- Saint Joseph's is looking to bounce back from a season opening loss to Temple, 86-70.
- The Hawks moved to 35-9 in home openers.
- The Hawks and Bison meet for the fourth time with SJU holding a 3-0 series edge.
- Saint Joseph's topped bucknell, 63-56, in the previous meeting on November 12, 2006 at Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse (previous results on page 2).
- Saint Joseph's finished with four players in double figures on Friday. The Hawks had that occur just four times in 2015-16.
- On Friday, sophomore guard **Alyssa Monaghan** tallied a team-best 15 points in a reserve role. Monaghan finished 5-of-7 from the field, including 2-of-3 from three-point range, and was 2-of-3 from the foul line and was a point shy of her career-high.
- Preseason A-10 All-Conference Third Team selection **Chelsea Woods** had a strong finish to Friday's game as she scored 11 points to go with a team-high seven rebounds and four assists despite playing much of the game in foul trouble.
- Co-captain **Adashia Franklyn** added 10 points in a starting role, with senior **Amanda Fioravanti** finishing with 14 points, five rebounds and two blocked shots.
- Newcomer **Jaryn Garner** had four points and two assists in her first start as a Hawk.
- Sophomore guard **Kristalyn Baisden** had a career-high seven points on Friday and nearly surpassed her total scoring output for all of 2015-16 (eight points). Sophomore forward **Michala Clay** matched her career-high with four points on Friday.

HAWK HILL ADVANTAGE

Saint Joseph's has always had a reputation of playing well at home. Over 44 seasons, the Hawks have boasted a 416-155 mark at Hawk Hill, including a 76-33 record at Hagan Arena. Last year, Saint Joseph's finished with a 9-7 record at home.

HAWKS PICKED EIGHTH IN ATLANTIC 10 PRESEASON POLL

Saint Joseph's was picked to finish eighth in the Atlantic 10 race, according to a poll of the conference's head coaches. Returning two starters and 11 letterwinners overall from last year's, the Hawks garnered 94 points in the A-10 Preseason Poll. Receiving nine first place votes, Saint Louis was picked to finish first in the conference standings with 191 points. Dayton and Duquesne were tied for second with 166 points, while the Dukes received three first place votes. Reigning A-10 champion George Washington garnered two first place votes and was picked to finish fourth with 157 points, followed by VCU (148) fifth, Fordham (117) sixth, Richmond (108) seventh and the Hawks eighth. Rhode Island was picked to finish ninth with 78 points, followed by St. Bonaventure (68), George Mason (64), La Salle (49), Davidson (42) and Massachusetts (22), respectively.

GRIFFIN BEGINS 16TH SEASON AT ALMA MATER

Saint Joseph's **Cindy Griffin** is in her 16th season as head coach of her alma mater. The all-time leader in wins at Hawk Hill, she enters Friday with a 273-199 record, and passed Women's Basketball Hall of Famer Jim Foster for career wins last year in a 58-54 victory over Villanova last season. During her tenure, the Hawks have had 10 postseason bids and 16 Atlantic 10 All-Conference honorees.

WOODS NAMED TO A-10 PRESEASON ALL-CONFERENCE TEAM

The Hawks' returning scoring leader, junior guard/forward **Chelsea Woods** was recognized as one of the top players in the Atlantic 10 this season as she was named to the A-10's Preseason All-Conference Third Team. Woods is coming off a break-through seasons in 2015-16 in which she averaged career-highs in scoring (9.6 ppg) and rebounding (6.9 rpg). Additionally, Woods ranked second in the A-10 in field goal percentage (.523) and finished with six double-doubles.

HAWKS ON THE AIR

The Saint Joseph's Sports Network (SJSN) marks its 27th year of operation in 2016-17, as the first broadcasts of men's and women's basketball games took place in the fall of 1990. The first women's game aired on WCZN-AM on November 23rd as the Hawks hosted Oregon. The 1990-91 season also marked the first in school history in which every SJU men's game aired on Philadelphia-area commercial radio.

Since its beginnings in 1990, SJSN's coverage of Hawk athletics has grown and included Saint Joseph's women's basketball television show *Courtside*, Phil Martelli's *HawkTalk* radio program and the nationally-renowned *HawkTalk* television show, which ran for 15 years.

Hawk fans everywhere will be able to hear the broadcast of every game through audio streaming at the Hawks' official athletics site, www.SJUHawks.com, which is provided free of charge. Fans can also take those broadcasts on-the-go, with the SJUHawks app for mobile devices.



HAWKS FACE TOUGH COMPETITION IN 2016-17

As is the standard for Saint Joseph's scheduling, facing strong opponents is the norm and 2016-17 is no different. This season, the Hawks will play potentially 16 games against opponents that made a postseason tournament last year. Sunday's contest versus Bucknell is the second versus an opponent that made the WNIT Tournament a season ago.

SJU IN THE NATIONAL SPOTLIGHT

This season, the Hawks will have two nationally televised games. SJU will make an appearances on CBS Sports Network on February 5 at Saint Louis, while their January 29 home contest versus St. Bonaventure will air on the American Sports Network.

FRANKLYN AND RULE NAMED CAPTAINS

Senior guard **Mackenzie Rule** and junior forward **Adashia Franklyn** will serve as co-captains for the 2016-17 season. The pair replace last year's captain, Sarah Fairbanks, who graduated in May.

STRUGGLES FROM DEEP

Saint Joseph's is coming off one of its down years from behind the arc as it finished the season just 116-of-374 for 31 percent. The percentage is the lowest for a Hawk team since 2004-05 when they shot just 29.6 percent from the perimeter. This year, SJU's top returning three-point specialists - **Alyssa Monaghan** and **Sarah Veilleux** - combined to go 44-of-128 for 34.3 percent.

OPPORTUNITIES ON OFFENSE

The Hawks will be looking for players to step forward this season and fill bigger roles on the offensive end. With the roster transitioning during the offseason, SJU lost 50.3 percent of its scoring (917 points of 1,822 total points). Junior guard/forward **Chelsea Woods** led the Hawks in scoring five times last year and is the team's returning scoring leader at 9.6 points per game.

GARNER MAKES SJU DEBUT

Senior guard **Jaryn Garner** made her Saint Joseph's debut on Friday versus Temple as she scored four points and had two assists. Prior to Hawk Hill, Garner played two seasons at Virginia, averaging 1.6 points and 1.0 rebounds over 42 games. Additionally, Garner was a teammate of current SJU classmate Amanda Fioravanti with the Cavaliers in 2013-14 prior to their transfers to the Hawks.

FISHER TO SIT OUT 2016-17 SEASON

Transferring to Saint Joseph's this season is sophomore forward **Whisper Fisher**. Coming to the Hawks after spending last year with Loyola Chicago, Fisher will sit out the 2016-17 season per NCAA transfer rules. While with the Ramblers, Fisher tallied 11 points and grabbed 16 rebounds over 21 games.

HAWKS FINISH THIRD IN A-10 ATTENDANCE

Saint Joseph's continues to be one of the top draws in the Atlantic 10 and 2015-16 was no different. Averaging 1,351 fans per home game, the Hawks ranked third in the conference in attendance and matched the program record for fans (4,200) in their season opener versus Rutgers on November 13, 2015.

MARZ BACK IN ACTION

Redshirt guard **Avery Marz** is set to make her SJU debut this season after missing the past two years recovering from a stroke she suffered on moving-in day in 2014. Cleared to practice during the offseason, she was named a *Sporting News* All-American Honorable Mention as a senior in 2013-14 at Wilson West Lawn.



FAIRBANKS AND ANDREWS PURSUE PRO CAREERS

Recent Saint Joseph's graduates **Sarah Fairbanks '16** and **Ciara Andrews '16** are continuing their basketball careers in professional leagues this year. One of just two Hawks to ever record 1,000 career points, 500 rebounds and 100 blocked shots, Fairbanks is playing for Dublin City University as she pursues her Master's degree in Ireland. A two-time All-Big 5 honoree, Andrews has transitioned to a starting role with SISU of the Danish League.

NEW-LOOK A-10 CHAMPIONSHIP

The 2017 A-10 Championship will feature a new, enhanced format, with six first-round games being played on campus sites before heading to Richmond, Friday through Sunday, for the quarterfinals, semifinals and championship final games. The top two championship seeds will receive a bye, with the remainder of the field facing off in games hosted by seeds 3-8 for the first round. The first round will take place on the Saturday and Sunday prior to the weekend of the quarterfinals, semifinals and final. In 2017 the first round will be Feb. 25-26 with the three final rounds being played March 3-5.

WHY S-A-I-N-T JOSEPHS UNIVERSITY?

The corporate title of "Saint" Joseph's University, which has been in place since Saint Joseph's was granted university status by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in 1979, is now the "public" title of the institution for all aspects of its operations. Previously, the abbreviation of "St." Joseph's University was permitted in a number of alumni and athletic contexts. According to the most recent edition of the Higher Education Directory, there are at least nine recognized "St. Joseph's" among the nation's colleges and universities. Only one of them-Saint Joseph's University, Philadelphia-is a university-level, Master's I, NCAA Division I institution. A complete spelling of S-A-I-N-T Joseph's University in all contexts will help eliminate any confusion among higher education and other public constituencies.

UP NEXT

Saint Joseph's begins a four-game road swing starting Wednesday at Iona. The Hawks, who won't return to Hagan Arena until December, will take on the Gaels at 7 p.m.

MEDIA INFORMATION

MEDIA CREDENTIALS

Credentials for media covering Saint Joseph's at Hagan Arena in 2016-17 should be made at least 24 hours in advance by contacting Jack Jumper.

Priority is given to daily newspapers, radio/TV stations and other media who cover Saint Joseph's and its opponents on a regular basis. Internet sites and agencies that will be considered for credentials include those of national cable networks or established publications. Internet sites representing local or regional media outlets will be provided credentials on a space-available basis. Websites that sponsor "message boards" or "chat rooms" where people are able to post anonymous information are ineligible for consideration of credentials. Credentials will only be issued to those 18 years of age and older.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS

All photographers attending Saint Joseph's home basketball games must be credentialed. Requests for credentials should be made in at least 24 hours in advance to Jack Jumper. Due to space demands, access to freelance photographers is limited.

SCOUT CREDENTIALS

Credentials for WNBA scouts must be requested in advance of the game by contacting Jack Jumper.

RADIO POLICY

Radio stations designated as the primary visiting outlet can have access to phone lines at a cost of \$100 per line per game. (\$200 for ISDN), unless a reciprocal usage agreement exists. Visiting radio stations wishing to broadcast the game should contact Jack Jumper at (610) 660-3389 or by email (jjumper@sju.edu) to arrange phone lines.

INTERVIEWS

All requests for interviews with Cindy Griffin and the Saint Joseph's student-athletes must be arranged through Jack Jumper. Advance notice of at least 24 hours is preferred, but every attempt will be made to accommodate all requests. Players will not be available for interviews on game day, except for post-game interviews.

PRESS ROW

Only accredited members of the media and accredited scouts will be issued credentials to cover Saint Joseph's basketball, and only those with passes will be permitted to sit in press seating. Members of the media are reminded that press row is a working area and cheering for either team will not be tolerated.

MEDIA SERVICES

Saint Joseph's and opponent's game notes, statistics, Atlantic 10 Conference notes and game programs will be available to working members of the media. Halftime statistics will be available in the media room at Hagan Arena and will also be distributed on press row. Final statistics will be distributed in the media room following completion of the game. Fax service is available at both locations.

Complete Saint Joseph's game notes will be available 24 hours prior to the game on SJUHawks.com.

MEDIA PARKING

Media parking is available at the ROTC Lot on 54th Street behind Hagan Arena. Media members desiring to be on the parking list must contact Jack Jumper at least 24 hours in advance of the game.

POST-GAME

Saint Joseph's head coach Cindy Griffin will be available in the interview room following a post-game cooling off period. The Saint Joseph's locker room is not open to the media.

THE HAWK



One of the most famous mascots in college sports, the Saint Joseph's Hawk celebrates its 61st anniversary in 2016-17. The Hawk is best known for staying in constant motion by flapping its wings throughout every basketball game and representing the Saint Joseph's motto, "The Hawk Will Never Die."

Jim Brennan originated the idea for a hawk as mascot during the 1954-55 season. Brennan, an ex-Marine and SJU cheerleader, at first wanted to secure an actual hawk, but later switched to the costume idea. The student government raised the 120 dollars needed to buy the initial costume,

which Brennan donned for three years. He made his debut as the Hawk on January 4, 1956, a 69-56 win over La Salle at the Palestra. Since then, and including this season, a total of 31 SJU students have donned the costume. The Hawk has not missed a men's basketball game since that first season in 1955-56. The Hawk, who was present at most women's basketball games, became a mainstay in 1989. Since then, 15 SJU students have donned the costume.

In addition to the constant flapping, the Hawk is also recognized by its "flying" in figure eights around the court during timeouts. Years ago, ESPN used a "flap-o-meter" on the national telecast of a Saint Joseph's game to estimate that the Hawk flaps its wings 3,500 times during a regulation game.

The Hawk is unique because it is one of the few mascots in the nation that travels to every game, and the student who holds the position gains a tuition scholarship. The student, who is selected through an interview process during the previous spring semester, also serves as a team manager for the men's basketball team and travels with the squad.

The most decorated mascot in the country, The Hawk has garnered numerous accolades in its 59-year history. In 2013-14, NCAA.com named The Hawk as "College Basketball's Best Tradition". The Sporting News, Sports Illustrated, Sports Illustrated for Kids, Street & Smith's Basketball Yearbook and ESPN College Basketball magazine have selected it as the nation's top mascot. Eastern Basketball tabbed The Hawk as the Atlantic 10 Conference's best mascot, while The Hawk won a "Best of Philly" award from Philadelphia Magazine in 2003-04. The Hawk was selected as a 2008 nominee for the Mascot Hall of Fame.

Saint Joseph's athletic teams have been recognized with the nickname "Hawks" since 1929. At that time, the school's yearbook editor, Charlie Dunn, initiated a contest among the student body for a symbol. More than 100 submissions were narrowed to two, with "Hawks" winning out over "Grenadiers" (World War I soldiers who specialized in tossing grenades) by a slim margin in the final vote.

John Gallagher '31, a catcher on the Saint Joseph's baseball team, submitted the winning suggestion. He won a sweater with a special Saint Joseph's monogram for selecting the winning name. According to the Student Annual, the nickname was appropriate because it typified "the fighting spirit of our crimson and gray athletes and it is suggestive of the aerial attack which has made our football team famous." Ironically, football was discontinued at Saint Joseph's following the 1939 season.

But it has been the connection with the storied tradition of the Saint Joseph's men's and women's basketball programs that has given The Hawk mascot its prominence on the national level, making it one of the most recognized mascots in college athletics

Saint Joseph's '91, MBA '93 - 16th Season

The all-time leader in wins at Saint Joseph's, **Cindy Griffin** is in her 16th season as head coach of the Hawks. A 1991 and 1993 graduate of SJU, Griffin (nee Anderson) has compiled an overall record of 321-232 in 19 seasons as a head coach, and a 273-199 record over 16 years at Hawk Hill that has included 10 post-season appearances.

The eighth coach in NCAA Division I history to lead her alma mater to the NCAA Tournament as a player and a coach, Griffin's squads have posted six 20-win seasons and six victories over nationally-ranked teams, while her players have been honored as Atlantic 10 All-Conference performers 17 times and 14 have gone on to play professionally.

Behind a pair of 1,000-point scorers in seniors Sarah Fairbanks and Ciara Andrews in 2015-16, Saint Joseph's finished tied for sixth in the A-10 behind a strong finish to the regular season. Finishing among the attendance leaders in the conference, the Hawks added to their mantle as they claimed the Hawk Classic title. Additionally, Fairbanks was named the Big 5's Scholar-Athlete, while sophomore Chelsea Woods was selected the Big 5's Most Improved Player.

Backed by First Team All-Big 5 selection Natasha Cloud, the Hawks earned a share of the Big 5 title in 2014-15. Cloud, who garnered A-10 All-Conference First Team and All-Defensive Team accolades, also became just the third SJU player to be selected in the WNBA Draft as she was picked by the Washington Mystics in the second round in April of 2015.

Following up their A-10 Championship the season prior, the 2013-14 Hawks continued to prove themselves as one of the top programs nationally as they earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament and advanced to the Second Round for just the seventh time in team history. Led by Erin Shields and Cloud, Saint Joseph's earned its fifth straight postseason bid and claimed its first outright Philadelphia Big 5 title since 2000-01.

Under Griffin's leadership, Saint Joseph's posted one of its most memorable seasons in team history in 2012-13 as the Hawks claimed the Atlantic 10 Championship for just the third time and earned the automatic NCAA Tournament bid. Led by a senior class that had advanced to the postseason every year, the Hawks finished with a 23-9 record that included wins over #5 Maryland and #11 Dayton.

In addition to the team's success, a trio of Hawks were singled out for their performances, led by NCAA Woman of the Year nominee Chatilla van Grinsven. With Griffin's guidance, van Grinsven turned in one of the more dominant seasons in recent SJU history, becoming just the fifth player in SJU history to average a double-double for the year en route to being named to the A-10 All-Conference First Team and the Big 5 Player of the Year. The duo of backcourt mates Shields and Cloud helped propel SJU to new heights, with Shields garnering A-10 and Big 5 Most Improved Player honors and I-AAA distinction, while Cloud was named the Most Outstanding Player of the 2013 A-10 Championship.

Backed by a veteran-laden team in 2011-12, the Hawks earned their third-straight WNIT berth and posted their most wins (22) since the 2003-04 season. Moving into second place in career victories at her alma mater, Griffin picked up her 200th win as the Hawks topped Boston University in the opening game of the WNIT on March 15, 2012. Leading the Hawks to a 15-4 mark at home, she helped Saint Joseph's become one of the more efficient teams in the nation, ranking fourth in fewest turnovers per game (12.5), 26th in three-point percentage (.348) and 39th in field goal percentage (.423).

Individually, senior Michelle Baker and Kelly Cavallo had breakout years, both garnering All-Big 5 honors. Behind Griffin's teaching, Baker went on to be named to the A-10 All-Conference Second Team and capped her career as SJU's then all-time leader in games played (127) while ranking in the top 20 for scoring and field goals made. After seeing limited time as a freshman, Cavallo developed into one of the top post players in the A-10, leading SJU and finishing in the top five of the conference in rebounding, blocked shots and field goal percentage. With Griffin's aid, Cavallo finished her career second all-time in blocks and 11th in rebounding at SJU.

Returning just one starter for the 2010-11 season, the Hawks quickly jelled under Griffin's guidance as they went on to win 20 games, earned the program's 700th victory, and advanced to the second round of the WNIT. Led by All-Big 5 honorees Baker and Katie Kuester, Saint Joseph's had its most efficient offensive showing since 2002-03, as the Hawks finished 60th in the nation in field goal percentage (42.1). Additionally, several Hawks were honored for outstanding seasons in 2010-11, headlined by sophomore Ashley Prim becoming the first SJU player to be named Atlantic 10 Sixth Player of the Year. Baker became just the second Hawk to be named to the A-10 All-Defensive Team, while freshman Erin Shields became the sixth player Griffin has coached to A-10 All-Rookie Team honors.

Earning a postseason berth for the first time in two years, the Hawks surpassed predictions in 2009-10 as they finished tied for fourth in the Atlantic 10 after being picked to finish ninth. After opening the season with a 3-7 mark, Griffin saw her team begin to click at the end of the non-conference schedule as SJU claimed the 19th Annual Hawk Classic title and worked its way to .500 by the second week of the Atlantic 10 slate. Posting a 9-5 mark against conference opponents, Griffin hit two milestones during A-10 play, earning her 150th win at Saint Joseph's in a victory against Dayton and earning her 200th coaching win against George Washington. The Hawks would go on to earn the program's seventh WNIT bid, and play the first postseason game at Hagan Arena.

In 2008-09, Griffin undertook arguably her toughest season to date as Saint Joseph's played every contest away from Hawk Hill for the first time in program history. And in typical SJU fashion, Griffin got her team to respond as Saint Joseph's went on to post an 8-5 record at home venues and earn its first Big 5 title since 2000-01. Individually five Hawks posted career bests in scoring, with Brittany Ford and Mariame Djouara both earning All-Big 5 Second Team honors.

Relying heavily on underclassmen in 2007-08, Griffin guided her Hawks to another winning season, including crowns at the Brown Basketball Classic and the Hilton Philadelphia Hawk Classic. Among the wins, Saint Joseph's posted its biggest win over a non-conference ranked opponent since the 1984-85, topping #15 Auburn for the Hawk Classic title. Despite losing several experienced players prior to the 2006-07 season, Griffin had her team peaking at the right time. Playing Griffin's style of hard-nosed defense and persistent offense, the Hawks advanced to the Atlantic 10 Championship game, including the program's first win over a

top 10 opponent (#8 George Washington) since 1992 along the way. Saint Joseph's capped the season with its fifth WNIT appearance in six years and tied the SJU record for games played in a season with 33.

Fueled by a collection of newcomers and a developed core of upperclassmen, Griffin led the Hawks back to national prominence in 2005-06. The Crimmon and Gray engineered the nation's best turnaround (13 games) and received votes in the national polls for the first time since 2003-04. The Hawks advanced to the semifinals of the A-10 Championship and earned a berth in the WNIT.

With the loss of four 1,000-point scorers, the 2004-05 Hawks showed their true colors down the stretch, earning a hard-fought victory over La Salle in the opening round of the Atlantic 10 Championship and coming within 10 points of 16th-ranked, and eventual A-10 Champion, Temple.

Led by six seniors, the 2004 team went 22-11 and advanced to the WNIT Elite Eight. Saint Joseph's finished second in the A-10 East and dropped a heartbreaker in the Atlantic 10 Championship to Temple. Four Hawk seniors reached the 1,000-point plateau, marking just the eighth time in NCAA history that a quartet of players had reached the milestone in the same season. Erin Brady, Irina Krasnoshiok, Stephanie (Graff) McCaffrey and Amra Mehmedic went on to sign professional contracts.

Following a memorable first year at the helm of her alma mater, Griffin upped the ante in her second season by capturing 2003 Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year honors after guiding the Hawks to a 19-11 record. The team sprinted to the conference's Eastern Division title and earned a berth in the WNIT for the second straight season, despite the departure of SJU's all-time leading scorer and a non-conference schedule that ranked fourth nationally.

Griffin helped to reinvigorate the SJU program in her first season, leading the squad to a 24-8 record and the second round of the WNIT. She capitalized on the team's tradition of scrappy play and rugged defense, while releasing the reins and allowing the team to play a more up-tempo style on the offensive end of the floor. The Hawks finished the year among the national leaders in nine different categories and paced the nation in free throw percentage for the second straight year.

Following her playing career, Griffin spent the 1992-93 season as a graduate assistant at her alma mater. She then accepted an assistant's spot at Vanderbilt University from 1993-95 under former Saint Joseph's head coach Jim Foster. Foster recruited Griffin to SJU and coached her during her playing career on Hawk Hill.

In her two years as an assistant at Vanderbilt, the Commodores finished 53-15 overall, won the 1995 SEC championship and reached the NCAA Sweet 16 both seasons. In addition to coaching responsibilities, she was the co-director of the Vanderbilt Basketball Camp and the director of the Black & Gold Club.

Griffin left Vanderbilt after the 1995 season to become an assistant coach at Loyola Maryland. She spent three seasons as an assistant under Patty Coyle before being promoted to associate head coach in 1998. Griffin was promoted to the position of head women's basketball coach at Loyola Maryland midway through the 1998-99 season. She was the seventh-youngest head coach in Division I at the time. Griffin – who was named head coach five games into the season as Coyle left for an assistant coach position with the WNBA's New York Liberty – kept the Greyhounds' momentum going as Loyola Maryland won a team-record 21 games that year. Overall she compiled a record of 48-33 during her tenure at the Baltimore school, guiding the squad to the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference semifinals all three years.

One of the top playmakers in Saint Joseph's history, Griffin starred for the Hawks from 1987-88 through 1991-92 (missing the 1988-89 season due to injury). A three-time team captain, Griffin finished her career with 662 points, 278 rebounds, 510 assists and 197 steals. She currently ranks fourth on SJU's all-time assist list.

As a junior in 1990-91, she played in 1,178 out of a possible 1,200 minutes to set the school record for minutes played in a single season. The Hawks made three NCAA Tournament appearances and posted three straight 20-win seasons during her playing career. A two-time Second Team All-Big 5 choice, as well as a Third Team All-Atlantic 10 pick as a senior, she was inducted into the Saint Joseph's Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in 1998.

A native of Maple Glen, Pa., Griffin played her high school basketball for Bishop McDevitt, winning two Philadelphia Catholic League titles. A 1987 graduate of McDevitt, she was inducted into its Athletic Hall of Fame in 1997, and in 2002, received the Philadelphia Catholic League's alumni achievement award. She earned a bachelor's degree in accounting from Saint Joseph's in 1991 and completed her M.B.A. from SJU in 1993. She resides in Conshohocken, Pa., with her husband, Curtis, and children, Kaylie, Hannah and Curtis Jr.

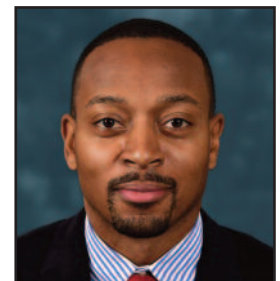

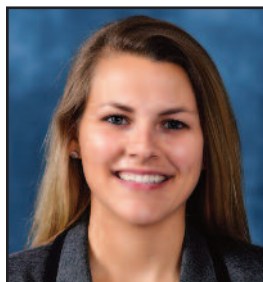
