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Three Javelinas Make NCAA Track & Field All-America

Three Texas A&M-Kingsville athletes are on the NCAA Division II All-America track and field first team, announced by the U.S. Track & Field Coaches Association last week.

Making the squad are Markim Felix, Thomas Nieto and Devon Williams.

Felix, grad student from Marlmount, St. Davids, Grenada, was the bronze medalist in the javelin at the national championships. He broke the Javelina school record in the event several times during the season.

Nieto, junior from Ibague, Colombia, won silver at the national meet. He cleared the same height as the gold medalist but lost out in a tiebreaker.

Williams, sophomore from Gonzales, was fifth in the discus at nationals.

Felix got his best throw of the season at the national meet. He had a best of 243-4, and it broke

the school record he had set earlier.

Nieto has a best vault of 18-05.

Williams' best throw of the season was 166-10.

Nieto Named Regional Male Field Athlete of the Year

Texas A&M-Kingsville pole vaulter Thomas Nieto has been named the NCAA Division II South Central Region field athlete of the year by the U.S. Track & Field Coaches Association.

Nieto, junior from Ibague, Colombia, was runnerup in the NCAA Division II national championships and had the same clearance as the gold medalist. He lost the gold through a tiebreaker.

Nieto had a best of 18-0.5 this season, the ninth best performance in Division II history.

He is the Lone Star Conference champion.

In addition to having the ninth best vault in Division II history, he also has the 17th best (17-10.50) and the 18th best (17-8.50).

Nieto was earlier named All-America first team, All-South Central Region and All-LSC.

EIGHTY-TWO TEAMS participated in the NCAA Division II National Champions Festival in Orlando, Fla., recently and determined champions in six sports.

But the athletes did more than merely compete for titles at the event.

Division II places an emphasis on life in the balance and athletes from each team and sport participated in community service activities throughout their week in Orlando.

Athletes spent time visiting veterans, children's hospitals, retirement communities, elementary schools and youth communities.

Participating organizations include the American Red Cross, Team IMPACT, Boys and Girls Clubs of America and Folds of Honor.

S.F. AUSTIN STATE has accepted an invitation to join the Southland Conference July 1.

SFA, a former member of the Lone Star Conference, was in the Southland for 34 seasons before leaving to join the Western Athletic Conference

With SFA, the Southland will have 12 members, seven in Texas and five in Louisiana.

The members will be Houston Christian, Incarnate Word, Lamar, McNeese (La.) State, New Orleans (La.), Nicholls (La.), Northwestern Louisiana, Southeastern Louisiana, S.F. Austin State, Texas A&M-Commerce, Texas A&M-Corpus Christi and Texas-Rio Grande Valley.

With SFA's and UTRGV's withdrawal from the Western Athletic Conference, that league's membership will have nine schools in six states: Abilene Christian, California Baptist, Grand Canyon (Ariz.), Seattle (Wash.), Southern Utah, Tarleton State, Texas-Arlington, Utah Tech and Utah Valley.

THE NCAA HAS extended its involvement with the Olympians & Paralympians Made Here campaign to include short videos of former Olympians, Paralympians and Olympic and Paralympic hopefuls sharing their collegiate experiences.

In April, the NCAA partnered with Fresh Tape Media to create a replica dorm room at the Team USA Media Summit in New York City. The retro-style interactive space was complete with collegiate memorabilia and sports equipment, providing a setting for athletes to showcase their personalities, reminisce about college and talk about how elite NCAA competition helped prepare them for the world stage.

Former Texas athlete Ryan Crouser, a four-time NCAA track and field champion was the first to tell his story through the new campaign. More than 50 athletes were interviewed during the summit. Content will continue to be released on NCAA social channels leading up to the Olympic Games this summer in Paris.

At the 2020 Tokyo Olympic Games, 67 percent of Team USA competed in the NCAA with 78 percent of Team USA medalists

The report was released by Helper Helper that tracks and manages community service hours for colleges in all divisions.

Two LSC athletic programs ranked among the top 25 in community service hours.

Texas Woman's was No. 4 and Midwestern State was No. 20. NCAA Division II schools had 3,329 community service events and had 151,588 service hours during the school year.

...Texas Woman's has been named the host for the 2025 women's wrestling region VIII championships.

The Pioneers hosted the regional tournament last year.

...St. Mary's STUNT team had three first-team All-Americans.

...Texas-Permian Basin vice president for athletics Todd Dooley has resigned after three and one-half years in the position.

"He will pursue his passion of flying airplanes," according a press release.

Former athletic director Scott Farmer will serve as the interim athletic director.

...Tammie Jimenez, head volleyball coach at Midland College, has been named the new head volleyball coach at Texas A&M International.

A native of Alpine, she played at Frank Phillips College and received her bachelor's from St. Mary's. She has a master's degree from the University of Phoenix.

...Texas-Tyler athletic director Dr. Howard Patterson will retire in August, transitioning to a new role as athletic program strategic planning administrator.

Chris Bizot, the men's and women's tennis coach at UT-Tyler will serve as interim athletic director.

In 2001, he founded the Patriot athletics, starting 18 NCAA programs and leading the program to NCAA Division III and then Division II.

Before going to Tyler, Patterson was the men's soccer coach at Midwestern State.

...The Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association will drop the divisional format for choosing a football champion and instead the teams with the two best records will advance to its championship game.

...Ursuline (Ohio) will add women's flag football as an intercollegiate sport beginning in the spring of 2026.

...Fresno Pacific (Calif.) will add STUNT as an intercollegiate sport beginning in the 2025-26 academic year.

...Lock Haven (Pa.) has announced a campaign to raise \$3.5 million to benefit the men's and women's wrestling programs.

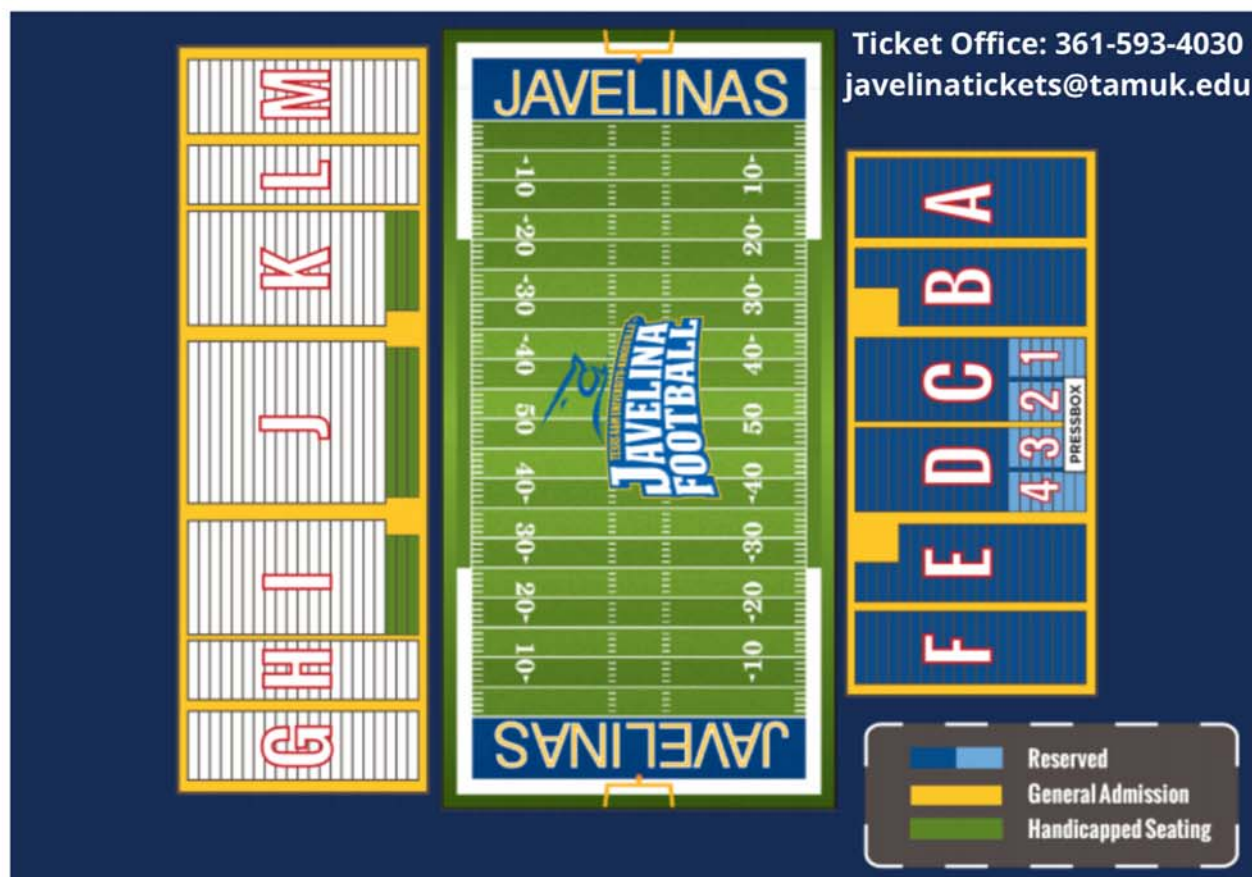

1959 Football Team to Celebrate 65th Anniversary of National Title

The 1959 Texas A&I football team is celebrating its 65th anniversary this fall.

The team will be recognized Oct. 5 on Champions Night at the Javelina football game with Midwestern State in Javelina Stadium.

It won the first of seven Javelina national championships and took the title in a game on CBS-TV from St. Petersburg, Fla.

The Javelinas defeated Lenoir-Rhyne (N.C.) in the championship matchup

It was the fourth college championship determined by a playoff system.

The Javelinas, who were coached by Gil Steinke, ended with a 12-1 season's record.

Victories were over Texas-Arlington, Trinity, Texas Lutheran and the University of Corpus Christi in non-conference games, and over LSC opponents Southwest Texas, Sam Houston, Sul Ross, Howard Payne, East Texas State and Lamar. The lone loss was to S.F. Austin.

The Javelinas defeated Hillsdale (Mich.), 20-0, in the semifinal game.

Fullback Butch Pressley was the most valuable player in the national championship game and Gerald Lambert was the most valuable lineman.

The Javelinas won the first of 27 Lone Star Conference football championships for the program.

Lambert and Kenneth Kachtik were captains of the squad.

Lambert was named to the Associated Press Little All-America first team as well as the NAIA All-America lineup.

He was All-Texas College first team and All-LSC first team.

Pressley was All-Texas College first team and James Franz was on the All-LSC first unit.

On the coaching staff with Steinke were Ted Carley, Gene Greene and Jack Little.
