Recap of the Season-Opener

Southern Illinois defeated Thomas More, 49-3, in its season-opener on Saturday. The 49 points are the most SIU has scored in its first game of a season since scoring 49 vs. Austin Peay on Sept. 2, 2023.

The Salukis totaled 386 yards on offense with 238 coming through the air and 148 on the ground. Southern did not commit a turnover while the defense forced five (three fumbles, two interceptions). Dating back to the final game of 2024 vs. Murray State, SIU has forced five turnovers in back-to-back games.

DJ Williams had a strong day in his return for SIU, going 18-for-24 (75%) with 227 passing yards and three touchdowns while also rushing four times for 18 yards and one touchdown on the ground.

Andrew Behm's six tackles were a team-high, while Amir Dwight had 2.0 TFL and 1.0 sack and Donnie Wingate had 1.5 TFL and 1.0 sack.

A pair of freshmen tallied interceptions on Saturday: David Obadein and Cameron Cason. Obadein's came in the form of a pick-six, while Cason registered his on the final drive of the game.

Breaking Down the 2025 Slate

In 2025, Southern will play five home games and seven road games, its most in a regular season since 2019.

The Salukis are heading out on a three-game road trip starting on Saturday at Purdue. This marks the fifth consecutive season where SIU has faced an FBS opponent. Since 2021, it holds a record of 2-2 against such teams with wins over

Northwestern in 2022 and Northern Illinois in 2023.

Southern Illinois will then travel to UT Martin on Sept. 13 and SEMO on Sept. 20 before it heads into its bye week. The Salukis will return home on Oct. 4 vs. Indiana State for Family Weekend before a tough road test at North Dakota State on Oct. 11.

The only time this season where SIU will play consecutive home games is Oct. 18 and Oct. 25 when it hosts North Dakota and then Northern Iowa.

DJ Williams' Strong 2025 Debut

- In his first game since suffering a season-ending hand injury in Week 3 against Incarnate Word last season, DJ Williams was both efficient and effective in his return to the field last Saturday against Thomas More.
- Williams' 75% completion percentage against the Saints was his highest mark as a Saluki, while his three passing touchdowns were tied for a career-high (reached this twice at Murray State). This was the senior quarterback's first three-touchdown game (passing) since Nov. 4, 2023, vs. North Dakota.
- Prior to an injury to his throwing hand that ended his 2024 campaign, Williams had thrown for 571 yards, 4 TDs and 2 INTs to go along with 39 rushes for 242 yards (6.2 avg) and 4 TDs
- Williams transferred to SIU from Murray State, where he was the 2021 OVC Freshman of the Year and passed for 1,529 yards and 11 touchdowns in 2023

Defense Shines in Week One

Under first-year defensive coordinator Lee Pronschinske, the Southern Illinois defense was dominant against Thomas More. The visitors' lone three points came off a field goal in the second quarter.

Southern held the Saints to 191 yards of total offense with 131 passing yards and 60 rushing. The 60 rushing yards are the fewest the Salukis have allowed in a game since allowing 53 vs. Austin Peay on Sept. 7, 2024, last season.

Linebacker Andrew Behm, who played in just three games in 2024 due to injury, led the team with six tackles after recording five total last year.

Donnie Wingate and Amir Dwight registered one sack each against the Saints. This was Dwight's third-career sack and first since Nov. 2, 2024, at Missouri State. Wingate's was his first as a Saluki after spending the previous three seasons at Lindenwood.

Pair of Freshmen Tally Pair of Interceptions against Saints

While veterans like Behm and Colin Bohanek made their impact felt on Saturday with 11 combined tackles, some of the younger members of the Saluki defense made their collegiate debuts memorable ones.

Freshman David Obadein recorded a pick-six from the opposing five-yard line at the 10:40 mark of the fourth quarter, giving SIU a 42-3 lead.

On Thomas More's final drive of the game, fellow freshman Cameron Cason tallied his first-career intereception and returned it for 36 yards.

Stats Perform FCS Top 25

week, the Salukis moved from No. 20 to No. 14 in the Stats Perform FCS Top 25 Poll. North Dakota State remains in first, while South Dakota State (second) and Montana State (third) flipped spots. The MVFC has six teams ranked in the top

Salukis Also Climb in AFCA FCS Coaches Poll

In the latest AFCA FCS Coaches Poll, Southern Illinois has moved up from No. 20 to No. 15. North Dakota State is ranked in the top spot, followed by South Dakota State and Montana State. The latter is tied with Tarleton State for third as both received 567 points.

SIU will face four ranked teams according to the poll. Its first ranked opponent will be No. 1 North Dakota State on Oct. 11 in Fargo, N.D., followed by a home matchup vs. No. 22 North Dakota on Oct. 18. Then, the Salukis will closeout the year with back-to-back ranked games against No. 6 South Dakota on Nov. 15 in Carbondale and No. 7 Illinois State on Nov. 22 in Normal.

UT Martin, who Southern will travel to on Sept. 13, received 22 votes while Northern Iowa, SIU's opponent on Oct. 25, received 21.

Southern Shows off Depth in Receiver Room vs. Thomas More

In a mostly new-look receiver room, seven different Salukis recorded at least two receptions in Week One vs. Thomas More. Vinson Davis III, who is the team's leading returning receiver, paced the team in both catches (six) and yards (97) against the Saints. Veteran Jay Jones and newcomers Fabian McCray and Jackson Parker all found the endzone in Week One.

McCray comes to SIU by way of Jackson State, where he played just three games in 2024 due to injuries. The Chicago native was on the preseason HBCU+ Player of the Year Watch List prior to the injury. Parker spent five seasons at Albany (2020-24) and played in 35 games before arriving in Carbondale. During his time there, Parker tallied 94 career catches for 1,224 yards and five touchdowns.

In terms of returners, senior Jay Jones caught five passes for 132 yards and one touchdown last season. Jones played in eight games in 2024, which matches his total from his first four years at SIU combined (did not play in 2020 and redshirted in 2021).

Stats Perform Preseason All-America Teams

Colin Bohanek was Southern Illinois' lone representative on the 2025 Stats Perform Preseason All-America Teams, which was released on July 15. Bohanek was one of two linebackers to be named to the third team.

Historic Crowd for SIU vs. SEMO in 2024

The 13,421 fans in attendance for Family Weekend last season on Sept. 21 versus SEMO were the second-most in stadium history, behind only the standing-room crowd of 15,276 that attended the opening of the stadium in



2010 versus Division II Quincy. Saluki Stadium seats approximately 14,000 in its horseshoe-shaped seating bowl, with an official stadium capacity of 15,774 that includes the standing-room area of the berm.

Postseason success under Hill

Of SIU's 11 playoff appearances in school history, Hill was the quarterback of two teams (2006, 2007) and head coach of three (2020, 2021, 2023). The Salukis have won 11 playoff games in school history and Hill was a part of six of them (quarterbacked three wins and coached three more).

Since 2019, only three FCS programs have won three or more playoff games (South Dakota State, North Dakota State and Southern Illinois).

A Look at the Coaching Staff

Lee Pronschinske, who coached the safeties in 2024, was promoted to defensive coordinator at the conclusion of the season and is entering his first year in the role. Pronschinske will continue coaching the safeties as well.

Darius Davis and Eriq Moore are two new additions to the staff for 2025. Davis will serve as the team's defensive line coach while Eriq Moore will coach the cornerbacks. Prior to SIU, Davis spent three years at Robert Morris (2022-24) in the same role and coached SIU transfer defensive tackle Bernadin Fleurima Jr.

Moore arrived in Carbondale in April of 2025 after coaching defensive backs for two seasons at Missouri Western State. As a player, Moore was a three-year starter at SEMO (2013-16).

Where SIU Ranked Statistically in 2024

Despite several injuries to the quarterback position, Southern Illinois still ranked third in the MVFC in passing, averaging 234.6 yards-per-game. This also ranked 30th in the country at the end of the season.

SIU's 13 interceptions were the fourth-most in the conference and were just one behind South Dakota, South Dakota State, and Illinois State for the league-lead.

The Salukis had a top five red zone defense in the Valley, as opponents converted at a rate of 79.5%. In the FCS, this ranked 47th out of 123 teams.

One of two FCS teams to beat FBS opponents in both 2022 and 2023 $\,$

Southern Illinois was one of two FCS teams that beat FBS opponents in both 2022 and 2023. The Salukis defeated Northwestern in 2022 and beat Northern Illinois in 2023. Sacramento State beat Colorado State (2022) and Stanford (2023).

Jake Curry to back-up DJ Williams after Busy Freshman Year

Jake Curry became the first true freshman to start at quarterback for the Salukis in 35 years (Brendon Prenger, a true freshman walk-on QB, started at Northern Iowa on Nov. 11, 1989) in 2025 after Southern lost both Williams and Hunter Simmons due to

injury. Curry took over in Game 7 vs. North Dakota State after Simmons went down.

Curry went on to play in seven games and make five starts in his first year as a Saluki. The Edwardsville, Ill., native finished the season 82-of-147 for 931 yards, three touchdowns, and seven interceptions. Curry also ran 45 times for 159 yards and three touchdowns.

Against Youngstown
State, Curry helped lead SIU
back from a 28-0 deficit to
win, 37-33, earning the then
freshman quarterback Stats
Perform National Freshman
Player of the Week honors.
Curry threw for 322 yards with
three touchdowns to go along
with 78 yards on the ground
and one touchdown.

The comeback was the largest in school history and tied for the largest in conference history.

Experience Across the Offensive Line

Southern's offensive line boasts plenty of experience in 2025. All five projected starters - Coleon Smith, Aiden Logan, Noah Fenske, Derek Harden Jr., and Cameron Dye - are seniors with at least five years under their belt.

Fenske is entering his second year as a starter for SIU after sitting out the 2023 campaign due to NCAA transfer rules.

On the outside, tackles Dye and Smith have a combined 10 years of experience. Guards Logan and Harden Jr. have a total of 11 years between them.

The offensive line is coached by Dan Clark, who has been in the role since 2022. Clark previously coached at Illinois State before joining the Salukis.

- SIU currently has three players on NFL rosters S Jeremy Chinn (Las Vegas), LB Branson Combs (Jacksonville), S PJ Jules (Cincinnati).
- Chinn was a second-round draft pick (64th overall) in the 2020 draft and runner-up for Defensive Rookie of the Year. The safety signed a two-year, \$16.25 million contract with Las Vegas in March.
- Jules, who was on the Bengals' practice squad in 2024, is now a member of the 53-man roster for the 2025 season. Combs was signed to Jacksonville's practice squad.

Salukis vs. the FBS

Since becoming a I-AA/FCS member in 1982, SIU is 6-37 versus FBS teams. Nick Hill was involved in five of the wins as either a player (Indiana-2006, Northern Illinois-2007) or head coach (UMass-2019, Northwestern-2022, Northern Illinois-2023).

SIU is 2-20 all-time against Power Five opponents, and head coach Nick Hill was a key factor in both wins. In 2006, Hill threw four touchdown passes and orchestrated a 35-28 win at Indiana.

The Salukis were the only FCS program to beat a Power Five

Entering his 10th season as head coach in 2025, Nick Hill has elevated his alma mater into one of the elite programs in FCS Football.

A native son of Southern Illinois and one of Saluki Football's all-time great quarterbacks, Hill made it his mission to restore the program to its place among the nation's best. By any standard, he has achieved that goal.

Playing in the toughest conference at the FCS level, the Salukis have advanced to the playoffs three times in the last five seasons. Southern is one of of only four FCS programs to accomplish this feat, joining North Dakota State, South Dakota State and Montana.

SIU was one of only two FCS teams in the nation to beat FBS opponents in both 2022 (Northwestern) and 2023 (Northern Illinois), joining Sacramento State, which beat Colorado State (2022) and Stanford (2023).

In its history, Saluki Football has won six games against FBS-level teams, and Hill has been a part of five of those wins (two as starting quarterback, three as head coach).

The Salukis have dominated in-state competition under Hill, winning their eight of their last nine games against instate schools (Northern Illinois, Northwestern, Illinois State twice, Western Illinois four times). The lone loss came against Illinois State Oct. 5, 2024.

Southern has beaten 11 ranked FCS teams in the last four seasons, including wins over the No. 1, No. 2, No. 3 and No. 4-ranked opponents.

Since 2020, the Salukis have been nationally ranked for 43 weeks, including 18 weeks in the top 10 and as high as No. 3. They enter the 2024 season having been ranked every week since Week 1 of 2023.

SIU has won three playoff games in the last five seasons, winning at Weber State (2020), at South Dakota (2021) and versus Nicholls State (2023), in the first home playoff game in Saluki Stadium history.

The program has produced multiple NFL players during Hill's tenure, including safeties Jeremy Chinn and Ryan Neal, cornerbacks Craig James and Madre Harper, plus tight end MyCole Pruitt. Chinn was a second-round draft pick of the Carolina Panthers and the 64th player chosen overall in 2020.

A leader on and off the field, Hill won the 2023 Fellowship of Christian Athletes Grant Teaff Coach of the Year Award, sponsored by the AFCA.

Hill's journey to the top job at SIU started just 20 miles north of campus, where he was a football and basketball icon at DuQuoin High School. During his senior year of high school in 2002-03, Hill was the area's Player of the Year in both sports and guided the Indians to the Illinois High School Association 3A state championship football game.

The legend continued on the hardwood where Hill averaged 23 points as a senior at Du Quoin and chose Western Kentucky from a host of Division I offers. A broken hand prematurely ended his freshman season at Western but ultimately led him home.

In the spring of 2004, Hill transferred to SIU to switch sports and play football under head coach Jerry Kill, just as

the program was beginning its rapid rise to the top of the league standings.

Hill initially sat behind league Player of the Year Joel Sambursky, before taking over the starting job in 2006. In two seasons as the starter, he went 21-6 and set the school record for passing yards in 2007. He still holds the best completion percentage (68.3) in school history.

Highlights of Hill's playing career include guiding Southern to a win at Indiana in 2006, in which he passed for four touchdowns as SIU became the league's first team to defeat a Big Ten opponent. Hill capped off his career in 2007 by leading the team to the Final Four of the playoffs, where the Salukis ultimately lost a 20-17 heartbreaker to Joe Flacco and Delaware. He was also a finalist for the Peyton Award in '07.

Hill played six seasons of professional football, mostly in the Arena Football League, where he played for head coach Jay Gruden, who went on to coach NFL's Washington Redskins from 2014-2019. Hill also had brief free-agent stints with the Chicago Bears in 2008 and Green Bay Packers in 2012.

Playing for Gruden, one of the game's top offensive minds, helped shape Hill's offensive philosophy. First as Southern's offensive coordinator and now as head coach, Hill has refined his own unique style of offense that combines elements of Air Raid, spread and up-tempo.

"Coaching my alma mater is a dream come true," Hill said.
"I love everything about this region and what it stands for, that blue-collar mentality. This is not my team. This is our team.
Our program is going to invest in the community and make us proud on and off the field."

Hill and wife, Alicia, a former volleyball player at SIU, reside in Carbondale and have three daughters. His brother, former Saluki quarterback A.J. Hill, coaches football at Rochester (III.) High School.
