The University

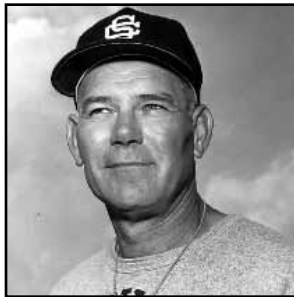
Founded in 1893, Southern Connecticut State University is in the midst of a \$230 million building program. Southern comprises six academic schools: the School of Arts and Sciences; the School of Business; the School of Education; the School of Communication, Information and Library Science; the School of Professional Studies; and the School of Graduate Studies and Continuing Education.

The key to Southern's academic excellence is its faculty. In addition, the University has developed outstanding facilities including an extensive library, science center, and a new student center and residence hall.

Though committed to academics, Southern recognizes the lasting value of informal extracurricular activities for its students. By balancing solid classroom learning with a variety of clubs, sports and interest groups, Southern helps students grow to meet the social, intellectual, cultural and moral demands of the modern world.

Jess Dow

The founder of the Southern Connecticut athletic program established the Owls' football program and served as head coach from 1948-65. He was recognized as one of the nation's outstanding coaches, with 15 winning seasons and a won-lost-tied record of 108-40-6 (.721). His teams lost only once in a season seven different times and his 1956 squad is still the only unbeaten-untied (9-0-0) team in Owls' history.



After retiring as football coach, Dow continued to serve as director of athletics until 1975. A former Little All-America fullback at West Texas State who played with the Philadelphia Eagles for three seasons, Dow also coached Southern teams in track, basketball, baseball and golf.

MEDIA INFORMATION

2010 Media Guide

The 2010 Southern Connecticut State University Football Media Guide is produced as a source of information for the media. Supplementary materials can be obtained either on the Web at www.southernctowls.com or by contacting the athletic communications office.

Working Press Credentials

Press and photograph credentials are issued to members of the working media only. These credentials can be obtained from Michael Kobylanski, associate director of athletics/communications. Passes should be requested no later than 24 hours prior to a contest to ensure space availability.

Media Parking

All members of the media should plan to arrive at least 30 minutes before the opening kickoff to ensure parking availability. There is reserved parking available for members of the media located in close proximity to Jess Dow Field.

Press Box Facilities/Services

The press box at Jess Dow Field is accessible via the press box entryways located at the top of the main grandstand. Per NCAA regulations, only credentialed members of the media, coaches, league officials and designated administrators are allowed into the press area. All members of the working media will be provided with extensive game notes, statistics and rosters approximately 90 minutes before each contest. Statistics will be provided at halftime, while a complete statistical package will be distributed immediately following the contest.

Post-Game Interviews

Interviews with SCSU student-athletes and head coach Rich Cavanaugh will take place on the field following a 10-minute cooling-off period. The SCSU locker room is closed to the media for both home and road games. A member of the athletic communications staff can assist you with the interview process. Interviews with opposing players must be arranged with the opposing team's SID. Reporters can file from the press box following the conclusion of competition.

Interview Policies

Interview requests are coordinated through the athletic communications office. Requests must be made at least one day in advance to allow the player/coach to be properly notified. At no time will the player's dormitory telephone number be released to the media. However, if a telephone interview is necessary, arrangements can be made for the student-athlete to contact that member of the media. The preferred interview time to request head coach Rich Cavanaugh is from 9 a.m.-noon during the season.

All student-athletes and coaches are available for interviews prior to, or following, practice with proper notification to the athletic communications office. Over the course of the past 25 seasons, Southern Connecticut State University football coach Rich Cavanaugh has left an indelible mark on one of the most storied programs in New England. The winningest and longest tenured head coach in program history, he has only built on the outstanding tradition that was in place when he assumed the duties in 1985.

Entering his 26th season leading the Owls, Cavanaugh guided SCSU its second Northeast-10 Conference Championship in the last four years in 2008. In the process, the Owls posted their 17th winning season under Cavanaugh's guidance.

In the process, Cavanaugh mentored 13 All-Northeast-10 Conference selections, four All-ECAC honorees, one All-Region performer, one All-New England selection and one Northeast-10 Conference All-Academic team pick. Three student-athletes were selected to play in the East Coast Bowl and two in the Cactus Bowl at the conclusion of the year.

The Owls also excelled in the classroom, as the team had 36 selections to the Northeast-10 Conference Commissioner's Honor Roll.

In 2008, Cavanaugh led the Owls to their fourth straight NCAA Division II playoff appearance. Despite a host of injuries to numerous key personnel, Cavanaugh and his staff pulled together a seven-game winning streak to close the regular season and ultimately clinch a spot in the field.

Cavanaugh reached another coaching milestone on Oct. 25, 2008, when he led the Owls to a 40-17 win at Pace. As a result of the win, the Owls secured Cavanaugh's 16th winning season as head coach of the program. In the process, he surpassed the legendary Jess Dow for the most winning campaigns in program history. Dow posted 15 winning years in a coaching run that spanned from 1948-65.

For his efforts, Cavanaugh was selected as the 2008 Northeast-10 Conference Coach of the Year. On the individual front, the Owls also boasted one All-American, four All-Region, four All-ECAC, two All-New England and 14 All-Conference performers. SCSU also had the Conference Offensive and Defensive Players of the Year, as well as the Conference Offensive Lineman of the Year.

In 2007, Cavanaugh's team matched the school record for victories in a season and has set numerous additional school

marks. A total of 12 players earned All-Northeast-10 honors, with another four earning All-Northeast Region honors and two taking home All-New England honors.

The Owls also produced three All-Americans in 2007, a program single-season high.

The 2006 season was another outstanding campaign for the Owls. SCSU earned a share of the Northeast-10 Championship and a berth in the NCAA Division II playoffs. The Owls closed the season with a 7-4 record, marking the fifth straight year with at least seven victories.

Following the regular season, nine players were recognized with All-Northeast-10 honors. In addition, two players were named All-Northeast Region, with another taking home All-New England accolades.

Cavanaugh, whose teams have posted a 151-108-1 record, led Southern to its first berth in the NCAA Division II championship playoffs in 2005. The Owls closed the campaign with an 8-3 mark.

Fifteen players were tabbed for All-Northeast-10 honors after a benchmark campaign.

Equally as impressive are Cavanaugh's overall accomplishments during a stint that has spanned more than two decades. The Owls have posted 16 straight seasons with records at or above .500 - the longest such streak in program history.

Over the last 15 seasons, Cavanaugh has guided the Owls to a 111-49 mark.

Furthermore, the Owls have enjoyed some of their most productive offensive seasons ever with Cavanaugh at the helm, including new records for rushing, passing and total offense yardage.

During Cavanaugh's career, numerous players have earned various honors as they have filtered through the storied program.

Since the formation of the Northeast-10, 124 players have been recognized with All-League accolades. Sixty-five players have taken home All-New England honors, with 49 individuals garnering All-ECAC accolades.

Cavanaugh has also coached 12 All-Americans, seven All-Northeast Region picks, six Offensive Players of the Year, three Rookies of the Year, three Defensive Players of the Year, two Defensive Linemen of the Year, two Division II-III Gold Helmet Award winners (Jim Lukowiak in 2005 and Steve Armstrong in 2007), two Offensive Linemen of the Year and one Northeast-10 Most Valuable Player.

Prior to being named head coach, Cavanaugh served for three seasons as Southern's offensive coordinator with head coach Kevin Gilbride (1982-84). The Owls posted a 24-7 (.774) mark during that stretch.

He joined the staff after three successful seasons as head coach at Branford (Conn.) High School. His 1981 squad registered an 8-3 mark and reached the Connecticut

MIKE DODGE
Defensive Coordinator
27th Season
Southern Connecticut '83

Affiliated with SCSU and its football family for nearly three decades, Mike Dodge is entering his 27th season on the Owls staff. The team's defensive coordinator and senior assistant, Dodge has formed one of the stingiest units in the region during the course of his tenure.

Forty-four defensive players have earned All-Northeast-10 honors since the Owls joined the league in 1997. Furthermore, three players have taken home Defensive Player of the Year honors, and another two Defensive Lineman of the Year accolades.

A 1983 graduate of SCSU, Dodge played four years (1979-82) as a member of the secondary. The Owls registered a 23-15-2 (.600) record during his playing career.

Prior to taking over as defensive coordinator, Dodge coached the defensive backfield for four seasons.

He also has coaching experience at the scholastic level, having served as an assistant coach under former Owls defensive back Mike Guy at his alma mater, Housatonic Valley Regional High. As a student-athlete, he was football captain and a member of the basketball and track teams. Dodge is a 2008 inductee into the Housatonic Valley Regional Athletic Hall of Fame.

He holds both bachelor's and master's degrees from SCSU.

Dodge resides in North Haven with his wife, Lisa, a former Southern gymnast, and their sons, Thomas, Nicholas and Matthew.



TOM GODEK
Offensive Coordinator
10th Season
Southern Connecticut '88

Tom Godek, now in his 10th season as offensive coordinator, has taken the Owls offensive attack to new heights. The former SCSU offensive tackle brings extensive experience as a coach and student-athlete at the collegiate levels.

A total of 56 players on the offensive side of the ball have been recognized with All-Northeast-10 honors since Godek joined the staff in 2001.

In addition, the Owls have shattered numerous offensive marks along the way. Since his arrival, the club accumulated new season highs for total yards, rushing yards, passing yards, touchdowns scored and points scored, along with a new program record for total offense in one game.

Signed by the New York Jets as a free agent after the conclusion of a stellar playing career at SCSU (1984-87), Godek was a two-time All-New England selection. As a senior, he served as team captain and also took home All-ECAC honors.

Prior to joining the staff at his alma mater, Godek coached for seven seasons (1994-2000) at American International College as offensive line coach and assistant to the head coach.

While with the Yellow Jackets, Godek helped the club win four division titles en route to four consecutive Northeast-10 Conference Championship appearances. AIC claimed the conference title on two occasions.

He also coached two NE-10 Offensive Linemen of the Year, along with 1999 Harlon Hill Trophy runner-up Kavin Gaillard.

Godek holds a bachelor's degree in history from SCSU and later earned a master's degree in education at AIC.

He resides in Ludlow, Mass., with his wife, Lisa, daughter, Emily and son, Stephen.

Entering his 11th season on the SCSU coaching staff, former SCSU standout tight end Dan Parady will now serve as the team's running backs coach after previously handling the wide receivers. He is a veteran of more than a decade of coaching experience at various levels.

Parady joined the Owls after previous collegiate stops at Marist College and Maine Maritime Academy. While at Marist, he helped the Red Foxes claim the 1994 Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Championship.

Parady also coached for three years in France's professional league. As the defensive coordinator of AIX-En-Provence, he played an integral role in an undefeated season (12-0 in 1995) and an appearance in EuroBowl X in 1996 - which came on the heels of a national championship.

He also has scholastic experience at three Connecticut schools - Seymour, Sheehan and his alma mater, Notre Dame of West Haven.

A 1992 graduate of SCSU, Parady played four years for the Owls from 1988-91. He also holds a master's degree from the University of New England.

Parady and his wife, Heather, reside in Bridgeport, Conn. with their daughters, Rose, Lily and Holly. He also teaches history at Bridgeport Central High.

An All-America offensive tackle for the Owls, Ron Lecointe is in his seventh season as defensive line coach.

Over the course of the past six seasons, Lecointe has played an instrumental role in developing players. At least one defensive lineman has earned All-Northeast-10 honors in each of the past six years. Lecointe also coached the 2005 NE-10 Defensive Lineman of the Year, Rashard Howard.

As an undergraduate, he was a two-time all-New England Division II selection in 1990 and 1991, serving as co-captain as a senior. Lecointe garnered Kodak/Coaches All-America honors in his senior season.

Lecointe earned his bachelor's degree from SCSU.

A native of the Bronx, N.Y., Lecointe also serves as Dean of Students at Hyde Leadership High School of Greater New Haven.

Lecointe is the father of a son, Eric.

Entering his ninth season as a member of the coaching staff, former SCSU offensive lineman Lenny Bonn handles the team's inside linebackers.

He rejoined the Owls in 2002 after a 14-year stint as head football coach at Branford (Conn.) High School. The Hornets were a formidable club in first the Housatonic League and later, the Southern Connecticut Conference, on an annual basis.

Bonn sent numerous players on to the collegiate ranks, including Connecticut State Player of the Year Remo Guarnieri, who moved on to become a team captain at Villanova.

Equally as impressive was the fact that Bonn produced numerous National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete honorees.

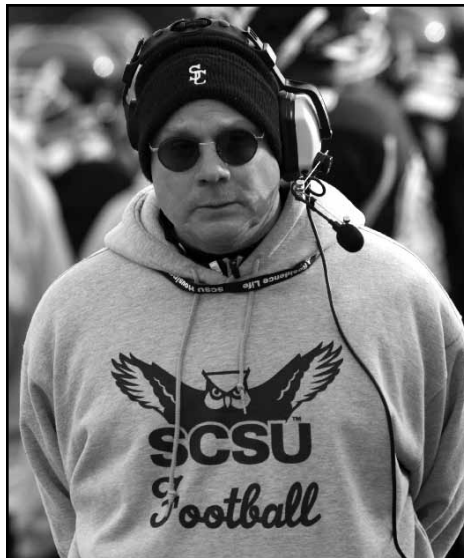
Prior to taking over at Branford, Bonn was an assistant coach at Notre Dame of West Haven from 1977-88.

He started his coaching career at SCSU, spending two years as a graduate assistant from 1976-77.

Bonn, who suited up for the Owls from 1972-75, earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from SCSU.

He resides in East Haven with his wife, the former Kathy Kadish, a school counselor at Notre Dame of West Haven and adjunct professor at SCSU. A standout with the Owls from 2003-05, Walter Gibbs enters his fourth year as a member of the coaching staff. He was an integral member of the 2005 squad that reached the NCAA Division II playoffs for the first time in program history. Gibbs earned All-New England and All-Northeast-10 honors as a senior.

Gibbs joined the SCSU staff with a strong coaching background at the scholastic level. He was an assistant coach on the staff at Hillhouse High School in New Haven, Conn. during its 2002 and 2006 State Championship seasons.

Gibbs also played scholastically at Hillhouse.

A New Haven native, he also currently resides in the city.

Ralph DeSantis is in his fourth year as the tight ends coach for the Owls. Prior to joining the staff, he spent seven years as a coach at his alma mater, Pomperaug High of Southbury, Conn.

DeSantis helped Pomperaug reach the CIAC State Playoffs on four occasions, including a state title in 2004. Pomperaug also claimed two South-West Conference crowns during his tenure.

DeSantis resides in Southbury.



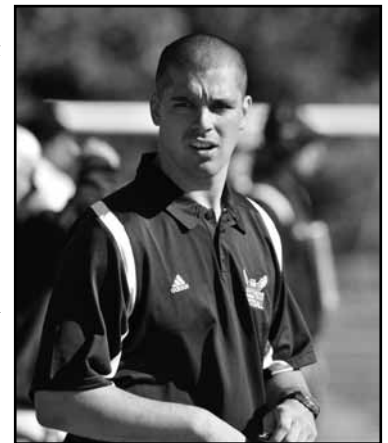
Chris Lorenti is in his second year as an assistant coach for the Owls and handles the team's inside linebackers

SEASON OUTLOOK

Fresh off its second Northeast-10 Conference championship in the last four years, the Southern Connecticut State football team will look to maintain its strong presence on the conference, regional and national scenes this fall.

The Owls have qualified for the NCAA Playoffs in four of the last five years and will look to chalk up another post-season appearance.

Twelve starters return off last year's squad that finished with a 6-4 overall mark. The mission now is to continue the program's standard of excellence.

"I'm excited about our football team as we prepare for the upcoming season," said head coach Rich Cavanaugh, who begins his 26th season guiding the Owls this fall. "We are focused on putting together another strong season, with the ultimate goals of competing for a Northeast-10 Conference Championship and a NCAA Playoff berth."

OFFENSE

Quarterbacks

After seeing various amounts of action in each of the past two seasons, junior Kevin Lynch has taken over full-time duties as the starting quarterback.

Lynch, a captain this fall, has proved a capable signal caller during his previous appearances. As a redshirt freshman in 2008, he made three appearances (including one start) before suffering a season-ending injury.

Last season, he saw additional time under center as a reserve. His skills should translate into an increased vertical game for the Owls.

Freshmen Jacob Jablonski and Ryan McLaughlin will both vie to serve as Lynch's backup in 2010.

Running Backs

The Owls have enjoyed a long line of outstanding running backs, and this year's group fits right in with that tradition.

Two returning All-Conference performers - senior John Wiechman and junior Rashaad Slowley - should provide a good chunk of the ground attack this fall.

Wiechman earned All-Conference laurels for the second straight year in 2009 and saw action at both the tailback and fullback positions. He finished the year with 494 yards and five touchdowns. As a sophomore, he rushed 1,047 yards and 13 touchdowns en route to Northeast-10 Conference Offensive Player of the Year, All-ECAC and All-Region honors.

Slowley enjoyed a breakout sophomore season in 2009 and led the Owls with 849 yards. His figure of 7.9 yards/carry was the second-best single-season mark in program history.

Junior Curtis Shappy served as the starting fullback last year and will continue to play a key role in the offense again this year. Sophomore Patrick Collins also saw action at the fullback position and registered two touchdowns in 2009.

Offensive Line

Four starters, including two All-Conference picks, are back to anchor the offensive line for the Owls.

Seniors John Russell, a team captain, and James Economou are the veterans of the group. Economou has collected All-Conference honors in each of the last two seasons and was

Junior Jeffrey Querusio continued his strong progression last fall when he was named All-Conference. He was also selected to the league's All-Rookie Team as a redshirt freshman.

Fellow classmate Spencer Charette also saw time as a starter for most of last season before suffering an injury.

Also expected to see time on the offensive line will be junior Robert Seccareccia, sophomores William Chaffin and David Dronzank, and redshirt freshmen Russ Furlow and Tom Beliveau.

Receivers/Tight Ends

A relatively youthful group of receivers and tight ends made significant strides in 2009 and is poised to become a major strength of this year's squad.

Junior Andre Privott emerged as a dependable wideout last fall and led the club in receptions (36), receiving touchdowns (8) and receiving yards (77).

Sophomore Willie Epps stepped right into the mix as a redshirt freshman in 2009 and earned Northeast-10

Conference All-Rookie Team accolades. He closed the year with 31 receptions for 528 yards and four touchdowns.

Senior Brian Tourtelott could also contribute this fall, as he has proved a capable asset when called upon over the past three years.

Sophomore Timothy Wells was fourth on the squad with 18 receptions a year ago, three of which resulted in touchdowns. Fellow classmate Jayson Holt is now back at full strength after suffering a season-ending injury just two games into the 2009 campaign.

Sophomore Sean Donnelly and redshirt freshmen Raymond Fagan and Vito Fornarelli will also look to emerge as targets this fall.

Two talented sophomores are back at the tight end position after seeing significant action during their rookie seasons.

Nick Mandich (eight catches) and Jerome Cunningham both played (four catches) in all 10 games last fall. They figure to play an important role in the Owls' scheme again this year.

Defensive Line

A strong corps of veterans will anchor the defensive line this fall, with contributions expected from some prospering youngsters.

Senior captain Daniel Allen collected All-Conference honors in 2009. He finished the year with 32 tackles, four sacks and paced the squad with seven quarterback hurries.

Juniors Dan Lamberton and Ike Igbinosun both saw time as starters last season. Igbinosun had 28 tackles - including six for loss - while Lamberton, a Northeast-10 All-Rookie Team pick in 2008, added 17 stops.

CONFERENCE CHAMPIONS AGAIN

For the second time in the past four years, the Southern Connecticut State University football team captured the Northeast-10 Conference championship. The Owls earned the title on the final day of the regular season following a 71-14 rout of Saint Anselm.

TUBA COLLECTS ALL REGION, ALL-NEW ENGLAND LAURELS

Senior offensive lineman Greg Tuba was named an All-Region performer by *Don Hansen's Football Gazette* in 2009. In addition, he was also named as an All-New England honoree.

ALL-ECAC HONORS PREVALENT AGAIN FOR SCSU

Four student-athletes - Jarom Freeman, Martin Manson, Greg Tuba and Christopher Hazelton - were recognized as All-ECAC picks in the fall.

THIRTEEN OWLS RECOGNIZED WITH NE-10 HONORS

Thirteen members of the SCSU football program were honored by the Northeast-10 Conference in its year end laurels. Four players earned First-Team All-Conference honors - Jarom Freeman (RB), Greg Tuba (OL), Eric Holter (DL) and Martin Manson (CB). Seven players were named to the Second-Team - Jeff Querusio (OL), Daniel Allen (DE), Richard Kirkland (CB), John Wiechman (RB), Rashaad Slowley (RB) and Pete DiGangi (TE). In addition, wide receiver Willie Epps was named to the All-Rookie Team.

- In terms of major awards, Tuba was chosen as the Offensive Lineman of the Year.

SCORING APLENTY AGAINST SAINT ANSELM

Southern Connecticut scored 71 points in its regular season finale against Saint Anselm, the third highest single-game total in school history.

Sophomore Spencer Charette was named to the Northeast-10 Conference Football All-Academic Team for his efforts in the classroom and on the playing field in 2009.

SLOWLEY NEARLY SETS A MARK

Sophomore running back Rashaad Slowley finished the year with a yards/carry average of 7.9, the second highest single-season total in school history. Tom Sacramone, who rushed for 8.2 yards/carry in 1955, still holds the mark

CONGRATS TO COACH CAV

Head coach Rich Cavanaugh recorded win No. 150 with the Owls in the 42-14 victory over Stonehill. He is ranked tied for 11th among active Division II coaches and is also 41st all-time in wins.

POST-SEASON SHOWCASES FOR THE OWLS

Seniors Jerome Pinckney, Martin Manson and Jarom Freeman were all tabbed to play in the East Coast Bowl following the conclusion of the year. In addition, Manson and Freeman were selected for the Cactus Bowl.

OWLS FINISH RANKED NO. 9 IN ECAC RANKINGS

The Owls finished the year ranked No. 9 in the ECAC Lambert Meadowlands Division II poll. To be eligible for the Lambert Meadowlands Award, a school must be located in the East or play half of its schedule against eligible Lambert teams. The territory includes New York, New Jersey, New England and Pennsylvania, while teams in the bordering states of Delaware, Maryland, Virginia and West Virginia and the District of Columbia qualify if half of their schedule features eligible teams.



2009 SEASON IN REVIEW

THE WINS KEEP ON COMING

With the win over Stonehill, the Owls extended their streak to 16 consecutive seasons with a record at or above .500. The last time that SCSU posted a season with a losing record was back in 1993. In addition, the Owls also posted their ninth consecutive winning campaign.

MANSON GETS THE JOB DONE

Senior Martin Manson became just the second player in Owls history to collect Northeast-10 Conference honors in each of his four seasons. He joined Sir Snowden, who reached that feat from 2001-04. Manson signed a contract with the Hamilton TigerCats of the Canadian Football League following the season.

FREEMAN JOINS ELITE COMPANY

Senior tailback Jarom Freeman became just the 10th player in Northeast-10 Conference history to record at least 3,000 rushing yards for his career. He finished the year ranked seventh on the all-time list for 3,360 yards.

CAPTAIN KIRK (LAND)

Richard Kirkland tallied three interceptions in the last four games for the Owls, including a pair against Bentley.

ALL GOOD THINGS MUST COME TO AN END

Southern Connecticut saw its streak of 26 regular season wins on or after Oct. 1 come to an end against Bentley. Prior to that, the last loss took place on Oct. 15, 2004, a 14-7 loss to C.W. Post. Otherwise, the only four losses for the Owls after Oct. 1 the last four years had been in the NCAA playoffs.

THE ELM CITY TROPHY STAYS IN NEW HAVEN

The Owls claimed the Elm City trophy against New Haven on Oct. 2 with a convincing 54-26 win. It was the first meeting between the two schools since 2000 and the first win for the Owls since 1998.

CENTURY CLUB GAINING MEMBERS

After not having an occurrence of two Owls rush for 100 yards in the same game over 17 games, the duo of Jarom Freeman and Rashaad Slowley accomplished that feat twice in four games from Sept. 11-Oct. 2. The pair both broke the century mark in the games against Pace and New Haven.

BATTLING OUT OF THE CORNER

Martin Manson became the first Owl in over a year to record a two interception game in the win over UNH. The stretch actually spanned 15 games dating back to the 2008 season opener, when Kyle Sandberg picked off three passes in the win over West Virginia Wesleyan. Coincidentally, Richard Kirkland also picked off two passes in the game against Bentley in the next outing.

FIRST THING'S FIRST

Sophomore Rashaad Slowley and freshman Patrick Collins both tallied their first collegiate touchdowns in the game against Assumption.

SCORE EARLY, SCORE OFTEN

Southern Connecticut outscored its opponents by a 109-49 margin in the first quarter and a 220-100 tally in the first half.

DEFENSE HOLDING THE FORT DOWN

SCSU merited only 14.3 points per contest in its six wins on the year.

ROBERTS SPREADING IT AROUND

Senior quarterback Chris Roberts completed passes to 11 different receivers in the game at Bryant.

NEW TARGETS ACCLIMATING THEMSELVES

Redshirt freshman Willie Epps (four catches, 57 yards) and freshman Nick Mandich (two catches, 16 yards) were among the top targets for quarterback Chris Roberts in the season opener. In addition, redshirt freshmen Tim Wells and Jayson Holt each had one catch. The receptions were the first as collegians for each of the four Owls. Jerome Cunningham also tallied his first two collegiate receptions in the game against Bryant.

A COMPLETE RETURN MAN

Senior Ramon Johnson, seeing his first significant action as a kickoff returner for the Owls, returned five kicks for 117 yards (23.4 average) against IUP.

GETTING INTO THE MIX

Redshirt freshman Josh McWilliams blocked a punt in his Owls' debut against IUP in the opener.

SCSU PICKED FIRST IN NE-10 PRESEASON POLL

The Owls were selected first in the Northeast-10 Conference preseason poll for the third consecutive year earlier this month. SCSU edged out American International by four total votes. The Owls had five first-place votes compared to four for AIC.

A PRESENCE IN THE AFCA POLL AGAIN

Southern Connecticut received 49 votes in the first American Football Coaches Association poll of 2009. The Owls finished just two spots out of the top 25.

ALL-AMERICA HONORS COMING ALREADY

Three Owls - senior Jarom Freeman and juniors James Economou and John Wiechman - were named preseason All-Americans by various media organizations. Freeman was selected by www.d2football.com, while Economou and Wiechman took home honors from Consensus Draft Services.

KEEP IT COMING

Four Owls were recognized with preseason All-Northeast-10 Conference laurels by www.d2football.com. Jarom Freeman was named as the Conference's Offensive Player of the Year, while James Economou, Martin Manson and Landon Osborn were also lauded.

STRONG AT THE TOP

Southern Connecticut returned the reigning Northeast-10 Conference Offensive and Defensive Players of the Year in junior running back John Wiechman and senior linebacker Jerome Pinckney.

Shutout Notes

- All-time, SCSU has recorded 85 shutouts, while having been shut out on 35 occasions.
- Two of the shutouts were scoreless ties.
- The longest stretch in program history without having been shut out is 107 games. The Owls were last shut out on Sept. 9, 2000 at Stony Brook and have managed to score in every game since then.
- The longest stretch without recording a shutout is 61 games. The Owls blanked Central Connecticut in the 1986 regular season finale, 13-0, and then failed to record another shutout until game three of the 1993 season against Bowie State.
- Central Connecticut is the opponent that the Owls have recorded the most shutouts against all-time (11).
- The 1951 and 1956 teams hold the record for most shutouts in a season with five.
- The record for consecutive shutouts is four, set by the 1956 team.
- The Owls have been shut out in back-to-back games on four occasions (last in 1979).
- The Owls were shut out three times in 1979, a mark that remains the single-season high.
- SCSU has notched at least one shutout in 38 of the previous 62 seasons of varsity action.

OWLS IN THE COMMUNITY



Community engagement is an important component of the experience as a Division II student-athlete. The Southern Connecticut State University football team continues to be active in the local community with various ventures.

All intercollegiate programs at SCSU participate in the Tim Greer Insurance Agency, Inc. Community Service Cup, which provides a competitive format that allows student-athletes to gain an enriched experience through engagement with the on-campus and local communities by supporting ventures of traditional citizens, campus community members and peer students and student-athletes. SCSU student-athletes volunteered more than 2,500 hours of their time to numerous outreach efforts, both on-campus and in Greater New Haven, during the 2009-10 academic year.

Among the events that the team and coaching staff participated in during the past calendar year:

- Hosted its first annual bone marrow donor drive at Moore Field House, which attracted nearly 200 participants.
- Took part in a cleanup along the Quinnipiac River as part of a Greater New Haven Chamber of Commerce Sports Council initiative.
- Participated in tutoring sessions with youngsters at the Clinton Avenue School in New Haven.
- Assisted with events at the Keefe Community Center in Hamden.
- Participated in the campus-wide Friends of Rudolph event for area youngsters.
- Took part in weekly Sports Night program at the Wallingford Boys and Girls Club.
- Assisted with events at the West Haven Community Center.

NORTHEAST-10 CONFERENCE

The Northeast-10 continues to grow today as the conference underwent another expansion, adding the University of New Haven and Adelphi University to the mix. New Haven became a full-time member at the start of the 2008-2009 academic year, while Adelphi will join the Northeast-10 beginning with the 2009-2010 academic year giving the NE-10 16 full-time members. The conference is a powerful union of strong academic and athletic colleges and universities that incorporates 15 institutions from New York and New England.

Now in its 28th year, the Northeast-10 is still one of the largest NCAA Division II conferences in the country. Home to nearly 5,500 student-athletes, the Northeast-10 offers 23 championship opportunities, the most championships hosted by a Division II conference in the nation.

The Northeast-10 can look to a long history of success including the growth from seven original schools to more than double its size 20 years later, the contention for and winning of numerous/multiple national championships, the recognition of student-athlete performances in the classroom where the real competitions take place.

The Northeast-7 Conference established instant credibility in its membership and that credibility led to a slow but continued expansion through the years. The admittance of Saint Anselm in 1981 created the Northeast-8. In 1984, Hartford joined the ECAC Division I North Atlantic Conference but was immediately replaced by Merrimack.

The “Northeast-10” name came about when Saint Michael’s and Quinnipiac joined the league in 1987 and the conference remained stable until 1995 when Springfield left for Division III.

The league stayed at 10 members as Le Moyne joined the league in 1996 from the New England Collegiate Conference (NECC) and briefly expanded to 11 when Pace joined in 1998 from the New York Collegiate Athletic Conference (NYCAC). Quinnipiac elevated to the Division I Northeast Conference (NEC) to again return the foundation of 10 until the last major expansion took place prior to 2001 when five new schools joined the fold. Franklin Pierce, Southern New Hampshire University (formerly New Hampshire College), the University of Massachusetts Lowell and Southern Connecticut State University were joined by the College of Saint Rose.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS PATRICIA NICOL



PATRICIA NICOL
Director of Athletics



Now in her seventh year as Director of Athletics and 12th overall as an athletic administrator at Southern Connecticut State University, Patricia Nicol has been the driving force behind one of the most formidable Division II athletic departments in the nation. A 2010 nominee for the Division II Athletic Director of the Year award, she leads a department that is comprised of nearly 80 coaches, administrators and staff members.

Since her appointment in April, 2005, the Owls have excelled on the playing fields, in the classroom and in the community, maintaining a status for those around the nation to emulate.

Over the course of the past seven years, SCSU has won one team NCAA Division II championship (women's basketball in 2007) and four individual NCAA Division II championships. Southern Connecticut's teams have made 60 NCAA Championships appearances and produced a total of 135 All-Americans during her tenure.

As a department, the Owls have ranked among the top-20 percent among all institutions in each of the past four years in the Learfield Sports Division II Directors' Cup, including three top-15 percent finishes over that same stretch.

However, success has stretched far beyond the realm of athletic competition. More than 525 student-athletes have been named to the Northeast-10 Commissioners Honor Roll over the past three years. Under Nicol's guidance, the department initiated its inaugural National Student-Athlete Day celebration in April, 2009 and has recognized more than 250 student-athletes since the event's inception.

In addition, the overall graduation rate of SCSU student-athletes continues to exceed that of the general student population.

Southern Connecticut's student-athletes, coaches and staff also continue to impact the campus and local communities under the guidance of Nicol. The creation of the Community Service Cup in 2008-09 enhanced the volunteer efforts of all athletic department representatives. Southern Connecticut student-athletes have volunteered more than 5,000 hours of their time to numerous outreach efforts over the last three years.

The 2009-10 academic year featured NCAA Championship participation from 10 programs, highlighted by appearances from the men's soccer, baseball and softball teams. Seven programs won Northeast-10 Conference Championships during the year – football, men's indoor and outdoor track and field, women's swimming and diving, women's outdoor track and field, baseball (regular season) and softball (tournament). On the individual front, 22 student-athletes were named All-Americans.

The Owls continued to excel in the classroom and in the community as well in 2009-10. SCSU student-athletes, coaches and staff members volunteered more than 2,500 hours of their time for numerous community service initiatives, including campus events such as Jail N Bail, Friends of Rudolph and The Big Event, as well as off-campus projects with New Haven schools, the Wallingford Ulbrich Boys and Girls Club, the Make-A-Wish Foundation,

Connecticut Special Olympics and the American Cancer Society.

Furthermore, the Owls had 300 selections to the Northeast-10 Conference Commissioner's Honor Roll – its highest figure in school history. From the conference level, 18 student-athletes were also named to the Northeast-10 Conference All-Academic Team, while three student-athletes were selected as winners of the league's inaugural Scholar-Athlete Sport Excellence Award. The department also had six Academic All-District selections, while senior gymnast Sarah Darst was named a First-Team Academic All-American by the College Sports Information Directors of America.

The 2008-09 academic year featured 11 programs participating in NCAA post-season action, including appearances by the football, field hockey and softball teams. SCSU finished third out of 15 member institutions in the annual Northeast-10 Conference Presidents' Cup, matching the highest department finish since joining the league. In addition, the Owls also won four Northeast-10 Conference championships – men's and women's swimming and diving, men's indoor track and field and men's outdoor track and field in 2008-09. Eighteen student-athletes earned All-America honors in 2008-09.

In addition, Nicol has been instrumental in lending support and oversight to several key department projects.

The first phase of facility upgrades to Moore Field House was completed in late 2008. Improvements in phase one included several lobby upgrades – including new displays of the history of SCSU athletics, its 10 team National Championships, a new Athletic Hall of Fame display, as well as additional signage – as well as new team locker rooms and a new state-of-the-art Athletic Training room. The main gymnasium in Moore Field House now also houses banners for all athletic programs recognizing Northeast-10 Conference and NCAA Tournament success. Nicol has also guided over facility upgrades to Jess Dow Field and recently, Hutchinson Natatorium in the summer of 2010, during her tenure.

Additional initiatives spearheaded by Nicol include the launch of the Athletic Department Study Table and Tutorial programs, relaunch of the Faculty Athletic Advisory Board, creation of the annual Senior Athletic Awards banquet and implementation of the department's new website, www.southernctowls.com.

The Owls have also enjoyed an increased external affairs presence in the areas of marketing, promotions and corporate sponsorships with Nicol leading the department.

Nicol had been Southern's interim director since August, 2004, after serving as interim co-director since June, 2003.

She is the fourth director of athletics in Southern history and the first female to be appointed to that position.

Prior to her interim appointment, Nicol served as associate director of athletics with the Owls' administration following three years as assistant director of athletics at the University of Maryland. Prior to that, Nicol spent six years as associate director of athletics at Providence College.

Nicol earned bachelor's (1980) and master's (1983) degrees from the University of Rhode Island, where she was an NCAA qualifier in track and field. Inducted into the URI Athletic Hall of Fame in 1990, she also served as head cross country/track coach at West Virginia University in 1983-84.

Nicol, a resident of Wallingford, Conn., has two children, Christine and Michael.

BOE PEARMAN

Associate Director of Athletics/
Senior Woman Administrator

Belinda “Boe” Pearman was appointed associate director of athletics and senior woman administrator at Southern Connecticut State University in June, 2005. She enters her sixth year in this capacity in 2010-11.

Pearman, who succeeded Patricia Nicol, is responsible for the department’s compliance with NCAA and conference rules and regulations. She also serves as the sport administrator for the men’s and women’s basketball, men’s and women’s swimming and diving and gymnastics programs.

Since joining the SCSU staff, Pearman has been instrumental in monitoring the academic excellence of the Owls’ student-athletes. More than 500 student-athletes have been named to the Northeast-10 Commissioners Honor Roll over the course of the past three years. In addition, more than 50 student-athletes were recognized at the conference level or higher for academic excellence within a specific sport in each of the past four years.

She has also developed and implemented several department academic initiatives, such as the SCSU Athletic Department Study Table and Tutorial programs. Pearman also serves as a liaison to various campus constituencies and is a member of the Student Athlete Advisory Board.

Also a respected member of the coaching community, Pearman was the head women’s basketball coach at Rhode Island from 1999-2004 and guided the Rams to the Atlantic 10 Conference Championship game for only the second time in the history of the program.

In addition, Pearman’s teams had three consecutive winning seasons for only the second time in URI history.

Equally as impressive was the fact that all players that completed their eligibility under Pearman graduated during her stint with the Rams.

A four-year starter and Second Team All-Atlantic Coast Conference player at the University of Maryland from 1980-84, Pearman earned a bachelor’s degree from UM.

She then joined Coach Chris Weller’s Terrapins’ staff, serving as an assistant from 1985-97. During her time at Maryland, the Terps won six ACC championships and appeared in 12 NCAA tournaments with three Elite Eight berths and two Final Four berths.

She then joined the New England Blizzard of the American Basketball League, the first professional league for women, serving as an assistant and then associate head coach to former Boston Celtics’ great K.C. Jones.

Pearman currently resides in Cheshire, Conn.



MICHAEL KOBYLANSKI

Associate Director of Athletics/
Communications

Veteran athletic administrator Michael Kobylanski joined the Owls’ staff in July, 2007 and is entering his fourth year as Associate Director of Athletics/Communications.

He oversees all internal and external communications efforts for the SCSU Athletic Department and its 19 varsity sports, including media relations, publications, marketing, promotions, community relations and corporate sponsorship. He also serves as the department’s NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills Coordinator.

In total, Kobylanski has amassed nearly two decades of combined experience in the fields of media relations and journalism.

Kobylanski’s first three years at SCSU have been highlighted by the formation of numerous key initiatives, including the relaunch of a renamed athletic department website - www.southernctowls.com, implementation of the Community Service Cup and National Student-Athlete Day event and the creation of comprehensive marketing and promotional schedules for all athletic programs.

In addition, Kobylanski has also played a pivotal role investigating and securing new corporate sponsors, implementing consistent brand imagery for external publications and promoting athletic department initiatives through an array of on- and off-campus measures.

He has also spearheaded new community outreach initiatives both on-campus and within Greater New Haven, including the creation of relationships with local groups such as the Boys and Girls Club and New Haven elementary schools.

Most recently, Kobylanski served as the search committee chair for the head men’s basketball coach vacancy that resulted in the successful hire of Michael Donnelly.

Prior to joining the SCSU staff, he served as both Assistant Athletic Director and Sports Information Director during a six-year run at Quinnipiac University. In that role, Kobylanski was responsible for the publicity and media relations for 21 Division I programs and oversaw the daily operations of the Sports Information office.

A native of North Haven, Conn., Kobylanski graduated cum laude from the University of Massachusetts with a bachelor’s degree in communications. He has also completed studies towards two advanced degrees. Kobylanski earned a master’s degree in journalism from Quinnipiac University in 2005. Most recently, he was awarded a second master’s degree in management of sport industries from the University of New Haven in May 2008.

He holds bachelor's and master's degrees from SCSU and earned his doctorate in educational leadership from the University of Hartford.



SOUTHERN CONNECTICUT ATHLETICS

Southern Connecticut State University maintains an outstanding intercollegiate athletic program for men and women, recognizing the needs of students in individual and team sports. The Owls are members of the Northeast-10 Conference, the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) and the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division II. Southern's women's gymnastics program also participates in the USA Gymnastics collegiate championships.

Women's intercollegiate programs in cross country, field hockey, volleyball, soccer, swimming, gymnastics, basketball, track and field (indoor & outdoor), lacrosse and softball have produced many distinguished athletes and coaches. Southern has a rich tradition in women's basketball, having placed among the top four teams nationally four times. The Owls' Mary Anne O'Connor and Sue Rojcewicz were members of the 1976 U.S. Olympic women's basketball team, which won a silver medal at Montreal. The 2007 Owls won the Division II National Championship for the first time in program history while finishing the year 34-2 overall.

Men's intercollegiate programs include soccer, cross country, football, track and field (indoor & outdoor), swimming, basketball and baseball. Southern has had numerous individual NCAA champions in swimming, track and field, and gymnastics and ranks among the top 10 of Division II colleges and universities for most individual championships. The Owls' Ben Michaelson, a 10-time NCAA champion in swimming, won two gold medals and set two records in 2003 for the United States at the Pan American Games in the Dominican Republic.

In addition, the Owls have won a NCAA Division II record six NCAA team titles in men's soccer, three in men's gymnastics and one in women's basketball. Southern's Peter Kormann, who coached U.S. Olympic teams at Atlanta in 1996 and in Sydney in 2000, became the first U.S. gymnast in 44 years to win an Olympic medal when he captured a bronze medal in floor exercise at the 1976 Montreal Olympic Games. Owls' gymnastics coach emeritus Abie Grossfeld has coached the U.S. Olympic team in 1972, 1984 and 1988, leading his team to a team gold medal in 1984.

Among Southern alumni in professional sports, Joe Andruzzi recently retired after a 10-year career with the New England Patriots, Green Bay Packers and Cleveland Browns of the National Football League. Andruzzi was a part of three Super Bowl winning clubs with the Patriots. Jacques Cesaire is a starting defensive lineman with the San Diego Chargers.

Bo Oshoniyi recently retired from Major League Soccer after suiting up with the Columbus Crew and Kansas City Wizards. Fellow men's soccer alum Brian Bliss played for three teams in MLS and also served as head coach of Kansas City. He is currently the Technical Director with Columbus. Two-time Major League Soccer All-Star Mike Petke currently plays with the New York Red Bulls. The Owls' men's soccer team won the NCAA Division II championship in 1987, 1990, 1992, 1995, 1998 and 1999.

Dedicated in November of 1988, Jess Dow Field is a multi-million dollar stadium facility which can accommodate football, soccer, field hockey, lacrosse and track and field. The AstropPlay artificially-surfaced playing field is surrounded by an eight-lane, state-of-the-art 400-meter track surface, both of which were replaced in 2000. Directly adjacent to Southern's Moore Fieldhouse, Dow Field is lighted and has seating for some 6,000.



James W. Moore Fieldhouse is Southern's primary indoor athletic complex. The main arena, with a permanent seating capacity of 2,800, has a six-lane, artificially-surfaced track (200 meters), which was completely renovated in the summer of 1997. The fieldhouse is utilized for all major indoor events and can accommodate multiple practice sessions simultaneously. Drop curtains and netting allow the main arena to accommodate a complete baseball or softball infield for practice as well as the traditional indoor programs.

Moore Fieldhouse also has complete weight-training facilities, locker rooms and equipment rooms. Located in Moore Fieldhouse, Hutchinson Natatorium has an eight-lane swimming pool with both one- and three-meter diving boards and a Colorado timing system.

The recently renovated Pelz Gymnasium is the oldest of the Southern athletic facilities and is utilized primarily for physical education classes, recreation & intramurals, women's gymnastics, and volleyball. The facility has a six-lane pool and an independent, auxiliary gymnasium for gymnastics.

The Owls also recently refurbished their softball facility behind Pelz Gym and opened a new baseball complex in the fall of 2001.

All of the Southern facilities have played host to collegiate and scholastic championship events.
