Football Kicks Off With Initial Workout Friday

The 2014 Texas A&M-Kingsville football team reports Thursday to begin its preseason program and the first practice session is set for Friday.

Three team meetings are scheduled for Thursday.

The first workout, in helmets, will be at 3:50 p.m. Friday and a similar practice will be at 9:50 a.m. Saturday.

The players will don shoulder pads for a 4:50 p.m. session Sunday and a similar workout will be held at 8:50 a.m. Monday.

Full pads will be worn for the first time at 8:50 a.m. Tuesday and

the squad will hold full-pad drills at 8:50 a.m. Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, Aug. 20-23.

The school-day fall workout schedule begins Monday, Aug. 25.

The Javelinas won't be lacking for experience this season.

Sixty-three of the squad members were with the team last fall.

Twenty-eight are lettermen, six are squadmen and 29 are redshirts.

The Texas A&M-Kingsville volleyball team will hold its first workout of the fall season Monday at 1:30 p.m. in the Steinke Center.

The Javelinas report Sunday and will meet for the first time at 6:45 p.m.

There will be two workouts Tuesday and Aug. 20-22.

The Javelinas will meet St. Edward's in a 1:30 p.m. scrimmage Aug. 23 in the Texas-Brownsville gymnasium in Brownsville.

The squad will be preparing for its season opener Sept. 5 in the Rollins Invitational Tournament in Winter Park, Fla., taking on Southern Arkansas.

The home opener will come Sept. 12 when the Javelinas host the Emerald Beach Hotel-Javelina

Invitational Tournament in Kingsville.

The first Lone Star Conference match is Sept. 19 with Tarleton State in Stephenville.

The Javelinas have five letterwinners returning this fall and there are five seniors.

JERON ROBINSON'S RECORD-SETTING high jump at the NCAA Division II Championships in Allendale, Mich., in May has him ranked as the 14th best in the world this season.

Robinson cleared 7-6.5 to win the national title and break the Division II meet record.

He has the third best jump by a United States competitor this season.

Erik Kynard has a 7-9 best and Dusty Jonas has cleared 7-8.5. Kynard and Jonas are professionals. Kynard finished at Kansas State in 2013 and Jonas ended his collegiate career at Nebraska in 2008.

Robinson will be a senior with the Javelina indoor and outdoor teams in 2015.

THE SEPTEMBER ISSUE of *Texas Highways* magazine has a 10-page section on "Extraordinary Texans".

Nine different Texans are featured and one is Armando Hinojosa of Laredo.

Armando is a graduate of Texas A&I and an internationally known sculptor and artist.

One of his works is the javelina sculpture, "Leaders of the Pack", on the boulevard in front of College Hall.

He also has a javelina sculpture in one of the engineering buildings and a sculpture of Dr. Frank Dotterweich is in the courtyard of the engineering complex.

His latest sculpture on campus will be dedicated Sept. 6 in Javelina Stadium. It is the likeness of Javelina coach, player and administrator Gil Steinke.

The article points out that he has at least 35 "monumental" sculptures including works for Sea World San Antonio, the city of Corpus Christi, the Boy Scouts and the Laredo airport and on the grounds of the state capitol building in Austin.

Armando is also an artist and his paintings of wildlife, and especially javelinas, appear in many public buildings and on private home walls.

Among those who have, or have had, Armando's art are the King Ranch, the Killiam Ranch, singer Vicki Carr, former president Richard Nixon, former vice president Walter Mondale, former Texas governors Dolph Briscoe and Bill Clements, the crown prince of Jordan, Mario Moreno (Cantinflas) and pianist Roger Williams.

EDDIE MOTEN CONTINUES to be one of the top players in the Arena Football League.

He is with the Orlando Predators and the squad played in the AFL semifinals Sunday night, meeting the Cleveland Gladiators.

If the Predators won the game, they will be in the XXVII Arena Bowl game Aug. 23.

Moten, 5-10, 185-pound defensive back, has been in the AFL for eight seasons and has been All-AFL first team and was a member of the 2008 Philadelphia Soul squad that captured the league championship.

He has also played for Dallas, San Jose and New Orleans as well as Orlando and Philadelphia.

Moten was with the Javelinas in 2002 and 2003 and was first-team All-America his senior season.

He was All-Lone Star Conference in both of his years with the Javelinas and also made all-region.

Moten was named the LSC defensive back of the year in 2003 and played in the Cactus Bowl.

In his two years with the squad, the Javelinas went 21-5, winning the LSC championship both seasons and reaching the NCAA Division II national semifinals in 2002 and 2003.

TWO COLORADO-MESA players were named to the All-Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference preseason football team.

The Mavericks on the squad are defensive lineman William Milo, 5-10, 290-pound sophomore from San Diego, Calif., and defensive back Jordan Price, 5-8, 180-pound senior from Fort Worth (Arlington Heights).

The Javelinas will host Mesa Sept. 13 in Javelina Stadium.

FIVE SCHOOLS HAVE been approved for the three-year membership process to gain admission into NCAA Division II. Concordia (Ore.), Concordia (Calif.), California State-San Marcos, Embry-Riddle Aeronautical (Fla.) and Oklahoma Baptist are the successful applicants for Division II alignment.

Concordia of Oregon will join the Great Northwest Athletic Conference and will begin competing for league titles in 2015-16.

With Concordia, the GNAC will have 11 institutions, located in five states and Canada.

Cal State-San Marcos will be a member of the California Collegiate Athletic Association when it gains full Division II membership.

Oklahoma Baptist will join the Great American Conference with its move to DII and Embry-Riddle will become affiliated with the Sunshine State Conference.

THE MID-AMERICA Intercollegiate Athletic Association and Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference are making it difficult for football teams in leagues that have squads looking for non-conference games.

Each of the teams in those two leagues will play no non-conference games....only contests against league opponents.

This means that Central Oklahoma and Northeastern Oklahoma and most of the Division II schools in Missouri and Kansas won't be available for non-conference opponents. They are members of the MIAA.

It also proves a negative for the MIAA and NSIC members. They have no intersectional games for the national pollsters to use in determining the strength of the conference against the other leagues.

If a school in either of those conferences goes 11-0, it means they are the best in that league but what about competition against a team or two from other conferences?

Schools with intersectional schedules should be given an advantage when it comes time to cast votes in this fall's polls.

Services Held For Former Football Player

A memorial mass was held Saturday for Sylvan Miori, 86, who died July 29 at his home in Wharton.

Miori is a former Javelina football player and a member of the Javelina Club.

One of the Javelina athletic department's scholarship endowment programs is named for Miori.

A native of Victoria and the son of an Italian immigrant farmer and rancher, he served in the U.S. Navy in World War II.

After being discharged, he attended Texas A&I on a football scholarship and received a bachelor's degree in 1949.

He was an assistant high school football coach in Wharton in 1951 and entered private business in 1954.

Miori served on numerous civic boards and committees and received the Outstanding Citizen Award from the Wharton Chamber of Commerce in 1998.

He founded a blood donation program geared to teenagers in 1995. The TAPS (Teens Are People Savers) program collected more than 26,000 pints of blood.

Miori is survived by his wife of 61 years, Betty Brown Miori; a daughter, Marsha Petter of Bay City; a son, Louis Miori of Houston; sisters Clara Berkman of Victoria and Lillian Lester of Huntsville; six grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

A memorial mass was celebrated Saturday at Holy Family Catholic Church in Wharton.

Javelina SAAC Receives Fifth Consecutive LSC Cup

The Texas A&M-Kingsville Student-Athletic Advisory Committee has been named the recipient of its fifth consecutive Lone Star Conference SAAC Cup.

The Javelinas have now received the Cup in five of the six years it has been presented.

TAMUK scored 18,780 points in the 2013-14 school year.

West Texas A&M had 16,938 points, Cameron 16,474 points, Texas A&M-Commerce 14,180, Midwestern State 7,088, Angelo State 6,846, Tarleton State 6,707, Eastern New Mexico 6,101 and Texas Woman's 5,263.

The honor is bestowed on the school that compiles the most points in LSC initiatives.

These include:

.....LSC community service months during which athletes take part in community service projects on their campuses and in their communities.

.....Make-A-Wish participation. Monetary donations are raised throughout the school year.

.....LSC SAAC meetings. At least two representatives from each campus attend two meetings a year.

.....Campus SAAC meetings. The campus meetings are held twice a month.

.....SAAC legislative grid. Points are awarded for completing the NCAA SAAC legislative grid by a required due date.

.....Other community service projects. These are held other than in the two months designated as LSC Community Service Months.

.....Other fundraising projects. These are for money raised other than for Make-A-Wish.

Amanda Knight, assistant athletic director for compliance and senior women's athletic administrator, and Jackie Wallgren, coordinator of student-athlete services, were advisors for SAAC in 2013-14.

Need-To-Know Rule Changes for 2014 Football Season

Since 2011, the National Football Foundation (NFF) has partnered with Rogers Redding, the national coordinator of College Football Officiating (CFO) to help generate awareness for the rule changes in college football.

With training camps underway, the NFF highlights the key rule changes and officiating points of emphasis that will be in effect during the 2014 season.

The Four Major Rule Changes for the 2014 Season

1. Targeting Fouls: Instant Replay Can Remove the 15-Yard Penalty

Part of the penalty for targeting fouls is that the player is ejected from the game. In games where instant replay is used, the player is returned to the game if the video review shows conclusively that there was no forcible contact to the head and neck area or with the crown of the helmet. If this happens in 2014, and there is not another personal foul in combination with the targeting foul, then the 15-yard penalty is also erased. Examples of combination personal fouls include roughing the passer and kick or catch interference. In cases where such fouls are accompanied by a targeting call, the 15-yard penalty will still be enforced, even if the player's ejection is overturned.

2. Targeting Fouls in Games Without Instant Replay: Halftime Review

In games where instant replay is not used, there is no opportunity for an immediate video review. A 2014 rule change now allows the referee to review a first-half foul at halftime when video is available at the game site. If this halftime review convinces the referee that the player should not have been ejected, he may return to the game for the second half. Such a review is optional. There must be a conference

policy in place, or pregame agreement between the teams in interconference games, which specifies where the review will occur and what kind of video will be used. The decision of the referee is final and may not be appealed.

Second-half targeting fouls may still be reviewed by appeal to the national coordinator of officials to determine whether the player is required to sit out the first half of his team's next game. This rule is unchanged from 2013.

3. Low Hits on the Passer

An extension of the rule for roughing the passer, a new rule in 2014 prohibits the defense from making forcible contact at the knee or below to an opponent who is in a passing posture. It is designed to eliminate knee injuries on plays where the defensive player forcibly drives a shoulder, helmet or forearm into the lower leg of the passer. This rule is not intended to prevent the defense from making a legitimate wrap-up tackle in which the contact is at or below the knee.

4. Player Numerals Must Contrast With the Jersey

Last year the rules committee clarified the rule requiring that the player's uniform number must clearly contrast with the jersey itself. During the 2013 season there was an interpretation that introduced a penalty for a team wearing a jersey that does not comply. This interpretation has now been codified as a rule.

Beginning in 2014, the referee will ask the team to change into legal jerseys before the game begins. If the team does not change, it will be charged with a timeout. The same opportunity will be offered during the time between the first and second quarters, at halftime and at the beginning of the fourth quarter, and again a timeout will be charged each time the team does not comply. This means that a team could potentially burn four of its

allotted six timeouts for the game because of the illegal jerseys.

2014 Officiating Points of Emphasis

This year college football officials are being asked to pay special attention to two areas of the game that are of concern to the rules committee and to other stakeholders: management of team personnel on the sidelines and the sportsmanlike behavior of players.

Management of the sidelines has emerged as a concern in the past few years, especially with the increase of no-huddle offenses.

This style of play means that coaches are much more likely to be on the field right before the snap and then again too quickly after a play is over. Many coaches and players are still unaware of the fact that the six-foot white border around the sideline is no-man's land. This restricted area must be clear while the ball is alive as well as during the period after the play is over until the action has ceased. Officials will work with teams to keep this area clear but closer attention will be given to enforcing the sideline rules, which will include imposing appropriate penalties when necessary.

Player behavior is also becoming an issue as unsportsmanlike conduct is starting to drift back into the game. Good sportsmanship and respect for the opponent are firmly entrenched characteristics of college football that must be maintained. Spontaneous enthusiasm and positive celebration are encouraged, but when players extend this into self-promotion and taunting of the opponent, officials will be firm about calling unsportsmanlike conduct fouls. Some of these acts, such as the "throat slash" or vulgar behavior, are automatic fouls. Actions of this ilk have no place in our game, and officials are instructed to throw the flag when these occur. The game and its image are advanced and strengthened when everyone involved conducts

themselves in a manner that embraces good sportsmanship.

"We want to protect the game and to help reduce critical injuries with this message: play the game hard but stay away from serious fouls," said Redding, who claimed the NFF Outstanding Football Official Award in 2010 after a three decade career in the Southwest Conference and the Southeastern Conference. "By making changes, we are signaling that the safety of the student-athlete stands at the very top of our list of priorities. The clear intent is to change

player behavior."

The CFO functions as the national professional organization for all football officials who work games at the collegiate level, and the organization held its annual winter meeting of conference coordinators for football officials in late January for the second consecutive year at the NFF headquarters in Irving. The NCAA Football Rules Committee subsequently adopted the CFO's recommendations to create a safer environment for football student-athletes.
