SETTING THE SCENE

- SMU will play its second consecutive home game as it hosts [rv/T-21] TCU in the annual Battle for the Iron Skillet Friday at 7 p.m. CT on ESPN. The Mustangs are 2-1 to start a season for the first time since 2011.
- Sophomore running back Braeden West rushed for a career-high 220 yards and two touchdowns last week in the home opener to lead SMU to a 29-14 win over Liberty. West's rushing total ranks fifth in program history and is currently tied for the fifth-best rushing total in an FBS game this season. For his play, he was named to the AAC Weekly Honor Roll and earned Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Honorable Mention.
- SMU has 1,472 yards of total offense in the first three games (572 at North Texas, 405 at Baylor, 495 vs. Liberty) for an average of 490.7 yards per game. Last season, SMU averaged 382.8 yards through three games, so the total represents a 28% improvement year-over-year.
- SMU will honor Dallas-area first-responders at the game, with the team wearing a specially-created Mustang helmet decal that features the Dallas skyline. There will be a moment of silence prior to the game for slain Dallas Police officers Lorne Ahrens, Michael Krol, Michael Smith and Patrick Zamarripa, DART Officer Brent Thompson, SMU Officer Mark McCullers and University Park Fire Department Chief Bob Poynter.

THE SERIES

- SMU and TCU have a long-standing rivalry, having played nearly every season since 1915. The Mustangs and Horned Frogs will meet for the 96th time when SMU hosts TCU at Gerald J. Ford Stadium. TCU holds a slight 48-40-7 advantage all-time against SMU. TCU is the most-played opponent all-time for the Mustangs, ahead of Rice (90) and Baylor (82). The Horned Frogs have won the last four in the series, with SMU's last win over TCU coming in 2011.

ABOUT THE HORNED FROGS

- Last week, TCU rebounded from a 41-38 overtime loss to Arkansas in week two to defeat Iowa State, 41-20. The Horned Frogs defeated South Dakota State (59-41) in week one.

THE COACHES

- Chad Morris is in his second season at the SMU helm, arriving on the Hilltop after five seasons as an offensive coordinator (Tulsa (2010); Clemson (2011-14)). Prior to his stint in college, Morris was a high school coach in Texas for 16 seasons, posting a 169-38 record. In his final prep stop, Morris led Lake Travis High School to back-to-back 16-0 state championship seasons in 2008 and 2009. In his first season on the Hilltop, Morris engineered an offensive turnaround, as the Mustangs increased their scoring output by 16.7 points per game – the second-largest increase in the nation in 2015.
- Gary Patterson is in his 16th season as the head coach of TCU and has compiled a 145-48 record while making 14 (9-5) bowl appearances. TCU has won six conference championships in three different leagues under Patterson.

LAST TIME VS. TCU

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) -- Trevone Boykin threw for 454 yards and five touchdowns and added a scoring run as No. 3 TCU held on for a 56-37 victory over SMU.

TCU was up 42-17 when Boykin threw a 31-yard TD pass to Kolby Listenbee on the first series after halftime, but SMU, with its own dual-threat quarterback in Matt Davis, scored the next 20 points before Boykin's 42-yard scoring strike to Josh Doctson with 6:32 left.

Both of Davis' TD runs came in a 79-second span of the third quarter. He scored on a 4-yarder and added a 1-yard plunge three plays after Horace Richardson intercepted Boykin's pass.

SMU was within 42-34 when Chad Hedlund kicked a 21-yard field goal on the final play of the third quarter.

After Green was stopped on fourth-and-1 at the TCU 23 on the ensuing possession, Davis scrambled 19 yards and then threw a 42-yard pass to freshman Cortland Sutton before Hedlund made a 32-yard field goal to make it 42-37.

THE IRON SKILLET

During the post-World War II college football boom, the SMU and TCU student bodies created a traveling trophy called the Iron Skillet that was presented to the winner of the annual football game between the archrivals. The tradition eventually died, and the skillet was lost.

In 1993, however, the tradition was revived as the president of the SMU student body painted the face of the TCU student body president red and blue following the Mustangs' 21-15 victory in Fort Worth. The engraved skillet is presented to the winning team after each game.

THE GAME OF THE CENTURY

There has been endless debate about which college football game should be designated the "The Game Of The Century." The Texas-Arkansas match up in 1969 comes to mind for many, but perhaps there has never been a game more deserving of that title than the epic **1935 showdown between SMU and TCU**.

It was a clash of two undefeated titans and the stakes for the game could not have been higher. The Southwest Conference title, a Rose Bowl bid and a National Championship would go to the winner. SMU was 10-0, and TCU, with Sammy Baugh at the helm, was 11-0.

The game drew unprecedented national attention as the National Broadcasting System sent it live across the country. This was the first such broadcast of a game ever in the Southwest. Grantland Rice was one of the dozens of sportswriters from all over the country that was sent to Fort Worth to cover the game.

On game day, nearly 37,000 fans made their way to TCU. The stadium only held 25,000 but that did not stop all 37,000 from making their way into the game one way or another. SMU's Bob Finley recalled, "Fans were all over everything, the hillside and the grass. They crawled over fences, pushed gatekeepers out of the way."

With All-SWC back Harry Shuford sidelined with an injury, Finley was given the play calling duties and led the Mustangs to a 14-0 lead, but the Frogs fought their way back to tie the score at 14 going into the fourth quarter.

With a little more than eight minutes left in the game, Bell had sent in Jack Rabbit Smith to take over play calling duties for this series, but left Finley at quarterback. There was no sending in plays from the sidelines in those days, so what happened next came as a shock to Bell as well.

On fourth-and-4 at the TCU 39, Smith called for a fake punt, even though on the sideline Bell was sure they would try to kick it out of bounds. Finley, the team's normal punter, broke the huddle and headed to line up in formation when Bobby Wilson grabbed him and said, "Throw it as far as you can. I'll be there."

Finley's pass had sailed more than 45 yards in the air and came down to Wilson inside the five, where he caught it between a couple of TCU defenders, and dived into the end zone for the touchdown. SMU had taken the lead, 20-14. Baugh tried valiantly to bring the Horned Frogs back but was denied by the Mustang defense.

This year, the AFCA Blue Ribbon Commission presented a Waterford Crystal Coaches' Trophy to SMU, recognizing that 1935 National Championship. This trophy will soon be on display in the Loyd All-Sports Center for all Mustang fans to see.

ALL OF A SUTTON

Sophomore Courtland Sutton was named to the 2016 Biletnikoff Award Watch List and was tabbed preseason All-AAC by Athlon Sports.

The Brenham, Texas, native was also named to the 2015 Biletnikoff Award Watch List during a stellar freshman campaign where he was named to the **USA Today Sports Freshman All-America Team** following a standout first season on the Hilltop.

In 2015, Sutton recorded team highs in catches (49), yards (862) and touchdowns (9). His 15 receptions of 20+ yards or more led all returning wide receivers entering 2016 and the 862 receiving yards set an SMU freshman record, besting the previous mark by 173 yards. His nine receiving touchdowns also tied the freshman mark set by former Mustang great, Super Bowl 50 champion and current Denver Bronco Emmanuel Sanders.

Sutton had a great week one at UNT, earning **AAC Honor Roll accolades** and **Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Honorable Mention** after posting four catches for 162 yards and three touchdowns, including a career-long 88-yard TD reception, the fifth-longest pass play in SMU history. His 162 yards on just four catches against UNT were the most yards on four grabs for a Mustang since 1998.

Sutton registered six catches for 112 yards and a touchdown in week two at Baylor to become the first Mustang since 2008 to open the season with four TDs in his first two games along with NFL-ers Aldrick Robinson and Emmanuel Sanders.

Sutton **leads the nation** at 25.8 yards per catch amongst receivers with at least 12 catches.

In the 2016 season opener, SMU rolled up 34 points and 572 yards of total offense, the most in both categories in an opener since a 1990 win over Vanderbilt (40/575). The 572 yards were the most in any game for the Mustang offense under Chad Morris.

Through three games, SMU has 1,472 yards of total offense (572 at North Texas, 405 at Baylor & 495 vs. Liberty), a 28% improvement over last season's first three games.

GO WEST, YOUNG MAN

SMU sophomore running back and return man **Braeden West** was named preseason All-AAC by Athlon Sports and selected to ProFootballFocus's All-G5 preseason squad.

West put together a spectacular performance in the home opener against Liberty in week three, rushing for a career-high **220 yards and two touchdowns** on 24 carries, including a career-long 66-yard TD run, the longest run for SMU since 2012.

The Katy, Texas, native's 220-yard rushing performance against the Flames ranks fifth in program history and is currently tied for the **fifth-best rushing total in an FBS game this season** and is the best for a player in The American. His 9.2 YPC average for the game is the sixth best in FBS this season (min: 20 attempts). For his play, he was named to the AAC Weekly Honor Roll and earned Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Honorable Mention.

It was the first 200-yard game at SMU since Zach Line was 30-202 with a touchdown vs. Marshall in 2010 and the first 200-plus yard, multiple-TD performance since ShanDerrick Charles was 27-212 with four TDs vs. UTEP in 2001. West now leads The American with 332 yards rushing.

Last week's game also marked the seventh time in 15 career games that West has recorded 100+ all-purpose yards. His career high is 225 vs. Temple 11/6/15

IMPROVED DEFENSE

In game three, SMU had four interceptions against Liberty, the most by the Mustangs in a game since 2012.

SMU now has **nine interceptions** on the season, which **shares the FBS lead** with Cincinnati and Ohio State. The Mustangs are currently third in the country in total takeaways with 10.

LAYIN' DOWN THE LAW

Junior defensive end Justin Lawler is currently tied for fourth in the country in sacks with 4.5 and now has 9.5 sacks in his career. Lawler was named to **Dave Campbell's 2016 All-Texas College Team** and the Athlon Sports and Phil Steele **All-AAC** preseason squads.

Lawler anchors the Mustang defense and leads the team in TFL (5.5) and is second in tackles (18). He recorded his second career blocked FG against Liberty, the first for SMU since the 2015 home finale.

The Pottsboro, Texas, native has helped the Mustangs on both sides of the ball during his career on the Hilltop, appearing in some goal-line offensive sets in 2014, catching a two-point conversion at Tulsa and hauling in a three-yard touchdown reception against USF.

RICHARDSON, WYATT & ASSOCIATES

It's not a law firm, it's SMU's defensive backfield. SMU is one of two teams in the country with two players who have three interceptions. Horace Richardson and Jordan Wyatt have each intercepted three passes, joining Ohio State's duo of Malik Hooker and Marshon Lattimore in equaling the feat. In fact, there are just six players in the entire country who have three picks.

Richardson recorded two picks in week one at North Texas and picked off his third last week vs. Liberty to give him seven for his career. Wyatt registered back-to-back games with an interception as he picked off his first of the season at Baylor and then snagged two more against the Flames, including his first career pick-six that sealed the victory. He now has five for his career.

Mustang defensive backs have been ballhawks this season, with four different players (Clemons (1), Millines (2), Richardson (3), Wyatt (3)) notching interceptions through the first three games. SMU has had **multiple interceptions in each game this season** (3 at North Texas, 2 at Baylor, 4 vs. Liberty).

SMU has **nine interceptions** on the season, which **shares the FBS lead** with Cincinnati and Ohio State. The Mustangs are currently third in the country in takeaways with 10.

X GON' GIVE IT TO YA

Sophomore Xavier Jones was named a preseason candidate for the 2016 Doak Walker Award. The award is named after SMU great and the 1948 Heisman Trophy winner. It is presented annually to the nation's top college running back.

The Spring, Texas, native was reliable and productive in his first season on the Hilltop after **setting an SMU freshman record for rushing touchdowns** (10), surpassing SMU greats Eric Dickerson and Zach Line, and finishing as the Mustangs' second-leading rusher with 634 yards.

In the season opener at UNT, Jones **ran for over 100 yards for the second time in his last three games**, and his 10.5 YPC was the seventh-best mark of any FBS ball carrier. He also scored SMU's first TD of the season on a 49-yard run.

Jones missed the last two games (Baylor, Liberty) with a hamstring injury, but is expected back for TCU.

SMU ATHLETICS MASTER PLAN

SMU has announced plans to construct a new Indoor Performance Center, an outdoor natural grass football practice field and a new soccer stadium, another sign of the University's commitment to competing at the highest level of intercollegiate athletics. These plans come on the heels of nearly \$200M in athletic facility investments since 2000, and after 18 months of careful planning and design.

"This is a transformative plan for SMU Athletics and another tangible example of our commitment and desire to compete at the highest level of intercollegiate athletics," said SMU President R. Gerald Turner.

The Indoor Performance Center (IPC) will feature a full-sized football field and indoor 300-meter track. In addition to use by the football and track programs, the IPC will also serve as a resource for other student and campus activities and events. A new outdoor natural grass football practice field will be adjacent to the IPC. The new soccer stadium will be located on Mockingbird Lane. These projects constitute Phase 1 of SMU Athletics' Facilities Master Plan, a \$50M portion of a \$150M comprehensive facilities investment that will serve the needs of all 17 sports and 400-plus student-athletes.

"Our commitment to competing for championships and enhancing the student experience requires continued investment in student well-being and our people as well as our infrastructure," said SMU Director of Athletics Rick Hart. "SMU and its donors and fans have made huge investments in athletics in recent years, and these projects are yet another step forward for our department."



DID YOU KNOW?



- SMU offers nationally-rated academic programs, championship-caliber facilities, a top-five media market, fertile recruiting grounds and is a top destination for travel.
- SMU is a historically great athletics program, having won eight team National Championships, over 100 individual NCAA Championships, more than 150 Conference Championships – with the vast majority coming in the Southwest Conference, a Power 5 equivalent – and having posted over 150 NCAA top-10 finishes. In the last 19 years, SMU has finished on top the NACDA Director's Cup standings in its conference 11 times, ranking as the best overall athletics department in its league.
- SMU has had recent broad-based success as well, with eight different SMU programs winning conference titles over the past three seasons and numerous programs ranking in the top 25. Since the inception of the American Athletic Conference, SMU has won the second-most conference championships – and trail the leader by just one championship.

Ford Stadium, which opened in 2000, was designed to be easily expanded to accommodate more than 40,000 from its current 32,000-seat configuration. Since 2000, SMU has invested almost \$200 million in athletic facilities, and recently announced the SMU Athletics Facilities Master Plan, a \$150 million comprehensive facilities investment that will serve the needs of all its 17 sports and 400-plus student-athletes.
- SMU's average SAT and ACT scores for first-year students would be the highest in the Big 12, and its position within the U.S. News & World Report national rankings would tie with Texas for tops in the Big 12. SMU also graduates students at a high percentage, as data shows its graduation rates would rate second in the Big 12, trailing only Texas.
- The Center for World University Rankings once again this year placed SMU among the top 15 percent of 1,000 universities worldwide, based on factors including quality of education and faculty.
- Baylor and TCU are local examples of what can happen with access to resources. Due to location, academic quality and other factors unique to SMU, the potential exists to develop a program on par with these schools as well as Miami, Vanderbilt, Northwestern and USC.
- Dallas is the nation's third-fastest growing city, with a population that is expected to double by 2050, and the DFW TV market is the largest in the Big 12.
- Dallas features two major airports with direct flights nationwide and is the company headquarters for many of the biggest sponsors in collegiate sports, including 20 Fortune 500 companies.
- Dallas is home to some of college football's biggest advertisers and sponsors: AT&T, Southwest Airlines, American Airlines, Dr. Pepper, Frito-Lay, Toyota, Exxon Mobil, JC Penney, Gamestop and others.
- Dallas is Texas' No. 1 tourist destination and ranked as the No. 4 sports city in America.
- Texas high school football produces the most Division I football prospects in the country.

DALLAS MAYOR ON BIG 12 EXPANSION

Dallas Mayor Mike Rawlings released the following statement regarding a Big 12 expansion:

"Adding SMU to the Big 12 makes sense for Dallas, for our region and for all of Texas."

Consider this:

The geography favors adding SMU, which already has longstanding — and natural — rivalries with the other Texas schools and would quickly develop new rivalries with our northern neighbors.

We all win if SMU regularly plays home games against Big 12 powerhouses. Alumni of those universities and students would travel to Dallas from around the country to see their women's and men's teams compete at SMU.

SMU's academic standing would benefit the Big 12. If SMU were in the conference today, its students would have the highest average SAT scores of any Big 12 school and be second, only slightly behind the University of Texas, in the U.S. News rankings of best national universities.

SMU's 100,000 energized alumni also would make quite an impact. More than 40,000 of them live in North Texas. And high-profile TV games in Dallas' large market would further boost our national visibility and that of the Big 12.

A study from the University of Texas found that intercollegiate athletic events have an impact of over \$600 million on the Austin community each year, including more than \$270 million in visitor spending. Dallas could put similar resources to good use.

The Big 12 Conference has strong ties to North Texas, being headquartered in Las Colinas. The conference represents thousands of jobs and at least \$1 billion in economic value to Texas. A strong Big 12 is beneficial to us all. Expanding the conference to include SMU would continue a rich tradition.

I call on my fellow elected officials, business leaders and sports fans throughout the region and the state to speak up in support of SMU joining the Big 12."

TEXAS LT. GOVERNOR ON BIG 12 EXPANSION

Texas Lt. Governor Dan Patrick released the following statement regarding the possible expansion of the Big 12 athletic conference:

"The start of the school year means football season is upon us. As a former sportscaster I know that Texans take their football seriously, and so do I."

"I previously commented about my support for the University of Houston's desire to join the Big 12. For many of the same reasons, I also support the inclusion of SMU."

"The impact to Texas would be big."

"Dallas and Houston are top TV markets and the Big 12 would be foolish to leave SMU and U of H on the sidelines. The economic impact to the state and to the schools is significant."

"I urge the Big 12 to carefully consider the addition of these two fine schools and all they have to offer."

"I hope Baylor University, Texas Christian University, the University of Texas and Texas Tech University will join me in supporting the addition of these two Texas schools. And, I trust these two schools will support each other."

SMU IN THE CLASSROOM

Head Coach Chad Morris believes that there is a direct correlation between improvement in the classroom and on the field. If so, then the Mustangs should see an increase in wins this season due to the improved grade-point average of the team.

The SMU football team posted a Spring GPA of 2.879 with a cumulative mark of 2.748, both program highs. The team continued its success in classroom over the summer, posting a 3.344 GPA in the session.

TOUGH TANGLIN' IN TEXAS

SMU played six teams that were ranked in 2015 and Phil Steele's College Football Preview ranked SMU as having the hardest schedule of any G5 team in the country last year. SMU's 2016 slate doesn't get any easier. SMU's opponents' record of 93-60 represents the highest winning percentage of any G5 team's schedule and the 13th highest of any FBS school.

The Mustangs will face two teams in non-conference play in 2016 that finished last season in the final AP top 15. They are just one of four teams to do so (Oklahoma, USC and Rice).

SMU's defense will be tested as the Mustangs will face five of the top 20 ranked offenses from last season, which includes Baylor (1), TCU (3), Tulsa (13), Memphis (19) and Houston (20).

In addition, the Mustangs will play two of the top 10 rushing attacks from 2015 in Navy (2) and USF (10).

SMU is slated to play six of the top 25 scoring teams from last year including 4 of the top 11: Baylor (1), TCU (7), Houston (10), Memphis (11), Tulsa (21) and Navy (22).

The Mustangs are the only team in the country to play their entire non-conference schedule in one state with two of those games on the road. SMU will play eight of their 12 regular season games in Texas.

NEW KIDS ON THE BLOCK

In the 2016 season opener, **28 first- or second-year Mustangs** (True Freshmen, Redshirt Freshmen or True Sophomores) saw action, continuing Chad Morris' trend of utilizing young players.

With 17 true and redshirt freshmen that played in week one in 2015, SMU ranked **ninth** among all teams in freshmen played in the season opener last year. Overall, SMU was tied for 14th in freshmen played among FBS schools last season.

SMU IN THE AP

SMU is one of only **44 schools** that have ever been ranked **No. 1** by the Associated Press. The first AP poll was in 1936. The Mustangs have been ranked No. 1 twice in program history.

This fall, the AP ranked SMU No. 55 in its all-time Top 100 college football programs.

PONY UP-GRADES!

SMU has made significant investments in Ford Stadium improvements since 2011, including upgrades to the locker room, a new team meeting room with stadium-style seating and renovated positional meeting rooms, a new playing surface, lighting system, A/V system, new suites and club seating.

In 2013, SMU added a new 233-seat Hall of Champions Club and seven new suites to the northwest corner of the stadium.

In 2014, SMU made significant upgrades to the Stadium Club. The improvements to the nearly 900-seat area included new stadium seats and bar stools. The enhancements also include new carpet and granite countertops.

In 2015, SMU updated its football offices and team areas, installing new graphics and displays.

This fall, SMU replaced the synthetic turf playing field at Ford Stadium, with the new surface being ready for the 2016 season.

FAST LAYNE

Paul Layne holds an unrivaled Mustang record, having attended every SMU game for the last 40-plus years, even going to Tokyo.

He had to pull a "fast one" more than once to keep his streak alive — like the time his ex-wife remarried. He persuaded her to schedule her wedding on a Friday within driving distance of SMU's game at Nevada the following day. So the night before the Mustangs tangled with the Wolf Pack in Reno, Layne attended the wedding in California's Sonoma Valley, then drove 200 miles to catch the opening kickoff.

Layne even attended a game dressed in a Halloween costume to disguise his case of adult-onset chicken pox.

Starting when Layne attended SMU and was a team cheerleader, he's attended 471 straight games.

PREP PREPAREDNESS

SMU Head Coach Chad Morris is one of 19 FBS head coaches who previously served as high school head coaches.

Morris' 16 seasons as a prep head coach ranks No. 1 among the group, and only Tony Jinks (Bowling Green) and Tony Sanchez (UNLV) were prep coaches more recently than Morris. Morris is among two AAC coaches with a high school background, joining Tommy Tuberville of Cincinnati.

SMU RISES IN US NEWS RANKINGS

SMU rose to its highest ranking among the nation's universities in the 2017 edition of U.S. News & World Report's Best Colleges. Among 220 institutions classified as national universities, **SMU ranks 56**, up from 61 a year ago.

The new ranking again places SMU in the first tier of institutions in the guide's "best national universities" category. In Texas, only Rice University ranks higher. SMU and the University of Texas-Austin were tied. Among private national universities, SMU ranks 39.

SMU's increase was one of the five largest among the top 100 universities. Since 2008, SMU's 11-point increase is one of the four largest among schools in the top 60.

For the rankings, U.S. News considers measures of academic quality, such as peer assessment scores and ratings by high school counselors, faculty resources, student selectivity, graduation rate performance, financial resources and alumni giving. SMU ranks 24 among all national universities in alumni giving at 25 percent.

In other ranking categories, SMU ranks 32 as one of the best national universities for veterans.

"It is gratifying for SMU to be recognized for its positive movement among the best national universities," said SMU President R. Gerald Turner. "The ranking is an example of the momentum of the Second Century Campaign and the University's Centennial Celebration.

"We appreciate external recognition of our progress and believe it's valid, but we also know that rankings do not portray the whole picture of an institution and its strengths. We encourage parents and students to visit the institutions they are considering for a firsthand look at the academic offerings, the campus environment and the surrounding community to best gauge a university."

SMU HITS \$1B CAMPAIGN GOAL

The Second Century Campaign, the largest and most successful fundraising initiative in SMU's history, raised \$1.15 billion for the enhancement of the University's student quality, faculty and academic excellence and the campus experience. The campaign's official completion date was Dec. 31, 2015.

The Second Century Campaign was publicly launched in 2008 with a goal of \$750 million. Rapid progress toward that goal and opportunities for further advancements led SMU leaders in 2013 to increase the goal to \$1 billion and extend its timeline to 2015.

Ending in 2002, SMU's previous major gifts campaign, "A Time to Lead: The Campaign for SMU", raised \$542 million. Combining both campaigns, in the last two decades SMU has raised a total of \$1.5 billion for 753 new scholarships, 111 new academic positions, 146 academic programs and 32 capital projects.

SMU joins 35 private universities that have raised \$1 billion or more through major gifts campaigns. The institutions range from Columbia and Notre Dame to Emory and Vanderbilt.

HONORARY CAPTAINS

Head Coach Chad Morris has brought several new traditions to SMU's football program, including naming an Honorary Captain at each home game.

In the seven home games last season, Harvey Armstrong, Reggie Dupard, Chuck Hixson, Ramon Flanigan, Gary Hammond, Lance McIlhenny and Louie Kelcher were all named Honorary Captains. Mike Ford was honored in the home opener.

This week, Morris has bestowed that honor upon former SMU great Jerry LeVias. LeVias was the first African-American to receive an athletic scholarship in the Southwest Conference. While at SMU, LeVias made athletic and academic All-America teams and, in 1966, contributed to the Mustangs' first SWC title in 18 years. He was an All-American in 1968 and was chosen All-SWC in 1966, 1967 and 1968.

Since 2009, the SMU coaching staff has annually chosen a deserving student-athlete to wear the number 23 to honor LeVias.

THE PONY EXPRESS RIDES AGAIN

SMU alum, 1982 All-American and NFL Hall of Famer Eric Dickerson has earned two huge honors over the past two years.

In 2015, Dickerson was the recipient of the 2015 Walter Camp Alumni Award. The award is bestowed on a worthy individual who has distinguished himself in the pursuit of excellence as an athlete, in his personal career and in doing good works for others.

Dickerson rushed for a Southwest Conference-record 4,450 yards and 48 TDs in three seasons for the Mustangs. In 1982, Dickerson totaled an impressive 1,617 yards and 17 TDs, averaging 7.0 yards a carry, on his way to Walter Camp All-America honors.

Dickerson was the first NFL player to gain more than 1,000 yards in seven consecutive seasons and became the fastest to total 10,000 yards (in just 91 games). He was named to the NFL 1980s All-Decade Team, and, in 1999, Dickerson was enshrined into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Following the 2015 season, Dickerson was inducted into the Cotton Bowl Hall of Fame. Dickerson was among six individuals who helped shape the tradition of the Goodyear Cotton Bowl Classic and college football history and were chosen for 2016 class.

Dickerson ran for 124 yards on 27 attempts in the 1983 Cotton Bowl Classic, serving as the workhorse in the Mustangs' 7-3 victory over the Pittsburgh Panthers. His constant pounding on Pittsburgh defenders propelled the Ponies to their first Cotton Bowl victory in 34 years and helped SMU to the 1982 Helms Athletic Foundation National Championship.

THREE-TIME NATIONAL CHAMPS

SMU is one of just 26 schools that boasts both a Heisman Trophy winner and multiple National Championships.

Doak Walker won the Heisman following a dominant 1948 season in which he rushed for 542 yards and eight touchdowns, caught 15 passes for 278 yards and two scores, and threw for 304 yards and five TDs. He also returned 10 punts for 169 yards and a touchdown, totaled 161 yards on five kickoff returns, intercepted three passes for 75 yards, averaged 42.1 yards on 35 punts and kicked 22 PATs. He beat out Charlie Justice and Chuck Bednarik for the Heisman.

The NCAA recognizes three SMU teams as National Champions - 1935 (Dickinson & Houlgate), 1981 (National Championship Foundation) & 1982 (Helms Athletic Foundation).

CALLS FROM THE HALLS

SMU boasts nine members of the College Football Hall of Fame and five that are enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. With five Pro Football Hall of Famers, SMU ranks 11th among all schools.

MAN ON THE RUN (OR PASS)

Matt Davis was named to the 2016 Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award Watch List. The award is presented annually at the end of each season to the nation's top college quarterback based on character, citizenship, scholastic achievement, leadership qualities and athletic accomplishments.

Davis entered the 2016 season ranked third all-time in career rushing yards by a quarterback and ninth all-time in total offense in program history before suffering an ACL tear in week one and being lost for the season.

The Houston, Texas, native has started 17 games in his career for SMU, including 11 in 2015 and has led the Mustangs in total offense the past two seasons. The senior signal caller recorded 1,468 yards of total offense in 2014, and again led the Mustangs in total offense in 2015 with 3,024 yards. He led the team in passing yards with 2,263, while also leading the squad in rushing with 761 yards. He is the only returning quarterback to lead his team in rushing in each of the last two seasons. The only other QB to lead their team in rushing in each of the last two years is former Navy signal caller Keenan Reynolds.

The dual-threat signal caller was ranked No. 4 in Pro Football Focus' 2016 list of top 10 running quarterbacks and was also listed as one of Athlon Sports' 20 most underrated quarterbacks in the country.

His 91 yards rushing vs. North Texas was the sixth-best total for a FBS signal caller in Week 1, and, at the time of his injury, he ranked seventh among active FBS quarterbacks.

WACO, Texas (AP) -- Seth Russell threw for 261 yards and two touchdowns and ran for another score, and No. 23/19 Baylor recovered from a slow start to defeat SMU 40-13 on Saturday.

Russell and the Bears (2-0) struggled offensively in the first half and had to settle for a 6-6 tie at intermission, but broke through with a 20-point third quarter on their way to a 13th straight victory over their former Southwest Conference rival.

Baylor missed on several deep shots in the first half, but Blake Lynch capped its opening march after halftime by breaking free in the right seam for a 31-yard touchdown reception from Russell, who added a 19-yard scoring burst on a scramble on the Bears' next possession. Russell was 26 of 47 with two interceptions.

Orion Stewart intercepted two passes for Baylor. The first was in the end zone to stop a promising SMU threat, and he returned the second 33 yards for a touchdown to push Baylor's lead to 26-6.

Redshirt freshman quarterback Ben Hicks made his first career start for SMU (1-1) in place of senior Matt Davis, who missed the game for undisclosed reasons. Hicks helped the Mustangs to 405 yards total offense, but he was intercepted three times -- twice in the end zone -- and SMU scored only one touchdown in five trips inside the 20.

Hicks threw for 144 of his 229 yards in the first quarter, and connected with Courtland Sutton for SMU's only touchdown, a 20-yarder, in the third quarter.

Chad Morris was named the Head Football Coach at SMU on Dec. 1, 2014. Morris arrived on the Hilltop after five seasons as an offensive coordinator on the collegiate level and 16 seasons as a Texas high school coach.

In his first season on the Hilltop, Morris engineered an offensive turnaround, as SMU increased its scoring output by 16.7 points per game – the second-largest increase in the nation in 2015. He also developed two of the nation's top freshmen - wide receiver Courtland Sutton and running back Xavier Jones. Sutton was named a Freshman All-American in 2015 after ranking No. 1 among freshmen with nine receiving TDs. He set an SMU freshman record for receiving yards with 862 and tied former SMU standout Emmanuel Sanders for most touchdowns by a freshman, while Jones set an SMU freshman record with 10 rushing TDs, surpassing SMU greats Eric Dickerson and Zach Line.

For the previous four seasons, Morris has served as Offensive Coordinator at Clemson, helping the Tigers to a 41-11 record, the 2011 ACC Championship and four bowl berths, including two BCS Orange Bowl appearances. Clemson also posted three final top-25 rankings, including a top-10 finish in the final USA Today polls in 2012 and 2013. At the time of his departure, the Tigers were ranked 19th in the 2014 AP and USA Today polls. Clemson established 127 offensive records during his four years (89 individual/38 team) and posted the top three scoring seasons in school history, as well as four of the top five passing seasons in Clemson history. For his work, Morris was named AFCA National Assistant Coach of the Year and one of five finalists for National Offensive Coordinator of the Year by 247Sports.com in 2013, and the National Offensive Coordinator of the Year by Rivals.com in 2011.

Among the players Morris tutored at Clemson were 2012 first-team All-American quarterback and ACC Player of the Year Tajh Boyd, 2012 first-team All-American center Dalton Freeman, 2012 third-team All-American wide receiver DeAndre Hopkins and 2013 first-team All-American wide receiver and Biletnikoff Award finalist Sammy Watkins as well as NFLers Dwayne Allen of the Indianapolis Colts, Jaron Brown and Andre Ellington of the Arizona Cardinals, Martavis Bryant of the Pittsburgh Steelers, Tyler Shatley of the Jacksonville Jaguars and Brandon Thomas of the San Francisco 49ers.

Clemson's 2012 team set school records for total offense per game (512.7) and points per game (41.0), ranking sixth in the nation in scoring and ninth in the nation in total offense, and the 2013 offense averaged 507.7 yards and 40.2 points per game. Clemson and Baylor were the only FBS schools with a 3,000-yard passer, 1,000-yard rusher and 1,000-yard receiver every year from 2011-13.

Morris went to Clemson after one season as Associate Head Coach/Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks Coach at Tulsa. After his arrival, Tulsa improved from 5-7 in 2009 to 10-3 in 2010, averaging 41.4 points per game, eighth-most in the nation, and scoring at least 28 points in 12 of its 13 games. Tulsa was fifth nationally in first downs (25.6) and tied for fifth in touchdowns scored from the red zone (46). His offense scored 64 touchdowns on scrimmage plays (32 rushing, 32 passing) and totaled 1,006 plays (537 rushes, 469 passes).

Prior to his stint at TU, Morris served as a head coach on the Texas prep level for 16 years, coaching at Eustace Independent School District (1994-97), Elysian Field ISD (1998-99), Bay City ISD (2000-02), Stephenville ISD (2004-07) and Lake Travis ISD (2008-09). Morris is a legend in the state after posting a 169-38 record overall and winning back-to-back undefeated state championships in his final two seasons as a prep coach. In all, Morris took six of his teams to Texas State Championship Games, with three of those teams capturing state titles, and earned Coach of the Year honors 11 times.

In his last two years in the prep ranks, Morris led Lake Travis High School to back-to-back undefeated 16-0 seasons as well as two Class 4A State Championships. Lake Travis was the state of Texas' top-ranked offense in both 2008 and 2009. The 2008 team was ranked second nationally by USA Today and eighth by Rivals.com, while the 2009 team ranked No. 2 nationally by Rivals.com and ninth by USA Today.

Morris' offenses enjoyed tremendous success in his two seasons at Lake Travis. In 2008, the Cavaliers averaged 49.0 points per game and had a 41-point margin of victory, while scoring 784 points, the fourth-most in Texas football history, and throwing for 305 yards per game. In that same 2008 campaign, Morris coached former Mustang great Garrett Gilbert, who was named the Gatorade and Parade Magazine National Player of the Year, while setting the state of Texas' single-season passing yardage mark with 4,884 yards and 55 touchdowns. Gilbert also rushed for 790 yards and 28 TDs that season.

In 2009, Lake Travis totaled 7,600 offensive yards for a 475-yard average. LTHS threw for 287.5 yards and scored 44.0 points per game, while defeating opponents by an average of 34 points a game. The Cavaliers put up 4,600 passing yards and 46 TDs, with just seven interceptions.

Before compiling a 32-0 record in his two seasons at Lake Travis, Morris posted a five-year mark of 49-10 at Stephenville High School, where he implemented a hurry-up, no-huddle offense in 2004. At Stephenville, Morris tutored former Ole Miss quarterback Jevan Snead. Snead started the 2004 and 2005 seasons under

Morris' tutelage and rushed for 1,053 yards in his senior season. After Snead, Morris coached quarterback Kody Spano, who later played collegiately at Nebraska. Spano threw for over 2,900 yards and rushed for more than 1,000 yards as a senior in 2007.

Before moving to Stephenville, Morris' teams registered a three-year record of 34-8 at Bay City High School, while playing for the state championship twice (2000 & 2001) and winning the crown in 2000 with a 14-1 record. At Bay City, Morris coached quarterbacks Andrew Smith (2000) and Scott Elliott (2001-02). Smith went on to play at North Texas where he led the Mean Green to a Bowl Game in his freshman season, while Elliott played collegiately at Tulane.

Morris' Elysian High School teams advanced to the state championship game in each of his two seasons as the head coach, while posting a 26-6 two-year record. His first team in 1998 compiled a 12-4 record, while the 1999 team compiled a 14-2 mark.

Morris received his first coaching position at Eustace High School as the quarterbacks coach in 1992-93, before taking over as head coach in 1994, leading the school to an 11-1 record in his final season of four years as the head coach. At Eustace, Morris also served as the head boys' basketball coach for four seasons (1993-97) and posted a record of 128-32.

Morris earned his bachelor's degree in mathematics with a minor in statistics from Texas A&M University in 1992.

Born Dec. 4, 1968, the Dallas, Texas native and his wife, Paula, have two children, daughter Mackenzie and son Chandler.
