Football Kicks Off Saturday With Incarnate Word



With an experienced roster and most of last year's statistical leaders returning, the Texas A&M-Kingsville football team opens its season Saturday night against Incarnate Word in San Antonio.

Kickoff will be at 6 p.m. in Benson Stadium on the UIW campus.

It will be the second consecutive year the Javelinas and Cardinals have opened with each other.

The Cards escaped with a two-point (18-16) victory last year, marking the first time in four seasons they had managed to down the Javelinas.

The Javelinas will be trying to improve on their 2-9 record of last season when they lost their nine contests by an average of nine point a game. Five of the setbacks were by a touchdown or less.

Daren Wilkinson begins his second season as head of the Javelina program.

He has his top rusher, top passer, top three receivers and top two tacklers returning.

Volleyball Opens Season in Memphis Tournament

The Texas A&M-Kingsville volleyball team opens its fall campaign Friday and Saturday in the Christian Brothers Invitational Tournament in Memphis, Tenn., and will open its home schedule Tuesday when the Javelinas host St. Mary's.

The St. Mary's match has a 7 p.m. start time.

In Tennessee, the Javelinas will meet opponents from four different conferences.

The Javelinas will take on

Southwest Baptist (Mo.) of the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletic Association at 12:30 p.m. Friday and will meet St. Joseph's (Ind.) of the Great Lakes Valley Conference at 5 p.m.

Saturday's schedule will see the Javelinas meeting Barton (N.C.) from Conference Carolinas at 10:15 a.m. and Arkansas Tech of the Great American Conference at 2:45 p.m.

Tanya Allen has all of her players from last season's 19-15

team returning this fall.

Casey Klobedans, 5-9 junior setter from Boerne (Champion), led the team in attack percentage (.298) and sets (10.02).

She was named the Lone Star Conference setter of the year and has received the same recognition in this year's preseason selections.

Krystal Faison, 5-7 junior outside hitter from San Antonio (Judson), led the team in kills with a 3.46 average and Brett Zaccardo,

5-7 junior libero from Amarillo (Bushland), was the top digger with a 4.98 average.

The roster still has only three senior this fall.

These are Ashley Bukowski, 5-8 senior middle blocker from Harlingen (South); Valerie Moerhig, 5-10 senior outside hitter from La Vernia, and Alexandria Wells, 5-8 senior middle blocker from Austin (Bowie).

WHEN THE JAVELINAS and Incarnate Word meet Saturday, it may be the last time they'll be matched up in football in the near future.

There are no more games on the current contract.

It will be the fifth meeting of the two South Texas schools.

When UIW started football several years ago, it was thought that the rivalry between the Javelinas and Cardinals could grow into one similar to the one the Javelinas had with Southwest Texas for decades.

But when UIW moved out of the Lone Star Conference, and NCAA Division II, it took a lot of the attractiveness of the game.

THE JAVELINAS WILL host Simon Fraser (British Columbia) next weekend (Sept. 10) for the opening home contest of the season.

The Clan roster will include mostly Canadian athletes. Fifty-seven of the players are Canadian and they come from all parts of the country.

Forty-one are from British Columbia. Seven are from Ontario, five from Alberta, two from Manitoba and one from Saskatchewan.

There are 13 from the U.S. and 10 of these are from the neighboring state of Washington. Two are from California and one from Alaska.

There is a player from Nigeria and one from the United Arab Emirates.

THERE WERE NO Lone Star Conference players on the NCAA Division II preseason All-America football team released by D2Football.com last week.

But one Javelina opponent was on the list.

Jordan Herdman, 6-2, 235-pound senior linebacker at Simon Fraser, made the first unit.

One LSC player was on the second team: Punter Felipe Parra, senior at West Texas A&M.

SEVERAL JAVELINAS ARE among the football statistical leaders returning this fall, according to LSCScoop.com.

Return man Nick Pelrean is the second top returnee in his field. He had 426 yards last season.

Quarterback Myles Carr is the top returning passer. He had 2,293 last season.

Halfback Greg Pitre is the third top rusher with his 744 yards last fall.

Wideouts Anthony Autry and Jordan Thomas are the fourth and fifth top returnees in receiving, Autry with 831 yards last year and Thomas with 703.

Defensively, Brandon Jones is the second top returner in tackles for losses with 12.5 last season.

He has the second most sacks with four.

Kelechi Amushie had nine passes broken up in 2015 and that is the second best among the returnees and Devonte Williams had three interceptions last year and he and four others return with the best stats in that category.

Along with Bukowski, Faison, Klobedans, Moerhig, Wells and Zaccardo, these are Madison Brabham, 5-9 sophomore setter from Humble (Kingwood); Haley Hutchinson, 6-1 sophomore middle blocker from Georgetown (Rouse), and Krystal Puente, 5-8 junior outside hitter from San Antonio (Incarnate Word Academy).

Southwest will also be opening its season in the game with the Javelinas.

The Bearcats lost their statistical leaders from last season.

Seniors returning are Taryn Marton, 5-9 outside hitter from Queen Creek, Ariz., and Kalyn Sotomayor, 6-1 middle blocker from Ogden, Utah.

St. Joseph's was 8-21 last fall.

The Pumas return Bridget Krasowski, 5-10 junior outside hitter from Oak Lawn, Ill., who led the team in kills with a 2.75 average, and Katie Dugan, 5-7 senior libero from Homer Glen, Ill., who led the team in digs with a 4.94 average.

Barton had a 15-13 record last season.

The squad returns Alexandra Cullins, 6-2 sophomore middle blocker from Tarpon Springs, Fla., who led the team with a .323 attack percentage and 1.07 blocks a set last fall.

Also back are Angelica Acevedo, 5-8 sophomore setter from Coano, Puerto Rico, who was the top setter with an 8.65 average.

Laura Peed, 5-7 junior libero from Pompano Beach, Fla., is also a returnee and led the team with 3.86 digs in 2015.

Arkansas Tech was 26-7 last season and the Suns are expected to be a top-ranked squad this fall.

Returning is Hunter Eshnaur, 6-0 sophomore outside hitter from Russellville, Ark., who had 3.76 kills a match last season to lead the squad and Madison Nagel, 5-6 junior libero from Rowlett, who was the dig leader with a 4.90 average. *(Continued on Page 5)*

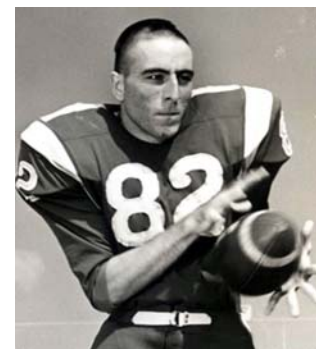

FORMER JAVELINA ALL-AMERICAN offensive lineman Earl Dotson is on the coaching staff at Corpus Christi John Paul II High School.

He has joined the staff of Bradly Chavez, former Javelina assistant coach who has taken over as head coach at John Paul.

Dotson has an NFL championship ring, received while playing for the Green Bay Packers.

THE HOUSTON CHRONICLE recently had an article, written by Jerome Solomon, which recalled the great Houston Yates High School football team of 1985.

And, of course, an important part of that team was running back Johnny Bailey, who would later become college football's most honored player as a member of the Texas A&I Javelinas.

The Yates team went 16-0 in winning the Class 5A (the highest class at that time) state championship.

It was the first UIL Class 5A team to go 16-0 and it set a single-season record with 659 points (41.1 points per game) while posting eight shutouts and allowing the opponents an average of 4.8 points a game.

Yates beat Odessa Permian, 37-0, in the title game, ending a 33-game Permian unbeaten streak.

Bailey ended his high school career that season as Yates' all-time leading rusher.

With the Javelinas, Bailey became college football's all-time leading rusher, all classifications.

He made 14 All-America first teams, including the Football Writers of America squad which includes Division I players only.

Bailey received the Harlon Hill Trophy, which goes to the Division II player of the year, three times and while not receiving it his freshman season (he was runnerup), he rushed for more than 2,000 yards that season and had the most impressive statistics of any player in college football.

Johnny, who died of pancreatic cancer in 2010, has been inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame, NCAA Division II Football Hall of Fame, Lone Star Conference Hall of Honor and Javelina Hall of Fame.

FIVE LONE STAR Conference players received spots on the three NCAA Division II All-America preseason football teams released by Football Gameplan last week, and three of the five are on teams entering the league for the first time this fall.

On the first unit from the LSC is Zacari Lavender, 6-0, 175-pound senior kick returner at Oklahoma Panhandle State.

Making the second team are Kamal Cass, 5-11, 185-pound junior running back at Eastern New Mexico, and Devyn Williams, 5-10, 175-pound junior kickoff returner from Panhandle State.

And on the third unit are Xavier Ayers, 5-11, 160-pound senior offensive back from Western New Mexico, and Felipe Parra, 5-10, 190-pound senior punter from West Texas A&M.

Panhandle State and Western New Mexico are in the LSC for the first time this season.

Football Will Attempt to Get Back On Opening-Game Victory Track

The Texas A&M-Kingsville football team will try to reverse a two-game losing streak in season openers when it takes on Incarnate Word Saturday night in San Antonio.

The Javelinas have lost their first game the past two seasons, dropping an 18-16 decision to Incarnate Word last season in San Antonio and losing the previous year, 27-14, to Humboldt (Calif.) State.

Before that, the squad had won five in a row on the opening date.

Through the years, the Javelinas have held an edge in openers, 47-38-2.

Eight of the early setbacks came to NCAA Division I squads, five of these to Southwest Conference members.

During a 1953-64 streak, the Javelinas won 12 openers in a row, and after losing in 1965, got five more victories, giving it a 17-1 record in 1953-70.

Greg Pitre, 5-7, 185-pound senior from Hutto, averaged 67.6 rushing yards a game last season and 5.7 yards a carry.

Myles Carr, 6-2, 210-pound senior from Arcadia, Calif., completed 162 of 288 (.563) passes for 204.5 yards a game. He threw for 21 touchdowns and had 11 interceptions.

Anthony Autry, 6-2, 190-pound senior wideout from Atlanta, Ga., led the receiving with 43 receptions for 831 yards and seven touchdowns.

Jordan Thomas, 6-0, 165-pound junior wideout from San Antonio (Stevens), was second with 40 catches for 703 yards and five scores and Pitre was third with 27 receptions for 397 yards and six touchdowns.

Defensively, DeMarcus Spurlock, 5-10, 242-point junior linebacker from Houston (North Forest), had 79 tackles to top the chart.

ZeMarcus Green, 5-10, 195-pound senior linebacker from Houston (North Forest), was second with 61 tackles a game.

Brandon Jones, 67-3, 250-pound sophomore linebacker from Houston (Nimitz), has 12.5 tackles for losses to lead the team in that statistical category.

Expected to play key roles for the Javelinas is an impressive number of transfers and redshirts.

The Cardinals are coming off a 6-5 season and a fourth place finish in the Southland Conference.

This will be the fourth year of NCAA Division I-AA play for the Cards after leaving the Lone Star Conference.

Trent Brittain, 6-3, 210 pounds from Eastland, returns at quarterback and is being touted as one of the top players at his position in the Southland. He led the league in passing yards and total offense last fall.

He passed for a school record 2,254 yards and was the second

leading rusher with 400 yards.

Junior Sessions, 5-11, 212-pound senior running back from Mesquite, has 1,482 career rushing yards, second best ever.

Broderick Reeves, 5-9, 205-pound senior running back from Mexia, has 1,067 career rushing yards.

Kody Edwards, 6-0, 165-pound junior wideout from Mesquite (Poteet), is the top receiver. He led the team last season with 38 catches for 561 yards.

Corey Lee, 6-0, 280-pound junior defensive end from LaPorte, was a pre-season All-American two years ago but a preseason injury kept him out last year.

He had 14.5 tackles for losses and five sacks as a sophomore.

The top tackler returning is Josh Zellars, 6-0, 210-pound senior linebacker from Baytown (Lee). He had 83 tackles last season and needs 73 to become the UIW career leader.

As has been the case in the past, the Javelinas are expected to have several thousand fans making the short trip to the Alamo City for the game.

It will be one of two non-conference games for the Javelinas.

They return home Sept. 10 to host Simon Fraser of Burnaby, British Columbia, Canada, before opening LSC play Sept. 17 with one of the preseason favorites, Midwestern State, in Javelina Stadium.

Nix Induction Into LSC Hall of Honor Oct. 1

Dwayne Nix's induction into the Lone Star Conference Hall of Honor has been set for 3 p.m. Oct. 1 in the Peacock Auditorium on the Texas A&M-Kingsville campus.

A reception will be held along with the induction and admission is free.

Nix will also be introduced Oct. 1 at the football game between the Javelinas and Angelo State in Javelina Stadium.

Nix is the lone inductee into the LSC Hall this year and becomes the 13th Javelina to be inducted.

The Hall recognizes outstanding individuals who have brought pride and honor to the conference through their contributions as an athlete or who have demonstrated a long-term commitment to the betterment of the conference as a coach or administrator.

Nix will receive the LSC's signature Hall of Honor award, a 15-inch custom-sculpted eagle figurine mounted on a cherry wood base.

Nix, from Kingsville, was a wideout for the 1965-68 Javelinas. He was named to the Associated

Press Little All-America first team in 1966, 1967 and 1968 and became the first athlete to be on the squad for three consecutive seasons.

He was on the All-Lone Star conference team twice and was named to the LSC Team of the Decade for the 1960s.

Nix served as a captain of the 1968 team that reached the NAIA national championship game.

In 1975, he was selected to the Texas A&I 50th Anniversary Team.

He played on two LSC championship squads, including the 1967 team that went 9-0 and became the school's first undefeated, untied squad.

Nix was on the All-Texas College first team in 1966 and 1967 and he played on teams that compiled a 30-10 record. At the end of his collegiate career, he held most of the team's receiving records.

He was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2003 and was inducted into the Javelina Hall of Fame in 1979.

Nix was a Colonel in the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve and he was activated three times and participated in the Vietnam conflict and Operation Desert Storm. He retired from the Marine Corps in 2003 and worked with the Department of Navy for 29 years before retiring in 2006.

He resides in Virginia. He and his wife Sandy, who is also a native of Kingsville, have two sons and five grandchildren. His son Andy is a Major in the Marine Corps and is serving on the U.S. Pacific Command staff.

It is the second consecutive year the Javelinas have had an inductee in the LSC Hall of Honor. Juan Castillo, former Javelina football player and coach and now on the coaching staff of the Baltimore Ravens, was inducted in 2015.

The Javelinas' 13 inductees lead the league in selections since the first induction ceremony in 1996.

Simon Fraser To Be First Canadian Team to Be Played by Texas College Football Squad

Texas A&M-Kingsville will become the first Texas team to play a Canadian school in football when the Javelinas host Simon Fraser of British Columbia Sept. 10 in Javelina Stadium.

Simon Fraser, located in Burnaby, a suburb of Vancouver, is a member of the Great Northwest Athletic Conference and is the only Canadian school in the NCAA.

The Clan had a 0-9 record last season and returns most of their lettermen.

Ante Litre, 6-1, 230-pound senior running back from

Vancouver, led the team in rushing and receiving last season.

He had 72.0 yards a game rushing and 5.4 yards a carry.

Litre caught 38 passes for 272 yards.

Also back is Justin Buren, 6-1, 200-pound junior wideout from Coquitlam, British Columbia, who had 36 receptions for 644 yards.

Brothers Jordan Herdman, 6-2, 235-pound senior linebacker from Winnipeg, Manitoba, and Justin Herdman, 6-1, 235-pound senior linebacker, led the team on defense last season. Jordan had 133 tackles and 9.5 were for losses. Justin had 83 tackles and 13 were for losses.

Kelly Bates is in his second

season as head coach of the Clan.

Simon Fraser was founded in 1965 and has an enrollment of 30,000 on three campuses.

Home games are played at Fox Field, which has a seating capacity of 3,500.

The Javelinas have a return matchup with the Clan in 2017 in Burnaby.
