1970 Football Team Celebrating 55th Anniversary

The 1970 Texas A&I football team will celebrate the 55th anniversary of its winning the NAIA national championship.

Most members of the team were also on the 1969 squad that had won a national title.

The 1970 squad had an 11-1 record with a victory over Trinity in a non-conference game and with wins over Lone Star Conference opponents McMurry, S.F. Austin State, East Texas State, Sul Ross State, Tarleton State, Sam Houston State, Howard Payne and Southwest Texas State.

The Javelinas defeated Wofford (S.C.), 38-7, in the

national championship game in Greenville, S.C., and beat Wisconsin-Platteville, 16-0, in a semifinal playoff game in Kingsville.

The lone loss was to Angelo State.

Four members of the team were All-America first team.

Defensive lineman Margarito

Guerrero was on the Associated Press Little All-American and NAIA All-America first teams.

Quarterback Karl Douglas and linebacker Robert Young were NAIA All-America.

Wideout Dwight Harrison was on the American Football Coaches Association All-America unit.

Guerrero, Harrison, defensive lineman Claude McMillon, wideout Eldridge Small and Young were on the All-Texas College first team.

All-LSC first team honorees were offensive lineman Jim Brown, Douglas, Guerrero, Harrison, McMillon, defensive tackle

The Javelina women are No. 29 in the national poll, No. 6 in the South Central Region poll and No. 3 in the LSC poll.

A COACH'S VIDEO review challenge in women's basketball has been approved by the NCAA Playing Rules Oversight Panel.

Under the change, the following plays can be challenged at any point during the game:

- *Ruled out-of-bounds violations.

- *Ruled backcourt violations.

- *Whether a change in team possession occurred before the ruling of a foul where free throws would be involved.

- *Whether a foul was assessed to the correct player.

Officials cannot initiate reviews on these calls, with the exception of whether a foul was assessed to the correct player.

Teams will not be required to have a timeout to make a video review challenge. However, a failed challenge will result in a technical foul for an excessive timeout.

Other rule changes made by the panel:

- *Setting the shot clock to 20 seconds when, following a dead ball, the offense is awarded the ball in its frontcourt.

- *Eliminating the rule that jerseys need to be tucked in.

- *Using excessive timeouts or playing with six players when the ball becomes live will become team technical fouls. These violations will count toward team fouls, and the team will be awarded possession at half-court following the free throws.

- *Allowing players to complete a jump stop when their feet land approximately at the same time. This will be a legal move and will not be considered a travel. The panel feels this will increase the accuracy on traveling rulings.

- *Allowing defenders multiple one-hand (hot stove) touches on stationary players holding the ball or on a dribbler. These touches would be legal as long as they are not repetitive and do not affect the rhythm, speed, balance and quickness of the dribbler or reroute the offensive player.

- *If a player competes in a game that the player should have missed due to a suspension, the player and the head coach will have to serve a one-game suspension for the next scheduled game.

THE NCAA DIVISION II Playing Rules Oversight Panel approved changes to men's basketball last week.

Changes include a coach's challenge at any point in a game to review out-of-bounds calls, basketball interference/goaltending and whether a secondary defender was in the restricted area arc.

The panel also approved modifications to the rule on continuous motion on field goal attempts.

Other enhancements to help the flow of the game include directives to address delay-of-game tactics, limit time spent at the monitor, improve game administration efficiency and reduce physicality.

Teams must have a timeout to request an instant replay review challenge.

If the instant replay review challenge is successful, teams will be allowed to have one additional video review challenge for the remainder of the game, including overtime.

Officials can initiate video reviews on basket interference/goaltending and restricted arc plays in the last two minutes of the game and into overtime.

Officials can't conduct video review on out-of-bounds calls unless through a coach's challenge.

The coach's challenge does not impact the NCAA officials' voluntary use of instant replay for timing mistakes, scoring errors, shot clock violations, two-point versus three-point field goal attempts, flagrant fouls, etc.

Discussed at the meeting was moving the men's game from halves to quarters. Women's basketball is played in quarters.

Other rule changes:

*Officials will have the option to call a flagrant 1 foul when a player is contacted to the groin. A flagrant 1 foul results in two free throws for the offended team and possession of the ball.

*If a player uses the rim to gain an advantage, it will be a basket interference violation.

*If one of the shot clocks becomes inoperable, the shot clock at the other basket will remain on. Previously, both clocks would be shut off until both are operable.

*Three LSC men's track and field teams finished in the top 10 at the NCAA Division II Championships: Texas A&M-Kingsville, West Texas A&M and Angelo State.

*West Texas A&M women's track and field team was fourth at the national championships.

*Texas A&M-Kingsville's Ronald Mosquera was the gold medalist at the national track and field championships and he was silver medalist in the discus.

*Texas-Tyler and Lubbock Christian men's tennis teams were semifinalists at the NCAA Division II championships and the Midwestern State women were semifinalists in their division.

*Lubbock Christian's Matthijs Mallee received the Elite 90 Award for men's tennis, Midwestern State's Hannah Yip was the Elite 90 Award recipient in women's tennis and Texas-Tyler's Sam Schott was named the Elite Award recipient for softball.

THE LONE STAR Conference sponsors championships in 18 sports, nine men and nine women.

Several of the schools have sports in which the LSC doesn't sponsor championships

Texas A&M-Kingsville is the only LSC school with beach volleyball.

Oklahoma Christian has men's and women's swimming and diving and women's bowling.

NCAA DIVISION II news:

...Northwest Missouri and Pittsburg (Kan.) State, conference rivals, will play their 2025 and 2026 matchups in Kansas City's Arrowhead Stadium, home of the Kansas City Chiefs.

Both schools had to give up a home game in order to schedule the neutral-site games.

They have played in Arrowhead before. A game in 2002 saw 26,695 fans in attendance.

The games normally draw between 15,000 and 20,000, more than can be accommodated at either of the schools.

...Conference Carolinas has resumed sponsoring football after dropping the sport 50 years ago.

The league stopped sponsoring the sport prior to the 1975 season.

The league schools with football programs are Barton (N.C.), Chowan (N.C.), Erskine (S.C.), Ferrum (Va.), North Greenville (S.C.), Shorter (Ga.) and North Carolina-Pembroke.

...Maryville (Mo.) has a new baseball facility that has dugouts, batting cages, locker rooms and more.

...Tampa (Fla.) won the NCAA Division II baseball championship last week, defeating Central Missouri in a two-out-of-three series in Cary, N.C.

It is the second consecutive title for Tampa.

..Due to "overwhelming community support", Missouri Western will reinstate the track and field program.

The school announced last week that the track and field program would be dropped due to facility limitations.

Brown and Douglas were elected captains of the team.

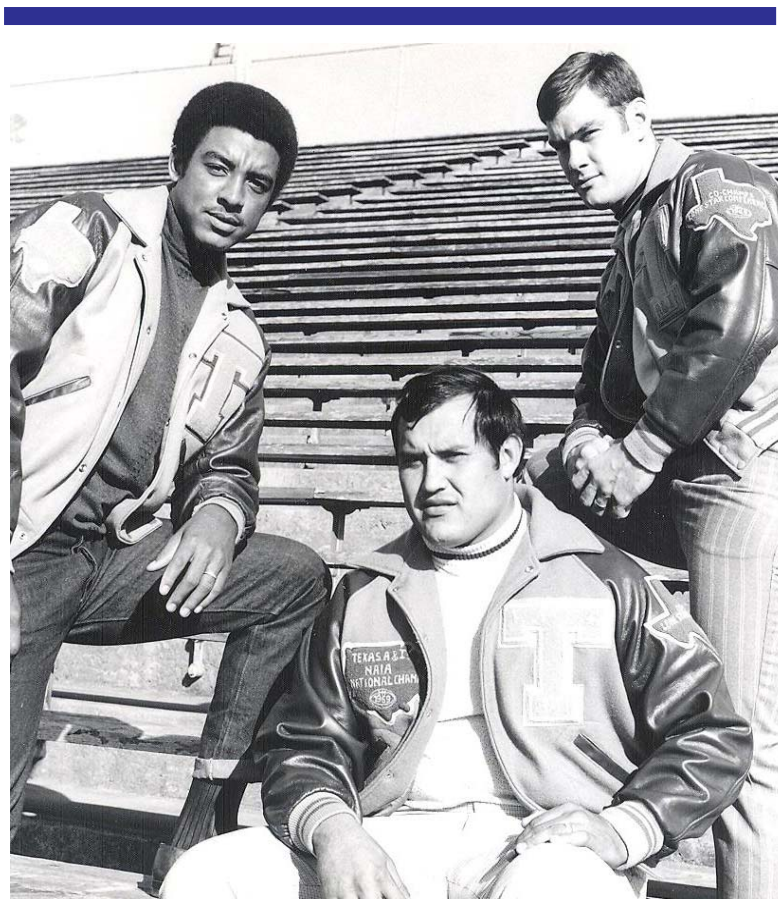
Seven members of the 1970 squad were drafted by NFL teams.

Two members of the team were first-round draft choices after concluding their college careers. Small was a first-round draft pick of the New York Giants and Price was a first round pick of the Detroit Lions.

Other draftees on the 1970 team were Harrison, a second round draft pick of the Denver Broncos; Douglas, a third round draftee by the Baltimore Colts; defensive back Levi Johnson, a draftee of the Detroit Lions; linebacker Larry Edwards, a fifth round draft choice of the New York Giants and offensive tackle Andy Browder, drafted by the Buffalo Bills.

Gil Steinke, who was named the NAIA national coach of the year and LSC coach of the year, was head coach of the team and the national title was his third at the helm of the Javelina program. He would win three more titles before retiring at the end of the 1976 season.

Assistant coaches were Bob Caskey, Willie Crafts, Ron Gentry, Fred Jonas, Ken Kelley and Don McDonald.

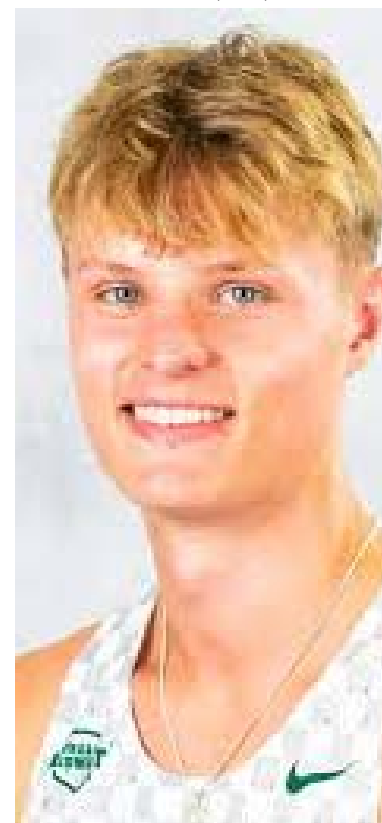
