### Press Credentials

All requests for working press, photo, and broadcast credentials for SMU's 2003-04 home basketball games should be made in writing on company letterhead by the sports editor or director to **Brad Sutton, Assistant A.D. for Media Relations, P.O. Box 750216, Dallas, Texas 75275** or faxed to (214) 768-2044. Individual game requests must be received by the Media Relations office at least one week prior to the game. All credentials which cannot be mailed should be picked up on game days in the Media Relations Office or at the Pass Gate located at the northeast corner of Moody Coliseum on Binkley Avenue. The Pass Gate is open 90 minutes before the game.

### Parking

Requests for parking passes should be made at the same time as the requests for press credentials. A limited number of spaces are available on Binkley Avenue, due north of Moody Coliseum.

### Radio & Television

All visiting radio and television stations should coordinate plans through SMU Associate Athletic Director for Sales & Marketing Shawn Heilbron at (214) 768-2885. SMU provides two regular business phone lines and a four-wire Switch 56 line for visiting broadcasters on a reciprocal basis.

### Working Area

Working media and radio crews will be seated in the press box above sections N & O. Overflow media will be seated along the east baseline. Television crews will be seated courtside.

### Press Row Services

Statistics monitors, complete box scores, running play-by-play, post-game notes and coaches' and players' quotes for SMU will be provided to the media. For fax service, please contact a member of the SMU Media Relations staff.

### Photographers

All photographers must have proper credentials, worn in plain sight. Photographers from daily newspapers, wire services, major magazines and television stations have priority. Photographers will be allowed to shoot the game from behind the end lines in the northwest and southeast corners of Moody Coliseum, but not directly underneath the baskets.

### Interviews

The SMU locker room will be closed to the media following games. After a brief cooling down period, Coach Mike Dement and selected players will be available in an interview room adjacent to the locker room. Please make any specific player requests to Assistant A.D. for Media Relations Brad Sutton.

Interviews during the week with Mike Dement or any SMU players should be arranged through the Media Relations Office. Dement and players who do not have class can be available up to 45 minutes before practice Monday-Friday. It is best to arrange for coach and player interviews at least 24 hours in advance.

## 2003-04 Outlook

As the 2003-04 season approaches, SMU Head Coach Mike Dement faces this tough alphabetical question – How will the Mustangs get “W”s with no “Q”?

The Ponies face new challenges after losing Quinton Ross, the WAC Player of the Year and an honorable mention All-American. The 6-6 do-it-all swingman was a key cog in SMU’s attack throughout his time on the Hilltop and the Mustangs will miss more than just his 1,761 career points.

“Quinton was a player who really did it all,” said Dement. “He hit the clutch shot, the clutch free throw, and he handled the ball in the crunch. He was our best defender, an excellent rebounder and the best leader by example we have ever had.”


“In each of the past two seasons we’ve had to replace big parts of our team – Jeryl Sasser and Willie Davis in 2001 and Damon Hancock in 2002. I’m not sure how we’re going to replace Quinton. It’s not just the points and the rebounds. You just don’t lose that type of player without having question marks about who’s going to step up and do all the things he did. It creates a big challenge for our players to improve and replace Quinton’s contributions.”

And after years of excellent play from upperclassmen including All-WAC performers Ross, Sasser, Davis, Hancock and Stephen Woods, the Mustangs enter 2003-04 without a dominant junior or senior on the perimeter. Instead, SMU will look to sophomore guard Bryan Hopkins to extend the Ponies’ school-record streak of seven straight .500-or-better seasons.

Hopkins was named WAC Freshman of the Year after his first season as a ‘Stang despite suffering from a hip flexor injury for most of the season. The guard came to SMU as perhaps the most highly-touted recruit in school history, ranked as high as the No. 8 prospect in the country as a high school senior. His debut season was somewhat up-and-down, however, as the nagging injury robbed the fab frosh of much of his quickness and mobility.

“People who know Bryan Hopkins, people who saw him in high school, know that he never did play to his full, healthy potential last season,” revealed Dement. “He had a remarkable season when you consider the fact that he was hurt all year. I think he had one solid dunk the whole year, and that was in the last game of the season. That’s something that, in high school, people expected because he was so explosive. But despite his nagging injuries, he was still the WAC Freshman of the Year and our second-leading scorer.”

“He still had some big scoring games and ended up hitting some clutch shots and free throws. His defense was affected as much as his offense because of his injury, yet he still led the WAC in steals. That shows some of his anticipation skills. He can be one of the best defenders in our league, both on and off the ball.”

Indeed despite his problems, the Dallas native ranked second on the team in scoring at 13.1 points per game while averaging over two steals and dishing out nearly twice as many assists as anyone else on the team. His 61 steals were a school record for a freshman and his 380 points were the fourth-most by a first-year in SMU history. But as the season approaches, Hopkins’ health remains a point of concern for Dement and Pony fans alike.

“He’s working at it, but he’s still not as healthy as he was in high school. His foot is healthy, but the groin and hip flexor problems have been much more problematic than the foot surgery. It really took away his ability to move and slide defensively. Things he used to do naturally, he couldn’t do last season, and we lost games early last season because of Bryan’s injuries. We’ve got to get Bryan healthy and keep him healthy.”

While Hopkins will be a focal point of the SMU attack in 2003-04, others will be expected to step up and assume larger roles, says Dement.

“Defenses will try a lot on Bryan next season. They’re going to put other people in the position to make plays, particularly now that Ross gone. His teammates know that.”

"Historically, teams in our league who have big years have a senior play well. This season we only have two guys who have been here for three years - Kris Lowe and Lavardicus Atkins."

Lowe and Atkins, both Georgia natives, enter their fourth years on the Hilltop still looking to leave their indelible marks on the program. Lowe, a three-time letterman, has shown flashes at times only to slip into the background at key moments, while Atkins stands as a redshirt junior, having been hampered by knee problems since his freshman season.

"Kris Lowe started a lot as a sophomore and a junior, but got off to a slow start and was a little bit inconsistent last season," said Dement. "I think he's a key player for us and he really needs to have a great senior year. Being a mainstay in the starting lineup, he has to be a guy who consistently hits a good percentage of his shots. He's been a good rebounder the last two years and he can be a great leader. He's very mature and we need him to have a big year on the court. With the loss of Ross on the wing, he's a logical candidate to step up to that starting position."

Atkins has been redshirted with an injury and it still continues to be a question mark as to whether he will ever play to the level he played at when he came in as a freshman. He continues to have problems with that leg, but we need Voc to be

healthy this season and challenge for time at the point guard spot."

SMU's best options for supporting Hopkins, however, may come from the junior class, where Eric Castro, Justin Isham and Patrick Simpson all appear ready to have breakout seasons. Simpson and Castro form an outstanding tandem in the post, while Isham appears to be next in the long line of outstanding Mustang guards.

Simpson, a long 6-9 forward, was SMU's leading rebounder and shot blocker a year ago and ranked third in scoring at 11.9 ppg. With 86 blocks in two seasons, the Denver native already ranks fifth all-time in swats on the Hilltop. Castro, meanwhile, has been a workhorse inside for the Ponies, battling away as a 6-8 center. He averaged nine points and six boards last season and led SMU in field goal percentage at 56.5 percent.

"Eric Castro and Patrick Simpson both improved last season," said Dement. "They picked up their scoring and rebounding, played well inside and stepped out and hit three-pointers in some big games. Eric was our Most Improved Player award winner and hit some big shots during the season. He was solid. And I thought Pat got stronger toward the end of the year last season. He was more focused and that was a big key to his success and our run at the end of the year."

"We'll ask them to shoot the three-pointer a little bit more this season and they should be mature enough now to look for it more. The big key for the two of them is to attack the basket and get to the free-throw line more. That will put them in a position to increase their point production and can put the other team's forwards in foul trouble. They have to be stronger around the basket, both offensively and defensively. They're both very good defensive rebounders, but we need them to improve on the offensive glass, go to the rim, finish and get fouled."

Isham, a 6-5 slasher, continued to make amazing acrobatic plays as a sophomore a year ago and emerged as one of SMU's top three-point threats.

"We need Justin Isham to become everything Quinton Ross was in his junior year. Ross emerged as a big scoring option as a junior and was an All-WAC defender. Justin can be that type of player with his quickness and his range. Justin shot the ball well from the three-point line last season and made some big ones for us in the clutch. He also ended up making some big free throws in key games. He has to improve his ball-handling, but I think he can put up big numbers up across the board. With his athleticism, we need to get him on the glass and to the free-throw line more."

While Isham and Hopkins will have the green light from beyond the arc, Dement said he will still look for improvement from long range, both offensively and defensively.

"For the last two seasons, the three-point shot has been a big emphasis with our team in that we wanted to shoot more and make more, but most importantly, defend it better. We didn't do that again last year. We shot a below-average percentage and allowed our opponents to shoot 36 percent for the

second year in a row. That's a big problem for us and will continue to be a focus."

"From an offensive standpoint we need to shoot it better. For us, that can translate into Brian Miller."

Miller, a 6-5 sharpshooter from Flower Mound, was a redshirt freshman in 2002-03 after missing all but six games in his true freshman season with a herniated disc in his back. His second season started slowly, but the guard made his way back into the rotation and saw significant minutes as the season wore on.

"Brian was recruited as a shooter, but then had to have major back surgery," said Dement. "That obviously affected him. He got off to a tough start last year, and it kind of snowballed into a lack of confidence and lack of consistency in his shot. He just needs to get back to what he does best - shoot. He could be a key factor for us in that regard. We need that great shooter - the guy who, when a defender makes a mistake and leaves him open, makes them pay."

Three other second-year players should also see increased playing time in 2003-04. Bobby Aitkenhead, Ryan Hopkins and Donatas Rackauskas all figure to play bigger roles for SMU next season.

Rackauskas should have the biggest impact, literally and figuratively. The 6-11, 250-pound post presence saw his min-

utes increase throughout 2002-03 and, with a season's seasoning, the Lithuanian big man should have a solid campaign.

"Donatas is going to be a good player," Dement stated. "He stayed here over the summer, worked out, took some summer school and was dedicated to getting better. He is probably our most improved player out of the summer. He played in the Global Games and got some experience against some tough competition. He played in 23 games last season and averaged about six minutes a game. With the loss of Jibran Kelley and Nigel Smith, we told him that he needs to take his six minutes, Jibran's 18 minutes and Nigel's 10 minutes and be ready for it. We expect him to be a 25-30 minute player, while challenging for a starting position. He's a very good defensive rebounder, he's got good touch from the floor and an excellent baseline jump shot. He needs strength like most big men, though, and needs to improve his post defense."

His looming presence could even see SMU go to a bigger lineup in 2003-04.

"We are considering moving Simpson into that wing spot to allow us to play Donatas and Castro as a bigger group," revealed Dement. "Eric and Donatas are both good high-low guys and moving Simpson to the perimeter would give us a much bigger look. It could cause some match-up problems."

Ryan Hopkins, Bryan's twin brother, will return at the two-guard spot and should see more playing time as a sophomore.

"Ryan was very competitive in our early practice sessions last year. He's a feisty player who made things happen in practice. He was a little inconsistent and faded a bit as the season wore on, but that's normal freshman stuff. He just needs to get stronger and stay competitive."

Aitkenhead joined the team a year ago as a sophomore walk-on after earning international experience in his native Guatemala. He was the spark in a home win over San Jose State, starting the second half and netting five points in his six minutes of play.

"Bobby has shown some flashes at the point guard position. We're trying to get him to be a guy not unlike Mark Campbell from Hawaii. He's mature, can get people in the right place, get them the ball, and hit the open shot. Bobby showed that he could do that in stretches last season, so he may give us some help there."

Another walk-on also returns in 2003-04, as junior guard Michael Dement continues to improve for his father's squad.

"Michael can shoot well, and there were times when we as a staff considered using him for his three-point shot. He's worked hard, gotten stronger, and could be a guy we call on against zones or in specialty situations."

Two additional walk-ons, redshirt freshman Duke Biggers and sophomore Trent Redden will also provide depth on the perimeter.

"Duke and Trent give us additional options at the guard spots," said Dement. "Having been in the program a year, Duke knows our system and Trent is a tremendous shooter from the perimeter."

College basketball has placed an increased level of importance on freshmen in recent years and the Mustangs are not exempt from the move. Three first-years will join the squad and could play important roles in the season.

Demetric Bennett, a combo guard from Albany, Ga., arrives at SMU after a standout prep career and could move right into a big role as a frosh.

"Demetric Bennett comes in with a reputation as a scorer," Dement said. "He can make the three and has good range. He's very strong and he could challenge for that vacated combo-guard spot. Ballhandling will be an area of concern for us because of Voc Atkins' injury, so we may have to turn to Demetric to play some point guard."

In the interior, SMU will add 6-6 Devon Pearson from Miami, Fla., and 6-8 Christopher Reay from Plano, Texas, to help fill the void created by the loss of Jibran Kelley and Nigel Smith.

"Devon had a great senior year, and was an All-Dade County performer. We'll probably have him come in as a small power forward like Willie Davis played in his great junior year. Willie was an All-District and All-Conference player in that spot and we think Devon can do the same. He can step out and shoot the jumper and create some problems for a bigger defender. He's an athletic, tough kid, who comes from an excellent prep

program. We think he can come in and challenge at the four spot, and maybe move him to the three eventually. With his speed, athleticism, and quickness, he can create a lot of problems for forwards guarding him."

"Christopher Reay has a big, strong body. He was highly recruited after his junior year and committed early, having played for David Piehler, a former SMU letterman. He has a good baseline jump shot, but needs to improve his athleticism. He's a player in the mold of Mike Niemi - big body, can score around the basket, can step out and shoot the jump shot."

Despite the questions surrounding SMU in 2003-04, the Mustangs will not be able to ease into the season as the schedule is daunting right out of the gate. To ease the transition, the Ponies took a preseason trip to Vancouver, British Columbia, which allowed for preseason competition and, most importantly according to Dement, 10 extra practices.

"The tour allowed us to get our freshmen some minutes so they don't have to play their first real competition for SMU against tough teams like San Diego, Texas Tech, Baylor or the like. They got to get their feet wet in games and we got 10 extra practices. The tour allowed us to try different lineups, experiment with our bigger group and do some things that we normally wouldn't get to do."

"As a program, we have adopted the philosophy that we play a tough non-conference schedule. We will always play Big 12 schools, ACC schools, Big Ten schools and the like and we again are going to have the toughest schedule in our conference. We have Baylor, San Diego, Texas Tech, Appalachian State, Wake Forest, Navy, Miami of Ohio, Purdue, should we win over Miami, and Oklahoma State."

"The teams in our league are making big moves. Boise State has everyone coming back and I thought they were a good team last year. They've recruited some junior college players and I think they can challenge for the league title. UTEP had a great recruiting class and have got a lot of guys coming back. San Jose has recruited a lot of junior college players, and was a team that beat Hawaii twice last year. Rice lost one player and has all their big scorers back. Hawaii, who finished sixth and got to the NIT, picked up Julian Sensely, a player who can challenge for player of the year honors right out of the gate. They become a favorite immediately. I think Louisiana Tech has one of the best recruiting classes in America with a lot of junior college players and a big-time freshman. Tulsa loses four seniors but still has an excellent group. Nevada's got a lot of guys coming back including Kirk Snyder, who's a top player of the year candidate, and they've recruited very well with a couple junior college guys and a very good freshman. And Fresno St. may lose some seniors, but they've got a pretty good class coming in next season. It's going to be a very tough league."

"We've established a winning tradition at SMU now," closed Dement. "The schedule is tough and we certainly have some question marks, but we're committed to continuing our success. It should be a very exciting and competitive season."

# Head Coach Mike Dement



Entering his ninth season at the helm of the SMU basketball program, Mike Dement has overseen the resurgence of hoops on the Hilltop.

Dement, 49, was named the 14th men's basketball coach in SMU history on May 5, 1995. He was the head coach at North Carolina Greensboro from 1991-95 and Cornell University from 1986-91 prior to accepting the position at SMU and has a 17-year overall record of 250-228 and a 128-105 ledger in eight seasons at SMU.

Taking over a program that had won just 13 total games in the two seasons prior to his arrival, Dement laid a foundation for success in his first season. Since the 1996-97 campaign, the Mustangs have averaged nearly 18 wins per season. Last season's 17-13 record marked the program's seventh-straight .500-or-better campaign, setting a new school record.

In 1999-2000, the Mustangs went 21-9 and made an appearance in the postseason NIT. It was SMU's best record and first postseason bid since the 1992-93 season, and the 21 wins were the program's most since the 1987-88 season.

Entering 2003-04, Dement sits in fourth place on SMU's coaching charts with 128 wins and is just 14 wins away from the No. 2 spot. In addition, his outstanding tenure has produced the second-best eight-year start for a Mustang coach in school history.

Over the past eight seasons, Dement has guided his players to All-WAC honors 12 times and has firmly restored the SMU program back to national respect.

Dement has guided the SMU program to several milestones, including:

- Seven straight 15+ win seasons, setting a new mark for the longest such streak in school history.
- Guiding Quinton Ross and Bryan Hopkins to WAC Player of the Year and Freshman of the Year honors, respectively, in 2002-03, marking the first time SMU student-athletes have ever won those all-conference honors.
- Guiding Jeryl Sasser to become the program's first NBA first-round draft pick in 16 years when he was selected by the Orlando Magic with the 22nd pick of the 2001 draft.
- Coaching seven players - No. 1 Jeryl Sasser, No. 4 Quinton Ross, No. 9 Damon Hancock, No. 10 Stephen Woods, No. 13 Jay Poerner, No. 14 Willie Davis and No. 17 Troy Matthews - who rank among the school's all-time top 17 scorers.
- Five WAC road wins in both 2001-02 & 2002-03, just one win shy of tying the mark for the most conference road wins ever at six, an event which happened just twice before and last in 1955-56 when SMU advanced to the NCAA Final Four.
- Eleven conference victories in 2002-03, the most ever by a Pony squad in the WAC and the most since SMU won 12 in the Southwest Conference back in 1992-93.
- Twenty-one wins in 1999-2000, the most wins at the school since 1987-88.
- A 13-game home win streak in 1999-2000, which tied the third longest streak in SMU history and was the longest streak in 15 seasons.
- Eight straight seasons of out-rebounding opponents for the first time in school history.
- Votes in the *Associated Press* Top 25 poll in four of the last six seasons.
- Placing at least one player on the All-Western Athletic Conference team in seven straight seasons.

Discipline has certainly been a major factor in SMU's improvement under the fiery Dement. SMU established a modern-day school record for fewest turnovers in a season with 11.6 per game in 1996-97, and the Mustangs have averaged fewer than 14 turnovers in six of the last seven seasons.

SMU has also gained a reputation as a tough rebounding team under Dement. The Mustangs' +3.6 rebound differential in 1997-98 was the best by an SMU team in eight years. Including its +0.7 rebound margin in 2002-03, SMU has outrebounded its opponents in eight consecutive seasons - all under Dement - marking the first time in school history that has occurred.

Dement's reputation as an outstanding recruiter has also solidified since arriving on the Hilltop. One key factor has been SMU's ability to keep Texas players at home. Prior to Dement's arrival, SMU had signed only 11 players from the state of Texas in the previous 11 seasons. Since 1995, 17 Texas recruits have signed with SMU, including 15 who were ranked among the state's top 45 high school players and six in the top 10. One of those recruits, Bryan Hopkins, was named the 2003 WAC Freshman of the Year and two more - Stephen Woods & Jeryl Sasser - were named as WAC Division Freshmen of the Year in 1997 and 1998, respectively. Sasser expanded his trophy case with the 1999 WAC Mountain Division Player of the Year award, becoming just the second WAC sophomore to earn Player of the Year honors, and yet another Dallas native, Quinton Ross, was the 2003 WAC Player of the Year.

The 2002-03 campaign saw SMU post its seventh-straight .500-or-better season and win 15 or more games for the seventh-straight season, setting new marks for the longest such streaks in school history. SMU also won 11 conference games, the most ever for the school in the WAC, was the No. 2 seed in the conference tournament and reached the semifinals in the process.

In 2000-01, SMU went 18-12, marking the third time SMU won at least 18 games under Dement. The Ponies' two-season win total of 39 was the most since 1987-88 and SMU just missed out on postseason play. Following the season, however, Jeryl Sasser became the program's first NBA first-round draft pick in 16 years when he was selected by the Orlando Magic with the 22nd pick overall in the draft.

The 1999-2000 season saw the Mustangs return to the postseason for the first time since 1992-93, with an appearance in the National Invitation Tournament. SMU's 21-9 record was the eighth 20-win season in school history and the most at the school since 1987-88 - earning Dement District 9 Coach of the Year honors from the National Association of Basketball Coaches. The Mustangs' third-place regular season finish was their highest since joining the WAC in 1996, and marked the first time SMU was the higher seed in its opening round game of the WAC postseason tournament.

In 1998-99, SMU continued to make its name as one of the toughest postseason teams in the nation. SMU advanced to the WAC semifinals for the first time and reached a semifinal round of a conference tournament for the first time in eight years. The Ponies continued their string of first-round upsets, topping higher-seeded UTEP for their fourth consecutive opening game tournament upset. The Mustangs' second-round victim was NIT-bound UNLV, a team that SMU defeated three times during the season.

The Mustangs posted an 18-10 record in 1997-98, their best record in five years. SMU improved its won-lost record the fourth consecutive year, marking the first time in school history that had happened. SMU, which started two freshmen and one sophomore all season, improved in 16 of 19 major statistical categories over 1996-97. SMU's 10-0 start set the school record for most consecutive wins to begin a season. SMU also posted an upset over a higher-seeded opponent in its conference tournament for the third consecutive season.

Competing in its first season as a member of the powerful WAC in 1996-97, SMU registered a 16-12 record, an eight-game improvement over Dement's first season on the Hilltop. SMU's turnaround earned the program notice as the 12th most-improved team in the nation. In addition to the record improvement, there were several other highlights as well. SMU, which posted its first winning season in four years, enjoyed its longest winning streak in four seasons. The Ponies posted the biggest comeback in school history after trailing at Kent by 20 points. Most importantly, SMU got the city of Dallas excited again, as shown by a 64 percent improvement in attendance over the previous year. Dement became the most successful second-year coach in SMU history by winning 16 games (the previous high was 12). Not surprisingly, *The Dallas Morning News* named Dement the WAC Coach of the Year for his efforts.



As fine as the 1996-97 regular season was, the team's play in the postseason earned it the most recognition. For the second straight year, SMU defeated a higher-seeded opponent in the opening round of its conference tournament. The victim was fourth-seeded Colorado State, which entered the game with a 20-8 record and had hopes of earning a bid to either the NCAA Tournament or the NIT. SMU upended the Rams, 93-89, in the first round and took the nation's No. 3 team, Utah, to the wire before falling in the WAC Tournament quarterfinal round. The Utes needed a miracle tip-in by All-American Keith Van Horn with three-tenths of a second left to escape with a 59-58 win. It capped a special season for a Pony team that was picked to finish last in its division in the preseason.

Dement's initial SMU squad in 1995-96 posted an 8-20 record, but that was misleading. The Mustangs improved in every major statistical category from the previous year and won two of their last three games, including a 62-57 upset of second-seeded Houston in the opening round of the final Southwest Conference Classic. The victory marked SMU's first postseason tournament win since 1991. In that game, SMU's suffocating defense - a trademark of Dement's Mustangs - rattled the Cougars to a 36 percent shooting night and forced 25 turnovers.

Prior to SMU, Dement took over the North Carolina Greensboro program in 1991-92, its first full year in Division I. Just three seasons later, the team finished with a 23-6 record and a Big South regular season championship. Dement's Spartans finished 14-2 in the league in 1994-95 and were the Big South Tournament runner-up. Greensboro led the Big South in several statistical categories, including team scoring, scoring defense, scoring margin, and rebounding. Three times during the 1994-

95 season, Greensboro received top 25 votes in both the *USA Today* and *Associated Press* polls, and *Basketball Times* named him the 1995 Seaboard Region Coach of the Year.

Under Dement's leadership, Greensboro steadily improved its victory totals from 1991-95. In his first season, the Spartans were 7-21 in their inaugural campaign in the Division I ranks after competing at the Division II level for three years (1988-91) and in Division III for 20 years. The next three seasons, Dement led the Spartans to 10, 15, and 23 victories, respectively. In 1993-94, the Spartans were ranked seventh in the nation in rebounding margin at +7.1.

Dement was the head coach at Cornell from 1986-1991, leading the Big Red to the 1988 NCAA Tournament and their first Ivy League title in 34 years. At the age of 32, Dement became the most successful first-year coach in the history of Cornell men's basketball. Dement, who was named Ivy League Coach of the Year by *Eastern Basketball* magazine in 1988, was 67-67 in his five years at Cornell.

Three of Dement's former assistant coaches have advanced to head coaching positions at the college level. Steve Robinson, one of Dement's assistants at Cornell, served as the head coach at Florida State from 1997 to 2002, and Dement's other Cornell assistant, Al Walker, is now the head coach at Binghamton. In addition, just weeks after Dement accepted the SMU job, Randy Peele, his top assistant at UNC Greensboro, was named the Spartans' head coach.

Dement served as an assistant coach at three schools before accepting the Cornell head coaching position in 1986. He had assistant coaching tenures at East Carolina (1985-86), Cornell (1983-85) and Duke (1982-83).

Dement's first college coaching experience was a volunteer assistant position under Mike Krzyzewski at Duke.

"When Mike came to us as a volunteer assistant," said Krzyzewski, "He gave up his job as a high school coach and athletic director. He has made a total commitment to become a really good Division I basketball coach and he is accustomed to building programs."

Krzyzewski's thoughts were echoed throughout the coaching community when Dement was hired at SMU.

"Mike is the most serious student of the game that I know in college basketball today," said South Carolina coach Dave Odom. "He studies the game, teaches the game and is devoted to the total development of student-athletes on his team. He has a reputation among his peers as being a coach who operates a program of the highest integrity."

In five years as a head coach in the scholastic ranks, Dement posted an overall record of 109-26. The Louisburg, N.C., native was head basketball coach/athletic director at Vance Academy in Henderson, N.C., from 1980-82 (50-9 record) and head coach/athletic director at Kerr Lake School in Townsville, N.C., from 1977-80 (59-17 record). Dement began his coaching career at Louisburg (N.C.) High School as an assistant in 1976-77.

As a player at Louisburg College from 1972-74, Dement helped lead the team to a second-place finish in Region X. Dement was a three-time all-conference selection and four-year letterwinner at Louisburg High School. He was part of Louisburg's 1971 state championship team.

Dement earned an Associate of Arts degree from Louisburg College in 1974 and a Bachelor of Science degree in Health & Physical Education from East Carolina in 1976. Born April 10, 1954, in Louisburg, N.C., Dement and his wife, Linda, have a son, Michael, a junior on the SMU squad, and a daughter, Emily.

**Robert Lineburg**  
Assistant Coach

With the longest tenure among men's assistant coaches on the Hilltop, Robert Lineburg is in his seventh season at SMU and has served two tours of duty with the Mustang basketball program.

Lineburg, who originally made the trek to SMU from UNC Greensboro with Mustang head coach Mike Dement

in 1995, spent the 2000-01 season as an assistant coach at James Madison before returning for his second stint at SMU on June 15, 2001.

Lineburg was on Dement's coaching staff as an assistant at UNC Greensboro in 1994-95, when the Spartans finished 23-6 and won the Big South regular season championship.

His strong organizational skills and familiarity with Dement's system are added bonuses for the SMU program. Lineburg's responsibilities are broad in scope and include recruiting, scouting, film preparation, academic support and other administrative duties.

In addition to his SMU duties, Lineburg also served on the National Association of Basketball Coaches' Assistant Coaches' Board of Directors.

At James Madison, Lineburg served as a primary recruiter in addition to his on-court coaching and administrative duties.

Prior to his year at North Carolina-Greensboro, Lineburg worked as a graduate assistant at Virginia Tech in 1993-94 and as an assistant coach at Emory & Henry College from 1991-93.

A native of Radford, Va., he played two years at Radford University and two years at Roanoke College, where he earned a B.A. degree in Political Science in 1991. Lineburg then received his Master's degree in Sports Management from Virginia Tech in 1995.

Born Feb. 14, 1968, Lineburg and his wife, Mary, were married in April of 2000.



**Coleman Crawford**  
Assistant Coach

Coleman Crawford begins his second season as an assistant coach on the Hilltop, having joined the SMU staff in July 2002 after five seasons as an assistant at Florida State.

Crawford has accompanied five teams to the NCAA Tournament and one to the NIT during his coaching career.

At FSU, Crawford served as one of two primary recruiters in addition to his on-court coaching and administrative duties. He was an integral part of attracting the Seminoles' 2000-01 & 2001-02 recruiting classes, both of which were ranked in the nation's top 25. FSU's 2000 class included a McDonald's All-American and three top-100 prospects.

Prior to his time in Tallahassee, Crawford assisted for two seasons at Tulsa, where he helped the Golden Hurricane to two NCAA Tournament appearances and the 1997 Missouri Valley Conference Tournament Championship.

He was the head coach at the University of Akron from 1990-95. During the 1989-90 season, his first at Akron, the Zips were 16-12 and fell just one win shy of tying the mark for the best record for a first-year Akron basketball coach. Crawford's teams also put together winning seasons in 1991 and 1992 with 15-13 and 16-12 records, respectively, and the Zips took second in the

Mid-Continent Conference standings in 1992.

Prior to his appointment at Akron, Crawford was an assistant coach at Tennessee under Don DeVoe from 1986 through 1989. During his three seasons with the Volunteers, UT earned bids to the 1988 NIT and 1989 NCAA Tournament.

Crawford was an assistant coach at Akron under current Cincinnati head coach Bob Huggins for three years (1984-86) and also held assistant coaching positions at Middle Tennessee State (1982-84) and Delta State (1979-82).

Crawford was a standout player as a collegian. He was a two-time all-conference selection while at North Alabama in 1974 and 1975, and in 1974, he was named the conference Player of the Year.

Crawford earned his bachelor's degree from North Alabama in history and secondary education in 1975 and earned his master's degree in administration supervision in 1980 from Delta State.

Crawford and his wife, Elaine, have two sons, William (30) and Adrian (24).



**Robert Brickey**  
Assistant Coach

Robert Brickey is in his second season as an assistant coach on the Hilltop, having joined Mike Dement's staff in June 2002.

Brickey, who earned his bachelor's degree in political science from Duke

University in 1990, was team captain of head coach Mike Krzyzewski's 1989-90 Blue Devil squad. During his career, he helped the Blue Devils to four NCAA Tournament appearances, including three Final Four finishes.

He graduated in 18th place on Duke's all-time scoring list and was third on the school's career blocked shots chart. He notched 1,299 points, 649 rebounds and 90 blocked shots while playing in 134 career contests.

More recently, Brickey spent two seasons as an assistant at Army, where he worked with Black Knights Head Coach Pat Harris.

Prior to arriving at West Point, Brickey spent one year serving as Community Outreach Coordinator for his alma mater's athletic department. He helped integrate Duke athletes into community-based, youth-oriented programs while also serving as liaison between the Duke athletic department and community representatives.

Between his graduation and subsequent tenure at Duke, he served in a

myriad of roles, primarily regarding the development of community programs for youths in the Durham-Fayetteville area of North Carolina. In 1994, he founded Time-Out Ministries and served as that organization's director, implementing fundraising and outreach programs for economically disadvantaged youths, and cultivating community ministry partnerships. Included in that vast array of responsibilities was his role as director and coordinator of the Christian Basketball Academy.

Brickey also served as director of Community I.M.P.A.C.T., a program designed to foster community support for programs that assist disadvantaged teens in the Fayetteville-Durham area.

Brickey has an 11-year old daughter, Kristina. He is single and resides in Dallas.



**Alvydas Pazdrazdis**  
Coordinator Of Operations

Alvydas Pazdrazdis returns for his second season with the SMU staff as the team's Coordinator of Basketball Operations.

Pazdrazdis arrived on the Hilltop after spending two seasons at Tulane,

where he served as the strength and conditioning coach for the Green Wave basketball team.

Pazdrazdis brings immense basketball playing experience to his current position. After college, he had an injury-shortened three-year professional career in his native country of Lithuania.

Prior to his pro career, he lettered for McNeese State, where he earned a pair of degrees in marketing and management as an undergraduate. In 1994-95, Pazdrazdis was an All-Southland Conference selection for the Cowboys, averaging 16.0 points and 5.8 rebounds. He also set a school record by hitting seven three-pointers in one game.

In 1992, he represented Lithuania in the Olympics in Barcelona, Spain, earning a bronze medal in the year of the first U.S. "Dream Team" and scoring three points against Michael Jordan, Magic Johnson, Larry Bird and crew. His Lithuanian teammates included NBA stars Sarunas Marciulionis and Arvydas Sabonis as his squad earned recognition for their great play and Grateful Dead t-shirts.

The summer of 2003 also saw Pazdrazdis serve his home country, but this time as a coach. He led the Lithuanian squad to a fifth place finish at the Coca Cola Global Games, serving as head coach in the medal round.

Pazdrazdis and his wife Ausra have a daughter, Karolina (6).



# Year In Review



# Year In Review

The 2002-03 campaign marked yet another season of excellence for the SMU Mustangs. Behind WAC Player of the Year Quinton Ross and WAC Newcomer of the Year Bryan Hopkins, the Ponies posted their school-record seventh-straight winning season, continuing a successful tradition they helped solidify on the Hilltop.

The Ponies also won 15 or more games for an impressive seventh consecutive year, outrebounded their opponents for a school-record eighth straight season and used their aggressive, attack-the-basket style of play to get to the line more than their opponents for the fourth straight season.

The Mustangs again tackled one of the nation's toughest schedules, playing 10 games against teams that advanced to the post-season. Despite the challenging slate, the Ponies succeeded. SMU advanced to the WAC Tournament semifinals for the first time since 1998-99 and finished on a hot streak, winning 11 of its last 16 games. Along the way, the Mustangs won 11 conference games, the most league victories for an SMU squad since 1992-93, and secured the No. 2 seed in the conference tournament, their highest seeding in 10 years.

SMU was successful both at Moody Coliseum and on the road in 2002-03. The Ponies were an impressive 10-3 at home on the year, reasserting their dominance at home. SMU has averaged over 10 wins in Moody over the last six years and have won more than 70 percent of their home contests. SMU also went 5-4 away from Airline Road in WAC contests for the second straight year. With that success, the Ponies became the only WAC team to post winning road records in league play in both 2001-02 and 2002-03.

Leading the way for SMU was honorable mention AP

All-America guard Quinton Ross. Ross averaged 20.3 points per game on the season to become just the second Mustang to average more than 20 points per game since Ira Terrell averaged 22 during the 1975-76 season - a span of 27 years. The 6-6 guard was the leading scorer in the WAC and led SMU in scoring in 20 of its 30 contests, topping the 30-point mark on two occasions.

With his scoring efforts, Ross finished his time on the Hilltop as the program's No. 4 all-time scorer with 1,761 points. That output places him among the school's top 17 scorers - a list which includes an amazing seven players who have lettered under Mike Dement - No. 1 Jeryl Sasser, No. 4 Quinton Ross, No. 9 Damon Hancock, No. 10 Stephen Woods, No. 13 Jay Poerner, No. 14 Willie Davis & No. 17 Troy Matthews. His senior season production of 608 points is the fifth-best single season effort in school history and marked the first time since 1970-71 that a Mustang topped the 600-point barrier.

For the second straight season, an SMU tandem ranked as the top scoring duo in the league, as Ross combined with star freshman Bryan Hopkins to average 33.4 points per game.

Hopkins, rated as high as the nation's No. 8 high school recruit in 2000-01, was slowed by injury for the season's first half, but still managed to put

up outstanding first-year numbers. Hopkins was second on the team in scoring at 13.1 ppg, led SMU in assists, recording a season-high 10 dishes against TCU, and led the WAC in steals. Hopkins' season total of 380 points ranks as the fourth-best freshman performance in school history and the point guard upped his average to almost 15 points per game in conference play.

Seniors Jibran Kelley and Nigel Smith made valuable contributions to the squad, as the posts provided depth off the bench. Kelley played in all 30 games for the Mustangs, starting six, while averaging two points and three rebounds. Smith saw time in 16 games, and, despite missing a large portion of the season due to illness, the 6-10 big man averaged two points and two boards per game.

Kris Lowe, the lone junior on the squad, once again provided solid play for SMU with averages of 4.3 points and 2.6 boards. The swingman had a season-high 16 at Appalachian State and added 13 in the home win over Hawaii. He was again one of the top free throw shooters in the WAC and gave SMU a solid inside-out threat.

SMU's super sophomores were a big part of the Mustangs' attack, as Patrick Simpson, Eric Castro, Justin Isham and Lavardicus Atkins provided a boost on both ends of the court.

Simpson led SMU in rebounding at 7.1 boards per game and added almost 12 points per contest as well. The 6-9 forward provided huge matchup problems for opponents and was among the league leaders in blocked shots. He came up big against Tulsa, notching a double-double with 23 points and 11 rebounds. The post player was third in the WAC in blocks at 1.5 per game and now ranks fifth on the SMU all-time list in rejections after just two seasons on the Hilltop.

Eric Castro continued his inside work for the Mustangs as well, providing a scoring post with solid passing skills. Castro finished 13th in the WAC at 6.0 rebounds per game and shot a team-best 56.5 percent from the floor. He played a big part in the win at Tulsa, setting a new career high with 19 points and adding 11 boards and two assists.

Justin Isham was emerging as a star for the Mustangs until suffering a sprained wrist in the WAC opener at La. Tech. Isham netted 25 points in the Jim Thorpe Classic and was establishing himself as an offensive threat before the in-

jury, and still recovered to the rank 12th in the WAC in steals despite being hampered by the sprain. It was his putback as time ran out at Tulsa that gave the Mustangs the overtime win.

Redshirt sophomore Lavardicus Atkins saw time in 28 games and averaged close to two points while working to regain his freshman form. Atkins was at his best versus Wake Forest, where he saw 33 minutes of action, scoring six and grabbing a team-high seven boards.

A pair of sophomore walk-ons also aided the Ponies. Michael Dement saw time in five games in his second season

as a walk-on, hitting a three versus Wake Forest, and newcomer Bobby Aitkenhead played in 11 contests and hit a pair of buckets. The Guatemala native started the second half against San Jose State and gave SMU a big boost off the bench with five points, a steal and an assist in six minutes of play.

Redshirt freshman Brian Miller made his way back after missing last season with a herniated disc. He averaged just over two points per game, but set a new career high with 12 points at Texas Tech, including a pair of threes.

First-year players Donatas Rackauskas and Ryan Hopkins saw limited time, but were productive in their minutes. Rackauskas averaged more than a rebound per game in just over five minutes per outing, while Hopkins shot 33 percent from three-point range.

Head coach Mike Dement finished the year just 14 wins away from the No. 2 spot on SMU's coaching charts with 128 wins. Dement's Ponies have averaged nearly 18 wins a

season over the last seven years, while earning All-WAC honors 12 times. In his stint on the Hilltop, Dement has firmly restored the SMU program back to national respect, as the Ponies have garnered top-25 votes four of the last six seasons.

With continued dedication and hard work by its players and coaches, the 2003-04 season promises to be successful and to establish further SMU's winning tradition.

# The Western Athletic Conference

The Western Athletic Conference features some of the most exciting competition at some of the most diverse campuses in the nation. With 10 members in Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Idaho, Nevada, California and Hawaii, the WAC continues to build upon its most recent success.

The WAC provides its student-athletes the chance to travel to scenic destinations and gain exposure in some of the nation's largest and most accessible media markets. In addition, the academic reputation of many of the WAC schools is unparalleled, with some of the nation's most respected institutions of higher learning among the WAC ranks.

This season marks the 42nd for the WAC, making it the sixth oldest among the nation's 11 Division I-A conferences. Its history traces back to 1962, when the original six-team league was created. The concept of a Western Athletic Conference began in 1958 when Brigham Young's Edwin Kimball, Leo Harris of Oregon and Roy S. Keen of Oregon State met during the NCAA Convention in New York to discuss the "ideal conference" because problems existed in their alignments. They believed such a conference should have eight members with approximately the same goals, ideals and resources and that such a union would include the following members: Washington State, Oregon State, Oregon, Utah, New Mexico, Arizona, Arizona State and Brigham Young.

Although the meeting did not result in any action, it established an idea that again was discussed two years later at the 1960 NCAA Convention in New York. There, Dick Clausen, athletics director at Arizona, and Pete McDavid, athletics director at New Mexico, organized a meeting which included representatives of Oregon State, Oregon, Washington State, Brigham Young, Utah, New Mexico, Arizona and Arizona State. Glenn "Red" Jacoby of Wyoming also was to be invited to the meeting but could not be located on short notice.

BYU's Dr. Kimball was elected the chairman of the group and, over the next two years, plans were formulated as the faculty representatives and presidents became involved with the athletic directors in the deliberations. As proposals were discussed, finances became the determining factor, evidenced by the following membership criteria: large facilities or a commitment to build them; location in or near a large population center; large student body; easy access by means of large jet aircraft; demonstrated fan support; winning athletic tradition; and commitment to maintain a varied and extensive athletic program.

While the membership structure was debated, Washington State, Oregon and Oregon State decided to re-align with the other Pacific Coast institutions, and the remaining university representatives were left to fill the openings. Although Wyoming, New Mexico State and Utah State applied, only Wyoming was accepted as the final charter member.

By the end of 1961, a working draft of a constitution, by-laws and operating code was drafted by Thomas Hall, the faculty representative at Arizona, and Paul Brechler, the WAC's first commissioner. On July 27, 1962, the conference officially was organized by the Presidents' Council when the original charter was signed, and the name Western Athletic Conference was adopted. Charter members were Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. The two Arizona schools had been members of the Border Conference; the others were members of the Skyline.

The WAC began operation with the 1962-63 academic year, and several changes have occurred since. UTEP and Colorado State became members in September 1967, while Arizona and Arizona State withdrew on June 30, 1978. Other membership additions included San Diego State (July 1, 1978); Hawai'i (July 1, 1979); Air Force (July 1, 1980); Fresno State (July 1, 1992); UNLV, Rice, San Jose State, SMU, TCU and Tulsa (July 1, 1996); and Nevada (July 1, 2000). Air Force, Brigham Young, Colorado State, UNLV, New Mexico, San Diego State, Utah and Wyoming withdrew on June 30, 1999. Boise State and Louisiana Tech became WAC members on July 1, 2001, while TCU withdrew following the 2000-01 season.

Paul Brechler was the Commissioner from 1962-1968, Wiles Hallock from 1968-1971, Stan Bates from 1971-80, Dr. Joe Kearney from 1980-94 and Karl Benson from 1994 to the present.

The WAC began competition with 10 sports, including football, basketball, track and field, baseball, wrestling, swimming, tennis, golf, cross country and gymnastics. The first championship was held in November 1962, when Arizona won the men's cross country title. New Mexico followed with the first WAC football title. Arizona finished second in the NCAA College World Series and, less than three years later, Arizona State claimed the league's first NCAA title when the Sun Devils won the College World Series trophy.

Before July 1, 1990, the WAC sponsored championships only in men's sports. However, a merger with the High Country Athletic Conference formed a single conference under one administrative structure, and the 1990-91 athletic year was the first in which both men and women competed under the WAC name.

Presently the WAC crowns team and individual champions in 18 sports - eight men's and 10 women's. For the men, there are championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, tennis, indoor track and field and outdoor track and field. Championships for women are held in basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field and volleyball.

The WAC office has been located in the Denver area since the conference's inception with the exception of a two-year stay in Phoenix from 1964-66.



## The Mustang Legend

Legend has it that when Ford Motor Company was preparing to introduce the sports car that would gain fame as the Mustang, it was considering other names such as Cougar, Bronco, Cheetah and Colt.

But during the 1963 football season, SMU took an undersized but quick team to Ann Arbor to play a massive Michigan Wolverine squad. Michigan gained the early advantage, but had to fight off the feisty Ponies for a 27-16 win.

After the game, Ford's Lee Iacocca entered the SMU locker room and addressed the disappointed Mustangs.

"Today," Iacocca said, "After watching the SMU Mustangs play with such flair, we reached a decision. We will call our new car the Mustang. Because it will be light, like your team. It will be quick, like your team. And it will be sporty, like your team."

Ford's new car got its name, and the rest, as they say, is history.

As a private, comprehensive university enriched by its United Methodist heritage and partnership with the Dallas Metroplex, SMU seeks to enhance the intellectual, cultural, technological, ethical, and social development of a diverse student body.



SMU offers undergraduate programs centered on the liberal arts and excellent graduate, professional, and continuing education programs in selected areas. The SMU experience includes abundant opportunities for research experience, international study, leadership development, and off-campus service and internships — all with the goal of preparing students to be contributing citizens and leaders for our state, nation, and world.

SMU comprises six degree-granting schools: Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences, Meadows School of the Arts, Edwin L. Cox School of Business, School of Engineering, Dedman School of Law, and Perkins School of Theology. Founded in 1911 by what is now The United Methodist Church, SMU is nonsectarian in its teaching and is committed to the values of academic freedom and open inquiry.

Because of its location in Dallas, a top 10 city for business and home to numerous corporate headquarters, SMU enhances the classroom experience with opportunities to gain practical experience through internships and part-time jobs. A number of companies are partners in SMU's cooperative engineering education program, and several other companies provide high-level executives as mentors to business and other students. Many of the area's 32,000 SMU alumni remain involved with the University as advisers and career contacts.

At SMU, personal attention is a priority. Classes are small enough to foster close faculty-student interaction and mentoring opportunities. Most courses at SMU are taught by faculty, not by graduate assistants, and even senior-level faculty teach undergraduates. To foster leadership development beyond the classroom, SMU offers nearly 200 student organizations. It is one of the few schools in the nation to have a voting student member on the Board of Trustees and several others on Board committees.

The school's diverse student population numbers about 6,000 undergraduate students and 4,500 graduate and professional school students. Although 63 percent of SMU undergraduates list home addresses in Texas, SMU also includes students from all 50 states and from 93 foreign countries. Members of minority groups comprise more than 20 percent of the student body. Most students come from the top third of their high school graduating classes, and nearly 80 percent of first-year students receive some form of financial aid.

Graduating student-athletes is also an SMU priority. For the class entering during the 1995-96 academic year, SMU's student-athletes graduated at an 82.9 percent rate, 10 percent higher than that of the general SMU student population, with a refined graduation rate of 95.7 percent. In 1997, SMU and Penn State were the only two programs whose student-athletes exceeded both school overall graduation rates and NCAA Division I averages in every sport (the national football graduation rate was 56 percent during that period).



SMU graduates join a distinguished group of more than 96,000 alumni throughout the world. Notable SMU alumni include Nobel Prize-winning physicist James Cronin; computer-memory pioneer Robert Dennard; First Lady Laura Welch Bush; movie and television producer Aaron Spelling; founder of Investor's Business Daily William J. O'Neil; I Can't Believe It's Yogurt co-founders Bill and Julie Ann Brice; Franklin Resources COO and CFO E Martin Flanagan; Emmy Award-winning "Late Night with David Letterman" producer Maria Pope; Academy Award-winning actress Kathy Bates and sound producer Rod Judkins; Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright Beth Henley and journalist Craig Flounoy; Dallas City Manager Ted Benavides; Olympic gold medalists Ryan Berube, Lars Frolander, Steve Lundquist, the late Jerry Heidenreich and silver medalist Martina Moravcova; Hermann Trophy winner Luchi Gonzalez; and NFL Hall of Fame members Raymond Berry, Eric Dickerson, Forrest Gregg, Lamar Hunt and the late Doak Walker.

Since becoming president of Southern Methodist University in 1995, R. Gerald Turner has developed a long-term strategic plan, campus master plan, and the largest major gifts campaign in the history of SMU. Ending in May 2002, The Campaign for SMU: A Time to Lead exceeded its \$400 million goal, generating more than \$542 million in gifts and pledges. The five-year campaign has raised funds for 80 new endowments for academic purposes, 171 new

scholarships, 16 new endowed faculty chairs or professorships, 28 new student life initiatives, and full or partial funding for 14 new or renovated facilities, including SMU-in-Legacy in Plano, Texas.

Beyond the campus, Gerald Turner serves on the Board of Directors of the National Merit Foundation, is chairman of the Board of Directors of the Independent Colleges and Universities of Texas, and is a member of the Knight Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics. He also serves on the boards of the United Way of Dallas, the Methodist Hospital Foundation, the Salvation Army of Dallas, and three publicly traded companies. He is recipient of the 2002 Henry Cohn Humanitarian Award of the Anti-Defamation League and the 2000 Chief Executive Leadership Award of the Council for Advancement and Support of Education, District IV.

A native of Texas, Gerald Turner earned a B.S. degree in psychology from Abilene Christian University and M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in psychology from the University of Texas at Austin. He and his wife, Gail, a native of Graham, Texas, have two daughters. Angela is a professional opera singer; Jessica, an SMU alumna, is a professional actress.

Southern Methodist University is a private, comprehensive university of 10,000 students enrolled in six degree-granting schools. SMU offers undergraduate and graduate programs in the humanities and sciences, business, engineering, and the performing, visual, and communication arts, as well as professional degree programs in law and theology. Founded in 1911 by what is now the United Methodist Church, SMU is nonsectarian in its teaching and committed to the values of academic freedom and open inquiry.

***Paul Rogers***  
***University Athletic Representative***



Paul Rogers, professor of law and the former dean of the SMU School of Law, is the university's faculty athletic representative and represents the university with the Western Athletic Conference and the NCAA. Rogers formerly served as president of the Southwest Conference and was recently appointed to a four-year term on the NCAA Division I Academics/Eligibility/Compliance Cabinet.

In 1988, Dean Rogers became the first chair of the SMU Athletic Council, which established academic and administrative policies for student-athletes at SMU, and continues to serve as a member of the council.

Prior to joining the SMU law faculty in 1980, he served on the law faculty at Loyola University of Chicago. He previously practiced law in Pennsylvania. Dean Rogers has earned two degrees (B.A., J.D.) from the University of Texas and an LL.M. from Columbia University.

Rogers served as dean of the School of Law from 1988-97. Earlier he served as associate dean for academic affairs at the Law School from 1982-86. He has co-authored a book on antitrust law, now in its third edition, and numerous articles on antitrust, regulated industries, contracts, commercial law and legal history. An avid baseball historian, he has published three books and a number of articles dealing with the history of baseball.

He is a member of the board of directors of Dispute Mediation Services and a former Trustee of the Dallas Bar Foundation. Dean Rogers is a fellow of the Dallas Bar, Texas Bar, and the American Bar Foundations. He also served as chair of the Ethics Oversight Committee for Dallas 2012 and is president of the Hall-Ruggles Chapter (Dallas-Fort Worth) of the Society of American Baseball Research. Born April 19, 1948, Dean Rogers has three daughters, Heather (29), Jillian (26), and Ruthie (20), and a grandson, Baer Heck.

## **Jim Copeland** **Director of Athletics**



Challenges have always motivated Jim Copeland - from the time he made the Cleveland Browns as a 10th round draft choice in 1967 to January of 1995 when he left a highly-successful athletic program that he helped build at the University of Virginia to become the director of athletics at SMU. Copeland, 58, had served in a similar position at Virginia, his alma mater, from 1987-95.

In eight years under Copeland's leadership, SMU has achieved similar success to that which his programs enjoyed at Utah and Virginia. SMU teams have captured 29 conference titles during the last six years, including men's cross country, women's soccer, men's and women's swimming and diving and men's track and field (indoors) last year.

During the 2002-03 academic year, SMU won the inaugural Western Athletic Commissioner's Cup, which is awarded to the top overall men's and women's athletic program in the league. Eleven SMU teams (men's sports: cross country, golf, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field (indoor and outdoor); women's sports: track and field (indoor and outdoor), soccer, swimming and diving) competed in the NCAA Championships and seven (men's cross country, men's soccer, men's swimming and diving, men's outdoor track and field, women's soccer, women's swimming and diving, women's indoor track and field) finished in their respective national top 25. The women's swimming and diving team led the way with a fourth place finish at the NCAA Championships.

Women's swimmer Flavia Rigmonti won two NCAA individual championships, capturing both the 500 and 1650 freestyle for the second consecutive year. Nevena Lendel won the women's NCAA indoor high jump championship while thrower Hanners Hapley won the NCAA outdoor discus title.

SMU has finished in the top 40 nationally in the Sears Directors' Cup standings in five of the last six years, including a 29th place finish in 2000-01. The Mustang athletic program has also ranked among the top 10 private institutions in the national standings in each of the last eight years.

A skilled fundraiser, Copeland successfully directed efforts to return SMU football to campus as the state-of-the-art Gerald J. Ford Stadium, a 32,000-seat facility, and the Paul B. Loyd Jr. All-Sports Center opened in September of 2000. The efforts culminated on September 2, 2000 when a sellout crowd, the school's first since November of 1990, watched the Mustangs whip Kansas 31-17 in the inaugural game in Ford Stadium. Additionally, Mustang Club donations have nearly doubled since his arrival at the school, from just over \$1 million to almost \$2 million three years ago.

Copeland's formula for success involves graduation, integrity, winning, fiscal responsibility and the integration of the athletic department into the university.

Under Copeland's guidance, SMU's student-athlete graduation rate continues to maintain high standards. For the class entering the 1995-96 academic year, SMU's student-athlete graduation rate was 82.9 per

Another focus of Copeland's tenure at SMU has been the establishment of Life Skills and Community Outreach programs. The SMU PALS program (Preparing Achievers for Lifetime Success) established its goals of preparing Mustang student-athletes for future careers and for participation in community service. In the past seven years, more than 800 SMU student-athletes who voluntarily enrolled in the PALS program have obtained more than 1,300 full-time, part-time and summer jobs. More than 350 have taken part in community service projects.

"We're very serious about the term 'student-athlete' here at SMU," said Copeland. "There's no reason why SMU student-athletes cannot be successful both athletically and academically. All the pieces are in place for us to continue to grow as an athletic department. I believe we're ready to take the next step."



Copeland is also a leader nationally in collegiate athletics, having served on the board of directors of the College Football Association, the NCAA Football Issues Committee, the NCAA Committee for Restructuring of Division I and the NCAA Division I Management Council. Copeland served as the president of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics in 1996.

While Copeland served as athletic director at Virginia, the Cavalier men's and women's teams graduated their student-athletes at a rate (89 percent) comparable to the graduation rate of the University's entire student body. Every year that Copeland was AD at Virginia, the football team received honorable mention recognition for its graduation rates for scholarship players.

During Copeland's time as AD at Virginia, the men's basketball team participated in the NCAA Tournament six times and won the 1992 National Invitational Tournament. The football team played in six postseason bowl games. The men's soccer team won an unprecedented four consecutive NCAA titles and the women's lacrosse team won two national championships.

Virginia's athletic endowment increased from \$3 million to \$7 million and athletic donations from \$3 million to \$4.5 million during Copeland's tenure at the school. Virginia's facilities were upgraded significantly, including a \$10 million athletic support center and a new stadium with a capacity of 4,500 for soccer and lacrosse.

Before going to Virginia, Copeland served as athletic director at Utah for two years. Under his direction, Utah won three national and 11 conference championships, and the school's student-athlete aid fund increased from 900 members and \$700,000 to 2,500 members and \$1.1 million in two years.

Copeland and his wife, Susan, have three adult children: Jennie Carter, Trey Copeland and Matthew Copeland. The couple also has one granddaughter, Kelsey Carter, and three grandsons, Garland Carter, Wyatte Copeland and Grant Copeland.

# Moody Coliseum

HOME OF SMU BASKETBALL

Moody Coliseum has been the home of SMU basketball since December 3, 1956, when the Mustangs defeated McMurry, 113-36. Since then, SMU has played 598 games in Moody Coliseum, winning 411 and losing only 185.

"Moody Magic" has become a popular term regarding SMU's play at the Coliseum. Why the phrase? The Ponies are 186-78 in the building during the past 18 seasons and have won 71 of its 98 home games in the arena the past seven seasons.

The Coliseum has undergone several changes in the past few years to modernize the facility. In 1996, the court was redesigned to mark SMU's entry into the Western Athletic Conference, and recent off-season improvements to the men's basketball locker room and players' lounge help make Moody Coliseum one of the most attractive arenas in the nation.

Moody Coliseum was the site of the Southwest Conference Post-Season Classic in 1976 and has hosted NCAA Regional tournament games, the McDonald's High School All-American All-Star Game and the NABC College Basketball All-Star Game during the 1986 Final Four held in Dallas.

The largest crowds ever at Moody Coliseum have been 10,276 vs. Texas A&M and 10,091 vs. Texas, both in 1979. Changes in the seating arrangement have reduced the seating capacity to 8,998 since 1995-96. SMU's most recent sell-out came Nov. 20, 2001, when the Mustangs hosted Texas Tech.





# Loyd All-Sports Center

The Paul B. Loyd, Jr. All-Sports Center, which is attached to the northwest corner of Gerald J. Ford Stadium, is a 72,000 square-foot structure providing all Mustang student-athletes with several improvements, including:

- Offices and locker facilities for football and several Olympic sports
- A state-of-the-art, 10,000 square-foot weight room featuring Olympic free weight machines and cardiovascular equipment
- A sports medicine complex
- Conference rooms, including a modern, theater-style meeting room for all SMU sports
- A modern equipment room which provides easy access to the playing field and houses expanded laundry and storage areas in order to serve all sports residing in the facility
- Ticket facilities, including ticket windows and offices, as well as working and waiting areas
- A permanent merchandise and novelty store, "The Spirit Shop," located on the concourse level with public access from both outside and inside the stadium

## Sports Medicine

The SMU athletic training program features first-class facilities inside the Paul B. Loyd, Jr. All-Sports Center and the outstanding services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals. Basketball Trainer Scott Kelly and SMU training staff members work together with physicians to design rehabilitation programs for injured student-athletes to minimize the loss of fitness during recuperative time.

Under the direction of Head Trainer Jeanne Olson, Kelly is assisted in the sports medicine area by full-time, certified trainers Cash Birdwell, Zach McLeese, Mike Morton, and Shana Thielman, as well as 20 student athletic trainers.

## Equipment Room

The SMU equipment staff handles all of the ordering and inventory of athletic gear for the football team and oversees the team's equipment, locker and team meeting rooms. Director Ed Davidson and manager Jon Allmon supervise an operation that custom fits all Mustang players with uniforms and practice gear. The equipment staff's facilities inside of the Paul B. Loyd, Jr. All-Sports Center are among the best in the country.

## SPORTS MEDICINE

The SMU Athletic Training program has a well-deserved reputation as one of the finest in the country, and the student-athletes are well taken care of on the Hilltop.

The sports medicine staff sees that every player receives the best treatment possible, not only when he is injured, but also to prevent injury.

Scott Kelly, in his third year with the Mustangs, is SMU's full-time basketball athletic trainer. Kelly is on-call 24 hours a day should a player need his services.

Kelly is assisted in the sports medicine area by certified trainers Jeanne Olson, Cash Birdwell, Marianne Aston, Zach McLeese, Mike Morton, Warren Young, Kathie Quigley and Osamu Moro as well as 20 student athletic trainers.

In addition to the training staff, SMU is also served by a staff of physicians who assist with injuries and illnesses, prescribe medications and make referrals to specialized physicians.

The quality of the Athletic Training Department is due in large part to the Athletic Department's emphasis on health care and its commitment to the student-athlete.


# Salvino Strength Center

The SMU strength and conditioning staff, led by head strength and conditioning coach Chuck Faucette and basketball strength coach Courtney Ray, train Mustang student-athletes in the Vic and Gladie Jo Salvino Strength and Conditioning Center - a state-of-the-art, 10,000 square-foot weight room featuring Olympic free weight machines and cardiovascular equipment inside the Paul B. Loyd, Jr. All-Sports Center. The Salvino Strength and Conditioning Center opened in August of 2000 and is considered one of the finest of its kind in the nation.

*"At Southern Methodist University, the emphasis of our strength and conditioning program is on speed, quickness and explosive power. We accomplish this with a program comprised of Olympic lifts, various plyometric drills and sport specific exercises. # PALS Program

Since its inception eight years ago, PALS has produced the results to show that the SMU athletic department not only "talks the talk" about its commitment to the program's acronym – Preparing Achievers for Lifetime Success – it also "walks the walk."

A total of **803** student-athletes have joined PALS voluntarily since 1995. They have acquired **1,382** positions, including **353** full-time jobs and **730** career-enhancing summer internships.

More than 125 companies in the Dallas-area have signed up to be corporate partners with the PALS program. Their involvement ranges from serving as sources for informational interviews to full-time jobs. "We want to help SMU," says Sewell Automotive general manager Rick Cowart, a football letterwinner at SMU from 1975-77. "Our more selfish goal is to find people who we can employ in the future. If we can bring in interns and summer help and show them how we want to do business, it will be a whole lot easier to recruit them."

Associate Athletic Director Ed Wisneski created the PALS program in 1995. He has worked at SMU since 1988 and has established numerous contacts during his 15 years in Dallas. "A lot of the football players I know from the late 1980s and 1990s are now in positions to hire SMU student-athletes," Wisneski points out.

"One of the main reasons Jim Copeland [SMU Athletic Director] asked me to start a career development program eight years ago was to give SMU athletes a level playing field with non-athletes who do not devote 20 hours a week to a sport and have more time to hunt for jobs and internships," Wisneski says. "One aspect of PALS that makes it unique among all college athletic career assistance programs is the wide range of services we offer within the athletic department: resume preparation, interviewing skills, company research and contacts, registration for computerized job searches, and placement in jobs."

"Most athletic programs offer those services through their school career centers," Wisneski adds. "We work closely with the SMU Career Center; but with fewer students to service, the PALS program can provide more individualized attention to personally market each student-athlete to potential employers."

Another distinction of PALS is that former SMU student-athletes who either have been out in the work force or are retiring from professional sports careers can still take advantage of its services. "With the present conditions of the economy, I am working with a lot of former SMU athletes who have lost their jobs through downsizing or who want to change careers," Wisneski says. "It's reassuring for them to be able to contact someone familiar at their alma mater whom they know will try to help them."

In addition to career planning and placement, the PALS program provides personal development education for all student-athletes. For the past several years, the PALS program, in conjunction with the SMU Center for Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention and the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center, has presented a two-night workshop on alcohol and other drugs risk reduction. Former college athletes and SMU staff members have drawn on personal experiences to give compelling speeches on the significant adverse effects that bad choices with alcohol and drugs can have on a student-athlete's life.

Other personal development programming for SMU athletes has included nationally-renowned sports nutritionist Tim Wierman and presentations by the National Football League on issues ranging from gambling to careers in professional sports.

## LEC Mission Statement

*The mission of the A-LEC's academic counseling staff is to create a supportive educational environment that assists student-athletes with their transition to the university culture, to guide student-athletes in becoming responsible for their learning by teaching skills that help them identify and pursue their educational goals, and to encourage student-athletes to develop and apply the skills and abilities that will expand their range of personal and professional choices and reinforce the commitment to life-long learning.*

Academic support for SMU's varsity athletes is coordinated through the Altshuler Learning Enhancement Center, which opened its doors to the student population in 1989 and has become one of the University's most widely-used student services.

In August 2000, the A-LEC staff and tutors moved into their new home on the second floor of the Paul B. Loyd, Jr. All-Sports Center. The A-LEC's move was made possible by significant gifts from longtime SMU supporters Ken and Ruth Altshuler, Jack and Laura Blanton and Joseph D. Jamail. Their generosity realized the vision first articulated in President R. Gerald Turner's "Strategic Plan for Southern Methodist University: 1996-2000." The new A-LEC contains the Blanton Academic Development Complex, including three state-of-the-art, fully-networked computer labs; six private rooms for both individual and small group study; an extensive library of audio, video and digital resources; and a large lounge area.

The A-LEC offers free tutoring for undergraduates enrolled in targeted courses, including almost all first and second-year courses. The A-LEC employs nearly 60 tutors, who provide an exceptionally strong support for SMU's undergraduate curriculum. The A-LEC's tutoring program has won enthusiastic support from SMU faculty, who encourage students to use the service, and work with A-LEC staff to recruit outstanding tutors. Almost all of the A-LEC tutors are SMU juniors and seniors who have done exceptionally well in a wide range of SMU courses. The A-LEC staff is especially proud of the many student-athletes who have served as A-LEC tutors. Recent changes in NCAA policy will make it possible for even more student-athletes to work at the A-LEC and serve as academic role models for the entire student body.

Heading the A-LEC is Vicki Hill, who received her A.B. from the University of California-Berkeley and her Ph.D. in English from SUNY-Buffalo. Coordinating the A-LEC's work with student-athletes are Valerie Harrison Ollison, who received her B.A. in education from the University of Wyoming and her M.S. in counseling from the University of Arkansas. Also working with student-athletes are two part-time academic counselors, Geri McKenzie and Shameka Brackens.

Understanding the distinctive challenges and unique experiences facing student-athletes, the A-LEC's Academic Counselors are responsible for tracking and responding to student-athlete needs at each stage of the academic calendar. The Academic Counselors' work includes pre-advising student-athletes during summer orientation and registration sessions, meeting with all student-athletes to discuss each semester's academic support needs, and conferring with coaches to determine which student-athletes should be recommended for more closely monitored academic assistance.

Stanford tops study on graduation rate of men's basketball teams


