13-TIME COACH OF YEAR

The Most in Conference History in Any Sport

Coach Steve Moore has brought historic excellence to the Islanders including 16 NCAA Tournament appearances and 33 Southland titles. Moore has been named Southland Conference Coach of the Year 13 times, an all-time Southland Conference record for any coach in any sport. Moore was named the 2013 ITA Texas Coach of the Year for NCAA D-I.

Moore brings a wealth of experience including coaching at three schools that reached the Top 25 nationally - Texas A&M, Texas Tech and SMU. Moore led two of those teams to top-10 national rankings. Moore has taken a total 20 teams to the NCAA Championships as a head coach or assistant.

Moore's Islanders are one of the elite Southland dynasties of all-time. Islanders Tennis is one of four sports in conference history (63 years) to ever win 13 titles.

In the 63 year history of the conference, Moore's 15 NCAA tournaments at the same school rank him first all-time in Southland Conference history for all coaches and all sports. He surpassed Lamar baseball coach Jim Gilligan (11) in 2021 after both the Islanders men's & women's tennis programs reached the NCAA Tournament.

Moore was selected to prominent national leadership positions as well, including a 4-year term on the 12-member NCAA National Tennis Committee, and as ITA Regional Chairman for Texas for NCAA D-I.

The women have soared under Moore, going to the NCAA Championships in three straight years in 2021, 2022 and 2023, and reached the top-75 national rankings in 2014 and 2016. The 2017 women's team made it back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances and in 2018 the team won its third straight Southland Conference title. A&M-Corpus Christi followed it up with another three-peat from 2021-23. The Islanders finished 24-0 in the 2016 regular season, the only team in NCAA Division I to go undefeated, before falling to eventual National Champion Stanford in the NCAA Championships. In 2014, the women climbed as high as #60 in the ITA national rankings.



2015 was a historic year for the men as they reached #40 in the ITA rankings, went to the NCAA Championships as a #3 seed and won the Southland Conference for the 8th year in a row. The men's tennis team has reached the top 40 in the ITA national rankings three times since 2007 and is 53-5 under Moore in SLC matches since 2007.

Both Islanders teams were ranked in the Top 10 in NCAA Division I in attendance during 2013, 2014 and 2015, as both teams have enjoyed tremendous support in the Corpus Christi community.

Since becoming Director of Tennis, Moore has been heavily involved in raising significant funds in the Corpus Christi Tennis community to benefit both teams. In 2007, the Islanders earned the rights to run the prestigious H-E-B Tournament of Champions, the longest running tournament in the nation at 54 years. Moore also saw the program upgraded with the addition of two full-time assistants and the state-of-the-art, 12-court Islanders Thomas J. Henry Tennis Center. In addition, the Islanders now have a full-time athletic trainer and strength coach.

In 1998, Moore left Texas Tech to become the head coach at A&M-Corpus Christi and did what few coaches have done - start an NCAA Division I program from scratch. Moore immediately put the Islanders on the map with a 45-17 record and 15-3 SLC mark in the first three years. He was one of the youngest NCAA Division I head coaches in the country at age 26.

Moore left the Island when SMU offered him the head women's coaching job in 2001. Moore changed the culture immediately, leading the Mustangs to their best conference finish and win total in 14 years - 16 wins and 2nd place in the WAC. Moore's team reached #42 in the national rankings and Moore's Mustangs went undefeated in the WAC the following year. Known for his strong work ethic, Moore worked double-duty also serving as the SMU men's assistant. He helped SMU reach the NCAA Final Four in 2001 and #5 in the nation. Moore worked equally hard raising funds in the community for SMU. He raised the money to create a paid assistant coach position and started the Volvo Car Coach program for the entire SMU athletic department.



In 2004, Moore left SMU to become assistant coach/recruiting coordinator at Texas A&M under Hall-of-Fame Coach Tim Cass. Moore saw Texas A&M reach the NCAA Sweet 16 and #9 nationally in his first year. A&M also signed the #1 player in the United States, hosted the NCAA Championships and led the nation in attendance.

In 2006, after back-to-back Top 20 seasons and NCAA Tournament appearances, Moore left Texas A&M to return to his beloved hometown and the Islanders team he started in 1998.

Moore has trained under some of the top coaches in the nation including Tim Cass at Texas A&M, Tim Siegel at Texas Tech and Carl Nuefeld at SMU. He has also trained with many of the top coaches on the ATP and WTA Pro Tour.

Moore's highlight was traveling with legendary professional coach Bobby Banck as he coached WTA #3 Monica Seles, winner of 9 grand slam events.

He coaches the Islanders based on four pillars: family, character, grit, and discipline. Players must be committed to excellence on and off the court while also being great teammates who care for each other deeply.

Moore played on tennis scholarships at North Texas and Abilene Christian. While at ACU, Moore was team captain and was nationally ranked in singles. He also competed on the professional satellite circuit after college.

“The dynasty Steve has built with the Islanders - championships, culture and donors is one of the most respected in the nation. With his success and reputation, he could coach anywhere, but he loves the Islanders and Corpus Christi. Steve is all about character and mentoring those kids for success in life. He treats them like family long after they graduate, and that's what we all respect about him the most. The Islanders Tennis culture is respected everywhere.” - Tim Siegel, head coach Texas Tech, former grand slam player and coach.

AURELIEN TAVE

Associate Head Coach, Aurelien Tave, entered his 11th season on the coaching staff in 2022.

Most recently, he coached the Islanders to three championships and two NCAA Tournament appearances in 2021, and the same in 2023. This past season, the NCAA Tournament and combined to win three championships. A&M-Corpus Christi was one of 29 Division I schools in America with both the men and women at the NCAA Championships. It was the third consecutive appearance for the women after also winning the conference tournament in 2022.

A former No. 1 singles and doubles player for the Islanders and former team captain, Tave began his coaching career as a student assistant coach with the Islanders. Since then, Tave has

been promoted to an assistant coach and then the associate head coach in fall 2016. As a player, Tave had the winningest record on the team in 2011 for an Islanders team that reached No. 54 in Division I National Rankings. He played No. 1 singles, doubles and was team captain of an Islanders team that won back-to-back Southland Conference Championships and had back-to-back years in the national rankings.

"Aurelien was one of the toughest and smartest players I've ever coached," Director of Tennis Steve Moore said. "He truly got every bit out of his talent and was respected nationally for how tough and smart he played. Aurelien does a great job of conveying that toughness and intelligent tennis to our players, he is tremendously well liked and respected by the teams. He was that guy on the team who did everything right, the kind of guy you really appreciate as a coach.

"I believe the Aure has emerged as one of the top young coaches in the country. He has all the qualities it takes to be a great coach - strong character, leadership and work ethic. He's very good on the court and great mind for the game. He is not afraid to tackle the tough parts of this job like the relentless dog fight of modern recruiting, gameplans and scouting, travel and helping run the big events we put on here. He is extremely loyal to the Islanders and cares deeply about the players. I consider Aure a great asset for our program. He is an elite Associate Head Coach for both men's and women's teams, and has been a huge factor in our team's success."

He assists Coach Moore in all aspects of the program; from recruiting, planning, setup and running practice, team travel, itineraries, fundraising and running the numerous tournaments held at the Thomas J. Henry Tennis Center.

"Aure has brought so much character, leadership and heart to our program for the past 13 years. He's truly a great coach, man and role model for these young, impressive Islanders. He leads by example and walks the walk. He has been such a blessing to the Islanders since his arrival, and is so highly respected by the players and coaches. Aure is a truly special Islander and pillar of this program." - Coach Moore

OLGA BAZHANOVA

Bazhanova joined the Islanders in 2017-18 after spending the previous three seasons as the head coach at Northwestern State, overseeing one of the most successful programs in the Southland Conference. In her first season on the Island, Texas A&M-Corpus Christi captured the women's regular season title and in 2019, the men's team won the program's 25th Southland title and earned the program's 11th trip to the NCAA Tournament.

In 2021, Bazhanova coached the Islanders to three championships and two NCAA Tournament appearances. The Islanders did the same in 2023, both reaching the NCAA Tournament and combined to win three championships. A&M-Corpus Christi was one of 29 Division I schools in America with both the men and women at the NCAA Championships. It was the third consecutive appearance for the women after also winning the conference tournament in 2022. As a head coach, she took the Demons to a Southland Conference Championship and NCAA Tournament in 2015. In 2016, she led her team back to the SLC finals for a second straight season.

COACH BAZHANOVA HIGHLIGHTS

Bazhanova has been to the NCAA Championships as a head coach, assistant coach and player. She played and coached under Coach Patrick Dubois, one of the winningest coaches in Southland Conference history. During her time with the Demons, which dates to 2013 as an assistant coach, Bazhanova helped lead Northwestern State to a pair of Southland Conference Tournament Championships and another two runner-up finishes. Bazhanova was also heavily involved in fundraising for the Northwestern State tennis program. She was also the Assistant Director of the Wellness and Recreation Center at Northwestern State.

A former player at Northwestern State, Bazhanova has been a part of five Southland titles for the Demons. During her playing days, Bazhanova played No. 1 singles and doubles for three-straight seasons at Northwestern State and led one of the best teams in Southland history climbing to No. 62 in the national rankings. Bazhanova also served as team captain for the Demons.

In 2010, Bazhanova won the clinching match at No. 1 singles against UT Arlington to send Northwestern State to the NCAA Championships as the Southland Conference Tournament winner. That same year, Bazhanova clinched one of the biggest victories for any Southland team in conference history, winning at No. 1 singles as Northwestern State toppled nationally-ranked, SEC-foe Mississippi State.

A native of Nikolaev, Ukraine, Bazhanova holds bachelor's and master's degrees with honors from Northwestern State.

AMBER BETSILL

Athletic Trainer

Amber Betsill joined the Athletics Department in September 2021 and serves as the head athletic trainer for both the men's and women's tennis teams. She is responsible for care and prevention for injuries for the tennis teams as well as the Islanders women's golf team.

Betsill came to A&M-Corpus Christi after working for 10 years in several different fields of athletic training. While in those positions, she provided comprehensive healthcare to high school athletes, collegiate athletes, and non-athletic orthopedic patients in the clinical setting.

Prior to her time at A&M-Corpus Christi, she earned her Master of Science degree in Exercise Science and gained experiences at the University of Louisiana at Monroe, as a graduate assistant athletic trainer. She assisted the women's soccer, softball, and track & field programs. She also completed her undergraduate degree in athletic training at Valdosta State University in Valdosta, Georgia.

A nationally certified and State of Texas licensed athletic trainer, Betsill is a member of the National Athletic Trainers' Association (NATA), Southwest Athletic Trainers' Association (SWATA), and Texas State Athletic Trainers Association (TSATA).

Betsill is a native of Jesup, Georgia. She currently resides in Corpus Christi with her husband, Tyler, and two German Short-haired Pointers, Bonnie, and Clyde.



ROBBIE KLEINMUNTZ

Sports Information Director

Robbie Kleinmuntz was hired at A&M-Corpus Christi in Nov. 2020 and elevated to Associate AD for Communications in Aug. 2022.

In three years, he's publicized an Islanders athletic department that has won 19 conference championships and made 11 NCAA Tournament appearances since his arrival. It includes eight tennis championships and five tennis NCAA Tournament appearances.

Kleinmuntz came to the The Island University after rebuilding a sports information department from scratch at Alcorn from July 2016 - Nov. 2020. He took over a department that had no prior stats, photos or records to work off of.

Kleinmuntz was awarded 2018-19 HBCU Sports Information Director of the Year by Black College Nines. Prior to Alcorn, Kleinmuntz spent three years as Assistant Director of Media Relations at the University of Louisiana Monroe from 2013-16. He was the primary contact for a men's basketball program that shot up to the top of the Sun Belt Conference standings after back-to-back 20-win seasons and a pair of postseason appearances.

Before ULM, Kleinmuntz worked as a communications assistant at the Sun Belt Conference office, and a sports information graduate assistant at Northwestern State. He experienced serving as the primary contact for soccer, volleyball, men's basketball, softball, track & field, tennis and swimming & diving during those stints.

As an undergrad, Kleinmuntz worked as an athletics media relations student intern at his alma mater the University of Pittsburgh. He worked in the Pitt Media Relations office when the men's basketball team was ranked No. 1 in the nation on two separate occasions. Kleinmuntz also wrote for the school newspaper, The Pitt News, as a sports writer and interned for the Pittsburgh Sports Report newspaper. Kleinmuntz earned his bachelor's degree as a double major in journalism and history from Pitt in 2010, and his master's degree in sports administration from NSU in 2012. He lettered in tennis at Highland Park High School (Illinois).

CARLOS PEDROSA

CARLOS PEDROSA was diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes his senior year, ending his amazing career with the Islanders - but he chose to play in the conference tournament. In front of a huge home crowd, Pedrosa was last match on. 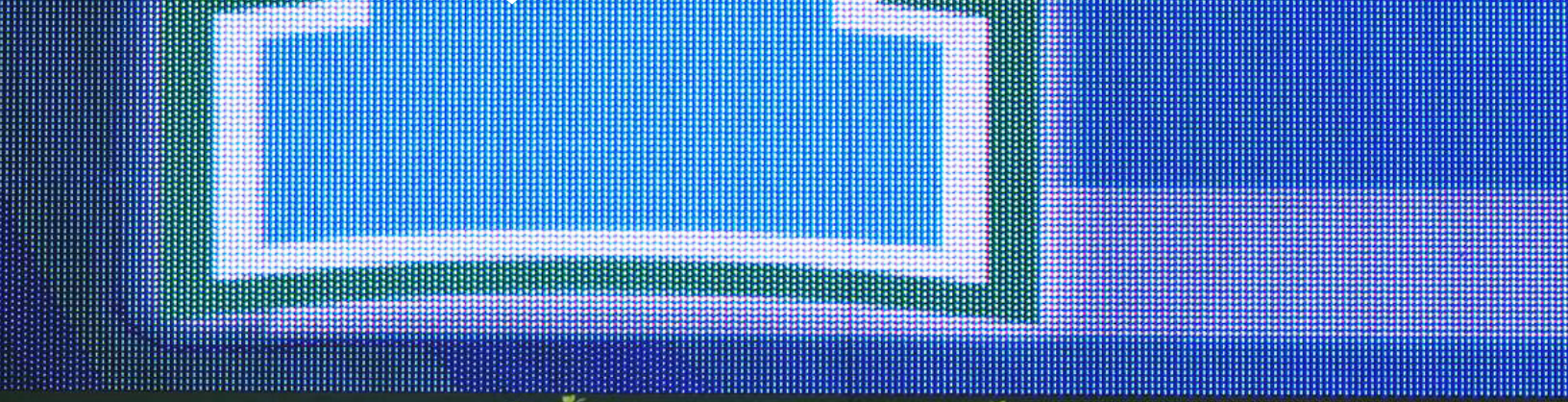

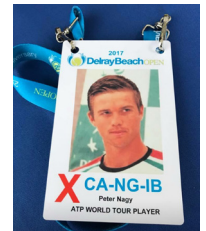

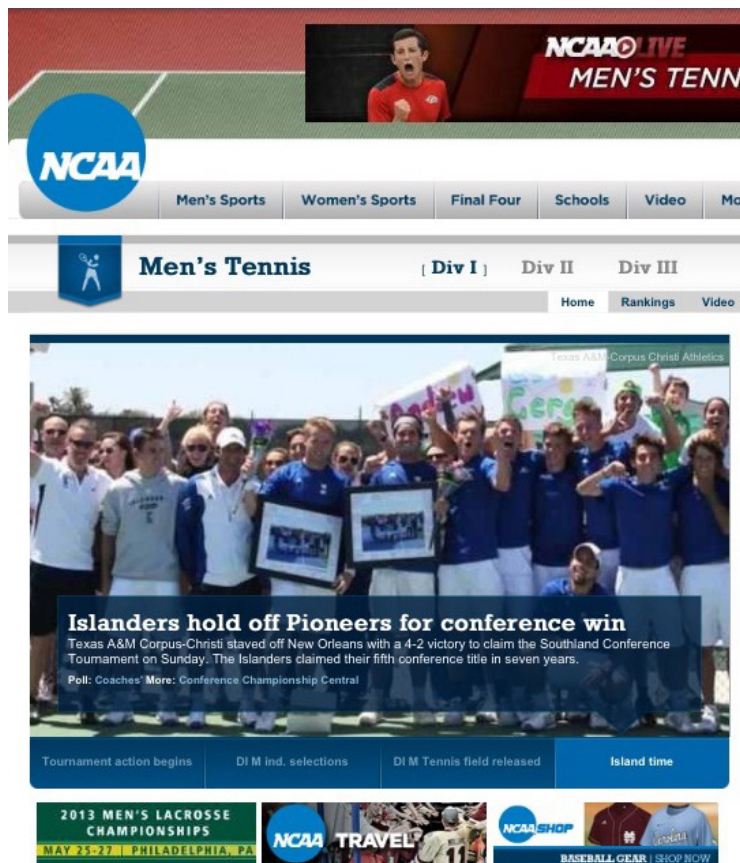
