# MEDIA INFORMATION

### **COVERING PRACTICE**

Oklahoma's spring practices are closed unless otherwise announced on specific dates. On days that the workouts are open, designated viewing areas will be clearly marked.

### COVERING THE RED/WHITE SPRING GAME

Credentials are required for working media covering the game as there is an admission charge for the public.

Parking passes are not available for the spring game.

All requests for credentials must be entered by sports editors/directors online. The online application is available by logging on to SoonerSportsMedia.com.

The deadline for requesting spring game credentials is April 1.

The credential application process for the 2007 season will begin in July and also will be conducted online.

### INTERVIEWS

Head coach Bob Stoops will meet with media after each practice beginning with the March 14 workout. Other members of the coaching staff and the players also will be available upon request after practice (no pre-practice interviews).

OU's Athletics Media Relations staff will hold players for interviews. Media are encouraged to plan for no more than two interviews per day.

Numerous players are enrolled in evening classes and may be unable to participate in interviews on specific days. Requests for players received at least 24 hours in advance are appreciated.

### PHOTOGRAPHERS/VIDEOGRAPHERS

Cameras are permitted only during interview sessions. Policies pertaining to cameras at open workouts will be announced prior to those specific events.

### PRACTICE DATES/TIMES

Dates and times are subject to change on short notice. The OU Athletics Media Relations staff will alert media to changes, but media are encouraged to confirm practice information before attending.

### PRACTICE LOCATION

Weather permitting, most practices will be held on the grass practice fields south of Gaylord Family - Oklahoma Memorial Stadium.

In the event of inclement weather, workouts will be moved to the Everest Center, one block east of the stadium. If a practice is forced indoors, OU staff will determine if the sideline space at the indoor facility is sufficient to hold the public that is in attendance. If it is, the practice will remain open.

Scrimmages will likely be held inside the stadium.

# SOONER FOOTBALL NOTES

## Looking Back at 2006

Oklahoma finished the season with an 11-3 mark, 7-1 in the Big 12, good for first place in the South. The Sooners advanced to the Dr Pepper Big 12 Championship Game at Kansas City's Arrowhead Stadium where they vanquished Nebraska, 21-7. OU then dropped a 43-42 overtime decision to Boise State in the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl.

- Conference Title No. 40: Oklahoma won its 40th conference championship. It's a remarkable feat considering the Sooners have held conference membership for just 92 of their 112-football-playing seasons. OU has won a conference championship in nearly half of its league seasons (43%).
- All-American No. 142: Rufus Alexander became OU's 142nd All-American. The Sooner program has averaged 1.3 All-Americans per year since its inception.
- Sooners Play Another Difficult Schedule: Oklahoma was the only Big 12 program to play a schedule comprised solely of NCAA Division I-A opponents. The Sooners played six ranked opponents (none in Norman) during and saw eight regular season foes advance to bowl play.
- Small Senior Class: Oklahoma's 2006 class included just nine scholarship players, making it the smallest of Bob Stoops' tenure. Even with the early departure of RB Adrian Peterson, the group of

Some 29 players who filled a starting role last season return. That exceeds the 26 who returned for 2006 and the 17 who returned for 2005.

Looking Ahead to 2007

- Category Leaders: The Sooners return their top receiver (Malcolm Kelly), but must replace their top passer (Paul Thompson) and top rusher (Adrian Peterson). On defense, OU welcomes back its leaders in interceptions (Nic Harris), fumble recoveries (Lendy Holmes) and pass break-ups (Marcus Walker), but must replace its leading tackler (Rufus Alexander), leader in tackles for loss (Alexander), sacks leader (Larry Birdine) and fumbles forced leader (Alexander). On special teams, Oklahoma welcomes back all of its leaders, including punt returns (Reggie Smith), kickoff returns (Juaquin Iglesias), field goals (Garrett Hartley), PATs (Garrett Hartley) and punting (Michael Cohen).
- Seven Home Games: For the first time since 2003, Oklahoma will play seven home games.
- Back From Injury: Branndon Braxton suffered a broken leg and missed the last seven games. He'll still be slowed for spring ball, but will be good to go for the August drills.

departed players is the smallest for OU under its current head coach.

- The Overcomers: Oklahoma's 2006 team perservered to spend the entire season ranked among the top 25. The day before practice was to convene in August, the Sooners learned that they would have to move receiver Paul Thompson back to quarterback. He was the only player remaining on the roster with OU game experience at the position (one as a starter). Then, in just its second Big 12 game of the year, the team lost running back and Heisman Trophy candidate Adrian Peterson to an injury. He missed seven games before returning for the Fiesta Bowl. Oklahoma was 6-0 in his absence and Thompson was brilliant, firing 22 TD passes and just 11 interceptions while becoming just the third OU quarterback since WWII to complete 60% of his passes in a season.
- TV, TV and More TV: Including last season, Oklahoma has now had 55 consecutive games televised. A very small number of those were produced for tape-delay or pay-per-view, but the vast majority were either over the air or on cable through widely recognized television networks.

## Signing Day Revisited

Oklahoma signed 20 players: five offensive linemen, three linebackers, three defensive ends, three receivers, two defensive backs, two athletes, one quarterback and one kicker. Oklahoma produced the most new Sooners with seven. Texas was next with six with three from Louisiana and one each from Colorado, Florida, Michigan and Missouri. Eighteen of the 20 players hail from the high school ranks while two are from junior colleges. Rivals ranked the class at No. 14.

## Big Crowds Follow Stoops Era

Oklahoma has sold out all 49 games (47 wins) since Bob Stoops came to Norman. The 2006 average attendance of 84,561 was the largest in school history. The top seven seasons for OU attendance occurred under Stoops. The gathering of 85,313 for the '06 Texas Tech game was the largest ever to see a sporting event in the state of Oklahoma.

## **ESPN** to Televise Spring Game

For the second straight year, ESPN will televise live Oklahoma's Red/White Spring Game. Announcers had not been set at press time. It will mark ESPN's third visit to the OU spring game. In 2003, the College GameDay crew stopped on behalf of SportsCenter. College GameDay has made three other visits to Norman for football (2000 Nebraska game, 2001 North Carolina game, 2003 Oklahoma State game), and College GameDay's basketball show was in Norman in January of 2006.



# **OFFENSE NOTES**

## **About the Sooner Offense**

- Under Bob Stoops, OU has produced its top two leaders in career passing and receiving, while turning out the No. 3- and No. 4-ranked rusher in school history and the school record holder for single-season rushing.
- OU has scored at least one touchdown in every game dating back to Nov. 7, 1998.
- Under Stoops, OU has rushed for 200 yards 32 times, including 26 over the last four seasons. With Stoops at the reins, Oklahoma has 25, 300-yard passing games.
- Also under Stoops, OU has 103 touchdowns of 25-plus yards and 220 scoring drives that took less than two minutes.

## Green at QB But That's Nothing New

Oklahoma has won 19 games and been to a pair of bowls over the last two years, yet neither time did it enter the campaign carrying a quarterback who had much starting experience. The 2005 season featured two QBs who had none, while the 2006 squad entered the year behind Paul Thompson and his one career start. None of the three quarterbacks vying for the 2007 job have ever started for the Sooners either. Junior Joey Halzle is the only one with game experience. The other two are Sam Bradford, who redshirted last season, and Keith Nichol, a highly-touted true freshman who joined the fold in January.

### **Balancing Act**

Oklahoma's 2006 team missed perfect offensive balance by just 202 yards (2,682 passing, 2,480 rushing). The 2005 team missed perfect balance by only one yard, while the 2003 squad missed it by just 160.

## **Ground Game Still Solid**

Oklahoma lost the No. 3 rusher in its history when Adrian Peterson declared for the NFL Draft following his junior season, yet the Sooners return a stable of good backs, who proved their worth in 2006 when Peterson missed seven games due to injury ...

- Allen Patrick carried 169 times for 761 yards last season. He scored four touchdowns, including one at Oklahoma State on a 65-yard burst, the longest rush by any OU player during the season. The senior logged four 100-yard games, including a best of 173 at Texas A&M.
- Chris Brown was outstanding in his true freshman season with 343 yards and six TD. His lone start came at Baylor when he carried 24 times for 169 yards.
- The Sooners redshirted a pair of promising backs in 2006. Mossis Madu and DeMarco Murray both figure to make a strong push for playing time as redshirt freshmen. During winter conditioning, Murray posted a time for 4.43 in the 40 and a vertical jump of 41 inches.

## **Quite a Catch**

Oklahoma returns its top four receivers from 2006, including All-America and Biletnikoff candidate Malcolm Kelly, who pulled in 62 passes for 993 yards and 10 touchdowns during the campaign. He missed nearly all of the Fiesta Bowl due to injury. Also back at wide receiver are Juaquin Iglesias (14-514-2), Manuel Johnson (36-478-3), Fred Strong (9-73-0), Quentin Chaney (5-52-2) and Adron Tennell (2-26-0).

Tight end figures to be a stellar spot for OU, too, with all three returning. Joe Jon Finely caught 19
passes for 241 yards and three touchdowns last season, while Jermaine Gresham caught eight for
161 yards and one TD. Brody Eldridge, used primarily in a blocking role, had three receptions for 18
yards.

## Trench Talk

Oklahoma may be as solid, and as big, as it has been up front in quite some time. Four of the five players who started the last seven games return, along with Branndon Braxton, who started the first seven at right tackle before going down with a broken leg.

- A newcomer of note is junior college All-American and mid-year transfer Phil Loadholt. The 6-8, 350-pounder is one of the biggest linemen in OU history. He is a candidate to replace the lone starter lost to graduation, consensus All-Big 12 performer Chris Messner, at left tackle.
- The five players returning with extensive previous starting experience (at least seven games) at OU average 6-4, 310 pounds.

## **About the Sooner Defense**

- Oklahoma has forced at least one turnover in 94 of Bob Stoops' 105 games and has at least one interception in 70 of the last 92 games. The Sooners have multiple picks in 26 of their last 61 outings.
- Opponents completed 50 percent or more of their passes in less than half of their games against Stoops-coached OU teams -- 50 times in 105 games.
- Foes scored less than 14 points in 48 of the games.
- Oklahoma has nine shutouts under its current head coach. Opponents failed to score more than seven points 28 times and scored less than 14 in 53 games.
- Last season, only two of the 14 opponents reached their scoring average in games against Oklahoma and just two were able to exceed their average total yardage figure. After game three, only one team exceeded its scoring average and none met their yardage number.

## **OU** in the NCAA Stats

## Very Hands-On

Last year, Oklahoma defenders touched the ball 93 times in the form of 61 pass deflections, 18 interceptions and 14 fumble recoveries. Over a 14-game schedule, a Sooner defensive player touched the ball an average of 6.6 times per game and claimed 2.3 takeaways per game.

• Players who accounted for 13 of the team's 18 interceptions last season return for 2007. The same is true for 11 of the 14 fumble recoveries.

## Stoops Era Staple: Run Defense

Nineteen times, Bob Stoops-coached Oklahoma teams have held opponents under 40 rushing yards in a game. Four times the total has resulted in negative yards. Last season, thanks in part to five sacks, the Sooners limited Baylor to -48 yards on the ground. That was the best single-game rushing defense performance by any team in the nation during the 2006 season and the best ever posted by an Oklahoma team during the Stoops Era.

• OU has ranked no worse than 23rd in national rushing defense over the last seven seasons. Three times during that span it ranked among the top 10 and six times it was among the top 20.

## **Secondary Improvement was Primary**

Oklahoma made substantial improvement in the defensive secondary as a young group from 2005 remained relatively young in 2006, but much more experienced. In 2007, 10 of the 11 defensive backs who saw action, including six of the seven who drew starts, return. The only one who is not back is Jason Carter, who started one game last season. Here are some examples of how the defensive backs improved from 2005 to 2006 ...

- In 2005, Oklahoma defensive backs accounted for 23 of 47 pass break-ups, or 48%. In 2006, that number jumped to 35 of 61 for 57%. In 2005, the Sooner secondary had six of the team's 13 interceptions for 46%. In 2006, it had 14 out of the 18 for 78%.
- In 2005, Oklahoma opponents completed 53% of their passes and fired 20 touchdowns. In 2006, those numbers dropped to 51.8% and 15, respectively.

# **SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES**

## **About the Sooner Special Teams**

Oklahoma's special teams under Bob Stoops ...

- There have been 24 special teams TD, including 17 in the last 54 regular season games. Those 17 came via five different kinds of plays -- 10 punt returns, two faked field goals, two blocked punts, two kickoff returns and a faked punt. The special teams also own one safety in that span.
- In total, OU has returned six kickoffs and 14 punts for TDs on Stoops' watch (since 1999).
- The Sooners have blocked 20 kicks.

## Many Happy Returns

Information on returns during the Stoops era ...

- Kickoff Returns -- 48 returns of 25 yards or more with six touchdowns.
- Punt Returns -- 44 returns of 15 or more yards with 14 touchdowns.
- Interception Returns -- 59 returns of 10 or more yards with 17 touchdowns.
- Fumble Returns -- Three returns of 15 or more yards with three touchdowns.

## **Got-R-Covered**

Opposing teams have found it difficult to return any kind of kick against Oklahoma.

- Over the last three seasons, Oklahoma's average rank in NCAA kickoff return coverage was 10th. Oklahoma's "worst" season-ending national ranking in that category came in 2005 (No. 15). The 2004 team ranked No. 4. Last season, the Sooners ranked 13th and gave up just 17.4 yards per return. The longest return by an opponent was 34 yards. Prior to Bob Stoops' arrival, opposing teams had averaged at least 22 yards per kickoff return in five straight seasons. Since he arrived, the best opposing average was 18.9 in 2001.
- OU has ranked among the top 10 in punt return defense in five of the last seven seasons. Last season, the team ranked No. 9 as opponents could muster just 4.2 yards per punt return. The longest punt return by an opposing player was 14 yards. The 2006 campaign marked the third in a row in which the Sooners held their opponents to less than 5.0 yards per punt return.

## **Sooners Have Hart-ley**

K Garrett Hartley was one of three finalists for the Lou Groza Award ...

- Hartley was 19-of-20 on field goals and and 49-of-50 on PATs in 2006. His lone field goal miss was a blocked kick at Oregon. He kicked off 78 times with 31 touchbacks.
- His field goal made percentage of .950 was tops in the nation among kickers with at least 10 makes. He made his last 11 attempts of the season.
- Hartley ranked No. 20 nationally in field goals made per game with 1.36 and was No. 21 in scoring with 7.57 points per game.
- Hartley made a career-high four field goals at Oregon.
- Hartley has three career makes of 50 yards or longer. His long last season was 46 yards, which he accomplished twice.

## **Two-Headed Punter**

Oklahoma used two punters last season and both return. Michael Cohen handled the long kicks and averaged 41.0 yards on 51 attempts. He had a long of 75 yards and another of 72. Nine of his kicks traveled at least 50 yards and he spread those long boots over six games. Mike Knall kicked on a short field and averaged 39.7 yards per boot with nine of his 11 tries downed inside the 20. He had only one touchback.

# **2007 OUTLOOK**



Prognosticating Oklahoma football? Not many are willing to be so bold these days.

Last season, the Sooners moved a wide receiver to quarterback one day before practices began, then lost all-everything running back Adrian Peterson to injury just two games into the Big 12 Conference schedule.

A long line formed as the "experts" called for OU's demise. That same line formed again later at the crow buffet.

Oklahoma exceeded even the most optimistic outlooks by fashioning an 11-3 record while adding the fourth Big 12 title and fifth BCS bowl game of Bob Stoops' tenure.

That squad featured the smallest senior class of the Stoops era so the departures, by numbers, were relatively small even with junior Adrian Peterson declaring for the NFL Draft.

As the results indicate, the group of departed players was solid. Finding their replacements will be a key part of the spring. Still, the number of returning players with quality playing experience is substantial.

It would appear that Oklahoma is set up for another strong run. Given the outcome of 2006, very few are willing to say otherwise.

## The Offense

Eight starters return on offense, including four of the five offensive linemen who started the last seven games. It was that line that was all the rage in 2006. Pinpointed by some as a potential weak spot for the team before the season began, it blossomed into one of the strengths.

That strong front, an experienced and dangerous group of receivers and a strong stable of running backs are blocks on which this offense can build.

The main focus will be on identifying a starting quarterback. The graduation of Paul Thompson, the surprise and outstanding signal-caller from last year, leaves a void. Coaches are confident in the abilities of the

three playing vying for the spot, but won't have the luxury of experience there as the season begins.

This staff and team have faced that factor before and still forged ahead successfully. Both expect to do the same in 2007 and the supporting cast is so proven that it's hard to expect anything less.

### **OUARTERBACKS**

A relative newcomer at quarterback? That's nothing new. The Sooners played most of 2005 with a redshirt freshman, then utilized Paul Thompson in 2006 even though he entered the campaign with just one career start at the position.

The three who hope to win the job for 2007 include junior Joey Halzle, redshirt freshman Sam Bradford and true freshman Keith Nichol, who enrolled at OU in January.

Halzle saw action in two games last season and completed 1-of-2 passes for 15 yards. He knows the system and has had more reps with the first unit than any of the other quarterbacks.

Bradford was an accomplished performer in the high school ranks, and not just in football. He also earned recognition in basketball and golf. That overall athletic ability is bound to serve him well.

Nichol was a prized recruit when the Sooners landed him during the winter months. Rated as one of the top run/throw prospects in the country, Nichol participated in the Elite 11 quarterback camp. He will go through spring drills with the Sooners.

### RUNNING BACKS

Normally, the early departure of a back as accomplished as Adrian Peterson would leave a gaping hole. That's the same thing that some expected to find when the school's No. 3 career rusher suffered a broken collar bone in the seventh game of the 2006 season.

Then depth happened. Oklahoma found that it had two or three more backs capable of running the team to victories. In Peterson's sevengame absence, OU reeled off just as many wins and saw two other backs combine for five 100-yard rushing performances.

# OKLAHOMA FOOTBALL

# **2007 OUTLOOK**



The most effective was Allen Patrick, a converted defensive back, who ran for 761 yards and four touchdowns. His 65-yard burst at Oklahoma State was the longest rush of the year by a Sooner.

Patrick had been known as a standout athlete so his results were only mildly surprising. The same cannot be said for Chris Brown. The then-true freshman ran like a much older back in gaining 343 yards on 70 carries.

His vision and strength proved valuable as he scored six touchdowns.

Another that figures in the mix is senior Jacob Gutierrez. He endured knee surgery after the 2005 season, but bounced back and drew one start in 2006. He stands 5-6, but bench presses 420 pounds and has the most time in the OU program of any of the current backs.

Two running backs redshirted last year and both are considered bright prospects. DeMarco Murray and Mossis Madu are elusive threats capable of the big play. It would not be surprising to see either or both of them to push hard for playing time.

At fullback, four players will compete in Matt Clapp, Brody Eldidge, lan Pleasant and Dane Zaslaw. All four played the position last season. Eldridge will still be listed at tight end despite his somewhat frequent forays into the backfield.

### RECEIVERS

The three players trying to win the quarterback job don't need an added incentive, but throwing to this acrobatic and speedy group could certainly be one.

The ring leader is Malcolm Kelly. At 6-4, 213, he's a big target, but he also has a flair for the circus catch. Get the ball in Kelly's zip code and it will likely result in a completion. He has the best numbers of any two-year receiver in OU history, an impressive accomplishment considering that three former OU receivers started for NFL teams just last season.

The corps of receivers is good enough and the ground game effective enough that Kelly may not post national or even conference-leading statistics in 2007, yet based on the quality of his work, will have to be

considered among the frontrunners for the Biletnikoff Award.

When Kelly isn't open, there are plenty of options. Juaquin Iglesias caught 41 passes last season and Manuel Johnson hauled in 36. Both are capable of taking even a short toss for a long gain.

And the list goes on. Fred Strong is back along with Quentin Chaney, the tallest receiver on the team at 6-5 (4.47 40) and Adron Tennell, the only true freshman to make a catch last season. Add in Brandon Caleb, who played as a true freshman, and OU has a deep list of wideouts.

The same can be said at tight end where all three of those who played last season return. Joe Jon Finley led with 19 catches, but Jermaine Gresham, just a true freshman at the time, added eight, and Brody Eldridge, an accomplished blocker, had two.

For any QB interested in throwing the ball, the prospects couldn't be much better. And of all of those listed above, just one, Finley, is a senior.

### OFFENSIVE LINE

The unvarnished truth is that the prospects are bright along the offensive line. Six players who have started, five who started extensively, are back for 2007. That fact alone would rate as positive, but the size and ability almost trumps the experience. This will be one of the biggest offensive lines Oklahoma has ever put on the field. Ability dictates that it could also be one of the best, but that will have to be proven on the field.

In the middle, Oklahoma welcomes back Jon Cooper, the starting center each of the last two seasons. He missed one game last season and true freshman Chase Beeler filled in more than admirably.

At the guards, the Sooners return George Robinson and Brandon Walker, who got all 14 starts last season. They're capably backed by Sherrone Moore and Brian Simmons. The latter got a late jump on the 2006 season due to injury, but came on strong.

The lone lost starter on the line, Chris Messner, resided at left tackle and was a consensus All-Big 12 selection. His loss can't be ignored, but neither can the group that stands ready to fill the spot.



# **2007 OUTLOOK**



Two of the returning tackles started on the right side last season. Branndon Braxton started the first seven games, then broke his leg against Colorado and gave way to true freshman Trent Williams. Williams played well beyond his years. One of those two could go to left tackle, or even to a guard spot, or the left tackle could be junior college transfer Phil Loadholt.

The 6-8, 350-pounder was a two-time junior college All-American at Garden City (Kan.). He combines imposing stature with an impressive history in basketball that gave him footwork normally found in a smaller player.

Another ingredient is Cory Brandon, who has added another 24 pounds to spread 295 over his 6-7 frame.

If the depth, talent and size mesh as it appears that might on paper, this offensive line could rate as one of the best nationally.

## The Defense

The trademarks are still there -- blistering speed, an immovable front and a vast array of blitz packages. Oklahoma has some excellent athetes to replace, especially at defensive end and linebacker, but the candidates carry the recognizeable attributes and varying levels of experience.

The interior and secondary return nearly intact and it is around those two areas that coaches can build. Oklahoma has ammassed a dynamic group of defensive backs and a defensive front that was downright menacing through much of last season.

The most encouraging aspect of the defense is the overall athletic ability. The coaching staff will have some interesting options when it comes to building schemes. Several players in this group have skill sets that lay the playbook wide open.

### **DEFENSIVE LINE**

Three of the four players who rotated in the two interior spots return in Steven Coleman, DeMarcus Granger and Cory Bennett. The lone departure is Carl Pendleton, who actually had one year remaining, but

chose to adopt a younger brother and enter graduate school.

There are good candidates waiting in the wings. Gerald McCoy was perhaps the most heralded player in the 2006 recruiting class and will now get his first taste of playing time. Billy Blackard is strong and, at more than 300 pounds, provides a good road block in the middle.

Adrian Taylor redshirted last season, but also was highly regarded coming out of high school and did nothing to diminish that reputation while working with the scout squad. Another former redshirt, Cordero Moore, is vying for time too.

The end position is less certain. C.J. Ah You, Larry Birdine and Calvin Thibodeaux were fixtures. All three ended their eligibility last season so it will be necessary to identify replacements.

One who emerged during the 2006 campaign was Alonzo Dotson. He has all the tools and the size. If he can play as consistently in a more prominent role, OU will experience little if any drop off on at least one side

Other candidates include Auston English and Alan Davis. Davis played defensive end two years ago and made plays, then spent some time at fullback last year before returning to his more natural position.

English redshirted last season after playing as a true freshman. Coaches have always liked his ability and feel that he should contribute quickly.

Jeremy Beal redshirted last season, but coaches like him a lot and he will likely make a push. Tim Johnson, a junior, will be in the mix, too, along with redshirt freshman Pryce Macon and John Williams.

Williams has been plagued by medical issues, but may have those behind him now. If so, he is a strong wild card. His size exceeds any of the other ends. He was impressive two years ago before suffering a knee injury. He endured an illness last season. It would be an understatement to say that the coaches are anxious to see what he brings when he comes back to the field. A starting role is most definitely not out of the question.

# **2007 OUTLOOK**



### LINEBACKERS

Two of the three starters must be replaced in Rufus Alexander on the weakside and Zach Latimer in the middle. Alexander was the school's 142nd All-American while Latimer held his starting role for each of the past two seasons.

The strong side still boasts considerable experience in Curtis Lofton and Demarrio Pleasant, both of whom got starts last season. Lofton had the job at season's end. Those two could stay in that spot or be considered for other roles.

In the middle, Oklahoma pulled in junior college All-American Michael Reed at the semester break. Fast and physical, he could fit the bill for the Sooners.

Another interesting element is Ryan Reynolds. He was moving rapidly up the depth chart at the end of his freshman season and continued his strong play into the spring, but then incurred a knee injury after the spring and missed the 2006 season. His recovery has gone well and he is expected to be a major contributor.

Lewis Baker is another who will see extensive time. He made a successful return from the safety position and was one of the Sooners' best on special teams last season.

Other linebackers include Austin Box, a true freshman who came in at the semster break, Lamont Robinson, a sophomore, and redshirt freshman Brandon Crow.

### **DEFENSIVE BACKS**

Ten of the 11 who saw the field last season, including all of the predominant starters, are back and the secondary figures to be one of the strengths of this Oklahoma team.

The starting corners for most of the season were Lendy Holmes and Marcus Walker, but they can't rest on their laurels. D.J. Wolfe, a starter in 2005, will make a push as will players like sophomore Brian Jackson and redshirt freshmen Dominque Franks and Jonathan Nelson, both of whom tested well in winter conditioning.

At strong safety, Reggie Smith returns and at free safety, Nic Harris and Darien Williams, both starters last season, are back.

Other players to watch are sophomores Keenan Clayton, who got two starts at strong safety, and Quinton Carter, perhaps the most physical defensive back on the team. Junior Brett Bowers, also is in the mix.

## The Special Teams

There won't be much need for a program to identify the key special teams personnel -- they're all the same from a year ago when the special teams logged a stellar season.

### **KICKER**

Garrett Hartley made 19-of-20 field goals last season and that percentage was the best in the nation among kickers with more than 10 makes. He also drilled 49-of-50 PATs and boomed 31 touchdbacks. The Groza finalist is back for his senior season.

### **PUNTER**

Oklahoma went with two punters last season -- Michael Cohen on the deep kicks and Mike Knall the short. Both return. Cohen averaged 41.0 per kick while Knall dropped down nine inside the 20 with only one touchback.

### **RETURNERS**

Reggie Smith took a punt return back for a touchdown and Juaquin Iglesias did the same on a kickoff. Smith will likely handle the punts while the duo will probably be deep for kickoffs.

### **DEEP SNAPPER**

Derek Shaw handled all of the snaps last season as a true freshman and is projected to work in that capacity again.

# BOB STOOPS

HEAD COACH | NINTH SEASON | 86-19 (.819) RECORD AT OKLAHOMA

History is one tough customer at Oklahoma. The tradition, so rich and so long-standing, is as daunting as it is impressive. To be among the best at Oklahoma is to be among the best in college football...

Such dramatics are lost on Bob Stoops. The Sooner head coach befriended the would-be albatross of OU's successful past from his first day on campus and remains steadfastly focused on tomorrow and the championship it holds.

It falls then to long-time observers and experts of the game to define Stoops' impact. Rarely have the pundits had it so easy.

That was true again in 2006. Stoops' youngest team, faced with adversity that might have crumbled other squads, persevered to yet another Big 12 Championship and BCS Bowl berth.

Many called it Stoops' best coaching job, a mouthful of compliment considering star-studded nature of his accomplishments at OU.

Under Stoops, Oklahoma has won 86 games; the 2000 national championship; spent 74 consecutive weeks in the national rankings; played in eight bowl games, five of the BCS variety; taken part in three national championship games and captured four Big 12 crowns. On a playing field leveled by scholarship limits and parity, this era stares down the Oklahoma standard and does not blink.

The achievement is so brilliant that it dulls the memory of what Stoops inherited. When he arrived in Norman, the proud Sooner program was five years removed from a winning record, four from a postseason appearance. Those atypical days of angst are so forgotten now that they could be mentioned with the Land Rush and Dust Bowl.

Stoops has been characterized as a grounded family man, brilliant big-game coach, relentless recruiter, strong leader and a person with uncommon perspective. His success emanates from a disciplined style true to his roots in the Steel Valley of Ohio, but he is far from inflexible. The principles to which he holds are the tried and true axioms of the sport ... mixed with cutting-edge strategy and an appreciation for the calculated risk.

During his time, OU has produced record-setting passers and receivers, three 1,000-yard rushers, suffocating defense and special teams units that rank among the most dynamic in the land. The Sooners have been nothing if not versatile.

The son of a coach, Stoops was a four-year starter at lowa. He began his coaching career in 1983 as a volunteer in the Hawkeye program under Hayden Fry, working through the ranks until he became co-defensive coordinator at Kansas State (1991-95). There he played a key role in one of the most impressive turnarounds in college football history.

Eventually, he left for Florida and a three-year stint as Steve Spurrier's defensive coordinator. In 1996, he was part of a national championship team. It was with the Gators that the spotlight found Stoops and made him one of the hottest names in the profession. His hiring at Oklahoma was one for the ages.

## **Coaching Accomplishments**

- Stoops is 86-19 overall, 4-4 in bowls, 3-3 in January bowls, 2-3 in BCS games, 56-11 vs. the Big 12, 31-8 vs. the Big 12 South, 25-3 vs. the Big 12 North, 4-1 in the Big 12 title game, 29-8 vs. non-conference opponents, 47-2 at home, 25-9 on the road, 13-8 on neutral fields and 25-10 vs. ranked opponents.
- OU has set or tied more than 170 school records under Stoops, not including bowl bests and marks specific to a particular position (i.e., receptions by a running back). Among those marks under Stoops are passing for a game, season and career; receiving for a game, season and career; and rushing for a season.

- Stoops has authored two of the seven longest winning streaks in Oklahoma history. His 2000 and 2001 teams won 20 straight, while the 2002 and 2003 teams reeled off 14 in a row. Those victories all came against I-A opponents.
- OU won the 2000 national championship, played for two more and captured five Big 12 South crowns and four Big 12 titles. Oklahoma has spent 22 weeks at No. 1.
- An OU player has finished among the top seven in the Heisman voting five times: Adrian Peterson (No. 2 in 2004), Jason White (No. 3 in 2004), Jason White (No. 1 in 2003), Roy Williams (No. 7 in 2001) and Josh Heupel (No. 2 in 2000).
- OU has had a double-digit lead in 87 of 105 games.
- Oklahoma has played in eight bowl games. Never had an OU coach taken even his first three teams to bowls. Prior to Stoops' arrival, OU had gone four straight years without a bowl, and had not played in one of what is now a BCS game since the 1988 Orange Bowl (1987 season). Stoops, in his second season, led OU to the 2001 Orange Bowl (2000 season).
- Under Stoops, OU has produced 22 All-Americans; two AP Players of the Year (Heupel, White); two Nagurski Award winners (Williams, Derrick Strait); two Thorpe Award winners (Williams, Strait); two Butkus Award winners (Rocky Calmus, Teddy Lehman); one Bednarik Award winner (Lehman); one Lombardi Award winner (Tommie Harris); one Walter Camp winner (Josh Heupel); two O'Brien Award winners (Jason White twice); a Maxwell Award winner (White); a Unitas Award winner (White); an Outland Trophy winner (Jammal Brown) and one Mosi Tatupu Award winner (J.T. Thatcher).
- OU has had a Butkus finalist in four of the last six years and a Lombardi finalist in three of the last five. The Sooners also had finalists for the Biletnikoff, Groza, Guy, Hendricks, Mackey and Doak Walker awards.
- In 1996 and 1997, his Florida defense scored eight touchdowns. The 1996 Gators won the national championship.
- During his final four seasons in Manhattan, Kansas State posted a 35-12 record and played in three bowl games.
- He assisted K-State to its first 10-win season with a defense that allowed seven or fewer points in six games, including three shutouts. In 1995, his unit led the nation in total defense (250.8 ypg) with four defensive backs named All-Big Eight.



### **Coaching Accomplishments**

- In 2006, OU led the Big 12 and ranked No. 13 nationally in pass efficiency defense. All five players who started in the secondary received some kind of all-conference recognition.
- Moved to the secondary in 2005. D.J. Wolfe and Reggie Smith both earned postseason honors. The Sooners ranked No. 21 nationally in passing efficiency defense. In Big 12 games, OU ranked No. 1 in completion percentage defense, No. 2 in passing efficiency defense and No. 3 in passing yardage allowed.
- OU defensive backs had more interceptions in 11 games of 2005 than in 13 games of 2004.
- Wright's 2004 DE rotation of Dan Cody, Jonathan Jackson and Larry Birdine ranked No. 1, 2 and 3, respectively, in sacks among Big 12 players.
- Also the special teams coordinator in 2004, Wright saw OU rank No. 1 in the Big 12 in kickoff coverage (15.7 ypr.), while giving opponents an average of just 4.2 yards on 21 attempts.
- In 2003, his ends piled up 35 TFL, 20 sacks and 59 hurries. In '02, the DEs accounted for nearly half of the team's sacks. Jimmy Wilkerson was All-Big 12 for the second straight year. In '01, the ends combined for 21 tackles for loss, including 18 by Wilkerson.
- Under Wright's guidance, All-Big 12 receiver Mike Adams broke every UT record in 1996.
- $\bullet$  In 1991, his secondary ranked No. 1 in the nation in pass efficiency defense.
- Developed freshman Texas K Phil Dawson, a first

team All-SWC honoree and Groza semifinalist, into the top-ranked kicker in the nation.

- His 1995 receiving unit was the best in the SWC when it averaged 16.8 yards per catch (107 catches for 1,796 yards and 10 TD). It featured first team All-SWC performer Mike Adams, the SWC's leading receiver.
- Helped lead North Texas to a 1983 conference crown and the I-AA playoffs.
- Was on the coaching staff that led Texas A&I to the 1979 Division II national title.



### **Coaching Accomplishments**

- The 2006 offense was balanced with 2,480 rushing yards and 2,2,682 passing yards. Three different running backs logged 100-yard games and QB Paul Thompson put up numbers that ranked among the top 10 in school history for passing yards, touchdown passes, and completion percentage. OU ranked No. 19 nationally in scoring offense; No. 17 in rushing offense.
- The 2005 line produced consensus All-Big 12 pick Davin Joseph as Adrian Peterson again eclipsed 1,000 rushing yards. Three freshmen were integrated as starters.
- In 2004, the line, featuring Outland winner Jammal Brown and Walter Camp All-American and Rimington Award finalist Vince Carter, cleared the way for Heisman runner-up Adrian Peterson's 1,925 rushing yards while allowing a Big 12-low nine sacks.
- The 2004 Sooners, featuring Wes Sims, a sixth-round draft choice by the Chargers, and All-Big 12 pick Joseph, were No. 8 in total offense and averaged 34.8 points.

- The 2003 team ranked No. 3 nationally with 42.9 points/game and No. 19 with 439.4 yards of total offense/game.
- In 2002, the line had four honorees as Quentin Griffin fell 13 yards shy of OU's season rushing record.
- As Northwestern's offensive coordinator, the 2001 Wildcats led the Big 10 in total offense and QB Zac Kustok was conference leader in that same category.
- In 2000, Northwestern set 25 school marks while ranking No. 3 nationally in total offense. The co-Big Ten champs were led by Damian Anderson, who rushed for a Big Ten record 193.6 yards per game.
- Finalist for the 2000 Broyles Award.
- Has helped produce 14 1,000-yard rushers. At OU, both Peterson (1,925 yards in 2004, 1,024 in 2005) and Griffin (1,884 yards in 2002) worked under Wilson.

# **CALE GUNDY**

RECRUITING COORDINATOR/RUNNING BACKS | NINTH SEASON

### **Coaching Accomplishments**

- In 2006, three different OU running backs logged 100-yard games, including true freshman Chris Brown, as the team piled up 177.4 rushing yards per game.
- In 2005, he coached his third 1,000-yard rusher and saw two different backs log 100-yard games for the second straight season.
- In 2004, coached his second 1,000-yard rusher in the last three years in Adrian Peterson. Peterson set a school season record and NCAA freshman rushing record with 1,925 yards.
- Also tutored Kejuan Jones, who rushed for more than 2,000 yards during his career.
- Adept at securing the ball, Gundy's 2004 backs logged 48 receptions for 377 yards and rarely lost a fumble (OU lost only nine as a team).

- In 2003, Oklahoma's running backs were charged with just two fumbles lost.

Griffin, a consensus All-Big 12 first team selection, became the first Sooner to surpass 1,000 yards since 1998 and also finished his career as the school's second-leading receiver. He caught one pass in an OU record 29 consecutive games.
- No OU back lost a fumble in 2002.

- OU backs fumbled just twice during the 2001 season, all in the first three games.
- In 2000, OU backs produced 32 rushing TDs, up from 15 in 1999. First team All-Big 12 Quentin Griffin scored 16 of those, second most in the conference. His six TDs against Texas set a Sooner record.

### **Coaching Accomplishments**

- His 2006 receiving corps hauled in 17 touchdown grabs. Malcolm Kelly recorded one of the top seasons in school history and reached 1,000 career receiving yards faster than any player in school history.
- In 2005, the OU tight ends accounted for three of the team's nine touchdown receptions, while the special teams witnessed the emergence of P Cody Freeby, who ranked No. 18 nationally. The Sooners were No. 10 in net punting. Also on the special teams, return specialist Reggie Smith made a mark as a true freshman, leading the team with a 20.9-yard average on 18 attempts.
- OU's tight ends became a more integral part of the Sooner offensive scheme in Sumlin's second season (2004). The group went from 18 receptions for 219 yards and two touchdowns in 14 games of the 2003 season to 23 catches for 226 yards and four touchdowns in 12 games.
- Became Texas A&M's offensive coordinator after the third game of the 2002 season. Prior to the switch, the Aggies had scored just 48 points in three games (16.0 per), but afterwards, A&M put 297 points on the board, or 33.0 per contest. The offense averaged 419 yards per game after just netting 286 in the first three contests.
- Purdue's 1998 receivers set school records with 377 receptions for 4,208 yards and 43 TD.

 Chris Daniels set a Big Ten record with 121 catches and recorded another Big Ten record with 21 receptions in one game.





### **Coaching Accomplishments**

- Had one of his least experienced groups in 2006, but the defensive interior was strong. OU was second in the Big 12 and No. 16 nationally against the rush.
- The 2005 season was another stellar campaign for OU's defensive interior. Dusty Dvoracek was a consensus All-Big 12 selection after leading the nation's DTs in tackles for loss with 19. The Sooners ranked No. 4 in rushing defense.
- Despite losing a pair of All-Americans and featuring one transfer and two freshmen in the rotation in 2004, he crafted a defensive interior that showed perhaps more improvement than any area on the team during the course of the season.
- In 2003 he coached Tommie Harris, the winner of the Rotary Lombardi Award and a consensus All-American. Harris also was a finalist for the Nagurski and Bednarik Awards. He also coached All-Big 12 DT Dusty Dvoracek in 2003.

Head Athletic Trainer Scott Anderson, his staff and the team physicians comprise the professional staff. Anderson was named 2005 Trainer of the Year by the National Athletics Trainers' Association and 2004 Trainer of the Year by the All-American Football Foundation.

Brock Schnebel, M.D., Head Team Physician for the 2000 United States Olympic Team, directs OU's physician staff. Don McGinnis, M.D., serves an Olympic Team assignment in addition to his responsibilities with the Oklahoma Athletics Department.

E. Randy Eichner, M.D., Team Internist, is internationally recognized for his expertise in medicine issues related to sports. Martin Tippie, M.D., completes the Sooners' primary physician staff.

The state-of-the-art Henry J. Freede Sports Medicine Complex in the Barry Switzer Center provides a convenient location for the Sooners to receive their care.

The Sports Medicine Staff provides consistent service on a daily basis which includes injury prevention and acute care, post-injury rehabilitation, x-ray, and physician assessment.

Jim Hillis, a Registered Physical Therapist and Certified/Licensed Athletic Trainer, coordinates all rehabilitation protocols.

The combination of the staff and facility provide the care that is vital to a championship program. OU's facility is equipped with SwimEx aquatic therapy, isokinetic rehabilitation and testing equipment, along with cardiovascular and exercise equipment that offers the ability to manage the multi-level needs of OU's student-athletes.

**NORMAN, Okla.** -- Adrian Peterson rushed for one touchdown and caught another as Oklahoma withstood a stubborn UAB team, 24-17. A crowd of 84,555, the largest ever to see an OU opener, witnessed the game.

Like the 2005 opener, when the Sooners lost to TCU, 17-10, Oklahoma committed four turnovers. Peterson had one of those, a fumble, but atoned with a four-yard touchdown run and a 69-yard TD reception.

Paul Thompson got the start at quarterback and was impressive. He completed eight of his first 10 passes and finished 14-of-24 for 227 yards. He was picked off twice, but also had a pair of scoring tosses.

OU trailed only once, 17-14, but scored on its first play after falling behind on the swing pass from Thompson to Peterson.

The two teams combined for just 110 plays, a record for fewest plays in a game over the last 50 seasons.

In particular, the touching of the ball and awarding of possession on an Oregon onside kick with 1:06 remaining drew outcry from Oklahoma and many national media. The Pacific 10 Conference later acknowledge the errors and reprimanded the officiating crew.

The Ducks rallied from a 13-point deficit over the final 3:12, then blocked OU's potential game-winning field goal on the final play.

Adrian Peterson starred for the Sooners. He rushed 34 times for 211 yards and one touchdown in the game. He was particularly impressive in the fourth guarter when he gained 145 yards.

Oklahoma trailed early, then built a 33-20 lead in the fourth quarter. A defense that had played well through the second and third periods, faltered in the fourth and wound up surrendering 501 yards on the day.

Adrian Peterson rushed 25 times for 109 yards and one touchdown against the nation's No. 3-ranked run defense. Paul Thompson completed 15-of-27 passes for 209 yards. He was picked off twice, but those interceptions came on the last two OU drives when the offense was in desperation mode.

Texas won by playing almost error free. The Longhorns did not commit a turnover and were penalized just three times for 30 yards.

It was the 101st meeting in the series. A crowd of 76,260, the second largest ever to witness the game, was in attendance.

STILLWATER, Okla. -- An Oklahoma team defined by its grittiness all year, used two of its toughest elements -- a relentless ground game and a stifling defense -- to notch its fourth straight win over Oklahoma State, 27-21, and its eventh consecutive trimumph overall.

The win ran the OU advatage to 78-16-7 in the nation's most lop-sdided series betweeen in-state opponents.

Allen Patrick, who had missed the previous two games with an ankle injury, carried 23 times for 163 yards. His first carry of the second half went off tackle for 65 yards and a touchdown.

The Sooner defense held OSU 15.6 points under its scoring average and more than 51 yards under its total offense average.

OU twice held 13-point leads in the second half. The Cowboys missed an opportunity to cut into those early in the fourth quarter when quarterback Zac Robinson, on a fourth-and-goal play, was stood up at the Sooner 1. He fumbled into the end zone and the ball was recovered by Oklahoma's Demarrio Pleasant.

Coupled with Texas' loss to Texas A&M one day earlier, the win gave Oklahoma the Big 12 South Division title and a berth in the Dr. Pepper Big 12 Championship Game.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. -- Ninety-nine yards and a defense as unyielding as the chilly temperatures were the difference when Oklahoma posted a decisive 21-7 win over Nebraska in the Dr Pepper Big 12 Conference Championship.

A crowd of 80,031, the largest in the history of the game, watched the Sooners claim their 40th conference crown and their fourth since the inception of the Big 12 (2000, 2002, 2004, 2006).

Leading 14-7 in the third quarter and mired inside their own 16 for a third consecutive drive, OU set sail on what Bob Stoops called, "the drive of the year."

Oklahoma marched 99 yards in 11 plays for a touchdown even though the first two snaps netted nothing. Finally, on a third-and-10, Paul Thompson hit Jermaine Gresham for 35 yards and the Sooners had their springboard. It was the first of five straight completions for Thompson, who, after misfiring on one throw, tossed a three-yard fade to Malcolm Kelly for the touchdown.

Kelly had eight grabs for 142 yards, the latter of which set a Big 12 title game record. He also scored twice.

On defense, Oklahoma shut down a Cornhusker team that was averaging 34 points per game. Nebraska started three drives in Sooner territory and another three at its own 47, 49 and 43, yet managed just one touchdown on a 23-yard drive following an OU turnover.

NU quarterback Zac Taylor threw a season-high three interceptions and was sacked three times.

**GLENDALE, Ariz.** -- Ninth-ranked Boise State completed a perfect season with a 43-42 overtime victory over No. 7 Oklahoma in the Fiesta Bowl.

In one of the most dramatic finishes in BCS history, the Sooners and the Broncos combined for 22 points in the final 86 seconds of regulation. OU recovered from an 18-point deficit midway through the third quarter to twice take seven-point leads.

The Broncos appeared to be finished when OU cornerback Marcus Walker intercepted Jared Zabransky's pass and returned it 33 yards for a touchdown to put the Sooners ahead 35-28 with 1:02 remaining. Boise State's trick play that resulted in a 50-yard touchdown on fourth-and-18 in the final seconds of regulation sent the game to overtime.

Oklahoma's Adrian Peterson opened the overtime with a 25-yard touchdown run, his final collegiate play. After missing seven games to injury, he carried 20 times for 77 yards and two scores.

The Broncos answered with Vinny Perretta's fourth-down TD pass to Derek Schouman. On a two-point conversion, Zabransky handed the ball behind his back to lan Johnson, who raced untouched into the end zone.





## The University of Oklahoma History

Created by the Oklahoma Territorial Legislature in 1890, the University of Oklahoma is a doctoral degree-granting research university serving the educational, cultural, economic and health care needs of the state, region and nation.

The Norman campus serves as home to all of the university's academic programs except health-related fields. Both the Norman and Health Sciences Center colleges offer programs at the Schusterman Center, the site of OU-Tulsa.

The OU Health Sciences Center, which is located in Oklahoma City, is one of only four comprehensive academic health centers in the nation with seven professional colleges.

OU enrolls nearly 30,000 students, has more than 2,000 full-time faculty members, and has 20 colleges offering 152 majors at the baccalaureate level, 160 majors at the master's level, 80 majors at the doctoral level, 38 majors at the first professional level, and 18 graduate certificates. The university's annual operating budget is \$1.2 billion. The University of Oklahoma is an equal opportunity institution.

### **Mission Statement**

The mission of the University of Oklahoma is to provide the best possible educational experience for our students through excellence in teaching, research and creative activity, and service to the state and society.

### What Do You Know About OU?

- OU is number one in the nation per capita among public universities in the number of National Merit Scholars enrolled. Seven hundred National Merit Scholars currently are enrolled at OU.
- The University of Oklahoma ranks in the top 10 in the nation in the Freshman Year Experience, according to a national study by the Policy Center on the First Year of College. The study recognizes OU's initiatives for first-year students and its commitment to put students first.
- OU is included on *Princeton Review's* "Top 10 Best Value Public Colleges" list, which ranks the best colleges in the nation based on academic excellence and cost to students — the University of California-Berkeley and University of Virginia-Charlottesville were among others selected.
- OU is one of only 10 universities in the nation with four Goldwater Scholars, including colleges such as Dartmouth, Williams and Duke.
- OU is the highest ranked public university in the history of Oklahoma. The latest *U.S. News and World Report* rankings place OU in the top tier among national public universities.
- OU has over a \$1.5 billion impact on the state's economy each year.
- OU ranks first in the Big 12 and at the top in the nation in international exchange agreements with countries around the world. The University has 150 student exchange agreements with universities in 60 countries. Fourteen hundred students from 95 countries are enrolled on OU's Norman campus.
- OU is in the top five in the nation among all comprehensive public universities in the graduation of Rhodes Scholars.
- OU this fall became one of the few public universities in the nation to cap the class size of first-year English composition courses at no more than 19 students.
- The University has created an Honors College with one of the largest honors programs among public universities in the United States. Fourteen hundred students participate in small classes of 19 or less.
- Just one year after launching a five-year, \$50 million Campaign for Scholarship endowments, OU achieved its goal, allowing the university to award hundreds of new scholarships this fall and ensuring that OU will remain affordable and keep open the door of opportunity for all qualified students.
- OU's private endowment has more than quadrupled since 1994, growing from \$204 million to more than \$850 million.



- OU continues to break private fund-raising records, with more than \$1 billion in gifts and pledges over the past decade, which has provided funding for dramatic capital improvements, the growth in faculty endowment and student scholarships.
- Due to OU's increased private support during the past 11 years, the number of endowed faculty positions has quadrupled, increasing from 100 to 407, helping to retain and attract talented faculty members.
- Over the past decade, research and sponsored programs expenditures at OU have more than doubled, and OU continues to set new records for funding for externally sponsored research and will reach almost \$250 million this year.



- The OU Health Sciences Center in FY 2004 continued its impressive rate of research growth by achieving more than \$124 million in federal, state, corporate and non-profit or foundation grants and contracts.
   Funding from the National Institutes of Health — considered to be the gold standard for research — was nearly \$53 million.
- Since 1994, almost \$1 billion in construction projects have been completed or are under way on OU's three campuses, the largest of which is the \$67 million National Weather Center.
- OU is home to one of the two largest natural history museums in the world associated with a university. The Sam Noble Oklahoma Museum of Natural History has more than 5 million artifacts and contains 198,000 square feet on 60 acres of land. The museum exhibits include the largest Apatosaurus on display in the world and the oldest work of art ever found in North America a lightning bolt painted on an extinct bison skull.
- The Fred Jones Jr. Museum of Art's collections total more than 8,000 works of art, including OU's Weitzenhoffer Collection of French Impressionism, the single most important gift of art ever given to a U.S. public university, major works by the Taos Colony of artists; the former U.S. State Department Embassy art collection; and the Dorothy Dunn collection of Native American art.
- OU's Western History Collection is one of the largest collections in the world of documents and photographs, including a rare multi-volume portfolio on the Indians of the United States and Alaska by Edward S. Curtis.
- OU's Research Campus has been certified by the Oklahoma
  Department of Commerce as Site Ready, which enables the university
  to capitalize on fast-moving economic opportunities and enables site
  selectors to readily find quality land and facilities that meet nationally
  established criteria in a timely fashion.
- A major beautification campaign has transformed the appearance of the OU Health Sciences Center in Oklahoma City. The project has replaced a divided highway through campus with seven tiered gardens featuring traditional OU arches at each end. The new pedestrian walkway's landmarks include an OU Seed Sower sculpture at the west end, a clock tower at the east end, and a 70-foot granite fountain in the center.
- OU has strong programs in international and area studies, with an International Programs Center led by former U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations Edward Perkins.
- A diverse student community is a priority at OU. OU ranks number one in the Big 12 in Native American enrollment and continues to be one of the leaders in enrollment of Latin American, Asian American and African American students.
- The University of Oklahoma maintains one of the three most important collections of early manuscripts in the history of science in the United States. It includes Galileo's own copy of his work, which first used the telescope to support the Copernican theory, with corrections in his own handwriting.
- OU President David Boren, a former U.S. senator and governor of Oklahoma, teaches an introductory course in political science each semester, and keeps in close touch with students.



# **ADMINISTRATION**



David L. Boren, who has served Oklahoma as governor and U.S. senator, became the thirteenth president of the University of Oklahoma in November 1994. He is the first person in state history to have served in all three positions.

Boren is widely respected for his academic credentials, his longtime support of education, and for his distinguished political career as a reformer of the American political system. A graduate of Yale University in 1963, Boren majored in American history, graduated in the top one percent of his class and was elected Phi Beta Kappa. He was selected as a Rhodes Scholar and earned a master's degree in politics, philosophy and economics from Oxford University, England, in 1965.

In 1968, he received a law degree from the University of Oklahoma College of Law, where he was on the *Law Review*, elected to the Order of the Coif, and won the Bledsoe Prize as the outstanding graduate by a vote of the faculty.

As Oklahoma's governor from 1974 through 1978, Boren promoted key educational initiatives that have had an enduring impact on Oklahoma. Established during his tenure were: the Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute, the Scholar-Leadership Enrichment Program, and the Oklahoma Physicians Manpower Training Program, which provides scholarships for medical students and medical personnel who commit to practice in underserved rural areas. Also, the first state funding for Gifted and Talented classes was provided in 1976 and, from 1976 through 1978, Oklahoma ranked first among all states in the percentage increases of funding for higher education.

One of Boren's most far-reaching projects in promoting quality education at all levels is the Oklahoma Foundation for Excellence, which he founded in 1985. The foundation recognizes outstanding public school students and teachers and helps establish private local foundations to help give academic endowment grants to local public schools.

As a senator, he was the author of the National Security Education Act in 1992, which provides scholarships for study abroad and for learning additional languages, as well as legislation to restore the tax deductibility of gifts of appreciated property to universities in 1993.

Boren, also a former state legislator, spent nearly three decades in elective politics before becoming the president of the University of Oklahoma. Boren was the youngest governor in the nation when he served from 1974 to 1978. Known as a reformer, Boren campaigned with a broom as his symbol. During his term, he instituted many progressive

programs, including conflict-of-interest rules, campaign-financing disclosure, stronger open meeting laws for public bodies, and more competitive bidding on state government contracts.

During his time in the U.S. Senate -- from 1979 to 1994 -- Boren was the longest-serving chairman of the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence. From his days as a state legislator and governor of Oklahoma to Washington, Boren carried a commitment to reform, leading numerous efforts to make government work better for American citizens. As chairman of the Senate Intelligence Committee, he strengthened oversight of secret government programs and reformed the procedures for Presidential notice of such programs to Congress. For more than 10 years, he led the fight for congressional campaign finance reform.

Boren left the U.S. Senate in 1994 with an approval rating of 9l percent after being reelected with 83 percent of the vote in 1990, the highest percentage in the nation in a U.S. Senate contest in that election year.

Boren served from 1988 to 1997 as a member of the Yale University Board of Trustees. His university experience also includes four years on the faculty of Oklahoma Baptist University, where he was chairman of the Department of Political Science and chairman of the Division of Social Sciences. In 1993, the American Association of University Professors presented Boren with the Henry Yost Award as Education Advocate of the Year.

Under Boren's leadership, the University of Oklahoma has developed and emerged as a "pacesetter university in American public higher education," with 20 major new programs initiated since his inauguration. They include establishment of the Honors College, a new expository writing program for freshmen modeled on the program at Harvard, an interdisciplinary religious studies program, a new International Programs Center, and the Faculty-in-Residence Program putting faculty family apartments in student residence halls. The Retired Professors Program has been started, bringing 50 retired full professors back to the University to teach freshmen. The new Honors College helps to assure that no students need to leave Oklahoma to find an educational experience to match their potential.

Over \$700 million in facilities construction has been initiated during his tenure. During his first decade over \$1 billion in private contributions were given to the university and the university contributor base was increased from 17,000 donors to almost 100,000.

Presidential Travel Scholarships, students from 111 countries on campus, more reciprocal international exchange agreements than any other university and the new International Programs Center are all making OU more international.

Above all, the Boren years have been marked by an emphasis on putting students first. There is not a university president in the country that is more committed to students as his number one priority. He teaches a freshman-level course in political science each semester and is one of the few presidents of major universities to teach.

Boren is married to Molly Shi Boren, a former judge and English teacher. Molly Boren has two degrees from the University of Oklahoma, a master's degree in English and a Juris Doctor degree from the OU College of Law. Mrs. Boren is actively involved in university life and has led the landscaping effort on all three OU campuses. Boren has two children, Carrie Christine Boren and Dan Boren.

## Joe Castiglione

Director of Athletics, The University of Oklahoma

In eight years, Joe Castiglione has established a pattern of excellence that few in his profession can match. While Castiglione would quickly point out that the credit belongs to the student-athletes and coaches, the staff and the university administration, the donors and the fans, someone had to make the first step, to take the lead. Following the slogan "Inspiring champions today ... Preparing leaders for tomorrow," Castiglione has authored one of the most successful athletics eras ever witnessed at OU, one that includes an expansion of facilities that is unmatched in Sooner history.

His peers have recognized his success at OU. In October 2004, he was named Athletics Director of the Year by the Bobby Dodd Foundation. In 2003, he was inducted into the National Association of Collegiate Marketing Administrators Hall of Fame. In June 2001, he received the General Robert R. Neyland Athletic Director Award for lifetime achievement from the All-American Football Foundation. In 2000, he was named the Central Region AD of the Year by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA).

The 11th director of athletics at the University of Oklahoma has celebrated six national team championships and numerous conference team titles; record numbers of graduating student-athletes and record-setting grade point averages for Sooner teams; dramatically increased donor giving; huge increases in ticket sales for all sports; major facility improvements, and development and construction of new facilities. And, as aggressive as the push to improve, expand and excel has been, he has produced a balanced budget in every year of his tenure, a first since the early 1980s.

Other highlights of Castiglione's tenure include:

- Six consecutive years among the top 25 in the standings for the Director's Cup which measures overall athletics success, including an all-time program best of 15th in 2003-2004.
- Twenty OU teams have ranked among the top 10 in season-ending polls.
- A school-record and Big 12 best graduation rate of 74% in 2003.
- Three appearances in the BCS National Championship Game and the college football national championship in 2000.
- Appearances by the men's and women's basketball teams in their respective Final Fours in 2002.
- A Division I record of 74 combined victories produced by the football team and both basketball squads in the 2001-02 school year.
- An average of more than 17 OU teams per year represented in postseason play

Credited with energizing OU's fund-raising efforts, Castiglione was instrumental in the athletics department's major campaign, Great Expectations: The Campaign For Sooner Sports. The campaign ended in November of 2003 with more than \$125 million raised or pledged. Unique in its approach, the largest fund-raising effort in OU athletics history included projects that impact each of OU's nearly 500 student-athletes and has become a national model for intercollegiate athletics.

Castiglione has cultivated numerous million dollar gifts, including the largest capital gifts in history for athletics at OU, and some of the largest ever for the university as a whole. He has driven dramatic facilities projects, including a \$70 million project at Gaylord Family-Oklahoma Memorial Stadium. Others include a \$17.2 million renovation of Lloyd Noble Center; phase I of The Headington Family Tennis Complex; John Jacobs Field; the Everest Training Facility, one of the largest indoor practice areas in the country; and Phase II of the soccer-tennis complex. Other projects completed in his tenure have included the redesign of the Sooner football practice fields; the Port Robertson Wrestling

Facility; phase I of the Sooner Soccer Complex and John Crain Field as well as additional renovations to the McCasland Field House; L. Dale Mitchell Park, the Charlie Coe Golf Learning Center, the OU Softball Complex and Barry Switzer Center. His administrative work, which has seen significant reorganization and the hiring of nine head coaches, also included the negotiation of multi-million dollar multi-media rights contract that produces more than \$5 million in annual revenue for the athletics department.

Castiglione was hired on April 30, 1998, after serving as athletics director at Missouri. In his 18-year career with the Tigers, Castiglione, who was named director of athletics at Missouri on Dec. 15, 1993, was credited with rebuilding sports programs, hiring outstanding coaches, devising a master plan for facilities, inspiring record-setting increases in fund-raising and balancing the budget in each of his five years as athletics director.

A 1979 Maryland graduate, Castiglione began his career as the sports promotions director at Rice. He then worked a year as director of athletic fund-raising at Georgetown before being hired in 1981 at Missouri as director of communications and marketing.

Active on the national and conference level, he is currently serving on the Board of Directors for the Collegiate Women Sports Awards, the Gatorade Collegiate Advisory Board, and the National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame. Recently, he was named to the executive committee of the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame. He served two terms as chair of the Big 12 Board of Athletics Directors and is a past president of the Division I-A Athletic Directors Association and NACDA. He served a four-year term on the NCAA Championship/Competition Cabinet and the NCAA Baseball Committee and is a past member of the NCAA Football Special Events Certification Committee. He recently agreed to serve on the NCAA Diversity Leadership Strategic Planning Committee and the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Discussion Group.

A native of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., Castiglione was born Oct. 8, 1957. He is married to the former Kristen Bartel, a 1990 graduate of the University of Missouri. They are the parents of two sons, Joseph Robert, Jr., born on December 20, 1996, and Jonathan Edmund, born on March 21, 2000.
