

2004-05 Season Outlook

The 2004-05 SMU men's swimming and diving team returns 22 letterwinners from last year's squad that finished 24th at the NCAA Championships, the team's 12th top 25 finish nationally since 1990. With a strong nucleus set to return and newcomers ready to provide immediate help, the Mustang squad is set for another impressive season under 16 year head coach Eddie Sinnott.

The Ponies will be led in the water by returning All-Americans Camilo Becerra, Ian Clark, Philip Griffin, Eric Hadley, Per Nylin and Justin Stephenson. This cast made up SMU's representation in the NCAA Championships and their experiences will have the 2004-05 team poised to make a bigger splash throughout this season and at this year's NCAA Championships.

SMU opens the season at the World Short Course Championships, Oct. 7-11, in Indianapolis, Ind. After an intrasquad meet on Oct. 14, the Ponies return to competition against Indiana on Oct. 30 at home. The team faces cross town rival TCU on Nov. 11 before traveling to College Station, Texas, for the Aggie Invite. After the winter break, the Mustangs will host the *Dallas Morning News* Classic, Jan. 14-15, at Perkins Natatorium beginning at 7:30 p.m. each night. This year's field consists of SMU, Florida, Florida State, Arizona State and Texas A&M. After the Classic, there are two remaining away meets against Texas/Arizona (Jan. 28-29) and Texas A&M (Feb. 4).

"Meeting eight top 20 teams this season will give us good preparation for the NCAA Championships," head coach Eddie Sinnott said. "Our schedule is extremely challenging."

The Mustangs take part in the NIC Championships in Auburn Hills, Mich., Feb. 23-26, as they look to bring home their fifth straight NIC crown and their ninth consecutive conference championship. After the NIC Championships, the Ponies will compete in the American Short Course Championships, before closing out the season at the NCAA Championships in Minneapolis, Minn., on Mar. 25-27.

Coach Sinnott has a bright outlook on the season and feels his team can improve on last year's NCAA finish.

"We return all of our All-Americans and our goal is to finish in the top 20," Sinnott said. "Our conference team is stronger also. If our medley team can step up, we will have a good balance."

This year's squad also returns the school record and NIC Champion 200 free relay team from a year ago and Sinnott feels that this group is a strength heading into the season.

"Sprinting is our strength," Sinnott said. "Our NCAA finish will be determined by our relay teams and our goal is to score in all five relay events in the NCAA's."

FREESTYLE

The Mustangs will once again be led in the sprint free line-up by the All-American tandem of Camilo Becerra and Per Nylin. Becerra had an immediate impact last year after coming to the Hilltop as a junior college transfer from Indian River C.C. in Florida. He also just competed in the 2004 Olympic games in Athens, Greece. Nylin enters his junior season holding two top team times and was part of three others in relay events. Emilio Garmendia and Justin Stephenson both return from last year's team and are ready to contribute again in 2004-05.

In the middle distance and freestyle events, the Mustangs will be led by senior co-captain Ferdi Postma. As a junior last year, Postma had the team's best 200, 500, 1,000, and 1,500 free times on the year. Joining Postma in the distance events will be juniors William Balderamos and Jessen Wabeke. Wabeke a junior, has the team's top time in the 1,650 free from a year ago. Juniors Chase Ingraham and J.D. White will both contribute in the middle distance events as well. White is coming off a solid sophomore campaign where he finished fourth at the NIC Championships in the 200 and 500 free.

BREASTSTROKE

Travis Wolther, Ian Clark and Justin Smith will be counted on to turn in top times in the breaststroke this season. Wolther had top four times a year ago in the 50, 100 and 200 breast. Clark and Smith will be asked to use their versatility and step up in breast events at dual meets

throughout the season. Patrick Raschle will also see action in breast events.

Raschle, a Texas native, was an All-American and All-State performer in high school.

BUTTERFLY

Standout Camilo Becerra will again be the leader in the butterfly events for SMU in 2004-05. Becerra owns the second fastest 100 fly time in SMU history, behind Olympic gold medallist Lars Frolander. Becerra will have the opportunity to flex his muscle in the 100 fly and will be supported by All-Americans Justin Stephenson, Richard Hampson, and Emilio Garmendia. Newcomer Brett Denham will learn from these accomplished returners and may also see some action on the year.

In the 200 fly, Hampson will try to improve on his third place finish at the NIC Championships from a year ago that gave him the team's best time of the year in the event. Ferdi Postma posted top team times in both the 100 and 200 fly and may contend in those events this season. Sophomore Justin Smith will also see plenty of action in the

BACKSTROKE

Senior All-American Eric Hadley will once again lead in the backstroke, headlining the Mustang squad in 2004-05. Hadley had the team's fastest 100 and 200 backstroke times last season. Sophomore Ian Clark will pair with Hadley to form a formidable duo. Clark is coming off an excellent freshman season on the Hilltop where he posted the second best team times in both the 100 and 200 back. Those two combined with sophomore, Justin Smith, who also holds top team times in both backstroke events, will make this one of SMU's strongest events heading into the season. Junior Alex Weideman will also be counted on for top performances and could make an impact this year.

Sophomores Ian Clark and Justin Smith lead the individual medley group into action in 2004-05. Clark and Smith finished one and two in both the 200 and 400 IM a year ago and will be looked upon to produce in similar fashion this season. J.D. White, Alex Weideman, William Balderamos, and Travis Wolther will also be looked upon to provide sparks for the Ponies in the IM events during the year, again giving the team a solid squad.

DIVING


All-American Philip Griffin headlines a diving team looking to improve upon its showings of a year ago. Griffin placed 10th in the one-meter at the NCAA Championships and was also named NIC Diver of the Year and Most Outstanding Diver in the *Dallas Morning News* Classic. However, the Ponies will be without his services during the first semester. Griffin will be out of the country and will not see any action until the spring.

Senior co-captain Beau Sydes will step up in the absence of Griffin and look to lead an experienced diving squad. Sydes placed in the top 10 in all three events at the Zone D Diving Championships and had a strong showing in the NIC Championships. Sydes will be finishing his eligibility after graduating with a B.A. in psychology last spring. He is the first diver to compete post-graduation in SMU history.

Head coach Jim Stillson knows he has a strong squad back, having lost nobody from last year's group.


"We expect to be even stronger at both the NIC and the NCAA Championships this season," Stillson said. "We will look for Philip to give repeat performances and for Beau to continue as our platform specialist. If all that happens, we will be ready to score at the NCAA's in all three events."

SMU also returns a strong supporting cast in diving competition with seniors Chad Chokel and David Bender as well as sophomore Casey Markham. The depth and experience of this team will give the Ponies

Eddie Sinnott enters his 16th year as head coach of the SMU men's swimming team. Sinnott has led the Mustangs to 10 NCAA top 15 finishes in the past 15 years.

In 2004, Sinnott guided the Ponies to their fourth consecutive NIC Championship and eighth consecutive conference championship. SMU went on to finish 24th at the NCAA Championships, marking the 13th time since 1990 that Sinnott has led SMU to a top 25 finish at the NCAA level.

An accomplished coach on the international level, Sinnott has coached 14 student-athletes since 1992 who have competed in four different Olympic games. In the summer of 2000, Sinnott watched as his protege Lars Frolander became the fourth Mustang to win a gold medal at the Olympics games, taking first in the 100 butterfly in Sydney, Australia. In 1996, former Mustang great Ryan Berube won a gold medal as a team member of the U.S.A. 800 free relay team. Current Mustang Camilo Becerra competed in Athens in 2004 for Columbia.

On the national level under Sinnott's guidance, both Frolander and Berube were named NCAA Swimmers of the Year within two years of each other (Frolander-1998, Berube-1996). In fact, since 1996 Sinnott has seen his Mustangs earn 87 conference titles, 42 All-American honors, four conference Swimmer of the Year awards, two conference Freshman of the Year awards, and the before mentioned two NCAA Swimmer of the Year awards.

A six-time conference Coach of the Year recipient, Sinnott guided the Ponies to eight straight NCAA top 10 finishes from 1991 to 1998. Sinnott has also served United States Swimming in various capacities. He was the head coach of the U.S. squad at

the World University Games in 1993 and a head coach and assistant coach for the U.S. Olympic Festival team in 1987 and 1993, respectively. Sinnott also served as the head coach of the U.S. National Team on its European Tour in 1987.

In addition to coaching the United States team, Sinnott has also coached for Haiti and Denmark. To begin this season, he will coach his fourth different country, Columbia, in the World Short Course Championships, coaching current Mustang Camilo Becerra.

A four-year letterwinner at SMU from 1973-76, Sinnott was the SWC champion in the 400 IM in 1973 and earned All-American honors in both 1973 and 1974. Born on Feb. 24, 1954 in Greenwich, Conn., Sinnott and his wife, Sioux, have two daughters: K.C., born in July, 1992, and Silver Ann, who was born in September, 1995.



Andy Kershaw begins his second year as assistant coach for the SMU men's swimming team. Kershaw came to the Hilltop last year after serving as the assistant swim coach for Ohio University from 1999-2003.

Kershaw's coaching career began as a student assistant at Ohio and continued in that role until 1998 when he became the graduate assistant for the '98-'99 season. In 1999 he was hired as the head assistant coach for the season. As the assistant, he was primarily responsible for the distance group and oversaw the organization of the recruiting efforts. During his four years as the assistant, Kershaw helped lead the women's team to back-to-back Mid-American Team Championships, while guiding two Ohio swimmers to NCAA All-American performances.

At the national level, Kershaw has gained experience coaching 17 NCAA qualifiers in 36 events and five U.S. Olympic Trial qualifiers over the past five years. He is also one of the team

managers for USA Swimming.


In his first year with the Mustangs, Kershaw helped lead four swimmers to All-American status and helped six swimmers qualify for the NCAA Championships for their first time ever.

Kershaw has had an impact in the classroom as well. He has assisted in guiding two swimmers to GTE-CoSida Academic All-America honors and nine NCAA Academic All-Americans. The focus on academics has continued on the Hilltop, as SMU earned an NCAA Academic All-American team award last year.

Aside from serving as the Mustang assistant, Kershaw is also the recruiting coordinator for the program and is the co-director of the Mustang Swim Camp. A native of Mansfield, Ohio, Kershaw earned a bachelors degree in psychology and a masters degree in athletic administration from Ohio University. Kershaw and his wife Elizabeth reside in Dallas.

Head Diving Coach

Jim Stillson begins his 22nd year as head coach of the SMU men's and women's diving teams. In 2003-04, Stillson guided men's diver Philip Griffin to NCAA All-American honors and NIC Diver of the Year Honors. Stillson's successful 03-04 season adds to the national prominence the SMU diving program has enjoyed since his arrival on the Hilltop.

In his 21 years at SMU, Stillson has coached six Olympians including 1992 silver medalist Scott Donie. Since 1970, Stillson has guided

41 student-athlete divers to All-American honors, including three NCAA Diver of the Year award winners. Stillson has coached four NCAA champions in seven different events, and since 1974, 10 U.S. National Champions have been crowned champion under the tutelage of Stillson. The 1991 and 1995 NCAA Women's Diving Coach of the Year, Stillson served as the U.S. Diving National Team coach from 1987-91 and again in 1997.

In 1989, Stillson was named the NCAA Men's Diving Coach of the Year. On the conference level, Stillson has earned 15 conference diving coach of the year honors while at SMU.

Stillson's successful coaching ability in 1999 earned him that year's United States Olympic Committee Diving Coach of the Year award.

Stillson's success with SMU student-athletes has been overly apparent in the individual success of his divers. Besides the 41 All-Americans under Stillson's direction, SMU divers have earned over 50 conference individual championships, eight conference diver of the year awards since 1997, 10 U.S. national champions, and four NCAA champions.

In 1992, Stillson received the Mike Malone Memorial Award, given for outstanding contribu-



tions to diving by the national governing body of the sport, U.S. Diving. Stillson has coached the U.S. National Diving Team in competition in Europe, China, and the Soviet Union. He was the 1984, 1988, and 1990 Texas Senior Coach of the Year.

Stillson was born on Sept. 5, 1951 in Aberdeen, Md. and attended Campbell (Calif.) High, where he was a high school All-American diver. A 1974 graduate of Ohio State, Stillson earned NCAA All-American honors his senior year in the three-meter competition. Stillson has a 13-year-old daughter, Katy.

Proud Tradition

SMU swimming & diving has a proud tradition of collegiate, national, and Olympic champions. In the past 15 years, SMU has finished in the top 12 at the NCAA Championships 10 times, and have won eight consecutive conference team championships.

Since 1990, SMU has collected 126 conference champion titles, two NCAA Swimmer of the Year awards and two Olympic gold medals. Since 1997, the Mustangs have four conference Swimmer of the Year awards, four conference Diver of the Year awards and two conference Freshman of the Year awards.

On the international level, SMU has had 27 members of its swimming & diving team compete in the Olympic games since 1968, including former NCAA Swimmer of the Year Lars Frolander. Frolander's gold medal at the 2000 Summer Olympics added to the world-class reputation the SMU men's swimming and diving team has set. In 1996, Ryan Berube captured gold as a member of the 800 free relay team for the United States. In 1992 both Frolander and Scott Donie won silver medals, while in 1984 the great Steve Lundquist won two gold medal. Ricardo Prado (Brazil) joined Lundquist in Los Angeles, winning a silver medal. Jerry Heidenreich (USA) won two gold medals, one silver, and one bronze at the 1972 Olympic Games in Munich, West Germany. All but four SMU swimming and diving records are now owned by Olympic medal winners.

SMU also owns one of the finest pedigrees in college coaching, beginning with the legend A.R. "Red" Barr, for whom SMU's outdoor pool is named. From 1946 through 1971, Barr lead SMU to 11 top 10 finishes in the nation, recording only three losing records in 25 years on the Hilltop. SMU swimming great George McMillion took over for Barr in 1972 and continued the Ponies' torrid pace on the national level of collegiate swimming, leading SMU to 14 NCAA top 10 finishes in 17 years as head coach, including a school best No. 2 finish in 1983. Eddie Sinnott has since led the Ponies to 10 top 12 finishes in the past 15 years.

SMU's proud tradition and unparalleled success keeps the Mustang program among the nation's best, both athletically in the pool and academically in the classroom.



Head Coach Eddie Sinnott

Entering his 16th year as head coach of SMU, Eddie Sinnott has led the SMU swimming program to an elite status among NCAA programs. Entering the 2004-05 season, Sinnott has a 81-42 record at SMU and a 85-45 record in 16 years of coaching experience that includes one year at Iowa State before coming to SMU. He has led the Mustangs to a top-12 finish nationally 10 of the past 15 years.

For the 23rd straight year, the Dallas Morning News Swimming & Diving Classic highlights the spring schedule for the men's swimming and diving team. This year's event will take place Jan. 14-15, 2005 and will begin at 7:30 p.m. each night. This year's field includes SMU, Florida, Florida State, Texas A&M and Arizona State.

The competition allows a nine-man squad (eight swimmers and one diver per team) from each of the teams for the two evening sessions. There are no preliminary heats, only consolation and championship finals. The meet features two diving events, the one-meter competition on Friday night and the three-meter on Saturday night.

Florida won the 2004 Classic with 359 points. SMU's Philip Griffin was named Outstanding diver and SMU took fourth place with 314 points.

Heidenreich Memorial



In 2003, the first Jerry Heidenreich Memorial 200 Freestyle event was held. Named after SMU's four-time Olympic medallist, the Heidenreich 200 freestyle honors the late SMU star that passed away in 2003.

Heidenreich won four medals, including two golds, at the 1972 Olympics in Munich for U.S.A. An All-American each of his four years at SMU (1969-72), Heidenreich set a new NCAA record in the 200 free on his way to being crowned national champion in the event during his dominating 1972 senior season.

In 1992, Heidenreich was inducted into the International Swimming Hall of Fame. To this day, Heidenreich remains SMU's most decorated Olympic medallist of all-time.
