

## 1960 Football Team To Celebrate 60th Anniversary Of LSC Title, Great Southwest Bowl Championship

The 1960 Texas A&I football team will celebrate this fall the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of its winning the Lone Star Conference championship.

The Javelinas will be recognized at a home football game.

The squad included many of the players who had been on the 1959 team that won the NAIA national championship.

The Javelinas compiled an 8-1-1 record and victories were over Howard Payne, Sam Houston State, S.F. Austin State, Lamar, Sul Ross, Southwest Texas, the University of Corpus Christi and Arkansas Tech.

The victory over Arkansas Tech came in the Great Southwest Bowl in Grand Prairie. The Javelinas beat the Wonderboys, 45-14.

Tackle Willie Crafts was an Associated Press Little All-America first team honoree.

On the All-Texas College first unit were halfback Harold Hees and fullback Butch Pressley.

Making the All-LSC first team were halfback Sid Blanks, Crafts, center James Franz, quarterback Jarrell Hayes, Hees, punter Tommy Janik and Pressley.

Captains of the team were John Beseda and Jesse Longhofer.

Blanks, Crafts and Janik were drafted after finishing their eligibility and several others had professional careers.

Blanks was the Lone Star Conference rushing and scoring leader. Most of the current conference awards weren't established at that time.

# Javelina Hash

**THERE ARE LOTS** of ‘what ifs’ about the Javelina spring sports season that will never be answered.

What if the softball team, loaded with much of the same talent that won conference and regional championships and finished runnerup nationally last year, could have finished out the season? Would the Javelinas been able to complete their run this year and bring home a national championship?

What if the beach volleyball team had been able to go to the national tournament? It has been national champion and national runnerup the past two years and was off to a successful start this season.

The other Javelina spring sports teams also had high hopes of successful campaigns. But like all of the other NCAA Division II programs in the country, the ‘what ifs’ won’t be answered.

It’s sad to have the questions go unanswered.

**AS A RESULT** of the remaining winter and spring NCAA championships and subsequent budgetary impacts across the association, Division II is projected to receive \$30 million less than anticipated in 2020 from its annual NCAA revenue allocation.

The NCAA constitution guarantees that Division II each year receives 4.37 percent of the actual NCAA revenue, and this year’s share is projected to be \$13.9 million.

In 2018-19, Division II received more than \$44 million from the NCAA.

The NCAA receives most of its revenue from television and marketing rights for the Division I men’s basketball championship, as well as championship ticket sales. The revenue is used to provide distributions to member conferences and schools, along with funding championships, national programs and other initiatives to support student-athletes.

The Division II Administrative Committee, the group responsible for handling Division II business in between quarterly meetings of the Presidents Council, already has begun evaluating the impact of the decreased revenue.

The committee will continue its discussions and make budgetary recommendations for the Division II Planning and Finance Committee and the Presidents Council to consider at their April 28-29 meetings.

A set of Division II budget guidelines and principles directs the division in light of an unexpected event to determine the use of Division II insurance and reserve dollars.

The division will prioritize expenses in the following order:

1. Contractual obligations.
2. Championships.
3. Enhancement fund.
4. Conference grant program.
5. Strategic initiatives.

“Division II, like our member institutions, has been actively responding to a range of issues created by the COVID-19 pandemic,” Sandra Jordan, chancellor of South Carolina-Aiken and

chair of the Division II Presidents Council, said. "The NCAA and each division will experience a significant loss of revenue. But DII will continue to respond to every challenge with the best interest of our student-athletes in mind and work to protect those distinguishing aspects of a DII experience that we all value."

NCAA budgetary decisions will continue to be made over the coming weeks and months. The Board of Governors recently voted to distribute \$225 million to Division I members, a revenue distribution that was originally budgeted at \$600 million.

Division II will receive 3.18 percent of the actual revenue, a figure currently projected to be \$10.7 million, a \$22 million decrease from last year.

**THE NCAA DIVISION II** Administrative Committee adopted emergency legislation last week to extend the recruiting deadline period through at least May 31.

The committee also adopted a resolution to allow schools to issue institution athletics aid agreements beginning April 16.

**COLLEGE FOOTBALL STAKEHOLDERS** have begun the process of modeling what a return to play would look like for the sport, according to CBS. There will be at least some adjustment made to the 2020 season due to the Coronavirus pandemic, which forced the cancellation of spring practices and spring games.

There have been models for football teams reconvening on June 1, July 1 and Aug. 1. There has been discussion of a season with only conference games being played.

All is on the table.

"I'm not worried (about not playing football)," Gary Patterson, TCU head football coach and president of the American Football Coaches Association, said. "We can only do what we can do. I would suspect that, if they have to cut back the season, people are going to lose their non-conference games. That's one theory out there. That hurts the lower levels for financial reasons. Everybody is going to have to pay a price."

Here are some of the factors facing football for the three dates:  
June 1 – The nearest facsimile of a normal calendar. That would give teams two months to prepare for fall camp, potentially with some additional practice dates or organized team activities built in to replace the lost spring practices.

July 1 – A restricted calendar could impact recruiting, pushing back or eliminating the early signing period. No high school camps. Perhaps there could be a condensed spring practice session.

"If you can't start training your football team by July 1, you're going to need at least four weeks," Brian Kelly, Notre Dame head coach, said. "Strength and conditioning coaches are going to want at least six (weeks). Sports medicine is probably looking at 4-6 weeks."

Aug. 1 – A group of coaches have suggested they could get their teams ready to start the 2020 season on time with only fall

camp to prepare and no additional practices to replace those lost during the spring.

If there is a normal fall schedule played, another question will be if fans will be in the stands, by choice or not there by necessity.

The later the starting period for workouts would handicap some schools more than others. Those with coaching staffs returning and most of their players back from last year would have a big advantage.

Those with new coaches, new systems and a roster full of new players will be at a disadvantage.

But how football can be played in the fall, as well as volleyball and other sports, remains to be seen.

**AN ARTICLE ON** a website this week questioned whether the larger programs in college football will suffer more than the small programs because of the current financial crunch.

The latter are used to working with fewer dollars.

Coaches at all levels feel this is true.

The schools that are used to extracting maximum value from each dollar are in a better position to deal with the crunch.

**NFL COMMISSIONER ROGER** Goodell has announced at the 2020 NFL draft will be in a fully virtual format later this month.

The 32 clubs will conduct their draft outside of their facilities, complying with current regulations due to the Coronavirus threat.

Team personnel were advised to be in separate locations, using phone and the internet to communicate.

The draft is April 23-25 and was originally to be held in Las Vegas.

Several former Javelinas will be involved in the draft, including Indianapolis Colt general manager Chris Ballard and Colt assistant general manager Ed Dodds.

Ballard is a former coach for the Javelinas and Dodds is a former member of the Javelina administrative staff.

The Javelinas also have Juan Castillo at the Chicago Bears, Kris Korcurek at the San Francisco 49ers and Al Harris with the Dallas Cowboys. All are on the coaching staffs with their clubs.

Castillo is a former player and coach for the Javelinas, Korcurek is a former Javelina coach and Harris is a former Javelina player.

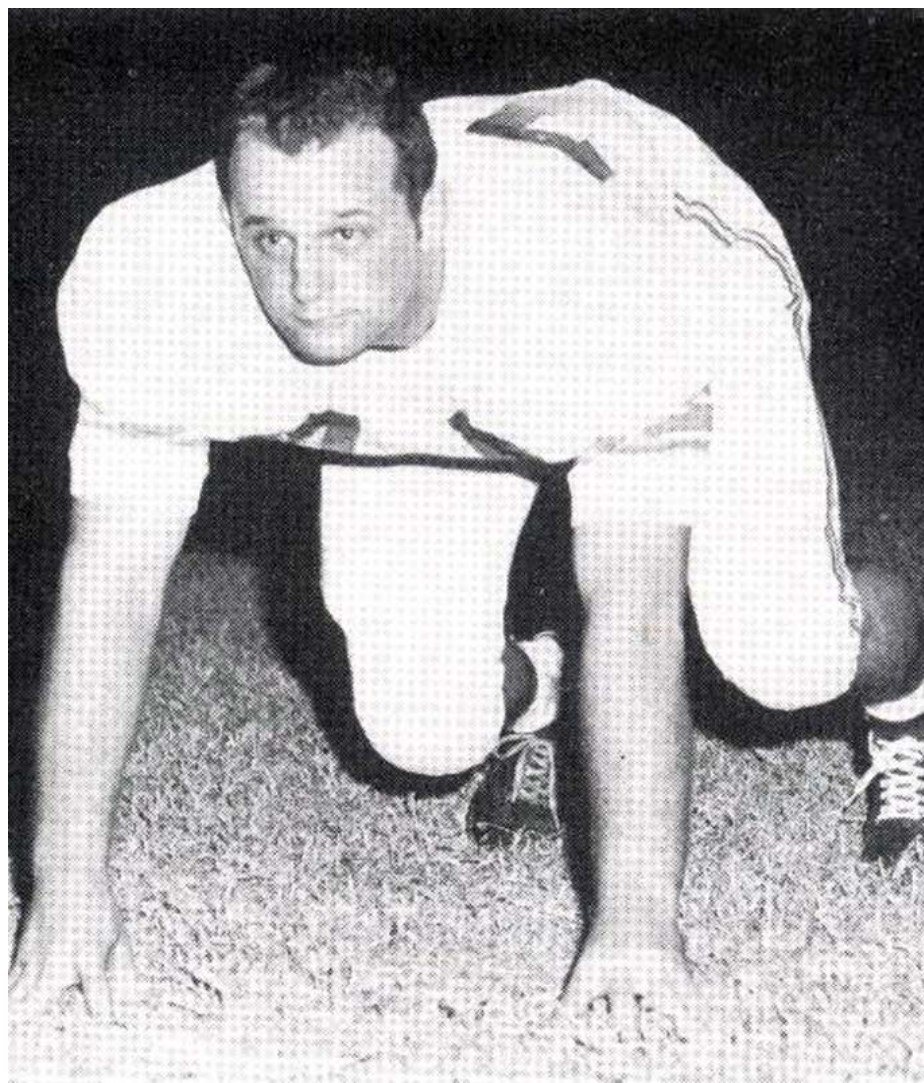

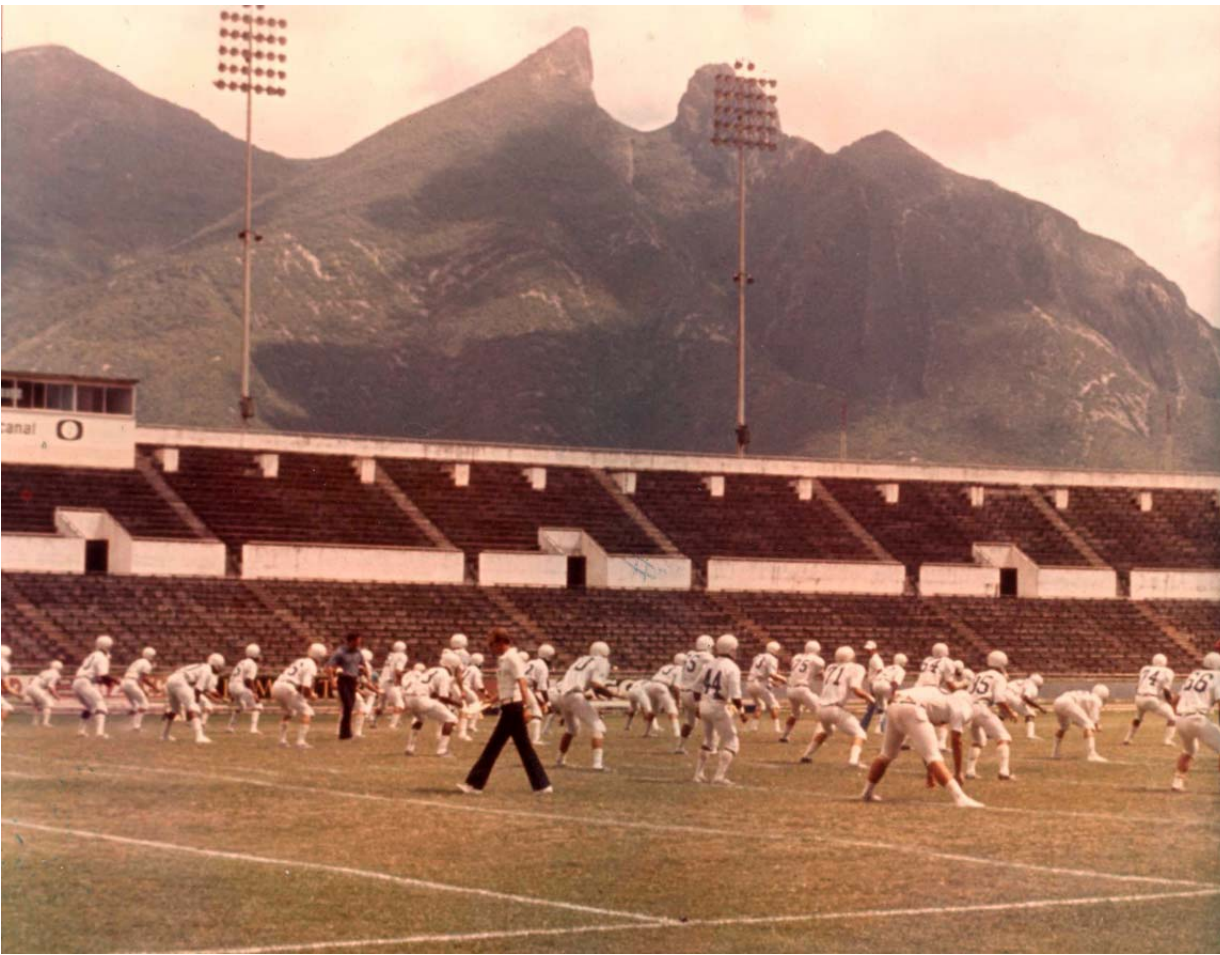
