

NEXT POSSIBLE GAME NCAA Third Round, March 22 vs. Villanova/Milwaukee

GAME STORIES

- Saint Joseph's captured its third Atlantic 10 Championship and first since 1997 with the win over VCU in the conference final. **Halil Kanacevic** was named the MVP of the championship and was joined on the All-Tournament team by fellow tri-captains **Langston Galloway** and **Ronald Roberts. Jr.**
- This is Saint Joseph's first appearance in the NCAA Tournament since 2008 when the 11th-seeded Hawks lost to sixth-seeded Oklahoma. The Hawks are seeking their first NCAA Tournament win since a victory over Wake Forest in the 2004 Regional Semifinal.
- SJU has gone 20-5 since a loss to #14 Villanova on Dec. 7 and has won nine of the last 11 games, including three in a row in the A-10 Tournament.
- The Hawks' 24 wins are the most since the 2004-05 team went 24-12. Saint Joseph's 11-5 A-10 record is the best since that same season (14-2).
- This is the first NCAA Tournament appearance for every member of the Hawks' team.
- Saint Joseph's received votes in both polls this week. .

PHIL MARTELLI Head Coach

Now in his 19th season as Saint Joseph's University head coach, **Phil Martelli** has built a program that is consistently one of the top in the conference, a perennial post-season participant and a key player on the national scene, while earning his place among the

top coaches in the school's storied history. He has worked 29 years overall at SJU, including 10 seasons as an assistant coach.

Martelli is the Hawks' all-time leader in career victories with a mark of 362-246. He set the record with the victory over Morgan State on December 28, 2011, breaking the mark held by Bill Ferguson (309). Setting the school record for wins in a season (30) in 2004, Martelli has guided SJU to 20 or more victories eight times in his 19 seasons, which is the most for any Hawks coach.

Martelli is the dean of Atlantic 10 coaches as the longest tenured coach currently in the league. He also ranks second all-time in the league in overall career victories, and with a 178-126 mark in Atlantic 10 play, owns the most conference wins for any active coach.

One of the more respected coaches in the game, he is currently the President of the NABC's Board of Directors and is a member of the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Ethics Coalition.

The 2012-13 season saw an experienced Saint Joseph's squad reach the Atlantic 10 Quarterfinals and earn a second consecutive NIT bid, for the 11th postseason berth in Martelli's career. Among the highlights of the season was a win over nationally-ranked Notre Dame in the Coaches vs. Cancer Classic, a victory over local rival Temple and two wins over conference foe Xavier.

In 2011-12, Martelli and the Hawks became one of nine teams in the nation to win 20 games after losing 20 the previous season, and also returned to the postseason with an NIT bid. Saint Joseph's boasted a young and exciting squad, and one of the most balanced in school history, as five different players received Atlantic 10 honors, the most ever for the Hawks. SJU also scored two wins over Top 25 teams (Creighton and Temple) and Martelli became SJU's all-time leader in victories.

In 2010-11, Martelli guided the youngest squad in his career, which included three freshman starters.

The Hawks made an exciting late-season run, earning a berth in the A-10 Tournament with a win in the final regular-season game, and won two games in the tourney to reach the semifinals. He reached two milestones with his 300th career victory (March 11) and his 150th conference win (March 5), while also coaching his 500th game and 250th A-10 contest.

Martelli faced a challenge in 2009-10 with a young and inexperienced squad that went 11-20, coming off a 2008-09 season that saw the Hawks go 17-15 for his ninth consecutive winning season.

Among the highlights of '08-09 was Ahmad Nivins earning AP Honorable Mention All-America honors and becoming the third Hawk in six years to garner the Atlantic 10's Player of the Year Award. Nivins was also chosen by the Dallas Mavericks in the 2009 NBA Draft, becoming the third player coached by Martelli to be drafted.

The 2007-08 Hawks reached the Atlantic 10 Championship game for the third time in four years and earned the program's 19th bid to the NCAA Tournament, and Martelli's fifth. The 11th-seeded Hawks fell to sixth-seeded Oklahoma in the NCAA First Round, while ending the year at 21-13.

Martelli has been at his best when it counts the most as his 17 postseason wins (6 NCAA, 11 NIT) are the most in school history, ahead of Ramsay's 12. Martelli ranks first among Hawk coaches with a .608 postseason winning percentage (17-11) and has taken SJU to the postseason in 10 of the last 14 years, and 12 times in his 19 seasons.

Martelli turned in another top-notch coaching performance in 2005-06, as the Hawks went from a 10-12 record to win eight consecutive games to reach the Atlantic 10 championship game for the second year in a row. SJU was rewarded with its sixth consecutive postseason bid, but saw the season come to an end in the NIT Second Round.

In 2004-05, Martelli turned in perhaps a more remarkable coaching job than in 2003-04 when he was the consensus National Coach of the Year. Faced with the loss of two NBA first-round draft picks, the

2004-05 Hawks struggled early on, but Martelli guided SJU to 21 wins in the calendar year of 2005 to finish 24-12. Saint Joseph's posted the conference's best record (14-2), won its fifth straight regular-season title to tie the league record, earned the A-10's top seed and reached the title game. He was named the Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year for the second straight season and the fourth time in his career, SJU made an exciting six-game run in the NIT, falling on a last-second shot in the championship game.

In 2003-04, Martelli guided a focused and unselfish squad that became the most compelling story in college basketball. The Hawks went undefeated in the regular season, reached the pinnacle as the top-

ranked team in the nation and earned the school's first-ever number-one seed in the NCAA Tournament, while advancing to the Elite Eight. Jameer Nelson was the consensus National Player of the Year and with teammate Delonte West, were both first-round selections in the NBA Draft. SJU opened the season ranked 12th in the polls and moved up throughout the year, taking the top spot on March 8, 2004, for the first time ever, while finishing fifth in the polls, for SJU's highest final ranking since 1966.

Martelli joined with Nelson to sweep the national coach and player awards, marking one of the few times in history that the top player and coach were from the same school. In addition to the national awards, he was the Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year for the third time and a repeat winner of the Big 5 Coach of the Year.

He served as head coach of the 2005 USA Under-21 World Championship Team, which finished in fifth place finish at the FIBA U21 World Championships.

A 1976 graduate of Widener, Martelli began his career on Hawk Hill with SJU's 1985-86 NCAA Tournament team. After 10 years as an assistant at Saint Joseph's, Martelli was named the 14th coach in school history on July 20, 1995, and just the third non-alumnus to follow in the storied tradition of SJU coaches.

Martelli burst onto the scene in his first season (1995-96) and took the squad to the NIT championship game. He followed that in 1996-97 with the Atlantic 10 regular season and tournament titles, along with a berth in the NCAA Sweet 16.

Prior to his arrival at SJU, Martelli spent seven years as head basketball coach at Bishop Kenrick High School and had a stint as assistant coach at Widener, helping guide the Pioneers to the 1978 NCAA Division III Final Four.

As a point guard at Widener, he was part of the NCAA Tournament teams in 1975 and 1976, and set the school's single season and career assist marks.

Martelli and his wife, Judy, a former basketball player with the national champion Immaculata College teams in the 1970s, have three children - Phil, Jr., Jimmy and Elizabeth. Phil, Jr. is an assistant basketball coach at the University of Delaware while he and Elizabeth are both Saint Joseph's graduates. The Martelli's have five young grandchildren, Philip Stephen, and Marra, who are the children of Phil, Jr., and wife Meghan; newborn twins Brynley and Avery, who are the daughters of Jimmy and wife Julie; and newborn Madalyn, who is the child of Elizabeth and Patrick Jefferies.

LAST TIME OUT: Langston Galloway hit a three-pointer at 2:28 to break a tie and Saint Joseph's never trailed again en route to a 65-61 win over VCU to claim the 2014 Atlantic 10 Championship at the Barclays Center and clinch the league's automatich berth to the NCAA Tournament. Galloway led all players with a game-high 19 points, while Ronald Roberts, Jr. finished with a 15-point, 11-rebound double-double. Halil Kanacevic grabbed a game-high 14 rebounds to go with 11 points, while DeAndre' Bembry finished with eight assists and 13 points. Kanacevic was named the tournament's Most Outstanding Player, while Galloway and Roberts were named to the All-Championship Team. VCU held a 48-42 lead with 10:23 to play, but the Hawks would tie up the score two more times. Down 52-50, Roberts hit one free throw and Bembry completed a three-point play to put the Hawks up, 54-52. The Rams tied it 54-54 on a pair of free throws by Treveon Graham at 2:56, but Galloway hit a step-back three-pointer to give the Hawks the lead for good, 57-54. Roberts put down a dunk off a feed from Bembry at 1:29 to put SJU up 59-54, and the Hawks iced the game from the foul line. Galloway made 4-of-5, **Chris Wilson** made one shot and Bembry hit a free throw with :20 to play to provide the final margin.

CHAMPIONSHIP SUNDAY: Saint Joseph's captured its third Atlantic 10 Championship and the first since 1997. It was the second title for the Hawks under coach **Phil Martelli**, with the other championship coming in 1986 when Martelli served as a Hawks' assistant coach.

ON A ROLL: Saint Joseph's has gone 20-5 since a loss to #14 Villanova on December 7. That included a six-game winning streak, which was the longest since a seven-game streak in the 2008-09 season. The Hawks went 6-2 in January, had a 6-1 mark in February, and are now 4-2 in March.

20-20: The Hawks have matched the number of wins from the 2004-05 season (24-12). **Phil Martelli** has guided the Hawks to 20-plus wins eight times in his career, and in two of the past three seasons (20 wins in 2011-12). With a win in this game, SJU would post its most victories since the 2003-04 team went 30-2.

BRACKET BOYS: This is Saint Joseph's third straight postseason appearance, but first NCAA Tournament berth since 2008, when the 11th-seeded Hawks lost to sixth-seeded Oklahoma, which featured Blake Griffin. **Phil Martelli** has led the Hawks to the postseason 12 times, with six NCAA bids and six appearances in the NIT.

BUFFALO BOUND: Saint Joseph's actually has a previous history playing in the NCAA Tournament in Buffalo, and a successful one. This arena is where the Hawks started their journey to the Elite Eight in 2004. The number-one seeded Hawks defeated Liberty, 82-63, and then Texas Tech, 70-65, to advance to the Regionals in East Rutherford, N.J. SJU's season came to an end just points away from the Final Four with the 64-62 loss to Oklahoma State in the Regional Final, finishing the memorable season with a 30-2 record.

PHIL AND THE TOURNEY: Phil Martelli owns a school record 17 postseason wins (6 NCAA, 11 NIT), ahead of Dr. Jack Ramsay's total of 12. He ranks first among Hawk coaches with a .608 winning percentage (17-11) and has taken SJU to postseason play 12 times in his 19 years. Martelli is 6-5 in NCAA Tournament games during his career.

DEJA VU'?: The last time Saint Joseph's entered the NCAA Tournament as the Atlantic 10 Champions was in 1997. The Hawks proceeded to reach the NCAA Sweet 16, defeating Pacific and Boston College, before falling to number-one seed Kentucky in the Regional Semifinal.

UPSETTING NEWS: The Hawks have posted a 4-4 mark as the lower-seeded team in NCAA Tournament play. The last "upset" for the Hawks was one of the biggest in school history, when ninth-seeded SJU defeated No. 1 seed DePaul in the 1981 NCAA Second Round, 49-48, on a last-second layup by John Smith. The Hawks would go on to defeat Boston College before falling to Indiana in the Regional Final.

HAWKS VS. THE TOP 25: The win over #21 UMass was Saint Joseph's first win over a ranked opponent this season and the first since an overtime win over #20 Notre Dame on Nov. 16, 2012. It was the first Top 25 win at Hagan Arena since an 82-72 win over #22 Temple on Feb. 25, 2012. The Hawks then scored a win over #23 VCU in the A-10 title game, giving them a 5-6 record against ranked teams in the last three years, counting this season.

CHAMPIONSHIP THREAD: Phil Martelli and assistant coach **Geoff Arnold** were involved in the Hawks' two A-10 titles thus far. Martelli was an assistant coach for the 1986 team, while Arnold was a senior guard on that squad. Martelli then coached the 1997 champions, which was his second year as SJU's head coach.

FACING THE FIELD: Saint Joseph's has faced seven teams this year which are in the NCAA Tournament - Dayton, George Washington, UMass, Saint Louis, VCU, Creighton and Villanova. The Hawks own a 6-5 record vs. those teams.

MR. EVERYTHING: Halil Kanacevic earned Most Valuable Player honors at the A-10 Championship and showed why he's been called the Hawks' most valuable all year long. He had 26 points and 17 rebounds in the semifinal win over St. Bonaventure, making a career-high 8-of-12 free throws in the win, while hitting 8-of-12 shots from the field. He followed that with 11 points, 14 rebounds, four assists and two blocks in the title game win over VCU. Phil Martelli has called him the Hawks' "most indispensable player" and has called him the "best teammate" on the squad.

TOURNEY TIME: Langston Galloway averaged a team-high 22.7 points per game in the three games of the Atlantic 10 Tournament, while hitting 51.3 percent from the field and 56.5 percent from three-point range. **Halil Kanacevic** averaged 15.3 points, 14.3 rebounds and 3.7 assists. **Ronald Roberts** (12.7) and **DeAndre' Bembry** (10.7) also averaged double figures in the tournament.

ALL-AROUND GUY: Halil Kanacevic is the only player to wear the Saint Joseph's uniform and amass over 1,000 points, 900 rebounds, 400 assists and 200 blocks in his collegiate career. The senior now has a total of 1,139 points, 1,021 rebounds, 401 assists and 213 blocks, totals which include his freshman year at Hofstra. In looking at where those totals rank among SJU's career leaders, Kanacevic is 36th in points, fifth in rebounds, ninth in assists and fifth in blocks.

MAN OF THE HOUR: Langston Galloway scored 20 of his 31 points in the first half and hit 6-of-11 from three-point range to lead the Hawks over Dayton in the A-10 Quarterfinals. The senior also had his second gamewinning three-pointer vs. Dayton this season, hitting the shot with 15 seconds remaining. Galloway's 31 points rank as the 11th highest all-time total for an A-10 Tournament game.

LONG-RANGE SPECIALIST: Langston Galloway, SJU's all-time leader in three-point field goals, hit six threes vs. Dayton. It marked the 12th time in his career that he has made six or more three-pointers in a game. He holds the single-game record with 10 threes made this year vs. Fordham.

CHARACTER STUDY: Phil Martelli attributes the success of the team this year to their character. He has said that the Hawks possess "character" and not "characters".

DOUBLE DIP: Saint Joseph's is one of 25 schools in the nation to have both their men's and women's teams in this year's NCAA Tournament.

STUDYING ABROAD: Saint Joseph's started the year by traveling to Italy in August, a trip which provided not only the benefits of extra practice and more games together, but strengthened the Hawks' chemistry Interestingly enough, the SJU women's basketball team traveled to Ireland in August 2012 and at the end of that season, won the 2013 Atlantic 10 Championship.

DEE-FENSE: The Hawks shut down St. Bonaventure in the second half, limiting the Bonnies to 4-of-24 from the field in the A-10 Semifinal. In the three games of the A-10 Tournament, SJU held its foes to 36.7 percent shooting and 58.7 points per game.

FROM THE LINE: The Hawks have struggled all year from the foul line, but **Ronald Roberts** and **Halil Kanacevic** were solid in the win over St. Bonaventure. Roberts hit all four of his shots, while Kanacevic converted a career-best 8-for-12 from the line.

ALL-LEAGUE HAWKS: Saint Joseph's freshman **DeAndre' Bembry** was named the Atlantic 10's Co-Rookie of the Year, sharing the award with E.C. Matthews of Rhode Island. Senior starters **Langston Galloway** (First Team), **Halil Kanacevic** (Second Team) and **Ronald Roberts, Jr.** (Third Team), were each chosen to the 2014 Atlantic 10 All-Conference Teams, in voting by the league's coaches. It marks the most Hawks to receive All-Conference honors since 2002-03 when Jameer Nelson, Delonte West and Pat Carroll were each named to the All-League Team. Bembry, who is also an All-Rookie Team selection, becomes the first SJU Player to earn the A-10's Rookie of the Year honor since Nelson in 2000-01. Galloway, a second-team honoree in 2012, earns first-team recognition for the first time. Kanacevic, who received honorable mention in 2012, is also named to the Second Team for the first time in his career. Roberts earns Third-Team honors for the second year in a row.

SENIOR STRENGTH: The starting trio of **Langston Galloway**, **Halil Kanacevic** and **Ronald Roberts** comprise one of the most productive groups in school history. Their combined numbers at SJU are: 4,054 points, 2129 rebounds, 734 assists and 323 blocks. Here are their individual numbers and where they rank in SJU history:

- Galloway: 1,966 pts (3rd); 593 rebs (31st); 293 asts; 170 stls; 339 3FG (1st)
- Kanacevic*: 857 pts; 761 rebs (18th); 361 asts; 152 blks (6th)
- Roberts: 1,383 pts (22nd); 851 rebs (12th); 115 blks (8th); 56.9 FG% (2nd)
- * SJU totals only not counting freshman season at Hofstra

TOP ROOKIE: DeAndre' Bembry established himself as one of the top rookies in the Atlantic 10, confirmed by his Co-Rookie of the Year award. The freshman, who was in the starting lineup from the first game, set a new career-high with 22 points at George Washington, while tying his personal best with eight assists. He ranks third on the team in scoring with 12.2 points per game and also ranks third in rebounds (4.5), assists (2.6) and field goal percentage (46.7), while topping the team in steals (1.0). The 6-6 wing player has tallied double figures in 24 games, including eight of the last nine.

MR. DEPENDABLE: Langston Galloway has set the SJU record for career starts with 131 in 132 games played. That breaks the mark of 125 career starts previously held by Jameer Nelson (2000-04).

PROUD PHIL: Phil Martelli has five grandchildren and three of them were born during this season. His son Jimmy and wife Julie had twin girls, Avery and Brynley, born on Jan. 21-22, which was the morning of SJU's game at Rhode Island. Then daughter Elizabeth and husband Patrick Jefferies had their first child, Madalyn, born on March 5. Martelli found out about the birth of Madalyn while at shootaround for the game at George Washington. His oldest grandchildren are Philip Stephen (4) and Marra (2), who are the children of son Phil, Jr., and wife Meghan. Video of Philip Stephen mimicking his grandfather at the A-10 Championship has made him the viral sensation of this week.

TEN YEARS AFTER: It's hard to believe but this season marks the 10th anniversary of Saint Joseph's memorable 2003-04 season, in which the Hawks went 27-0 during the regular season, and 30-2 overall, earned a number-one seed in the NCAA Tournament and reached the Elite Eight, while coming within two points of a Final Four berth. Jameer Nelson and **Phil Martelli** were the consensus National Player of the Year and National Coach of the Year, respectively, while creating a season on Hawk Hill for the record books. The Hawks' NCAA Tournament run began in Buffalo in 2004.

THE COMPLETE GAME: The Hawks put together one of their most complete games in the 79-53 win over Dayton on Feb. 25, which snapped the Flyers' six-game winning streak. SJU jumped out to an 8-0 lead and was up by double digits with less than seven minutes gone by. The Hawks held a 30-point lead with over six minutes to play. Among the key stats of the game were:

- SJU FG%- 58.3; Dayton FG%- 31.7
- SJU 3FG%- 60.0; Dayton 3FG%- 22.7
- 8 turnovers by SJU; 11 by Dayton
- 19 assists on 28 field goals by SJU; 8 assists on 20 field goals by Dayton
- ullet 39 first-half pts by SJU; 20 first-half pts by Dayton

RAINING THREES: Langston Galloway put on another long-range shooting exhibition vs. Fordham as he set the school record with 10 three-pointers en route to scoring a career-high 33 points. The senior made 3-of-5 in the first half and 7-of-10 in the second half, to hit 66.7 percent (10-of-15) in the game. The previous SJU record was nine by Brian Leahy vs. Duquesne on Jan. 17, 1988. Galloway scored 24 points in the second half, which matched his career best set earlier this season against Duquesne. In that game, the senior connected on 9-of-11 shots in the half, including 6-of-7 three-pointers to score 24 points in 19 minutes.

FOUL BALL: Despite having done a good job of limiting their fouls all season, the last two road games were tough for the Hawks with the whistle. SJU was called for 21 fouls at St. Bonaventure and 22 at George Washington, above the team's average of 15.7. At St. Bonaventure, **Halil Kanacevic** picked up his fourth early in the second half and played just five minutes in the second half. **Ronald Roberts** also fouled out late in the game, but not before hitting 7-of-8 field goals and finishing with 15 points. In the GW game, Kanacevic played a season-low 13 minutes and fouled out with 6:55 to play, finishing the game without an assist. SJU committed 20 fouls in the loss to La Salle, but 10 of them came in the last five minutes as the Hawks were trying to get the ball back.

FOUR TO SCORE: Saint Joseph's owns a 12-5 record when at least four players reach double figures in the game.

EASY POINTS: The Hawks have had their struggles from the foul line this year, shooting 64.1 percent. But SJU has gotten to the line 171 more times than its opponents. And despite the shooting percentage, the Hawks have still made 84 more free throws than their foes.

ROAD WARRIORS: Saint Joseph's owns an 8-4 record on the road this year, which is the most road wins since 2007-08, when that squad went 9-6. The Hawks are 5-1 in neutral site games.

STRAIGHT SHOOTERS: Ronald Roberts and **Halil Kanacevic** rank first and second, respectively, in the A-10 for field goal percentage in league games. Roberts converted 59.7 percent while Kanacevic hit 58.7 percent from the field.

CAN'T MISS CHRIS: Chris Wilson converted all eight field goal attempts, including three three-pointers, in the Hawks' dominating win over Dayton. The junior point guard scored 11 points in the first half on 5-for-5 shooting, and then finished the game with a career-high 20 points. It ranked up there with some of the other "perfect" shooting games in Hawk history - the last one prior to Wilson's effort was Delonte West's 12-for-12 performance at Xavier on Jan. 17, 2004.

BOUNCING BACK: After a six-point effort at Rhode Island, **Langston Galloway** bounced back in a big way vs. Fordham with 33 points and a school-record 10 three-pointers. The longest stretch of his career in which the senior has scored less than 10 points is a three-game streak in January, 2013. **Phil Martelli** said, "He's done it through his whole career. It's very rare that he has two or three games in a row where he's playing poorly. You know, Lang gets it. He's a senior. He's got three left in this building. And he wanted to leave people with a memory on this one." Earlier this year, Galloway rebounded from two straight single-digit games to score 24 in the win over VCU. He has tallied double figures in 98 of the 132 games of his career and in all but five games this season.

DOING IT ALL: Halil Kanacevic fills the boxscore unlike any other player. In the Feb. 22 win over Dayton, he had 10 points, eight rebounds, eight assists and four blocked shots. He had a double-double against Creighton with 10 rebounds and 10 assists, which was the first of his career in those categories. That came after a 12-point, 11-rebound, 8-assist effort in the win over Marist. Then there was the career game - 27 points, 14 rebounds, 4 assists, 2 blocks - in the win over Drexel. Against #19 UMass, the senior had 19 points, 13 rebounds and six assists. **Phil Martelli** has called the senior the team's "most indispensable player."

DOMINATING DUO: Ronald Roberts and Chris Wilson combined for 42 points on 16-for-19 shooting against Dayton. The duo had the same amount of points as Dayton did with over four minutes to play - but the Flyers were shooting 16-for-56 from the field as a team.

STREAK STATS: The Hawks put up some impressive numbers in the six-game winning streak. **Langston Galloway** averaged 19.2 ppg during the streak, while **Ronald Roberts** averaged 15.3 points and 7.3 rebounds and **DeAndre' Bembry** scored 14.8 ppg, while tallying double digits in all six. RALLY CAPS: The Hawks have won 12 games in which they trailed at some point of the second half - Vermont, Washington State, Drexel, Boston University, Denver, George Mason, Rhode Island (two games), Dayton (two games), St. Bonaventure (two games) and VCU. In three of those wins, Saint Joseph's trailed by double figures during the game. Those were:

THE 600 CLUB: The win at Rhode Island was the 600th game of **Phil Martelli's** head coaching career. Martelli has posted a school-record 362 wins in 19 seasons at Saint Joseph's. The Fordham game was the 300th Atlantic 10 game of his career, and he owns 178 conference wins.

LONG-DISTANCE LEADER: Langston Galloway is Saint Joseph's all-time leader in career three-pointers with 339. Galloway hit three three-pointers at Richmond to break the record of 294 held by Big 5 Hall of Fame inductee Pat Carroll (2001-05). He also holds the school single-game record after he connected on 10 vs. Fordham while his total of 104 threes on the season is the second best all-time.

STEPPING UP: The Hawks showed their balance again at St. Bonaventure, earning the win even though starter Halil Kanacevic was saddled with foul trouble and played just 19 minutes. Langston Galloway led the way again with 27 points, but the Hawks got a boost off the bench from sophomore Isaiah Miles, who scored 11 points. DeAndre' Bembry (18 pts) and Ronald Roberts (15 pts) also paced the Hawks, who shot an impressive 63.6 percent from the field in the game.

LUCKY SEVENS: SJU outscored Fordham, 21-2, early in the second half. But what was more remarkable was that the Hawks scored three points on each of seven consecutive possessions. **Langston Galloway** knocked down five three-pointers in the four-minute stretch, while **Chris Wilson** also hit a three and **Halil Kanacevic** had a three-point play.

WINNING WITH WILSON: Chris Wilson's career-best game vs. Dayton was the 12th game in double figures this season for the junior. He also had 18 points on 6-for-11 three-point shooting against Creighton and scored 17 points at Loyola, hitting 4-of-5 from the field and 3-of-4 from three-point range.

DEANDRE'S DEFENSE: DeAndre' Bembry has often been called on to guard the opponents' top scorer. Bembry drew the assignment of Tyreek Duren at La Salle and although Duren scored the Explorers' first eight points of the game, the Hawks' freshman shut him down the rest of the way, allowing the La Salle star just seven more points.

LATE-GAME HEROICS: Langston Galloway banked in a three-pointer with 1.8 seconds to play to give the Hawks a 60-57 win at Dayton on Jan. 29. It was the first game-winning shot of his SJU career.

ONE OF A KIND: Halil Kanacevic is a unique player and he's one of a few in the country to lead his team in rebounds (8.8), assists (4.4) and blocks (1.6). Stephen Madison of Idaho led his team in those three categories as well as points and steals, while Jerrelle Benimon of Towson was his team's leader in rebounds, assists and blocks.

BIG-TIME BEMBRY: DeAndre' Bembry had a big-time game in the regular-season win over VCU. The Hawks used the freshman to bring the ball upcourt against VCU's pressure and he scored 18 points on 8-for-13 shooting while grabbing six rebounds. Among the plays on his highlight reel were a three-pointer near the end of the first half that gave SJU a 10-point lead, and a lob pass to **Ronald Roberts** for an alley-oop dunk that pushed the lead to 13 points with 5:56 to play. He also had a solid game at La Salle, scoring 16 second-half points after going scoreless in the first half.

AT THE LINE: Saint Joseph's has struggled at the foul line practically all season, but has also come through with some solid efforts. In the three games prior to GW, the Hawks were shooting 77.7 percent, compared to the current season percentage of 64.1. The best performance of the year was 81.8 percent at La Salle, with the worst in 10 games (54.5) coming against the Explorers at home on March 9.

THREE-HEADED MONSTER: Phil Martelli joked that in the UMass game, **Halil Kanacevic** served as player, coach and referee - referring to the senior's vocal nature and the "help" he provides during the game to the SJU coaching staff and the officials.

BALANCED ATTACK: A testament to the Hawks' balance came when SJU led #21 UMass by 16 points at halftime and leading scorer Langston Galloway didn't have a point. The senior played just 12 minutes in the first half as he was saddled with two fouls. That happened again at Rhode Island when Galloway went scoreless in the first half and finished the game with six points. Ronald Roberts picked up the slack, scoring 18 points, while DeAndre' Bembry and Halil Kanacevic scored 12 apiece. Four of five Saint Joseph's starters are now averaging double figures, led by Galloway at 17.5 ppg. The Hawks have had four players score in double figures in 17 of 33 games and all five starters score double figures once (at La Salle).

AVOIDING THE WHISTLE: The Hawks have done a good job limiting their fouls this season and rank sixth in the nation with the fewest fouls per game (15.8). At La Salle, the Hawks went until 5:23 remained in the first half without being whistled for a foul. **Phil Martelli** pointed out that **Halil Kanacevic** has been succesful in limiting his fouls this season and that's allowed the senior to stay on the court. Kanacevic, who is averaging 3.7 fouls per game, has played all 40 minutes in seven games this year. He has only been disqualified six times, but the most costly one came in the loss at George Washington.

IRON MEN: The Hawks' starters have logged a lot of minutes during A-10 play, with all five averaging over 32 minutes per game. **Langston Galloway** leads the way with 37.3 minutes and ranks second in the league in A-10 games only. Galloway leads the squad in minutes in all games with 35.7, a number that ranks third in the Atlantic 10.

MOVING ON UP: Ronald Roberts, Jr. eclipsed the 1,300-point mark vs. Dayton (Feb. 25) and now ranks 22nd on the all-time scoring list with 1,383 career points, an average of 10.6 per game.

RON'S REBOUNDS: Ronald Roberts went over 800 rebounds in his career vs. Dayton (Feb. 25) and now has has 851 to rank 12th in Hawk history. That's an average of 6.6 per game.

SENIOR MOMENTS: Phil Martelli has repeatedly praised this group of players for their character on and off the court. And he's singled out the seniors for leading the way. After the win over La Salle, Martelli said, "Seniors, seniors. They have been special since the summer when we were preparing for Italy. They were great on that trip and they've been

great every practice. When I looked at the stat sheet at halftime, I thought that the seniors are taking us here."

SENSE OF BALANCE: The Hawks had their most balanced game of the year at La Salle as all five starters scored double figures for the first time this season. The Hawks also shot 49 percent from the field and went a season-best 81.8 percent from the foul line. SJU also committed just eight turnovers while forcing La Salle into 13 turnovers.

HEATING UP: Saint Joseph's shot 59.2 percent from the field vs. Fordham, tied as the second best number of the season, and made 15-of-29 from three-point range (51.7 percent). The Hawks also shot over 70 percent from the foul line (73.7 pct) for only the eighth time this year. Helping the team's field goal percentage were 4-for-4 efforts by both **Ronald Roberts** and **Halil Kanacevic**.

CRYING FOUL: As one of the teams in the nation with the fewest personal fouls per game, the Hawks faced a different situation at Rhode Island on Feb. 19. **DeAndre' Bembry** picked up his second foul at 15:27 of the first half and sat the rest of the half. **Halil Kanacevic** was whistled for his second with over six minutes left in the first half and then he and Bembry picked up their third fouls in the first six minutes of the second half. Kanacevic got his fourth with over 10 minutes to play in the second half, but stayed in the rest of the game. **Ronald Roberts** had four fouls with over six minutes remaining, but finished the contest playing all 40 minutes. Bembry was whistled for his fourth at 5:32 of the second half, but finished out the Hawk victory.

COMEBACK KIDS: The Hawks fought back from a 10-point deficit at Rhode Island to score the 57-54 win. **Ronald Roberts** helped pace the win with 11 of his 18 points in the second half. Trailing by 10 at 14:27, the Hawks went on a 9-0 run and tied the game on a three-point play by Roberts at 9:57. The Hawks went up by 53-48 on a three-pointer by **Papa Ndao** and eventually sealed the win on a layup by **Halil Kanacevic** with 34 seconds to go. After shooting just 35.7 percent from the field and making 1-of-10 from three-point range in the first half, the Hawks hit 12-of-21 shots and 3-of-6 three-point attempts in the second half. It was the second biggest deficit overcome for victory this season.

20-20: After just missing a triple-double at Penn, **Halil Kanacevic** was within one rebound of a 20-20 game at Richmond. The senior had 21 points and a career-high 19 rebounds in the loss. Classmate **Langston Galloway** has scored 20-plus points 11 times this year, and in 34 games of his career, which is one of the best numbers in the A-10.

RIGHTING THE SHIP: After consecutive losses to city rivals Temple and Villanova (30-point loss) in early December, Saint Joseph's has gone 20-5 since then and Phil Martelli credits the players for the turnaround. "These guys looked at each other and decided that if they kept coming every day and kept themselves tight, then good things would happen. It was all of them. Not one guy wavered. I would say the strength of this group is the group and that's what they leaned on."

MISSED GAMES: Ronald Roberts, Jr., made his return to the starting lineup at Penn after missing the George Mason and Duquesne games with back spasms suffered at UMass. They were the first games in his career that Roberts missed, ending a consecutive-game streak of 113. Isaiah Miles was also back in action at Penn after missing three games (UMass, George Mason, Duquesne) due to a concussion suffered in the Denver game on Jan. 4.

BEMBRY'S WEEK: DeAndre' Bembry was named the Atlantic 10 Co-Rookie of the Week for Feb. 10, as he averaged 11.5 points and four rebounds per game in the Hawks' 1-1 week. Bembry scored 18 points and added six rebounds as the Hawks topped VCU, 69-62. He also added three assists and a game-high three steals in the win. It was the second weekly honor for Bembry as he was previously honored on Nov. 18.

REPEAT HONOREE: Halil Kanacevic was named the Philadelphia Big 5 Co-Player of the Week for February 3. It marked the third time this season that he's earned the Big 5 honor. The forward averaged 13.0 points, 8.5 rebounds and 4.0 assists and shot 55 percent from the field (11-for-20) from the field.

TRIPLE PLAY: Halil Kanacevic just missed the rare triple-double against Penn, falling one point short. The senior had nine points, 15 rebounds and tied his career-high with 12 assists. The last time a Hawk achieved a triple-double was Dwayne Jones versus St. Bonaventure on Feb. 19, 2005, when he had 11 points, 11 rebounds and 10 blocks.

BACK IN FORM: Langston Galloway returned to the long-range shooting form from his sophomore season, when he was the top three-point shooter in the A-10 and ranked fourth in the nation with 46.6 percent. The senior is second in the A-10 with 43.9 percent and first with 3.2 three-pointers made. He ranks 13th in the nation in three-point percentage and 14th in threes made per game and 12th in total three-pointers (104).

THE POINT FORWARD: Halil Kanacevic's unique passing ability for a forward allows the Hawk offense to often run through him. He has been SJU's leader in assists for the past two seasons and currently leads the team in rebounds (8.8) and assists (4.4), while ranking second in the A-10 in rebounds and fourth in assists.

FAB FROSH: DeAndre' Bembry is third on the team in scoring with 12.0 points per game. He's on track to finish the season averaging double figures, and if he does so, will become the first freshman since Langston Galloway to accomplish that. Galloway averaged 12.8 ppg in his rookie season (2010-11).

GAME OF THREES: The Hawks have put on a few long-range shooting exhibitions this season, particularly a season-best 17-for-27 (63.0 percent) effort in the win over Duquesne. It marked the most three-pointers made since a school-record 20 by the Hawks against Temple in the 2003-04 season. SJU has also hit 14 three-pointers in a game twice this year, against Binghamton and Creighton, and then made 15 in wins over Penn and Fordham. **Langston Galloway** was responsible for a school-record 10 threes in the Fordham win. SJU averages 7.4 three-pointers made per game, a number which is second best in the A-10.

FACE THE NATION: Langston Galloway is fourth in the nation among Division I active career leaders for three-point field goals, with his career total of 339. He also ranks 24th in threes made per game (2.57) and 30th in three-point percentage (42.4). The top four players in career three-pointers made are:

AROUND THE A-10: Langston Galloway leads the Atlantic 10 in three-pointers made (3.2), ranks second in three-point percentage (43.9), and third in scoring (17.5). **Halil Kanacevic** is second in rebounding (8.8) and

is fourth in assists (4.4), while **Ronald Roberts** tops the league field goal percentage (59.8). As a team, Saint Joseph's leads in field goal percentage in both overall (46.9) and conference games (47.6).

DEPTH PERCEPTION: The injuries to starter **Ronald Roberts** and sixth man **Isaiah Miles** in early January emphasized the Hawks' lack of depth. At #19 UMass, SJU was without Miles because of a concussion suffered in the Denver win. Then Roberts suffered back spasms early in the second half (17:05), which sidelined him for the rest of the game. **Phil Martelli** used only seven players in the rotation and seniors **Langston Galloway** and **Halil Kanacevic** played all 40 minutes. It marked the first time in his career that Kanacevic played all 40 minutes - although he did play 44 in an overtime win over Notre Dame last season. The Hawks were without Roberts and Miles at George Mason, but **Papa Ndao** made the start and contributed a career-high 13 points, and Galloway and Kanacevic logged 40 minutes again. SJU's starters all average over 31 minutes per game.

THE BIG THREE: Senior tri-captains Langston Galloway, Halil Kanacevic and Ronald Roberts, Jr., are the core of the Hawks' team and they currently account for 58 percent of SJU's scoring and 55 percent of the rebounding. There have only been four games this year in which the Hawks' leading scorer was not one of those three players. Chris Wilson and DeAndre' Bembry have each led two games in scoring.

PAPA'S PLAY: Papa Ndao has earned the role of sixth man with his play this year. In the three games prior to the Rhode Island win, the junior made his last 7-of-8 three-point attempts and 9-of-10 total shots. He hit two crucial free throws with 12 seconds to play in the win over Massachusetts but was unavailable for the VCU game because of the flu.

ON THE MARK: Ronald Roberts ranks second in SJU history in career field goal percentage, converting 56.9 percent from the field (537-944). Ahmad Nivins, who was the 2009 A-10 Player of the Year, is the all-time leader with 62.7 percent.

NOW'S THE TIME: Papa Ndao stepped up in a big way at George Mason, replacing **Ronald Roberts** in the starting lineup. The junior made the sixth start of his career and responded with a perfect shooting game to score a career-high 13 points. It marked his first time in double figures as he went 4-for-4 from the field, making three three-pointers, and hitting two free throws in the final minute. Ndao played a career-high 37 minutes - his previous high was 20 minutes. He also started the Duquesne game and grabbed a team-high seven rebounds.

BIG MAN ON CAMPUS: Saint Joseph's senior Langston Galloway was named the Philadelphia Big 5 Player of the Week for Feb. 17. It was the second time this season that he has earned the honor and the sixth time in his career. The guard led a balanced effort by Saint Joseph's in the 75-64 win over Atlantic 10 and city rival La Salle. He had one of the best shooting weeks of his career as he hit 68 percent (17-for-25) from the field and a blistering 70.5 percent (12-for-17) from three-point range.

FROZEN: Either the ice storm or the Saint Louis defense froze the Hawks' offense in the 65-49 loss to the Billikens. Saint Joseph's shot just 27.3 percent in the first half, and just 31.9 percent in the game. The Hawks had their worst effort of the season from the three-point line, going just 1-for-15.

ON THE SIDELINE: Kyle Molock is sidelined for the rest of the year. The redshirt freshman reinjured his right knee in practice earlier this month and had successful surgery on February 7 to again repair the ACL of that

knee, of which he previously had surgery in August 2012. The injury to his right knee that took place in August 2012, was the second on that knee for Molock, and the third knee injury overall. He was averaging 19.0 points through eight games as a senior at Dublin Coffman when he tore the ACL of his right knee in January 2012; in July of 2010, he suffered a severe injury to all of the major ligaments in his left knee, causing him to miss his junior year.

THE HAWK WILL NEVER DIE: The Saint Joseph's Hawk mascot has been named the best college basketball tradition by NCAA.com in its rankings of the top five traditions. Ranking behind the Hawk are: 2- Kansas' "Rock Chalk, Jayhawk" chant; 3- the "Frisbee Cheer" at UCLA; 4- Duke's "Krzyzewski-Ville" when students camp out for the game with North Carolina; and 5- Wake Forest's "Rolling the Quad" with streamers of white tissue.

EVERYBODY INTO THE ACT: All 12 players who were dressed for the game saw action vs. Duquesne. Redshirt freshman **Javon Baumann** notched career-highs of eight points and five rebounds; **Daryus Quarles** had a season-high nine points; and senior walk-on **Colin Kelly** scored his first career points.

THE DUNK CONNECTION: Halil Kanacevic, the team's leader in assists, has a knack for finding **Ronald Roberts** around the rim. Kanacevic assisted on three of Roberts' five dunks in the Washington State game and has a total of 24 assists on dunks this season, mostly to Roberts.

WINNING WITH WILSON: Point guard **Chris Wilson** scored in double figures four times during the five-game winning streak in December. Wilson had 11 points against Drexel, 17 at Loyola and tied his careerhigh with 19 in the win over BU. He shot a career-best 7-for-14 from the field vs. BU, while making 3-of-6 three pointers. He then added 13 points vs. Binghamton.

ODD OCCURRENCE: Halil Kanacevic went without an assist against Denver. It was the first time since the Butler game on Jan. 9, 2013 that the Hawks' leader in assists did not register one. In the Denver game, however, the Hawks missed 21 shots in the first half. He also did not have an assist at GW, but the senior was limited to 13 minutes of action with foul trouble.

FOUR FOUR: Langston Galloway is on track to become the first Hawk to lead the team for all four years in each of two categories - minutes played and three-point percentage. The senior is currently averaging a team-high 35.7 minutes played per game, and leads the squad in three-point percentage (42.5). No Hawk has led either of those categories for all four years.

POMP AND CIRCUMSTANCE: Langston Galloway, Halil Kanacevic and Eric Kindler became Saint Joseph's graduates on December 17, which was the end of the first semester. All three players finished the coursework for their degrees. Kanacevic earned his bachelor's in communications, Galloway received his in sports marketing and Kindler earned a degree in theology. Coach Phil Martelli said it was the first time in his career that he had that many players graduate in December. Both Galloway and Kanacevic will both exhaust their eligibility at the end of this season. Kindler will have one year remaining as he transferred to Saint Joseph's in his sophomore year but did not play basketball.

HAPPY HOMECOMING: Isaiah Miles put together a career-best game vs. Loyola in his hometown of Baltimore. The sophomore scored 11 points in the first half en route to a career-high 17, in just 12 minutes of action.

He hit on 4-of-5 shots from the field and made all eight free throw attempts. He then had his second double-figure effort in three games when he scored 11 points in the win over Binghamton.

HAIL HALIL: Halil Kanacevic was named the Big 5 Co-Player of the Week for Dec. 23 after he had a career game to lead the Hawks to the win over Drexel. The senior had a career-high 27 points and added 14 rebounds for the 12th double-double of his career. He also led the team with four assists and two blocks while shooting a personal best 12-for-13 from the field. Phil Martelli said, "Halil was the way he had practiced and the way he had talked. He was really emphatic with his teammates about getting their heads up and moving on to the next challenge." It was the first Big 5 honor of his career, although he earned it again on Jan. 13 and Feb. 3.

ROCK OF AGES: This year's squad is one of SJU's most experienced teams in recent years. The average age of the starting five is 21.2 years old. Three Hawks - Langston Galloway, Ronald Roberts and Halil Kanacevic - have each played over 120 games in their college careers.

RAVING ABOUT RON: Phil Martelli had this to say about Ronald Roberts after the LSU game: "Ron has worked at his game. He's been the Most Improved Player as voted by the coaching staff for three years in a row.... And he'd even be a candidate for this year. But what Ron will probably tell you after tonight is that he had three turnovers. I'm happy for him, he's the product of a really great family. He and (asst. coach) Dave Duda have worked on his game every day to try to get better."

FIRST HONOR: DeAndre' Bembry was named the Atlantic 10 Rookie of the Week for Nov. 17. He averaged 14.0 points, 3.5 rebounds and 3.0 assists as the Hawks went 1-1 on the week, while connecting on 54.5 percent from the field and 55.6 percent from three-point range.

ABOUT BEMBRY: Phil Martelli likes what he has seen this season from freshman **DeAndre' Bembry**: "DeAndre' is a player beyond his age. He's got a really nice way about him and really takes in what you give him."

SEEING DOUBLE: Halil Kanacevic now has a team-high six double-doubles - including one in rebounds (10) and assists (10) vs. Creighton. **Ronald Roberts** led the Hawks last season with 13 double-doubles on the year and he has two so far, against Marist and Washington State.

ON THE REBOUND: Halil Kanacevic and Ronald Roberts provide the Hawks with a top-notch rebounding tandem. Kanacevic is averaging 8.8 boards and 6.8 defensive rebounds per game while Roberts is grabbing 7.4 boards and 4.5 defensive rebounds. Kanacevic has notched double figures in rebounds 12 times this season. SJU's team rebounding margin stands at +2.9, which is the fifth best number in the A-10.

SERVING THE COMMUNITY: Chris Wilson was one of 70 NCAA Men's Division I nominees for the Allstate NABC Good Works Team. The award, now in its second year, recognizes a select group of college basketball student-athletes who have made significant contributions to the greater good of their communities through volunteerism and civic service. Wilson has participated in numerous Saint Joseph's community service projects, has volunteered at his church in Philadelphia and at home in Fayetteville, N.C. Teammate **Langston Galloway** was named to the inaugural team last year and made a trip to the 2013 NCAA Final Four.

FROM THE START: Freshman **DeAndre' Bembry** was the first freshman in SJU's starting lineup on opening day since 2010-11 when the trio of **Langston Galloway, Daryus Quarles** and C.J. Aiken each started their first collegiate game.

TWO-FOR-TWO: Ronald Roberts, Jr. was named both the Atlantic 10 Co-Player of the Week and the Philadelphia Big 5 Player of the Week for March 3. It was his second weekly honor of the year for both leagues, and the third of his career for both. Roberts averaged 18.5 points, 6.5 rebounds and 2.0 blocks in the Hawks' 2-0 week which ran their winning streak to six games. The senior shot 78.9 percent (15-19) from the field and 58.3 percent (7-for-12) from the foul line. He scored a game-high 22 points in the Hawks' 79-53 win over Dayton, while hitting 8-for-11 from the field and 6-for-10 from the foul line. He then had 15 points in SJU's 83-74 win over St. Bonaventure, hitting 7-of-8 field goal attempts while grabbing six rebounds and blocking two shots. He was also named the Atlantic 10 Co-Player of the Week on Dec. 2 after being selected to the 2013 Old Spice Classic All-Tournament Team by averaging 20 points, 7.0 rebounds and 1.7 blocks in SJU's three games in Orlando.

ENJOYING THE RIDE: On many occasions this season, **Phil Martelli** has said that he enjoys coaching this group. After the Creighton game, he elaborated, "I have a really great team. Now there are basketball pieces missing. But these guys, you can't wait to get to work with them in every aspect. The way they're perceived on campus and in recruiting is great."

VIVA ITALIA: Saint Joseph's got a jump on the season when it traveled to Italy in August for a 10-day, four-game tour. The Hawks visited Rome, Florence, Venice and Lake Como and posted a 4-0 record on the trip. It marked the second time that **Phil Martelli** took SJU to Italy, with the last trip coming in 1999.

DEAN OF COACHES: This is **Phil Martelli's** 19th season at the helm of the Hawks, and he is SJU's all-time leader in career victories with a 362-246 record. He notched his 350th win on Jan. 18 vs. Penn. He is the longest tenured coach in the Atlantic 10 (19 years) and is now second on the conference's list for all-time career victories, behind John Chaney of Temple (516). Martelli is currently serving as the president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC).

SIGN THEM UP: Saint Joseph's had four high school standouts - James Demery, Markell Lodge, Shavar Newkirk, and Obi Romeo - sign National Letters of Intent during the early signing period. Demery is a 6-6 wing player from Northside Christian Academy in Charlotte, N.C. He averaged 16.8 points and 4.2 steals last season as his team won its second straight Independent School 2A state title. Lodge, originally from Virginia, is a 6-7 wing at Pace Academy in Carrboro, N.C., who is known for his tremendous athleticism and leaping ability. Newkirk is a 6-0 point guard from Cardinal Hayes High School in Bronx, N.Y. Considered one of the top point guards in New York City, he helped Cardinal Hayes to the CHSAA Semifinals in 2012. Romeo, a 6-foot-10 forward with a 94-inch wingspan, is originally from Nigeria and has been in the United States for the past three years, attending Greenbrier East High School in West Virginia. He averaged 10 points and 13 rebounds last season for the team that went 20-5.

IN MEMORY: Halil Kanacevic changed his uniform number this year to 45 (from 21) in memory of his uncle, Rizo Popovic, who passed away during the 2012-13 season at the age of 45. Kanacevic explained, "It's one of the most selfish things you think of, as a player, when you're growing up. You get a certain number, you get infatuated with it...I've seen kids get into fights over a jersey number. My thing was, let me be unselfish about that and actually give meaning to it. I know what that number means, I know what it represents, I chose it for personal reasons, not a selfish reason. I felt like I needed to do it."

HOME SWEET HOME: This marks the fifth season of Michael J. Hagan '85 Arena. The arena was dedicated in October 2009 after a two-year expansion and renovation of Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse, which was the home of the Hawks since 1949. Saint Joseph's owns a 44-24 record in the five seasons of Hagan Arena, but a 363-106 overall record in 63 years of Hagan Arena/Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse. SJU went 11-4 on its home court this season, the best record since the Hawks posted the same mark in 2011-12.

STRENGTH OF SCHEDULE: Saint Joseph's non-conference schedule was ranked as the second toughest in the A-10, behind VCU's. Other non-conference foes of note on the Hawks' schedule were Creighton, Villanova, Temple and Vermont.

CAPTAINS OF THE SHIP: Langston Galloway, Halil Kanacevic and Ronald Roberts, Jr., have served as tri-captains this season.

WAITING IN THE WINGS: Freshman forward Jai Williams, from Philadelphia Electrical and Technical Charter School, earned All-Public League Fourth Team honors is redshirting the season. Aaron Brown, a 6-5 guard, transferred to SJU from West Virginia this summer and will sit out the year due to NCAA transfer rules. He was the Delaware County Player of the Year in 2010 for nearby Penn Wood High School and will have two years with the Hawks beginning in 2014-15.

CRADLE OF COACHES: The Saint Joseph's coaching connection is an impressive one. A total of seven Saint Joseph's graduates have gone on to become head coaches in the NBA, and SJU is tied with Illinois for second on the list of universities with alums that have served as NBA head coaches. Indiana tops the list with 11 graduates that have coached in the league. Jim O'Brien was the most recent NBA head coach, and his last year with the Indiana Pacers was in 2010-11. THE HAWK

The Saint Joseph's Hawk mascot has been flapping its wings for 57 years. One of the most famous mascots in college sports, the Hawk is best known for staying in constant motion by flapping its wings throughout every basketball game and representing the Saint Joseph's motto, "The Hawk Will Never Die".

The Hawk mascot was named the "Best College Basketball Tradition" by NCAA.com in 2014.

The idea for the Hawk as a mascot was originated by Jim Brennan during the 1954-55 season. Brennan, an ex-Marine and SJU cheerleader, at first wanted to secure an actual hawk, but later switched



to the costume idea. The student government raised the 120 dollars needed to buy the initial costume, which Brennan donned for three years. He made his debut as the Hawk on January 4, 1956, a 69-56 win over La Salle at the Palestra. The Hawk has not missed a men's basketball game since that first season.

In addition to the constant flapping, the Hawk is also recognized by its "flying" in figure eights around the court during timeouts. The constant motion, coupled with the scrappy play of the University's athletic teams, helped to spawn the school's familiar slogan "The Hawk Will Never Die!" A few years ago, ESPN used a "flap-ometer" on the national telecast of a Saint Joseph's game to estimate that the Hawk flaps its wings 3,500 times during a regulation game.

The Hawk is unique because it is one of the few mascots in the nation that travels to every game, and the student who holds the position gains a tuition scholarship. The student, who is selected through an interview process during the previous spring semester, also serves as a team manager for the men's basketball team and travels with the squad.

lan Klinger, the 35th student to wear the wings, is the Hawk mascot for the second consecutive season. He is a senior finance and accounting major from Millersburg, Pa.

Game 4: November 28, 2013 - Old Spice Classic - Orlando, Fla. LSU 82 - SJU 65

LSU defeated Saint Joseph's, 82-65, in the first round of the 2013 Old Spice Classic, held at ESPN's Wide World of Sports. Ronald Roberts led SJU with 21 points and in the first half, became the 51st Hawk to surpass 1,000 points in his career when he scored on a tip-in at 6:23. The senior connected on 9-of-13 from the field while grabbing a team-high seven rebounds. The Hawks suffered from a poor shooting night, from both the three-point arc (18.8 %) and the foul line (46.2%), as they made just 12-of-26 free throws. Saint Joseph's defense didn't have any answer for the Tigers' long-range shooting as LSU converted 8-of-13 three-point field goals in the opening period. After LSU went up, 51-30, in the first minute of the second half, the Hawks made a run and closed to 54-44. LSU stopped Saint Joseph's momentum with a three-pointer at 10:39 to extend its lead to 57-44. It was a tale of two halves, but Saint Joseph's held on for an 88-77 win over Loyola Maryland. Four Hawks scored in double figures during a 60-point first half as Ronald Roberts led Saint Joseph's with 20 points. SJU was led early by Langston Galloway, who hit on his first four three-point attempts and first five field goal attempts. After a 10-3 Hawk spurt, Loyola scored five straight to close within 13-12, which would be as close as the Greyhounds would get for the rest of the game. With SJU holding a 24-19 lead, a three-pointer from Isaiah Miles kicked off a 36-5 run to close out the half. Miles' three began a 17-0 spurt for the Hawks and was highlighted by a 9-of-10 shooting stretch for Saint Joseph's. SJU held a 60-24 lead at intermission. During the first half, the Hawks shot a blistering 64.5% (20-31) from the field, including 8-of-12 from three-point range, and hit on all 12 free throw attempts. In the middle of the second half, things turned around as Loyola outscored SJU 53-28 and held the Hawks to just four field goals. With SJU leading 72-42 with 9:30 left, Loyola raced to a 20-5 run, closing to 77-62 with 3:19 to play. Loyola then used an 8-1 spurt over a 40-second span to close to within 79-70 with 1:35 to go. Over the final 1:30, the Hawks hit 9-of-11 free throws to ice the game. Miles finished with a career-high 17 points in his hometown, Chris Wilson had 17 and Galloway scored 14 points.

Chris Wilson tied his career high with 19 points to lead four Hawks in double figures while Ronald Roberts, Jr. had 19 as well, Langston Galloway scored 16 and freshman DeAndre' Bembry added 11. Trailing by three points with 7:25 remaining in the game, seniors Halil Kanacevic and Langston Galloway put Saint Joseph's on their backs and led the Hawks to a gritty 84-80 win at George Mason in the first A-10 meeting of the teams. Kanacevic scored 23 points, Galloway had 20 and DeAndre' Bembry added 17, while Papa Ndao posted a career-high 13 points on 4-of-4 shooting in his first start of the season. The Hawks were without second-leading scorer Ronald Roberts, Jr., who missed his first career game due to back spasms, and Isaiah Miles who missed his second consecutive game due to a concussion. Galloway and Kanacevic would each drain a pair of free throws to help seal the victory before GMU hit a desperation three-pointer at the buzzer to provide the final margin.

Langston Galloway scored 24 of his 26 points in the first half as Saint Joseph's staked a 30point lead and cruised to an 84-75 win over Duquesne. Halil Kanacevic led all players with 21 points and a career-high 19 rebounds, but Saint Joseph's struggled from the floor in a 77-62 loss at Richmond. During the game, Langston Galloway broke the school's career record for three-point field goals (294) set by SJU Basketball Hall of Famer Pat Carroll from 2001-05. Galloway sank the 295th three-pointer of his career in the second half. Leading 35-28 at halftime, Richmond opened the second half with an 11-2 run to take a 46-30 lead with 15:41 to go. SJU would cut the deficit to 52-43 after five points each from Galloway and Chris Wilson during a 13-6 stretch. The Spiders responded with a 12-2 run, taking their biggest lead of the game when a dunk made it a 64-45 advantage with 4:34 to go. After a dunk by Ronald Roberts, Galloway hit his record-breaking three to cut the deficit to 64-50. A three-pointer from Kanacevic with 3:20 to play preceded a pair of UR free throws that left the score at 66-53, but a jumper from DeAndre' Bembry and another three from Galloway capped off a 13-2 run that got the Hawks back within 66-58 with 2:22 to go. The Hawks could not get closer, however, as the Spiders converted 9-of-10 free throws over the final 1:25 to seal the victory. Saint Joseph's enjoyed a 44-35 advantage on the boards and pulled down 21 offensive rebounds, but shot just 37.1% (26-of-70) from the floor. Richmond hit on 47.9% (23-of-48) of its shots; that mark included 10-of-22 (45.5%) from three-point range, well over their average of 31.6%. Galloway scored 11 of his 13 points in the second half, while Bembry (11) and Wilson (10) also reached double-digits for SJU.

Langston Galloway banked home a three-pointer with 1.8 seconds remaining to lead Saint Joseph's past Dayton, 60-57. Chris Wilson led the Hawks with 15 points on 5-of-9 shooting, while Halil Kanacevic scored the 1,000th point of his collegiate career and grabbed 11 rebounds. Ronald Roberts, Jr. added 12 points and DeAndre' Bembry had 11. With the Hawks leading 57-55, Dayton's Dyshawn Pierre tied the game with a layup with 11 seconds left. After a timeout, Galloway

took the inbounds pass in the backcourt and dribbled around a pair of screens on his right. His shot hit the backboard and went through the net with 1.8 seconds on the clock. The Flyers missed a desperation attempt from halfcourt to give the Hawks the victory, their first in Dayton since Feb. 21, 2001, snapping an eightgame losing streak at UD Arena. The Hawks owned a 15-point lead in the second half, but almost let it slip away. With SJU leading 47-32 at the midway point of the half, Dayton made its comeback, outscoring the Hawks, 19-7, over the next eight minutes. After Dayton's Vee Sanford picked off an SJU pass, Bembry was whistled for a flagrant foul in trying to stop the break. Sanford hit both free throws to pull UD within 54-51 at 2:23, but Wilson intercepted a pass on Dayton's ensuing possession. Bembry then hit a pair of free throws to increase SJU's lead to 56-51. The Flyers came within 56-55, at :27, but Bembry connected on the front end of the one-and-one to give SJU a 57-55 cushion. The Flyers answered with a layup at :11 to tie the game at 57-57 and set the stage for Galloway's game-winner. SJU scored a season-low 20 points in the first half, and trailed 25-20 at halftime. The Hawks came out like a different team after intermission and opened the second with a 27-7 run, including 12 straight points to take a 47-32 lead.

Chris Wilson hit a pair of free throws with :30 seconds to play to help Saint Joseph's hold on for a 73-68 win over #21/19 Massachusetts at Hagan Arena. Halil Kanacevic led the Hawks with 18 points and five assists while Ronald Roberts scored 17. DeAndre' Bembry had 13 points and Wilson scored 12. Massachusetts fought back from a 17-point first half deficit and tied the game 67-67 with 1:20 to play. SJU followed with a free throw from Langston Galloway at :56 to regain the 68-67 lead, but UMass tied it again on a foul shot at :39. Wilson's free throws at :30 gave Saint Joseph's a 70-68 lead, but UMass turned the ball over on its next possession and Papa Ndao came away with the ball. Langston Galloway hit a school-record 10 three-pointers and scored a career-high 33 points to lead Saint Joseph's to an 87-72 win over Fordham at Hagan Arena. Galloway made 10-of-15 from behind the arc to eclipse the record of nine threepointers previously set by Brian Leahy vs. Duquesne on Jan. 17, 1988. The senior finished the game shooting 11-for-18 overall from the field. Ronald Roberts, Jr. had 13 points and a team-high 13 rebounds for the Hawks, while DeAndre' Bembry scored 13 and Halil Kanacevic added 10 points and five assists. Ronald Roberts, Jr. scored 22 points and Chris Wilson had a career-high 20 points as Saint Joseph's scored a convincing 79-53 win over Dayton at Hagan Arena. The win was the fifth in a row for Saint Joseph's while snapping Dayton's six-game winning streak, and handing the Flyers their worst loss of the season. It was the 20th win for SJU, marking the first 20-win season since 2007-08. Wilson shot a perfect 8-for-8 from the field, while Roberts hit 8-of-11 field goals. DeAndre' Bembry scored 12 points while Halil Kanacevic added 10 points, eight rebounds, eight assists and four blocked shots. Wilson and Roberts each scored 11 points in the first half as the Hawks quickly built up a double-digit lead. SJU scored the first eight points of the game and never looked back, taking a 10-1 lead in the first four minutes, and expanding it to 17-6 with seven straight points from Roberts. Backto-back three-pointers from Papa Ndao built SJU's lead to its biggest of the half, 37-18, and the Hawks went into intermission holding a 39-20 lead. The Hawks kept rolling in the second half and maintained a 20-plus point lead most of the way. The Hawks took their largest margin of the game, 77-47, on a three-pointer by Bembry with 2:10 to play. Saint Joseph's made 58.3 percent from the field in the game and connected on 60 percent (9-of-15) from three-point range. Dayton hit just 31.7 percent and 22.7 percent from behind the arc





Martelli gets teary as St. Joe's clinches

ed St. Joe's would have a good 2013-14 season, you started off right, then were wrong, very wrong, right, right, right, crucially wrong, and now completely right.

Right after the Villanova game, a 98-68 December debacle, a website was constructed, Philmustgo.com. According to the site, 351 people signed a petition, many giving reasons why it was time for a change.

"It's impossible," Martelli said of ignoring the website, talking just before the selection show. "I read newspapers. I'm out in the community, so I hear everything."

In the past, he would have engaged, he said. (Think 2004, Billy Packer.)

"Who is it, and what are they saying?" Martelli said said he might have responded. "But you're not dealing with all the cards. I get it. We were 4-4 and we got annihilated."

Critics had more cards. St. Joe's hadn't been to the NCAAs since 2008, hadn't won a tourney game since 2004. Despite that '04 run to the Elite Eight after a perfect regular season, Martelli doesn't get a lifetime deal.

Still, he said, "I've worked so hard at not just being the coach."

In other words, of course he was hurt.

"I thought that we could be special," Martelli said of this season, how he tried to leave the outside noise aside. "The players, I know that they know, because I can hear them, and there's a couple of them that wanted to engage. ... I told the players 'Don't engage. I'm good.'

Fans getting upset at coaches isn't exactly breaking news, but it may be unique to have a website set up and petitions signed to get rid of the coach, and plenty more alumni agreeing with the sentiment, it the midst of what turns out to be a special season, now 24-9.

And now? It's a joyride When Martelli saw where the Hawks were placed, he snapped his head a little.

"I was startled," he said not because the Hawks were a 10th seed and playing UConn, but because of the potential secondrounder with 'Nova.

But if that matchup were to happen, it's not any more outlandish that how the rest of this has played out for the Hawks

"This is going to go way up there on a number of fronts," Martelli said, ticking off the joy of his players and all his family there, including his grandson who gave his own news conference, mimicking his grandfather. "This will be tough to beat."

And if you go to Philmus tgo.com now, you see a pho to of the coach, his arm extended, thumb raised, with the words, "Congratulations to the 2014 A10 Champs... In Phil We Trust."

Seniors going out right way

BROOKLYN, N.Y. — Phil Martelli is almost never wrong.

Not about his basketball team, sequestered on Hawk Hill in Martelli's tiny fieldom, all things within his gaze.

He's wrong about this team. Just a little.

Martelli thinks this St. Joseph's team was propelled to the Atlantic 10 Tournament title yesterday by a 10-day trip it took to Italy in August. There, Martelli picked up a rosary ring blessed by the Pope and watched a minor miracle unfold: His assemblage of modestly talented players traipsed through the Old Country as giddy as middle-school kids. They rode in gondolas, posed at the feet of David and ate curious food that bore no resemblance to an Olive Garden menu.

This time, Martelli is wrong about what set this group toward a No. 10 seed in the NCAA Tournament and a first-round game against No. 7 Connecticut in Buffalo on Thursday.

It wasn't sharing cannoli and scallopini.

It was beans and rice, queso burritos and chicken quesadillas.

That's what seniors Ronald Roberts, Halil Kanacevic and Langston Galloway ate at the Qdoba just off campus last March.

A week before, St. Joe's was knocked out of the NIT in the first round. It was the second time in as many seasons that happened. Galloway, Roberts and Kanacevic had one more chance to leave a better legacy at St. Joe's. Over cips and salsa, they vowed to avert mediocrity.

"We didn't want to go out like that," Roberts said.

Then they lost their last two regular-season games this season.

They had 21 wins and a No. 4 seed in the A-10 Tournament, but

they needed at least one more win to ensure an NCAA slot. Galloway gave it to them with a last-minute jumper against Dayton on Priday. They avoided top seed Saint Louis, thanks to St. Bonaventure's upset win Friday, then beat the Bonnies on Saturday.

In the final yesterday, the Hawks outlasted one of the game's young coaching geniuses, Shaka Smart, and his deep, talented Rams, 65-61, for their first A-10 Tournament title since 1997. It is their first NCAA Tournament bid since 2008, when they were a No. 11 seed.

They didn't expect to miss the dance for 5 years.

The Hawks managed 18 wins last year and 20 the year before. They felt like they underachieved.

"In the past few years, we might have had more talent," Kanacevic said. "But this team, by far, has more character."

No one needed more growth of character than Kanacevic, a 6-8, Hedo Turkoglu archetype from Staten Island with a mouth that never stopped. Before this season, he would rather complain than compete.

He was hit with more technical fouls in his first season, 2011-12, than any other Hawk got in their career, Martelli said. Kanacevic's most notorious tech came in his second season with St. Joe's, on Dec. 11, 2012, when he flipped the bird to the Villanova crowd during a Holy War loss on national television.

He was suspended for a week and he missed two games.

"It was the worst week of my life. It was like being in solitary confinement," said Kanacevic as he held the tournament MVP trophy yesterday. "If you'd have told me then that all this was going to happen to me, I'd have told you that you were crazy."

Kanacevic averaged 15.3 points, 14.3 rebounds and 3.7 assists in the three games. He would have deserved the MVP even if St. Joe's had lost.

"That incident made him a better player and a better person," said assistant coach Mark Bass, who scored more than 1,200 points at St. Joe's. "When I played games at Villanova, I wanted to do what he did all the time. But you've got to look at the big picture."

Kanacevic began sketching this season's picture a year ago over his queso burrito, but, certainly, the picture grew in form and color in the canals of Venice. For instance, Roberts, the team's soft-spoken big brother, sought out freshman DeAndre Bembry for inclusion in Italy. Yesterday, Bembry shredded VCU's "Havoc" defense, and his second-half dunk over 6-6, 250-pound bodybuilder Mo Alie-Cox turned the game back St. Joe's way.

Bembry finished with 13 points and eight assists. Like his teammates, he was indifferent that the selection committee appeared to devalue their A-10 title run. Saint Louis lost in the first round of the A-10 Tournament and got a No. 5 seed, as did VCU. Massachusetts got a No. 6 seed despite finishing below St. Joe's, George Washington (ninth seed) and Dayton (18th).

St. Joe's could play secondseeded Villanova if both teams win Thursday.

"That's all right," Bembry said. "We're in."

Bembry, the conference's cofreshman of the year, is this team's future.

The seniors are its present.

Roberts, whose Dominican heritage gave him that love for beans and rice, was 6-for-6 from the field yesterday. He scored 15 points, grabbed 11 rebounds and had the decisive block at the game's end. Galloway, who loves quesadillas, led the team with 19 points and averaged 22.7 in the tournament, showcasing himself nicely for the pro scouts in the crowd.

No one is more this team's present than Kanacevic; rough, talented, inexhaustible.

"He had a tough season last year, but you grow," said Kanacevic's father, Hidajet, who emigrated from the former Yugoslavia with Halil's mother before Halil was born. "Life makes you loann"

Hidajet yesterday saw his son play in college for only the third time. Halii's mother, Neziha, "Gets too nervous," Hidajet said. "She has seen him play only once."

She has at least one more chance.

HAWKS RELY ON SENIOR MOMENTS

HE TEXT arrived in the middle of the night on Dec. 8, 2013, reminding Phil Martelli of a game that took place on Feb. 4, 2008, at the Palestra. The Saint Joseph's coach was just a few hours removed from his team getting crushed on its homecourt by archrival Villanova, 98-68, dropping the Hawks' record to 4-4.

It was the kind of defeat that can ruin a season, overwhelm a coaching staff and destroy player confidence. The author of the text reminded Martelli of that night when St. Joe's had crushed Villanova, 77-55, in 2008. It was the Wildcats' fifth consecutive defeat. Their season was spinning out of control at 13-8.

Fast forward 7 weeks and those same Wildcats were playing eventual national champion Kansas in the Sweet 16. They had gone 7-4 through the Big East Tournament, got one of the last at-large berths in the NCAA Tournament, came from way behind to beat Clemson in the first round and then beat Siena to get that date with Kansas.

Nobody understood better what Martelli was feeling than Jay Wright. The Villanova coach had been there. So, he sent that text in the middle of the night.

It was an only-in-Philly moment that will be celebrated early this morning at the Palestra where all the city coaches will gather for the annual Coaches vs. Cancer Tourney Tip-Off Breakfast. Wright will be there to talk about his Big East regular-season champions. Martelli will share the same daiswhere he will be talking about his Atlantic 10 champion Hawks.

It's never about what happens to you. It's about how you deal with what happens to you. Something happens to everybody.

Villanova happened to the Hawks on

Dec. 7. For the next 3 months, the Hawks happened to just about everybody they played, winning 17 of 20.

Then, a bad final week of the regular season happened to them. They got over it, went to Brooklyn for the A-10 Tournament, got a tense, must-have game against Dayton on Friday, played a brilliant second half to blow away St. Bonaventure on Saturday and then played brilliantly down the stretch yesterday to withstand the heat that is VCU.

Now, here they are, the three seniors, Langston Galloway, Halil Kanacevic and Ronald Roberts, junior point guard Chris Wilson and freshman forward DeAndre' Bembry, the iron five playing almost all of the minutes, going 10-3 in games decided by six points or less, finding a way to utilize their unique skill sets and play winning basketball.

These Hawks are top 50 in two-point and three-point percentage, bottom 25 in freethrow shooting, bottom five in bench minutes and top three in fewest fouls, 15.8 per game. It is a way to play that nobody would imagine, but it is their way.

When asked before the A-10 Tournament what an NCAA berth would mean, Martelli, after a very long pause to gather his thoughts, said: "It would be a testimony to the players because of perseverance, the unusual journey because so many of them have played so many minutes from when they were so young. It would be an endorsement of what and how you should go about your college career. They've stayed with it."

They watched one teammate get thrown out of school, another transfer, one leave just weeks before a school year was about to start and still another leave for a pro career that has not happened. The seniors all just kept showing up.

Galloway now has 1,966 points, closing on Bernard Blunt's 1,985 second all-time at SJU, a school record 339 threes, two gamewinners against Dayton this season and "the" shot against VCU yesterday. He is the big-shot maker.

Kanacevic, after his tour de force 26-point, I7-rebound day against the Bonnies in the A-I0 semis and another doubledouble in the championship game, now has one of the unique career stat lines in Big 5 history—1,151 points, 1,020 rebounds, 402 assists and 279 blocks. He is the facilitator.

Roberts has 1,381 points and 851 rebounds and a succession of impossible dunks, perhaps topped by that insane tip throw/jam on Friday against Dayton. His dunks will be impossible to equal on Hawk Hill. He is the finisher.

Most important, the seniors are 62-37 in their three seasons together (Kanacevic sat out a season after transferring from Hofstra) and will finish their college careers playing in the NCAA Tournament for the first time.

This was the same core that was picked to win the A-10 in 2012-18 and played like they had something to lose, rather than something to gain. None of them played as well as they had when they were sophomores. There were chemistry issues. They finished 18-14. They head for the NCAA at 24-9.


"As a coach, to see their name called on Sunday, to see them get that kind of reward and that kind of joy, it would be a special one," Martelli said. "The world that we live and I'm not saying it's a wrong world, it's based on that tournament. In professional sports, it no longer seems enough to be a playoff team. Well, we didn't win it all."

This Saint Joseph's team is not going to win it all. They might win an NCAA game. Or even two, Or none.

And the games will certainly matter on some level. But these players and the coaches who believed in them and showed them a way to maximize their abilities have already won something far more important than any triumphs on the basket-ball court. They have found a way to overcome their doubts and their fears and even their results and come out the other side, with the experience of a journey none of them will ever forget.

The hawk is known for its cunning demeanor, the representation of a sly, clever predator that soars freely through the clouds to locate its prey. Once locked in on its unknowing victim, the hawk strikes: powerfully, and above all, mercilessly.

No one better embodies this characterization than Saint Joseph's senior forward Ronald Roberts, Jr. Known for his remarkable ability to consistently dominate above the rim, Roberts recognizes defensive weakness and seizes opportunity by soaring freely up into the air. Once above the rim, Roberts owns the advantage – power. And with that power, the Hawk strikes.

The hawk soars. Ronald Roberts, Jr., soars. It was meant to be.

Roberts' ability to launch himself high above the rim has allowed the senior to slam down the rock 164 times throughout his four-year career at Saint Joseph's. The power forward has thrown down his signature move five times in one game on three different occasions, including twice this season. Having played in 123 career games, the 6-foot-8, 225-pound senior averages 1.3 dunks every night he takes the court.

"I definitely love dunking," said Roberts. "It's something I've been doing since I was little, especially with my friends in my backyard on a little Fisher Price rim. Just watching Vince Carter growing up doing these crazy dunks. Dunking is my favorite thing to do on the court. It deflates the other team because they don't want their team to get dunked on. They kind of put their heads down, so it works as an advantage for us, especially with our home crowd. They go crazy."

Roberts is a threat to score every time he touches the ball, whether on the ground or in the air. The senior brings the Hagan Arena crowd to its feet game after game with every rim-shaking dunk, highlighted by a pair of

his personal favorites – a windmill dunk against Dayton in January 2012 and a monstrous throwdown against George Washington in February 2013. Although both dunks are remarkable in the stylistic sense, Roberts remembers them with a sense of pride due to the challenges he tackled to convert both plays.

"I went up to do the windmill dunk and I got fouled, and I still made [the free throw]," said Roberts of his sophomore-year dunk against the Flyers. "I like that dunk. And I like the dunk against George Washington where Halil [Kanacevic] threw it in on an out-of-bounds play; I caught it at a weird angle but I still got it to go in. That was cool."

Roberts has been perfecting his craft since the day of his first real – outside of the Fisher Price days – dunk.

He was 13.

The standout admits that when he was first learning the move back in middle school, physically dunking the ball would take him multiple tries as he couldn't do it on demand. However, his body would catch up quickly as just two years later he threw down dunk after dunk as a rookie on his freshman basketball team.

Of course, Roberts contributes in additional ways as he ranks second on the squad in scoring (14.3 points per game), rebounding (7.2 per game), and blocks (1.3 per game). Being one of SJU's most effective all-around threats on both the offensive and defensive ends of the court demands an obvious amount of physicality. But contributing also requires a sharp mentality, and Roberts possesses a concrete understanding of what it takes to maintain a strong mentality from the opening tip through the final buzzer.

"It's actually easy," said Roberts in reference to switching his mentality between offense and defense. "I'm more defensive-minded if anything. I take it personally when my man scores on me. I just want to be the nastiest, dirtiest dude on the floor. A lot of guys are talented and have skills and that's great, but I don't think a lot of guys want to bring the toughness and nastiness, getting on the floor and doing all the dirty stuff, so I like to bring that to the game."

Roberts utilizes his committed level of focus to lead his team by example. Although he is, self-admittedly, not the most vocal player on the court, Roberts demonstrates his leadership through each offensive and defensive play. And Roberts was rewarded for his consistency in leading by example in one of the most respected ways – alongside Langston Galloway and Halil Kanacevic, Roberts was named a team captain for the 2013-14 season.

"It meant a lot," said Roberts of the captaincy. "I actually thought those guys were definitely going to be the captains because Lang was the captain before and Halil is very vocal. I'm more laid-back, but I like to show my teammates by example. I didn't think I was going to get it, but I was very honored. It made me just want to show the younger guys what to do on the court and that you should always go hard. I love leading the team."

Roberts has worked hard from the moment he stepped foot on campus for his very first collegiate basketball practice. He knew he would have to work hard on the college stage in order to succeed. So, he did. With the exception of a string of 12 starts in the final 13 games of his freshman season, Roberts began his career as a sixth man, coming off the bench for a majority of his freshman and sophomore campaigns. Although he desired a starting spot in the rotation in his second year, the then-sophomore continued to both work and play as hard as he could. That work ethic earned him 2011-12 Atlantic 10 Sixth Man of the Year recognition.

The Hawks' captain has earned multiple accolades throughout his career, including Atlantic 10 All-Conference Third Team and All-Big 5 First Team recognition last season and a slot on the Atlantic 10 Preseason All-Conference Second Team this year. However, perhaps the most impressive pair of honors came last season. For the third consecutive year, Roberts received the Robert O'Neill Memorial Most Improved Player Award, and for the first time in his collegiate career, Roberts also received the John P. Hilferty Award as Saint Joseph's Most Valuable Player. Most valuable and most improved. To Roberts, it's all about continuous progression.

"You have to be patient and you have to keep working hard every day," said Roberts of succeeding on the court. "Every time you get on that court, you have to realize the opportunity. It could change your life if you just

keep going at it; you just have to keep at it. You can't let little things distract you. There are always going to be bumps in the road, but you just have to be mentally tough. That's the main thing – you have to be mentally

tough. That'll take you through a lot of things."

With just a handful of games remaining in his senior year, Roberts has begun to look toward the future. In his short-term future, the senior has aspirations of playing professionally for as long as the opportunity presents. After that, he would like to put his communications degree to good use in the area in which he has always excelled – athletics. Roberts aspires to work his way into sports journalism at any level, potentially beginning with grammar- and high-school level teams with the goal of eventually reaching collegiate and NBA athletes. It takes commitment, focus, and, above all, hard work, to reach one's dreams, and that will only help Roberts on his path to success. As can be expected, Roberts will just keep working.

"I could keep working my way up," said Roberts. "I want to write about sports. I want to stay close to the game."

Returning to his present, Roberts is set to compete in the final two home games of his collegiate career, with the first of the two set to tip off tonight as the Hawks take the court against Dayton. The Hawks won their most recent matchup against the Flyers back on January 29. It was as close a game as it could possibly be as Galloway banked home a three-pointer with 1.8 seconds remaining in regulation to lift Saint Joseph's to a 60-57 victory. Roberts expects that same level of competition this evening.

"We know it's going to be a tough game," said Roberts. "Dayton is always really good and they're very athletic. But I think if we execute the plan and do what Coach tells us, we'll be fine.

"And playing at Hagan with all of these great fans is always good," he added.

Tonight, Saint Joseph's will fight for its milestone 20th win of the season and look to improve to 11-3 at home.

As always, we can expect that one defining moment, that moment when we see Saint Joseph's senior forward Ronald Roberts, Jr., outwork everyone on the court en route to soaring high above the rim.

Of course he'll soar. He's a Hawk.

And that's what hawks do.

A Hawk who relishes his role

This is Phil Martelli's 19th season as St. Joseph's head basketball coach and as he remembers he has never given a freshman as much defensive responsibility as he does to 6-foot-6 forward DeAndre' Bembry.

Most of the time Bembry will cover the opponent's top offensive player, regardless of size. That was the case in Saturday's 75-64 win over La Salle, when Bembry covered point guard Tyreek Duren, who was limited to nine shots.

"I would say DeAndre'

has probably had the most significant defensive role of any freshman I have had," Martelli said.

One of the reasons Bembry has been so successful in this role is that unlike many college (or NBA) players, he relishes the chance to defend.


"I have always liked playing defense and have been guarding the other team's best player since I was young," Bembry said. "Guarding is definitely a positive thing for me."

He is able to adjust whether it's defending guards, forwards, or even centers.

In high school I covered all positions, so it's not a problem for me," he said.

Bembry isn't just a defensive specialist. He leads the 17-7 Hawks with 26 steals, but is also the third-leading scorer with an 11.4 average. Bembry is also averaging 4.6 rebounds and 2.3 assists.

On a team that starts three seniors and a junior, Bembry has blended in with the veterans. He is averaging 31.8 minutes per game, and the only statistic he cares much about is the number of points the player he guarded had scored.

It was only just last week, but the Hawks' 60-57 victory at Dayton on January 29 already feels like a classic game from Hawk lore. After struggling from the floor in the first half, much as they had for the two games prior, the Hawks caught fire and ran out to a 15-point lead. But college basketball is a game of runs, and the Flyers had theirs at the right time, tying the game with 11 seconds to go.

Everyone remembers Langston Galloway banking home a three-pointer with less than two seconds remaining to win the game. But something historic happened that night that had nothing to do with Galloway, nothing to do with the Hawks breaking a long losing streak at UD Arena.

A look at the box score would reveal what appears to be just another night at the office for Saint Joseph's senior forward Halil Kanacevic. Eight points, 11 rebounds, three assists, two blocked shots, and a steal in 40 minutes. He certainly filled up his line, but nothing really blows you away. It's pretty much what we've come to expect from him.

Until you look at the big picture, that is. Kanacevic scored the 1,000th point of his collegiate career during that second half run. He also pulled down his 900th career rebound. Combine those milestones with the fact that he had already amassed over 300 career assists, and you might be inclined to wonder who else in Hawk history has put together those sorts of numbers.

You can stop wondering. It's Halil Kanacevic. That's the list.

Of all the great players to don the Crimson and Gray, none had scored 1,000 points, pulled in 900 rebounds, and dished out 300 assists as a college basketball player until that night in Dayton.

His stat line didn't tell the whole story. But maybe that is the story.

Halil Kanacevic is playing the best basketball of his career at the perfect time. After a 4-4 start, Saint Joseph's has won 11 of its last 14 games, and Kanacevic's steady production has been a driving force behind that record. This season, he is posting career-best averages in points, rebounds, and assists. Possibly most importantly, he's also averaging a career high in minutes.

"It's been the most important thing, but it's also been the hardest thing," Kanacevic said about his increased ability to stay on the floor. "I play pretty aggressively."

Throughout his career, Kanacevic has often found himself in foul trouble, a symptom of that aggressive style of play. Instead of being forced into becoming overly cautious on the defensive end due to foul trouble, he's figured out how to nip the problem in the bud.

"I think I've always known how to play with [foul trouble]," he said. "I think now I'm moreso learning how to avoid it. It's kind of changed the way I play. It's different.

"It's the era, too," he continued. "I grew up playing physical basketball. It's a different story, how the game is called today."

In three of his last four games, he's played a full 40 minutes. One of his most memorable performances in a Hawk uniform, however, came just a few weeks ago during a game in which he played only 30 minutes.

On January 18 at The Palestra, Kanacevic posted a double-double in the first half and finished with nine points, 15 rebounds, and 12 assists, coming just a single point away from an elusive triple-double. Many in attendance and following along at home knew what he was close to accomplishing, but Kanacevic wasn't among them.

"I knew I had a lot of rebounds, and I knew how many points I had because it's on the scoreboard," he said. "But I didn't know about the assists."

Despite finding out that he was just a single point short of an outstanding personal achievement when he checked out of the game with over eight minutes to go, he never even considered asking back in. After all, there was only one stat he cared about.

"It's no big deal," he said. "It's more important to win the game."

* * *

Sometimes, even a team's best passer needs an assist.

We all make mistakes. Most of us are fortunate enough to make them privately. For Kanacevic, the lowest point of his basketball career played out in front of thousands of people.

In December of 2012, Kanacevic found himself suspended for two games and a week of practice after a well-publicized incident of unsportsmanlike conduct during a game at Villanova. For someone known for his intelligent play, it was a lapse in judgment he won't soon forget.

"It was dumb," he said of his behavior that night. "That's the best way I can put it. It was dumb. I'm definitely not proud of it, but it happened, and I can't do anything about it."

Being away from his teammates and the game he loves had a profound effect on a thoughtful young man like Kanacevic.

"It was depressing, honestly," he said. "You're kind of up in the air. You know how you're going to be perceived now. You know it's going to be one of those things where it's like, 'are you going to be able to get back from this?' in regards to people liking you again.

"I'm not the type of person that's overly concerned with what other people think about me," he continued. "But I

don't care who you are; it's going to bother you to some extent. But over time, you start being able to recoup from it."

Just as Kanacevic dishes out assists on the floor, his teammates returned the favor during a tough period.

"I got texts from teammates, telling me they had my back," he said. "That was great [to have their support]."

Kanacevic returned to the lineup for three games, but soon found himself away from the team once again, this time for reasons beyond his control, when his uncle Rizo passed away at the age of 45. Kanacevic joined his family in Montenegro, and basketball ended up on the back burner.

Despite their physical distance, Kanacevic and his uncle were close, thanks to frequent phone calls and family conversations.

"We were really close, and it's...I don't want to say it's 'odd,' but it's kind of weird because he didn't live here [in the United States]," he said. "We spoke on the phone, and he always checked up on me. Even if he didn't talk to me directly, he always checked up on me, and I always asked my mom how he was doing."

The pair did get to spend quality time together when Kanacevic had opportunities to make the trek to Europe.

"When I went over there, he would always have me by his side and would take me places," he said. "He was trying to make up for the time that we couldn't spend together over here. Most people have their aunts and uncles around them and get to see them, but we didn't have that, so when I went over there, we spent a lot of time together."

It can take a lot to bounce back from a loss like that, and we all find unique ways to process our grief and honor our loved ones. Kanacevic does so every time you see him take the floor: he traded in his old jersey number, 21, in exchange for 45, his uncle's age at the time of his passing.

"It's one of the most selfish things you think of, as a player, when you're growing up. You get a certain number, you get infatuated with it," he explained before the season began. "I've seen kids get into fights over a jersey number.

"My thing was, let me be unselfish about that and actually give meaning to it," he continued. "I know what that number means; I know what it represents. I chose it for personal reasons, not a selfish reason. I felt like I needed to do it."

It's not a temporary change, either. Wherever his basketball career may go, his uncle's memory will be right there with him.

"Of course. If I can keep it, why not?" he said of his new number.

With such a low point on the court followed so quickly by personal tragedy, many people would have broken down. But not Halil Kanacevic. He's about as tough as they come.

Growing up, he had no other choice.

* * *

They say that "game recognizes game." Nowhere is this more true than on playgrounds across New York City. If you can't play, then you won't play. But if you can? There will always be a spot waiting for you. That sort of meritocracy is what turned Kanacevic, a Staten Island native, into the jack-of-all-trades we've enjoyed watching for the past two-plus seasons.

"Sometimes when you're playing with older kids, you've got to rebound and pass the ball," he said. "They're not letting you score, you know? You've got to find other ways to score without them getting the ball to you. You've got to get an offensive rebound. Do you know how to move without the ball, so that when they actually do pass it to you, you're in a good spot to make a shot?"

All of these abilities conspire to keep a young player on the court. After all, who wouldn't want to have a guy like that on their team?

"If you keep getting rebounds, they'll want to pick you up for the next game because 'this kid rebounds all the time," he went on. "If you make good passes, they know if they give you the ball, you'll make a good pass. That's a way to finagle your way into playing with the older kids because they think, 'oh, we'll pick him up, he has all the intangibles.' And it's fun."

In the modern age of specialization, players are labeled by what they do best. A player can be thought of as a spot-up shooter, a low-post presence, a distributor, or any number of other labels that get bandied about when discussing what someone does well. This process often begins at a young age, when players go to summer camps and play in middle school or on the AAU circuit.

Halil Kanacevic is a post player. He's also a perimeter player. He's a magnificent passer and a tenacious rebounder as well. In short, he's a *basketball player*. And while it may sound counterintuitive, this well-rounded skill set is a result of his late entry into organized basketball.

"I didn't play a lot of organized basketball when I was younger, where you're coached," he explained. "It's like, 'oh, you're a big guy, you've got to post up, that's what you do.' I was more like, 'go outside and play; do everything and make a difference."

Despite developing a more reliable three-point shot throughout his time on Hawk Hill, Kanacevic does most of his scoring down on the blocks. When you're battling in the post, you need the power to fight through the trees for a put-back, good footwork to evade defenders, and a deft touch near the rim.

You're going to take a beating down there, so you've also got to be a pretty tough cookie. For that portion of Kanacevic's basketball education, he turned to the gridiron.

Well, kind of.

"We used to play a lot of street football," he recalled.

"I used to go home crying all the time, because they would just abuse me," he said with a chuckle, remembering the older kids with which he used to do battle. "I was probably about 12, and some of them were 16, playing high school football. My parents would yell at me for getting beaten up like that."

But those pickup games toughened him up, and also helped foster the competitiveness that he brings to the court every day.

"We used to have these two buildings, 18 and 20," he said. "We used to play against each other. In the middle of the two buildings there was a spot of grass; 'there it is, go ahead, go at it.' And we went at it. But it was fun and it was definitely competitive."

Toughness and a wide range of skills can go a long way towards building a good basketball player, but sometimes the flow of a game can change, and you need to be able to adapt. You could say that no one on this current Hawk squad has had to adapt, in a basketball sense, like Kanacevic has.

He began his career at Hofstra, playing one season for the Pride before transferring to Saint Joseph's. And while we've all grown accustomed to seeing him handling the ball at the top of the key, that wasn't the case when he was a freshman.

"My thing at Hofstra was to set screens, post up, pick and roll, pick and pop," he explained. "The offense didn't run through me, but you throw it inside and I'll score, I'll go get you a basket, I'll get you a rebound. I was more like a double-double guy."

To what by now should be no one's surprise, he was effective in that role, opening his career with 18 points and 12 rebounds in his first collegiate game – against perennial national power Kansas, no less – and averaged 8.6 points and 7.6 rebounds per game en route to CAA All-Rookie honors.

At Saint Joseph's however, where Ronald Roberts, Jr., and C.J. Aiken were already manning the post, Kanacevic's role changed.

"Once I got here, I couldn't play inside as much," he said. "I'm more acclimated to playing outside with the ball [than other post players] because my skill set allows that, and it's what the team needs."

Just like those games on the playground, transferring to Saint Joseph's was another step in the evolution of Halil Kanacevic, the basketball player. Of course, as is typical of a team-oriented guy, he won't take all the credit for his growth.

"I feel like it helped because it shows my versatility," he said of making the move to Hawk Hill. "But at the same time, I'm also playing with really good players, so that helps as well."

Looking at how he became the player he is today, it's easy to see that evolution and change are nothing new for Kanacevic. But there's a big change coming up on his horizon.

College is almost over.

* * *

Kanacevic finished the required coursework for his undergraduate communications degree in December and will walk with his class at Commencement in May. Before then, he'll play in his final collegiate games. Just like any soon-to-be college graduate, Kanacevic has already given some thought to what he'd like to do next. And just like most college basketball players, he hopes that next step involves the game he loves.

"God willing," he said about a potential professional career. "I'll do whatever's asked of me. If you want me to go out there and get 12 rebounds and that's it, I'll do that. If you want me to go set screens, I'll do that."

When his playing days eventually come to an end, if all goes well, he won't stray far from the hardwood. Kanacevic can certainly see himself coaching, but while many folks dream of someday running their own program, at this point, he wants no parts of that.

"I honestly don't know if I'd ever want to be a head coach," he explained. "I'd probably like to be a college assistant. Being a college head coach is something that you've got to grow into.

"That's a tough job. People don't realize it, but it's a really tough job," he said with a laugh. "Being a college assistant and helping players develop, I'd like to do that."

Like many players, the allure of television also shines bright for Kanacevic. Down the line, if a network is looking for an insightful basketball mind with an engaging personality to boot, he'd be ready to answer the call.

Of course he will. Because when you get right down to it, answering the call is just what he does.

* * *

Not long after leading his team past nationally ranked Massachusetts in front of a raucous crowd at Hagan Arena, Kanacevic pushed a laundry cart across the court. He stopped to speak with a young Hawk fan, signing an autograph before continuing on his way to the equipment room.

Earlier in the evening, a ball boy had attempted to mop a puddle of sweat off the floor. When a nearby official pointed out a few more spots in need of cleaning, Kanacevic grabbed the mop and got the job done.

You might think such menial tasks would be below a team's senior captain, someone who cut his basketball teeth on the playground in New York, a guy who has posted numbers no one in his school's history ever has. Maybe in some places they would be. But those places probably don't have anyone quite like Halil Kanacevic on their roster.

Saint Joseph's does. And with every tough put-back, critical rebound, and needle-threading assist he racks up, Hawk fans are increasingly glad that he's here to get the job done.

'Lang' in homestretch of strong SJU career

G EOFF ARNOLD was in Las Vegas one summer, going from gym to gym, watching AAU games, searching for players who might fit at Drexel, where he was an assistant coach. He had just talked to his sister Jeralyn, who had told him her son was in Vegas, playing for a 15-and-under team from New Orleans. Arnold had seen him play before, but it had been a while.

One morning when he did not have to see a game involving 17and 18-year-olds, Arnold went to watch his nephew.

"There was a jump ball and his team got it," Arnold remembered. "He shot a three off the jump and it went in. A couple plays later, he nailed another three. At the end of the first quarter, I called my sister and I told her, 'You don't have to worry about paying for college.'"

Fast forward to 2014, and 22-year-old Langston Galloway has scored 1,746 points and made a school-record 299 threes as he enters the homestretch of a career at Saint Joseph's.

Hawks coach Phil Martelli tells some classic offthe-record stories about some of his former players, calling a few high maintenance and most minimal maintenance.

Galloway, Martelli said, has been no maintenance.

There is nothing off the record about "Lang." He graduated in 3 years. He never stops working on his game. He is accountable. He looks you in the eye when he talks.

"There's no mask," Martelli said. "There's no costume with him."

Arnold, the Hawks point guard from back in the day, came back to his alma mater in 2008 to be one of Martelli's assistants. He did not forget what he saw that day in Vegas.

"He is a better shooter now than I ever was, even though he's 15," he told Galloway 's mother.

SJU began to recruit the shooting guard from Baton Rouge, La.

"My uncle and the coaching staff started coming down," Galloway said.

And they kept coming until Galloway decided to leave the South and come to the Northeast. It has worked out better than he or any of his coaches ever imagined. In life, Galloway is a pleaser. Galloway 's high school team had just won a state championship semifinal in Louisiana when he came to Martelli and apologized for how he played.

If he has an on-court fault, it's that he tries too hard, wants it too much. It can show in his expression, how his classic form can sometimes drift. It is why he felt the need to apologize when no apology was necessary. There has never been a question about his effort.

His freshman year at St. Joe's, Galloway started on a freshmen-dominated roster that finished 9-21 in the regular season, but fell only four points short of playing for the Atlantic 10 championship.

"My recognition of Langston was he cares too much," Martelli said. "He's so hard on himself."

He still is, but he plays through it. He often guards the other team's best wing, sometimes even the point guard if that player is especially dangerous. He makes threes (42.2 percent career). He makes free throws (80.9 percent career). He plays to win the game.

"The thing that has stayed true is the quality of the person," Martelli said. "The work ethic is unbelievable. The shooting stroke is his. He worked it, he refined it. He's still his harshest critic. I've tried to wean him off that, but that's who he is."

Galloway spent enough time in the city before he came to Hawk Hill to have a pretty good idea of what he was getting into. Still, there were two issues.

"First thing was definitely the weather," he said. "I was not prepared for it. Everybody was telling me you've got to be ready for the winter." He wasn't. He looked out one day, saw 10 inches of snow and said, "Where am I; am I in another world, or what?"

He also could not get used to the food.

"I was in need of some spicy food," Galloway said. "Everything was bland. It was definitely a shock to me." This winter is giving him one final reminder of our reality. He solved the food issue. He cooks his own now. His parents are in town all the time to see him play, cook him some meals.

Galloway and Arnold's daughter, Gabrielle, are only children, so, according to Arnold, they are more like brother and sister.

"I never got a chance to coach her in athletics," Arnold said. "I'm just a fan. Having him on the team, it's the closest thing to having my son play for me."

When you recruit a player, even a player you know like family, you don't really know how it will turn out. "He's exceeded my expectations," Arnold said. "His whole experience has been phenomenal."

And it is almost over. That 2011 A-10 run was a hint that two straight seasons of losing were over. SJU won 38 games the previous two seasons.

And here they are at 15-7 after missing an opportunity Wednesday against Saint Louis and looking at another opportunity at home tomorrow night against VCU, a chance to get Galloway and fellow 1,000-point scorers Ronald Roberts and Halil Kanacevic to their first NCAA Tournament.



"In the locker room, we'll talk about it," Galloway said. "We're definitely excited. We know the whole coaching staff is excited, because last year and the year before, everybody was down at this point, just trying to make our way through."
