


MISSION STATEMENT

2005-06 OUTLOOK

The men's swimming and diving team brings high hopes into 2005-06 as the team returns 20 letterwinners from last year's squad and adds 10 talented newcomers. With a strong nucleus set to return and newcomers ready to make an immediate impact, the Mustangs look to be one of the most improved teams in the country and hope to return to the top 15 for the 11th time under 17-year head coach Eddie Sinnott.

As returning All-Americans, Ian Clark, Philip Griffin, Per Nylin and Justin Stephenson will lead SMU. Clark was All-American last season in the 400 IM and his teammates have represented SMU in past NCAA Championships. Their experience and leadership will be beneficial to the newcomers as the Mustangs hope to make a bigger splash at this year's NCAA Championships.

Coach Sinnott brings one of the best recruiting classes in his tenure to the Hilltop and is looking to the new class of 2009 to be the precipitant that leads the team back to being one of the elite 10 teams in the nation. Headlining the new crop of Mustangs will be Alex Hetland who comes in as a sophomore after transferring from Oslo, Norway. Hetland already has times in breast events that would make him a scorer in the NCAA's. Hetland is joined by Luka Vrtovec who is expected to fill the void left by Camillo Becerra in the butterfly.

Assistant coach Andy Kershaw is excited about the newcomers.

"When you consider the great accomplishments under Eddie's reign, it is very exciting to believe that this class is one of the most talented groups of newcomers that he has ever had. We can't wait to get the new season started and see what happens."

"We're excited about the quality of athletic and academic performance that these men bring to the program," added Coach Sinnott. "I believe this class will ensure our place in the top echelon of collegiate swimming for next four years. Everyone on the team is excited to welcome them to the great tradition of SMU Swimming and Diving."

SCHEDULE

Once again, SMU will swim a tough schedule, highlighted by The Dallas Morning News Swimming & Diving

Classic on Jan. 13-14 at Perkins Natatorium.

The Mustangs will host Florida, Florida State, Notre Dame, Northwestern and Washington in 2006.

SMU hosts six dual meets at home this season: Air Force, Wyoming, Centenary College, Florida State, Texas A&M and Texas all journey to campus to face the Ponies. The team will participate in the Texas A&M Invite at College Station, Texas, and the Kerr-McGee Invite in Oklahoma City, Okla.

"We look forward to our dual meet season," Sinnott said. "We swim quite a few home matches this season against top competition and as always, we look forward to another exciting weekend of swimming at the Dallas Morning News Classic."

The Mustangs look to win their 10th straight conference championship when they participate in the first annual Conference USA Invitational Feb. 22-24 in Houston, Texas. The event is being held in conjunction with the women's C-USA Championship and the squad is excited about participating at the same venue as the women's team.

After the C-USA Invite, qualifiers will compete in the NCAA Championships in Atlanta, Georgia, on Mar. 23-25. The 2006 U.S. Spring Nationals round out the year for the Mustangs.

Coach Sinnott has a bright outlook on the season and is eager to see his team perform.

"Our relays are stronger than last year," Sinnott said. "Our goal is to get our relays qualified at NCAAs, so our team will have the ability to finish higher. We also look forward to seeing our newcomers perform and develop as the year goes on."

FREESTYLE

The Mustangs are led in the sprint free lineup by the trio of Per Nylin, Justin Stephenson and Emilio Garmendia. The three seniors have had strong performances in international as well as NCAA competition and look to contribute again in 2005-06. Freshman Luka Vrtovec will compliment the veterans and coach Sinnott believes that he may develop into one of the fastest swimmers in the country. Sophomore Jani Brackett is an impressive swimmer as well and will help round out the sprint free crew.

In the middle distance free events, J.D. White is expected to be the leader. Fresh off a solid performance at nationals over the summer, White looks to pick up where he left off. Chase Ingraham will also be counted on for leadership and wants to step up in his senior year. Sophomore Shane Milu blossomed at the conclusion of his freshman year and coach Sinnott believes that he will step up as well.

The team will be led by three freshman in distance free competition. Michael Dmitriev, Chris Ginder and Thomas Callaghan make up the talented trio of newcomers. Dmitriev is a potential NCAA scorer and Ginder and Callaghan had great high school careers. The coaches are expecting them to develop quickly and Sinnott feels that Dmitriev has the possibility of breaking some school records that have been existence since 1993.

BREASTSTROKE

The breaststroke will be a stronger event for the Mustangs as compared to years past.

Incoming transfer Alex Hetland has All-American potential and along with Per Nylin, will create formidable duo in the sprint breast. Senior Travis Wolther will be featured in breast events once again and looks to be complimented by newcomer Mitchell Johnson. Johnson will be thrown into the mix early and Sinnott hopes he will develop into a top performer.

BUTTERFLY

Justin Smith and Freshman Luka Vrtovec expect to fill the void left by Camilo Becerra in fly events. Vrtovec has swum for the Slovenian national team and the coaches expect him to be an impact swimmer. Sophomore Brett Denham is coming off a freshman year that established him as a solid performer at this level.

In the 200 fly, Justin Smith will be the number one option. Smith had a successful sophomore campaign and also is expected to provide leadership to this year's young lineup. Freshman Nathan Clark will get an opportunity to show what he can do at this level and help with depth in fly events.


BACKSTROKE

Returning All-American Ian Clark will be the Mustangs top swimmer in both the 100 and 200 breast. Clark had an excellent sophomore season and posted SMU's top times in both the 100 and 200 back a year ago, setting new career bests in all of his featured events. Clark will be supported by Per Nylin and freshman Pat Ellerding in the 100.

Newcomers Colton Ingraham, younger brother of Chase, and Alex Hetland will both get chances to prove themselves in the 200. This mix of veteran and newcomers will make backstroke events one of the deepest for SMU heading into the season.

IM

Individual medley will be SMU's strongest event in 2005-06. Sophomores Ian Clark and Justin Smith leads this strong group, while J.D. White, Alex Hetland, Nathan Clark and Pat Ellerding round out the lineup. Clark led SMU in both the 200 and 400 a year ago and the other returnees were also strong. Sinnott expects this group to be very solid once again in both the 200 and 400. He also believes this group will train well together and can be impact scorers in all events.


DIVING

All-American Philip Griffin headlines a diving team looking to improve. With the departure of NCAA performer Beau Sydes, Griffin hopes to duplicate his performances from his sophomore season when he placed 10th in the one-meter at the NCAA Championships and was also named NIC Diver of the Year and Most Outstanding Diver in The Dallas Morning News Classic. Griffin had a great summer at the Midwest Championships and qualified for the senior nationals on both boards where he finished in the top-20 and expects to pick up where he left off.

Head coach Jim Stillson is excited about the upcoming season and hopes to see Griffin return to form in '05-'06.

"Phil had a solid summer and I expect him to turn in a strong senior season," Stillson said. "This is also a big recruiting year for the squad and it will be interesting to see how the move to C-USA affects recruiting. Having the both conference meets at the same facility should have a positive impact on the program."

The diving team also returns junior Casey Markham who will be rebounding from an injury filled '04-'05. Stillson hopes that Markham can compliment Griffin and provide some solid scores.

EDDIE SINNOTT

Expectations are high as Eddie Sinnott enters his 17th year as head coach of the SMU men's swimming team. With "one of the best recruiting classes" in his tenure to the Hilltop, Sinnott looks for the new additions to lead the squad back to being one of the elite teams in the nation. Under Sinnott, SMU recorded 10 NCAA top-15 finishes in the past 15 years.

Last season, Sinnott guided the Ponies to their fifth consecutive NIC Championship and ninth consecutive conference championship. SMU placed 30th at the NCAA Championships and has notched 13 top-25 finishes at the NCAA level under the direction of Sinnott and his staff.

An accomplished coach on the international level, Sinnott has coached 14 student-athletes since 1992 who have competed in four different Olympic games. In the summer of 2000, Sinnott watched as his protege Lars Frolander became the fourth Mustang to win a gold medal at the Olympics games, taking first in the 100 butterfly in Sydney, Australia. In 1996, former Mustang great Ryan Berube won a gold medal as a team member of the U.S.A. 800 free relay team and 2005 graduate Camilo Becerra competed in Athens in 2004 for Columbia.

On the national level under Sinnott's guidance, both Frolander and Berube were named NCAA Swimmers of the Year within two years of each other (Frolander-1998, Berube-1996). In fact, since 1996 Sinnott has seen his Mustangs earn 100 conference titles, 46 All-American honors, four conference Swimmer of the Year awards, two conference Freshman of the Year awards, and the before mentioned two NCAA Swimmer of the Year awards.

A six-time conference Coach of the Year recipient, Sinnott guided the Ponies to eight straight NCAA top 10 finishes from 1991 to 1998. Sinnott has also served United States Swimming in various capacities. He was the head coach of the U.S. squad at the World University Games in 1993 and a head coach and assistant coach for the U.S. Olympic Festival team in 1987 and 1993, respectively. Sinnott also served as the head coach of the U.S. National Team on its European Tour in 1987.

In addition to coaching the United States team, Sinnott has also coached for Haiti and Denmark. Last year he coached his fourth different country, Columbia, in the World Short Course Championships.

A four-year letterwinner at SMU from 1973-76, Sinnott was the SWC champion in the 400 IM in 1973 and earned All-American honors in both 1973 and 1974. Born in Greenwich, Connecticut, Sinnott and his wife, Sioux, have two daughters K.C. and Silver Ann.

ANDY KERSHAW

Andy Kershaw begins his third year as assistant coach for the SMU men's swimming team. Kershaw came to the Hilltop in the fall of 2003 after serving as the assistant swim coach for Ohio University from 1999-2003.

Kershaw's coaching career began as a student assistant at Ohio and continued in that role until 1998 when he became the graduate assistant for the '98-'99 season. In 1999 he was hired as the head assistant coach, a role he served until 2003. As the assistant, he was primarily responsible for the distance group and oversaw the organization of the recruiting efforts. During his four years as the assistant, Kershaw helped lead the women's team to back-to-back Mid-American Team Championships, while guiding two Ohio swimmers to NCAA All-American performances.

At the national level, Kershaw has gained experience coaching 20 NCAA qualifiers in 44 events and five U.S. Olympic Trial qualifiers over the past five years. He is also one of the team managers for USA Swimming.

In his first two years with the Mustangs, Kershaw has helped lead six swimmers to All-American status and helped the team win two conference championships.

Kershaw has had an impact in the classroom as well. He has assisted in guiding two swimmers to GTE-CoSida Academic All-America honors and 11 NCAA Academic All-Americans. The focus on academics has continued on the Hilltop, as SMU earned an NCAA Academic All-American team award the last two years.

Aside from serving as the Mustang assistant, Kershaw is also the recruiting coordinator for the program and is the co-director of the Mustang Swim Camp. A native of Mansfield, Ohio, Kershaw earned a bachelors degree in psychology and a masters degree in athletic administration from Ohio University. Kershaw and his wife Elizabeth reside in Dallas.

COACHING STAFF

JIM STILLSON

Jim Stillson begins his 23rd year as head coach of the SMU men's and women's diving teams. In 2003-04, Stillson guided men's diver Philip Griffin to NCAA All-American honors and NIC Diver of the Year Honors. Stillson's success in recent years adds to the national prominence the SMU diving program has enjoyed since his arrival on the Hilltop.

In his 22 years at SMU, Stillson has coached six Olympians including 1992 silver medalist Scott Donie. Since 1970, Stillson has guided 41 student-athlete divers to All-American honors, included three NCAA Diver of the Year award winners. Stillson has coached four NCAA champions in seven different events, and since 1974, 10 U.S. National Champions have been crowned champion under the tutelage of Stillson. The 1991 and 1995 NCAA Women's Diving Coach of the Year, Stillson served as the U.S. Diving National Team coach from 1987-91 and again in 1997.

In 1989, Stillson was named the NCAA Men's Diving Coach of the Year. On the conference level, Stillson has earned 15 conference diving coach of the year honors while at SMU.

Stillson's successful coaching ability in 1999 earned him that year's United States Olympic Committee Diving Coach of the Year award.

Stillson's success with SMU student-athletes has been overly apparent in the individual success of his divers. Besides the 41 All-Americans under Stillson's direction, SMU divers have earned over 50 conference individual championships, eight conference Diver of the Year awards since 1997, 10 U.S. national champions and four NCAA champions.

In 1992, Stillson received the Mike Malone Memorial Award, given for outstanding contributions to diving by the national governing body of the sport, U.S. Diving. Stillson has coached the U.S. National Diving Team in competition in Europe, China and the Soviet Union. He was the 1984, 1988 and 1990 Texas Senior Coach of the Year.

Stillson was born in Aberdeen, Md. and attended Campbell (Calif.) High, where he was a high school All-American diver. A 1974 graduate of Ohio State, Stillson earned NCAA All-American honors his senior year in the three-meter competition. Stillson has a 14-year-old daughter, Katy.

PROUD TRADITION

SMU swimming & diving has a proud tradition of collegiate, national, and Olympic champions. In the past 15 years, SMU has finished in the top 12 at the NCAA Championships 10 times, and have won nine consecutive conference team championships.

Since 1990, SMU has collected 138 conference champion titles, two NCAA Swimmer of the Year awards and two Olympic gold medals. Since 1997, the Mustangs have four conference Swimmer of the Year awards, four conference Diver of the Year awards and two conference Freshman of the Year awards.

On the international level, SMU has had 27 members of its swimming & diving team compete in the Olympic games since 1968, including former NCAA Swimmer of the Year Lars Frolander. Frolander's gold medal at the 2000 Summer Olympics added to the world-class reputation the SMU men's swimming and diving team has set. In 1996, Ryan Berube captured gold as a member of the 800 free relay team for the United States. In 1992 both Frolander and Scott Donie won silver medals, while in 1984 the great Steve Lundquist won two gold medal. Ricardo Prado (Brazil) joined Lundquist in Los Angeles, winning a silver medal. Jerry Heindenrich (USA) won two gold medals, one silver, and one bronze at the 1972 Olympic Games in Munich, West Germany. All but four SMU swimming and diving records are now owned by Olympic medal winners.

SMU also owns one of the finest pedigrees in college coaching, beginning with the legend A.R. "Red" Barr, for whom SMU's outdoor pool is named. From 1946 through 1971, Barr lead SMU to 11 top 10 finishes in the nation, recording only three losing records in 25 years on the Hilltop. SMU swimming great George McMillion took over for Barr in 1972 and continued the Ponies' torrid pace on the national level of collegiate swimming, leading SMU to 14 NCAA top 10 finishes in 17 years as head coach, including a school best No. 2 finish in 1983. Eddie Sinnott has since led the Ponies to 10 top 12 finishes in the past 16 years.

SMU's proud tradition and unparalleled success keeps the Mustang program among the nation's best, both athletically in the pool and academically in the classroom.

Entering his 17th year as head coach of SMU, Eddie Sinnott has led the SMU swimming program to an elite status among NCAA programs. Entering the 2005-06 season, Sinnott has a 83-47 record at SMU and a 87-50 record in 17 years of coaching experience that includes one year at Iowa State before coming to SMU. He has led the Mustangs to a top-12 finish nationally 10 of the past 16 years.

Frolander wins for Sweden

SYDNEY, Australia — Dallas resident Lars Frolander won precious metal in the swimming Games.

They just never turn out to be Sweden's Lars Frolander, a 21-year-old swimmer living in Dallas, who shocked the International Aquatic Centre rooters on Friday by winning the 100-meter butterfly in a world record time of 52.20 seconds.

Previously, Marti Marti, a 19-year-old swimmer living in Dallas, had won the 100-meter butterfly in one last year's world record time of 52.20 seconds.

Frolander entered the competition as a decided underdog, having won only one race in his last 10 starts.


For the 24th straight year, the *Dallas Morning News* Swimming & Diving Classic highlights the spring schedule for the men's swimming and diving team. This year's event will take place Jan. 2006 and will begin at 7:30 p.m. each night. This year's field includes SMU, Florida, Florida State, Notre Dame, Northwestern and Washington.

The competition allows a nine-man squad (eight swimmers and one diver per team) from each of the teams for the two evening sessions. There are no preliminary heats, only consolation and championship finals. The meet features two diving events, the one-meter competition on Friday night and the three-meter on Saturday night.

California won the 2005 Classic with 352 points. Florida took second with 313 points followed by SMU with 293. Arizona St. came in fourth, followed by Florida St. and Texas A&M.

Heidenreich Memorial



In 2003, the first Jerry Heidenreich Memorial 200 Freestyle event was held. Named after SMU's four-time Olympic medalist, the Heidenreich 200 freestyle honors the late SMU star that passed away in 2003.

Heidenreich won four medals, including two golds, at the 1972 Olympics in Munich for U.S.A. An All-American each of his four years at SMU (1969-72), Heidenreich set a new NCAA record in the 200 free on his way to being crowned national champion in the event during his dominating 1972 senior season.

In 1992, Heidenreich was inducted into the International Swimming Hall of Fame. To this day, Heidenreich remains SMU's most decorated Olympic medalist of all-time.
