SAN JOSÉ STATE UNIVERSITY FOOTBALL FACT SHEET

San José State record: 5-7, 4-4 Mountain West. The Spartans concluded the regular season losing to Boise State, 40-23, on November 27.

San José State head coach Ron Caragher: Finishing his third season as the San José State head coach. Has a record of 14-22 with the Spartans. Overall, he is completing his ninth season as a major college head coach and has a 58-44 record. Caragher's first six seasons as a head coach were at the University of San Diego.

More wins than in 2014: San José State's 5-7 regular season record was a two-win improvement over the 3-9 regular season mark in 2014. The Spartans also improved by two wins in Mountain West action going 4-4 as compared to 2-6 in 2014.

Best Mountain West divisional finish: San José State's tie for second place in the Mountain West's West Division is the Spartans' best finish since joining the conference in 2013. The Spartans tied for third in 2013 and were fifth in 2014.

Senior Day for 18 Spartans: The November 27 game marked the final home game for 18 San José State seniors. Defensive end **Cedric Lousi** was a Spartan beginning in 2010 and returned to San José State following his church mission. Ten of them started with the Spartans in 2011.

Nearly equal scoring: San José State's 336 points scored nearly matches the 338 points allowed during the regular season. Miami (Fla.), Kansas State and Auburn are the three other programs with similar points scored and points allowed during the regular season.

2015 Spartans have best 3rd down conversion rate: San José State finished its regular season ranked 11th nationally converting 48.5 percent (81-of-167) of its 3rd down opportunities - the Spartans' highest percentage based on available records back to 1993.

Most rushing touchdowns in a season since 2004: San José State's 23 rushing touchdowns are the first time a Spartan team scored 20 or more rushing touchdowns in a season since 2004.

San José State faces Boise State with 2,043 yards and is averaging 185.7 rushing yards a game this season. Four times this season (New Hampshire, Fresno State, New Mexico and Nevada), San José State rushed for at least 200 yards in a game.

2,000 rushing/20 rushing TDs & 2,000 passing/20 passing TDs: The 2015 San José State team is the second Spartan squad since 1950 and the first since 1976 to rush and pass for at least 2,000 yards in each category and produce at least 20 rushing and 20 passing touchdowns.

Potter closes 10-year rushing gap: With his two 9-yard rushing touchdowns in the 42-23 win at Hawai'i, **Kenny Potter** became the first San José State quarterback in 11 years to rush for six touchdowns in a season. In 2004, **Dale Rogers** was the most recent Spartan signal caller to score six rushing touchdowns in a season.

Since 1950, current St. Louis Rams assistant coach **Jeff Garcia** in 1992 and **Roger Proffitt** in 1975, are two San José State quarterbacks to rush for seven touchdowns in a season.

Potter bridges a 30-year rushing chasm: In the Nevada game, **Kenny Potter** became the first San José State quarterback in 30 years to rush for at least 100 yards in a game. Potter was credited with 116 yards on 19 rushing attempts. Two of his rushes were quarterback sacks.

On October 12, 1985, Doug Allen was a San José State quarterback who rushed for 117 yards on just eight carries in a 37-17 loss at Fresno State.

Team passing completion percentage: San José State finished the regular season with a team passing completion percentage of 68.3 percent - tops in the Mountain West.

In the New Hampshire (9/3) and Fresno State (9/26) wins, the Spartans completed 85.7 percent and 86.9 percent of their passes, respectively, and did not throw an interception in either game.

San José State quarterback **Kenny Potter** ranks ninth nationally and first in the Mountain West with a 68.5 percent pass completion rate.

#3-nationally in fewest penalty yards: In games played through November 28, San José State is third in the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) for fewest penalty yards (416) and fewest penalty yards per game (34.67).

Michael Carrizosa is a Ray Guy Award finalist: Sophomore **Michael Carrizosa** is one of three finalists for the 2015 Ray Guy Award given to the top punter in the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS). Carrizosa was the national leader in punting for 10 weeks this season, but finishes the season unranked because his 43 punts were 0.2 short of the 43.2 minimum for 12 games played. His 47.7 yards per punt average this season is an improvement of 10.8 yards a punt from his 2014 average of 37.1.

His punting also is responsible for San José State currently ranking fourth in net punting at 41.97 yards a punt. In 2014, the Spartans were 125th in net punting at 30.7.

The award winner will be announced on December 10 during the Home Depot College Football Awards Show on ESPN .

Billy Freeman - a John Mackey Award semifinalist: Junior **Billy Freeman** was one of eight semifinalists for the 2015 John Mackey Award honoring the nation's top tight end. Freeman led the Spartans with personal single-season bests of 47 receptions, 581 receiving yards and six touchdown receptions.

Freeman became the second San Jose State tight end to lead the Spartans in single season pass receiving. In 1995, **Brian Roche** caught 66 passes for 729 yards and five TDs.

CoSIDA Academic All-District VIII honors for Schweitzer and Crawley: Offensive tackle **Wes Schweitzer** and wide receiver **Tim Crawley** are two of 27 players named to the 2015 College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-District VIII for NCAA Division I football team. The two Spartans met the academic criteria of a minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.30 and were voted to the team by CoSIDA members. The two Spartans now are eligible for Academic All-America honors.

Schweitzer is a senior majoring in biochemistry; Crawley, a junior majoring in business management information systems.

Outstanding 2015 for Tyler Ervin: Tyler Ervin ranks among the most productive Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) players this season.

Through November 28, he is second nationally in all-purpose running yards per game (200.8), tenth in rushing yards (1,469) and 12th in rushing yards per game (122.4).

Ervin became the San José State career leader in all-purpose yardage in the November 14 game at Nevada. He finished the regular season with 5,919 all-purpose yards.

One of college football's busiest players: Tyler Ervin was one of the busiest Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) players in 2015.

Twice this season, he had the football in his hands more than 40 times. When the 177-pound senior ran for a school record 300 yards against Fresno State (9/26), he accumulated 345 yards of all-purpose running on 42 rushes and four pass receptions. In the New Mexico victory, he handled the ball 41 times (36 rushes, two pass receptions, three kickoff returns).

1,000 yards & more for Ervin in 2015: Tyler Ervin is the first Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) player with two games rushing for 250 or more yards in games played this season through November 21.

Ervin, with 1,469 yards for the season, gained a school-record 300 yards and scored three touchdowns on 42 carries in the September 26 Fresno State win. In the October 24 victory over New Mexico, he rushed 36 times for 263 yards and a touchdown.

He is the one of two FBS players this season with 36 or more carries in multiple games and has two of the top-six all-purpose yardage games. His career high of 345 all-purpose yards came against Fresno State.

Tyler Ervin establishes school rushing mark: Tyler Ervin's 300 yards gained on 42 carries in the win over Fresno State (9/26) broke the previous San José State single-game record of 286 set by Nathan DuPree in an October 31, 1992 game at UNLV.

His 42 carries were a personal single game high, one shy of the San José State singlegame record of 43. His previous high of 22 carries was in the 2014 Utah State game.

With four pass receptions for 45 yards, Ervin accumulated 345 yards in all-purpose running against Fresno State. His all-purpose yardage total was more than Fresno State's 247 yards of total offense.

Sharing the load: Of the 23 times San José State passed for at least 400 yards in a game, the 422 yards in the New Hampshire win marked the first time two quarterbacks each accounted for at least one-third of the passing yardage output. Starter Joe Gray passed for 253 yards (59.9 percent); Kenny Potter, 167 yards (39.6 percent); and Malik Watson, 2 yards (0.5 percent), against New Hampshire.

Pass defense has top ranking: The Spartans ended the week of November 28 second nationally in fewest passing yards allowed per game (153.6). During the season San José State topped the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) in fewest passing yards allowed per game for seven weeks.

Pick two turns into "pick sixes": For the first time since the 2008 season when San José State returned four interceptions for touchdowns, the 2015 Spartans had two interception returns for scores.

Cornerback **Cleveland Wallace, III**, scored on a 61-yard interception return in the November 6 game vs. BYU. Cornerback **Jimmy Pruitt** was the first Spartan this season to return an interception for a touchdown with his 28-yard return in the Fresno State victory on September 26.

The corner store: Since junior **Cleveland Wallace, III**, and senior **Jimmy Pruitt** were paired as San José State's starting cornerbacks in the third game of the 2014 season, there are six games in which an opponent failed to gain 100 passing yards.

Wallace, III, was a 2014 second-team All-Mountain West selection and Pruitt received honorable mention accolades. Wallace had his first interception of the season in the Oregon State game. Pruitt has interceptions at Air Force, against Fresno State and UNLV.

San José State overtime trivia: San José State has a 3-6 record in overtime games after losing to Nevada, 37-34 in the first overtime, on November 14. The 2015 Spartans are the first San José State team to play two overtime games in a season. Coincidentally, both overtime games were against teams from the state of Nevada. The Spartans defeated UNLV, 33-27 in the first overtime on October 10.

Two of the Spartans' three all-time overtime wins are against UNLV. The most recent overtime game is the first time San José State won an overtime game by being on offense second. All three Spartan overtime wins were done in the first overtime.

Offensive outburst at start of the season: San José State was credited with 707 yards of total offense in its win over New Hampshire. The total is the fifth best single-game figure in school history, the sixth time the Spartans gained at least 700 yards in a game and ranks 13th among 2015 single-game performances through October 10.
