The Javelinas meet South Dakota Mines at 7:30 p.m. Friday in the Steinke Center and will take on Chadron (Neb.) State at 7 p.m. Saturday.

## Football Closes Home Season With TV Game

The Texas A&M-Kingsville football team will close out its home season Saturday afternoon when it hosts West Texas A&M in a televised game in Javelina Stadium.

Kickoff will be 3 p.m.

The game is one of four LSC games being shown live on television stations in Texas and New Mexico this season.

It is on stations and/or websites owned by Nexstar and these are KTAB in Abilene, KASY in Albuquerque, N.M., KCPN in Amarillo, KBVO in Austin, KVEO in Brownsville, KTSM in El Paso, KLBK in Lubbock, KMID in Midland-Odessa, KSAN in San Angelo, KTPN in Tyler, KWKT in

Waco and KJBO in Wichita Falls.

The Javelinas and Buffaloes will be meeting for the 35<sup>th</sup> time since the first matchup in 1939.

The Javelinas hold an 18-15-1 series lead. West Texas A&M won last year's matchup, 35-31, in Canyon.

The Javelinas are 2-7 for the year and 1-5 in the LSC standings.

The squad is averaging 373.3 total yards a game, 110.6 rushing and 262.7 passing.

The Border Bandits are allowing 442.6 total yards a game, 199.7 rushing and 242.9 passing.

Luis Lopez, 5-7, 220-pound senior running back from San Diego, leads the rushing with 58.4 yards a game and 5.8 yards a

carry. He has 11 rushing touchdowns.

Cade Dyal, 5-11, 195-pound junior quarterback from Kerrville, has completed 127 of 227 (.560) passes for 182.6 yards a game. He has thrown 12 interceptions and has five touchdowns.

Koy Detmer Jr., 5-11, 175-pound senior quarterback from Somerset, has completed 88 of 160

(.550) passes for 125.5 yards a game. He has thrown for six touchdowns and has had four interceptions.

Darrian Hambrick, 6-6, 220-pound junior wideout from Nashville, Tenn., has 46 pass receptions for 650 yards and two scores.

# Javelina Hash

**THE JAVELINA MEN'S** basketball team barely missed getting a headline-grabbing win over NCAA Division I and Southeastern Conference member Texas A&M Friday night in College Station.

The Javelinas had a lead over the Aggies mid-way through the first half, was within a point with 14:48 left in the game and was within three points with 15 seconds remaining in the contest.

The Javelinas outscored the Aggies, 40-35, in the second half. The final score was 81-74.

The game pitted two head coaches who have degrees from Texas A&M-Kingsville.

Javelina head men's coach Johnny Estelle played for the Javelinas and A&M head coach Buzz Williams is a former Javelina assistant coach and has his master's degree from TAMUK.

Williams said after the game that it is the first time he has had a team play an exhibition contest and he did it because of Estelle.

The connection through TAMUK extends to Williams' family. He is married to former Javelina basketball player Corey Norman who he met while in Kingsville.

**THE LONE STAR** Conference teams will compete in three divisions for this season's men's and women's basketball play.

The league has expanded to 19 teams this year and 18 have men's and women's basketball. Dallas Baptist doesn't have women's basketball and Texas Woman's doesn't have a men's team.

The Javelina men and women are in the South Division.

Other teams in the division with the Javelina men are Dallas Baptist, St. Edward's, St. Mary's, Tarleton State and Texas A&M International.

Men's teams in the North Division are Cameron, Midwestern State, Oklahoma Christian, Texas A&M Commerce, Arkansas-Fort Smith and Texas-Tyler.

In the men's West Division are Angelo State, Eastern New Mexico, Lubbock Christian, Texas-Permian Basin, West Texas A&M and Western New Mexico.

The women's North and West divisions have the same teams as the men.

In the South Division, the Javelina women's team will compete with St. Edward's, St. Mary's, Tarleton State, Texas A&M International and Texas Woman's.

Twelve teams will advance into the LSC postseason tournament, which will decide the conference champion and the clubs receiving the LSC automatic berths in the NCAA Division II postseason playoffs.

The first round games will be on campuses and eight men's teams and eight women's teams will advance into the quarterfinal round of the playoffs in Frisco.

**THE ST. EDWARD'S** men's basketball team, one of the squads in the Lone Star Conference South Division along with the Javelinas, defeated NCAA Division I Rice University, 89-83, last week in an exhibition game in Houston.

Tre' Michael Tutt, 5-10, 210-pound junior linebacker from Channelview, leads the tackle chart with 94. He has eight tackles for losses, a sack and a fumble recovery.

West Texas is 6-3 for the year and 3-3 in the LSC standings.

The Buffs average 345.4 total yards a game, 162.2 rushing and 183.2 passing.

Defensively, the team gives up 399.9 total yards an outing, 159.1 rushing and 240.8 passing.

Carter Duke, 5-9, 185-pound senior running back from Grand

Prairie (Lake Ridge), is the top rusher with 64.6 yards a game and 4.2 yards a carry. He has five touchdowns.

Nick Gerber, 6-1, 184-pound sophomore quarterback from Levelland, has completed 146 of 271 (.539) passes for 183.22 yards a game. He has 13 touchdowns and has been picked off seven times.

Juwan McCall, 6-2, 180-pound senior wideout from Louisville, Ga., has 28 receptions for 397 yards and four touchdowns.

Frank Honang, 5-10, 203-pound senior linebacker from Saginaw, has 101 tackles, 7.5 tackles for losses and a sack.

The Javelinas will close out their season Nov. 16 against Texas-Permian Basin in Odessa.

There were other Division II successes over Division I teams last week. They included Pittsburg (Kan.) State's women's win over Kansas, a Lander (S.C.) women's victory over Clemson and the Tuskegee (Ala.) women's win over Georgia State.

**DR. BARRY DUNN**, former executive director of King Ranch Institute for Range Management at Texas A&M-Kingsville, has been appointed to the NCAA Presidential Forum.

His term begins immediately and runs through August 2022. He is currently president at South Dakota State. Dunn was on the TAMUK faculty in 2004-10.

**LUBBOCK CHRISTIAN**, a new member of the Lone Star Conference, played the University of Texas-Austin in a women's basketball exhibition game last week and dropped an 83-73 decision to the Longhorns.

The Chaps out shot the Longhorns, 42 percent to 40 percent, from the field. LCU outscored UT in the second half.

LCU is the defending NCAA Division II champion and has been a power in the division for the past several years. It is heavily favored to take the LSC title in its first year of membership.

The Javelinas will play LCU once during conference action and it will be in Lubbock Feb. 22.

**SPEAKING OF LUBBOCK** Christian, the school has a new synthetic field in softball.

The bullpens have been renovated and a berm has been added to the outfield.

The Chaps become the sixth LSC school with synthetic turf on its softball field.

**THE FOLLOWING NEWS** release was issued by the NCAA last week:

"In the Association's continuing efforts to support college athletes, the NCAA's top governing board voted unanimously to permit students participating in athletics the opportunity to benefit from the use of their name, image and likeness in a manner consistent with the collegiate model.

"The Board of Governors' action directs each of the NCAA's three divisions to immediately consider updates to relevant bylaws and policies for the 21st century," said Michael V. Drake, chair of the board and president of The Ohio State University.

"We must embrace change to provide the best possible experience for college athletes," Drake said. "Additional flexibility in this area can and must continue to support college sports as a part of higher education. This modernization for the future is a natural extension of the numerous steps NCAA members have taken in recent years to improve support for student-athletes, including full cost of attendance and guaranteed scholarships."

"Specifically, the board said modernization should occur within

the following principles and guidelines:

“...Assure student-athletes are treated similarly to non-athlete students unless a compelling reason exists to differentiate.

“...Maintain the priorities of education and the collegiate experience to provide opportunities for student-athlete success.

“...Ensure rules are transparent, focuses and enforceable and facilitate fair and balanced competition.

“...Make clear the distinction between collegiate and professional opportunities.

“...Make clear that compensation for athletic performance or participation is permissible.

“...Reaffirm that student-athletes are students first and not employees of the university.

“...Enhance principles of diversity, inclusion and gender equity.

“...Protect the recruiting environment and prohibit inducements to select, remain at, or transfer to a specific institution.

“The board’s action was based on comprehensive recommendations from the NCAA Board of Governors Federal and State Legislation Working Group, which includes presidents, commissioners, athletic directors, administrators and student-athletes. The group gathered input over the past several months from numerous stakeholders, including current and former student-athletes, coaches, presidents, faculty and commissioners across all three divisions. The board also directed continued and productive engagement with legislators.

“The working group will continue to gather feedback through April on how best to respond to the state and federal legislative environment and to refine its recommendations on the principles and regulatory framework. The board asked each division to create any new rules beginning immediately, but no later than January 2021.

“As a national governing body, the NCAA is uniquely positioned to modify its rules to ensure fairness and a level playing field for student-athletes.” NCAA president Mark Emmert said. “The board’s action today creates a path to enhance opportunities for student-athletes while ensuring they compete against students and not professionals.”

**THE NCAA DIVISION II** Presidents Council took formal positions on seven membership-sponsored proposals for the 2020 Convention.

It voted to support five of the proposals and to oppose two.

The Council remained opposed to adopting a notification of transfer model in Division II, which would replace the permission-to-contact legislation for four-year athletes with a model similar to the one adopted in 2018 by Division I.

The proposed model would require Division II schools to enter an athlete’s written request for transfer in the NCAA Transfer Portal within seven consecutive calendar days of receipt. It would not change the one-time transfer exception legislation which allows schools to approve or deny immediate eligibility for competition upon transfer.

The concept was first introduced in the Division II governance structure where it was supported by the Management Council last spring before the Presidents Council voted in May not to sponsor it for the Convention.

The concept was submitted as a membership-sponsored proposal, guaranteeing it will go to a Division II membership-wide vote in January.

The Presidents Council took the following positions on the other membership-sponsored proposals:

...Supported a proposal that would require current Division II conferences to maintain a minimum of eight active member schools, rather than the 10-school minimum that is slated to take effect in 2022.

...Supported a proposal that would increase the permissible length of golf tryouts for a prospective athlete from two to five hours.

...Supported a proposal to amend the recruiting calendar in women's basketball to extend the spring contact period through the third weekend in May and eliminate the May 18-June 14 evaluation period.

...Supported a proposal that would specify that basketball contests played as part of a conference challenge event should be included in both the numerator and denominator and the first half of the season calculation for a hardship waiver.

...Supported a proposal that would prohibit fall championship sports from commencing weight training, conditioning and team activities before the school's fourth day of classes for the second term of the school year.

...Opposed a proposal that would eliminate the requirement that a current transcript must be provided to a school prior to issuing a National Letter of Intent or written offer of athletic aid.

The Council approved two changes to the neutrality policy for preliminary rounds of champions.

**ST. MARY'S LOST** its home court advantage for two Lone Star Conference volleyball matches last weekend.

A conflict in the schedule for the Rattlers' home court forced the volleyball squad to play a Friday match at Incarnate Word and a Saturday match at the Northwest Independent School District facility.

...Richie Bruister, Texas A&M-Commerce head softball coach, has been given a multi-year contract extension through the 2023 season.

He is the only head coach in the program's four-year history.

Bruister is entering his 16<sup>th</sup> season as a collegiate head coach, all in Division II. He previously coached at Henderson (Ark.) State and Texas Woman's.

...Josh Hawley of Tarleton State and Ashton Spears of St. Edward's were on the NCAA.com top-player list announced on the website last week.

Both players are in the Lone Star Conference South Division.

The Javelinas are in the South Division.

The Texas A&M-Kingsville volleyball team will play two Lone Star Conference South Division opponents on the road this weekend.

The Javelinas take on Dallas Baptist at 6 p.m. Friday in Dallas and will meet Tarleton State at 2 p.m. Saturday in Stephenville.

The Javelinas enter the weekend with a 5-1 South Division record. St. Edward's is 7-1 in the division, the Javelinas are second with their 5-1 mark, Tarleton State is 3-3, Dallas Baptist is 3-5, St. Mary's is 2-6 and Texas A&M International is 0-6.

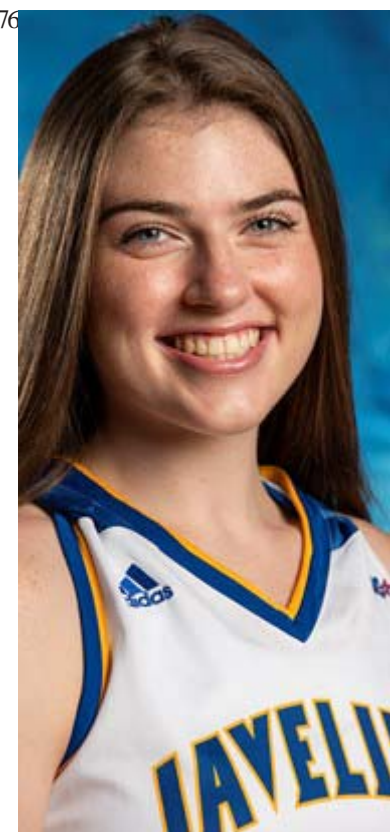

The 1979 Texas A&I football team will be honored this weekend on the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary of its winning a national championship.

The team will be the special guests at a reception at the President's Home Friday evening and will be introduced at Saturday's game between the Javelinas and West Texas A&M.

The 1979 squad is one of three Javelina national championship squads to celebrate anniversaries this fall. The 1959 team had its 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary and the 1969 squad celebrated its 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

The '79 squad won the sixth national trophy in an 11-year period.

The team has been inducted into the Javelina Hall of Fame.

Fourteen members of the team and

staff have already been inducted into the Hall individually or with other teams.

These are players Juan Castillo, Randy Friedrich, Andy Hawkins, Robert Pool, Durwood Roquemore, Mike Sheffield, Glenn Starks, Martin Stroman and Robert Young.

Coaches previously inducted are Ron Harms, Pete Murray and Young.

Staff members are trainer Willie Gipson and sports information director Fred Nuesch.

The 1979 football team was picked to finish third in the Lone Star Conference.

The team compiled a 12-1 record en route to the seventh national trophy for the Javelina program.

Harms took over the head position two months before the start of the

season. He had been the Javelina offensive coordinator in 1974 and 1975 before going to Baylor.

In the three postseason games, the Javelinas defeated Western Colorado, 38-14, in the quarterfinals; Angelo State, 22-19, in the semifinals, and Central Oklahoma, 20-14, in the Palm Bowl in McAllen, the championship game for the NAIA at that time.

Quarterback Stroman led the Javelina passing with 1,264 yards. He completed 78 of 162 passes.

Stroman also was the total offense leader with 2,029 yards.

Running back Pool was the top rusher with 1,189 yards and wideout John Herrera led the receiving with 34 catches for 647 yards.

Defensively, linebacker Hawkins topped the tackle chart with 134.

Offensive lineman Friedrich, Hawkins, offensive lineman Sheffield and Stroman served as team captains.

Hawkins was on three All-America first units and defensive back Jafus White was on two All-America squads.

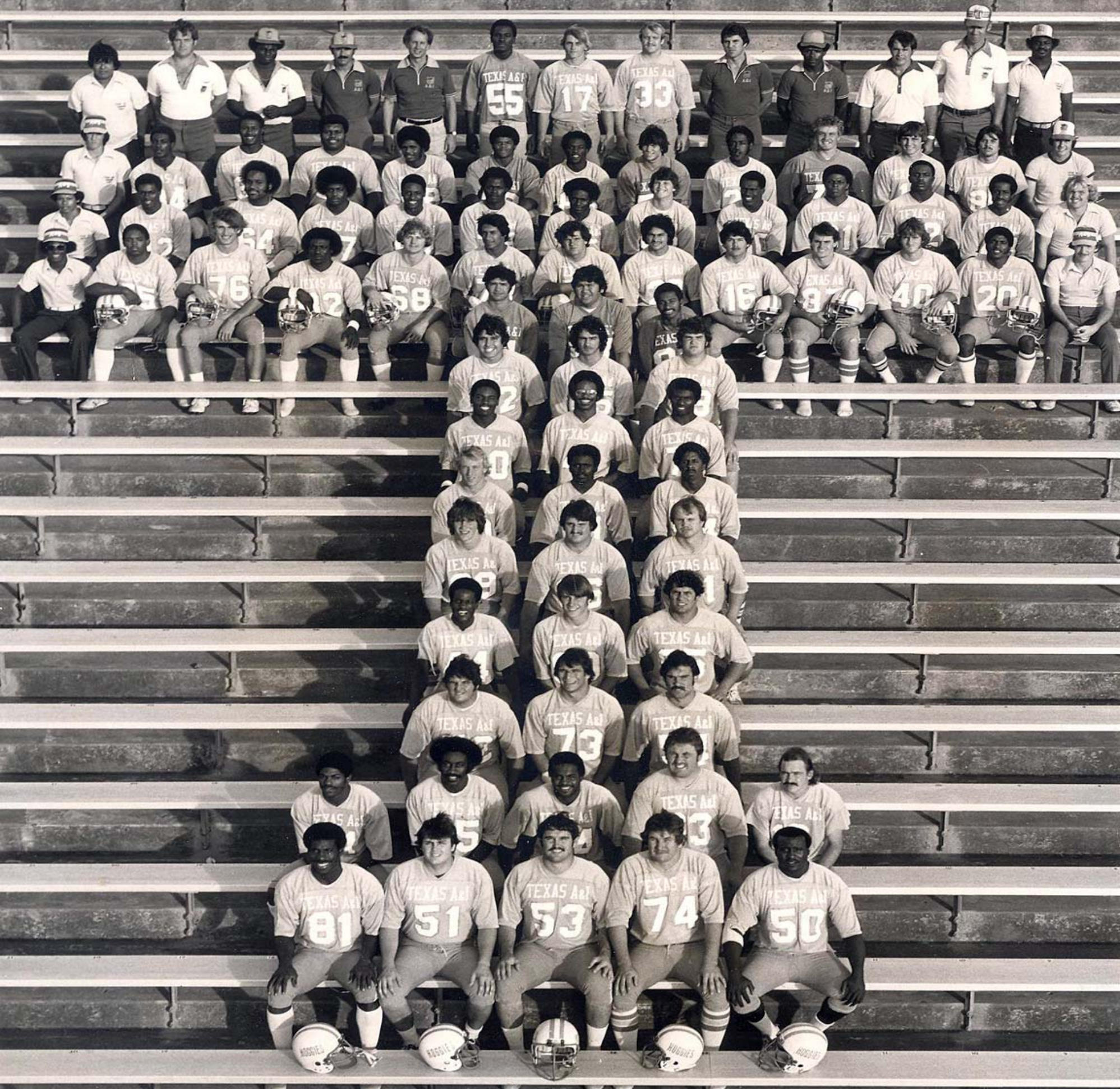
Also receiving All-America honors were defensive backs Roquemore and Don Washington.

Harris was an All-Lone Star Conference honoree for the Javelinas and was drafted in the sixth round by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

He went to the Philadelphia Eagles after a season in Tampa Bay and was with the Eagles for five seasons.

In 2003, he was signed by the Packers and was there for eight seasons. He had 14 interceptions and 108 passes defended.

# **Javelina John Randle To Be Inducted Into Minnesota Sports Hall of Fame**

Former Texas A&I defensive standout John Randle will be inducted into the Minnesota Sports Hall of Fame Dec. 11 during the Minnesota Sports Awards in Minneapolis, Minn.

The inductees were nominated by Minnesota fans.

Randle played with the Minnesota Vikings in 1990-2000. He signed as a free agent after concluding his career with the Javelinas.

After playing two seasons at Trinity Valley Community College, he joined the Javelinas as a junior and was on the Associated Press Little All-America first team and was Lone Star Conference lineman of the year as a junior and senior.

He was selected to the LSC Team of the Decade for the 1980s.

Randle, from Hearne, is considered one of the top pass rushers in NFL history.

As an undrafted rookie in 1990, he played in each of the Viking games his first year of pro ball.

After missing part of the 1991 and 1992 seasons because of injuries, he then played in 176 consecutive games

In eight consecutive seasons, he recorded 10 or more sacks. In 1997, he led the NFL with 15.5 sacks and had a career-high 71 tackles.

Randle led the Vikings in sacks nine times and after moving to the Seattle Seahawks, he led the latter in sacks two seasons.

He had 137.5 sacks in his career.

He made All-Pro in 1993 and received a Pro Bowl invitation. He was All-Pro and Pro Bowl

participant for six consecutive seasons.

Randle was on the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1990s.

He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2010, and is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame, Lone Star Conference Hall of Fame and the Javelina Hall of Fame.

He is also a member of the Vikings' Ring of Honor.
