellman, sophomore midfielder, and George Mishalow, junior back, are expected to contend for starting positions.

If the Cougars are going to make a strong bid to retain their title, the new recruits must develop fast. The new prospects include Leo Bourneuf, midfielder from Rosary High, Missouri State Champions; Steve Gauvain, St. Louis U. High, and member of IMO's Junior 1979 National Junior Cup Champions; Greg Fleher, a back from Parkway High and formerly of Rosary High, Mike Gauvain, St. Mary's High; and Chris Kenny, McCluer High and Florissant Cougars Missouri Junior Cup Champions. Bourneuf, Fleher, and Mike

Gauvain have had experience with the USA National Youth Team.

Matt Malloy, Guelker, Downar, Gettemeier, Howe, Mike Twellman and Pat Malloy were members of the Busch Soccer Club of St. Louis which captured the United States Soccer Federation National Amateur Cup competition for 1979-80.

Losses from the 1979 Championship squad were severe for the Cougars, and would cause many to feel that Guelker will be in a rebuilding year. Six players were drafted by the NASL pro teams in the first two rounds of the draft. This was an NASL record for any collegiate team. Seniors and tri-captains were Dave Hundelt, Dave Hummert, and Jeff Cacciatore. All three were four-year starters, and they also played on the 1977 club.

Three key juniors elected to turn pro, namely: Don Ebert, Tim Clark and Bob Bozada. All three were starters on the 1977, 1978 and 1979 teams and had three years tournament experience. Ebert and Clark were also starters on this year's USA Olympic Squad and Bozada was an alternate.

Ebert, who was the NASL's #1 draft choice and went to the New York Cosmos, was the Cougars leading goal scorer for each of his three years. He also set some new individual scoring records for the Cougars. Clark was the MVP Back in the NCAA tournament, and Bozada was the #2 point man for the 1979 season. The experience of these three players will be sorely missed.

While challenges are nothing new to Coach Guelker, trying to repeat as champions with these losses will be an extremely difficult task.

However every Cougar soccer team since they went eligible for post-season tournament play in 1969 has qualified for post-season play. The 1980 squad has its work cut out for them.

Matt Malloy

Senior, Forward, 6'0", 150 lbs., Age: 21

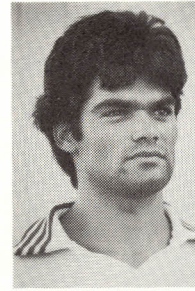
Matt is a tri-captain and has been a starter for three years. He and Tim Guelker are the only two returnees who were freshman starters on the 1977 squad which finished as the #3 ranked team in the nation and third place in NCAA Division I play-offs. His basic position is as an outside right forward, but he is equally comfortable at the striker position. In the championship final last year at Tampa, he scored all three goals as the Cougars captured the NCAA crown. During his three years with the Cougars he has accumulated 18 goals and 16 assists for a total of 34 points to be ranked as seventh among the all-time Cougar individual scorers.



Tim Guelker

Senior, Midfield/Back, 6'2", 170 lbs., Age: 21

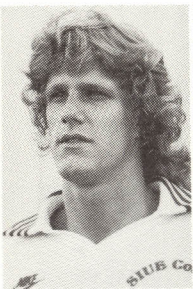
Tim is a tri-captain and is the son of Coach Guelker. He has been a starter at both midfield and striker positions for all three years. He was a member of the 1977 team which captured third place in both the NCAA and the national ranking system. As a sophomore, he was the Cougars second leading total point man behind Don Ebert. He was second highest goal scorer and tied with Matt Malloy for highest in assists. As a junior last year, he scored goals in both games against St. Louis University, i.e. the Bronze Boot Game, and the NCAA tournament game. He scored in the NCAA semi-finals (Penn State) and got credit for two assists in the championship match. Because of his experience, Coach Guelker is planning to move Tim to the sweeper position at the start of the season.



Joe Howe

Senior, Midfield/Back, 5'10", 170 lbs., Age: 21

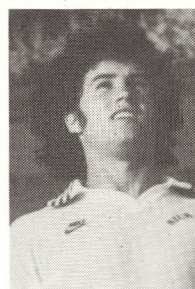
Joe is a tri-captain, and last year was a transfer from Florissant Valley Communities College where he earned All-American honors. He started out as a sweeper back, and Guelker switched him to a defensive midfield position. Because he did so well in the NCAA play-offs last year, he is expected to split time in this position as well as the stopper-back position. He is a strong, hard-nosed player capable of going up on the attack. Joe is the fifth member of the Howe family to play for the Cougars. Tom and Kevin are former captains. Jerry and Rick also played.



Terry Trushel

Senior, Back, 6'0", 165 lbs., Age: 20

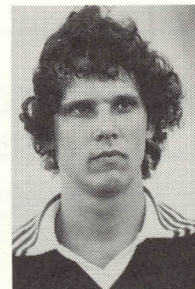
Terry was a reserve on the 1977 squad, and he was a starter in the backfield the last two years. He has played both the stopper and wing back positions. He is fast and a very hard worker.



Pat Malloy

Junior, Back, 6'2", 175 lbs., Age: 20

Pat has shown versatility playing as a reserve on the forward line as well as the backfield in his freshman year. Last year as a sophomore, he was a starter at the left back position on the championship team.
