Craig Nicholson, who has more than 1,000 victories as a head coach, has been named the new head softball coach at Texas A&M-Kingsville.

Nicholson, who served as head coach at Arizona State in 2013-15, has coached teams that have won four National Junior College Athletic Association national championships, four Mid-American Conference titles, took a National Pro Fastpitch championship and had teams make the NJCAA national tournament eight times.

His overall record is 1,048 victories and 284 losses. He has a .787 winning percentage.

As head coach at Central Arizona College, his teams won national titles in 1997 1999, 2003 and 2005 and were national runnersup in 1996 and 2000.

1967 Javelina Football Team To Celebrate 50th Anniversary of Perfect Season This Fall

This fall marks the 50th anniversary of the 1967 Texas A&I football team that compiled the first undefeated, untied record in Javelina football history.

And it not only became the first perfect-record squad, it also ushered in one of the greatest eras in college football history.

The Javelinas, under head coach Gil Steinke, went 9-0-0.

Along with Lone Star Conference opponents S.F. Austin State, East Texas State, McMurry, Sul Ross, Howard Payne, Sam Houston and Southwest Texas, the Javelinas claimed victories over McNeese (La.) State and Trinity.

The season ended with a 23-21 victory over Southwest Texas in what is billed in Javelina circles as one of the most exciting games

in football history.

The two rivals met in the season finale in Javelina Stadium and a standing-room-only crowd saw placekicker John Kardow kick a 28-yard field goal with 1:13 remaining to give the Javelinas their victory margin.

With a squad loaded with underclassmen, the Javelinas went on to go 10-2 in 1968 and reach

the NAIA national championship game.

The 1969 and 1970 teams claimed national championships, both teams compiling 11-1 records.

Steinke was named the LSC coach of the year in 1967 and wideout Dwayne Nix was an Associated Press Little All-America first-team honoree.

THE LONE STAR Conference announced last week that it is moving the LSC men's and women's basketball championship tournaments to Frisco.

Frisco is becoming a center for many athletic events in the North Texas area.

It is home of the new Dallas Cowboys training center, has hosted the NCAA Division II men's basketball national tournament and the Dr. Pepper Center, where the LSC meet will be held, is the home of the Dallas Stars.

Jim Gandy, former Javelina football player, is the economic development corporation president for the City of Frisco.

CONGRATULATIONS TO ROY Sandoval, outfielder for the Corpus Christi Moody High School baseball team, on making the Class 5A all-state tournament lineup.

Sandoval has signed a national letter of intent with the Javelinas.

THE TARLETON STATE Memorial Stadium renovation has begun and it will see the removing of the old artificial turf, which was installed in 2004, and will have a new CoolPlay surface by FieldTurf.

CoolPlay is designed to keep the playing surface up to 35 degrees cooler.

The new surface is expected to be ready by July 15.

The new turf is the first procedure in the Memorial Stadium renovation project. The next phase is scheduled to begin in September and will see a new grandstand, suites and press box added to the west side of the facility.

The west side will become the "home" side for the TSU home games.

TSU officials have said the construction won't interfere with the home games this fall. The east stands, which currently serve as the home side, won't be disturbed and visiting fans will have temporary bleachers.

The Javelinas will meet the Texans Oct. 21 in Kingsville.

A FOUR-FOOT restricted-area arc in the lane for women's basketball has been approved by the NCAA Playing Rules Oversight Panel.

The arc has been located three feet in front of the basket.

A secondary defender must be outside the arc and in league guarding position to draw a charge. If the player is in the restricted area when the contact occurs, a block will be called.

The panel also approved allowing teams to choose from which side of the court to inbound the ball after advancing it to the front court after a timeout in the back court. Previously, teams had to inbound the ball at the 28-foot line on the side with the scorer's table.

Other action on the panel saw the "use-it-or-lose-it" timeout in the first half eliminated. Coaches will be allowed to carry all timeouts over to the second half.

The 10-second back court will not be reset when the offensive team calls a timeout beginning in 2017-18.

Officials will be allowed to use replay to determine if the release of the ball on a made basket occurred before the shot clock expired.

The coach's box will be extended to 38 feet. It was previously 28 feet.

A player must now have both feet on the floor outside the lane to avoid a three-second violation.

THE COMMITTEE ALSO approved several changes for men's basketball.

The coach's box will also be extended to 38 feet, just as with the women.

The panel approved a rule permitting a reset of the shot clock to 20 seconds when the ball is inbounded in the front court after a foul by the defense. If more than 20 seconds remain on the shot clock, the clock will not be reset.

Referees can use the instant replay rule in the last two minutes of the second half or last two minutes of overtime to see if a secondary defender was in or outside the restricted-area arc but only when a call has been made. If the player is in the restricted area, a block will be called on the defender. If the secondary defender is in legal guarding position and outside the restricted area, a player-control foul will be called.

The cylinder rule was adjusted to allow more freedom of movement for the offense. If a defensive player straddles an offensive player's leg in a way that prohibits him from making a normal basketball move, contact that creates a common foul will be called on the defensive player.

OMAR GONZALEZ, WHO has been a member of the Javelina men's basketball coaching staff for the past two years, has been named an assistant men's basketball coach at Blinn College.

While on the Javelina staff, Gonzalez received his master's degree from the University.

He has been a strong contributor to the Javelina Family during his stay at TAMUK and all wish him the best at his new position.

At Central, he also served as a professor of sport and fitness and was division chair in the department in 2005-06.

Nicholson was NJCAA coach of the year four times and was the MAC coach of the year in 2009 and 2013.

He was the National Fastpitch Coaches Association junior college coach of the year three times.

Nicholson's record at Central Arizona was 723-90 and the team won the four national titles, seven conference championships and eight regional titles.

He was associate head coach for the Chicago Bandits and the team won the national championship the year he was there.

Nicholson was the head coach at Ball (Ind.) State in 2006-13 and during that time the program won the Mid-American Conference title in 2009, 2010, 2012 and 2013

He holds a bachelor's degree from Wilfrid Laurier University in Waterloo, Ontario, Canada, and has a master's degree from the United State Sports Academy.

The new Javelina coach is married and he and his wife, April, have four children: Cade, Avery, Payton and Colby.

Nicholson replaces Betsy Dean, who resigned after three seasons as head of the program.

He is the eighth head coach for the program still it was started in 1997.

Julie Garcia was head coach in 1997-99, Brady Tigert was the coach in 2000-02, Ron Faubion headed the program in 2003, Jake Schumann was head coach in 2004-07, Blake Miller was head coach in 2008-10, Rick Rothbauer was head coach in 2011-14 and Dean was in the position in 2015-17.

The Javelinas won the Lone Star Conference championship in 2003 and reached the NCAA Division II playoffs in 2002 and 2003.

The Javelinas were 27-24 last spring and lost one player to graduation: pitcher Carlie Clark.

The capacity of the stadium has been 5,000 and this will double in size with the new facility.

Phase two will see new locker rooms, concessions, restrooms, ticket offices and storage areas. Construction will begin next month.

Dixie officials have said with the new facilities, the school hopes to attract NCAA Division Championships.

Phase three will include a three-level press box that will include club seating and private suites and will be used for alumni functions, banquets, private weddings, high school socials, etc.

Dixie State is a member of the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference.

...Meagan Mulcahy is the new athletic director at Oklahoma Panhandle State.

Panhandle was an associate member of the LSC in football through the 2016 season.

Mulcahy has been the head volleyball coach for the past five years.

Nix, 6-0, 180-pound junior from Kingsville, would become one of the few three-time Little All-America honorees, making the team in 1966, 1967 and 1968.

He is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame as well as the Lone Star Conference and Javelina halls of fame.

Nix; defensive back Larry Pullin, 5-11, 180-pound junior from Nixon; linebacker Butch Riley, 6-1, 210-pound junior from Ingleside, and defensive lineman Carlos Saldana, 5-10, 190-pound junior from Laredo (St. Joseph's), were All-LSC first team and Nix and Pullin were All-Texas College.

Assistant coaches were Fred Jonas, Pete Murray, Don McDonald and Ken Kelley.

Jerry Gates, 5-10, 200-pound senior linebacker from Pasadena; James Hill, 6-2, 190-pound senior back from San Antonio (Highlands), and Glenn McDonald, 5-11, 190-pound senior tight end from Ingleside, were selected as captains of the team.

Hill was a first-round pick of the San Diego Chargers, the 18th player selected in the draft.

Quarterback Karl Douglas, 6-2, 190-pound freshman from Houston (Worthing), led the team in total offense with 113.4 yards a game and he completed 52 of 110 passes for 841 yards and 11 touchdowns.

Roy Farmer, 5-10, 175-pound sophomore running back from Lubbock, was the top rusher with 32.7 yards a game and 4.3 yards a carry.

Freshman Dwight Harrison, 6-1, 165-pound wideout from Beaumont (South Park), was the leading receiver with 25 catches for 488 yards and four scores and Nix had 23 receptions for 270 yards and three scores.

Kardow led the team in scoring with 43 points.

Defensive back Ed Scott, 5-11, 175-pound freshman from Austin (S.F. Austin), set a school record with seven interceptions.

Since 1967, the Javelinas have posted perfect seasons in 1974 (13-0), 1975 (12-0) and 1976 (13-0).

LSC Basketball Championships Moving to Frisco

The Lone Star Conference has moved its postseason men's and women's basketball championships to the Dr. Pepper Arena in Frisco.

The first tournament will be held in March 1-4, 2018.

The LSC and the City of Frisco have a two-year agreement with an option of a third year.

The Dr. Pepper Arena is a multi-purpose sports and entertainment venue located at the corner of the Dallas North Tollway and Gaylord Parkway.

The facility seats 6,000 and features a state-of-the-art sound system, three HD video screens, 12 suites and a private lounge area.

It is the home practice field

and executive offices for the NFL Dallas Stars as well as the home of the Texas Legends basketball team.

The arena hosted the 2016 NCAA Division II men's basketball national championship.

The top eight men's and top eight women's basketball teams in the final LSC regular-season standings advance into the tournament.

Fourteen games will be played over a four-day period and the winners receive automatic berths in the NCAA Division II national tournament.

The Texas A&M-Kingsville men's team upset LSC champion Texas-Permian Basin in the opening round of the tournament

in March and the Javelina women's squad knocked off top-ranked Eastern New Mexico in the first round.

"We're thrilled to announce Dr. Pepper Arena and the City of Frisco as the new home of the Lone Star Conference basketball championship," Jay Poerner, LSC commissioner, said.

"Our goal is always to provide our student-athletes and fans with a first-class experience and this new partnership will certainly do that. We're grateful for the opportunity to align with such a great venue and community."

Frisco is the third neutral site for the LSC basketball championships since 2012. The

tournament has been played at the Allen Event Center in Allen and in Bartlesville, Okla., in the past.
