SETTING THE SCENE

- [RV/RV] SMU opens the 2024 season on the road with a meeting at Nevada on Saturday at 7 pm CT on CBSSN.
- The Mustangs are coming off their fifth straight season being bowl eligible, the longest stretch in program history.
- SMU went unbeaten during its final year as a member of the AAC, capturing its first conference title since 1984.
- The Mustangs broke into the final College Football Playoff rankings for the first time in program history last year, finishing at 24th.

QUICK HITS

- The Mustangs are coming off one of the best seasons in program history in 2023, posting an 11-3 record.
- The 11 wins were most since 1982 and tied for the second most in the program history.
- SMU received votes in both the AP and US LBM Coaches Preseason Polls, the fifth straight season receiving votes in the Coaches Poll.
- The Mustangs are set to play their first game since 1995 as a member of a power conference with its official inclusion into the ACC back on July 1.
- SMU has had 20 players earn various accolades prior to the start of the new season.
- The Mustangs had at least seven receivers catch a pass in every game in 2023 and is the only team in all of the FBS with eight players with at least 300 yards receiving on the year.
- SMU was one of four FBS teams to rank in the top 11 in the country last season in both scoring offense (8th) and scoring defense (11th), joining Oregon, Georgia and Notre Dame.
- SMU's 542 points last season were the second most points scored in program history.
- The Mustangs' sack total of 47 last year rank second in the NCAA and second most in program history for a single season.
- SMU's defense was supreme last season, ranking in the top 20 in NCAA in third down pct defense (3rd), defensive touchdowns (1st), rushing defense (18th), scoring defense (12th), team passing efficiency defense (13th), team sacks (2nd), tackles for loss (13th) and total defense (12th).
- SMU led the nation in points scored in the first quarter last year, averaging 12.3 per game.
- The Mustangs scored at least 55 points four times last season, the most in program history for a single season.
- SMU was undefeated (10-0) last season with scoring at least 30 points in a game, pushing its winning streak to 15 games dating back to Oct. 14, 2022 when it scores 30 or more.

THE SERIES

- This is the seventh meeting in the series, with it being tied at 3-3.
- The Mustangs have won the last two contests.
- The teams last met in Sheraton Hawaii Bowl back on Dec. 24, 2009, a 45-10 victory for SMU.

ABOUT THE WOLF PACK

- Nevada is coming off a record of 2-10 in 2023.
- The Wolf Pack were 1-5 at home last season.
- Nevada has lost its last four games, giving up at least 27 points in each contest.

THE COACHES

• Rhett Lashlee is in his third season as the head coach at SMU and has a 18-9 career record. Lashlee, who served as offensive coordinator for the Mustangs for two seasons (2018-19), also served as the offensive coordinator at Miami in 2020 and 2021. A one-time finalist (2013) and two-time semifinalist (2019, 2020) for the Broyles Award, Lashlee has the distinction of being the only coach ever nominated for the Broyles Award four different times at four different schools (Arkansas State, Auburn, SMU, Miami).

• Lashlee was named a finalist last season for the prestigious Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year Award, handed out to the nation's top coach as voted on by the National Sports Media Association, the Bryant Awards' Executive Leadership Team and the Bryant Family. The Arkansas native was also named Co-Coach of the Year by the Dave Campbell's Texas Football publication, a finalist of the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award and a semi-finalist for Coach of the Year Award by the Maxwell Football Club for the job he did in 2023.

• Jeff Choate is in his first season as head coach at Nevada. He comes to the Wolf Pack from Texas, where he served as the co-defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach since 2021. Choate served four seasons (2016-19) as head coach at Montana State. There, he led the Bobcats to a combined 28-22 record, making consecutive appearances in the FCS playoffs in his final two seasons, with a run to the semifinals in 2019.

THE EARLY BIRD GETS THE WORM

- August 24 marks the earliest start to the season in program history for SMU. Previously, the earliest game was on August 29, 2008 at Rice.
- In addition, Saturday's contest against the Wolf Pack marks just the eighth time the Mustangs have taken the field in the month of August.
- The 2024 season is also the first time in program history that SMU will play two games in the month of August.
- SMU is one of just six FBS programs to kickoff its season on Saturday, joining ACC foes Florida State and Georgia Tech along with New Mexico and Hawaii.

SUSTAINED SUCCESS UNDER RHETT LASHLEE

- Third-year head coach Rhett Lashlee has been the driving force in leading the Mustangs' return to prominence in his first two years as the leader of the program, highlighted by a championship season in his second year, going 11-3 and undefeated in AAC play (8-0).
- The success of the 2023 season has resulted in various accolades for the team and coach himself, including a record-tying 18 AAC All-Conference selections.
- In his two seasons, the Mustangs have been near the top of the nation offensively, ranking in the top-16 in total offense both seasons.
- In addition, the 2023 season saw SMU be dominant on both sides of the ball, ranking in the top-25 nationally in 18 different categories.

MUSTANG CAPTAINS

- Kevin Jennings, Jonathan McGill, Justin Osborne, Elijah Roberts, Preston Stone and Kobe Wilson were voted captains for the 2024 season.

OPENING STATEMENT

- The Mustangs have a recent history of starting the year right.
- Last year, SMU won 38-14 against Louisiana Tech which pushed the Mustangs' season-opening win streak to five, their longest since a 15-game streak from 1972-86.

THE VOTES ARE IN

- SMU opened the season receiving votes in the in both the AP and US LBM Coaches Poll, making it the fifth straight season of being ranked or receiving votes.

CLUB TAKEAWAY

- Club Takeaway is back and open for business again in 2024.
- The Mustangs have at least one takeaway in 32 of the past 40 games, 41 of the past 50 games and 61 of the past 72 games.
- SMU has forced at least one turnover in 10 straight games.

START FAST

- SMU has led or been tied after the first quarter in 44 of the past 60 games, and have also led or been tied at halftime in 46 of the last 60.

PROTECT THE ASSET

- The Mustangs provided elite protection for their quarterbacks during the 2023 campaign.
- SMU ranked 13th in the NCAA in sacks allowed last year with just 16 on the whole season.



LUCKY NUMBER 30

- SMU has posted a record of 18-1 during Lashlee's two seasons in charge when they score 30 or more points in a game.
- The Mustangs currently have a 15-game winning streak when they hit the magic number.

LET'S TAKE THIS SHOW ON THE ROAD

- The Mustangs were impressive on the road last year, posting a 5-2 mark.
- SMU outscored its opponents 30.6-21.6 in seven road contests in 2023.
- The SMU's five-game road winning streak ranks tied for ninth longest in college football and longest in program history since a 12-game streak from Sept. 26, 1981 to Sept. 15, 1984.

BEST IN TEXAS

- SMU has enjoyed much success in the past five seasons.
- The Mustangs have recorded 43 wins since 2019, tied for the most by any of the 13 teams in the state with UTSA.
- Of those 43 wins, 19 have come on the road, tops for any team in the state during five-year window.

ACC PRESEASON MEDIA POLL

- SMU was selected seventh in the conference's annual preseason poll on July 31.
- The 2024 ACC Preseason Poll was conducted via a vote of a media panel, including those who were credentialed ACC Football Kickoff in Charlotte, North Carolina on July 22-25.
- Defending champion Florida State was picked first in the poll with 2708 points, highlighted by 81 first-place votes. Clemson came in at second with 2657 points and 55 first-place votes and Miami third with 2344 points and 17 first-place votes.
- SMU (seventh, 1798) was the highest of the three newcomers that included itself, Cal (10th, 1095) and Stanford (17th, 477).

SOMETHING TO BUILD ON

- The Mustangs are coming off one of the best seasons in program history in 2023, posting an 11-3 record.
- The 11 wins were most since 1982 and tied for the second most in the program history.
- SMU's 43 wins in the last five years are tied for most by any FBS Texas team.
- The Mustangs were 10-0 last year when they scored at least 30 points in a game.
- The Mustangs' sack total of 47 last year ranked third in the NCAA and second most in program history for a single season.
- SMU's defense performed at a high level in 2023, ranking in the top 20 in the NCAA in third down pct defense (4th), defensive touchdowns (1st), scoring defense (11th), team sacks (3rd), tackles for loss (16th) and total defense (12th).
- The Mustangs took it to the conference opposition, posting an average margin of victory of 28.9 points (45.9-17.0) in conference games in 2023, the largest margin for any team in the NCAA in conference play last year.
- SMU outscored its opponents 174-58 in the first quarter last year.
- The Mustangs scored at least 55 points four times last season, the most in program history for a single season.

A NEW ERA

- SMU is set to begin its first season in the ACC in 2024 with an eight-game conference slate.
- The first ACC game will be on Sept. 28 at Gerald Ford Stadium when the Mustangs welcome defending ACC Champion Florida State to Dallas.
- The Mustangs hit the road for three straight road matchups with games at Louisville (Oct. 5), Stanford (Oct. 19) and Duke (Oct. 26) to complete the October slate.
- The month of November features a match-up in Dallas against Pittsburgh (Nov. 2) on homecoming, then another home game against Boston College (Nov. 16).
- SMU closes out its regular season with match-ups against Virginia (Nov. 23) on the road before hosting Cal (Nov. 30) on Senior Day.

WELCOME TO THE LEAGUE ROOKIE

- Four Mustangs have found their way onto NFL rosters for training camp this year after helping deliver a conference championship in 2023.
- Former Mustangs Elijah Chatman (New York Giants), Devere Levelston (Seattle Seahawks), Jordan Miller (Denver Broncos) and Charles Woods (Los Angeles Rams) all signed professional contracts this past April.
- SMU now has 20 former players currently on a roster in training camp for the 2024 NFL season.

Since 2009, the SMU coaching staff has chosen a deserving student-athlete to wear the number 23 to honor Jerry LeVias. Isaiah Nwokobia earned the honor for a second straight season in 2024.

LeVias was the first African-American to receive an athletic scholarship in the Southwest Conference. While at SMU, LeVias made athletic and academic All-America teams and, in 1966, contributed to the Mustangs' first SWC title in 18 years. He was an All-American in 1968 and was chosen All-SWC in 1966, 1967 and 1968. He is in both the College Football and SMU Athletics Halls of Fame.

MAKE IT 12

- The Mustangs captured their 12th conference championship with a 26-14 win at Tulane on Dec. 2, 2023, in Yulman Stadium.
- SMU has won 12 conference titles in the program's history - 1923, 1926, 1931, 1935, 1940 (shared), 1947, 1948, 1966, 1981, 1982, 1984 (shared) and 2023.

BACK AND BETTER THAN EVER

- Mustangs redshirt junior quarterback Preston Stone looks to build on his breakout campaign from a year ago.
- Stone has received numerous accolades this preseason, appearing on the Davey O'Brien Preseason Watch List, Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Watch List, East-West Shrine Bowl 1000 List, Manning Award Watch List and Unitas Golden Arm Award Watch List.
- The Dallas native showcased his abilities all last season, throwing for career highs in yards (3,197) and touchdowns (28).
- His 90.9 passing grade last season by Pro Football Focus (PFF) led all American Athletic Conference (AAC) quarterbacks. He also ranked first in big-time throws (30) and fourth in passer rating (110.0).
- Stone's passing efficiency rating of 161.3 last season ranks ninth highest for a returning quarterback in all of the FBS.

THE ALL-AMERICAN MAN

- Senior Elijah Roberts got rewarded for his breakout season in 2023 with the Mustangs.
- Roberts was named to Action Sport's All-America First Team on defense last season.
- Roberts has gotten his recognition this preseason, being named Best Defensive Lineman in Texas by Dave Campbell's Texas Football publication.

RUNS IN THE FAMILY

- RJ Maryland has made his mark on the record books for his position in only two seasons with the Mustangs.
- Maryland has 13 touchdown receptions in his career at SMU, which ranks second in program history for a tight end.
- The junior is coming off a breakout season in 2023 where he started in every game and recorded the team's second most receptions (34), reception yards (518) and reception yards per game (37).
- He was named to the Mackey Award List this preseason, only the second Mustang tight end in program history to be selected to the list, joining Grant Calcaterra in 2021.

RUN ROOSTER RUN

- Jaylan Knighton returns after a great debut season for the Mustangs in 2023.
- The graduate student led the team in rushing with 745 yards along with seven touchdowns last season, showcasing game-breaking speed out of the backfield.
- One of the biggest highlights of the year was when he ripped off a 95-yard touchdown run in the third quarter against Charlotte on Sept. 30, 2023.
- The run tied the second longest in program history and was the third longest in AAC history.

BUILT DIFFERENT

- SMU had the best defense in the AAC in 2023.
- The Mustangs ranked in the top three in the conference in several categories, including third down conversion defense (first), defensive touchdowns (first), first down defense (second), interceptions (third), passing yards allowed (first), rushing defense (second), scoring defense (first), team passing efficiency defense (first), team sacks (first), team tackles for loss (third) and total defense (first).
- SMU's defense allowed 16.47 fewer points per game in 2023 compared to 2022.
- The Mustangs held eight opponents to under 300 total yards in a game last year.

HOME SWEET HOME

SMU is 24-4 at home since the start of the 2019 season, which included a 6-0 mark in 2023, a 5-1 record in 2021 and a 6-0 record in 2019.

The Mustangs currently have an eight-game winning streak in Ford Stadium dating back to 2022, tied for fourth longest in program history, and currently ranks sixth longest in all of college football.

SMU set a record for the largest regular season attendance in Ford Stadium at the Sept. 24, 2022 contest against TCU with 35,569 fans, including a record 4,590 students. The previous regular season record was 35,481 vs TCU (2010). The stadium record is 36,742 (Armed Forces Bowl, SMU vs Army, 2010). The Mustangs averaged 24,971 last season at Ford Stadium (149,827 total in 6 games), an SMU-best since Ford Stadium opened in 2000.

FIREWORKS IN FORD

- SMU was explosive on offense in Ford Stadium last year.
- The Mustangs averaged 52.3 points per game in six home wins in 2023.
- The Mustangs were especially dangerous on the ground, averaging 207.0 yards rushing at home.

SAME PONY, NEW EXPRESS

- The Mustangs dialed it back to the days of the Pony Express with the elite level of play shown in 2023 on both sides of the ball.
- SMU held three straight opponents to 10 points or less (at ECU, at Temple, vs. Tulsa) on defense last year, the longest streak since doing so in four straight games in 1983.
- The Mustangs scored at least 55 four times last season, the most in program history.
- SMU has outscored conference opponents 140-41 in the first quarter of games last year.

SHUT'EM DOWN

- The Mustangs recorded two shutouts last season for the first time since 2012.
- SMU also posted the first shutout of a conference opponent since 2012 with a 55-0 victory at Temple (55-0) on Oct. 20, 2023.
- The 1935 National Champion team holds the record for shutouts in a single season with eight.

PRESEASON AWARDS RACKING UP

- SMU athletes have earned a high number of preseason accolades for 2024.
- 20 different players have picked up a preseason honor, with 12 having earned preseason All-ACC accolades by Athlon Sports or Phil Steele.
- Stone leads the way, picking up eight preseason honors already, and 13 Mustangs have earned multiple accolades.

500 CLUB

SMU has registered 500 yards of total offense or more in 19 of the past 45 games. Ten of the top 14 totals on the single-game list have come in the last five seasons, Seven of 14 have come with Rhett Lashlee as HC or OC.

PONY UP DALLAS

- In just seven days after announcing the move into the Atlantic Coast Conference on Sept. 1, 2023, SMU raised \$100 million to support the Mustangs' transition to the ACC for 2024.
- The generous early commitments from a group of thirty donors that includes trustees and key donors – alumni and non-alumni alike – enables SMU to align and compete with an elite group of national institutions with powerhouse athletic programs, benefiting both SMU Athletics and the entire University community.
- Notably, the move immediately raised SMU's profile, with media coverage of the move generating more than \$163 million in advertising value in the first three days.
- In that same small window, SMU also experienced a 103% increase in visitors to its undergraduate admissions homepage.

HISTOR-ACC DAY

- SMU celebrated one of the most important moments in the school's history on July. 1 when it joined the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC).
- With the additions of SMU, Cal & Stanford, the ACC will have 17 members in football for 2024.

Every Friday is a "Wear Red Friday" on the Hilltop – a vibrant display of Mustang pride and unity. Peruna leads the charge, reminding us to wear our favorite red apparel and to support our Mustang Nation.

FUNDRAISING RECORDS

- SMU Athletics hit three major fundraising goals prior to its first season in the ACC.
- The department raised a record-setting \$159 million during the 2023-24 fiscal year, a number punctuated by an unprecedented \$100 million donated in just seven days following the announcement of the move to the ACC in September.
- SMU's Mustang Club reached its ambitious goal of 5,000 members, which far surpassed the previous high of 3,500 members.
- On the program's first day in the ACC, SMU announced that \$100 million had been donated to its ACC Competitiveness Campaign, an initiative launched to help ensure that the university's athletic programs remained competitive at the highest level of college sports during its transition to the ACC.
- In April, SMU announced that 2024 will feature the most season-ticket holders in Ford Stadium history, and season-ticket sales are up more than 50 percent compared to the end of the 2023, putting SMU on pace to more than double the amount of season tickets sold for the upcoming year.

REMEMBERING A MUSTANG LEGEND

SMU lost one of its biggest fans on Sept. 12, 2022, as SMU alum, former cheerleader and superfan Paul Layne died following a brief illness.

Layne set an unrivaled Mustang record, attending every SMU game for over 50 years, even going to Tokyo and Hawaii (EIGHT TIMES) to cheer on the Ponies. Starting when Layne attended SMU and was a team cheerleader, he attended 542 straight games.

More than once Layne had to go to extreme lengths to keep his streak alive – like the time his ex-wife remarried. He persuaded her to schedule her wedding on a Friday within driving distance of SMU's game at Nevada the following day. So the night before the Mustangs tangled with the Wolf Pack in Reno, Layne attended the wedding in California's Sonoma Valley, then drove 200 miles to catch the opening kickoff. In 1995, Layne attended a game dressed in a Halloween costume to disguise his case of adult-onset chicken pox, and in 2020, Layne received a special invitation from Tulane to attend SMU's 37-34 overtime win, since Yulman Stadium was closed to spectators. Layne is immortalized in Ford Stadium with a plaque on his seat as a season-ticket holder.

SMU ATHLETICS STUDENT-ATHLETE SUCCESS DEPARTMENT

As part of its goal of Shaping Champions and preparing students for life, SMU Athletics proudly announced the creation of a new Student-Athlete Success Department in 2022. This new department encompasses all student-development-centered efforts such as Life After Ball, SAAC and community service initiatives. Additionally, it will house NIL Education and Diversity, Equity and Inclusion programming. Due to a generous donation from Suzanne and Glenn Youngkin, SMU Athletics will be able to grow staffing in these critical areas in our support of our student-athletes.

MUSTANG STUDENT-ATHLETES & NIL

SMU Football student-athletes benefit from Name, Image, Likeness (NIL) opportunities through SMU Athletics' conference-leading BOLD NIL program. SMU topped the AAC for NIL Deals among INFLCR partners, ranking No. 1 in Total Transactions, Total Transaction Value and Average Transaction Value. To date, football student-athletes have amassed over 160 total transactions, totaling more than \$434,800 with an average transaction value of nearly \$2,700. SMU student-athletes overall have over 280 transactions for over \$620,000 with an average transaction value of \$2,200.

PONY UP-GRADES!

Opened in 2000, Gerald J. Ford Stadium is adjacent to Mockingbird Lane. The architecture is consistent with the Collegiate-Georgian style of the entire SMU campus and features traditional, yet state-of-the-art design concepts. The stadium has a seating capacity of 32,000 with the possibility for future expansion to 45,000. The configuration includes nearly 600 club level seats and 240 seats in 24 spacious luxury suites housed in a three-level tower and press box. In addition to housing the club and suites, the press box provides excellent sightlines and comfortably accommodates more than 125 working print, digital, radio and television media. The playing surface is 25 feet below ground level, with half of the stadium's seats sunk below grade, ensuring a smooth transition into the surrounding neighborhood and the remainder of campus.

SMU has also invested in the creation of the Armstrong Fieldhouse includes features such as two scoreboards, a video board, glass rollup doors and translucent panels above the practice field to let natural light in. Housing the Weber Observation Deck and Loyd Field, Armstrong Fieldhouse incorporates tributes to SMU's most famous football alumni.

The stadium has undergone millions of dollars' worth of upgrades since opening. SMU moved into the \$100 million Garry Weber End Zone Complex in 2024. Sparked by a \$50 million commitment from the Garry Weber Foundation – the largest gift in the history of SMU Athletics – the new three-level complex increased the functionality, efficiency and overall experience of Mustang Football and its fans. It also continued SMU's century-long commitment to competing at the highest levels. On Sept. 23, 2022 SMU announced a \$15 million gift from Bill and Liz Armstrong toward the end zone project.

THE RED CARPET

SMU may need to install a red carpet in the Mustang locker room as SMU has become "the place to be" in Dallas. Among the celebrities, legends, current and former pros that have attended practice or stopped by the stadium in recent years are: Micah Parsons, Dax Prescott, Trevon Diggs, Bo Nix, Bryce Young, Derrick Henry, Dez Bryant, Roger Staubach, Troy Aikman, Terrell Owens, Tim Brown, Michael Irvin and Deion Sanders, as well as SMU Hall of Famers Reggie Dupard, Eric Dickerson, Craig James, Jerry Ball, Russell Carter, Don Meredith, and Emmanuel Sanders.

Former President George W. Bush performed the ceremonial coin toss at games against Navy (2011), Memphis (2012), Texas Tech (2013), Cincinnati (2014), UNT (2015), Memphis (2016), Navy (2018) and Texas State (2019). Dallas Mayor Eric Johnson performed the coin toss in SMU's 2021 season opener against ACU, and Billy Gibbons of ZZ Top flipped the coin before the win over Tulane.

Eric Dickerson, Craig James and Lance McIlhenny were part of the coin toss against Lamar (2022), and former President Bush returned for the game vs. Navy.

RECORD TICKET SALES

- The Mustangs have enjoyed an all-time record in season ticket sold going into 2024.
- Season Ticket Sales are on pace to more than double the 2023 season.
- The Mustangs have sold 10 times as many mini plans as last year.

THIS ONE GOES TO 11

Russell Carter is on the 2025 College Football Hall of Fame ballot with a chance to become the 11th Mustang enshrined in the Hall.

Carter was a football and track & field standout for SMU from 1980-83. Carter was a 1983 unanimous First-Team All-American who helped the Mustangs win NCAA-recognized National Championships in 1981 and 1982. Carter had seven interceptions in 1981 and 1983, both tied for second in a season at SMU. The three-time All-SWC performer led Mustangs to consecutive league titles in 1981-82 and is the Mustangs all-time career leader in interceptions with 18.

Carter was drafted in the first round (10th overall) of the 1984 NFL Draft by the New York Jets. Carter was inducted into the SMU Hall of Fame in 2013.

He was a crucial member of the 1983 NCAA Indoor and Outdoor National Championship teams and was an All-American on the indoor mile relay team and the outdoor 1600-meter relay team in 1983.

With 10 current Hall of Fame inductees hailing from the Hilltop, SMU is tied for 29th-most CFB HOF honorees with Texas A&M, Iowa, NC State and Syracuse.

GARRY WEBER END ZONE COMPLEX



Mustang Letterman Garry Weber's Foundation gave \$50 million to SMU for the new End Zone Complex at Ford Stadium. The largest gift in SMU Athletics history launched a \$100 million facility drive to power Mustang Football and increase support for all student-athletes.

-  The 192,500-square-foot Garry Weber End Zone Complex will anchor Ford Stadium's south bowl, connecting its existing east and west gate entries.
-  Team-focused spaces will include new locker rooms, a weight room, position-specific meeting rooms, and a full-team auditorium.
-  A full kitchen and training table to support all of SMU's 484 student-athletes.
-  The new facility will also house football coaches, support staff and video and recruiting services.



ARMSTRONG FIELDHOUSE

ARMSTRONG FIELDHOUSE

Constructed in a Collegiate Georgian architectural style that is harmonious with SMU's traditional campus environment, the Armstrong Fieldhouse includes features such as two scoreboards, a video board, glass rollup doors and translucent panels above the practice field to let natural light in. Housing the Weber Observation Deck and Loyd Field, Armstrong Fieldhouse incorporates tributes to SMU's most famous football alumni.

LOYD FIELD

Outfitted with the same playing surface as Ford Stadium, Loyd Field will increase flexibility for many of SMU's sports programs to train, particularly during inclement weather. This space also allows use by other campus and student groups when not programmed by Athletics.



MUSTANG VISION STUDIOS

Located on the second floor, features the brand new \$23 million dollar Mustang Vision Studios, a state-of-the-art control center that handles all broadcast for the ACC Network involving SMU teams.

WEBER OBSERVATION DECK

Located indoors on the second floor, the Weber Observation Deck overlooks the Armstrong Fieldhouse and offers prime views of practices or other activities on Loyd Field.

CRUM TERRACE

Located on the second floor and visible from Bishop Boulevard and Binkley Avenue, is a premier outdoor event space with two entrances from the recruiting lounge.

MILLER BOULEVARD BALLROOM

Located on the ground floor just inside the main entrance off Bishop Boulevard, serves as a multipurpose space that can accommodate banquets, presentations, meetings, hospitality and other social gatherings for athletics, as well as campus and community events.

WEIGHT ROOM

Located on the ground floor and has direct access to Loyd Field. It provides an additional strength and conditioning space for student-athletes.

LETTERWINNERS PLAZA

As a testament to over 100 years of SMU Football history, the Letterwinners Plaza features bricks with all of the men and women who earned a football varsity letter as a student-athlete, manager or trainer since the program's inception in 1915.

DALLAS (AP) -- Preston Stone threw three touchdown passes and SMU defeated Louisiana Tech 38-14 on Saturday.

Stone, a redshirt sophomore with one previous start and two touchdown passes in his SMU career, was 23 of 37 for 248 yards and wasn't intercepted. LJ Johnson Jr. rushed for 128 yards on 14 carries with one touchdown.

The Mustangs were an easy winner in its opener to kick off its final season as an American Athletic Conference member.

SMU rolled to a 31-0 halftime lead, capping the half with Stone's third touchdown pass of the day, a 25-yarder to RJ Maryland, coming with two seconds remaining. Stone also had 67-yard scoring pass to Jordan Hudson for the Mustangs' first points and a 9-yarder to Nolan Matthews-Harris. Kori Robertson had a 16-yard pick-6 after blocking a pass at the line.

The Mustangs had 311 yards offense by halftime while holding the Bulldogs (1-1) to 78. By game's end, SMU outgained the Bulldogs 457-269, held Louisiana Tech to 28 rushing yards and sacked Hank Bachmeier six times, two of them by Alex Kilgore.

NEW ORLEANS (AP) -- Kevin Jennings threw a touchdown pass and accounted for 266 yards from scrimmage in his first career start, Collin Rogers kicked four second-half field goals and No. 25 SMU beat No. 17 Tulane 26-14 on Saturday in the American Athletic Conference championship game.

The Mustangs (11-2) also turned in a stifling defensive performance, limiting Tulane (11-2, No. 22 CFP) to a touchdown during the final 59 minutes to snap the Green Wave's 10-game winning streak and dethrone the defending league champs.

SMU sacked Michael Pratt seven times. Defensive back Isaiah Nwokobia's interception in the fourth quarter all but sealed it, sending numerous fans to the exits of Yulman Stadium, where the Wave had celebrated their first AAC title a year ago.

SMU's league title was its first since winning the Southwest Conference in 1984. It'll also be the Mustangs' last in the AAC. They move to the ACC next season.

The Mustangs punted only once in the first half, but a missed field goal and turned the ball over twice more before finally taking at 14-7 lead on Jennings' 17-yard pass to Key'Shawn Smith with 1:32 left in the first half.

Jennings' inexperience showed on his turnovers, but his potential to be the Mustangs' QB of the future was evident in the way he escaped pressure to extend plays and made clutch throws on third and fourth downs, highlighted by his third-down scoring pass to Smith, who was covered by top Tulane cornerback Jarius Monroe, on a well executed back-shoulder throw.

BOSTON (AP) -- Thomas Castellanos had two fourth-quarter touchdown runs and Boston College beat No. 17 SMU 23-14 on Thursday in the Fenway Bowl at the home of the Boston Red Sox, snapping the Mustangs' nine-game winning streak.

Kevin Jennings went 24 of 48 for 191 yards and a TD for SMU (11-3), which finished with its most victories since the 1982 squad also got 11.

With the Mustangs moving to the Atlantic Coast Conference next season in a sweeping list of realignments that have overtaken college football, it was a matchup of two teams that'll see each other again next season in Dallas during league play.

SMU had taken a 14-10 lead when Jennings hit Jaylan Knighton with a 6-yard scoring toss with eight seconds left in the first half, scoring just in front of the visitors' dugout.

Trailing 3-0 early in the second quarter, the Mustangs took the lead on LJ Johnson Jr.'s 1-yard run just a few feet from where home plate was covered.

But the Eagles answered right back, scoring on Robichaux's 6-yard burst into the end zone just in front of the bullpens.

Playing in a steady rain that would usually have a tarp on Fenway's infield during baseball games, the Eagles grabbed a 3-0 lead on Liam Connor's 45-yard field goal.

Due to tight foul territory, both sidelines were in the outfield in front of the fabled Green Monster that was draped with banners of the Fenway Bowl logo and advertisements. The manually operated scoreboard had the line score of the game broken by quarters.

Jennings filled in nicely after starting QB Preston Stone was lost when he broke his leg in their regular-season finale against Navy. ... The Mustangs leave the American Athletic Conference with 12 titles.

Head Coach Rhett Lashlee enters his third season in charge in 2024.

Lashlee has a career head coaching record of 18-9.

The third-year coach has been the driving force in leading the Mustangs' return to prominence in his first two years as the leader of the program, highlighted by a championship season in his second year, going 11-3 and undefeated in AAC play (8-0).

SMU's 11 wins and nine-game winning streak in 2023 were the most since the 1982 National Championship team. The Mustangs also finished out the year ranked 22nd in the AP Top 25 Poll, the first time appearing in the final poll since 1984.

Lashlee made history on Dec. 2, 2023 with a 26-14 victory over No. 22 Tulane in the AAC Championship game, giving the Mustangs their first conference championship since 1984 and 12th overall as a program. It was the first outright conference title won by the school since 1982.

The historic campaign led to a fifth straight year of being bowl eligible, the longest stretch in program history.

The success of the season has resulted in various accolades for the team and coach himself, including a record-tying 18 AAC All-Conference selections. Lashlee was also named a finalist for the prestigious Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year Award, handed out the nation's top coach as voted on by the National Sports Media Association, the Bryant Awards' Executive Leadership Team, and the Bryant Family.

The Arkansas native was also named Co-Coach of the Year by the Dave Campbell's Texas Football publication, a finalist of the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award, and a semi-finalist for Coach of the Year Award by the Maxwell Football Club.

SMU was dominant all season long in 2023 on both sides of the ball, ranking in the top 25 in the FBS in numerous categories including: third down defense (4th), defensive touchdowns (1st), fewest penalties per game (18th), first down offense (6th), passing offense (22nd), passing yards allowed (13th), passing yards per completion (12th), red zone defense (25th), red zone offense (8th), sacks allowed (13th), scoring defense (11th), scoring offense (8th), tackles for loss allowed (9th), team passing efficiency defense (9th), team sacks (3rd), team tackles for loss (16th), total defense (12th) and total offense (16th).

On offense, the 542 points ranked second highest in program history. The 29 rushing touchdowns were third most in program history. The Mustangs scored at least 55 points four times in 2023, the most in program history for a single season. Lashlee's offense also finished top five in program history in first downs (1st), passing touchdowns (5th), passing yards (5th) and total yards (tied for 1st).

Quarterback Preston Stone led the attack for Lashlee's offense, posting career highs in passing yards (3,197) and passing touchdowns (28). Stone's 161.3 passing efficiency rating led all quarterbacks in the AAC. For his great play, Stone earned All-AAC Third Team honors in his first year starting under Lashlee.

Defensively, the Mustangs were one of the elite teams in the country. The 47 sacks rank second in program history for a single year. SMU took it to the conference opposition this past season, posting an average margin of victory of 28.9 points (45.9-17.0) in conference games on the year, the largest margin for any FBS team in conference play in 2023. SMU also finished first in all of FBS in defensive touchdowns with five. The Mustangs' two shutouts during the regular season were the most by the team since 2012.

Lashlee completed his first season (2022) as head coach on the Hilltop with a 7-5 regular season record, and an appearance in the New Mexico Bowl against BYU. Under his leadership, the Mustangs ranked 14th in the nation in total offense, 12th in scoring offense, and seventh in both red zone offense and passing offense. Furthermore, the Mustangs were among the best-disciplined teams in the nation, committing the 11th fewest penalties across FBS teams.

The appearance in the New Mexico Bowl made the Mustangs bowl eligible for the fourth straight season. The streak is the longest since SMU went to four bowls from 2009-12 and made the Mustangs bowl eligible in five of the past six seasons. The program has won at least seven games each season dating back to 2019, making it the longest stretch with at least seven wins since the 2009-12 seasons. It was also the first season the Mustangs have won five conference games since going 6-2 in league play in 2019.

Rashee Rice was named a second-team All-American by multiple organizations, Collin Rogers and RJ Maryland were among freshman All-America mentions and four Mustangs earned All-American Athletic Conference honors led by first-team selection Rice.

Lashlee, who served as offensive coordinator for the Mustangs for two seasons (2018-19), also served as the offensive coordinator at Miami in 2020 and 2021. A one-time finalist (2013) and two-time semifinalist (2019, 2020) for the Broyles Award, Lashlee has the distinction of being the only coach ever nominated for the Broyles Award four different times at four different schools (Arkansas State, Auburn, SMU, Miami).

During his time at Miami, Lashlee's first season saw the Hurricanes jump to No. 32 in the FBS in total offense (from No. 98), No. 29 in passing offense (from No. 52), No. 26 in scoring offense (from No. 90), No. 17 in red zone offense (from No. 122) and No. 20 in first downs gained (from No. 84). In 2021, Miami again ranked 26th in scoring average, improving to 34.1 PPG, and jumped up to 22nd in total offense at 448.8 yards per game.

Under his watch, QB D'Eriq King was a semifinalist for the Maxwell Award, Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award and Davey O'Brien Award. Several offensive players enjoyed career years under his tutelage, including Michael Harley, who became the school's all-time leading wide receiver, and TE Brevin Jordan, who was a Mackey Award semifinalist and an eventual 2021 NFL Draft pick of the Houston Texans. In 2021, freshman Tyler Van Dyke was named the ACC Rookie of the Year, and

Charleston Rambo broke the Miami single-season receiving yards and receptions record.

Prior to heading to Coral Gables, Lashlee helped lead the Mustangs to a 10-3 finish in 2019, guiding an offense that ranked No. 7 in FBS in scoring (41.8 points per game), No. 13 in passing offense (309 yards per game), No. 9 in total offense (489.8 yards per game) and No. 12 in first downs gained (322). SMU's 10 wins were the school's most since the 1984 season, and its 35 rushing touchdowns set a school record.

The Mustangs were ranked No. 3 nationally in plays per game, averaging 80.9 – a testament to Lashlee's up-tempo offensive style. SMU was one of only 34 teams in FBS to average more than six yards per play in 2019. Quarterback Shane Buechele threw for 3,929 yards with 34 touchdowns and just 10 interceptions, completing 63 percent of his passes. Running back Xavier Jones rushed for 1,276 yards and 23 touchdowns, averaging 5.2 yards per carry. His 23 TDs led the nation. James Proche led the nation with 111 catches. All three were first-team All-AAC selections.

In his first season at SMU, the Mustang offense ranked 27th nationally in passing offense at 271.7 yards per game. Quarterback Ben Hicks registered 2,582 yards and 19 touchdowns to finish his SMU career as the all-time leader in passing yards (9,081), total offense (8,977), TD passes (71), TDs responsible for (74), completions (718) and 300-yard games (12). His season passing yards ranked 11th at SMU, while his 19 touchdowns tied him for eighth. Wide receiver Proche was named a first-team All-AAC selection, and finished the season ranked fifth nationally in receptions per game (7.8), seventh in receiving touchdowns (12) and ninth in receiving yards (1,199).

Prior to joining SMU's staff, Lashlee served as an offensive coordinator for seven seasons, spending 2017 at UConn, 2013-16 at Auburn, 2012 at Arkansas State and 2011 at Samford.

In his only season in Storrs, Lashlee improved the Huskies' offense significantly, as UConn jumped from 122nd to 49th in the nation in total offense and from 94th to 34th in passing offense.

Prior to UConn, Lashlee helped Auburn to the 2013 SEC Championship, a BCS Championship berth and the 2016 Sugar Bowl, managing one of the more prolific offenses in college football during his tenure. The 2013-14 seasons were the best back-to-back offensively in Auburn history, and the 2014 squad set an Auburn record for total offense. Lashlee also served as the quarterbacks coach and demonstrated impressive ability to develop talent. In 2013, Auburn had the second biggest turnaround in college football history. Starting QB Nick Marshall did not practice until August, but Lashlee tutored the junior college transfer to 3,044 yards of total offense (1,976 passing, 1,068 rushing), 14 TD passes and 12 rushing TDs.

Lashlee was the offensive coordinator at Arkansas State (2012), helping the Red Wolves to a Sun Belt Championship and quarterback Ryan Aplin to Conference Player of the Year honors, and at Samford (2011), after having served as a graduate assistant at Auburn (2009-10) and Arkansas (2006). While at Auburn as an offensive graduate assistant during the 2009-10 seasons, Lashlee assisted Gus Malzahn with all aspects of the offense and coached the quarterbacks and slot receivers in 2010. In 2009, the Tigers finished 8-5 winning the Outback Bowl. During the 2010 season, he helped the Tigers finish 14-0, winning the SEC title and the BCS National Championship behind Heisman Trophy winning quarterback Cam Newton. Lashlee coached at Springdale (Ark.) High School in 2004-05, working with the quarterbacks and 2005 National Player of the Year Mitch Mustain.

Lashlee graduated from Arkansas in 2006 with a degree in marketing and business administration. He received his master's degree in higher education from Auburn in 2009.

He is married to the former Lauren Lee. They have twin sons, Thomas and Hudson, and twin daughters, Rowyn and Scarlet.
