1979 Football Team To Be Inducted Into Javelina Hall

A team picked to finish third in the Lone Star Conference, the 1979 Texas A&I football team not only won the league title but the NAIA national championship as well.

On Sept. 5, the 1979 squad and staff will be inducted into the Javelina Hall of Fame at ceremonies in the Memorial Student Union Building ballrooms on campus.

The event is set for 5:30 p.m.

The team compiled a 12-1 record en route to the seventh national trophy for the Javelina program.

This is the 35th anniversary of the team's accomplishments.

Ron Harms took over the head position two months before the start of the season. He had been the Javelina offensive coordinator in 1974 and 1975 before going to Baylor.

He was on the Baylor staff for three seasons.

In the three NAIA postseason playoff games, the Javelinas defeated Western Colorado, 38-14, in the quarterfinals in Kingsville; Angelo State, 22-19, in the semifinals in Kingsville, and Central Oklahoma, 20-14, in the Palm Bowl in McAllen.

The Palm Bowl was the championship game for the NAIA at that time.

Quarterback Martin Stroman led the Javelina passing with 1,264 yards. He completed 78 of 162 attempts.

Stroman also was the total offense leader with 2,029 yards.

Running back Robert Pool was the top rusher with 1,189

yards and wideout John Herrera led the receiving with 34 catches for 647 yards.

Defensively, linebacker Andy Hawkins topped the tackle chart with 134.

Hawkins was on three All-America first units and defensive back Jafus White was on two All-America squads.

Also receiving All-America honors were defensive backs Durwood Roquemore and Don Washington.

Hawkins was the most outstanding defensive player in the NAIA quarterfinal and semifinal games.

Stroman was the outstanding offensive player in the NAIA championship matchup and Herrera was the most valuable offensive player in the quarterfinals.

CONTINUING THE SERIES on the outstanding trips the Javelina athletic teams have made in the past.

There have been a number of treks to Mexico.

Before I arrived on the scene, the Javelina football team played in Mexico City.

In my first few years in Kingsville, the men's and women's track and field teams went to Mexico City and to Monterrey for meets.

In Mexico City, the team went a year after the Olympic Games had been held there.

The squad stayed in one of the Olympic Villages and rumor had it the meet would be in the Olympic Stadium. But there was a track and field facility on the grounds of the Village and it was staged there.

There was a parade-in, just as with the Olympics, with each of the teams displaying their banners.

The Javelinas traveled to Mexico City on a bus with Texas-Pan American. The Javelinas and Broncs were the only U.S. teams in the competition.

As always, there was an opportunity to tour Mexico City.

A chartered bus, which had once been a school bus, carried the team to a tour of downtown and a shopping area.

Traffic in Mexico City is just as with any other metropolitan area in the world....hectic.

The bus driver had everyone scared as he entered thoroughfares without looking for on-coming traffic. He had some religious medals hanging from the mirror and they worked. It was a good trip with only a few cars displaying their discontent by honking.

The food in the Village was local and different. Even though many of the entrees were named the same as in the U.S., they were prepared differently.

Mangos were always present and prepared in different ways.

En route to Mexico City, the team stopped in San Luis Potosi each way to spend the night. This also enabled the athletes and staff to visit one of Mexico's historic and interesting cities.

Again, the Javelinas found that you don't bluff your way across the street. When the traffic is coming, you'd better get out of the way.

The players had been told that there were certain items that wouldn't be allowed into the U.S.

This didn't stop several from purchasing stuffed birds and other items at the Monterrey market.

Needless to say, they didn't make their way back to Kingsville.

The meet in Monterrey was also run like an Olympic event.

There was the parade-in and the raising of the flags of the U.S. and Mexico.

The Javelinas stayed in a downtown Monterrey hotel and had the opportunity to check out sites.

The 1974 Javelina football team played Monterrey Tech in Monterrey.

The Mexico team was coached by former Javelina player and coach Barry Copenhaver.

Steve Yaden, former Javelina football and baseball player, is a trooper with the Texas Department of Safety. Yaden was an All-Lone Star Conference wide receiver in football in 2005 and 2006 and was the LSC South Division player of the year in baseball in 2005 and made the All-LSC South Division baseball team in 2005 and 2006. His .433 batting average in 2005 is the fourth best ever for the Javelinas. His .398 two-year career batting average is the third best in Javelina history. Yaden's eight triples is the seventh most in a career and his .535 slugging percentage ranks ninth best in a Javelina career. His 488 putouts in two seasons is the sixth highest total ever. In football, Yaden's 4.33 receptions per game in his career is fourth best and his 44 receptions in 2005 led the team in that statistical category.

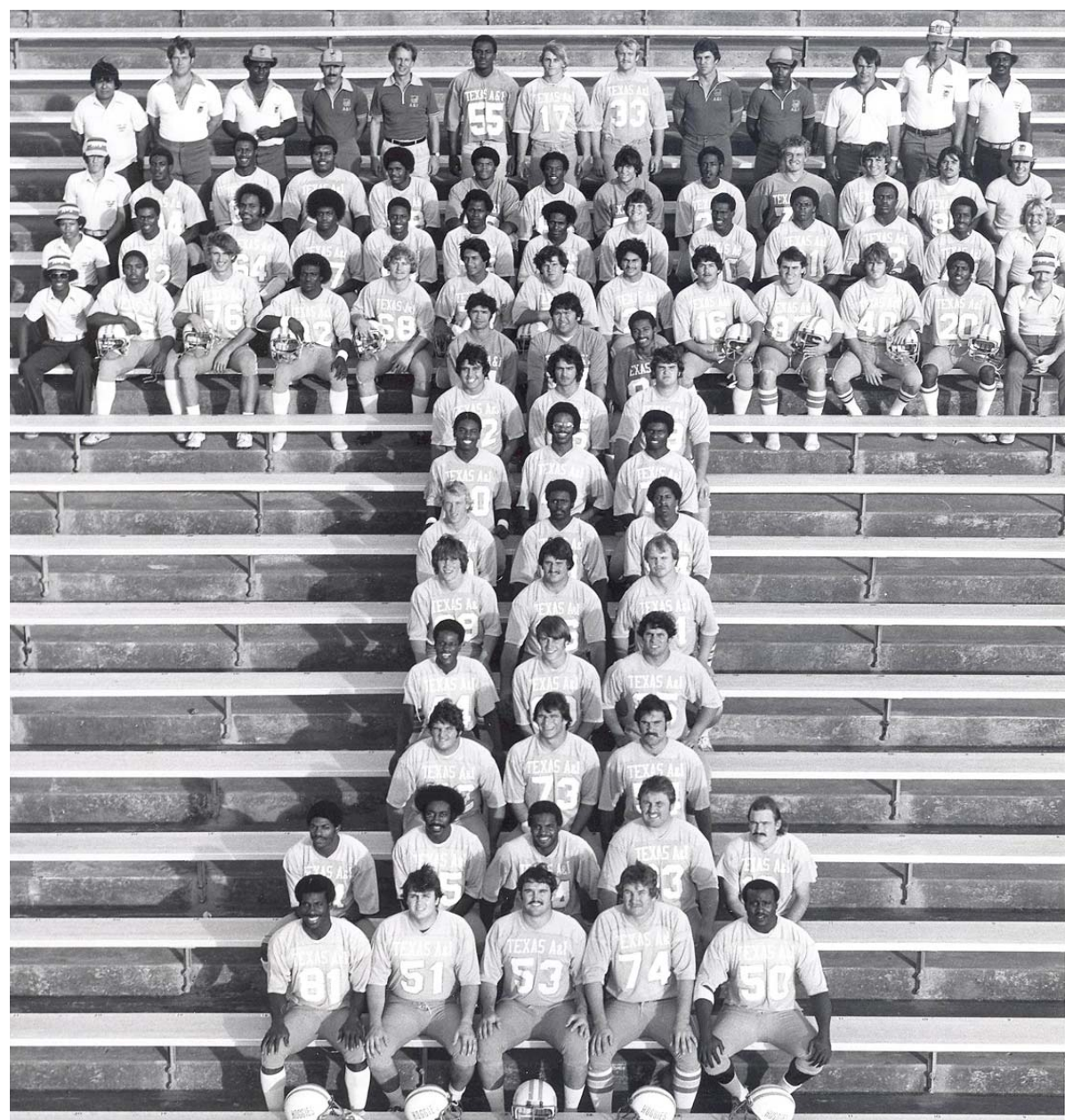

Three coaches have been added to the Texas A&M-Kingsville athletic staff.

Betsy White-Dean has been named the head softball coach, Autumn Williams is the new head women's tennis coach and Brittany Mason has been selected as the women's basketball assistant.

White-Dean becomes the seventh head coach in softball since the start of the program in 1997.

She has been the pitching coach at Seton Hall for the past three seasons.

White-Dean was a pitching and power-hitting coach at Adelphi (N.Y.) before going to Seton Hall.

She served as head softball coach at Elba High School in Alabama in 2008.

The new Javelina coach has worked at various football camps at schools such as Rutgers, Notre Dame, Massachusetts-Lowell and Hofstra.

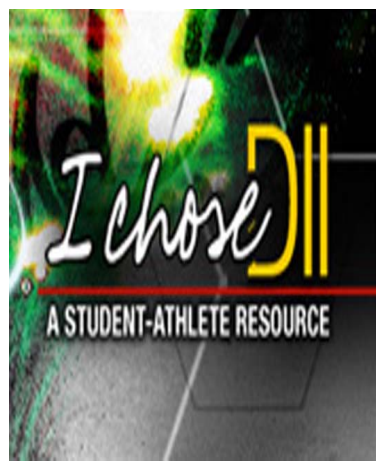
Tickets must be purchased in advance. There will be no sales at the door the night of the banquet.
