AGGIES READY FOR MINERS ---

The 1-1 Aggies, fresh off a 51-3 victory over visiting Wyoming, will host the Texas-El Paso Miners in a 7 p.m. game at Kyle Field on Saturday, Sept. 16. The game will not be televised.

The Miners are 1-1 also after beating former Southwest Conference member Southern Methodist in El Paso last Saturday.

The Aggies won the only meeting between the two schools with a 20-17 decision in 1984 at Kyle Field.

LAST WEEK ---

The Aggies squelched any talk of a Notre Dame hangover by pouring on the points in an impressive 51-3 win over Mountain West Conference member Wyoming last Saturday. The Aggies scored a touchdown on its initial drive to take the lead early in the first quarter and had extended it to 21-3 by halftime. On the first play after halftime, quarterback Mark Farris and receiver Robert Ferguson hooked up for a 93-yard touchdown pass and catch. A&M added another touchdown on its next possession with a 1-yard plunge by Ja'Mar Toombs, and head coach R.C. Slocum began to flood the field with reserves. The Aggie backups added 17 more points to the final score with quarterback Colby Freeman and fullback Amon Simon tallying the initial touchdowns of their careers.

PERFECT IN HOME OPENERS ---

The Aggies are a perfect 12-0 in home openers in the R.C. Slocum era (1989-present).

WELCOME TO AGGIELAND ---

Texas A&M's Kyle Field has become one of the nation's toughest road venues since R.C. Slocum took over the Aggies' reins in 1989. In 12 seasons with Slocum as head coach, the Aggies have compiled a sparkling 61-5-1 record on their home field. The Aggies have posted eight undefeated home records during that time, including seven perfect 6-0 home worksheets. Prior to Slocum's arrival as head coach, Texas A&M had posted just eight undefeated season records at Kyle Field.

NON-CONFERENCE GRAVEYARD ---

The Aggies are a perfect 25-0 against non-conference opponents at Kyle Field during the R.C. Slocum era, including a 10-4 mark against top 25 foes and a 4-2 record against top 10 teams. A&M has won five straight matchups against ranked opponents on its home turf.

The last non-conference home loss for the Aggies was the infamous "Hurricane Bowl" in 1988 when the Alabama Crimson Tide handed A&M a 30-10 loss in Jackie Sherrill's final game as head coach.

BIG-PLAY WIDEOUTS ---

The Aggies' wide receiver triumvirate of senior Chris Taylor, junior Bethel Johnson and Robert Ferguson have unquestionably added a big-play dimension to A&M's offense. The trio has combined for 12 career touchdowns with an average length of 52.0 yards, including the two longest receptions in school history (a 96-yarder by Taylor against Tulsa in 1999 and a 93-yarder by Ferguson last Saturday against Wyoming). All three have scoring plays of more than 70 yards to their credit.

1,000 YARDS FOR TAYLOR ---

With 48 yards on 2 catches against Wyoming, senior Chris Taylor eclipsed the 1,000-yard mark in career receiving yards. His current career total is 1,009 on 57 catches. He needs 223 more yards to match Brian Mitchell's (1991-94) 1,232 yards and enter A&M's career top 10. The school record is 1,576 by Tony Harrison (1990-93).

BIG HOME DEBUT FOR FARRIS ---

Sophomore quarterback Mark Farris completed 14-of-21 passes for 272 yards and two touchdowns in his first start at Kyle Field last Saturday against Wyoming. It was the most prolific home starting debut by an A&M since 1996 when Brannndon Stewart threw for 275 yards against Tulsa. Farris connected with his new best friend Robert Ferguson for a pair of touchdowns, including a 93-yarder which was the second-longest reception in school history.

FERGUSON BEGINS ASSAULT ON A&M'S RECORD BOOK ---

Junior wide receiver Robert Ferguson had a huge Kyle Field debut with 7 catches for 174 yards and 2 touchdowns against Wyoming. It was the best home debut ever by an A&M receiver. The only A&M receiver with a 100-yard game in his home debut was tight end Rich Siler, who grabbed 6 passes for 107 yards in a 1983 loss to Cal-Berkeley. Ferguson had a pair of touchdowns, including a 93-yarder that was the second-longest in school history. Ferguson's 174 yards tied for the fifth-best effort in school history. The school record is 250 yards on 13 catches by Ken "Dude" McLean in 1965.

LB GLENN ON BUTKUS LIST ---

Texas A&M senior outside linebacker Jason Glenn is a member of the 2000 Butkus Award Watch List. The award is given annually to the nation's top linebacker. The preliminary list of 70 candidates will be trimmed to 10 semifinalists on Oct. 19 and three finalists will be announced on Nov. 9. The winner will be announced Friday, Dec. 8 at the Butkus Award Gala at Hard Rock Live on the Universal Studios City Walk in Orlando, Fla.

AGGIE 'BACKERS RATED BEST ---

Texas A&M's 2000 linebacker unit has been rated best in the nation by Lindy's 2000 College Football Annual. The publication cited A&M's four returning linebacker starters (OLBs Roylin Bradley and Jason Glenn and ILBs Brian Gamble and Cornelius Anthony) and strong backups as the reason for its selection of the Aggies. Naturally, Lindy's also tabbed the Aggies' LB corps for best in the Big 12 honors.

MCKINNEY RATED AMONG ELITE ---

Texas A&M junior Seth McKinney was rated among the nation's elite offensive centers by CBSSportsline.com. The 6-foot-3, 290-pound McKinney was rated as the No. 6 center in college football. McKinney is one of only two underclassmen on the list.

IRONMAN MCKINNEY ---

In his third season as a starter, junior center Seth McKinney is following the same career tracks as school-record 51-game starters Dat Nguyen and Semisi Heimuli.

Like Nguyen and Heimuli, McKinney redshirted his first season at A&M before starting every possible game of his career.

The 6-foot-3, 290-pound McKinney, who is the younger brother of Indianapolis Colts offensive line starter Steve McKinney, has started 28 consecutive games and is a pre-season All-Big 12 Conference selection.

BIG HOME -OPENER CROWD ---

Last Saturday's attendance of 69,273 against Wyoming marked the fourth-largest home-opener crowd in school history. The record for a home opener is 72,577 against Oklahoma in 1994. The other two crowds were: 71,282 against LSU in 1987 and 70,057 against LSU in 1995.

FIRST DRIVE SCORING ---

The Aggies scored a touchdown on its first possession against Wyoming, changing a trend that plagued them throughout 1999. Last season, the Aggies scored just one touchdown on their first possession (10th game of season against Missouri).

BIG RUMBLE HITS PAYDIRT ---

Junior fullback Ja'Mar Toombs had a pair of rushing touchdowns against Wyoming, giving the 275-pounder three multi-TD games in his last four regular season games.

FLEMONS SNAPS SACK DROUGHT ---

Senior defensive end Ronald Flemons, who is in third year as a starter, broke a long quarterback sack drought with a first-quarter trap of Cowboy QB Jay Stoner last Saturday. It was Flemons' first sack since the 1998 Southern Mississippi game, a span of 24 games.

FARRIS EMERGES AT QB ---

Former Pittsburgh Pirates farmhand Mark Farris has emerged as the Aggies' starting quarterback. Farris, who reached the AA level with the Pirates, is the latest in a quickly-growing list of college quarterbacks who returned to the gridiron after several years in minor league baseball. Others include Georgia's Quincy Carter, Oregon's Akili Smith, Florida State's Chris Weinke, and one of the originals, Kevin Murray of Texas A&M. At 25, Farris is the Aggies' oldest starting quarterback of the modern era.

SCATES SHINES AT PUNTER ---

Facing the daunting task of replacing NCAA career punt average champion Shane Lechler in the Aggie lineup, true freshman Cody Scates has done nothing but impress in his first two games. Scates, who only played one year of high school football, is averaging 41.2 yards on 11 boots. Showing excellent hang time, Scates' net average is a respectable 37.8. Against Notre Dame, Scates out-debuted Lechler, who averaged 37.2 yards on five punts in his 1996 debut against Brigham Young in the Pigskin Classic.

SENDING PLAYERS TO THE NFL ---

Texas A&M stands as the Big 12's top producer of National Football League talent with 36 players on opening day rosters, according to the Big 12 Conference.

Twenty-two of the 31 teams in the NFL have former A&M players on their rosters, with the Atlanta Falcons and Oakland Raiders leading the way with three former Aggie players on their squads.

Thirty-five of the 36 Aggie NFLers played at least one season during the R.C. Slocum era (1989-present). Only veteran offensive lineman Jerry Fontenot remains from the pre-R.C. time.

REDSHIRT COMES OFF SMITH ---

Aggie coaches were hoping to redshirt both defensive line newcomers, Linnus Smith of Tyler John Tyler and Marcus Jasmin of New Orleans De La Salle, but attrition on the A&M D-line coupled with Smith's fast development has put Smith into A&M defensive front rotation. In his debut against Wyoming, Smith contributed two solo tackles.

FIRST DRIVE FREEMAN ---

Redshirt freshman quarterback Colby Freeman made his playing debut against Wyoming and rushed for a 4-yard touchdown on the first drive of his career. The last A&M quarterback to rush for a touchdown on the initial drive of his career was Bucky Richardson (82-yard run against Southern Miss in 1987).

JONES GRANTED SCHOLARSHIP---

Head coach R.C. Slocum rewarded fullback Stacy Jones for his blocking by putting the sophomore from Midland Lee High School on scholarship last week. Jones has not received a carry in 2000, but did clear the way on Ja'Mar Toombs' 1-yard blast in the third quarter against Wyoming last Saturday.

OTHER FIRSTS VS. WYOMING ---

Robert Ferguson's 7-yard TD reception from Mark Farris was the first of his career. It was also Farris's first-career TD pass ... Greg Porter's second-quarter grab was the first official catch of his career. ... DBs Wes Bautovich and Sean Weston made the first starts of their careers, as did RB Richard Whitaker ... Ty Warren's third-quarter sack of Cowboy backup QB Matt Swanson was the first of his career. ... Redshirt freshman QB Colby Freeman made his playing debut tonight and turned in a 13-yard rush for a first down on his first play ... On the next play, sophomore running back Maurice Harris had a 11-yard tote for a first down on his first career carry. Harris ended up leading the Aggies in rushing with 54 yards on 8 carries ... junior running back Amon Simon posted his first career TD run with a one-yard plunge late in the game.

KILLEEN'S DYNAMIC DUO ---

The success of the Aggies' secondary will likely be linked to how well its two top returning defensive scorers perform. Senior Michael Jameson and junior Jay Brooks each scored three touchdowns last season to lead the Wrecking Crew. More than teammates at A&M, they were also teammates at Killeen Ellison. They even lived in the same house (Jameson's) in central Texas while Brooks' mother was serving the military in Germany and Jameson's mother worked at Fort Hood.

NEW FACES ON A&M STAFF ---

The Aggies have four new faces on their coaching staff. Newcomers to the coaching staff are Larry Kirksey (from San Francisco 49ers), Pete Hoener (from Iowa State) and Buddy Wyatt (from Colorado), while Shawn Slocum returns to Aggieland after a two-year hitch with Southern California.

RED-SHIRTING O-LINEMEN ---

Since the formation of the Big 12 Conference, virtually every offensive lineman signing a national letter of intent with the Aggies has redshirted his first season. In fact, with the exception of the incoming freshmen, every offensive lineman on the A&M roster has had the benefit of a redshirt season.

PRESEASON INJURIES TAKE TOLL ---

Preseason injuries have robbed the Aggies of several key contributors, including returning defensive end starter Rocky Bernard. A starter the past two seasons at end, Bernard suffered an anterior cruciate ligament tear in his knee early in fall camp. He will be lost for the season.

Joining Bernard on the injured list are sophomore offensive guard Billy Yates, sophomore offensive tackle Chris Montgomery and redshirt freshman offensive tackle Alan Reuber.

Yates was projected to start in 2000, but suffered a broken fibula during fall camp and isn't expected back until midseason. Montgomery was expected to backup Michael Mahan at right tackle, but has been hampered by back problems. Reuber was slated to backup Tango McCauley at left tackle, but suffered a broken leg during spring drills and hasn't been cleared to compete.

POSITION CHANGES ---

Several players have changed positions since 1999, including a pair of two-year letterwinners who moved from defense to offense.

Junior Lonnie Madison, who was A&M's top defensive line backup the past two sea-

sons, switched to tight end and has earned the backup job. Madison was recruited to play tight end at Boston College by current A&M offensive coordinator Steve Kragthorpe.

Also switching to offense was key line-backer reserve Amon Simon, who moved to fullback. Simon has always been recognized as one of the biggest hitters on the defense and his aggressive nature has brought quality depth to the position. Prior to Simon's switch, junior Ja'Mar Toombs was the only scholarship fullback on campus.

Redshirt freshman Ellison Collins moved the secondary to wide receiver, bringing impressive (6-3, 195) size at the position.

WALK-ON PROGRAM PAYING OFF ---

R.C. Slocum's desire to enhance the walk-on program at Texas A&M is paying immense dividends. Most notable is Rich Coady, who was drafted in the third round of the 1999 NFL Draft and helped the St. Louis Rams to their first Super Bowl victory earlier this year. Ten walk-ons have earned jersey numbers and appear on the 2000 A&M roster, including five who are listed on the current depth chart. Another former walk-on, placekicker Terence Kitchens, was awarded a scholarship last season after a blistering start in 1999.

COMFORTS OF HOME ----

100 W's FOR SLOCUM ----

When he won his 100th career game midway through the 1999 season, A&M head coach R.C. Slocum joined an elite group of head coaches who won the 100th game of their careers in 11 seasons or sooner. Hall-of-Famer George Woodruff, who coached at Penn, Illinois and Carlisle from 1892-1905, reached 100 in just his eighth season (1898).

Since 1960, only two coaches reached 100 faster than Slocum. Oklahoma's Barry Switzer won game No. 100 in the third game of his 11th season (1983) and Nebraska's Tom Osborne reached in the fourth game of his 11th year (1983).

Other coaches reaching the century mark in wins in their 11th seasons were: Penn State's Joe Paterno (9th game in 1976), Florida's Steve Spurrier (9th game in 1997), Oklahoma's Bud Wilkinson (6th game in 1957) and Chicago's Amos Alonzo Stagg (6th game in 1900).

In his 12th season as the Aggies' head coach, R.C. Slocum (McNeese State, '67) has compiled a 103-33-2 (.754), ranking him No. 6 in winning percentage among active Div. I-A head coaches and A&M's all-time winningest coach.

- ✓ Slocum is 66-16-2 (.798) in conference games, 61-5-1 (.918) in games at Kyle Field and 38-20 (.655) in road games.
- ✓ Slocum, a four-time Coach of the Year, has led the Aggies to one Big 12 Conference crown, three SWC Championships, two Big 12 South Division titles and nine bowl games, including five on Jan. 1st.
- ✓ Ten of Slocum's 11 teams have finished the season ranked in the Top 25.
- ✓ Slocum's teams compiled a 29-game SWC unbeaten streak running from 1991-95.
- ✓ This is the 28th year he has been associated with A&M football, the longest of any football coach in school history. He was an assistant from 1972-80 and once again from 1982-88, interrupted only by a one-year stint as defensive coordinator at USC in 1981.
- ✓ With the Aggies' win over Texas in 1997, Slocum became A&M's winningest head coach by passing Homer Norton, who posted 82 wins from 1934-47 and won the 1939 national championship.
