Track & Field Racks Up 12 Gold Medals at LSC Meet



A Third Gold And a National Record

Jeron Robinson, junior from Houston (Travis), won his third Lone Star Conference outdoor high jump championship, in as many seasons, at the conference meet last weekend in San Angelo. Robinson broke the LSC and NCAA Division II records in the event by clearing 7-7.

The Texas A&M-Kingsville men's and women's track and field teams didn't take the team titles but they did win the battle for the gold at the Lone Star Conference Championships last weekend in San Angelo.

The Javelina men and women won the most gold medals in their divisions.

The team combined for 12 gold medals, six by the men and six by the women.

In both divisions, West Texas A&M was second with five gold medals for the men and four for the women.

Men's team champion Texas A&M-Commerce had four golds and the women's winner, Angelo State, had two.

Jeron Robinson, junior from Houston (Travis), set an NCAA Division II record when he cleared 7-7 in the high jump.

That broke the record 7-6.5 he had tied at last year's Division II national meet.

He had shared the record with Jim Dilling of Minnesota State.

Javier Lopez, sophomore from Cordova, Spain, tied the school record in the 110-meter hurdles with a 13.67 in the prelims. He finished second in the finals.

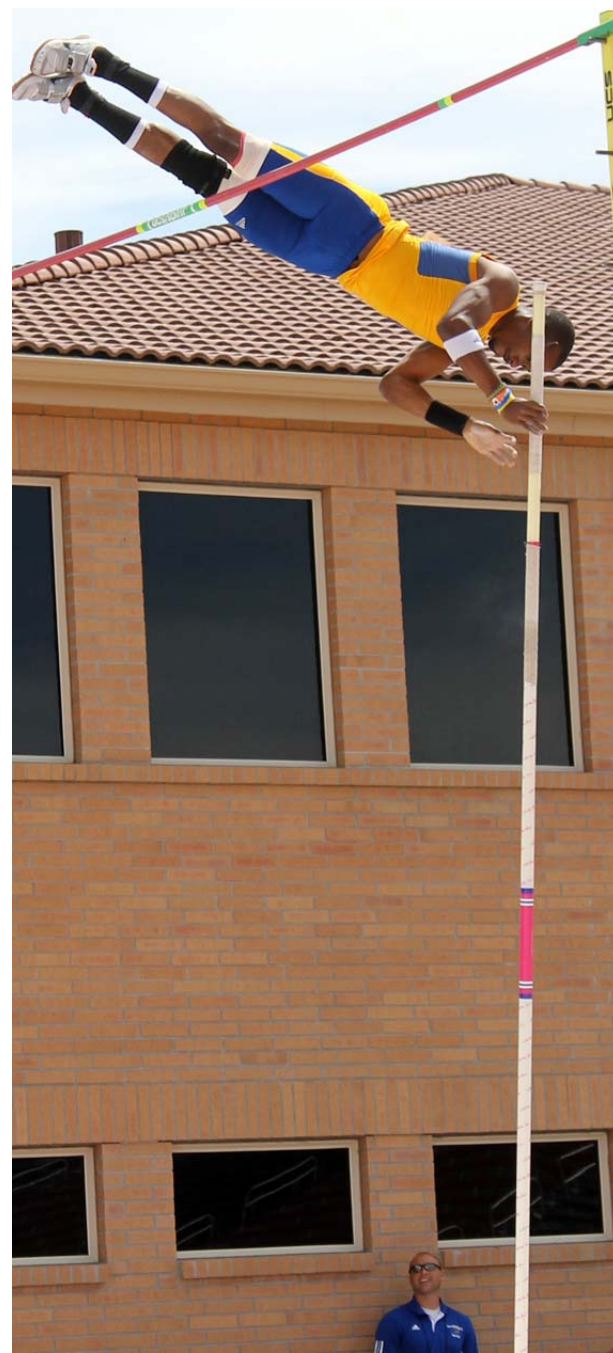
The record was set by Tarmo Jallai in 2004.

Kaina Martinez, junior from Seine Bight, Belize, was a double winner for the Javelinas, establishing herself as the fastest female in the Lone Star Conference and one of the fastest in the nation.

She won the 100-meter dash in a time of 11.76 and took the 200 title with a time of 24.18.

Martinez has the fastest 100 time in Division II.

IT HAS BEEN apparent since the start of the outdoor track and field season that the Javelina teams had the quality but probably not the quantity to take Lone Star Conference team championships.

This turned out to be true last weekend.

But did the Javelinas ever shine in the individual and relay events.

The Javelinas won more gold medals in the men's and women's divisions than any other school.

Each squad captured six golds.

Texas A&M-Commerce used its depth to compile enough points to take the men's team title. The Lions had four first-place finishes.

Angelo State also had quantity as it repeated as women's titlist. The Rambelles won two gold medals.

Not only did the Javelinas have the most champions at the conference level, but have national leaders as well.

Jeron Robinson broke the national record in the high jump last weekend, clearing 7-7.

Long jumper Lutalo Boyce won his event and has the best mark in Division II.

Javier Lopez has the nation's best time in the 110-meter hurdles.

Kaina Martinez is the national leader in the 100-meter dash and won the 100 and 200 at the conference meet.

The Javelinas didn't return to South Texas with team trophies, but with lots of gold medallions hanging from their necks.

THE BASEBALL TEAM'S season ended on a sour note last weekend when it was eliminated in the Lone Star Conference postseason tournament.

But it didn't erase an outstanding season for the Javelinas and as I said last year, the team has moved into the upper echelon of the NCAA Division II circles with its successes over the past few years.

The squad was ranked in the national polls most of the season and was one of the top teams in the South Central Region.

When baseball is talked in Division II nowadays, the Javelinas are part of the conversation.

With a good nucleus returning from this season, and an impressive signee list, this success is expected to continue in the future.

THINK THERE ISN'T enough offense in baseball?

You should have been at the NCAA Division II game between Minnesota State-Bemidji (Minn.) State April 11 in Bemidji.

MSU defeated the Beavers, 41-20, in a game that saw 56 hits, 35 by the winner.

The three-hour, 55-minute contest saw Minnesota State scoring 14 runs in one inning and 10 in another.

One of the MSU batters had five hits and two of the Bemidji batters had four hits each.

Lopez had an automatic qualifying time in the 110 hurdles in the prelims and finals.

Jordan Yamoah, junior from Arlington, N.Y., automatically qualified for nationals in the pole vault with a winning height of 17-7, best in Division II.

Lutalo Boyce, sophomore from Westbury, N.Y., again automatically qualified for the national meet in the long jump when he won with a 25-3.25 jump.

Texas A&M-Commerce won the men's division with 196 points and West Texas was runnerup with 166.

Angelo State was third with 146, the Javelinas fourth with 135, Tarleton State fifth with 85, Harding sixth with 48 and Eastern New Mexico seventh with 35.

In the women's division, ASU had 197 points and West Texas was runnerup with 177.5.

Tarleton State finished third with 136.5, Texas A&M-Commerce fourth with 99, the Javelinas fifth with 87, Eastern New Mexico sixth with 56, Harding seventh with 44 and Midwestern State eighth with 20.

The Javelinas who have automatically qualified and the provisional qualifiers who receive invitations this week will take part

in the NCAA Division II national meet May 21-23 in Allendale, Mich.

Robinson is the defending national champion in the high jump and Yamoah was the national pole vault winner in 2013.

The Javelina men finished fourth in the team standings last season.

There were 440 total pitches thrown by 16 different pitchers. Nine home runs were hit along with eight doubles.

One hundred and 30 batters went to the plate.

The score didn't set an NCAA record. It was the second highest scoring game in history.

The next day, MSU got a 23-1 victory over the Beavers.

In other Division II baseball news:

...Pitcher Matt McClain of St. Mary's recently set a school record when he threw 10 shutout innings in a game against St. Edward's.

He lowered his earned run average to 1.17 with the shutout.

The Javelinas played St. Mary's and St. Edward's twice each this spring.

...Southern Arkansas, a Javelina opponent earlier this season, had five home runs and scored 24 runs on 28 hits in a recent doubleheader split with Arkansas Tech.

FIVE LONE STAR Conference teams were selected for the NCAA Division II softball playoffs.

The league filled five of the eight positions in the South Central Region.

Sixty-four programs advanced teams into the postseason play.

West Texas A&M, defending national champion, is seeded No.

1 in the region and the other LSC teams are Cameron No. 4, Angelo State No. 5, Texas Woman's No. 7 and Tarleton State No. 8.

The regional winners advance into the Super Regionals this weekend and the final eight will play in the national tournament May 21-25 in Oklahoma City.

THE LONE STAR Conference will have a new look beginning in 2016-17.

There will be 13 schools that will be full-time members or are associate members of the league.

The associates are Oklahoma Panhandle State in football only and Harding of Arkansas in men's and women's cross country, indoor track and field and outdoor track and field.

The other 11 will be full-time members.

If the schools sponsor the same sports they currently sponsor, this is how the league will look in 2016-17 in each sport in which the Javelinas participate

Services Held For Patrick in Austin

Services for Dr. Donald Patrick, 76, a Texas A&I graduate and member of the Javelina track and field team, were held May 2 in Austin.

His twin brother, David, was also an athlete for the Javelinas.

Patrick was a Distinguished Alumni from Texas A&I.

He served as honorary meet referee at a Lone Star Conference Track and Field Championship in Kingsville.

After receiving his degree, he attended Baylor College of Medicine where he completed is neurosurgical residency.

He was the chief of neurosurgery of the 24th evacuation hospital in Vietnam and received a Bronze Star.

Patrick practiced neurosurgery in Austin from 1970-2001. He served as the chief of staff and chief of surgery at multiple hospitals.

He was the executive director of the Texas Medical Board from 2001-08.

His interests varied from raising quarter horses, ranching, building and flying his own airplane, running marathons, climbing mountains and traveling extensively.

Patrick served on, and was president of, the Pflugerville Independent School District board.

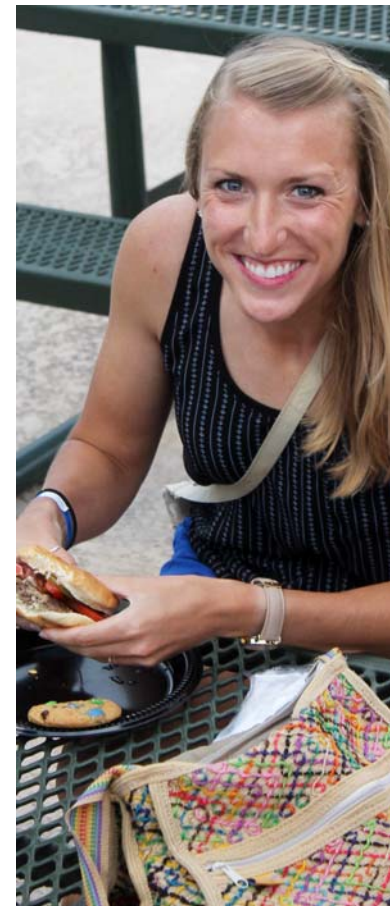

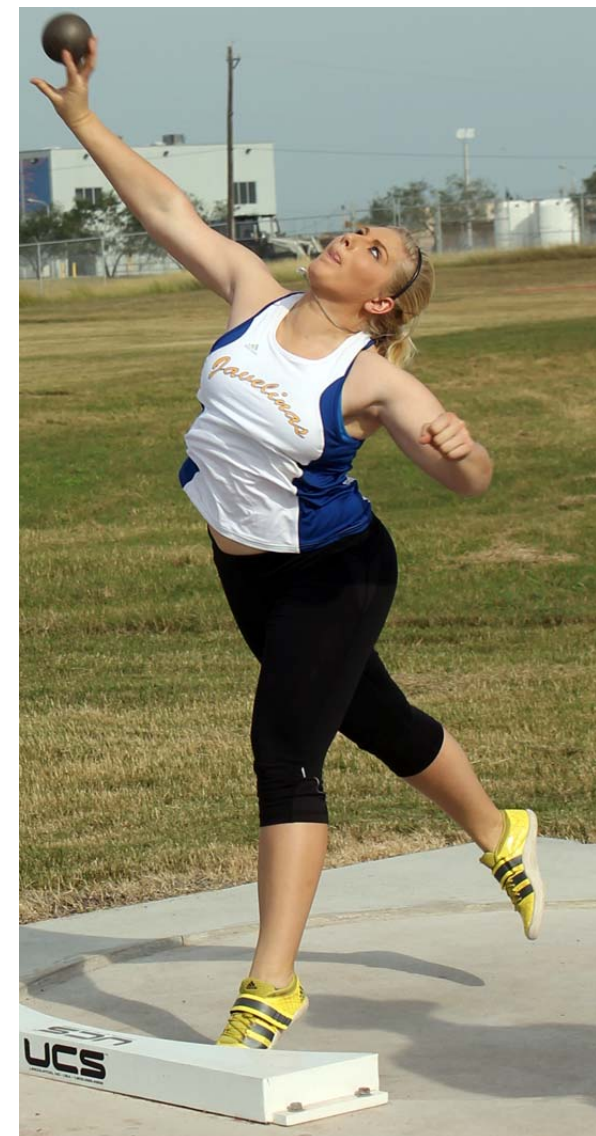
