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## Gil Steinke...One of College Football's All-Time Best

Gil Steinke.

A name from the past in college coaching annals and one some of the younger members of today's coaching family might not recognize.

But if a coach, player or fan doesn't know of his outstanding accomplishments and records, he

or she definitely isn't one who is familiar with the history of the game.

Steinke's name belongs on any all-time best list.

He compiled one of the best coaching records in the history of college athletics.

Steinke was the athletic director and head football coach at Texas A&I University for 23

years and during that time he compiled a record that takes a back seat to no one.

Steinke's squads won six national championships, was national runnerup once and had an eighth postseason victory when the Javelinas won the 1960 Great Southwest Bowl.

His teams had a 14-1 record in NAIA post-season play.

Steinke had a 181-62-4 record at Texas A&I, and as a head coach.

The Javelinas won 10 Lone Star Conference championships in his 1954-76 career.

They had a 39-game winning streak intact when he stepped down as head coach after the 1976 season.

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## Javelina Football Has Had 11 Head Coaches in 95 Seasons

The Texas A&M-Kingsville football team has had 11 head coaches since the first squad took the field in 1925.

In those 95 seasons, Gil Steinke had the longest tenure with 23 years.

Ron Harms was head coach for 21 seasons and spent two seasons as offensive coordinator.

Steinke and Harms are both in the College Football Hall of Fame.

Mike Salinas was named the head coach for 2000 and he'll have his first team on the field next fall.

**JOHN SHARP, TEXAS A&M University System** chancellor, said last week that all 11 system schools are set to open in August and host football games.

Texas A&M-Kingsville is one of the 11 schools in the Texas A&M University System.

The Javelinas and other system schools have had their athletic programs closed since mid-March.

The Javelina football team is set to host Colorado State-Pueblo Sept. 5 in Javelina Stadium.

The Javelina volleyball squad will play its first match Sept. 4 in a tournament in San Angelo. The first home volleyball match is Sept. 15 with St. Mary's.

St. Mary's officials also announced plans for the school, which is in the Lone Star Conference with the Javelinas, to open in August.

**JAVELINA ATHLETICS HAS** lost two of its best supporters. Dan McCauley died April 27 and E.C. Simpson passed away Monday.

Both were attendees at most of the Javelina home events, all sports.

And they often made road trips.

Dan's father, Joe D. McCauley, played football for the Javelinas in the 1930s.

E.C. was known for driving to games, no matter how far away. He drove to Oregon for games with Portland State and was in North Dakota for games there.

The Live United Bowl game in Texarkana, Ark., a few years ago was played in cold, driving rain. E.C. stood in the end zone for the entire game.

I think he may have made all of the football road games.

They have been long-time boosters for the Javelinas and will be missed by the athletic staff and athletes.

# Wollenzien Begins Seventh Season As Head Women's Tennis Coach

Autumn Williams Wollenzien will begin her seventh season this fall as head coach of the Texas A&M-Kingsville women's tennis team.

Wollenzien joined the Javelina staff in 2014.

She had been at Clark Atlanta (Ga.) for four seasons.

The Javelina players have received numerous national and conference recognition during her tenure as head coach. They have also been honored academically.

She was named Lone Star Conference coach of the year in 2015.

While at Clark Atlanta, she became the first to be on teams and coached squads that won Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championships. When she was on the team, the team won three conference titles and reached the national tournament four times.

Her coaching career started in Chicago, her hometown, where she coached the youth outreach program.

After finishing at Clark Atlanta, she spent three years as a staff writer for the Atlanta Daily World and the RollingOut Urban Style weekly.

At the same time, she was a tennis pro at Sugar Creek Tennis Center in Decatur, Ga.

Wollenzien was a volunteer

with the Atlanta Youth Tennis and Education Foundation.

While in Kingsville, she and her players have been volunteers for the Special Olympics, the Boys and Girls Club of Kingsville and the Coastal Plains Community Center. They have also volunteered at Mission 911 in Corpus Christi and were volunteers after Hurricane Harvey.

In addition to her degree from Clark Atlanta, she holds a bachelor's degree in photographic imaging from the Art Institute of Atlanta.

She has a master's degree from Coker (S.C.) College.

She is married to Gregory Wollenzien.

**THE NCAA PLAYING** Rules Oversight Panel approved last week the delaying rules changes in five sports for a year to mitigate the financial impact on athletic budgets because of the Coronavirus.

The sports with implementation of delays are baseball, men's basketball, softball, lacrosse and swimming and diving.

In baseball, Divisions II and III were scheduled to begin regular-season bat barrel compression testing in 2021. Instead, the baseball programs must be compliant with the rule by 2022.

Division II and III men's basketball programs were scheduled to move their three-point lines to 22-1.75 for the 2020-21 season. But the rule change will be delayed until 2021-22.

Softball was scheduled to require bat barrel compression testing for Division I in 2021. This rule is now delayed until spring 2022.

Division II and III softball teams are still required to do regular-season bat testing by 2022, which is the original time frame.

Lacrosse and swimming and diving have requirements that have been delayed.

The panel's decision to delay the implementation of these rules was based on feedback from each of the corresponding playing rules committees, as well as the Division I Competition Oversight Committee, the Division II Management Council and the Division III Management Council.

**THE NCAA DIVISION II** Presidents Council approved last week changes to the division's long-range budget to address the reduction in revenue for the current fiscal year as a result of the impact from the Coronavirus crisis.

The council advanced a proposal regarding access to athletic aid for all freshman athletes and two-year college transfers, regardless of their initial eligibility status, for the 2021 NCAA Convention.

The council further discussed the supported name, image and likeness concepts following the Board of Governors' announcement on the issue.

The changes in Division II's long-range budget included mostly delayed or lowered budget increases, in response to a \$30 million decrease in projected revenue this fiscal year due to the cancellation of the Division I men's and women's basketball tournaments and most of the 2020 NCAA winter and spring championships.

Division II expects to use \$16 million from its reserves to cover

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the difference between projected expenses and the updated expected venue for this fiscal year.

The Presidents Council approved the changes to the division's new long-range budget to meet its budget policy of holding a reserve balance of at last 70 percent of the division's operating revenue.

Division II expected to receive \$15 million from event cancellation insurance for the Division I men's basketball tournament.

**SIXTEEN NCAA DIVISION II** schools are currently listed as having beach volleyball as a sport.

This number is growing each year and hopefully it won't be long until the NCAA will have a national championship for Division II schools.

At the present, all beach volleyball teams compete in one division in the NCAA playoffs. This means the Javelinas who have been one of the best among the Division II schools, must compete with Southern California, Florida State, UCLA, etc.

The American Volleyball Coaches Association has had a Division II national playoff the past two years. The Javelinas won the title in 2018 and were runnersup last spring.

## Gray Beginning Fifth Year As Women's Golf Coach

Stefanie Gray will enter her fifth year as head coach of the Texas A&M-Kingsville women's golf team when the squad starts its season next fall.

She joined the Javelina staff July 1, 2016, after spending seven seasons as assistant coach at S.F. Austin State, and head of the women's program.

Gray played at Texas-Rio Grande Valley where she was a four-time all-independent selection.

She was the school's female athlete of the year in 2005-06 and was the PGA Minority Collegiate Golf Championship medalist three times.

Gray was a 2008 semifinalist in the Texas Women's State Amateur consolation bracket. She was a two-time national championship qualifier on the Golf Channel Amateur Tour.

She was runnerup at the 2005 Central Texas Women's Amateur tournament.

Gray holds a mechanical engineering degree from UTRGV and was graduated magna cum laude. She was a four-time National Golf Coaches Association All-America Scholar.

She has a five-year old daughter, Rebekah.

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that weekend, things changed with the cancellation of games.

With no on-field action, the event became an on-line experience with support for coaches and the NFCA coming from all corners of the nation on social media.

The outpouring of support was almost too much to keep up with on Twitter as the hashtag #NFCAday dominated feeds both days of the weekend.

A live Twitter chat added to the success, with coaches sharing more than 300 ideas and thoughts about their “why” as a coach. The NFL was overwhelmed by the generosity of its members and other supporters of softball who made donations to help assure the NFCA could maintain the same level of educational offerings during the pandemic.

The NFCA has found many innovative ways to keep engaged with the members, including providing multiple webinars and coaching discussions each week, regular news updates via email and launched Virtual Coaches Clinics last week.

The NFCA offered a discount for first-time memberships and added 119 new members for the week.

The Association has already started making plans for next year’s NFCA Day on April 17, and is looking forward to celebrating coaches as originally intended and where they are most comfortable—on the softball field.

Craig Nicholson is head softball coach for the Javelinas, Dennis Furr is the assistant coach, Haley Boyett is the graduate assistant and Sarah Gilbert is a student assistant.

This time last year, the Javelina softball team had won the Lone Star Conference championship and the LSC postseason tournament, was preparing to win the NCAA Division II South Central Region title this weekend, capture the NCAA Division II South Central Super Region championship next week and advance into the NCAA Division II Women’s College World Series where it would be national runnerup.

**THE NCAA’S FOOTBALL** Oversight Committee has suggested a six-week period before returning to play.

The six-week period will not be officially recommended until the committee receives the necessary approval of the NCAA COVID-19 Advisory Panel.

The six-week time frame, if formally approved, is significant because it gives universities a better indication of when the college football season could start, a time frame that’s dependent on allowing students to return to campus this fall in the first place.

The season is expected to start Aug. 29 with seven games involving 12 NCAA Division I teams. This would mean athletes would need to report around July 20 to get the necessary six weeks in.

The remaining Division I schools do not play their openers until the following week. Those schools would need to report around July 27.

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# Steinke...One of Football’s All-Time Best

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In his final three seasons, Texas A&I was 13-0 in 1974, 12-0 in 1975 and 13-0 in 1976.

He also had undefeated teams in 1967 (9-0-0) and 1962 (9-0-1).

The 1974, 1975 and 1976 teams led the nation offensively and the 1976 squad set a national record for most yards gained during a season (6,269) and another mark for most offensive yards per game (569.9).

His teams were among the most traveled in the nation, at any level. He took his 1976 team to Europe and played exhibition games in Austria, France and Germany. It was the first time American football had played on the Continent.

The Javelinas also played games in Mexico and Hawaii, and went against clubs from 20 different states.

The Javelinas played the University of Hawaii in 1975 to open Aloha Stadium in Honolulu and took a 43-0 victory. The Javelinas returned the next year and again left the Islands victorious.

Steinke was NAIA national coach of the year four times and was American Football Coaches Association district coach of the year twice.

He was the Texas Sports Writers Association coach of the year in 1975 and was Lone Star Conference coach of the year five times.

Steinke was chosen the LSC coach of the decade for the 1960s.

He was a charter inductee into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1996 when it opened its doors to coaches and athletes from college division schools.

Steinke was inducted into the NAIA Hall of Fame in 1971 and was a charter member of the Javelina Hall of Fame.

He was inducted into the Texas Sports Hall of Fame in 1977.

A health and kinesiology building on the Kingsville campus is named for Steinke.

He retired from coaching after the 1976 season but continued as athletic director until 1982.

At his retirement, Texas A&I president Dr. Gerald B. Robins called Steinke “an institution” (Continued on Page 6)

He has all 10 of the top 800-meter run indoor track and field times for the Javelinas, his best being a 1:51.09. He also has the all-time best in the indoor mile run at 4:18.56. He ran a leg on the indoor distance medley relay unit that recorded the best ever at 10:39.04. He was also on the distance medley team that had the second best time ever. Idziak ran a leg on the school’s sixth best indoor 1600-meter relay squad that had a 3:16.27 time. He holds the school record in the outdoor 800-meter run at 1:49.64. He also has nine of the 10 best ever races in the outdoor 800. Idziak had a 3:58.29 in the 1500-meter outdoor run and that’s the fifth best ever. He won the 800-meter indoor gold medal in each of his four seasons with the team. He was the outdoor 800 champion. He was Lone Star Conference male academic player of the year in 2015.**

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If athletes are not allowed to return to campus by late July or early August, it's likely the season will not begin on time as scheduled.

Until approved, it isn't known if the six-week period would be mandatory or whether football programs could receive exemptions to play with only four or five weeks to prepare since universities could be opening fall classes on different dates.

A number of universities around the country have indicated they are planning on-campus classes in the fall, another sign that college football might be able to return this autumn.

If the time-frame is approved, the Oversight Committee will work on determining what those six weeks would look like regarding strength and conditioning timeframes before returning to the field, number of practices allowed, the possibility of two-a-day practices and a multitude of other factors that may require tweaking or rewriting of some current NCAA rules.

**THE NCAA BOARD** of Governors, at a meeting last week, supported rule changes to allow athletes to receive compensation for third-party endorsement both related to and separate from athletics.

Athletes would be permitted to identify themselves by sport and school but use of conference and school logos, trademarks or other involvement would not be allowed.

The board emphasized that at no time should a university or college pay athletes for name, image and likeness activities.

The board directed all three divisions to consider appropriate rules changes based on recommendations from its Federal and State Legislation Working Group.

The board's recommendations will move to the rules-making structure in each of the NCAA's divisions for further consideration.

The divisions are expected to adopt new name, image and likeness rules by January to take effect at the start of the 2021-22 academic year.

The board is requiring guardrails around any future name, image and likeness activities. These would include no name, image and likeness activities that would be considered pay for play, no school or conference involvement, no use of name, image and likeness for recruiting by schools or boosters, and the regulation of agents and advisors.

Any changes adopted by the divisions must be in concert with the following principles and guidelines:

...Ensuring athletes are treated similarly to non-athlete students unless a compelling reason exists to differentiate.

...Maintaining the priorities of education and the collegiate experience to provide opportunities for athlete success.

...Ensuring rules are transparent, focused and enforceable, and facilitating fair and balanced competition.

...Making clear the distinction between collegiate and professional opportunities.

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within an institution”.

While his record and his honors are unsurpassed, he was a pioneer in football.

Steinke recruited Sid Blanks in 1960 and Blanks became one of the first black football player at an integrated school in Texas, and one of the first in the South.

Blanks served as a team captain in 1963, another first for a black player at an integrated school in the state or South.

Stories of the obstacles Steinke and his teams faced in the seasons after Blanks joined the team are numerous.

In the latter years of his coaching career, Steinke left the sidelines and went into the stands to call plays. “The worst place to watch a game in on the sidelines,” Steinke would say at the time. He said the press box was “too hectic”.

He had a coach with him and would send the aide back and forth to the sidelines to give the coaching staff instructions.

Steinke also admitted he enjoyed getting to know the fans in the stands. On many occasions, he would be seated in the opponent's fan section. All that meant was that he had made friends with people from another school.

Even though he wasn't considered a psychologist, he was a master at the trade when dealing with players.

Again, there are too many stories to list here, relating as to how he handled players and teams.

There was one road trip where the Javelinas were facing a team they were expected to beat by a wide margin.

Figuring the players wouldn't be ready for the game, Steinke booked rooms as a small town 40-50 miles away from the game site. There were two small motels in the town and the players had to be split between the two.

He had the bus driver park at one of the motels and the players from the other had to walk the mile

to catch the bus to eat and later go to the game site.

Needless to say, the players were in a bad mood and, as Steinke had foreseen I'm sure, they were definitely ready for the game.

Steinke played for the Javelinas out of high school in Ganado.

He held several Javelina rushing records for years after finishing his career.

Steinke was in the U.S. Navy during World War II and when he returned, he played for the Philadelphia Eagles for four years where he led the NFL in punt returns and led the Eagles in interceptions in 1947.

He was a starting safety on the 1948 Eagle team that won the NFL championship.

Steinke led the NFL in punt returns in 1947 with a 14.8 average.

Before returning to his alma mater as head coach, Steinke was on the staffs at Trinity, Oklahoma State and Texas A&M.

He was the head coach of the San Antonio Gunslingers of the U.S. Football League in 1984 and 1985.

Steinke sent a stream of athletes into the pro ranks, including six who were first-round draft choices.

These included Gene Upshaw, an all-pro performer for the Oakland Raiders, and James Hill, who was selected by the Green Bay Packers.

Upshaw went on to become the executive director of the NFL Players Association and Hill continues to be one of the top television sportscasters in the Los Angeles area.

The other first round picks were Randy Johnson by the Atlanta Falcons, Eldridge Small by the New York Giants, Don Hardeman by the Houston Oilers and Ernest Price by the Detroit Lions.

Eight other Javelinas were selected in the second or third round.

The Javelinas produced 41 All-America first-team honorees under Steinke and he had players in each of the postseason all-star games.

Steinke died in May 1995 but his legacy will continue as long as there is college football.

Although his entire head coaching career was at a college division school in South Texas, the milestones the Javelinas accomplished under his guidance can stand up to those posted by any college, at any level, at any time in college football history.

...Maintaining the distinction between college athletes and professional athletes.

...Upholding the NCAA's values, including diversity inclusion and gender equity.

Other head coaches distributed an additional 250 face shields.

The shields are used by members of the businesses in the prevention of the Coronavirus.

...Long-time St. Mary's basketball public address announcer James Koett died April 25.

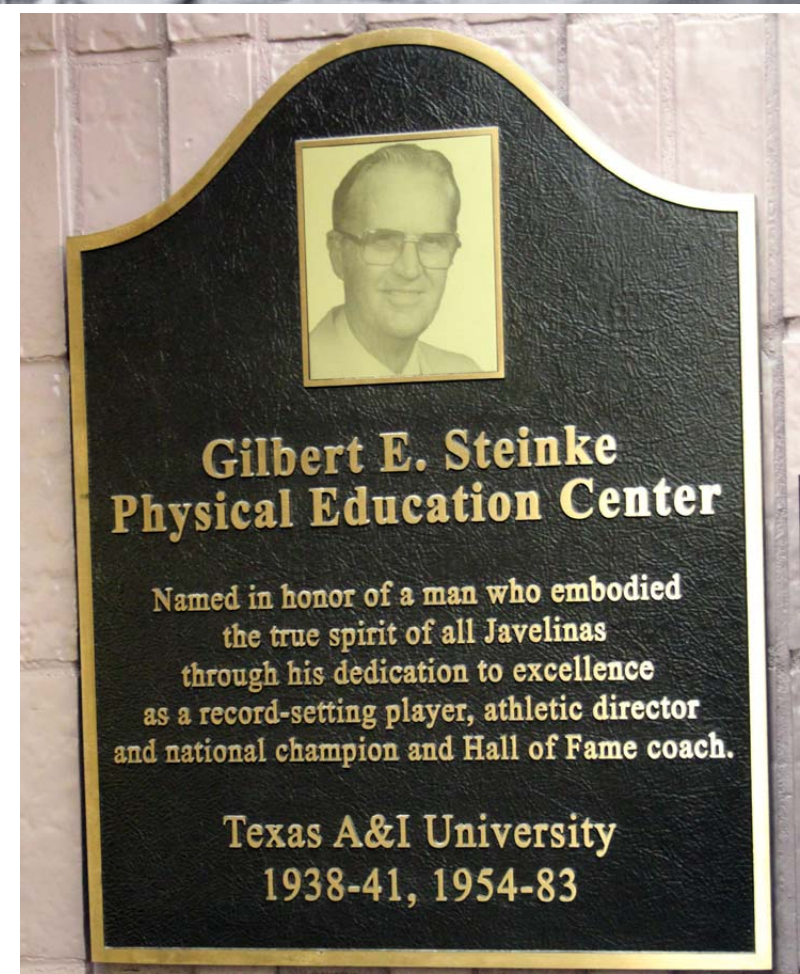

Dan McCauley passed away April 27.

He has been one of the Javelinas' biggest fans along with his wife, Sandra.

They attend most Javelina home events and made out-of-town trips. His father, Joe D. McCauley, played football for the Javelinas in the 1930s.
