

Javelinas Hold Own Among All Schools in Pro Football Hall of Fame Inductions

The Javelinas rank with all schools, regardless of division, in having produced Pro Football Hall of Fame inductees.

The Javelinas have three members in the Hall.

Thirty-one schools have had more than three inductees.

Fourteen other programs have had three.

In Texas, SMU and Texas have had five each and the Javelinas and TCU have had three each.

Texas teams with inductees, but less than three, are Texas Southern with two and with one each are Baylor, Bishop, Hardin-Simmons, North Texas, Prairie

1970 Football Team To Celebrate 50th Anniversary

The 1970 Texas A&I football team will celebrate its 50th anniversary this fall.

The squad included many of the same players who had taken the 1969 national title, and which had compiled a 41-4 record in four seasons.

The seniors in 1970 had been on teams that won four consecutive Lone Star Conference titles, and were national runnerup in 1968.

The 1967 team was undefeated.

The 1970 Javelinas had an 11-1 record.

Four members of the team were All-America first team honorees.

Quarterback Karl Douglas, defensive lineman Margarito Guerrero and linebacker Robert Young were NAIA All-America first team, Guerrero made the

Associated Press Little All-America first team and wideout Dwight Harrison was on the American Football Coaches Association All-America first team.

On the All-Lone Star Conference first unit were offensive lineman Jim Brown, Douglas, Guerrero, Harrison, defensive lineman Claude McMillon, defensive tackle Curtis

Neal, wideout Eldridge Small and Young.

Douglas was selected as the most valuable back in the NAIA championship game, defensive tackle Ernest Price was the most valuable lineman in the NAIA semifinal contest and Young was the most valuable lineman in the NAIA title contest.

ATLANTA LOST THE opportunity to host the 2020 Final Four because of the NCAA's decision to cancel the tournament because of the public health concerns involving Coronavirus.

But the association is planning to give the city another opportunity to host the event in the future.

A report from CBS Sports said the NCAA will consider Atlanta for a Final Four host when "there's an opening on the calendar."

The host sites have been set through the 2026 season, including the 2023 meet in Houston and the 2025 tournament in San Antonio.

If the NCAA does give consideration to Atlanta as a future host, what about the other schools and cities that had championships canceled this spring.

Texas A&M-Kingsville, Kingsville and the Coastal Bend were scheduled to host the NCAA Division II Track & Field Championships at the end of May. But it was canceled.

The NCAA has announced Allendale, Mich., as the host site for the meet in 2021 and 2022, but no sites have been announced afterwards.

CLEMSON QUARTERBACK TREVOR Lawrence and his girlfriend tried to do what they could to help Cononavirus victims, but NCAA rules prohibited them from going through with their plans.

The two started a GoFundMe fundraising page for Coronavirus victims last week but it was shut down the same day after raising \$2,670.

The Clemson compliance department asked for the page to be taken down in order to comply with NCAA rules that prohibit using name, image and likeness for crowd funding.

Lawrence and his friend were forced to deactivate the page.

The \$2,670 raised will go to Meals on Wheels America and No Kid Hungry.

"Despite all of the craziness and drama with that we were able to raise a little over \$2,500. So all of that's going to go to Meals on Wheels and No Kid Hungry, which is super awesome," Lawrence said. "Thank you guys, all of y'all that donated. It's really much appreciated. It's going to help some kids and some elderly somewhere, so it's going to be very helpful. So we really appreciate y'all. Sorry for all of the drama and all of the confusion but we got it worked out."

Lawrence and friend could seek a waiver from the NCAA to start a GoFundMe page. With the NCAA dealing with issues involving the Coronavirus, including eligibility for spring sports athletes for 2020, it is unknown if a waiver would be approved in a timely manner.

CENTRAL CONNECTICUT STATE will celebrate and recognize its seniors online and on social media with our #CCSUSeniorDay. The move came after the cancellation of the spring athletic seasons and the cancellation of awards banquets.

The CCSU director of athletics said that it is important to recognize the commitment and efforts of the student-athletes, especially the senior class.

Beginning last week, the school recognized seniors each day with a dedicated post to the CCSU department of athletics website and social channels.

TEXAS A&M ATHLETIC director Ross Bjork expects that the NCAA will allow a type of mini camp for football in May, June or July to make up for spring practices.

Most, if not all, spring practice periods were canceled because of the Coronavirus threat, including the Javelina drills.

Ross Dellenger of Sports Illustrated said that the idea has been discussed across the coaching and/or the athletic directors community.

It was noted that the extra time to practice would be a benefit for every program. This is especially true for programs with a number of new coaches.

This would be the case where Javelina head football coach Mike Salinas is in his position for the first season and a majority of his staff includes newcomers.

FOR THE THIRD consecutive week, the NCAA Division II Administrative Committee took action last week to further assist Division II schools and student-athletes amid the ongoing Coronavirus pandemic.

The committee addressed several policies and regulations pertaining to athlete reinstatement, recruiting and financial aid.

The group waived current requirements for spring sport athletes who received degree-completion awards for 2020-21 and were granted an extension of eligibility, allowing them to participate in their last season in spring 2021 and still receive the award.

This action follows the earlier decision to grant an additional season of competition for all spring sports athletes as a result of the cancellation of the 2020 spring season.

The committee also issued the following clarifications regarding current policies and regulations:

...Confirmed that rules and decisions made by other divisions and organizations regarding the use of a season of competition or 10 semester/15 quarters in spring 2020 would follow the athlete upon transfer to a Division II school.

Division II athletes who transfer to another Division II school also would retain use of the self-applied waivers.

...Clarified that blanket waiver applications for financial aid equivalencies apply only to athletes who would have exhausted their eligibility after the spring 2020 term.

Additionally, this flexibility will apply only to athletes who remain at their original school.

...Clarified that institutional camps and clinics are not permitted during the recruiting dead period that has been implemented through April 15.

THE NCAA BOARD of Governors voted to distribute \$225 million in June to Division I members to specifically focus on supporting college athletes.

The move came in response to the cancellation of all remaining winter and spring NCAA championships.

Division I revenue distribution for 2020 previously was budgeted at approximately \$600 million, with the first distribution scheduled for April.

Of the \$225 million distribution, \$50 million will come from NCAA reserves. The NCAA also has a \$270 million event cancellation insurance policy, and the proceeds when received will be used to pay off a line of credit that will cover the remaining distribution within 12 months.

For this year's Division I distribution, \$53.6 million will be distributed through the Equal Conference Fund which is split equally among Division I basketball playing conferences that meet athletic and academic standards to play in the men's basketball tournament.

The remainder will be proportionally distributed through the remainder of all other funds.

Division II will receive 4.37 percent of actual revenues, currently projected to be \$13.9 million for the division, which is a \$30 million decrease from last year.

Division II will receive 3.18 percent of actual revenues, currently projected to be \$10.7 million for the division, which is a \$22 million decrease from last year.

These amounts will be used to fund national programs.

LONE STAR CONFERENCE notes:

...Michael Walton has been named the special teams coordinator at Tarleton State.

He has 15 years of coaching experience.

Walton has been assistant head coach at his alma mater, Eastern New Mexico, for the past two seasons.

He was a four-year letterman for the Greyhounds in 1996-99.

After finishing his eligibility, he was on the ENMU staff for seven seasons.

Walton spent three years on the staff at Sam Houston when current TSU head coach Todd Whitten was head coach there.

He was on the S.F. Austin State staff in 2014-16 before going to Missouri Western.

He returned to Eastern in 2018.

Walton is a native of Earth and holds his bachelor's and master's degrees from Eastern.

Tarleton State is leaving the Lone Star Conference this season but remains on the Javelina football schedule this fall as a non-league opponent.

...The D2 Conference Commissioners' Association All-America men's basketball first team includes sophomore guard Qua Grant of West Texas A&M.

Brian Halums, senior guard at Arkansas-Fort Smith, is on the third team.

Assistant coaches for the Javelinas were Willie Crafts, Fred Jonas and Don McDonald.

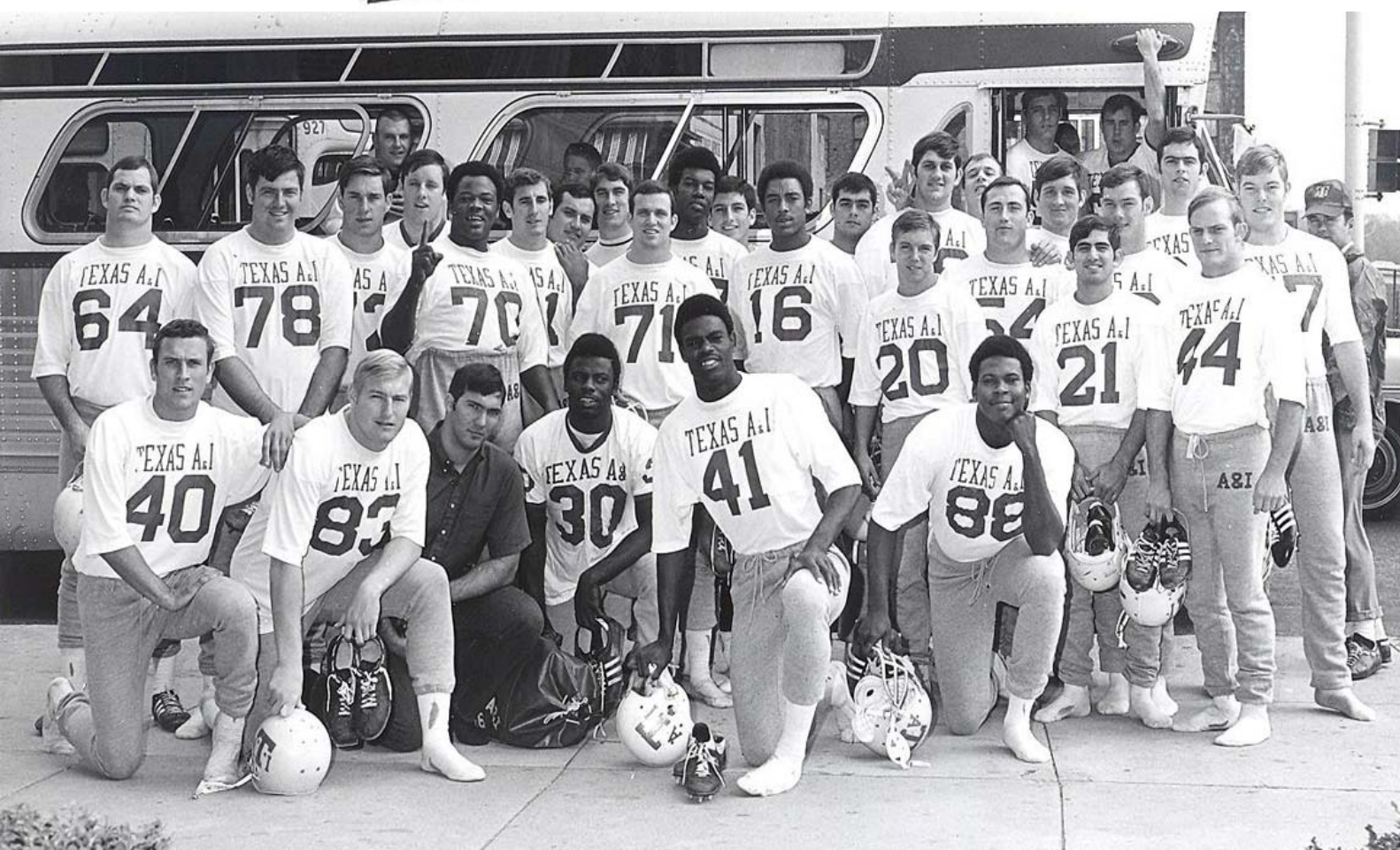
