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1974 Football Win Over SWT Is One For the Books

Any time the Javelinas and Southwest Texas State met in football for decades, it was a classic.

The schools, whose football recruiting territory and fan connections overlapped, first played in 1925, the year football started at Texas A&I.

There were 60 games before the meetings stopped when SWT moved into NCAA Division I-AA.

The Javelinas hold a 33-25-2 advantage in the series.

The 1967 game saw the Javelinas and Bobcats meeting in the finale, both with undefeated records.

meet in Houston Feb. 28.

His height was the seventh best in the world.

Robinson is one of the best outdoor jumpers in the nation but the outdoor meets have been canceled thus far because of the Coronavirus pandemic.

He had the best height in the U.S. during the 2019 season.

Robinson won the NCAA Division II national indoor titles in 2013 and 2016. He was Division II outdoor champion in 2013, 2014, and 2015, and was runnerup in 2016.

He holds the national outdoor record at 7-6.75.

Robinson won the Lone Star Conference indoor high jump gold medal in each of his four seasons with the team and did the same outdoors.

His 7-6.75 mark is also the LSC outdoor record and he has the indoor record with a 7-6 jump in 2016.

The Javelinas had a field goal by John Kardow in the closing minutes to defeat the Cats in Kingsville before one of the largest crowds in Lone Star Conference history.

Another game for the books was the 1974 contest in San Marcos.

Five inches of rain fell before and during the game. The Bobcat Stadium field was covered in water and officials had to visually determine where the ball should be after each play.

Under almost impossible playing conditions, the teams played to a 0-0 halftime score.

The high-powered Javelina offense had 104 total yards at the break and Southwest Texas had been held to 30. There were three

passing attempts in the first two quarters and none was completed.

The Javelinas pushed across two scores in the fourth period to take a 14-0 victory and close out their regulation campaign 11-0.

Don Hardeman got the first score on a three-yard run.

Larry Collins scored the second on a five-yard run.

Richard Ritchie kicked the extra point after each of the touchdowns.

The final statistics reflected the playing conditions, but the Javelinas also won that part of the game.

The Javelinas ended with 260 total yards, 212 rushing and 48 passing.

Southwest Texas was held to

84 total yards, all rushing. The Bobcats attempted one pass and it was incomplete.

Hardeman ended with 97 yards rushing and his longest run was for 14 yards.

Collins had 73 yards rushing and his longest was 16.

Ritchie threw for 48 yards and rushed for 33.

The Javelinas went on for a 13-0 season and won the first of three consecutive national championships.

And the season was to become part of a 46-game winning streak that started in the final game of the 1973 season when the Javelinas beat...Southwest Texas State.

MISSING JAVELINA ATHLETICS more and more.

Had there not been cancellations, the Javelina baseball team would be hosting Arkansas-Fort Smith Friday, Saturday and Sunday in a four-game Lone Star Conference series.

The beach volleyball team would be in Florida for the AVCA Division II national championship. The Javelinas won the national title in 2018 and was runnerup last season. They would have been one of the favorites in this year's meet.

The Javelina women's golf team would be in Arlington next Monday and Tuesday for the Lone Star Conference championships.

The women's tennis team would close out its regulation season Friday and Saturday by hosting Tarleton State and Texas-Tyler in LSC matches.

Absence certainly makes the heart grow fonder. Even in sports.

LIKE THE JAVELINAS, the Colorado State-Pueblo football team will have a roster loaded with freshmen next fall.

The Javelinas open their season with the Timberwolves Sept. 5 in Javelina Stadium.

There were 23 freshmen, who had been redshirts the previous season, on last fall's lineup and there are 56 true freshmen on the squad, most of them redshirted for the 2019 season.

The Javelina roster will also be loaded with incoming freshmen, and also freshman redshirts.

TEXAS A&M UNIVERSITY Chancellor John Sharp said last week that officials believe a 13-game college football schedule will be possible even if the start of the season is delayed until October because of the Coronavirus threat.

The college season is scheduled to begin Aug. 29.

Speaking in a live video discussion with the Texas Tribune, Sharp addressed the football season in answering a question about the university system's lost revenue because of college sporting events which have been canceled.

"In some conversations with SEC officials and NCAA, I think they've come to the conclusion that you can probably start football as late as October and still have a 13-game schedule," Sharp said.

Sharp added that there are still many unknowns about the football season because of the pandemic.

THE NCAA HAS formed a committee to study the logistics of a return for fall sports, namely, football.

Named the "COVID-19 Playing and Practice Seasons Working Group", the committee will assist the membership with evaluating medical, operational and potential rules challenges for upcoming seasons of training and competition."

Its primary focus will be football.

The committee will be cross-functional, representative and will be responsible for identifying, examining and recommending advice, solutions and/or direction to the relevant governance committees to respond to playing and practice issues of a national scope arising from the pandemic.

To begin, the group will primarily focus on football which will include direct communication with the NCAA Division I Football Oversight Committee and the NCAA Divisions II and III Football Committees as well as other governance groups.

Emerging strategies will likely be applicable to all fall sports impacted by current events.

WHEN THE SPREAD of the Coronavirus in the U.S., spring sports were wiped out with sports like outdoor track and field taking the largest hit.

The measures universities started to implement to try to keep their students safe delivered a different set of challenges for international athletes.

These athletes were faced with deciding whether to stay in the U.S. or go back to their home countries.

There are more than 20,000 international students competing at NCAA schools.

There were 16 international students listed on Javelina rosters in 2019-20.

Cross country/indoor track and field/outdoor track and field had the most with six.

LONE STAR CONFERENCE notes:

...Eastern New Mexico has announced its 2002 football schedule and its first two games will be against old Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference rivals.

The Greyhounds play New Mexico Highlands in the opener and will take on Adams (Colo.) State in the second game.

...Texas-Permian Basin athletics had a Falcon Giving Day last week.

It supported the UTPB students, the Student Emergency Fund and the UTPB Pantry.

...Texas-Permian Basin has created an Athletic Ticket Office and has hired Jasper Fell as its first ticket manager.

He has been at Sam Houston State since 2018 and has also held similar positions at Lamar and Prairie View A&M.

...The West Texas A&M women's basketball team will open its season Nov. 4 with an exhibition game against Baylor in Waco.

The Bears have won three national championships and would have been favored to take this year's title had the national playoffs been held.

NCAA DIVISION II notes:

...The National Fastpitch Coaches Association released its final NCAA Division II softball poll last week and the Lone Star Conference had three teams in the top 10 and six in the top 20.

Texas-Tyler was No. 5, Angelo State No. 7, Texas A&M-Commerce No. 10, Oklahoma Christian No. 16, Lubbock Christian No. 18 and Tarleton State No. 20.

The Javelinas got a bad deal by the coaches who voted in the poll. They defeated No. 1 Southern Arkansas and No. 20 Tarleton State.

The only top 20 team they lost to was No. 3 North Georgia. ...Nebraska-Kearney led NCAA Division II in attendance last season, averaging 956 a match in 23 home events.

Four Lone Star Conference teams were in the top 17.

Angelo State was third with a 770 average, Tarleton State was 11th with 425, Texas A&M-Commerce was 12th with 466 and West Texas A&M was 17th with a 417 average.

...Sites for 2020-21 NCAA Division II championships are pending in some sports but have been set for the events in which the Javelinas have teams.

Men's and women's cross country will be in Evansville, Ind.; volleyball will be in Sioux Falls, S.D.; football will be in McKinney; men's and women's indoor track and field will be in Birmingham, Ala.; women's basketball is set for Columbus, Ohio; men's basketball in Evansville, Ind.; women's golf will be in Detroit, Mich.; women's tennis is in Surprise, Ariz.; softball will be in Denver; men's and women's outdoor track and field is set for Allendale, Mich., and baseball will be in Cary, N.C.

Javelina Football Built Rivalries With West Coast Teams in NCAA Playoffs

When you speak of rivalries, you usually think of two teams that are in the same area, or the same state, with each other.

One example would be the rivalry Texas A&I and Southwest Texas State had with each other for decades.

When the two met in any sport, there was a huge, rambunctious crowd.

But the Javelinas also had two big football rivals on the West Coast for a period of time.

These opponents were Portland (Ore.) State and the University of California-Davis.

The rivalries were built through NCAA Division II playoffs.

The Javelinas met Portland State 13 times between 1988 and 1995. There was a single regular-season game in 2003.

There were two games in each season in 1988, 1992, 1993, 1994 and 1995.

The first of the playoff games came in 1988. The Vikings took a 35-27 victory in Oregon in the NCAA Division II semifinals.

They met again in the 1992 quarterfinals in Portland and the Vikings won, 35-30.

The Javelinas reversed the decision in the 1993 first round in Portland, stunning the home team 50-15.

There was a 1994 quarterfinal game in Kingsville and the Javelinas won, 21-16.

The teams locked up in 1995 in the quarterfinals in Kingsville and the Javelinas took a 30-3 decision.

That would be the last of the playoff games.

The 1992 regular-season game between the Javelinas and Vikings was selected by a national publication as the college game of the year, all classifications.

The Javelinas had to score twice in the final four minutes, in Portland's home stadium, to take a 44-43 victory.

Halfback Dexter Deese reached the end zone from two yards out with 3:41 left and John Cortez kicked the extra point.

Quarterback Joe Menchaca found wideout Daryl Owens for a six-yard scoring pass with 54 seconds left to tie the score and Cortez added the extra, and deciding, point.

Running back Martin Patton rushed for 181 yards and quarterback Wesley Whiten ran for 148 yards.

The Javelina offense amassed 595 total yards, 471 rushing and 124 passing.

When the series ended, the Javelinas held a 9-5 advantage.

After Portland State moved into NCAA Division I-AA, California-Davis took its place as the big West Coast rival for the Javelinas. The Javelinas and Aggies played six times, all in the playoffs.

The first game came in 1993 in the quarterbacks. And they played again in 1996, 1997, 1998 and 2001 in first-round matchups.

A 2002 game was in the quarterfinals.

The teams split in their series, 3-3.

The 1998, 2001 and 2002 games were in Kingsville, and the other three in Davis, Calif.

One memory of the series came in one of the Kingsville games. The Cal Davis band traveled non-stop by bus to attend the contest and after it was over, it boarded the bus and went back to California, non-stop.

Like with Portland State, the rivalry with Cal Davis ended when the Aggies moved into NCAA Division I-AA.

Allen Begins 10th Year as Head of Volleyball Programs

Tanya Allen begins her 10th year as head of the Texas A&M-Kingsville volleyball program this fall.

She joined the Javelinas in 2011 after three seasons as head volleyball coach at Frank Phillips College where she had a 42-3 record and had a team reach the National Junior College Athletic Association Final Four.

Allen was the Western Junior College Athletic Conference coach of the year three times and was a two-time district coach of the year.

Allen played at New Mexico State where she was on two Sun Belt Conference championship teams.

She helped the team reach the NCAA tournament three times and the clubs she was on compiled a 113-19 record in four seasons.

Allen was a team captain her senior year and was on the ESPN Magazine all-district academic team twice.

Allen played at Deming, N.M., High School where she was the New Mexico player of the year.

She holds a bachelor's degree from New Mexico State and has a master's degree from Western New Mexico.

As indoor volleyball coach for the Javelinas, her team was the 2014 and 2015 Student-Athlete Advisory Committee team of the year for its community service and outreach.

The Javelina athletic program started a beach volleyball program in 2017 and Allen became the head coach while maintaining her position as indoor volleyball coach.

In its second year, the Javelinas won the American Volleyball Coaches Association Division II national championship, and was national runnerup in 2019.

The Javelinas were off to another outstanding start this spring before the season was halted because of the Coronavirus outbreak.

They were undefeated against non-NCAA Division I opponents.

Her indoor and beach athletes have received number honors and awards.

There have been All-America, all-region and All-Lone Star Conference honorees indoors as well as players of the year.

The 2020 indoor team opens its season Sept. 4-5 at a tournament in San Angelo.

National Players Association Asking For NCAA Rule Changes During Pandemic

The National Players Association is asking the NCAA to make changes to its rules during the Coronavirus pandemic.

The player rights advocacy group is asking for the NCAA to allow third parties to pay for athletes' expenses, including food, rent, utilities and other fees. That includes health insurance and other medical expenses.

The NCPA's letter came two days after Oklahoma State coach Mike Gundy said that he was hoping football staffers could go back to work in the team facilities on May 1. After the staffers would be allowed to go back to work following negative Coronavirus tests, Gundy said he wants players to come back to campus to start preparing for the season.

The Big 12 and other conferences have put a moratorium on all team activities until May 31.

Another request of the NCPA is for college athletes to have

freedom to make money off their name, image and likeness. Athletes are prohibited under NCAA rules from taking endorsement and sponsorship money. The NCAA has moved to loosening those restrictions.

The group also wants all spring sports athletes granted an extra year of eligibility to be able to transfer without penalty if a school cannot guarantee the same scholarship level for the upcoming season.

The NCAA has moved to allow spring sport athletes an extra year of eligibility in March though those who were seniors in 2020 aren't guaranteed the same scholarship money in 2021 if they choose to return.

The NCPA has no official power to compel the NCAA to make rule changes though he association's stature has grown as public opinion has shifted in favor of athletes' rights in recent years.

The NCPA called for the NCAA basketball tournaments to

be played without fans in February and the NCAA made the decision to play without fans but moved to cancel the tournaments as the severity of the pandemic worsened.
