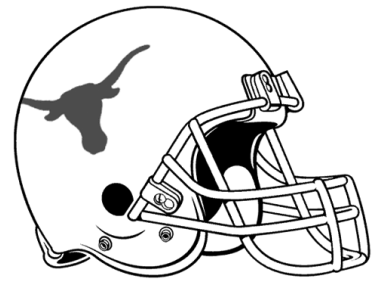

THE SERIES: Texas leads 56-21

TELEVISION: The game will be shown nationally by ESPN. Dave Pasch (play-by-play), Brian Griese (color) and Tom Luginbill (sidelines) have the call. Longhorn Network airs a pregame show beginning at 6 p.m. and a one-hour postgame show.

RADIO: All games are broadcast on the Longhorn IMG Radio Network on its 38-station network which includes flagship KVET (1300 AM/98.1 FM) in Austin. Pregame begins one hour before kickoff. Craig Way (play-by-play), Roger Wallace (color) and Quan Cosby (sideline) will call the action. Dr. Rubén Pizarro-Silva (play-by-play) and John Jagou (color) have the call for the Spanish Language Broadcasts. During bowl season, team broadcasts are not available either on SiriusXM or online. ESPN Radio will have a national broadcast with Adam Amin (play-by-play), John Congemi (color) and Kayce Smith (sidelines) on the call. That broadcast can be heard on SiriusXM Channel 83.

CONNECTING WITH THE HORNS

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TEXAS TO PLAY ARKANSAS IN THE ADVOCARE TEXAS BOWL: Texas and Arkansas will renew a Southwest Conference rivalry when the two teams meet in the Advocare V100 Texas Bowl on Dec. 29 in Houston. This will be the 78th meeting between the schools, including the second time in the postseason. Both teams played well down the stretch this year to reach bowl eligibility. Texas won three of its last four games and Arkansas was victorious in three of its last five contests, including a pair of shutouts.

BOWL HISTORY: Texas has a lengthy bowl resume. The Longhorns rank second all-time on the NCAA appearance list with 52, trailing only Alabama (60). UT, which has an all-time record of 27-23-2, has appeared in a bowl game in 19 of the last 21 years. That stretch includes a UT-record stretch of 12 straight appearances from 1998-2009, which bettered the previous mark of nine consecutive from 1977-85. The Horns have won nine of their last 12 bowl games. With a 24-21 victory over No. 10 Ohio State in the 2009 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, Texas won bowl games in five consecutive years for the first time in school history (2004-08). The Horns did win five straight previously (1963-64, '66, '68-69), but the streak was interrupted by seasons that did not result in a bowl. The Longhorns have appeared in the Cotton Bowl 22 times, the most of any bowl game. They appeared in the Bluebonnet Bowl six times and the Holiday Bowl five.

THE ARKANSAS SERIES: Texas and Arkansas, which played 60 straight times as Southwest Conference foes before the Razorbacks left for the SEC following the 1991 season, have met 77 times dating back to 1894. The Longhorns hold a 56-21 advantage. Arkansas has won three of the last five meetings, but Texas won the last two matchups - 22-20 in Fayetteville (2004) and 52-10 in Austin (2008). In 2003, the Hogs' 38-28 victory in Austin snapped a Texas 20-game home winning streak, its longest since a 42-game home victory string from 1968-76. UT has won six of the last 11 meetings. The Razorbacks won the lone postseason meeting, a 27-6 triumph in the 2000 Cotton Bowl. The Longhorns won the first 14 meetings and 27 of the first 32 contests between the two schools. The Horns 14-game winning streak from 1894-1932 is the longest in series history. The Horns also had a 12-game winning streak from 1939-50. Arkansas' longest win streak is a four-game stretch from 1935-38.

ARKANSAS SERIES TIDBITS: Texas has outscored the Razorbacks 1,765-982 in the 77 previous meetings ... six of the last 11 games were decided by four points or less ... Texas and Arkansas have played 33 games that were decided by 10 points or fewer with the Longhorns holding a 21-12 advantage ... Texas owns a 35-9 mark in games decided by more than 10 points ... Texas' average margin of victory in the series is 18.5 points, while Arkansas' is 11.0 points ... there have been six games decided by one point in the series, with the teams splitting those contests three apiece ... there have been 17 shutouts in the series, with Texas winning 16 of those contests ... the Longhorns blanked Arkansas in 10 of the of the first 13 meetings in the series, including the first four ... the last shutout in the series came in 1957 with Texas claiming a 17-0 win.

LONGHORN BOWL NOTES:

- Texas will be facing an SEC team in a bowl for the first time since playing Alabama in the BCS Championship game following the 2009 season (37-21 loss). It will be the 20th bowl game matchup with an SEC opponent, with Texas holding a

11-7-1 record. Texas' most common SEC opponent is Alabama (4-1-1 record).

- This will be the second time Arkansas and Texas meet in a bowl game. The Razorbacks won the 2000 Cotton Bowl 27-6. Two members of the UT staff were on the sidelines. Tight ends coach Bruce Chambers was the UT running backs coach at the time and defensive backs coach/special teams coordinator Chris Vaughn was an Arkansas graduate assistant in 1999.

- Head coach Charlie Strong will be making his fifth appearance in a bowl game in five seasons as a head coach. Strong had a 3-1 bowl record at Louisville. He also served as interim head coach for Florida in the 2004 Peach Bowl (Miami won 27-10).

- The Longhorns are making their 53rd bowl appearance (second on the all-time NCAA list), including 36th in the state of Texas and seventh in Houston. The Longhorns made six appearances in the now defunct Bluebonnet Bowl with a record of 3-2-1. Texas played in the final Bluebonnet Bowl game, a 32-27 victory over Pittsburgh on Dec. 31, 1987. The Longhorns have played in the Cotton Bowl 22 times, Sun Bowl four and Alamo three.

- UT had a school-record stretch of 12 straight bowl appearances from 1998-2009, which bettered the previous mark of nine straight from 1977-85.

- With a 24-21 victory over No. 10 Ohio State in the 2009 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, Texas won bowl games in five consecutive years for the first time in school history (2004-08 seasons). CHARLIE STRONG (Central Arkansas '82): Strong, who is in his first season at UT, has compiled a 43-22 (.662) career record. He spent the previous four years as head coach at Louisville, leading the Cardinals to two Big East Championships and four bowl appearances. A two-time Big East Coach of the Year, Strong spent 11 seasons as a defensive coordinator (1999-02 at South Carolina; 2003-09 at Florida).

BRET BIELEMA (Iowa '92): Bielema is in his second season as Arkansas head coach. He went to Fayetteville after leading Wisconsin to three straight Rose Bowls by winning three consecutive Big Ten titles. He owns a 77-39 (.664) career record in nine years as a head coach.

DID YOU KNOW?

Malcolm Brown leads the team in tackles for loss (14) and sacks (6.5). He has a chance to become the first defensive tackle to lead the team in those two categories since Tony Degrate in 1984. Degrate had 18 tackles for loss and 12.0 sacks en route to capturing the Lombardi Award as the nation's best down lineman.

FIRST-AND-GOAL:

- The Texas Bowl will mark the fifth appearance for the Horns at NRG Stadium. They defeated Rice three times (34-17 in 2010; 52-7 in 2006; 48-7 in 2003) and Colorado, 70-3, in the 2005 Big 12 Championship game.
- Texas has been led by its defense. The Horns were solid for most of the year, ranking 26th in the FBS in total yards allowed (348.3 per game), No. 12 in passing defense (186.3 ypg), No. 8 in yards allowed per play (4.67), 16th in passing efficiency defense (108.34 rating), tied for seventh in sacks (3.25 pg) and 33rd in points allowed (23.3 pg) at the end of the regular season. UT had strong performances against some of nation's best offenses. Texas Tech, which had the 23rd-ranked offense (483.8 ypg), was held to 381 total yards. West Virginia came into its game with Texas ranked 12th nationally in total offense (508.2 ypg) and 11th in passing yards (325.8 pg). WVU was held to 448 yards of offense, with 74 of that total coming on a meaningless drive in the final 5:00 of the game. Oklahoma State entered its game with Texas averaging 386.4 yards of offense and was held to a season-low 192, including 34 on the ground. Arkansas enters the bowl game with a strong rushing attack. The Razorbacks rank 26th in the FBS, averaging 220.3 rushing yards per game. They have a pair 1,000-yard backs in Jonathan Williams (1,085) and Alex Collins (1,024) which has helped them post the ninth-best time of possession in the nation (33:27 pg).
- The Texas defense has surrendered just 11 passing touchdowns this season, including only three over the last five games. Oklahoma State snapped a string of three straight games without allowing a TD pass with one in the fourth quarter. The last time UT didn't allow an opponent to throw a passing touchdown for three consecutive games was 2001 (at Baylor - Nov. 3; Kansas - Nov. 10; at Texas A&M - Nov. 23). This season only six teams in the

FBS have allowed fewer than 11 TD passes.

- After averaging 319.2 yards of total offense over the first five games, the Horns have posted an average of 390.3 yards over the last seven contests. They are No. 102 nationally in total offense (360.5 ypg). Texas' top four offensive outputs this season have occurred in its last seven games. One week after being held to a season-low 196 total yards, including 90 on the ground, in the loss to K-State, which came into the game ranked No. 10 nationally in rushing defense (100.8 ypg) and No. 39 in total defense (352.0 ypg), Horns posted 469 total yards vs. Texas Tech. After posting 482 total yards (148 rushing/334 passing) vs. Oklahoma, the second-highest total in series history (553 in 1999), UT rolled up a season-high 512 total yards vs. Iowa State. The output in those two games was the best in back-to-back conference contests since the 2011 season when UT rolled up 590 yards vs. Kansas (Oct. 29) and then 595 vs. Texas Tech (Nov. 5). The Longhorns will be facing a strong Arkansas defense. The Razorbacks rank 24th in the FBS in total defense (345.4 ypg), 15th in points allowed (20.3 pg) and 22nd in rushing defense (124.0 ypg).
- QB Tyrone Swoopes has been the focal point of the offense in just his second season. Swoopes has directed the offense the last 11 games after returning starter David Ash retired due to injury. Swoopes has completed 211 of 359 passes (58.8 percent) for 2,352 yards with 13 TDs and 10 interceptions. His passing yardage and total offense output (2,646) are both the fourth-best marks in school history after 11 starts (see chart on page 5). He posted career highs in completions (27), attempts (44) and passing yards (334) vs. Oklahoma and followed up by recording career highs in total offense (416) and rushing yards (95) vs. Iowa State. Swoopes also has 294 rushing yards and is one of just five QBs in school history to pass for 2,000 yards and rush for 200 in a season.

DID YOU KNOW?

The Longhorns have not allowed an offensive touchdown in the first half in eight games this season. Only Iowa State (3), K-State (1), Texas Tech (1) and TCU (1) have scored offensive TDs in the opening two quarters.

- John Harris (64) and Jaxon Shipley (58) are leading the team in receptions. Harris (5.3 per game) and Shipley (5.3) rank tied for 47th and 52nd, respectively, in the FBS. Harris is fifth in the Big 12 and 25th nationally in receiving yards per game (84.6). In addition, Harris is averaging 15.9 yards-per-catch, which ranks ninth nationally among players with at least 55 receptions.

- Malcolm Brown (683) and Johnathan Gray (628) are the top rushers. Brown (6) and Gray (7) have also combined for 13 rushing touchdowns. Brown rushed 22 times for a season-high 116 yards against Texas Tech and Gray posted a season-best 101 on 10 carries vs. West Virginia. Those were the first 100-yard rushing games of the season for Texas.

NATIONAL AWARD SUCCESS: Texas has continued its success of having players considered for national awards. UT had nine players represented a total of 23 times on 13 award preseason watch lists. Two of them - LB Jordan Hicks and DT Malcom Brown - made either the semifinalist or finalist lists for three of those awards.

- Brown was a finalist for both the Bronko

Nagurski Award (top defensive player) and the Outland Trophy (top interior lineman). He was the lone defensive lineman among the Nagurski finalists and only defensive lineman among the Outland finalists. Brown is the third Nagurski finalist in school history, joining Johnson (2004) and Brian Orakpo (2008), both of whom won. Texas has three Outland winners: defensive tackle Brad Shearer (1977), guard Tommy Nobis (1965) and tackle Scott Appleton (1963). There were also three other finalists: offensive lineman Justin Blalock (2006), offensive tackle Leonard Davis (2000) and offensive guard Dan Neil (1996).

- Hicks was named one of 20 semifinalists for the Chuck Bednarik Award, which honors the nation's most outstanding defensive player, on Nov. 3. A Longhorn has

never won the Bednarik Award, though Derrick Johnson was a finalist in 2004. Hicks did not reach the finals.

- Brown was first team All-America choice by the AP, FWAA and Sporting News, becoming the 47th (eighth DT) consensus first team All-American in UT history. Brown and Hicks were second-team selections by Walter Camp. Hicks was also on the FWAA second team

LONGHORN GRADUATES: Several Longhorns participated in UT's Fall Commencement ceremonies. When the Horns take the field for the Texas Bowl, 22 team members will have earned their degrees with a 23rd, who had enough hours to participate in Fall Commencement, due to earn his in the spring. In all, 15 football student-athletes took part in ceremonies on Saturday, Dec. 6. Those included QB David Ash, RB Malcolm Brown, CB Quandre Diggs, WR Chris Giron, WR Dakota Haines, OT Marcus Hutchins, WR Bryant Jackson, LB Tevin Jackson, QB Miles Onyegbule, PK Ben Pruitt, DE Cedric Reed, P William Russ, TE Chris Terry, WR David Thomann and S Mykkele Thompson, while P Michael Davidson will graduate this semester but not walk. Of those, only Tevin Jackson has hours remaining to complete his degree. Several others have already graduated in previous semesters. That group includes DS Nate Boyer, TE Greg Daniels, C Dominic Espinosa, WR John Harris, LB Jordan Hicks and TE M.J. McFarland. Also, LB Demarco Cobbs completes his degree this semester, however he qualified to participate in last spring's commencement ceremonies and did so. The Horns' 22 graduates are tied for first nationally among bowl participants.

GETTING HOT IN THE RED ZONE

Tyrone Swoopes has been at his best in the red zone, completing 16 of 23 passes (69.6 percent) for 108 yards and nine touchdowns while throwing just one interception. His 229.45 passer rating in the red zone is eighth-best nationally among QBs with at least 20 attempts (via CFBStats.com), and his 69.6 completion percentage is fifth.

JUMP START

Tyrone Swoopes has gotten off to several hot starts this season, leading the offense to points five times in the last seven opening drives. Swoopes is 28 of 36 for 316 yards with three touchdown passes and no interceptions on opening drives this year, good for a 179.01 QB rating.

Tyrone Swoopes on opening drives this season

STREAKS, TRENDS AND MILESTONES:

- Texas is one of only 10 teams nationally that has held at least three FBS teams to seven points or less in a game this season (LSU - 4; Ole Miss - 3; Penn State - 3; Georgia - 3; Clemson - 3; Mississippi State - 3; UCF - 3; Cincinnati - 3; TCU - 3). The Longhorns are the only Big 12 team to hold two league foes to a TD or less. The last time Texas held three opponents to seven points or less in a season was 2009.
- Five of Texas' losses occurred to ranked teams and four (UCLA, Baylor, Oklahoma and Kansas State) remain among the top 15 nationally. Oklahoma dropped out of the top 25 after the regular-season finale.
- Texas won three of its four Big 12 road games this season. UT has won nine of its last 12 league road games.
- Over the last three games, the opposition has converted just 10 of 45 third-down attempts (22.2 percent). West Virginia was only 3 of 17 (17.6), Oklahoma State 2 of 13 (15.3) and TCU 5 of 15 (33.3). UT is now No. 16 in the country in third-down conversion defense (33.8 percent).
- Tyrone Swoopes completed 24 of 33 passes for 305 yards and two TDs in the win

against Oklahoma State. He had a career-best passing efficiency rating of 170.36 and was 9 of 13 for 163 yards, including both his TDs, on third down. Swoopes now has three 300-yard passing games on the season, which is tied for fourth on the UT single-season list. Only five quarterbacks (Colt McCoy - 15; Major Applewhite - 9; James Brown - 7; David Ash - 4; Chris Simms - 4) have more in a career and two have a higher total in a season (McCoy - 6 in 2008, 5 in 2009; Applewhite - 5 in 1999).

- Malcolm Brown has moved up the UT career rushing yards list during the season (now at 2,653). One week after posting a season-high 116 yards on 22 carries vs. Texas Tech to move from 13th to 12th, the senior rushed 20 times for 90 yards vs. West Virginia and passed Jim Bertelsen (2,510/1969-71) to move to 11th. In the last seven games, Brown has rushed for 437 yards after posting 246 in the first five. He had his 11th career 100-yard rushing game vs. Texas Tech and ranks tied for seventh place on that UT all-time list. Brown has six rushing scores this year and 24 in his career. He is three shy of the UT career top 10.
- Johnathan Gray became the 18th UT

player to top 2,000 career rushing yards vs. West Virginia when he posted his fifth career 100-yard rushing game (10 carries/101 yards). Gray is now 15th on the school's career rushing yards list (2,109).

- With three receptions for 38 receiving yards vs. West Virginia, Jaxon Shipley moved from fourth to third on the UT all-time list, passing Quan Cosby (212/2005-08). Shipley has 58 catches on the season and 217 in his career. The senior is one of three players in school history to record three 50-reception seasons. He had a career-high 59 catches in 2012 and 56 last season. Shipley is joined by Mike Adams (1993, '95-96) and Roy Williams (2001-03) on the exclusive list. Shipley missed the regular-season finale with TCU due to a hamstring injury.

- When John Harris had a career-high tying nine receptions for 117 receiving yards and one TD vs. Oklahoma State, he moved to No. 8 on the UT single-season receiving yards chart (976). In the regular-season finale vs. TCU, Harris became just the sixth player in UT history to post more than 1,000 receiving yards (1,105) in a season. His 64 receptions rank tied for eighth on the single-season list and he needs one more TD to move into the top 10 (seven through 12 games). His four career 100-yard receiving games rank tied for fifth on the UT single-season list.

- The Horns have been forced to utilize five different starting lineups along the offensive line. The lineup - LT Marcus Hutchins, LG Sedrick Flowers, C Taylor Doyle, RG Kent Perkins and RT Camrhon Hughes - has been the same the last six games.

- Quandre Diggs has made his way into a pair of the UT top 10 career lists. He recorded his third interception of the season vs. WVU. With 11 career picks, he now ranks tied for ninth on the UT all-time list with Mossy Cade (1981-83) and William Graham (1979-81). Diggs also posted his 37th career pass breakup vs. TCU to move into a tie for ninth with Cade on the UT all-time list.

- Senior LB Jordan Hicks was one of 20 semifinalists for the Chuck Bednarik Award, given to the nation's top defensive

SOLID START

Sophomore Tyrone Swoopes has performed solidly in his first 11 starts. His numbers compare favorably to many of the top quarterbacks in school history through 11 career starts. He ranks fourth in passing yards (2,352), and is fourth in total offense (2,646), behind only Garrett Gilbert (2010, 2,909), Major Applewhite (1998-99, 2,834), and James Brown (1994-95, 2,825).

player. Hicks has a team-high 138 stops for an average of 11.5 per game. The senior has eight double-digit tackle games, including a career-best 18 stops vs. both UCLA and Iowa State. He was named the Big 12 Defensive Player of the Week for his 15-tackle, one-interception performance vs. Kansas (Sept. 27). Steve Edmond is second with 122 stops, including a career-best 19 vs. Baylor. He has six double-digit tackle games.

• C Dominic Espinosa, who fractured an ankle in the season opener vs. North Texas, had his team-best 40 consecutive-game starting streak snapped vs. BYU. DE Cedric Reed, who has started 31 straight games, now has the team lead. TE Geoff Swaim has the most consecutive starts on offense with 18.

RUSHING ATTACK: Over the last four games, the Longhorns have racked up their two best rushing outputs of the season. One week after a season-high 241 rushing yards vs. Texas Tech (the most since rolling up 281 vs. Texas Tech last season), the Texas offense produced 227 yards on the ground vs. West Virginia. After averaging 120.5 rushing yards over the first four games, Texas has posted 162.8 over the last eight. The Longhorns tallied more rushing yards in the first half (178) vs. West Virginia than they did in seven games this season. UT rushed for 190 yards vs. a Baylor defense that ranked No. 6 in the nation in rushing defense (80.0 ypg). The

Longhorns followed up with 148 yards (40 attempts), including 78 by Brown and 50 by Swoopes, vs. Oklahoma. OU entered the game ranked No. 22 nationally in rushing defense, allowing 109.6 yards per contest.

PRODUCING EXPLOSIVE PLAYS: Texas has had its best production of the season making explosive plays (12-plus yard rushes/16-plus yard catches) in five of the last seven games. The Longhorns had 10 (six rushing/four receiving) at Texas Tech, including three John Harris receptions of 35 or more yards. Following that game, UT had nine against West Virginia, seven of which came via runs, including 39 and 40-yarders by Johnathan Gray. UT had 10 explosive plays vs. Oklahoma State, including a season-high tying seven via the air. Against Oklahoma, Texas had a season-best 12 explosive plays and followed with nine vs. Iowa State (four on the ground and five in the air). Two of the explosive plays came during the final drive of the game (3 plays, 68 yards, 19 seconds) to set up the game-winning 21-yard field goal by Nick Rose. UT has 14 pass plays of 30 or more yards this season and 11 occurred over the last seven games.

PICKING IT OFF: Texas has 15 interceptions this season after posting 10 in 2013. That is the most for UT since recording a nation's-best 25 in 2009. The Horns rank tied for 16th nationally in interceptions and tied for 38th in turnovers gained (20).

O-LINE JELLING DESPITE ADJUSTMENTS

Despite five different starting combinations in 12 games, the Texas offensive line has found its footing the second half of the season. The offense has produced its top four outputs of the year the last seven games (482 vs. Oklahoma; 512 vs. Iowa State; 469 at Texas Tech; 430 at Oklahoma State). The Longhorns are averaging 162.8 rushing yards over the last eight games after posting 120.5 during the first four contests. That includes a season-high 241 on the ground at Tech and 227 vs. WVU.

SACK ATTACK: The Longhorns have combined for 39 sacks through 12 games and rank tied for seventh in the FBS (3.25 per game). LAST TIME VS. ARKANSAS (SEPT. 27, 2008): No. 7/7 Texas registered 200-plus yards both rushing and passing for the third time in four games and held Arkansas to just 191 total yards of offense in a 52-10 win in Austin. It was the Longhorns largest margin of victory in the series in 92 years, dating back to a 52-0 win in 1916. Texas scored on seven (six TDs) of its first eight possessions en route to 421 total yards (208 rushing/213 passing). Five of the TD drives covered at least 60 yards. Texas completed a school-record 21 of 23 passes (91.3 percent), eclipsing the mark of 90.9 percent (10 of 11) set against Rice in 2006. Colt McCoy completed 17 of 19 passes for 185 yards and three TDs (no interceptions) and led the team in rushing with 84 yards and two scores. Jordan Shipley hauled in eight catches for 83 yards and two TDs, his fourth straight game with a TD reception. Quan Cosby added five catches for 67 yards and a score. Running backs Vondrell McGee (16-48) and Cody Johnson (9-43-1) combined for 91 yards and a score on 25 carries. UT held the Hogs to 11 yards rushing on 26 carries, Arkansas' lowest output since 1997. The Razorbacks total offense output was the lowest since 2002. Texas, which had seven sacks, 11 TFL and 11 pressures on the game, held Arkansas to just 57 yards on its final 29 plays (2.0 ypp) of the game. Brian Orakpo led the defense with two sacks, three TFL and a forced fumble. Sergio Kindle chipped in five stops, including a sack, and Chykie Brown added four tackles with a sack. Henry Melton forced a fumble (recovered by Ben Alexander) that resulted in a UT TD drive and Aaron Williams returned an interception 81 yards for a score.

GAME OF THE CENTURY (DEC. 6, 1969): Texas was undefeated in 18 straight games while Arkansas had won 15 in a row. The Longhorns were ranked No. 1 by The Associated Press and Arkansas was at No. 2. UT was leading the nation in rushing and Arkansas was atop the national list for scoring defense. President Richard Nixon was on hand to proclaim the winner National Champion. Something had to give. Arkansas scored first on a 1-yard touchdown run just 1:27 into the game, and took a 7-0 lead to the locker room after both teams were scoreless the remainder of the first half. The Razorbacks then increased the lead to 14-0 when Bill Montgomery passed to Chuck Dicus for a 29-yard touchdown in the third quarter. But late in the third period, James Street led the Longhorns on an 80-yard drive

capped by a 42-yard touchdown gallop by the senior quarterback. After converting the two-point conversion on a run by Street, UT trailed 14-8. Arkansas drove right back to the Texas 7-yard line and was poised to score when UT defensive back Danny Lester picked off a Montgomery pass in the end zone. Texas fumbled on its next possession but got the ball back 62 yards from the Arkansas goal line with 7:58 to play. Three plays netted 7 yards, and on fourth-and-3 from the 43, Street called a timeout. Royal then famously called for the "53 veer pass," and seconds later, tight end Randy Peschel was on the receiving end of a 44-yard strike from Street that kept Texas' hopes alive. Two plays later, Jim Bertelsen slammed over from 2 yards out as the stunned Arkansas crowd looked on. Happy Feller added the extra point

and Tom Campbell's interception of a Montgomery pass at the Texas 21-yard line with 1:22 left sealed the victory.

STRONG DEFENSIVE EFFORT VS. OSU:

In the 28-7 win against Oklahoma State, the Longhorns surrendered the fewest total yards (192) and rushing yards (34) to a Big 12 opponent in three years. Kansas State tallied 121 total yards on Nov. 19, 2011 and Texas Tech was held to 30 rushing yards on Nov. 5, 2011. In the Oklahoma State game, the Cowboys had four pass plays that accounted 99 yards. In their other 48 offensive plays, OSU was able to generate just 93 total yards (1.9 yards per play). The Cowboys recorded their lowest point total, offensive output and fewest first downs since a 27-0 defeat at the hands of Oklahoma in 2009. In that game, OSU had 109 total yards and six first downs. The Cowboys also tallied the lowest rushing total since posting 34 vs. Iowa State in 2005.

TOP 25 WIN: The Longhorns recorded their first victory against a top-25 team this season in their 33-16 victory vs. No. 24/25 West Virginia on Nov. 8. They were 0-4 on the season entering the game, with the last win over a ranked team coming last year against No. 12/10 Oklahoma. In addition, Texas won at home vs. a top-25 team for the first time since a No.-1 ranked squad defeated No. 7/8 Oklahoma State, 28-24, on Oct. 25, 2008. However, in the seven previous home games vs. top 25 teams, the Longhorns were either unranked or lower in the polls. Texas faced six top 25 teams this season which marks the seventh season in school history the Longhorns played at least six ranked teams. UT met six ranked teams in 1957, 1979, 1995, 2004 and 2013, and a record seven in 1990.

HOLDING BAYLOR'S HIGH-POWERED OFFENSE IN CHECK:

Baylor entered its Oct. 4 game with Texas ranked No. 1 in the FBS in scoring (56.8 points per game), first in total offense (641.0 ypg) and fourth in passing offense (401.3 ypg) and the UT defense held the Bears well below those averages as they produced 389 yards of total offense, including 111 passing yards. It marked just the second time in the previous 45 games Baylor posted less than 400 yards of total offense (370 vs. TCU in 2013) and it was the lowest passing yards output by the Bears since the final game of the 2008 sea-

FAVORITE TARGETS

Senior wide receivers Jaxon Shipley and John Harris have been the favorite targets in the receiving corps for Texas this year. Harris leads the team with 64 receptions and his 5.3 catches per game ranks tied for 47th in the FBS. Shipley has 58 catches, with his 5.3 receptions per game ranked 52nd in the nation. The duo is among just 13 Longhorns to have made at least 58 receptions in a season. In addition, Harris' receiving yards total (1,015) is the eighth-highest total in school history.

son (91 vs. Texas Tech). UT held Baylor's explosive plays to a minimum. The Bears had five runs of 12-plus yards and only three pass plays of 16 or more yards. Bryce Petty was held to a career-low passing efficiency rating of 104.20

DIRECTING THE OFFENSE: Sophomore Tyrone Swoopes served as the starting quarterback in 11 of 12 regular season games. He has completed 211 of 359 passes (58.8 percent) for 13 touchdowns and 10 interceptions. His 2,352 passing yards are the fourth-most by a Texas QB in the first 11 starts of his career.

- Swoopes has shown great ability at times, combining for 800 total yards of offense vs. Oklahoma and Iowa State, then passing for 228 yards in a win at Texas Tech. After a 305-yard passing performance at Oklahoma State he has three games with at least 300 yards this season which is tied for fourth on the UT single-season list.

- Against Iowa State, he became just the third player in school history to pass for 300 yards and rush for 90 in the same game.

- That came on the heels of a 334-yard passing performance vs. Oklahoma, making him just the fifth QB in school history with consecutive 300-yard passing games, joining Colt McCoy (three times),

James Brown (twice), Major Applewhite and David Ash.

- Swoopes has thrown at least one TD pass in nine of his 11 starts (Baylor, K-State). Against Oklahoma, he set career highs in completions (27), attempts (44), and passing yards (334). He was 7 of 13 for 99 yards and two TDs on third-down passing.

SWOOPES ON TARGET: Tyrone Swoopes has thrown 10 interceptions this season in his 359 attempts, but has two of the longest stretches in school history without a pick. His streaks of 77 (second through fifth games) and 104 attempts (Iowa State through West Virginia) with tossing a pick are in the top 11 in school history.

REVAMPED OFFENSIVE LINE: With three starters lost from last year, the Longhorns were going to have a somewhat different look to the offensive line this year. Dominic Espinosa entered the

season having started the last 39 games at center, but the senior suffered a fractured ankle vs. North Texas and missed the rest of the season. Junior Kennedy Estelle made eight starts a year ago and opened the UNT game at left tackle, but did not play vs. BYU and UCLA due to suspension and was subsequently dismissed from the program. Potential starting tackle Desmond Harrison missed all 12 regular-season games due to suspension.

- That left Texas with a group that entered the BYU game with a combined five starts: sophomore right tackle Kent Perkins had two, junior left guard Sedrick Flowers had two and junior left tackle Marcus Hutchins had one. Hutchins moved over from the defensive line during preseason camp. Meanwhile, right guard Taylor Doyle and center Jake Raulerson made their first career starts vs. BYU. That group started again the next two games but the Longhorns shook up the lineup vs. Baylor, when redshirt freshman Darius James started at right tackle, moving Perkins to right guard. That group helped Texas average 4.8 yards per carry and total 190 rushing yards which were then season highs.

- Texas again altered the lineup vs. Oklahoma when Doyle replaced Raulerson

FIRST TIME STARTERS

The Longhorns have used a bevy of first-time starters this season. A total of 15 players, including eight on offense and seven on defense, have made their starting debut at some point in the season. Additionally, DE Caleb Bluiett, OG Sedrick Flowers and OT/OG Kent Perkins each had just one start coming into the season.

GOAL-LINE STANDS

Texas ranks 26th nationally in red zone defense (76.9 percent) and once an opponent has penetrated the 10-yard line, the defense has been able to hold them to a field goal or less on 11 occasions. Five of those 11 times the opponent has come away with no points, including twice against Texas Tech when the Red Raiders missed a field goal in the first quarter and turned it over on downs in the fourth. The Texas 'D' also made goal line stands against Baylor, Kansas and West Virginia.

at center. The latest shakeup saw sophomore Camrhone Hughes play in his first career game when he started at right tackle vs. Iowa State, marking the fifth different combination of starters Texas has used this season. The Longhorns have since stuck with that lineup and totaled 468 rushing yards in a two-game stretch vs. Texas Tech (241) and West Virginia (227).

- With Darius James sustaining a knee injury that caused him to miss the last three games (and will cause him to miss the bowl), just six linemen played vs. West Virginia, Oklahoma State and TCU (starting five plus Jake Raulerson).

- Flowers is the only player to start every game at one position (left guard).

CATCHING ON: Texas came into the season without much returning receiving production beyond senior Jaxon Shipley and junior Marcus Johnson, but has found a playmaker in John Harris. The fifth-year senior, who came into the season with nine career catches, has been the breakout wide receiver, posting a team-best 64 catches for a team-high 1,015 yards (eighth on UT's single-season list) and seven touchdowns. His 84.6 yards per game rank fifth in the Big 12 and 25th nationally. He ranks tied for ninth in the Big 12 and tied for 46th nationally in TD receptions. Harris has four 100-yard receiving games (110 vs. North Texas, 147 vs. Iowa State, career-high 165 vs. Texas Tech, 117 at Oklahoma St.) this year.

- Harris had the first multiple-TD game of his career vs. Oklahoma when he caught two. He followed that up with 147 yards and a career-high nine receptions vs. Iowa State, including a key 29-yard catch with seven seconds remaining that set up the game-winning field goal. Against Texas Tech he posted five catches for a career-high 165 yards, including a career-long 68-yarder. Harris became the sixth different Longhorn to surpass 1,000 yards in a season when he caught five passes for 39 yards against TCU. He has led the team in receiving yards in nine of 12 games.

- Shipley, meanwhile, has posted 217 receptions (third all-time at UT list) in his career after catching 58 for 571 yards in 11 games (missed the TCU game with a hamstring injury). Johnson ranks third on the team in catches (26) and yards (304), while freshman Armanti Foreman is coming off a career-best performance against TCU in which he had four receptions for 91 yards, including a 73-yard TD.

HARRIS HAS THE SCORING TOUCH: John Harris had one TD reception in each of the first four games, becoming just the second player in school history to accomplish that feat. Jordan Shipley had at least one TD catch in the first eight games of 2008. Harris' TD streak of four straight games, snapped vs. Baylor, ranks tied for fifth in UT history. Harris has gone on to post seven receiving TDs on the season and would move into a tie for ninth place

on the UT single season list with one more touchdown catch. The school's single season record is held by Jordan Shipley (13 in 2009).

TOP RECEIVING DUO: Jaxon Shipley and John Harris have formed one of the top receiving duos in the nation this year. Harris has 64 catches and Shipley 58, making Texas one of just 12 teams in the nation with at least two players who have 55 or more receptions. Their combined 122 catches rank as the ninth most among the 12 teams, with Washington State (four players with 55 or more receptions and 311 total) leading the way.

ONE-TWO PUNCH IN THE BACKFIELD: Malcolm Brown and Johnathan Gray give UT a formidable running back duo. They have handled nearly the entire workload, with Brown carrying it 176 times for 683 yards and Gray rushing

141 times for 628 yards. Gray has a team-high seven rushing TDs and Brown six; Brown had two vs. Iowa State and two vs. Texas Tech, while Gray had a career-high three vs. West Virginia.

- The duo was at its best in a three-game stretch near the end of the year: Brown had a season-high 116 rushing yards and Gray had 77 vs. Texas Tech. Then, against WVU, Gray had 101 yards on just 10 carries and Brown added 90 yards. Gray had a team-high 81 at Oklahoma State.

- Behind Brown and Gray, UT is young with just two scholarship backs on the roster: true freshmen Donald Catalon and D'Onta Foreman. Foreman saw action in seven games, though he missed the TCU game with a hand injury, while Catalon has yet to play.

TOPPING 2,000: Malcolm Brown and Johnathan Gray give Texas a rare combination of two teammates with over 2,000 career rushing yards playing at the same time. Brown ranks 11th in UT history with

2,653 yards while Gray is 15th with 2,109. Though they are two of 18 players in school history to top the 2,000 yard mark, just two other times in school history has a pair of teammates been on the team at the same time both were over 2,000. In 2004, Cedric Benson was wrapping up a career that saw him rush for 5,540 yards and Vince Young broke the 2,000-career yard mark in a Rose Bowl victory over Michigan. Before that, Eric Metcalf (2,661) and Darron Norris' (2,079) career's overlapped from 1985-88.

STRONG IMPROVEMENT

A long-time defensive coordinator, Charlie Strong's teams pride themselves on being tough, physical and sound defensively. During his four years (2010-13) as Louisville head coach, the team improved in a number of categories culminating with last year's top-rated defense in the FBS. The Cardinals were in the top 25 nationally in total defense in each of Strong's four seasons. In the three years prior to his arrival, the Cardinals never finished higher than No. 65 in the FBS in total defense.

Strong's offenses, meanwhile, also showed great improvement during his tenure at Louisville. The year prior to Strong's arrival, the Cardinals ranked 91st nationally in total offense (334.1 yards/game), but improved their ranking by 20 spots in year one and checked in at 28th in the country last year (460.8 yards/game). Louisville was one of the most efficient third-down teams in the nation last year while ranking 25th in scoring, its highest ranking since 2007.

TIGHT ENDS FIND INCREASED

ROLE: Texas has three tight ends on the roster with extended playing time. Seniors Greg Daniels and Geoff Swaim were the starters last season, including five games together. While Daniels and Swaim were a key in the running game last season, the duo combined for just six catches. M.J. McFarland, the No. 3 tight end, did not have a reception in his 11 games. McFarland has posted 11 catches so far this season, including a 2-yard TD catch vs. UCLA and a 1-yard TD reception vs. Kansas, while Swaim has 10 catches for 70 yards, including a career-best three catches vs. K-State. He caught his first career TD pass against West Virginia when he hauled in a 2-yarder. A knee injury caused Daniels to miss the first three games (he returned vs. Kansas) so freshman Andrew Beck was moved to tight end in the preseason and has played in all 12 games. Looking back at Louisville last year, Charlie Strong's offense had two tight ends - Gerald Christian (28) and Ryan Hubbell (14) - combine for 42 catches. During 2012, Hubbell (14) and

HOLDING BIG 12 OFFENSES IN CHECK

In recent years, Big 12 offenses have been among the most prolific in the nation. This season, the Longhorns held the offenses of their nine league opponents in check. In league action, Texas ranked first in passing yards allowed (201.4 pg), total yards allowed (357.1 pg) and passing efficiency defense (110.1 rating), and second in scoring defense (23.4 ppg). Baylor was held below 400 yards of offense (389) for the just the second time in 45 games; Oklahoma (232) had its lowest offensive yards output in seven years (230 vs. Colorado in 2007); Oklahoma State had its lowest output (192) since 2009; and TCU had 368 yards which marked a low in league play.

Nate Nord (13) combined for 27 receptions. That same season, McFarland (8) and Daniels (5) were more involved in the UT passing game, combining for 13 catches.

IN THE TRENCHES: Texas is relying on a stout and experienced defensive line. Senior Cedric Reed has been the starter at strong end while junior Shiro Davis, sophomore Caleb Bluiett and redshirt freshman Naashon Hughes have made starts at fox end. Junior Malcom Brown and sophomore Hassan Ridgeway have occupied the tackle positions. The Horns are without senior Desmond Jackson who suffered a foot injury vs. UCLA that sidelined him for the remainder of the season.

- The line has helped Texas record 39 sacks (3.25/game) which ranks tied for seventh nationally and is the most by UT in the same span since it had 40 in 2009.

- After recording four sacks vs. North Texas, the Longhorns had six vs. BYU, three vs. UCLA and four vs. Kansas. Texas became the first team to record a sack of a Baylor QB in the matchup with the Bears, finishing the game with three. After making just one vs. Oklahoma, the Longhorns had three against Iowa State, two at K-State and one at Texas Tech. Reed had all three of UTs sacks vs. WVU.

- Texas had a season-high seven sacks at Oklahoma State, with six of those coming from the defensive line (Brown - 2, Ridgeway - 1, Davis - 1, Bluiett - 1, Hughes - 0.5, Paul Boyette - 0.5). Against TCU, they had two.

- Brown leads the team with 6.5 sacks, Ridgeway is second with 6.0 and Reed is

third with 5.5. Brown's 14 tackles for loss lead the team while Reed and Ridgeway have 10 each.

STRENGTH AT LINEBACKER: Texas has utilized mostly nickel sets on defense with Jordan Hicks and Steve Edmond as the starting linebackers, giving the Longhorns strength and experience at that position. Edmond was a honorable mention All-Big 12 selection last year while Hicks battled through injuries the past two seasons. Both have played at a high level this year: Hicks has recorded a team-high 138 tackles, including 13 for a loss which is second on the team. He also has two interceptions on the year, with one coming

vs. North Texas and the other vs. Kansas. He was named one of 20 semifinalists for the Chuck Bednarik Award on Nov. 3 and earned second team All-America honors from both Walter Camp and the FWAA. Edmond is second on the team with 122 stops, including a career-high 19 vs. Baylor when he also had two sacks. His 12 TFLs are third on the team while his 4.5 sacks are fourth. Edmond was an honorable mention All-Big 12 choice this year.

- Outside of Hicks and Edmond the Longhorns have depth, with three other players who made starts in 2013. Peter Jinkens made six starts a year ago, Dalton Santos made seven and Timothy Cole made one.

ELITE PASS RUSHING COMPANY

By recording 2.5 sacks against BYU, junior defensive tackle Malcom Brown put himself in some elite company. Since 1998, just 10 other Longhorns (11 occurrences) have recorded 2.5 or more sacks in a game, and just one of those was a defensive tackle - Cedric Woodard (3.0, Nov. 27, 1998, vs. Texas A&M). DE Cedric Reed was an addition to the list when he collected 3.0 sacks vs. West Virginia.

PLAYMAKERS IN THE SECONDARY:

With experienced playmakers Quandre Diggs, Duke Thomas and Mykkele Thompson, the Horns have a well-equipped secondary and proved that by allowing just 186.3 passing yards per game which ranks 12th nationally (15 vs. UNT, 181 vs. BYU, 226 vs. UCLA, 140 vs. Kansas, 111 vs. Baylor, 129 vs. Oklahoma, 345 vs. Iowa State, 224 vs. K State, 225 vs. Texas Tech, 248 vs. WVU, 158 vs. OSU, 233 vs. TCU).

- In nine Big 12 games, Texas led the league in pass defense (201.4 yards per game) and pass efficiency defense (110.1 rating). UT had 10 interceptions in league play which was the third most.

- The secondary has helped the Longhorns record 15 interceptions in total which is tied for 16th in the nation. Dylan Haines leads the team with four, Diggs and Thomas have three apiece, while Thompson and Adrian Colbert have one.

- The unit had an impressive day against the high-powered offense of Baylor, holding QB Bryce Petty to 7-of-22 passing for just 111 yards which was the Bears' lowest passing output since Nov. 29, 2008 when they had just 91.

- Diggs, a four-year starter who earned All-Big 12 honors this season, and Thomas, a junior who started 10 games a year ago, man the cornerback positions. With 48 career starts under his belt, Diggs is the most experienced player on the team. Manning one of the safety positions, as well as cornerback, is Thompson, a senior who has seen action in 50 career games including 30 starts. Colbert and Haines, both

sophomores, along with freshman Jason Hall have also made starts at safety this season. Sophomore Bryson Echols made his first career start vs. Texas Tech, opening the game as one of three cornerbacks.

KICKING GAME: After serving as the kickoff specialist each of the last two years, junior Nick Rose took over as the place-kicker this season and has connected on 14 of 21 field goals, including 10 of his last 13. Rose had his best game vs. Iowa State, when he connected from 45 yards (then career long) and then hit the game-winner with :03 left from 21 yards. He was named Big 12 Special Teams Player of the Week. He also connected on 3 of 4 attempts vs. Oklahoma State including a career-long 51 yarder. Rose has also been valuable on kickoffs, recording 44 touchbacks on 59 kicks. The Longhorns have had just 13 kickoffs returned this season which is the fewest in the nation.

- Senior William Russ served as the No. 1 punter much of the season and is averaging 42.3 yards per punt, which ranks 45th nationally, but Michael Davidson took over in the WVU game. Davidson averaged 43.7 yards per punt on six kicks, putting three inside the 20 (two inside the 5) and was honored as co-Special Teams player of the week by the coaching staff. In his second week of duty he averaged 39.8 yards on four tries vs. OSU with one inside the 20. Most recently vs. TCU, the pair shared punting duties, with Russ averaging 38.2 yards on six kicks, and Davidson averaging 45.0 yards on three kicks.

BREAKING DOWN THE 2014 SCHEDULE: UT played eight games this season against teams that reached a bowl game and four teams that finished the season ranked in the top 15 of the College Football Playoff rankings. UT only left the state of Texas three times in 2014, but the schedule was one of the more challenging in recent history. All three nonconference opponents - North Texas, BYU and UCLA - reached bowl games in 2013. The Longhorns were one of only two Big 12 teams without an FCS foe on the 2014 schedule. As of Dec. 15, the Longhorns schedule is 49th-most difficult in the nation, according to NCAA.org. The Longhorns' past and future opposition has a winning percentage of .541 (72-61).

PRODUCING STRONG TEAMS:

Featuring an explosive offense and stingy defense, Charlie Strong's Louisville squad ended 2013 ranked 15th in both the USA Today Coaches and Associated Press polls after compiling a 12-1 record, including a 7-1 mark in the American Athletic Conference. The Cardinals capped the year with a dominating 36-9 win over Miami (Fla.) in the Russell Athletic Bowl. The Cardinals led the nation in nine team categories: total defense (251.5 yards per game), rushing defense (80.7 ypg), third-down conversion defense (26.7 percent), sacks (3.31 per game), fewest passes intercepted (4), fewest turnovers lost (10), fewest first downs allowed (183), completion percentage (70.8) and punt-return defense (1.15 yards per return). Not surprisingly, last year's team produced a number of NFL-caliber players. In fact, the Cardinals had three first round picks in the 2014 NFL Draft and four selected in the top 75, both tied for first in the nation.

LAST-SECOND WINS

When Nick Rose kicked a 21-yard field goal with :03 left to beat Iowa State, 48-45, it marked the first time Texas had scored the game winner in the last 10 seconds of a game since 2011. In the modern era, Texas has recorded a game-winning score with under 10 seconds to play 11 times, 10 of which were by way of a field goal.

Jaxon Shipley cracked the top 10 in career receptions in the 2013 Ole Miss game and the top 10 in career receiving yards three weeks later vs. OU. He is now third in career receptions (217) and sixth in receiving yards (2,504). Last season, Shipley led the team in receptions (56) and was second in receiving yards (589). DUAL THREAT: Not only is Jaxon Shipley one of the top wide receivers in school history, but he's also among the best punt returners. Shipley ranks No. 9 on the school's all-time return average list at 9.7 (37 returns for 359 yards). This season, Shipley ranks fifth in the Big 12 and 26th nationally in punt-return average (9.6). His two longest returns this year - 41 yards vs. Kansas and 31 yards vs. Oklahoma - set up touchdowns.

CLIMBING THE SINGLE-SEASON RECEPTIONS CHART:

Despite having one game remaining this season, seniors Jaxon Shipley and John Harris have already had two of the most productive years in UT history. Harris's 64 receptions are tied for eighth on the UT single-season list and Shipley's 58 catches are tied for 12th. Shipley's career-best 59 catches in 2012 are 11th on the school's list.

RECEIVING MILESTONE: The Longhorns have 14 games in school history in which they have produced a pair of 100-yard receivers, but had their first occurrence of three players posting 90 or more receiving yards in the same game in the Oklahoma contest. Jaxon Shipley posted a career-high tying nine receptions for 115 receiving yards, Marcus Johnson had a career-high seven catches for a season-best 93 yards, and John Harris five receptions for 90 yards and two TDs.

IN TOP 10 IN RECEIVING YARDS:

After entering the season with just nine receptions for 190 yards in his career, John Harris now finds himself in the UT all-time top 10 in single-season receiving yards. Harris has 1,015 receiving yards this season which ranks No. 8. He is just the sixth player in school history to record 1,000 or more in one year and could move into the top 5 on the chart with 72 more yards.

• The senior was named to the preseason watch lists for the Chuck Bednarik Award and the Nagurski Trophy, along with the Jim Thorpe Award honoring the best defensive back in college football. Diggs has excelled in each of his three seasons at Texas. In 2011, he posted one of the top freshman seasons in school history for a defensive back. He was named the 2011 Big 12 Defensive Freshman of the Year and was a FWAA Freshman All-American. He tied the school record for interceptions by a freshman, matching Chris Carter's mark of four in 1993. Diggs also had 15 pass breakups to rank second most on the UT freshman list behind Earl Thomas' 17 in 2008. In 2012, Diggs led the team in both interceptions (four) and pass breakups (seven). Last year, he posted 58 tackles and a team-high 10 pass breakups.

HORNS LEAD THE WAY ACADEMICALLY: Texas placed 18 players on the 2014 Academic All-Big 12 team, including 12 on the first team. Players earning first-team honors were DS Nate Boyer, P/PK Michael Davidson, C Dominic Espinosa, S Dylan Haines, LB Jordan Hicks, DB Devin Huffines, TE M.J. McFarland, OL Jake Raulerson, CB Ryan Roberts, WR Jaxon Shipley, WR Ty Templin and TE Chris Terry. It marked the third-straight year Boyer, a 2013 Academic All-American, has earned first-team honors. Huffines and McFarland were selected for a second-consecutive year. The second team included RB Malcolm Brown, LB Demarco Cobbs, WR Chris Giron, WR Dakota Haines, QB Tyrone Swoopes and WR Jacorey Warrick. Over the last nine years, Texas has led the conference in both total selections and first-team choices. During that span, the Longhorns have had 176 total honorees, including 116 on the first team.

FRESHMEN CONTRIBUTIONS: Texas has played eight true freshmen this season. TE Andrew Beck, WR Armanti Foreman, RB D'Onta Foreman, DB Jason Hall and WR Lorenzo Joe were the first to play, seeing time during the first three games. WR Roderick Bernard, DT Poona Ford and WR Dorian Leonard saw their first action in the Kansas game. Bernard played on special teams, Ford as a reserve along the line and Leonard in the wide receiver rotation. Hall, who opened the KU game at safety, became the first true freshman to start since Blake Gideon in 2008. Beck earned his first start in the WVU game.

BOYER EARNS A PAIR OF ACCOLADES: Senior Nate Boyer was named to the 2014 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team on Sept. 23 and a semifinalist for the 2014 William V. Campbell Trophy, which recognizes the best football scholar-athlete in the nation, on Sept. 25. Boyer, a fifth-year deep-snapper, is the ninth Longhorn to earn a spot on the prestigious Good Works Team that each year pays tribute to a select group of student-athletes who have worked to positively impact the lives of others. He is among 22 collegiate players, including 11 at the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) level, on this year's team. He was one of 167 candidates announced by The National Football Foundation (NFF) and College Hall of Fame for the Campbell Trophy. Candidates must be a senior or graduate student in their final year of eligibility, have a grade point average of at least 3.2 on a 4.0 scale, have outstanding football ability as a first-team player or significant contributor, and have demonstrated strong leadership and citizenship.

BROTHERLY TIES: The Texas football team has a family feel to it. The Longhorns have four sets of brothers on the current roster and five other players whose brother was a member of the program. Running back D'Onta Foreman and wide receiver Armanti Foreman are freshmen. Freshman offensive lineman Elijah Rodriguez and his brother Daniel, a sophomore, joined the team this summer. Camhron Hughes is a sophomore offensive lineman, and his brother, Naashon, is a redshirt freshman linebacker. Dakota Haines is a senior wide receiver and Dylan Haines is a sophomore safety. In addition, FB Dominic Cruciani (Michael - 2009-12), Quandre Diggs (Quentin Jammer - 1997-98, 2000-01), Jaxon Shipley (Jordan - 2006-09), Chris Terry (Brad - 2011-12) and Kevin Vaccaro (Kenny - 2009-12) all have brothers who played at Texas.

ASH RETIRES: David Ash entered 2014 with high hopes as the team's starting quarterback, but the fourth-year player was forced to retire from football on Sept. 22 after playing in just one game this year. He was looking to replicate a 2012 season which saw him start in 12 of 13 games and finish 15th in the FBS in completion percentage (67.3). Ash played in just three games last year, missing the final 10 to a head injury and earning a medical red-shirt. He was one of the most experienced quarterbacks in the Big 12 having played in 29 games with 22 starts. However, head coach Charlie Strong announced Sept. 22 that Ash was giving up football, though he will remain involved with the team. He ends his career eighth on the UT all-time passing yards list (4,728), 10th in total offense (5,125) and seventh in touchdown passes (31).

GAMES ADDED TO FUTURE SCHEDULES: The Longhorns have recently adjusted their nonconference schedules.

- On Sept. 17, Texas announced an agreement in principle with Michigan for a home-and-home series in Ann Arbor on Aug. 31, 2024, and in Austin on Sept. 4, 2027. The lone previous meeting came in the 2005 Rose Bowl. The two storied programs created a classic as Texas prevailed, 38-37, on Dusty Mangum's 37-yard field goal as time expired. Vince Young accounted for 372 yards and five TDs, including 192 yards and four TDs on the ground, as the Longhorns won in their first BCS Bowl appearance to cap an 11-1 season.

- On Oct. 16, Texas announced it reached an agreement in principle for a home-and-home football series with LSU, and a three-game series with USF. LSU is scheduled to come to Austin on Sept. 7, 2019, and the Longhorns will travel to Baton Rouge, Louisiana, on Sept. 12, 2020. That series will replace the recently canceled 2019 and 2020 games with Notre Dame. USF is slated to play in Austin on Aug. 31, 2019, and Sept. 7, 2024, with the Horns traveling to Tampa, Florida, on Sept. 3, 2022.

TEXAS BY THE NUMBERS

1: Under the direction of head coach Charlie Strong and defensive coordinator Vance Bedford, Louisville led the FBS in nine team categories in 2013 - total defense (251.5 ypg), rushing defense (80.7 ypg), third-down conversion defense (26.7 percent), sacks (3.31 per game), fewest passes intercepted (4), fewest turnovers lost (10), fewest first downs allowed (183), completion percentage (70.8) and punt-return defense (1.15 yards per return).

1: Under the direction of head coach Charlie Strong and offensive coordinator Shawn Watson, Louisville led the FBS in three team categories in 2013 - completion percentage (70.8), passes intercepted (4) and turnovers committed (10). The Cardinals were also second in third-down conversions (56.0 percent) and time of possession (33:19).

1: Number of offensive touchdowns allowed by the Texas defense in the opening quarter this season (vs. Iowa State).

1: Cedric Reed leads the current roster in career tackles for loss (37), sacks (18.0) and forced fumbles (6).

1: Charlie Strong is the only head coach in Louisville to win at least three bowl games and he did it in just four seasons.

2: The Longhorns have two alums on the coaching staff. Defensive coordinator Vance Bedford was a cornerback (1977-'79, '81) and Les Koenning coaches the position he played (1978-80) - wide receiver.

2: Charlie Strong was twice named Big East Coach of the Year (2010, '12).

2: Charlie Strong served as the defensive coordinator on two national championship teams at Florida (2006, '08).

2: The Longhorns have two running backs on the roster with more than 2,000 career rushing yards. Malcolm Brown ranks 11th on the school's career list (2,653) and Johnathan Gray is 15th (2,109).

2: Demarco Cobbs and Jordan Hicks are the only two Longhorns who have played in NRG Stadium. Both played as true freshman vs. Rice in 2010, seeing time as reserves on defense and on special teams.

3: Charlie Strong had three of his Louisville players selected in the 2014 NFL Draft, tied for the most in the nation.

3: The Longhorns, who rank tied for seventh in the FBS in sacks (3.25 pg), have produced at least three sacks in eight games this season.

3: Jaxon Shipley ranks No. 3 in school history in career receptions (217) after passing Quan Cosby (212/2005-08) during the West Virginia game.

4: Charlie Strong had four of his Louisville players selected in the top 75 of the 2014 NFL Draft, tied for the most in the nation.

5: Number of career starts the offensive line had registered entering the BYU game (Kent Perkins - 2; Sedrick Flowers - 2; Marcus Hutchins - 1).

5: Cedric Reed ranked tied for fifth in the FBS last season with five forced fumbles (0.38 per game).

6: Jaxon Shipley ranks No. 6 in school history in career receiving yards (2,504).

7: David Ash ended his career ranked No. 7 on the UT all-time passing TDs list (31).

8: David Ash ended his career No. 8 on the UT career passing yards list (4,728).

9: Jaxon Shipley ranks tied for ninth on the school's all-time punt return average chart (9.6).

9: Quandre Diggs is the team's active career leader with 37 pass breakups, which is tied for the 9th most in school history.

11: Malcolm Brown has a team-high 11 career 100-yard rushing games, a mark that ranks tied for seventh in school history. The Longhorns are 8-3 when Brown rushes for 100 or more yards.

12: Jordan Hicks has 12 career double-digit tackle games.

13: Opponents have returned just 13 of 59 kickoffs, the fewest in the nation.

23: During 2012-13, Charlie Strong led Louisville to a 23-3 record. The win total was tied for fourth in the FBS over that span.

28: Malcom Brown has 28 career tackles for loss, which ranks second on the team among active players (Cedric Reed - 37).

31: Cedric Reed has started 31 straight games which leads the team.

40: Dominic Espinosa had his team-leading streak of 40 straight starts snapped when he missed the BYU game (fractured ankle).

49: As of Dec. 15, the Longhorns' strength of schedule is 49th in the FBS, according to NCAA.org. The past and future opposition has a winning percentage of .541 (72-61).

53: Texas has 53 all-time bowl appearances, second all-time in the NCAA.

53.04: John Harris (64) and Jaxon Shipley (58) lead the team in receptions and are the clear top targets of Tyrone Swoopes. That duo has accounted for 53.04 percent (122 of 230) of the team's receptions.

60: Number of career starts by members of the offensive line (Kent Perkins - 13; Sedrick Flowers - 13; Marcus Hutchins - 12; Taylor Doyle - 10; Camrhon Hughes - 6; Jake Raulerson - 4; Darius James - 2).

62.39: John Harris (1,015) and Jaxon Shipley (571) lead the team in receiving yards. That duo has accounted for 62.39 percent (1,586 of 2,542) of the team's receiving yards.

77: Tyrone Swoopes had streak of 77 passes without an interception snapped vs. Baylor. That is the 11th-longest streak in school history.

102: Texas' 102 appearances in the BCS standings were the most of any team in the country.

104: Tyrone Swoopes had streak of 104 passes without an interception snapped vs. West Virginia. That is the seventh-longest streak in UT history.

176: Over the last nine years, Texas has the most Academic All-Big 12 selections of any team in the conference with 176.

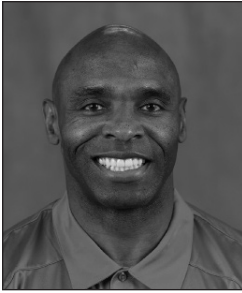
314: Steve Edmond is the team's active leader in career tackles (314). Jordan Hicks is second with 290.

881: With 881 victories in program history, Texas is tied for second with Notre Dame on the NCAA all-time victories list behind only Michigan.

2,000: In the West Virginia game, Johnathan Gray became the 18th player in Longhorn history to surpass 2,000 career yards rushing.

100,000: Darrell K Royal-Texas Memorial Stadium is one of just seven collegiate stadiums with a capacity of 100,000 or more.

COACHING STAFF



CHARLIE STRONG

Head Coach • First Year

A two-time conference coach of the year and the architect of a revitalized University of Louisville program that posted at least 11 wins in each of the last two seasons, Charlie Strong is in his first year as the Texas head football coach.

Strong, the 29th head coach in UT history, spent the previous four seasons as Louisville head coach, re-energizing a program that was coming off back-to-back losing seasons (5-7 in 2008, 4-8 in 2009) and a 15-21 record in the three years prior to his arrival. He amassed a 37-15 record, a pair of Big East Conference Championships (2011, 2012) and was named Big East Coach of the Year in both 2010 and 2012. He also led UofL to four straight bowl game appearances (3-1 record), including a victory over No. 4 Florida in the 2013 Allstate Sugar Bowl.

This season, Strong rallied the Longhorns from a 3-5 record to reach a bowl game despite the loss of two key starters on offense (QB David Ash, C Dominic Espinosa) and one on defense (DT Desmond Jackson) for nearly the entire season.

Texas ended the regular season with one of the better defenses in the nation, ranking 26th in the FBS in total yards allowed (348.3 per game), No. 12 in passing defense (186.3 ypg), No. 8 in yards allowed per play (4.67), 16th in passing efficiency defense (108.34 rating), tied for seventh in sacks (3.25 pg) and 33rd in points allowed (23.3 pg).

During his final two seasons at Louisville, the Cardinals' were nation's fourth-winningest program, posting a 23-3 record (88.5 percent) and registering bowl victories in consecutive seasons for the first time in school history. Louisville's 11-plus win seasons in 2012 and 2013 were the fourth and fifth in school history and the first back to back. UofL finished among the nation's top 15 for a school-record second straight year. The Cardinals ended 2013 among the top 25 in both polls for just the ninth time in school history.

Featuring an explosive offense and stingy defense in 2013, the Cardinals ranked 15th in both the USA Today Coaches and Associated Press polls (also No. 18 in final BCS Standings) after compiling a 12-1 record, including a 7-1 mark in the American Athletic Conference

Strong spent seven seasons as the defensive coordinator at the University of Florida under Meyer from 2005-09 and Ron Zook from 2003-04 where he helped the Gators win a pair of national titles – 2008 over Oklahoma and 2006 over Ohio State.

From 2003-09, Strong's defensive units at Florida allowed an average of 17.6 points per game, which ranked ninth in the country over that span. His stint as defensive coordinator marked his fourth tenure at Florida, including a stretch from 1991-94 in which he coached defensive ends (1991-93) and defensive tackles (1994) after coaching outside linebackers in 1988-89, and serving as a graduate assistant in 1983-84. He served as Florida's assistant head coach from 2005-07 and was the associate head coach in 2008-09.

Before returning to Florida for the fourth time, Strong received his first defensive coordinator assignment at the University of South Carolina under Holtz from 1999-2002.

Outside of his time at Louisville, Florida, and South Carolina, Strong's career stops have included one season (1985) at Texas A&M as a graduate assistant before moving on to Southern Illinois as wide receivers coach from 1986-87, one season (1990) at Mississippi as wide receivers coach and four seasons (1995-98) as the defensive line coach at Notre Dame.

A native of Batesville, Ark., Strong was a three-year letterwinner (1979-81) and three-time all-conference safety at Central Arkansas, where he graduated in 1982 with a bachelor's degree in education. He and his wife, Vicki, have a son, Tory, and two daughters, Hailee and Hope.
