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## 1969 National Championship Football Team to Celebrate 50th Anniversary at Oct. 26 Game

The 1969 Texas A&I football team celebrates the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of its national championship this fall.

The squad was the second to win one of the seven national titles for the Javelina program. And many of the players who were on the 1969 squad played in 1970 when the Javelinas repeated as national champs.

The 1969 Javelinas had an 11-1 record.

The team had a 21-7 victory over Long Beach State of California and in the NAIA championship game downed Concordia (Minn.), 32-7.

It had beaten New Mexico Highlands, 28-23, in a semifinal game.

Quarterback Karl Douglas, who was also on the 1967 unbeaten team, the 1968 national runnerup squad and the 1970 national championship team, was named the outstanding back in the

1969 title game.

Defensive lineman Margarito Guerrero was the most valuable lineman in the 1969 semifinal playoff game.

Defensive back Alvin Mathews was NAIA All-America first team in 1969.

All-LSC first-team honorees were Guerrero, Young, Mathews, defensive back Ed Scott, end James Respondek, offensive lineman Andy Browder and

offensive lineman Ronald Fielding.

Young was the LSC outstanding lineman.

Mathews was a second round draft pick of the Green Bay Packers.

Leroy Deanda, Respondek and Gene Walkoviak were captains of the 1969 team.

Gil Steinke was head coach in 1969 and members of his staff were Fred Jonas, Ken Kelley, Frank Kelly, Don McDonald, Pete Murray and Pat Walker.

**SOME OF THE** Javelina fans may not be familiar with the eight new schools entering the Lone Star Conference this season.

Up front, there are some NCAA Division II powers coming into the league.

They will strengthen the conference and it will be more difficult to win LSC championships than in the past.

An example is Lubbock Christian. Since becoming NCAA Division II in 2012, the Chaps have a 206-106 record in baseball, are 107-64 in men's basketball, have a 163-26 record in women's basketball and have won two Division II national championships, are 229-92 in softball and have a 103-64 record in volleyball.

Texas-Tyler has been a power in NCAA Division III and is now transitioning into Division II. The Patriots are expected to factor into the LSC title chases beginning this year.

And the other newcomers have programs that will allow them to become immediate contenders in the LSC.

The Lone Star Conference is not only the largest league in the country, but is also expected to strengthen its claim as being one of the strongest in Division II.

**OKLAHOMA CHRISTIAN WILL** be the only Lone Star Conference member without a volleyball team this season. But that will be for the 2019 season only.

The school announced in 2018 that it is reviving its volleyball program and will begin competing in the league in 2020.

A coach has been hired and has begun recruiting for its debut in 2020.

The Eagles had volleyball in 1976-83.

**PERFORMANCES AT THE** NCAA Division II track and field championships in Javelina Stadium continue to receive publicity and this usually gets a mention of Texas A&M-Kingsville and Kingsville.

Rene Medley of Lincoln (Mo.) was one of the Faces in the Crowd in last week's Sports Illustrated issue.

She won the 100-meter and 200-meter dashes at the national meet and she ran legs on the first-place 400-meter and 1600-meter relay teams.

The information on Medley didn't mention that the Division II meet was in Kingsville. But most of the other mentions have included the university and/or town.

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the severity of head impacts at the professional level.

Northwest Missouri State leads with six.

North Dakota State won five, Grand Valley (Mich.) State and Valdosta (Ga.) State each have four, North Alabama has three and Minnesota-Duluth, Northern Colorado, Pittsburg (Kan.) State, Southwest Texas and Troy (Ala.) two each.

The Javelinas won seven national championships while a member of the NAIA.

**THE NCAA BASEBALL** Rules Committee met recently in Indianapolis to set protocols for in-season bat testing that will take place in Division I during the 2020 season.

The committee proposed mandating in-season bat testing in 2017 and the rule was approved by the NCAA Playing Rules Oversight Panel. It was delayed due to the cost of \$1,500 for purchasing the necessary equipment.

The rule will go into effect in Divisions II and III for the 2021 season, giving those schools time to purchase the equipment.

Bat testing should be conducted before a team's first game of a series, single games, the first game of a doubleheader and before

## Robinson Wins National Title

Former Texas A&M-Kingsville high jumper Jeron Robinson won the gold medal in his event at the USA Track & Field Outdoor Championships last weekend in Des Moines, Iowa.

The five-time NCAA Division II national champion for the Javelinas cleared 7-6.5 to take the title and advance into the World Championships Sept. 27-Oct. 6 in Doha, Qatar.

Robinson won the national and World Cup gold medals in 2018.

Robinson holds the NCAA Division II record in the jump at 7-7.

Another former Javelina competitor, Robert Downs, finished eighth in the 800-meter run at the national event.

He ran a 1:48.35 in the finals after posting a 1:47.03 in the preliminaries and 1:46.46 in the semifinals.

Downs is expected to be selected to represent the USA in meets this summer and fall.

Downs was on the 2018 Javelina outdoor team that won the NCAA Division II championship.

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the first game of a series where multiple games are played between several teams.

The location for barrel testing will be determined by the host and will be communicated to participating schools no less than 24 hours before the start of competition.

Testing should occur following each team's practice time or at an agreed-upon time by the participating schools or the conference.

Testing should be conducted with representatives from both schools president, coaches or a team designee will bring all bats to the testing location, and testing should not be conducted in public view or near fans or members of the media.

Part of the testing procedure is the visual inspection of the bat. This is done to ensure the bat is on the approved NCAA model list and doesn't have a predominantly white barrel, flat spots, an audible rattle or cracked or loose end caps or attachments.

Testing consists of two parts. Bats passing both tests should be identified as approved with a tamper-proof sticker.

The Committee recommended a 20-second action rule be enforced before all pitches beginning in 2019-20.

It will be optional for a school to have visible clocks to keep the time between pitches.

If no visible clock is used, one of the base umpires will keep the clock on the field.

If a pitcher violates the 20-second action rule, a ball will be awarded in the count. If a hitter violates the 20-second action rule, a strike will be added to the count.

The committee also recommended that all chest protectors used in 2019-20 be models that are approved by the National Operating Committee on Standards of Athletics Equipment.

**THE NCAA DIVISION II** Management Council has recommended the Presidents Council to sponsor three legislative proposals at the 2020 convention.

The first proposal would move up the start date for men's and women's soccer in years in which the Division II National Championships Festival occurs in the fall.

The other recommendations include allowing hotels to be farther from competition venues to ensure championship-caliber facilities, conducting a separate men's and women's basketball festival event in the "off" year of other festivals, moving the spring festival back one week to align with the softball standard date formula and adjusting the festival competition schedules of cross country and swimming and diving.

The Management Council also supported two proposal changes being considered in all three divisions that would add acrobatics and tumbling and women's wrestling to the NCAA emerging sports for women program.

The proposals were recommended by the NCAA Committee on Women's Athletics which oversees the emerging sports program with the goal of increasing participation opportunities for female athletes.

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The program provides a fast track for eligible women's sports to become full-fledged NCAA championship events.

The NCAA currently has three emerging sports: equestrian, rugby and triathlon.

The recommended proposals to add women's wrestling and acrobatics and tumbling would have an effective date of Aug. 1, 2020.

The Presidents Council has sponsored and the Management Council has backed three other convention proposals:

...A proposal that would permit athletes to accept donations from an institution staff or faculty member, excluding athletic department staff, when fundraising to cover expenses for participation in outside competitions.

...A proposal that would specify that an athlete transferring from another NCAA division, a two-year college or the NAIA would be subject to the season-of-competition legislation applicable to the school where the athlete competed, rather than Division II legislation. The Management Council approved a modification recommended by the Legislation Committee that would not charge Division III athletes with a season upon transfer if they only practiced at the Division III school.

...A proposal that is being considered in all three divisions that would require every school and conference to establish a diversity and inclusion designee for athletics.

**THE NCAA PLAYING** Rules Oversight Panel approved changes to the components of the pitching position and the procedure for pitchers to take signals before releasing a pitch beginning with the 2020 season.

Many pitchers receive the information on which pitch to throw by looking at a signal armband, the NCAA Softball Rules Committee felt pitchers were stepping onto the pitcher's plate and starting their pitching motion without pausing, creating an advantage over the batter.

Pitchers must follow these protocols beginning next spring:

...The pitcher is in the pitching position when she has her hands apart, her pivot foot in contact with pitcher's plate, both feet on the ground within the 24-inch length of the plate and her hips in line with first and third bases, and the catcher is in position to receive the pitcher.

...While the pitcher takes the signal, her stride foot may be on or behind the pitcher's plate as far back as desired. Once the pitcher initially sets the toe of her stride foot, she cannot move it to increase the distance behind the pitcher's plate. The pitcher must take or appear to take a signal while in the pitching and signal-taking positions.

In other action taken by the panel, barrel compression testing will be required to be conducted before the start of each tournament, series, doubleheader or single midweek game during the regulation season in NCAA Division II by Jan. 1, 2021, and in Divisions II and III by Jan. 1, 2022.

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This will require schools to purchase a barrel compression testing machine, which costs approximately \$875.

The panel approved allowing conferences to experiment with video review in regular-season conference games and conference tournament games.

Coaches will be allowed two video review challenges during a game. A challenge must be initiated verbally or visually before the next pitch; before the pitcher and all infielders have clearly vacated their normal fielding position and left fair territory, or before the umpires have left the field of play.

Umpires would be allowed to initiate a video review before the sixth inning until the end of the game.

Plays that can be reviewed are:

...Deciding whether a batted ball called fair is fair or foul.

...Deciding whether a batted ball called a ground-rule double or home run is fair or foul.

...Deciding whether a batted ball called foul that could result in a ground-rule double or home run is fair or foul.

...Spectator interference.

...Deciding scoring plays at home inclusive of collisions (illegal and/or malicious slides), obstruction by a defensive player or timing plays.

...Force/tag play calls: Plays involving all runners acquiring the base before the defensive player's attempt to put the runner out at any base.

...Hit-by-pitch calls: Plays for which there is a possibility that a pitched ball touches a batter or her clothing, which shall incorporate a review on whether the batter is inside or outside the batter's box if it is determined upon review that a pitched ball has touched a batter or her clothing.

...Placement of runners: An umpire's placement of all runners (per the rules/case book) after any blocked ball call.

...With runners on base, a no-catch call can be changed to a catch only if it results in a third out. With no runners on base, a no-catch call can be changed to a catch at any time.

The Southeastern Conference experimented with video review in its conference tournament last spring. Eight video reviews took place with only one call being overturned. Another review was inconclusive, so the original call stood. The other reviews confirmed the original call on the field.

The average time of the video reviews was one minute and two seconds.

## LONE STAR CONFERENCE notes:

...Aaron Meade has been named the head baseball coach at Tarleton State.

He has been an assistant and pitching coach at Pittsburg (Kan.) State for the past four years.

He spent a year at William Jewell (Mo.) and was a volunteer assistant at his alma mater, Missouri State, for a season.

Meade played for Missouri State and was All-Missouri Valley Conference. He was drafted in the 10<sup>th</sup> round by the Los Angeles Angels.

# Gil E. Steinke Award Named for One of the Best in the Game

The Gil E. Steinke Award was presented recently to the top male and female athletes for the 2018-19 school year.

The award is named for the long-time Javelina head football coach who is one of the most successful in the history of the game.

Steinke was athletic director and head football coach at Texas A&I from 1954-76, and played for the Javelinas in 1938-41.

Each year, there are newcomers to the Javelina Family who aren't as familiar to the outstanding accomplishments of Steinke as those who were around during his tenure with the university.

For those newcomers, and those who like to reminisce, following is the information on Steinke that appears on a plaque at his statue in Javelina Stadium:

Athletic director and head football coach at Texas A&I from 1954-1976.

He retired with the Javelinas on a 39-game victory streak.

In his final three seasons, Texas A&I was 13-0 in 1974, 12-0 in 1975 and 13-0 in 1976. He also had undefeated teams in 1967 (9-0-0) and 1962 (9-0-1).

His teams won six NAIA national championships (1959, 1969, 1970, 1974, 1975, 1976).

The Javelinas won 10 Lone Star Conference championships and his career coaching record at Texas A&I was 182-61-4. His only college head coaching job was at Texas A&I.

His 1960 team won the Great Southwest Bowl game.

Steinke has been inducted into the Texas Sports Hall of Fame, the College Football Hall of Fame, the NAIA Hall of Fame and was a member of the first induction class of the Javelina Hall of Fame.

Steinke was NAIA national coach of the year four times and was American Football Coaches Association district coach of the year twice.

He was the Texas Sports Writers Association coach of the year in 1975 and was Lone Star

Conference coach of the year five times.

Steinke was chosen the LSC coach of the decade for the 1960s.

He remained as athletic director at Texas A&I until 1982.

Steinke was head coach of the San Antonio Gunslingers of the U.S. Football League.

As a player, Steinke was a four-year letterman in 1938-41 and made All-Alamo Conference.

He held the Javelina rushing record for several decades.

Steinke served in the U.S. Navy after college, signed with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1945 and played four seasons, including the 1948 season when the Eagles won the NFL championship.

Steinke's coaching career included stops at Oklahoma State University, Trinity University and Texas A&M University before he returned to his alma mater in 1954.

## Allendale To Host National Track & Field Meet in 2021-22

Allendale, Mich., will be the site of the NCAA Division II men's and women's outdoor track and field championships following the two-year stay in Kingsville.

Javelina Stadium was the site last spring and will host the 2020 championships May 21-23.

The 2021 and 2022 meets will be in the Grand Valley State Stadium in Allendale, Mich.

Allendale was the site of the 2014 and 2015 meets.

Bids are now being accepted for the sites beyond 2022.



Steinke scheduled some of the nation's top teams as a challenge to his alma mater.

The 1975 squad went to Honolulu, Hawaii, to open Aloha Stadium (home of the NFL Pro Bowl Game) and the Javelinas defeated the University of Hawaii, 43-9. The South Texans returned the next year and took a 56-21 victory over the Rainbow Warriors.

His 1976 Javelinas were selected to introduce American football to Europe with a three-week exhibition tour and games were played in Austria, France and Germany.

Steinke-coached teams also played in Mexico.

During Steinke's tenure as head coach, one opponent coach was quoted as saying that he would rather go to hell and face Satan than to play the Javelinas in Kingsville.

NFL scouts were on campus frequently as Steinke's teams produced some of the top players in pro football history.

Gene Upshaw was a first-round draft choice and became an All-Pro offensive lineman for the Oakland Raiders. He was head of the NFL Players Association and was tagged by one publication as one of the five most important people in sports in the world.

Upshaw is a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Other first-round picks off Steinke teams were quarterback Randy Johnson (1966), defensive back Jim Hill (1968), wide receiver Eldridge Small (1972), defensive tackle Ernest Price (1973) and fullback Don Hardeman (1975).

Eight other Javelinas were selected in the second or third round.

Thirty-one of his players were drafted by NFL clubs.

The Javelinas produced 41 All-America first-team honorees under Steinke and he had players in each of the postseason all-star games.

When Steinke recruited Sid Blanks in 1960, Blanks became the first black football player in the

Lone Star Conference and one of the first at an integrated school in Texas. He later served as captain and it was recorded that Blanks was the first black captain as an integrated college in the South.

The problems Steinke and the Javelinas confronted on some of the road trips with Blanks on the roster produced stories that would make an interesting and historical movie.

Steinke's rosters were always diverse and he recruited players regardless of social, ethnic or financial status.

The Steinke Center on

campus is named for the legendary coach.

He was married to the former Mary Houston of Alice and they are the parents of twin sons, Leslie and Larry, and a daughter, Jan.

Steinke died in 1995.

At his retirement, Texas A&I president Dr. Gerald B. Robins called Steinke "an institution within an institution".

There hasn't been a college football coach who has been more successful, in all aspects of the game, than Gil Steinke....the pride of Javelinas everywhere.

The league head football coaches, sports information directors and media representatives voted in the poll.

Defending champion Tarleton State was favored to repeat, receiving 19 of the 25 first-place votes and 217 points.

Midwestern State was the choice for second with two first-place votes and 185 points.

yards last season and was the LSC receiver of the year.

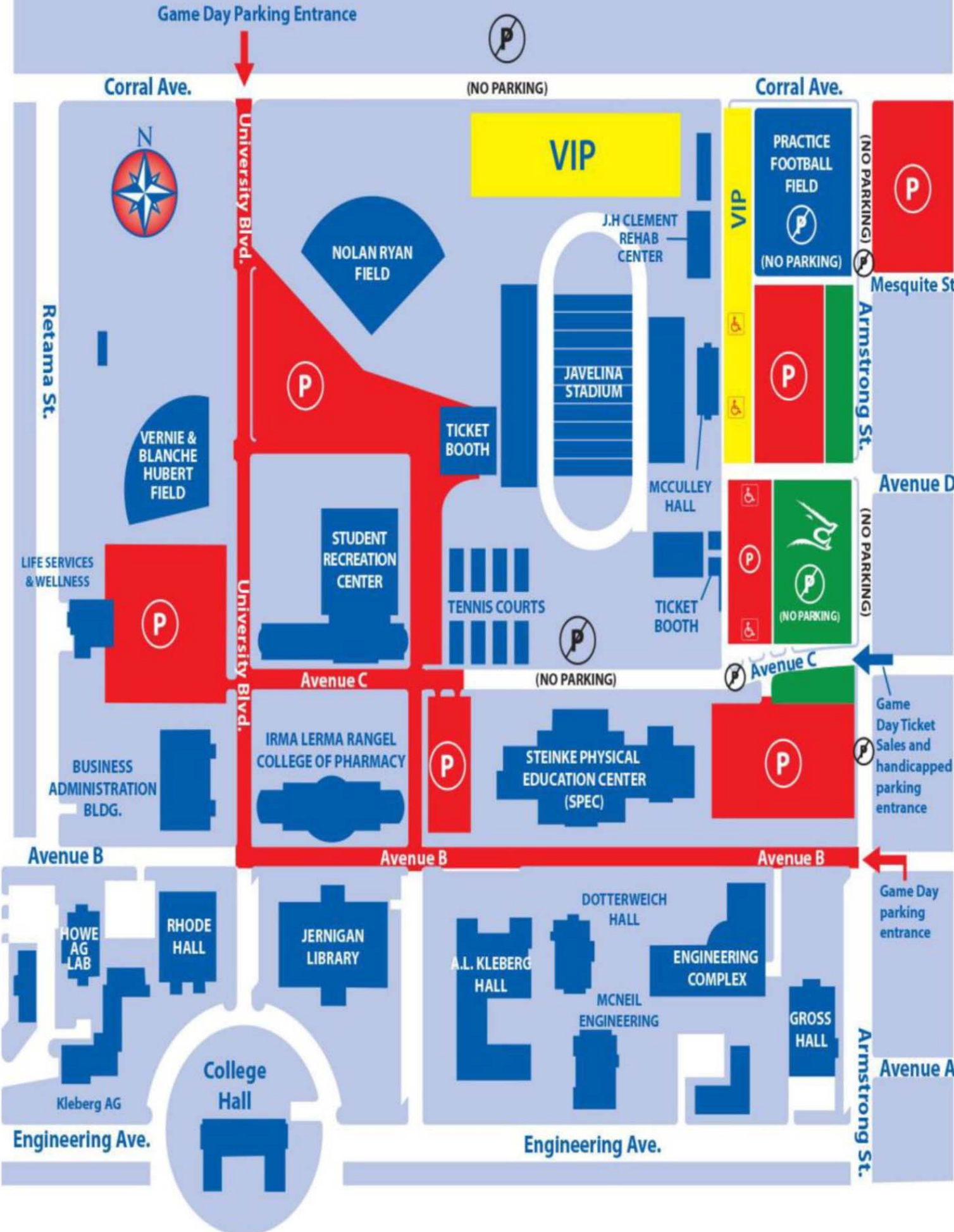
He was ranked fifth in NCAA Division II in receiving yards per game with 121.5.

He had 6.5 tackles for losses, 1.5 sacks, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery.



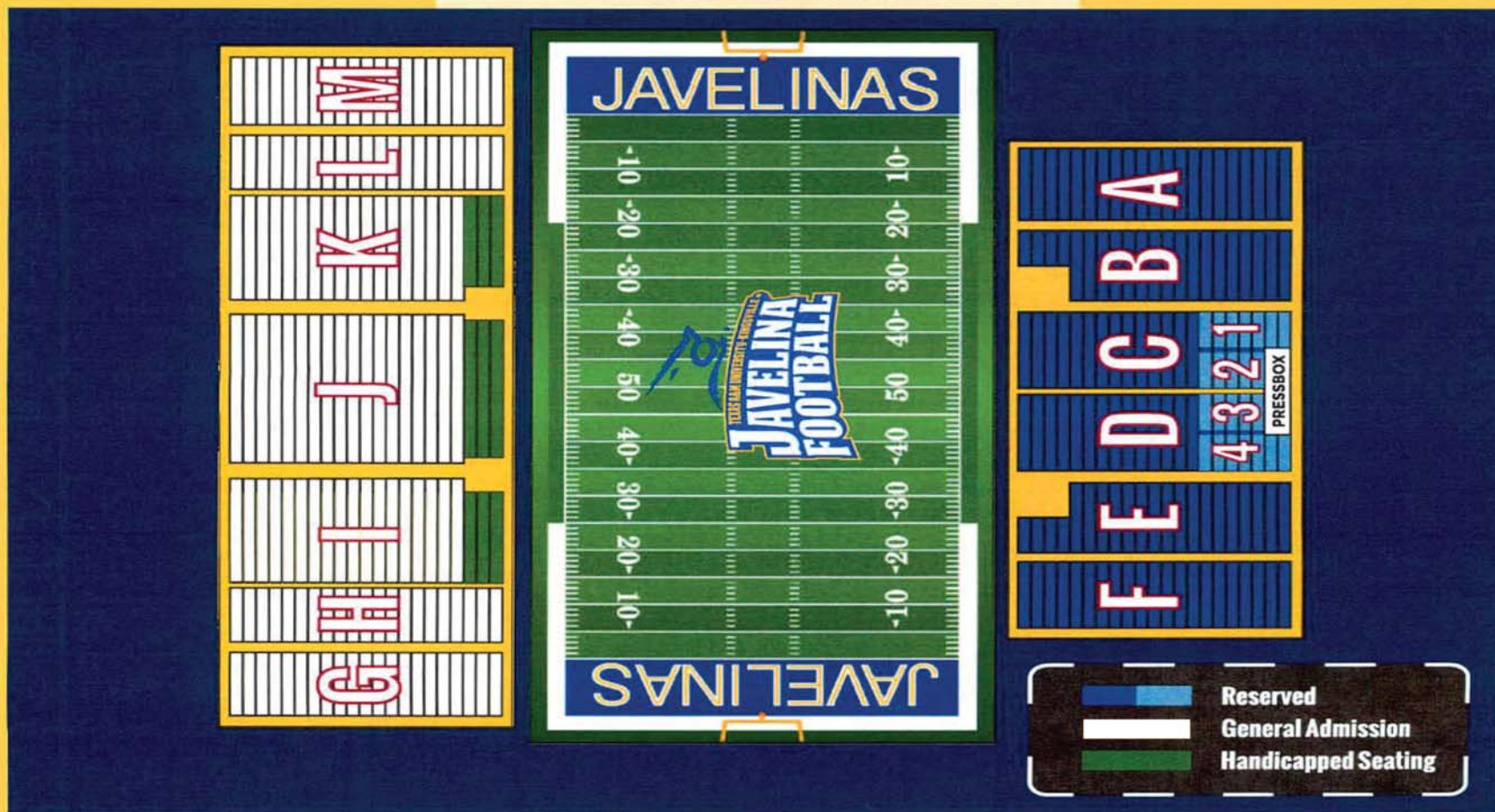
JAVELINA FOOTBALL 2019

# 2019 Javelina Tailgating Guidelines

**Purpose:** Texas A & M University-Kingsville (TAMUK) Tailgating compliments the Javelina game day experience by providing a social gathering area prior to home Football games. Javelina alumni, students, fans and supporters can enjoy the tailgating traditions of food, fellowship and fun as a prelude to home games and all Lone Star Conference (LSC) and NCAA Play Off games.

The University alcohol policy prohibits the possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages on campus except in designated areas. Tailgating activities are permitted in **Lot G, (Southeast corner)**. To ensure our tailgating tradition provides a safe and positive game environment, the following guidelines will be enforced by the University Police Department and Home Events Staff.

1. One (1) tailgate space per group.

2. Tailgating spaces **CAN NO LONGER BE PRE-MARKED**. Marking of any spaces with spray paint, stakes, rope, ribbon, etc. **IS PROHIBITED**. Setup starts at 7:00 a.m. Saturday the day of the game.

3. Tailgate areas must be completely setup on **GAME DAY ONLY**. Your area **CANNOT BE LEFT UNATTENDED AFTER SETUP**. Tailgate spaces are available on a first-come, first-serve basis and must be consistent with the lane markings and other signage. Please honor and be respectful of the reserved areas. Tailgate spaces marked or setup prior to 7:00 a.m. on Saturday or any unattended areas are subject to removal by authorized University representatives and will not be replaced.

4. **IMPORTANT...The Department of Athletics does not guarantee tailgate spaces and is not responsible for any spaces at any time.**

5. Javelina Athletics and TAMUK are not responsible for any lost, stolen or damaged personal property.

6. Parked vehicles are not allowed in the tailgate area. **ONLY drop off** of your tailgate items is allowed by vehicle ——— **NO EXCEPTIONS!** No non-University golf carts or ATV vehicles allowed in tailgate area or adjacent game day areas. Entrance by vehicles will be through Avenue C and exit will be by the Electronic Marquee.

7. **Pets are NOT allowed!** Service animals are an exception to these guidelines.

8. The possession and use of alcoholic beverages must be in compliance with all state, county, city, Board of Regents, and University laws and ordinances. Individuals of legal age—21 or older—may consume alcoholic beverages in the tailgating area. It is also illegal to provide alcohol to minors. Alcohol is not permitted outside the tailgating area.

9. All beverages must be in *cans or plastic containers*. Alcohol drinking games, funneling or any other games are prohibited. Alcohol *drinking game apparatus, kegs, beer pong balls or other common source containers* are prohibited. **NO GLASS BOTTLES ALLOWED!**

10. If alcoholic beverages are served, tailgaters must also serve an adequate amount of food or alternative beverages in the same location as alcoholic beverages.

11. Individuals are encouraged to have designated drivers who do not drink alcoholic beverages to monitor their tailgating party throughout its duration.

12. **Disruptive behavior:** individuals who interfere with the rights of others by the use of loud, abusive language, music and or behavior, or who may prevent others from enjoying tailgating will be asked to cease and desist and may be directed to leave the event if necessary.

13. ALL tailgate parties will **CONCLUDE** 15 minutes prior to kickoff and all participants will depart the tailgate area no later than 15 minutes after kickoff.

14. Tailgate parties may not resume at half-time.

15. **Advertising banners or Corporate Sponsor signage are not allowed without prior written approval from the Texas A&M University-Kingsville Athletics Department. No distribution of advertising flyers/promotional materials allowed.**

16. Participants and organizations are prohibited from selling food, products and/or raffle tickets, campaigning for office, distributing petitions and/or lobbying for votes.

17. No live bands or loud speaker systems are permitted on the premises. All music must cease whenever the live entertainment at the Javelina Main Stage area begins.

# History of NCAA Division II

## Information from NCAA.org

NCAA Division II was officially christened in 1973 when NCAA members at a special convention voted to establish three divisions for athletic competition.

Before then, NCAA schools were classified as university or college to distinguish between the larger and small athletic programs, but the three-division structure adopted in 1973 gave NCAA members a more varied menu for which to classify their programs.

The birth of Division II gave programs that wanted to keep their athletic budgets in good proportion to the total institutional budget a place to compete.

A key distinction for Division II schools is the “partial-scholarship” model for athletic-based financial aid in which schools recognize an athlete’s skills through scholarship dollars without covering all of the student’s college expense through the athletic grant.

Division I programs offer fully funded athletic scholarships for most athletes while Division II programs do not award athletic-based financial aid.

A significant change came in 1997 when the NCAA voted to keep its divisional structure but give each division more autonomy to govern itself. Before then, the NCAA bylaws and policies were determined through an annual legislative process in which each member school, regardless of division, cast a single vote on a proposal.

Starting in 1997, each division was granted the authority to decide its own policy. Divisions II and III retained the one-school/one-vote approach while Division I adopted a representative system based on conferences that grant some programs more voting authority than others.

In 2005, Division II started an ambitious and unique identity campaign to more clearly define what the division represented for

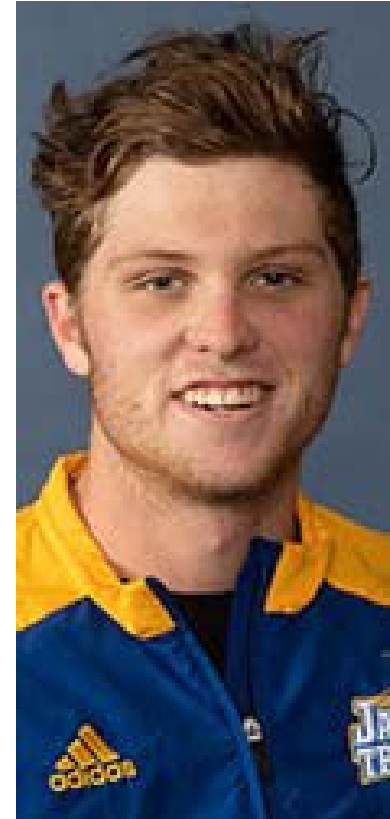

its members. At the time, Division II was being defined as the “middle division” or a classification that was neither Division I nor Division III.

Not satisfied with that distinction, Division II members assembled a promotional campaign that emphasized Division II as a chosen destination for athletes who experience a “Life in the Balance” in which they excel athletically, academically and as citizens in their communities.

Today, the Division II experience continues to emphasize the attributes of learning, balance, passion, sportsmanship, service and resourcefulness. Member schools provide the “Life in the Balance” experience for more than 90,000 athletes who achieve on the fields and courts, in the classrooms and in the community.

Texas A&I and Texas A&M-Kingsville have been members of Division II since the early 1980s and compete in the national organization in all intercollegiate sports.
