



SUSQUEHANNA SWIMMING & DIVING HISTORY (EVENTS)



From the beginning, Susquehanna Swimming & Diving has revolved around respect, hard work, and doing your best – in the pool, in the classroom, and in the community. Soon after setting foot on the deck, one learns that this group is much more than team; it is a family whose pride runs strong and deep across the generations. As the people before us have paved the way, how will you contribute to our valued history? What footprint will you leave behind?

1977-1978: The “Susquehanna Swim Club” held its first official practice. While continually searching for a coach, the team was initially run by student-swimmers John Stahl ‘81, Charles Zlock ‘80, Judy Rile ‘78, and Peter Rile ‘81 with help from Karl Reuther ‘80. Charles Zlock approached Psychology Professor Ged Schweikert to coach the already organized team. Ged’s reply was “You know, I’ve been waiting for someone to ask me that question for years!” A meet schedule was arranged featuring the York Relays, Lycoming, Kings, Wilkes, Gettysburg, and conference championship. After a panic concerning swimming the very dominant Gettysburg team, Ged set the tone for the team for years to come by stating “It’s good to go up against the best. Then you know how good you really are and how far you have yet to go.”

Two days after serving as the starter for the first intercollegiate meet held at Susquehanna (against Bloomsburg University), Richard A. Reiland suddenly died on February 3, 1978. The Reiland Awards for most valuable and most improved swimmers were established in his honor.

The inaugural team picture was featured in the 1978 *Lanthorn*. The team consisted of 17 members (including one diver and three managers).

1979-1980: First season as a varsity sport
Women finish 7th and men finish 10th at the Middle Atlantic Championship meet.

1980-1981: Women improve to a 6th place finish at MACs. The men finish 10th.
The legend of “the duck” = John D. Christenson ‘81 introduced their mascot, Commander Douglass C. Drake, to the team during a practice. A tradition began as JC would warm up for meets with the Commander attached to his ankle with a string of fishing line. During the first session at MACs, JC and the Commander were warming up as usual when a stern-looking league official approached Coach Schweikert to register a complaint. Ged immediately apologized for the duo. The official commented “The swimmer is fine but the duck needs to touch the wall on the turn!” The eye of the duck...

Adopting a University of Tennessee swimming tradition, co-captain John Stahl '81 would fill a bottle with SU's pool water and bring it to away meets. Prior to the start of the meet, John would ceremoniously mount the opposing team's diving board and pour the SU water into the pool officially declaring it a Susquehanna University "home meet".

1981-1982: The women finish 9th and men 11th at MACs.

1982-1983: With no separate women's team this year, the women competed against the men. The squad finished 12th at MACs.
Bette Funkhouser '83 is named SU's Outstanding Female Scholar Athlete.

1983-1984: A separate women's team is reestablished and achieves its first winning season (6-4). The men earn a 9th place finish at MACs – highest placement in team history. The women also finished in 9th.

1984-1985: The men achieve their first winning season (6-4). Both programs finished in 9th at MACs.

1985-1986: The women's team earns their most wins in a season (8). Both programs finished in 9th at MACs.
Ruth Jones '86 is named SU's Outstanding Female Scholar Athlete.

1986-1987: The men earn their most wins in a season (9) and continue to climb the ranks by finishing 7th at MACs. The women finish in 9th.
Tom Kauffman (Business major with an emphasis on Operations Management, Computer Science minor) is the Class of 1987 valedictorian.

1987-1988: The women earn their most wins in a season (10). At MACs, the women finish in 7th and men in 9th.

1988-1989: The women finish in 6th and men in 11th at MACs.

1989-1990: At MACs, the women placed 7th and men 10th.

1990-1991: Bette Funkhouser '83 Higley is inducted into SU's Hall of Fame.
The women finish in 7th and men in 8th at MACs.

1991-1992: At MACs, the men place 10th and women 12th.
Paige Malin '92 is named SU's Outstanding Female Scholar Athlete.

1992-1993: The men finish in 8th place and women in 9th at MACs.

1993-1994: Middle Atlantic Conference splits – Centennial conference is established.
The men's and women's team have their highest finish at MACs when both take 5th.

1994-1995: Ruth Jones '87 Wholley is inducted into SU's Hall of Fame.
Both squads finish in 5th place at MACs.

1995-1996: Both squads finish in 5th place at MACs.
Senior gift to Ged dons "Chance made us a team, love made us a family."

1996-1997: The men's squad has their highest finish in MACs by placing 4th. The women placed 7th.

1997-1998: The men placed 6th and women 7th at MACs.

1998-1999: The women's program earns its 100th win by beating Lebanon Valley (97-83).
At MACs, the women finished in 5th place while the men earned 6th.

1999-2000: Stephen Fischer '00 becomes the Crusader's first conference winner (200 butterfly 2:01.92). Luke Peterson also wins a conference title in 100 backstroke (55.07).
The women shock the conference by swimming to a 3rd place finish at MACs – highest placement in team history. The men finished 5th.
Making program history, Ged wins Women's Coach of the Year.

2000-2001: Both squads finish in 7th place at MACs.
Charlotte Murray '01 is named SU's Outstanding Senior Female.

2001-2002: Paige Malin '92 Donohue is inducted into SU's Hall of Fame.
The men's program earns its 100th win by beating Lebanon Valley (105-71).
The men finish in 7th and women in 8th at MACs.
Valerie Bodam '02 is named SU's Outstanding Senior Female.

2002-2003: Both squads finish in 7th place at MACs.
Katie McKeever '03 is named SU's Outstanding Female Scholar Athlete.

2003-2004: The men finish in 5th place and women in 7th at MACs.
Jonathan Illuzzi '04 is named SU's Outstanding Senior Male.
Toni Davis '04 represents SU and USA as part of the United States Paralympic Team. She finished 4th in the 100m butterfly in Athens, Greece.

2004-2005: The men's team makes program history by earning a 3rd place finish at MACs. The women finish 7th.
Making male program history, Ged wins Men's Coach of the Year.

2005-2006: After a long hiatus, the Commander returns to the pool after being discovered in Ged's office. Jeff Fornadley '08 becomes SU's first male multi-winner at championships by winning the 100 and 200 freestyle (48.09, 1:46.66). Nick Hoover '06 wins the 1st Annual Championships Belly Flop Contest. The men finished in 3rd and women 7th at MACs.

2006-2007: Jeff Fornadley '08 becomes SU's first male repeat conference winner by taking the 50, 100, and 200 freestyle (21.91, 47.66, 1:46.67) and the first male conference record holder with his 100 free victory. Derek Wolf '09 also wins a conference title in the 100 breaststroke (1:00.67). The men finished in 3rd and women in 7th at MACs.
Ged wins Men's Coach of the Year.

2007-2008: SU leaves the Middle Atlantic Conference to join the newly formed Landmark Conference. The men's team defeated perennial opponent Dickinson for the first time in program history (111-89). The men's team continues to make history with their undefeated regular season (11-0, the first SU undefeated team of any sport in 10 years), most wins in a season (11), and the highest place at championships with a 2nd place finish. Jeff Fornadley '08 is named Male Co-Swimmer of the Year and Joe Scheno '11 is named Male Rookie of the Year. The SU men earned a number of conference titles and conference records (*): Fornadley (50 free 21.57*, 100 free 46.70*, 200 free 1:43.90*), Scheno (100 fly 53.69*), Derek Wolf '09 (100 breast 1:00.16 – prelims 1:00.10*), Alex Thurstlic '08 (200 back 2:00.79), 200 free relay (Fornadley, Jeff Kormanik '11, Wolf, Scheno 1:27.23*), 400 medley relay (Thurstlic, Wolf, Scheno, Fornadley 3:35.31*), 800 free relay (Fornadley, Thurstlic, Andrew Lyon '08, Scheno 7:11.45*), and 400 free relay (Fornadley, Thurstlic, Kormanik, Scheno 3:12.46*). The women placed 4th at MACs.

2008-2009: Coach Schweikert succumbs to cancer June 15, 2008. Dan Phillips is named head coach. Coach G. Edward "Ged" Schweikert III is inducted into SU's Hall of Fame. Lindsey Jankiewicz '11 becomes the Crusader's first female conference winner (100 back 1:01.18) and the first female conference record holder with her 100 back prelim swim of 1:00.81. Christie Savard '11 also wins a conference title in conference record time in the 200 back (2:10.96). Colin Sullivan '11 sets conference records in the 100 and 200 breaststroke during both prelim swims (59.64, 2:10.81). The women earn their highest championship ranking by finishing 2nd. The men placed 4th. Mary Louise Schweikert establishes the "Heart of a Champion" Award in Ged's honor. The award was named by Coach Phillips. Dan Phillips resigns as head coach.

2009-2010: Jerry Foley is named head coach. The women's team wins the inaugural CHAMPS program Team GPA award for having the highest combined GPA for the 2008-2009 school year. Both the men's and women's team finish in 2nd place at championships. Christie Savard '11 is named Female Swimmer of the Year, Devin Lessard '13 is named Female Rookie of the Year, and Susquehanna wins Female Coaching Staff of the Year. Savard becomes SU's first female multi-winner and repeat conference winner. The SU women earned a number of conference titles and conference records (*): Savard (200IM 2:10.22*, 400IM 4:34.03*, 200BK 2:05.32*), Lessard (500FR 5:08.00*, 100FL 59.23*, 200FL 2:08.61*), Catherine Harris '10 (50FR 24.73*), Hayley Keenan '10 (100BK 59.78 – prelims 59.42*), 200 free relay (Keenan, Savard, Tina Los '10, Harris 1:40.27*), 400 medley relay (Savard, Los, Lessard, Harris 4:03.97*), 800 free relay (Savard, Abby Gernert, Harris, Lessard 8:02.10* -- Savard's 200 free lead off 1:56.30*), and 400 free relay (Keenan, Savard, Lessard, Harris 3:39.94*). The SU men earned titles with Taylor Cole '13 (500FR 4:50.17), Chadd Lee '13 (200IM 1:57.76), and Colin Sullivan '11 (100BR 58.76 – prelim 58.26*, 200BR 2:07.72*). Via the B-cut standard, four qualified for NCAAs: Savard (200IM, 400IM, 200BK), Lessard (500FR, 100FL, 200FL), Keenan (100BK), and Sullivan (200BR). Keenan and Savard are named Scholar All-Americans. James Strande '12 is the victor of the championship Belly Flop Contest. Featured in *Sports Illustrated* "Faces in the Crowd", Savard becomes the first SU swimmer in program history to participate in the DIII NCAA Championship meet where she finished 19th in the 200BK.

CollegeSwimmingAwards.com names the SU women's team a national finalist for Female Break-Out Team of the Year. Both the men's and women's team earned Scholar All-American Team status by the CSCAA for both semesters.

2010-2011: The men's team wins the CHAMPS program Male Team GPA award for having the highest combined GPA for the 2009-2010 school year. The women's team wins Susquehanna Swimming's first team conference title. Those earning conference titles and conference records (*) were Christie Savard '11 (200IM 2:09.60*, 200BK 2:05.28*), Devin Lessard '13 (400IM 4:36.12, 200FL 2:07.20*), 200 free relay (Savard, Lessard, Abby Gernert '13, Jamie Platt '13 1:41.93), 800 free relay (Savard, Kate Mays '14, Lauren Snyder '11, Lessard 8:02.55), and 400 free relay (Savard, Gernert, Platt, Lessard 3:40.95). SU achieves its first 1-2-3 championship finish in program history (200BK Savard, Michelle Delgado '14, Gernert). The men's team is ranked 10th among Division III men's swimming programs by Avidasports Performance Rankings after finishing the dual meet season undefeated (9-0, the second undefeated season in program history). Earning 2nd place at Landmark's, those winning conference titles were Josh Heller '14 (50FR 20.70*), Colin Sullivan '11 (100BR 58.07*, 200BR 2:06.49*), Chadd Lee '13 (200FL 1:57.81), 200 free relay (Heller, Griffin Kearney '13, Joe Scheno '11, Jeff Kormanik '11 1:24.85 – Heller's 50FR lead off 20.59*), and 200 and 400 medley relay (Scheno, Sullivan, Kormanik, Heller 1:35.85, 3:31.32). Susquehanna wins Men's Coaching Staff of the Year. Via the B-cut standard, four qualified for NCAAs: Savard (200BK, 200IM), Lessard (400IM, 200FL), Sullivan (200BR, 100BR), and Heller (50FR). Sullivan becomes the first SU male swimmer to participate in the DIII NCAA Championship meet where he finished 19th in the 200BR. The women's team earned Scholar All-American Team status by the CSCAA (both semesters) and Christie Savard was named Scholar All-American. Savard also win the Connie Harnum award (previously named SU's Outstanding Female Scholar Athlete).

2011-2012: The women's team defends their title by winning a second team conference title. Those earning conference titles and conference records (*) were Devin Lessard '13 (200IM 2:09.49*, 1650 17:24.82*, 200FL 2:08.32), Dana Pontecorvo '15 (400IM 4:44.96), Lexi Cole '15 (200BK 2:08.40), 800 free relay (Lessard, Pontecorvo, Kate Mays '14, Cole 8:00.14*), and 400 free relay (Avanti Banks '15, Cole, Lessard, Kyle Seaman '15 3:38.77*). Lessard was named the Landmark Female Swimmer of the Year and Cole earned the Landmark Rookie of the Year award. With the men finishing in 3rd, those winning conference titles were Tyler Long '14 (500FR 4:44.78*, 1650 16:47.56), Chadd Lee '13 (200IM 1:53.96*, 400IM 4:12.31, 200FL 1:55.87), Josh Heller '14 (50FR 20.71 – 20.48 in prelims*, 100FR 46.31*), and 200 medley relay (Taylor Cole '13, Lee, Nick Boyle '15, Heller 1:35.53). Lee was named the Landmark Male Swimmer of the Year. Via the B-cut standard, three qualified for NCAAs: Lessard (1650, 200FL), Lee (200IM), and Heller (50FR). Heller participated in the DIII NCAA Championship meet where he finished 18th in the 50FR. Lee was named Scholar All-American and the women's team earned Scholar All-American Team status by the CSCAA (both semesters).

2012-2013: The women's team achieves a three-peat by winning their third consecutive conference title. Those earning conference titles and conference records (*) were Lexi Cole '15 (500FR 5:09.43, 200FR 1:56.33, 200BK 2:07.93), Devin Lessard '13 (200IM 2:08.95*,

400IM 4:36.50, 200FL 2:05.19), 200 free relay (Kelsey Lessard '16, Cole, Avanti Banks '15, Kyle Seaman '15 1:40.10), 400 medley relay (Cole, K. Lessard, D. Lessard, Seaman 4:03.05*), 200 medley relay (Annie Bruxelles '15, K. Lessard, D. Lessard, Seaman 1:52.06), 800 free relay (D. Lessard, K. Lessard, Valerie Stearns '16, Cole 8:05.28), and 400 free relay (Bruxelles, Cole, D. Lessard, Seaman 3:38.46*). Making team history, SU women swept the championship relays and Devin Lessard becomes the first SU swimmer to 4-peat her signature event (200 fly) as well as the first to qualify for NCAAs for all four years of her SU career. Devin Lessard was named the Landmark Female Swimmer of the Year and Kelsey Lessard earned the Landmark Female Rookie of the Year award. With the men finishing in 2nd place, those winning conference titles were Josh Heller '14 (50FR 20.50 – prelim 20.38*, 100FR 46.17*), Chadd Lee '13 (200IM 1:54.28, 100BR 56.87, 200BR 2:05.32) and the 200 medley relay (Taylor Cole '13, Lee, Duncan Frazier '16, Heller 1:34.66). The swimmers qualifying for NCAA were D. Lessard (400IM, 200FL), Heller (50FR, 100FR), and Lee (200IM, 100BR). Representing the program at NCAAs, Lessard swims into the record books by becoming SU's first All-American with her 5th place finish in the 200 fly (2:02.04). For both semesters, the women's team earned Scholar All-American Team status by the CSCAA. Lee was named Scholar All-American and won the Blair M. Heaton Award. Bobby Ries '13 was named SU's Outstanding Senior Male.

2013-2014: The women's team wins their fourth consecutive conference title. Those earning conference titles and conference records (*) were Kelsey Lessard '16 (200IM 2:10.34, 400IM 4:37.51), Ashlee Weingarten '17 (100FL 58.73, 200FL 2:12.48), Lexi Cole '15 (200BK 2:08.79), 400 medley relay (Erin McElwee '17, Alex Bornman '15, Weingarten, Kyle Seaman '15 4:02.21*), and 200 medley relay (McElwee, Bornman, Weingarten, Julia Doherty '16 1:50.37). The men placed 2nd at championships. Annie Bruxelles '15 and Dave Miller '17 are named to the Landmark All-Sportsmanship Team. Both men's (fall semester) and women's (both semesters) teams earned Scholar All-American Team status by the CSCAA.

2014-2015: By the largest margin in conference history (215 points), the women's team wins their fifth consecutive conference title. Those earning conference titles and conference records (*) were Lexi Cole '15 (500FR 5:05.44*, 200FR 1:55.08*, 1650FR 17:41.23), Kelsey Lessard '16 (200IM 2:08.74*, 400IM 4:34.60), Erin McElwee '17 (100BK 58.86*), 400 medley relay (McElwee, Joann Butkus '18, Ashlee Weingarten '17, Jessica Jozefiak '18 3:38.16*), and 800 free relay (Lessard, Caroline Henderson '17, Kyle Seaman '15, Cole 7:53.85*). The 800 free relay of Jourdan Stewart '17, Danny Csakai '16, Bill Crumrine '17, and Dave Miller '17 won a conference title in 7:01.19 as the men's team earned a 2nd place finish overall. Via the B-cut standard, Lessard qualified for NCAAs in the 400IM and was named an Academic All-American. Susquehanna wins the Female Coaching Staff of the Year. McElwee and Csakai are named to the Landmark All-Sportsmanship Team. Both the men's (fall semester) and women's (both semesters) team earned Scholar All-American status by the CSCAA.

2015-2016: Jeff Fornadley '08 becomes the first male swimmer and the first "swimming only" inductee to SU's Hall of Fame. The women's team wins their sixth consecutive conference title by 195 points. Those earning conference titles and conference records (*) were Lindsey VanKirk '18 (500FR 5:12.82, 1650FR 18:00.69), Kelsey Lessard '16 (200IM 2:07.20*, 400IM 4:3381, 200FL 2:06.56), Katie Willis '19 (50FR 24.53, 200FR 1:54.54* prelims/1:54.86 finals, 100FR 52.98), Maggie Palaski '19 (100FL 58.36), Megan Duck '19 (200BR 2:26.70), 200 free relay (Willis, Devon Niness '19, Julia Doherty '16, Joann Butkus '18 1:38.16), 400 medley relay (Erin McElwee '17, Butkus, Palaski, Jessica Jozefiak 3:56.44*), and 800 free relay (Willis, VanKirk, Caroline Henderson '17, Jozefiak 7:53.35*). Leading the men to a second place overall, Dave Miller '17 (200FR 1:43.55) and James Orzolek '19 (100FR 46.68) won conference titles. Via the B-cut standard, Lessard (200IM, 400IM, 200FL) and Danny Csakai '16 (100BR 57.51) qualified for DIII NCAAs. SU wins the Landmark Female Swimmer of the Year with Lessard, Female Rookie of the Year with Willis, and the Female Coaching Staff of the Year. Doherty and Nick MacDonald-Martell '16 are named to the Landmark All-Sportsmanship Team. The women's team earns Scholar All-Academic status by the CSCAA for both semesters. Lessard is named the Landmark Senior Scholar-Athlete. Lessard and Csakai earn Academic All-American status. Henry Chang '18 competes and wins Mr. SU. Dillon Warr (Biology major, Spanish minor) is the valedictorian of the SU Class of 2016.

2016-2017 The Landmark All-Decade Team was created to mark the tenth anniversary of the conference. Earning this honor for the SU women's team was Lexi Cole '15, Devin Lessard '13, Kelsey Lessard '16, Erin McElwee '17, Christie Savard '11, and Katie Willis '17 and for the men, Jeff Fornadley '08, Josh Heller '14, Chadd Lee '13, Joe Scheno '11, and Colin Sullivan '11. Devin Lessard also won the "Landmark Conference Women's S&D Top Moment" for her 5th place finish in the 200FL during the 2013 NCAA Championships. The women's team continues their streak in the Landmark with a seventh conference title (by a conference record 263.5 points) and being named a Scholar All-American squad for both semesters. Those earning conference titles and conference records (*) were Ashlee Weingarten '17 (200IM 2:12.08, 100FL 56.78*, 200FL 2:06.68), Joann Butkus '18 (100BR 1:06.06, 200BR 2:25.08), Erin McElwee '17 (100BK 58.54), and both the 400 and 200 medley relays (McElwee, Butkus, Weingarten, Katie Willis '19 3:52.18*, 1:46.39*). Earning conference titles for the third place men's team were Bill Crumrine '17 (500FR 4:46.42), Shane Sullivan '20 (100BR 58.46, 200BR 2:08.88), 200 medley relay (David Grove '20, Sullivan, Eric Lawrence '17, James Orzolek '19 1:35.59), and 400 free relay (Grove, Lawrence, David Miller '17, Orzolek 3:11.20). Via the B-cut standard, Weingarten qualified for DIII NCAAs in the 100FL and 200FL. SU wins the Female Swimmer of the Year with Weingarten and the Female Coaching Staff of the Year. Izzy Cieri '18 and Sean Murray '19 are named to the Landmark Winter All-Sportsmanship Team. Weingarten is named Landmark Senior Scholar-Athlete and earns Academic All-American status.

2017-2018 The women's squad earned their 200th victory in program history in a meet against Messiah (142-119) and won their eighth consecutive conference title. Those earning conference titles and conference records (*) were Katie Willis '19 (50FR 23.75*, 100FR 51.65*), Maggie Palaski '19 (100FL 58.92), 200 free relay (Willis, Tori Weems '21, Jessica

Jozefiak '18, Joann Butkus '18 1:36.88*), 400 medley relay (Abby Condon '21, Butkus, Palaski, Willis 3:55.12), 200 medley relay (Cate Welch '20, Butkus, Palaski, Willis 1:46.98), 800 free relay (Jozefiak, Caitlin Kelly '20, Megan Shaffer '20, Weems 7:52.89*), and 400 free relay (Willis, Butkus, Jozefiak, Weems 3:33.24*). David Grove '20 earned two conference titles (100BK 51.75, 200BK 1:53.96) for the second place men's team. Willis qualified for DIII NCAAs via the B-cut standard in the 50 and 100FR. SU won the Female Coaching Staff of the Year. Butkus was named the Landmark Senior Scholar-Athlete and won SU's Connie Harnum Award. Representing SU on the conference Winter All-Sportsmanship Team were Morgan O'Hara '20 and Owen Madden '20. The men's and women's squads were named CSCAA Scholar All-American Teams for both semesters.

2018-2019 The men's squad earned their 200th victory in program history in a meet against Messiah College (168-91). After receiving the program's highest preseason ranking by CSCAA (6th in the Northeast South region), the women won their ninth consecutive conference title. Those earning conference titles and conference records (*) were Katie Willis '19 (50FR 23.72*, 100FR 51.82, 200FR 1:52.52), Krista White '19 (3m diving 313.40pts), 400 medley relay (Megan Shaffer '20, Olivia Fravel '21, Maggie Palaski '19, Willis 3:55.19), 200 medley relay (Devon Niness '19, Fravel, Palaski, Willis 1:47.24), and 400 free relay (Willis, Fravel, Caitlin Kelly '20, Tori Weems '21 3:33.11*). Helping the men to a second place finish, Eric Towse '22 won two individual events (100BK 51.58, 200BK 1:52.33) and led off the winning 200 medley relay (Towse, Shane Sullivan '20, Luke Henry '21, James Orzolek '19 1:34.45). Willis qualified for DIII NCAAs via the B-cut standard in the 50FR. Towse won the Landmark Male Rookie of the Year and White earned SU's first Landmark Women's Diver of the Year. Brooke Boes '21 and Anthony Principe '21 were named to the Landmark Winter All-Sportsmanship Team. Palaski became the fourth consecutive SU winner of the Landmark Senior Scholar Athlete award. The men's and women's squads were named CSCAA Scholar All-American Teams for both semesters. Willis won SU's Connie Harnum Award and earned Academic All-American status. Jerry Foley resigns as head coach.

2019-2020 Mike Tubb is named the program's fourth head coach. Lindsey Jankiewicz '11 Breiner and Devin Lessard '13 are inducted into the Susquehanna Hall of Fame. Lessard becomes the first "swimming only" female to receive this honor. Coach Tubb's first ever victory as a head coach occurred with the SU women's win over Drew (113-108). His first victory with the men's team happened against Goucher (146-59). The men's team continued their second place conference finish as the women fell to third. Both the men's (spring semester) and women's (both semesters) team earned Scholar All-American status by the CSCAA. Erin Wetmore '20 becomes SU S&D's first Fulbright Award winner.

2020-2021 President Green cancelled winter competition due to COVID-19 restrictions and thus, SU cannot compete or participate in the Landmark Championship meet. Representing SU on the Landmark Winter All-Sportsmanship Team were Brooke Boes '21 and Owen Kelly '21. Both the men's and women's teams earned Scholar All-American status by the CSCAA for the fall and spring semesters. Brooke Boes (Neuroscience major, Health Care Studies minor) is a valedictorian of the SU Class of 2021.

2021-2022 Competition is reinstated with mandatory masking on deck. Christie Savard '11 Spangler is inducted into the Susquehanna Hall of Fame. The men finished in third and women in fourth place at the Landmark Conference Championship meet. Earning conference titles were Haley Muth '23 (50FR 24.37), Julia Romano '25 (1m 313.90 points), Jack Imburgia '23 (100FR 46.61), and the 200FR relay (Brendan Alvino '24, Ricky Thomas '22, Conor McManus '22, Imburgia 1:24.60). Carter Niness '22 and Olivia Lee were named to the Landmark Winter All-Sportsmanship Team. For both semesters, the men's and women's teams earned Scholar All-American status by the CSCAA. Olivia Lee (Early Childhood Education major) is a valedictorian of the SU Class of 2022.

2022-2023: Katie McKeever '03 Sillup is inducted into the Susquehanna Hall of Fame. Both squads finished in 4th place at the Landmark Conference Championship meet. Those earning conference titles and conference meet records (*) were Jayden Corrigan '23 (500FR 4:40.56, 400IM 4:06.61), Haley Muth '23 (100FL 58.51), Brendan Alvino '24 (200FR 1:40.61*, 100FR 45.91), 200 free relay (Alvino, Andre Fissella '23, Josh Sahd '24, Jack Imburgia '24 1:23.61* - tying with Drew University), 800 free relay (Alvino, Fissella, Corrigan, Imburgia 6:59.10), and 400 free relay (Alvino, Corrigan, Fissella, Imburgia 3:06.53). Julia Adams '23 and Jayden Corrigan '23 were named to the Landmark Winter All-Sportsmanship Team. The men's and women's squads earned Scholar All-American status by the CSCAA for both semesters. Julia Adams (BA English-Publishing & Editing, BS Marketing) is a valedictorian of the SU Class of 2023. Mike Tubb resigns as head coach.

2023-2024: Rachel Drosdick-Sigafoos is named as interim head coach becoming the fifth coach overall and the first female coach of SU S&D. Toni Davis '04 is inducted into the Susquehanna Hall of Fame. Coach Drosdick-Sigafoos' first ever victory as a head coach occurred with the women's win over Ramapo (153-106). Her first victory with the men's team happened in a tri-meet with Moravian/Goucher (145-7/145-46). At the Landmark Championship meet, the women finished in fourth place and the men in fifth. Mia Doll '24 won the 200IM conference title in 2:09.67. Doll and Dan Venuti '27 were named to the Landmark All-Sportsmanship Team. The men's and women's squads earned Scholar All-American status by the CSCAA for both semesters.
