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1985 Lone Star Conference Football Championship Team To Celebrate 35th Anniversary This Fall

The 1985 Texas A&I football team will celebrate this fall the 35th anniversary of it winning a Lone Star Conference championship.

The team went 8-3 overall and 4-0 in the conference.

LSC members, along with the Javelinas, at the time were Angelo State, Abilene Christian, East Texas State, Eastern New Mexico and Howard Payne.

Defensive back James Jefferson was Football News All-America first team and Lone Star Conference defensive back of the year.

Center Charles Smith was Associated Press Little All-America and Football News All-America first unit.

Fullback Heath Sherman was named the Lone Star Conference freshman of the year.

Kicker Walter Rule was All-Texas College first team and AP Little All-America second team.

On the All-LSC first team were defensive lineman Ken Blackmon, defensive back Ricky Collins, Jefferson, Rule, Sherman, Smith and offensive lineman Richard Zepeda. Zepeda was All-Texas College.

Linebacker Robert Soza was on the LSC and Texas all-academic first teams and the College Sports Information Directors of America academic all-district.

Sherman led the team in rushing with 1,287 yards, and that

also led the LSC. He went on to become one of the state's all-time leading rushers with 5,140 career yards. He averaged 114.2 rushing yards a game in his four seasons.

He ranks second in career all-purpose yards with 5,695. He averaged 129.4 all-purpose yards a game in his career.

Sherman ranks first and second on the season rushing touchdown list with 27 in 1988 and 23 in 1986. And he has 69 in his career, three behind teammate Johnny Bailey.

Rule holds the school record for most extra points kicked in a season with 54 and he is second with most field goals in a season with 16 in 1985.

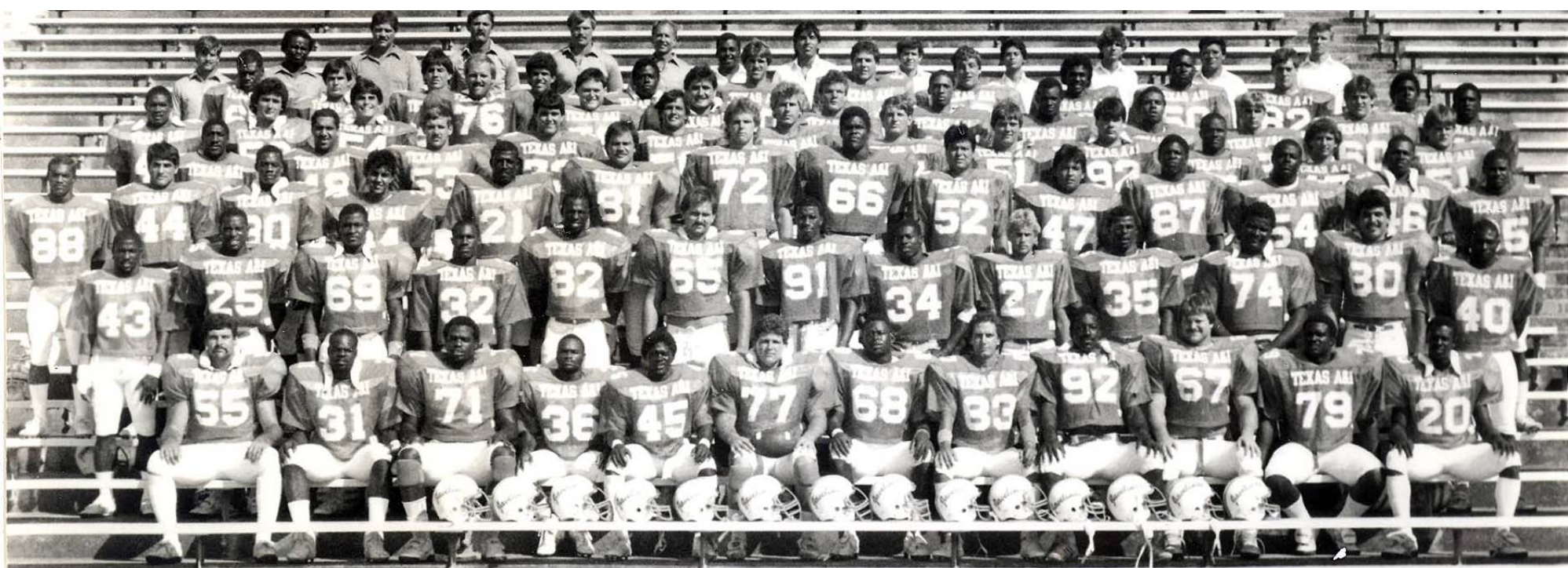
He was 28 for 28 in 1985.

Blackmon and Zepeda were elected captains of the squad.

Sherman was a draft choice of the Philadelphia Eagles after his record-setting career with the Javelinas. Jefferson would have a professional career that saw him play for the Seattle Seahawks and in the Canadian Football League.

Ron Harms was head coach of the Javelinas and assistants were Juan Castillo, Richard Cundiff, Dan Hurley, Neal LaHue, Don Pittman, Mike Scott and Mark Smith.

Cundiff would later become the Javelinas' head coach and LaHue is currently on the Javelina football staff.

ANOTHER VICTIM OF the current pandemic is the Lone Star Conference football media day.

It will be presented online this summer.

This has always been the prelude to the start of football season.

Each of the LSC football coaches has been present along with a couple of players from each school, athletic administrators, sports information directors and members of the news media.

It has been a great time to get together with those from your opponent schools before being across the field from them once the season starts.

It also has afforded the media an opportunity to get interviews and shots for the upcoming campaign.

Hopefully, things can get back to norm in 2021 in this area, as well as the many others that have been disrupted during this crisis.

THE GREAT NORTHWEST Athletic Conference is facing a dilemma this fall.

The league has only four members that play football. Because of the shortage of teams, the GNAC members play each other twice and also schedule non-conference games against mostly Lone Star Conference schools.

Currently, the U.S. and Canada borders are closed except to “essential” travelers. This probably would not include athletic teams.

If the three U.S. schools in the GNAC lose two Simon Fraser games, plus other cancellations that are being made on a weekly basis, they could have only five or six teams on their schedules.

And some of these may be canceled because of the Coronavirus pandemic.

It’s a problem for all football leagues but the GNAC may face the biggest problem of all.

The Javelinas are scheduled to meet Western Oregon of the GNAC Sept. 12 in Monmouth, Ore.

The GNAC football-playing programs, other than Simon Fraser and Western Oregon, are Azusa Pacific (Calif.) and Central Washington.

THE TEXAS-PERMIAN Basin football opener Sept. 5 with Wayland Baptist has been canceled.

The move came last week after the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA), of which Wayland is a member, required teams to reduce their football schedules to nine opponents.

WBU had to cut two opponents off its schedule.

UTPB now has 10 games on the football schedule.

One of its remaining games is against Simon Fraser, located in Burnaby, British Columbia. Currently, the U.S. and Canadian border is closed and that matchup is threatened.

The border closure doesn’t run into the fall, but it has been extended several times.

THE WORLD BASEBALL Softball Confederation has published a set of health and operational recommendations for the safe return of baseball and softball activity.

These recommendations include:

...Avoid sharing of competition equipment. Each player should have his or her own bat, helmet, glove, batting gloves, rosin bags, etc.

...Batters shall retrieve their own bat when possible.

...No chewing tobacco, seeds or spitting at any time.

...Players (in particular pitchers), shall not lick their fingers.

...Umpires shall wear masks and gloves.

...If possible, avoid lineup exchange at home plate.

...Avoid physical contact, such as shaking hands, high fives, fist bumps, hugging, etc.

...Ball prep (mud rubbing) to be done by one appointed person with protective rubber gloves.

...Different set of official balls for home and visiting teams while on defense.

...Coaches may always approach umpire keeping a minimum distance of two meters (seven feet).

...Home plate umpire shall avoid coming in contact with catcher.

...Minimum physical distance of one meter (three feet) shall always be kept in dugout.

...Bases shall be cleaned every half inning.

...No bat boys/girl shall be allowed.

THE NCAA EMERGING Sports for Women program will add two sports in August.

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STUNT has received a recommendation from the Committee on Women's Athletics to join the program.

Acrobatics and tumbling and women's wrestling were recently approved as emerging sports in Division I and were approved in January by Divisions II and III.

Both sports will join equestrian, rugby and triathlon as emerging sports.

Acrobatics and tumbling expects 30 NCAA schools will sponsor the sport in 2020-21 and women's wrestling will be sponsored by 35 schools.

"STUNT is relatively inexpensive and provides participation opportunities for female students of all body types and from diverse sports backgrounds," according to the group's website.

The Divisions II and III Management Councils will meet in July to consider the recommendation to add STUNT to the program. Each council will decide whether to sponsor a legislative proposal.

If a council decides to sponsor a proposal to add STUNT, the membership of that division would vote at the 2021 NCAA Convention in January on whether to add the sport.

STUNT is a new and growing sport very similar to cheerleading in terms of athletic skills.

STUNT requires high athletic skills and its competition format and scoring systems are unique.

The maximum number of players on each team can reach 30 athletes.

Emerging Sports for Women was created in 1994 as a pipeline to support the advancement of women's sports to NCAA championship status.

The Committee on Women's Athletics identifies sports to be added to the program.

The program provides athletic opportunities for women and sport-sponsorship options for schools. Schools may use an emerging sport to help meet membership minimum sports-sponsorship requirements and financial aid requirements.

A sport must have a minimum of 20 varsity teams and/or competitive club teams that have competed in a minimum of five contests to be considered a program. The sport must be sponsored by 40 varsity programs to move forward to NCAA governance structure for championship consideration.

In the past 21 years, emerging sports that have reached championship status are rowing, ice hockey, water polo, bowling and beach volleyball.

SPEAKING OF BEACH volleyball, currently all three of the NCAA divisions are thrown into one division.

This makes it difficult for a Division II or Division III school to gain the national playoffs.

Eighteen Division II schools are currently listed as having beach programs.

Four others are listed by the American Volleyball Coaches Association as starting the program in 2020-21 or 2021-22. These

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are California State-San Bernardino, Lindenwood (Mo.), San Francisco (Calif.) State and Western Oregon.

The AVCA has 19 schools listed as starting beach in 2022-23 or 2024-25. These are Angelo State, Arkansas-Fort Smith, Barry (Fla.), Chaminade (Hawaii), Dallas Baptist, Dixie (Utah) State, Lewis (Ill.), Limestone (N.C.), McKendree (Ill.), Nebraska-Kearney, Newberry (S.C.), North Greenville (S.C.), Oklahoma Christian, Seton Hill, Simon Fraser (British Columbia), Southern New Hampshire, Southwestern Oklahoma and Texas Woman's.

It should be about time for the NCAA to have a Division II beach championship.

The Division II schools with beach programs currently are California State-Los Angeles, California State-San Marcos, Carson-Newman (Tenn.), Catawba (N.C.), Colorado-Mesa, Concordia-Irvine (Calif.), Eckerd (Fla.), Erskine (S.C.), Florida Southern, Lincoln Memorial (Tenn.), Lynn (Fla.), Palm Beach Atlantic (Fla.), Saint Leo (Fla.), Spring Hill (Ala.), Tampa (Fla.), Texas A&M-Kingsville, Tusculum (Tenn.) and Wayne (Neb.) State.

The AVCA has sponsored a national championship for Division II schools the past three years.

In the first year, the Javelinas took the title and they were runnersup in 2019.

The 2020 meet had to be canceled because of the Coronavirus pandemic.

THE JAVELINAS ARE the only beach volleyball team in the Lone Star Conference at the present time. But if those listed by the AVCA as starting the program in the next four years, the LSC would have five schools with the sport.

At that stage, the league might consider adding a conference championship in that sport.

REUBEN FRANK OF NBC Sports in Philadelphia selected the 10 greatest assistant coaches in Eagles history.

One of the 10 is Juan Castillo, former Javelina player and coach and member of the Javelina Hall of Fame.

Frank's comment on Castillo was as follows:

"Before Castillo became offensive line coach in 1997, the Eagles hadn't had a Pro Bowl offensive lineman since 1981. During Castillo's 14 years as O-line coach, five different Eagles O-linemen made a total of nine Pro Bowls.

"A terrific teacher, a tremendous motivator and a tireless worker, Castillo spent a total of 18 years as an Eagles assistant under Ray Rhodes and Andy Reid, the last two as defensive coordinator.

"He's currently coaching O-line with the Bears under Matt Nagy, who coached with Castillo in Philly under Reid."

Juan is in good company on the list. The nine other assistants selected are Marion Campbell, Bud Carson, Sid Gillman, John Harbaugh, Dale Haupt, Jim Johnson, Frank Reich, Duce Staley and Jeff Stoutland.

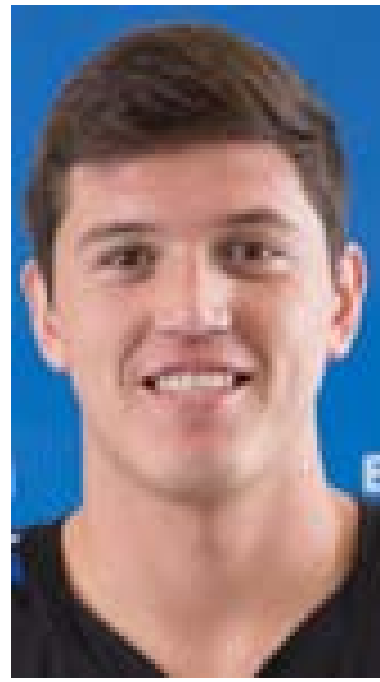

To be selected as one of the 10 greatest assistant coaches for Philadelphia is quite an honor. The Eagles have been in existence since 1933.

The Eagles have had a number of Javelinas on their roster.

Former Javelina player, coach and athletic director Gil Steinke played with the Eagles in the 1940s.

Offensive lineman Jermane Mayberry, who was coached by Castillo while with the Javelinas, was a first-round draft choice of the Eagles in 1996.

Fullback Heath Sherman and wide receiver Joe Hayes were drafted by the Eagles, Hayes in 1984 and Sherman in 1989.

Defensive back Al Harris played with the Eagles in 1998-2002. I hope I didn't miss any others.

THE CHICAGO BEARS' website has a story by Larry Mayer on Juan Castillo under the heading, "Castillo Living Proof That All Things Are Possible. Bears offensive line coach Juan Castillo has overcome humble beginnings and tremendous adversity to forge a 25-year NFL coaching career thanks to hard work, determination and sacrifice."

It is great coverage of Juan throughout his life and career, including his time as a player and coach for the Javelinas.

THE NAIA ANNOUNCED a month ago that it was adding women's flag football as its newest sport. It is one of the NAIA's emerging sports.

The NAIA cited financial assistance by the NFL as having an impact on participation.

Fifteen schools have declared intent to participate in 2020 and each has been granted a \$15,000 stipend from the NFL to aid in the on-boarding process of the sport.

The next step for women's flag will be to gain invitational status, which requires 25 schools to declare intent. The final stage to be a championship sport is to have 40 schools sponsoring the sport.

The NAIA has worked with Reigning Champs Experiences which operates the NFL FLAG initiative for the NFL.

There will be a brief program for each of the LSC's eight football teams and an open interview session will follow the program via Zoom breakout rooms.

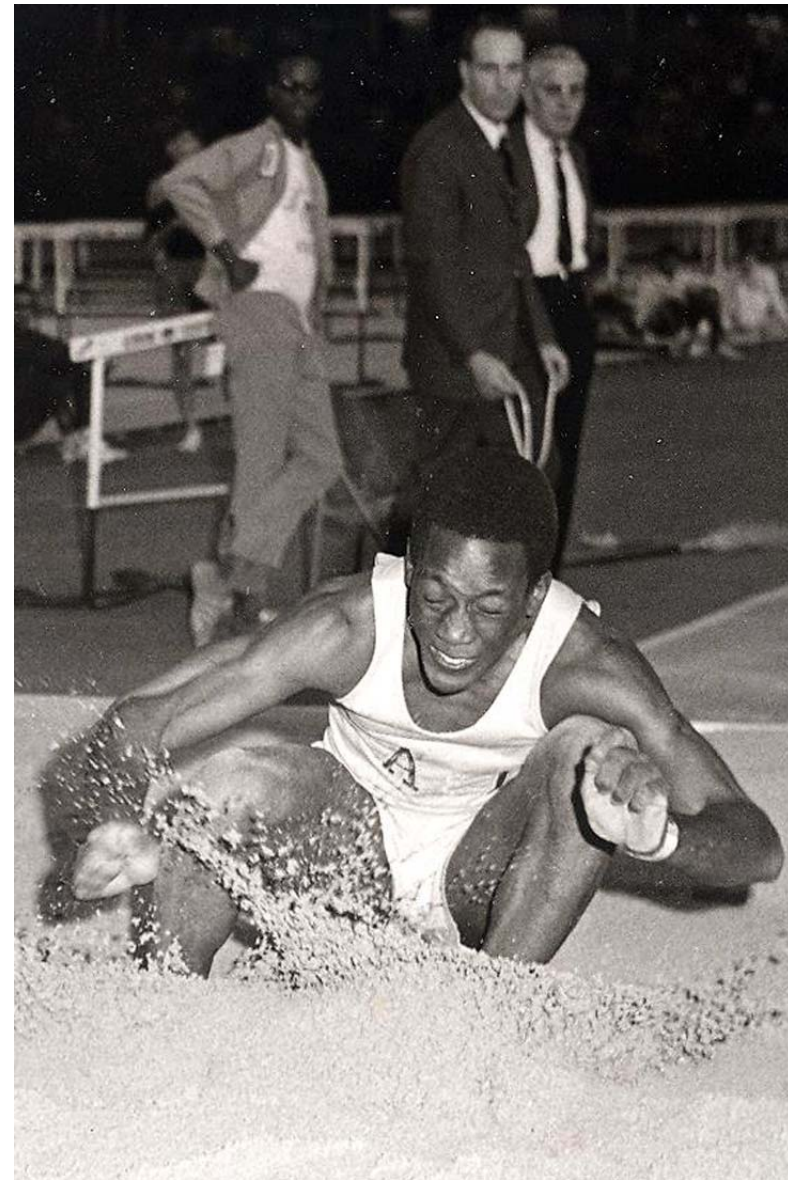
Javelina head football coach Mike Salinas will take part along with two Javelina players.
