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STUNT Added To Javelina Intercollegiate Program

The Texas A&M-Kingsville athletic department is adding STUNT to its intercollegiate athletic programs.

The sport will begin competition in the spring of 2025 and will face opponents in the Steinke Center.

STUNT is one of the fastest growing programs in the NCAA. The Javelinas will become the fifth Lone Star Conference school with a team.

The LSC schools with STUNT are Dallas Baptist, St.

Mary's, Texas Woman's and Texas-Tyler.

There are seven STUNT programs in Texas. These are, along with the LSC teams, Austin College, Texas Tech and Texas-Austin.

STUNT is a head-to-head game between two teams who execute skills-based routines in various categories such as partner stunts, jumps and tumbling, pyramids and tosses, and team routines during four quarters.

In 2020, the NCAA

Committee on Women's Athletics recommended the addition of STUNT as an emerging NCAA sport.

Four LSC teams were ranked in the final NCAA Division II poll this season. Dallas Baptist is No. 4, St. Mary's No. 7, Texas Woman's No. 8 and Texas-Tyler No. 11.

Davenport (Mich.) was ranked No. 1 and won the national title.

A national search is currently underway for a Javelina STUNT coach.

THE NCAA AND Helper Helper are looking for member schools to battle it out in the community service area.

The NCAA and Helper Helper, a volunteer management and tracking platform, launched the NCAA Community Service Competition 11 years ago to recognize athletes and schools who give back to their communities.

The 2023 challenge will run from Sept. 15 through Dec. 15.

The Javelinas have received recognition for community service in the past.

The schools that participated in 2022's challenge logged 218,594 hours, more than double the 2021 total. The estimated impact of those service hours was \$6.5 million.

Georgian Court (N.J.) won its third NCAA Division II community service award in 2022. It had won in 2017 and 2018. Each athlete at the school averaged 20 hours of community service in 2022.

JAVELINA HEAD WOMEN'S basketball coach Michael Madrid will speak at the Texas Girls Coaches Association summer clinic in Arlington.

He will lecture on "Offensive Spacing/Movements" at 1:30-2:30 July 11 and will talk on "Transition Offense/Half Court Sets."

The TGCA is the largest association for coaches of girls' athletics in the nation. It was established in 1953 and has more than 7,000 members. It is headquartered in Austin.

Devoux Deysel of Angelo State broke the javelin record with a 259-8 throw and the West Texas A&M men's 400-meter relay team with a time of 38.70.

The other record came in the triple jump where Auna Childress had a 43-10.5 jump.

Jeron Robinson, Javelina multi-time national champion high jumper, holds the NCAA Division II record in his event. His best was 7-6.50, set in 2014.

INTERNATIONAL PLAYERS DOMINATED the NCAA Division II South Central Region rankings released by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association last week.

In singles, four players are from Texas, four are from Russia, two are from Colorado, two are from Mexico, and there is one each from Martinique, Germany, Italy, New Zealand, India, Ukraine, France and Bosnia.

In doubles, six are from Texas, two from Russia and one each from Arkansas, Australia, Belgium, France, Germany, India, Italy, Japan, Martinique, Netherlands, New Zealand and South Africa.

NCAA DIVISION II notes:

...Western Oregon held its 37th athletic auction last weekend. It had in-person and online silent auctions as well as items up for bid.

Proceeds go to the WOU athletic department.

...Colorado Mines has received an anonymous \$6.5 million gift of which \$5 million will go toward Olympic Sports scholarships and the remainder is earmarked for cross country and track and field facility improvements.

...Notre Dame (Ohio) is adding men's and women's cross country and track and field beginning in 2023-24.

The school had the sports earlier but they had been dropped a decade ago.

...The NCAA has acknowledged an error in the men's 5000-meter run at the recent NCAA Division II Championships in Pueblo, Colo., in which officials incorrectly counted the number of laps and ringing the final lap bell one lap early.

The error led Adams (Colo.) State athlete Jeff Reynolds, who is visually impaired, to empty the tank and pushed him to cross the line in third, one lap early.

Reynolds recalls officially on his visually impaired side saying there was one more lap but he assumed they were talking to another athlete.

The error led to Reynolds finishing in 18th place opposed to third with a bronze medal.

The NCAA statement read in part: "After the track and field officials realized the error, they attempted to inform the runners that they had another lap remaining. At the conclusion of the race, Adams State filed a protest. By rule, a minimum of two referees must review the protest and make a final decision.

"While the unfortunate lap-counting mistake caused confusion, the referees determined, since the full 5000 meters were completed by all participants remaining in the race at the time the bell rang and the distance race could not be run again, the results would stand as completed.

"This scenario is regrettable for all involved but resulted in the fairest outcome."

It's doubtful Reynolds would agree.

The Javelinas downed Northern (S.D.) State in the opening round playoffs, 20-0.

Gil Steinke was head coach of the squad and assistants were Fred Jonas, Ken Kelley, Don McDonald, Pete Murray and K.Y. Owens.

Dwayne Nix and Carlos Saldana were elected captains of the team.

Defensive tackle Ray Hickl was named American Football Coaches Association All-America first team and was All-Texas College and All-Lone Star Conference.

Nix was Associated Press Little All-America first team.

Running back Henry Glenn was named the outstanding freshman back in Texas.

Wideout Dwight Harrison was All-Texas College and All-LSC first team.

Other All-LSC first teamers were quarterback Karl Douglas, offensive lineman Ronald Fielding, offensive lineman Quintin Holtz, offensive lineman Bill Pettijohn, defensive back Larry Pullin, linebacker Butch Riley and defensive back Ed Scott.

Joining Hickl and Harrison on the All-Texas College team were Pullin and Riley.

Glenn led the team in rushing with 60.1 yards a game and 5.7 yards a carry. He had six touchdowns.

Douglas completed 107 of 200 passes (.535) for 140.4 yards a game. He had 16 touchdown passes.
