2002 National Semifinalist Javelina Football Team Celebrating 15th Anniversary This Year

This fall will be the 15th anniversary of the 2002 Texas A&M-Kingsville football team that reached the semifinal round of the NCAA Division II Championships, and won the Lone Star Conference title.

The squad had a 10-3 record.

Richard Cundiff was head coach of the team and the assistant coaches were Greg Bormann, Haskel Buff, Lee Hayes, Neal LaHue, James Lott, Ben Noonan and Mike Salinas.

The regular-season victories came over Prairie View A&M, Tarleton State, Midwestern State, Texas A&M-Commerce, Northeastern Oklahoma, West Texas A&M, Abilene Christian and Angelo State.

In the Division II playoffs, the Javelinas downed Nebraska-Kearney, 58-40, in the opening round and California-Davis, 27-20, in overtime in the quarterfinals.

The Javelinas dropped a 21-12 decision to Valdosta (Ga.) State in the semifinals in Valdosta, Ga.

Honors were plentiful for the Javelinas.

Defensive lineman Mike Clay was on three All-America first teams and was the Lone Star Conference lineman of the year.

Nicholas Davis, defensive back, was on two All-America first units.

Clay, Davis, Davylyn Nelson, Walter Wigfall and Larry Williams were all-region.

Quarterback Abel Gonzalez was the LSC offensive back of the year, Gary Lusk was the LSC receiver of the year, Davis was the LSC defensive back of the year

and Wigfall was the LSC offensive lineman of the year. Nelson was a regional defensive player of the year.

All-LSC first-team selections were Luke Byrnes, Clay, Davis, Gonzalez, Jason Lee, Lusk, Eddie Moten, Terrence Moten, Nelson, Kevin Palmer, Wigfall and Williams.

Gonzalez, Clay and Nelson were elected captains of the team.

Williams led the LSC in scoring with 108 points.

The 2018 and 2019 meets were to have been in Sioux Falls, S.D., but host University of Sioux Falls backed out on holding the meet.

This proved to be a good move for the Javelinas, and it will become an even better move if the meet comes to Texas in 2018, giving the Lone Star State the event for three consecutive seasons.

regarding the best way to use verifiable performances for entry into NCAA indoor and outdoor track and field competition.

Committee members will make necessary revisions and address the concerns raised by the membership. The committee will have a new rule recommendation by June 2018.

The committee had originally recommended that all meet entries use verifiable performances from the current season, which would be published online by meet directors in the ranked list of entry entries.

Verified performances would come from the NCAA verifiable reporting system.

The rule, which would have been effective Dec. 1, was put in place to disallow speculative marks. It also sought to provide guidance to the members regarding reporting and publishing entries for a competition and for consideration of qualifying for an NCAA championship meet.

Feedback from the track and field community raised questions about what to do with incoming freshmen, redshirt freshmen and transfers who have verifiable performances.

Originally, it was decided that athletes in any of these categories would be entered with a "no mark" performance until a verifiable current season performance was established.

One possible solution for transfer athletes would be to permit them to carry a verified mark that stays with them until they exhaust athletic eligibility.

IN CONJUNCTION WITH the 45th anniversary of the Title IX, the NCAA office of inclusion has released a report on the status of female athletes, coaches and administration in the NCAA.

Among the report's key findings:

...The number of female athletes is at an all-time high. Both male and female athletes continue to set NCAA participation records year after year, both in the 2000s, the men's participation numbers in championship sports slightly outpaced women's.

...The low representation of minority women in NCAA leadership positions has remained mostly stagnant over the past five years. In that period, the percentage of minority female head coaches of women's teams has remained at just under 14 percent. The number of NCAA athletic directors who are women is at 2.5 percent.

...Division I has the greatest gap in spending between men's and women's athletic programs with athletic departments, on average, spending twice as much on their men's programs. The spending is more equitable in Divisions II and III.

...Women hold about 23 percent of all NCAA head coaching, athletic director and conference commissioner positions.

...Over the past five years, women have outpaced men in acquiring conference commissioner positions. In 2015-16, women held 37 of the 142 available conference commissioner positions, up from 27 in 2010-11.

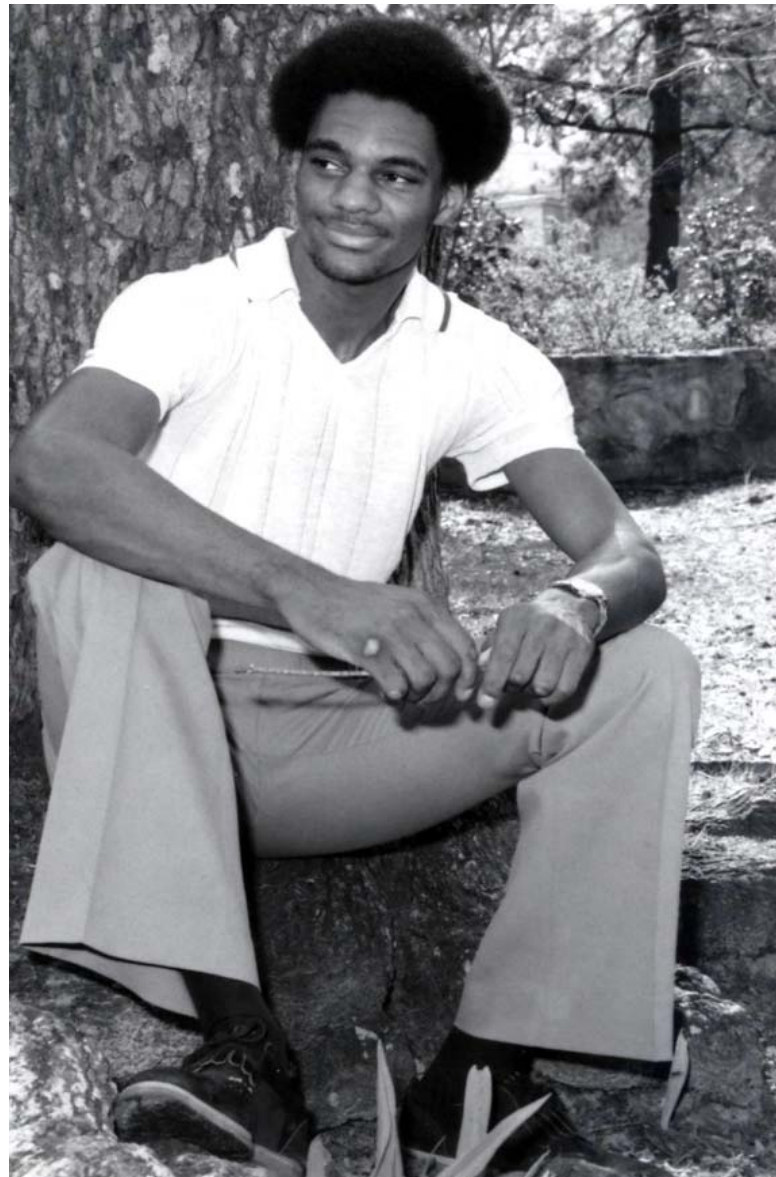

LSC Names Male, Female Outdoor Track & Field Athletes of the Year

The Lone Star Conference has named a trio as the male and female athletes of the year.

Rellie Kaputin, West Texas A&M track and field athlete is the female athlete of the year and Texas-Permian basketball player Daeshon Francis and West Texas A&M pitcher Marshall Kasowski were co-male athletes of the year.

The honorees were selected by the LSC sports information directors.

Kaputin was named U.S. Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association national women's field athlete of the year after winning the triple jump and scoring 21 points at the 2017 NCAA Division II Indoor Track and Field Championships, becoming the first Lady Buff in program history to win an individual title.

The Papua New Guinea native finished second in the long jump and became the first Lady Buff to earn three All-America honors at the same indoor championship.

Kaputin earned LSC indoor female field athlete of the year acclaim after leading the Buffs to the LSC championship for the fourth straight year.

In the outdoor season, Kaputin was a member of the 2017 NCAA Division II national championship team, scoring a school-record 22 points, including a national title in the triple jump and a runnerup finish in the long jump.

Kaputin was all-region in the jumps and earned back-to-back conference titles in the long jump and triple jump and a runnerup finish in the high jump as WT claimed its second straight LSC Championship.

Francis led UTPA to a 26-6 record as it captured the LSC men's basketball championship and tournament title in its first season in the league. The junior earned LSC player of the year and D2CCA South Central Region player of the year honors after

scoring 18.2 points per game with a .559 field goal percentage.

The Indianapolis, Ind., native helped the Falcons lead the league and rank 13th nationally in scoring this season, averaging 88.3 points per game. Francis scored in double-figures in 30 of 32 games this season with a season high 34 points.

The LSC Tournament MVP scored at least 20 points 11 times in 2016-17. Francis paced the team with 48 steals and was second in rebounding (6.6 per game) and assists (3.1).

Kasowski led the nation in strikeouts, breaking the school and LSC records for strikeouts in a season with 165 and helping the Buffs win the LSC baseball tournament championship.

He also topped the nation in strikeouts per nine innings at 15.91. Kasowski became the highest drafted player in WT baseball history as the 400th

overall pick in the 13th round of the 2017 Major League Baseball Draft by the Los Angeles Dodgers.

The Conroe native was named LSC Pitcher of the Year, first team All-LSC, NCBWA and CCA region pitcher of the year and was a multiple All-America honoree in his first season with the Buffs.

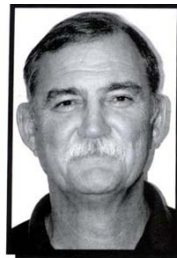

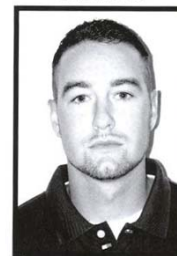

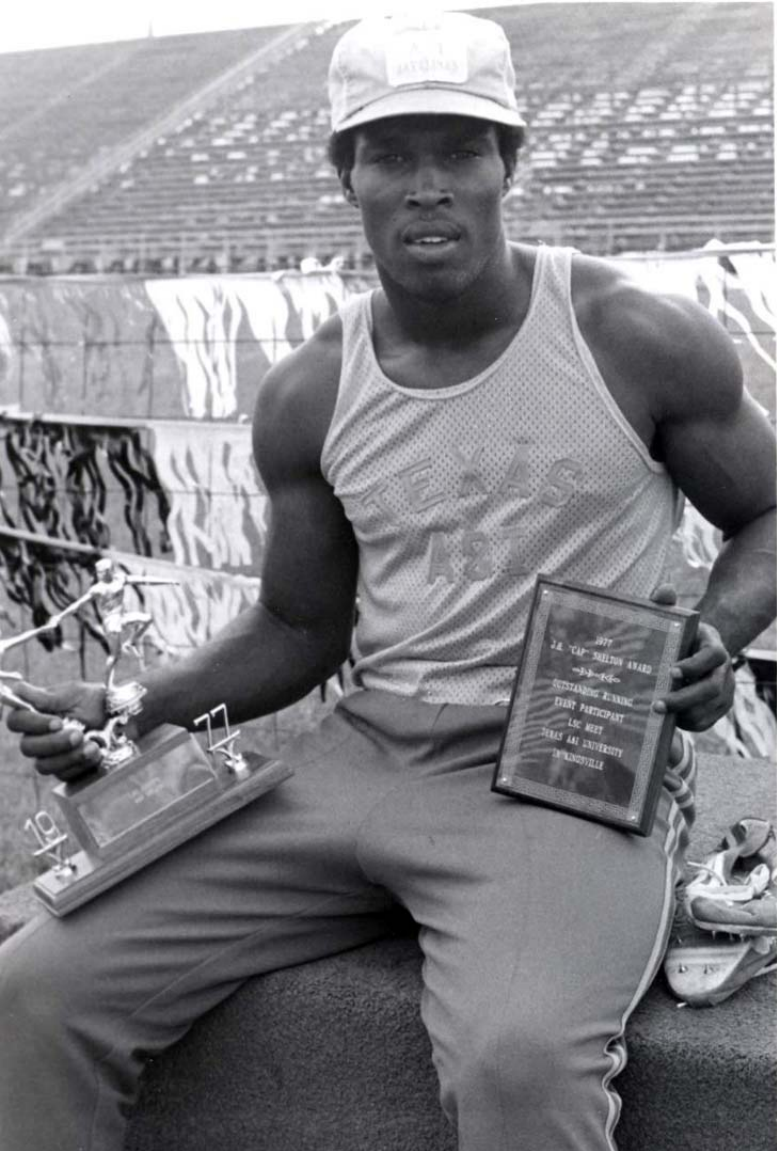
