USE OF AUDIO/VIDEO COVERAGE

Any accredited media entity using "video or audio materials" (film, traditional video or audio, digital video or audio, photos, etc.) from University of Texas Athletics events (games, practices, post-practice/postgame interviews and press conferences) may use that material only for traditional television newscasts, web-based or print coverage (see note below regarding policy on game video on web), or other electronic transmission as approved by The University in writing, with a limitation of up to three (3) minutes in length from any single event. That three (3)-minute package may contain no more than two (2) minutes of game highlights. Its usage must be only as supporting edited video/audio for a reported video/audio story and not simply as a raw video post/rebroadcast/ streamed highlights or interview sessions. Accredited media entities may not offer any live video, audio or other coverage of the event (or tape delay rebroadcast coverage in its entirety) without the advance written permission of The University of Texas athletics department. Video is for news usage only and may not be sponsored or sold. This policy includes all games, matches, practices and events involving any of Texas' athletics programs. It includes all media events — press conferences, pre/post-practice interviews and pre/post-game interviews.

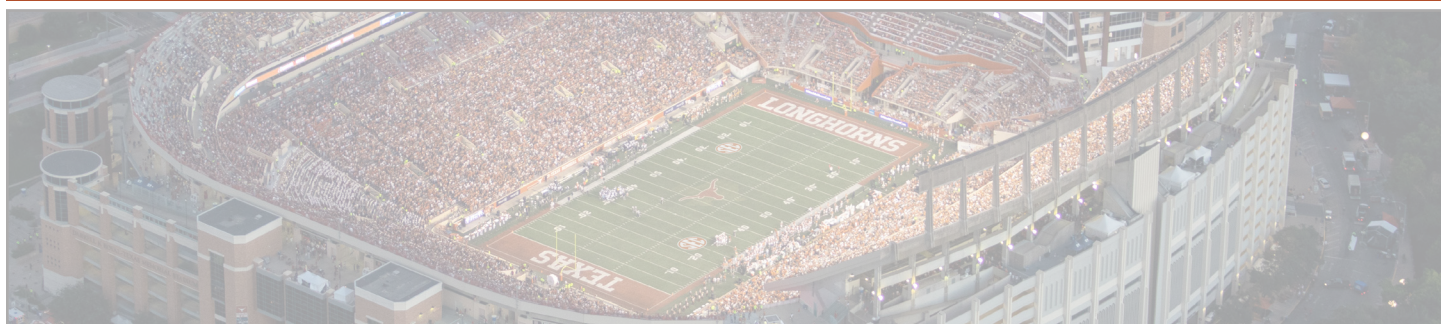
NOTE REGARDING USE OF GAME VIDEO: Policy permits entities to use up to two (2) minutes of video on air (whether taken from the network feed or shot themselves) or on the entity's website. Reports and features must be filed postgame and not during the game. If a game/event is contracted to a network television partner, all highlights may remain on a website no longer than 48 hours following the game/event's conclusion. Highlights may not be used via social media platforms except as a link back to the website/URL hosting the highlights.

EXCEPTION: With advance written permission from the UT Athletics department, media entities will be permitted to rebroadcast the Steve Sarkisian weekly Monday press conferences in its entirety. Video from that 20-minute press conference can be used for either over the air rebroadcast or web postings. Live distribution of the weekly Monday press conference is not permitted. If posted on a website, it must be removed 48 hours after the conclusion of the press conference.

THE OPENING KICKOFF

• No. 1/1 Texas Football (2-0) will make its first-ever trip to Knoxville, Tenn., for its SEC opener against No. 14/13 Tennessee at 11 a.m. CT Saturday, Sept. 26, at Neyland Stadium. The game will broadcast on ABC with Chris Fowler (play-by-play), Kirk Herbstreit (analyst) and Holly Rowe (reporter) on the call.

• ESPN's College GameDay will broadcast live from Tennessee's campus for the matchup against the Texas on Sept. 26. The show will air for three hours from 8-11 a.m. CT, hosted by Rece Davis, Desmond Howard, Pat McAfee, Nick Saban, Kirk Herbstreit and other ESPN personalities. Including eight visits to the Red River Rivalry and 10 road/neutral site appearances, Texas' Week 4 game at Tennessee will be the 30th time the GameDay set and its show will be a prominent fixture at a Texas game.

• Texas remains the No. 1 ranked team in this week's AP and Coaches polls. It's Texas' 52nd appearance at No. 1.

• Texas has won 12-consecutive home games at DKR-Texas Memorial Stadium, the fourth-longest streak in the FBS.

• Texas has won four-consecutive home contests against ranked opponents (No. 1/1 Ohio State on Sept. 13, No. 3/3/3 Texas A&M, No. 9/11 Vanderbilt on Nov. 1 and No. 13/13/16 Clemson in 2024), which ties for the longest active streak in the FBS.

• Texas finished the 2025 season with a 10-3 record, highlighted by three wins over top-10 opponents in a season where the Longhorns faced five top-10 teams — both were the most of any FBS program. Texas ended the season with a 41-27 victory vs. No. 18/17/18 Michigan in the Cheez-It Citrus Bowl on Dec. 31 in Orlando.

• Under Sarkisian, Texas has turned in three-straight 10-win seasons, marking the first time the Horns have recorded three-consecutive 10-win seasons since registering nine-straight from 2001-09.

• In addition to its third-straight 10-win season and top-15 ranking, the season featured a fourth-straight top-25 final ranking for the first time since 2006-09. It is also the first time Texas has put together three-consecutive 10-win seasons since 2007-09.

• Texas' 11 wins against top-25 opponents, including six against the top-10, since 2024 are the most of any FBS program.

• 2025 featured wins over Oklahoma, Texas A&M and Arkansas in the same season in back-to-back years for the first time since 1969-70. The Longhorns concluded the season winning seven of its last eight games.

• Texas currently boasts 974 all-time wins, the fifth-most in college football history. UT holds an all-time record of 974-398-33 (.705).

• Head coach Steve Sarkisian has led his programs to postseason appearances in nine of his 12 seasons as a head coach, including a current streak of four-straight postseason appearances while at Texas. Sarkisian guided the Longhorns to back-to-back CFP Playoff Semifinal appearances in 2023 and 2024 — the only program to advance to the CFP Semifinals in both of those years. In 2022, the Longhorns finished 8-5 with an Alamo Bowl appearance. He led Washington to four-straight bowl games following the 2010-13 seasons and guided USC to the Holiday Bowl in 2014. His Washington team played in the 2013 Fight Hunger Bowl, a game he did not coach in after taking over the Trojans' program. Sarkisian was the head coach for the Huskies' Alamo Bowl appearance against Baylor in 2011.

• Steve Sarkisian holds a 50-20 record at Texas and an 96-55 mark in 13 seasons as a head coach.

SERIES HISTORY

• Texas and Tennessee will meet for just the fourth time in history and first time since 1969 on Saturday. The Longhorns lead the all-time series, 2-1.

• It'll mark Texas' first trip to Neyland Stadium to face the Volunteers.

• The three previous matchups between Texas and Tennessee were at the Cotton Bowl.

A TEXAS WIN WOULD

• Move Texas' record to 4-0 on the season and 1-0 in SEC play.

• Claim Texas' second ranked victory of the season in four games.

• Give Texas a 3-1 series advantage against Tennessee.

• Claim Texas' 974th all-time win.

• Secure Steve Sarkisian his 98th victory as a head coach and 52nd at Texas in his 154th career game as a head coach.

• Increase Texas' win streak to seven-straight games with four of those wins coming against ranked opponents.

YEAR SIX OF THE SARKISIAN ERA

• Texas Football Head Coach Steve Sarkisian is in his sixth season at the helm of the Longhorns and his 13th season as a head coach overall.

• Since 2023, Texas is 38-8 (82.6 percent) under Sarkisian.

• Since 2023, Texas is 22-1 (95.6 percent) at home under Sarkisian.

• Texas has won 18 of its last 21 conference matchups.

• Texas has made four-consecutive postseason appearances under Sarkisian heading into the 2026 season.

• Sarkisian holds a 51-20 record at Texas and a 97-55 mark in 13 seasons as a head coach.

• In 2025, Sarkisian turned in a 10-3 season and Cheez-It Citrus Bowl victory over Michigan. It was UT's third-straight 10-win season and the first time Texas has put together three-consecutive 10-win seasons since recording nine-straight from 2001-09.

• In UT's inaugural season in the SEC in 2024, Sarkisian led Texas to the best regular season record in the conference (7-1) and an SEC Championship Game berth, and the Longhorns became the only program to earn a spot in the CFP semifinals in 2023 and 2024. Texas' 13-3 record in 2024 matched the school-record for wins and included a second-straight final top-five ranking (No. 3 Coaches Poll/No. 4 AP), marking the first consecutive top-five finishes for the Longhorns since 2008-09.

• Sarkisian and the Horns turned in a historic season in 2023 with a 12-2 record, a Big 12 Championship, No. 3 final ranking and College Football Playoff semifinal appearance.

• The 2024 Longhorns were just the third team in program history to amass 13 or more victories in a single season.

• Under head coach Steve Sarkisian, the Longhorns are 39-9 in their last 48 games. Eight of their nine losses are against AP top-15 programs.

• In Sarkisian's first 22 games as head coach at Texas, UT went 11-11.

• Sarkisian is one of two coaches in program history with a 13-win season (Mack Brown) after Texas finished the 2024 season 13-3 overall.

HORNS BEAT THE BUCKEYES

- Texas overcame a 20-point fourth-quarter deficit vs. No. 1/1 Ohio State to beat the Buckeyes, 24-23. It was second-largest fourth quarter comeback in program history and the fourth-largest overall. It was Texas' largest comeback under head coach Steve Sarkisian.
- After taking down No. 1/1 Ohio State on Sept. 12, it was the Longhorns' first win over the AP No. 1 since defeating No. 1 Oklahoma, 45-35, on Oct. 11, 2008.
- UT's comeback vs. No. 1/1 Ohio State was the largest

comeback against an AP No. 1 ranked team this century.

- Texas is the first non-conference opponent this century to put up 21+ points in the 4th quarter against Ohio State (first team overall since Michigan on 11/26/22).
- The Longhorns shut out Ohio State, 21-0, in the fourth quarter on Sept. 12. That is tied for Texas' second-largest fourth-quarter shutout this century, behind a 2007 game at Oklahoma State (24-0).

TEXAS X ESPN COLLEGE GAMEDAY

- ESPN's College GameDay will broadcast live from Tennessee's campus for the matchup against the Volunteers on Sept. 26. The show will air for three hours from 8-11 a.m. CT, hosted by Rece Davis, Desmond Howard, Pat McAfee, Nick Saban, Kirk Herbstreit and other ESPN personalities. It marks the second time this season that Texas has drawn College GameDay.
- Including eight visits to the Red River Rivalry and now 10 road/neutral site appearances, Texas' Week 4 game at No. 14/13 Tennessee will be the 30th time the GameDay set and its show will be a prominent fixture at a Texas game. It'll be the 12th time in the last six seasons that Texas will be appearing on ESPN's College GameDay.
- College GameDay broadcasted live from five games Texas was playing in during the 2024 season - the most in a single season for the Longhorns. GameDay was in Ann Arbor for Texas' road win at No. 10/9 Michigan on Sept. 7 before the show returned to the Forty Acres for Texas' home contest with No. 5/4 Georgia on Oct. 19. GameDay traveled to College Station, Texas, for the Lone Star Showdown vs. Texas A&M on Nov. 30. GameDay covered Texas in back-to-back weekends as it aired lived from the 2024 SEC Championship at Mercedes-Benz Stadium in Atlanta prior to Texas vs. Georgia. GameDay then traveled to the CFP Semifinal at the 89th Goodyear Cotton Bowl between Texas and Ohio State.
- 2024 was the third-straight year that GameDay broadcast at least twice in a season live from a game UT was playing in. The only other times that has occurred for the Horns was 2005, 2008 and 2009 when Texas made three GameDay appearances those years.
- Texas is 14-14 all-time when the Horns are one of the teams in College GameDay's featured matchup.

• With the win over UTSA on Sept. 19, Texas has won 22-straight home games against unranked opponents - the team's longest such streak since an 18-game stretch that spanned between the 1999 and 2003 seasons.

• Texas heads into Saturday on a six-game win streak.

• With the win over UTSA on Sept. 19, Texas improved to 23-1 in its last 24 games at DKR-Texas Memorial Stadium.

• Texas' defense has had at least one interception and one sack in seven-straight games, dating back to last season. That is tied for the longest active streak in the FBS with App State and Utah.

• Texas has won four-consecutive home contests against ranked opponents (No. 1/1 Ohio State on Sept. 13, No. 3/3/3 Texas A&M, No. 9/11 Vanderbilt on Nov. 1 and No. 13/13/16 Clemson in 2024), which ties for the longest active streak in the FBS.

• Texas has won 15-consecutive games in the month of September, the longest active streak in the FBS. That is the Longhorns' longest run since a 22-game stretch between 1976-85.

• Texas is 22-1 at home since the start of the 2023 season with 18 wins coming by 14 or more points. That ties for the second-most such wins in the FBS over that span (Ohio State - 20 and Oregon - 18).

• Texas holds the FBS' longest active win streak when winning the time of possession. Texas has won 21-consecutive games when winning the game's time of possession (21-Texas; 15-Ohio; 15-Indiana; 12-Tennessee; 10-Notre Dame).

• The Longhorns have won a game by at least 50 points in each of the last four seasons, currently one of three FBS teams to accomplish that along with Ohio State and UCF.

• Texas has a +100 third-quarter point differential since the beginning of the 2025 season. That ranks second in

the SEC (Vanderbilt, +115) and ranks ninth in the FBS.

• Texas is 27-2 when it scores first since the beginning of the 2023 season. That ranks third by a Power Four team.

• Over the last 26 seasons, Texas is 64-0 at home when leading by 14+ points at halftime.

• UT has registered an interception in each of its last five games, dating back to the 2025 season.

• Texas has forced a turnover in 26-straight home games, the longest active streak in the FBS (SMU is second with 18-consecutive home games). During this stretch, the Longhorns have converted those takeaways (49 total) into 200 points. It's also the longest streak by Texas since recording 24-consecutive from 1999-2003. The only current SEC team to have a longer such streak in the past 10 years was Alabama from 2016-2021 (40 games).

• 2024 marked the second-straight season in which UT played in a conference championship game.

• The Texas defense gave up just four passing touchdowns through 12 games during the regular season in 2024 - the fewest in program history since giving up four in 1972 (10 games). It also tied for the fewest by an FBS team during the regular season (tied with Ohio State).

• Texas held its opponent to under 350 yards in its first 13 games of the season in 2024, becoming the first FBS team to do so in 13-consecutive games in a single season since Alabama in 2011. The last team to do so in 14-straight games in a single season was another Alabama squad (2009).

ON THE ROAD AGAIN

• Texas has had four road wins against ranked opponents since 2023, tied for the most in the FBS over than span with Alabama and Ohio State. The Longhorns have won their last seven games against opponents ranked 11-25 in the AP Poll, their longest streak since a 12-game run between 2004-09.

- Senior QB Arch Manning is 15-3 as a starter after leading Texas to a 30-6 victory over UTSA on Sept. 19. The New Orleans native has appeared in 28 games with 18 starts across four seasons at Texas.
- Manning has won four career games as a starter against AP Top 10 opponents. That's the most amongst all active QBs, just ahead of Georgia's Gunner Stockton (three) and Houston's Conner Weigman (three).
- Manning is undefeated (11-0) as a starter at DKR-Texas Memorial Stadium, including wins over three AP Top 10 teams in No. 1/1 Ohio State, No. 3/3 Texas A&M and No. 9/11 Vanderbilt. He is the only Longhorn starting QB in program history to knock off three Top 10 opponents at home in a career.
- Manning is a perfect 8-0 as a starting QB in September, the best mark by an active FBS quarterback. The last Texas starting QB to go 5-0 or better in his September career was Vince Young (6-0).

- This past Saturday against UTSA, Manning went 17-of-33 for 164 yards and two touchdowns. Manning was Texas' leading rusher with 50 yards on the ground on nine attempts (5.6 ypc).
- Following the win against Ohio State on Sept. 12, Manning was named the SEC's Co-Offensive Player of the Week - his third career SEC weekly honor and first since Nov. 3, 2025. Manning completed 23-of-37 passes for 195 yards and a touchdown against the Buckeyes. Manning orchestrated three-consecutive touchdown drives to end the game (all of at least 12 plays and 72 yards) and rally from a 23-3 deficit. On those three drives, he completed 13-of-18 passes to seven different receivers for 125 yards and one touchdown and rushed three times for 26 yards. Two of his completions came on fourth downs in Texas territory that kept two of the scoring drives alive. The Longhorns became the only team in the past 15 years to close a victory with three-straight touchdown drives of 12 or more plays. It marked the third-largest comeback win by any FBS team against an AP No. 1 team this century, while Texas became the first non-conference opponent this century to score 21-plus points in the fourth quarter against Ohio State (first overall team since Michigan on in 2022). Manning has now thrown a touchdown pass in four-consecutive games against a Top 5 opponent, the longest streak by an FBS QB since a six-game run by Ohio State's Will Howard in 2024. He holds a 5-2 record in seven games against Top 25 teams dating back to last season with a 3.33 to 1 touchdown to interception ratio. Four of those victories came against Top 10 teams. Manning has now led four fourth-quarter comebacks in his career after doing so against Kentucky, Mississippi State and Michigan last year. Against the Buckeyes, Manning tossed a perfectly placed touchdown pass to WR Ryan Wingo with 14:19 remaining in the game that started the comeback and capped a drive in which he converted a fourth-and-9 to TE Emaree Winston from the Longhorns' 42-yard line. On the next drive, Manning found WR Emmett Mosley for a 12-yard gain on a fourth-and-6 from Texas' own 32 before the Longhorns scored a touchdown nine plays later to pull within 23-17. The final drive was highlighted by a 19-yard pass play from Manning to Mosley to reach the Ohio State 1-yard line before Texas punched in the winning score from there three plays later with 00:25 left.
- In Texas' 2026 season opener against Texas State on Sept. 5, Manning completed 20-of-27 passes (74 percent) for 305 yards and four touchdowns. It was Manning's

- second career game with 300+ passing yards and four passing touchdowns and first since Arkansas in 2025.
- Manning's 33 TD passes since the start of 2025 tie for the most in the SEC with Georgia's Gunner Stockton.
- Manning has 12 career games with multiple touchdown passes.
- Manning has six 300-yard passing performances.
- Manning was on the preseason watch lists for the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award, Davey O'Brien Award, Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award, Manning Award, Walter Camp National Player of the Year Award and the Maxwell Award.
- In his first full season as a starter at Texas, Manning guided the Longhorns to a 10-3 overall record to clinch UT's third-straight 10-win season – its most since 2007-09. Texas finished the season winning seven of its last eight games in addition to four AP Top-20 wins. The Longhorns went 5-2 against Top-20 opponents this season with three of those wins coming against top-10 teams.
- In 13 starts in 2025, Manning completed 248-of-404 passes (61.39 percent) for 3,163 yards and 26 touchdowns, averaging 243.31 yards per contest. Also a threat with his legs, the New Orleans native was Texas' second-leading rusher in 2025 after recording 399 yards (92 attempts) and a team-best 10 rushing touchdowns, averaging 4.3 yards per run.
- Manning ended his sophomore season with an exclamation point. Over the last six games, he generated 1,714 passing yards (286 per game) and 205 rushing yards while averaging 320 yards of total offense per game and 20 total touchdowns (14 passing, five rushing and one receiving).
- Manning had three games last season with at least 300 passing yards and three touchdown passes without an interception. That tied for the most such games by any Power Conference QB this season (Baylor's Sawyer Robertson & Ohio State's Julian Sayin) and is the most in a season by a Longhorn since Major Applewhite in 1999.

Manning hit former UT TE Jack Endries for a 17-yard touchdown with 7:41 remaining in the second quarter to even the score at 17-17. His second touchdown came on a 23-yard run with 4:38 left in the third quarter to put the Horns in front, 24-20. Down 27-24, Manning found then-freshman WR Kalii Lockett for a 30-yard passing touchdown with 6:54 left in the ballgame to put Texas in the lead, 31-27. Manning then clinched the win with a season-high 60-yard rushing touchdown with 5:06 remaining for a 38-27 lead.
- Against the Wolverines, Manning became just the fifth Texas QB to register a game with at least 200 passing yards and 100 rushing yards, joining Sam Ehlinger, Colt McCoy, Vince Young and Donnie Little.
- Manning notched his seventh game of the season with both a passing and rushing touchdown, including his third-straight game and 10th of his career accomplishing those feats. It was also his seventh multi-passing touchdown of the season.
- With the performance vs. Michigan, Manning became the only FBS or NFL QB in the last 30 seasons to have a game with 200-plus passing yards, 150-plus rushing yards, multiple passing touchdowns, multiple rushing touchdowns, no sacks, and no turnovers while averaging 15-plus yards per rush.
- After throwing for 221 yards, Manning surpassed 3,000 yards for the season to become the seventh Longhorn QB to throw for 3,000 yards in a season, joining Colt McCoy (2007-09), Sam Ehlinger (2018-19), Quinn Ewers (2023-24), Major Applewhite (1999), Chris Simms (2002) and Vince Young (2005).
- Manning finished 14-of-29 for 179 yards and two scores - one through the air and one on the ground - in UT's 27-17 win over No. 3/3 Texas A&M on Nov. 28, 2025. Manning ran seven times for 53 yards and a touchdown.
- Manning became the fourth SEC player this century with at least 24 pass TD, seven rush TD and a receiving TD in a season after doing so in 2025 - the others are 2010 Cam Newton (Auburn), 2014 Dak Prescott (MissSt) and 2016 Joshua Dobbs (Tenn).
- Manning was one of three quarterbacks to run for more than 20 yards against Texas A&M last season, joining Arkansas' Taylen Green who ran for 85 yards and South Carolina's LaNorris Sellers who recorded 28 vs. the Aggies.
- Manning's 35-yard TD run vs. Texas A&M in 2025 was the longest by a Texas QB against a conference opponent since Tyrone Swoopes in 2015 (46-yards vs. Texas Tech and 44-yarder vs. Kansas) - It is the longest run by a QB against Texas A&M since Anthony Richardson's 60-yard TD in 2022 (Florida at Texas A&M).
- Manning connected on 18-of-30 passes for a career-high 389 yards and four passing touchdowns in Texas' 52-37 home win vs. Arkansas on Nov. 22, 2025. Manning matched his career and season highs in touchdown passes with four on the day. Manning also accounted for a three-yard rushing touchdown and a four-yard touchdown reception. Manning matched his career-high with six total touchdowns on the day.
- Manning is the first Texas QB with a passing, rushing and receiving TD in the same game since Bobby Lane did in 1946. Manning is also the first SEC QB to do it in a game since Dak Prescott in 2014.
- Manning, who caught his first career receiving touchdown, is the second Texas QB this century with a touchdown reception. The other was David Ash in 2011 against Cal in the Holiday Bowl (47 yards - Marquise Goodwin threw the pass).
- Against the Razorbacks, it was the second time Manning has thrown multiple touchdown passes for 45+ yards and his first time since UTSA in 2024.

- Manning became the second SEC player this century with multiple pass TD, a rushing TD and a receiving TD in a game. The other was South Carolina's Connor Shaw in the 2013 Capital One Bowl (played January 1, 2014 - 3 pass, 1 rush, 1 rec).
- Manning was the first FBS player with at least three pass TD, one rush TD and one receiving TD in a game since Florida State's Jordan Travis in 2022 (at Syracuse - 3 pass, 1 rush, 1 rec). It matches Manning's career high for total TD (pass+rush+rec) along with last year against UTSA and this year against San Jose State and Sam Houston.
- Manning was the first FBS player with 300 pass yards, three pass TD, one rush TD and one receiving TD in a game since Texas State's Tyler Jones in 2016. The only other power conference players to do that this century are Kansas State's Josh Cribbs (2003 & 2004), Northwestern's Mike Kafka (2009) and South Carolina's Connor Shaw (2013 Capital One Bowl)
- Manning was the fourth FBS player this century with at least four pass TD, one rush TD and one receiving TD in a single game. The others were Ohio State's Terrelle Pryor (2010), North Illinois' Jordan Lynch (2013) and Texas State's Tyler Jones (2016).
- Manning averaged 21.6 yards per completion vs. Arkansas, the highest average by a Texas player (min. 15 completions) since Chris Simms in 2000 against Texas A&M (23.9). It is the highest average in an SEC game since LSU's Jayden Daniels in 2023 against Florida (21.9).
- Manning was the second Texas QB since the beginning of the Big 12 era (1996) with three games of 300 pass yards and three pass TD against conference opponents. The other was Casey Thompson in 2021. The only other SEC QB to match that this season is Tennessee's Joey Aguilar (also with three).
- Manning earned his first career SEC Offensive Player of the Week honor on Nov. 3 following his outing in UT's 34-31 win over No. 9/11 Vanderbilt on Nov. 1, 2025. Manning also was named a Manning Award "Star of the Week" for the second-straight week in addition to being listed on the Davey O'Brien Award's "Great 8" list.
- With the win over No. 9/11 Vanderbilt on Nov. 1, 2025, Manning became the fourth UT quarterback since 1999 to throw for 300+ yards and three touchdowns in consecutive games.
- Manning posted his second-straight game of 300-plus yards passing and three passing touchdowns as he led the Longhorns to a 34-31 win over No. 9 Vanderbilt on Nov. 1. It was the first time a Texas quarterback accomplished that in consecutive games since Sam Ehlinger in November 2018. He is also the fourth UT quarterback to reach both marks in three games in a season since 1999, joining Major Applewhite (1999), Colt McCoy (2009), and Casey Thompson (2021). Overall, Manning completed 25-of-33 attempts for 328 yards and three touchdowns in guiding the Longhorns to their second top-10 win of the season and their fourth-straight victory overall. It was also the first time in 30 years Texas had eight different receivers with multiple catches and at least 15 yards receiving each. Manning opened the game with a 75-yard touchdown connection to Ryan Wingo on the first play of the game, his third 75-yard touchdown pass in the last two seasons, the third-most among FBS quarterbacks in that time. Manning later registered six-yard touchdown passes to both CJ Baxter and Emmett Mosley V as the Longhorns built a 34-10 lead through the first three quarters.
- Manning was named a Manning Award "Star of the Week" on Oct. 27, 2025 after his effort in Texas' 45-38 overtime road win at Mississippi State on Oct. 25. completed a career-high 29 passes on 46 attempts (63.0%) for a career-high 346 yards and three touchdowns, while also rushing for a touchdown in Texas' 45-38 overtime win on the road at Mississippi State. Manning led the Longhorns' rally from twice being down by 17 points, including with 26 seconds left in the third quarter and 12:29 to go in the fourth quarter, tying for the

seventh-largest comeback win in program history. In both instances, Manning and the Longhorns answered with touchdown drives to get back within 10 points. Manning connected with wide receiver Ryan Wingo for three passes of 45-plus yards, including a 60-yarder on the opening offensive play of the game, and later a 47-yarder and a 62-yarder.

- Manning was stellar in Texas' 26-3 win over No. 6/6 Oklahoma on Oct. 11, 2025, completing a then-career-high 21 passes (21-for-27) and a score. He also ran four times for 36 yards (8.5 ypc).
- In Texas' SEC opener at Florida on Oct. 4, 2025, Manning completed 16-of-29 passes for 263 yards and two touchdowns while throwing a pair of interceptions. Manning was also Texas' leading rusher, accounting for 300 of UT's 341 yards of total offense.
- Manning is one of 10 SEC players this century to run and pass for at least five TDs in the first four games of a season after doing so in 2025. The only ones of that group to have more than Manning's nine TD passes were Tim Tebow, Johnny Manziel, Matt Corral and Jalen Milroe (10 each).
- Manning had a strong performance vs. Sam Houston on Sept. 20, 2025, to close out non-conference play, completing 18-of-21 passes for a season high 309 passing yards and three touchdowns. Manning also added a pair of scores on his legs to account for five total touchdowns and 320 yards of total offense.
- With his performance vs. Sam Houston on Sept. 20, 2025, Manning became the third Texas QB since 2000 to have multiple games of 300+ pass yards and 80% completion rate, joining Colt McCoy (4) and David Ash (3). Manning is the fourth Texas QB this century with two passing touchdowns and two rushing touchdowns in a game, joining Sam Ehlinger, Colt McCoy and Vince Young.
- Manning is the first SEC QB to record 300+ passing yards, 3+ passing TDs and 2+ rushing TDs in a single game since Joe Milton III (Tennessee) on 11/25/2023.

- In the home opener vs. San Jose State (Sept. 30, 2025), Manning completed 63 percent of his passes for 295 yards (19-of-30), while mounting five total touchdowns. Manning became the fifth Texas quarterback to throw at least four touchdown passes in the first half of a game in the last 30 years, joining Vince Young (Nov. 12, 2005), Sam Ehlinger (Sept. 12, 2020), Casey Thompson (Oct. 9, 2021) and Quinn Ewers (Dec. 2, 2023 & Nov. 9, 2024). Manning's career-long 83-yard strike to Parker Livingstone in the first quarter was the longest passing touchdown by a Texas player since Jerrod Heard hit John Burt for an 84-yard score on Nov. 7, 2015.
- Over the past 15 years, just three SEC players have had multiple games with 4+ pass TDs and 1+ rush TDs as an underclassmen: Texas A&M's Johnny Manziel (3 in 2012-13), Alabama's Tua Tagovailoa (2 in 2018) and now Texas' Arch Manning (2 - vs. San Jose State in 2025, vs. UTSA in 2024).
- In his first career start on the road at No. 3/2 Ohio State in the 2025 season opener on Aug. 30, Manning finished 17-of-30 for 170 passing yards with one touchdown and an interception. Manning also added 38 yards on the ground, accounting for 208 yards of total offense for the Horns.
- As a redshirt freshman in 2024, Manning saw action in 10 games with the two starts, completing 61-of-91 passes (68 percent) for 939 yards and nine touchdowns.

He was named the SEC's Co-Freshman of the Week on Sept. 16, 2024, was placed on the Davey O'Brien's Great 8 list on Sept. 16, and named the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose National Player of the Week on Sept. 17. He added 25 carries for 108 yards and four touchdowns.

- Taking over for an injured Quinn Ewers vs. UTSA on Sept. 14, 2024, redshirt freshman Manning led Texas to two wins in two starts on the Forty Acres.
- In the 35-13 victory against Mississippi State to open conference play on Sept. 28, 2024, Manning established new career highs in completions (26), 83.9 completion percentage and passing yards (325). Manning tossed two touchdowns and accounted for three total after recording a one-yard rushing touchdown.
- Manning was the first Texas freshman with 300+ pass yards, 2+ pass TD and no interceptions since Colt McCoy in the 2006 Alamo Bowl against Iowa (308 yards, 2 TD, 0 INT).
- Manning was the first Texas QB to have 300+ pass yards and no interceptions in the team's first conference game of a season since Major Applewhite in 1999 at Baylor (333).
- After recording a 67-yard touchdown run vs. UTSA on Sept. 14, 2024, Arch Manning was the fifth SEC freshman QB in the last 15 years to have a 65+ yard touchdown run, joining South Carolina's LaNorris Sellers (did so on Saturday) Florida's Anthony Richardson (2021) Auburn's Malik Willis (2017) and Texas A&M's Johnny Manziel (2012).
- Arch Manning's 75-yard TD pass (tied for seventh-longest by a UT freshman) to Ryan Wingo and 67-yard TD run (longest ever by a UT freshman) against UTSA marked the first time in UT history that a player recorded a 65-yard-plus pass and run in the same game. Colt McCoy (2009) and Vince Young (2003 and 2005) are the only other players in UT history to post a passing and rushing play of 65 or more yards in the same season.
- McCoy had three 65-plus TD passes (68t vs. Kansas, 78t vs. ULM, 88t UCF) and a 65-yard TD run at Texas A&M in 2009. Young recorded a 75-yard TD pass vs. Texas Tech and posted an 80-yard TD run at Oklahoma State in 2005. He also recorded a 67-yard TD pass at Oklahoma State and 65-yard TD run vs. Nebraska in 2003.
- In the last 25 years, only one FBS or NFL QB has had a 75+ yard TD pass, a 65+ yard TD run & another 50+ yard TD pass all in the same game. That one QB was Arch Manning. He did it in a span of 15:10 of game time in a game he didn't even start (via OptaStats).
- Manning's 67-yard rushing touchdown was the longest by a UT quarterback since Vince Young was credited with an 80-yard scoring run in the third quarter against Oklahoma State on Oct. 29, 2005.
- The redshirt-freshman's 67-yard rushing touchdown was the longest scoring run by a Longhorn football student-athlete since Jaydon Blue reached the end zone on the ground from 69 yards out during the second quarter of Texas' 57-7 win over Texas Tech on Nov. 24, 2023. Blue has since run for a 77-yarder against Clemson.
- Manning set a single-game high in passing touchdowns with four after throwing one to DeAndre Moore, Jr., during the second quarter and then connecting with Isaiah Bond to open the third quarter.
- Manning's 12-yard touchdown pass to Cook II early in the fourth quarter marked the first time a UT quarterback has accounted for 5-or-more touchdowns in a game since Casey Thompson had six in the Longhorns' 70-35 win against Texas Tech on Sept. 25, 2021.
- Manning's five (four passing, one rushing) touchdowns on the night are the most touchdowns accounted for by a UT freshman quarterback since Colt McCoy had six (six passing) against Baylor on Oct. 14, 2006.

TWO-HEADED MONSTER IN THE BACKFIELD

- Running backs Raleek Brown and Hollywood Smothers transferred to Texas in spring 2026 and look to have an immediate impact. Texas returns RBs Ryan Niblett (Sr.) Michael Terry III (So.) and James Simon (So.) and added two freshmen in Derrek Cooper and Jett Walker.
- Hollywood Smothers is one of two Texas players in the last 20 seasons to have at least 250 scrimmage yards, multiple rushing touchdowns and a touchdown reception through the first three games of a season. The only other Texas player to accomplish that feat was former UT RB, Bijan Robinson, who did so in both 2021 and 2022.
- The Horns posted a season-high 228 rushing yards against UTSA on Sept. 19. Four different running backs totaled at least 39 yards on the ground in senior Hollywood Smothers (10 carries, 54 yards, 5.4 ypc), freshman Derrek Cooper (11 carries, 44 yards, 4 ypc), fifth-year Raleek Brown (10 carries, 45 yards, 4.1 ypc) and sophomore Michael Terry III (seven carries, 39 yards, 5.6 ypc).
- Texas ran for 141 yards (3.4 ypc) in its 24-23 victory against No. 1/1 Ohio State on Sept. 12. Smothers paced Texas with 21 carries for 74 yards (3.5 ypc) and two touchdowns in the win over the Buckeyes, including the game-tying 1-yard run with 25 seconds remaining in the game. Brown was Texas' second-leading rusher after carrying the ball 10 times for 54 yards (5.4 ypc).
- The Texas running back room accounted for 156 yards on the ground and three scores in UT's season opener against Texas State on Sept. 5.
- Smothers led Texas with seven touches for 72 yards (7 ypc) to go along with three receptions for 28 yards and a touchdown against Texas State. Smothers notched 100 yards of total offense vs. the Bobcats.
- Brown's Texas debut, he registered 11 carries for 34 yards (3.1 ypc) and two touchdowns while collecting one reception for 11 yards.
- Texas is one of three FBS schools to have multiple players on its roster who rushed for at least 900 yards at the FBS level in 2025 in Brown and Smothers. The other two programs are Auburn and Western Michigan.
- Brown and Smothers both made the preseason Doak Walker Award watch list on Aug. 17. It marks the second-consecutive year Smothers has earned a spot on the preseason watch list for the award, while Brown is a first-time selection.
- Brown and Smothers look to join a prestigious quartet of Longhorns who have won the Doak Walker Award, which began in 1990. Ricky Williams was a two-time winner, bringing home the trophy in 1997 and 1998, while Cedric Benson collected it in 2004, D'Onta Foreman won the honor in 2016, and Bijan Robinson earned it 2022. Texas' five all-time Doak Walker Award trophies are tied

for the most by an FBS school with Wisconsin. In 2023, former UT running back Jonathon Brooks was named a semifinalist for the award. Brown and Smothers are the fourth Texas running back duo to be selected to the preseason watch list for the award in the last five years.

- Brown is a fifth-year running back who transferred to Texas from Arizona State in spring 2026. The Stockton, Calif., product played three seasons at Arizona State (2023-25) after his began his collegiate career at USC in 2022. Last year at Arizona State, Brown played in 12 games and ran for 1,141 yards on 186 carries, averaging 6.1 yards per touch and 95.1 yards per game while recording four rushing touchdowns. Brown also caught 34 passes for 239 yards (7.0 ypc) and two scores. Brown set a program record for rushing yards in a road game after totaling 255 yards on 22 carries (11.6 ypc) in ASU's 42-17 win at Colorado on Nov. 22, 2025. Brown concluded the regular season with 1,446 all-purpose yards (1.141 rushing, 239 receiving, 35 kickoff return, 31 punt return), averaging 120.5 all-purpose yards per contest. Brown became the only student-athlete in Arizona State program history since 1996 to reach 140-plus rushing yards on 12 or fewer carries in a single game after running for 144 yards on 12 attempts vs. Texas State on Sept. 13. Brown logged 110 yards on the ground on 18 attempts at Mississippi State on Sept. 6. He also reeled in three receptions for 10 yards against the Bulldogs. Brown had 21 carries for 80 yards at Baylor on Sept. 20 and also caught three passes for 23 yards against the Bears. Brown posted 134 yards on 21 carries against No. 24 TCU on Sept. 26 and made nine receptions for 50 yards vs. the Horned Frogs, compiling 184 yards of total offense. Brown carried the ball 14 times for 67 yards at Utah on Oct. 11 in addition to two catches for 17 yards. He recorded 19 rushes for 69 yards and a touchdown vs. No. 7 Texas Tech on Oct. 18. He also had four receptions for 15 yards vs. the Red Raiders. Brown tallied 64 yards on the ground on 11 carries while snaring two receptions for 20 yards against Houston on Oct. 25. Brown logged 16 rushes for 64 yards in addition to eight receiving yards on two receptions at Iowa State on Nov. 1. Brown filed 53 rushing yards and grabbed three receptions for 29 yards and a score vs. West Virginia on Nov. 15. Brown ran for a career-high 255 yards on 22 carries (11.6 ypc) against Colorado, including a season-long 88-yard run for a touchdown. Brown also caught a 33-yard touchdown pass against the Buffaloes, accounting for 288 yards of total offense. Brown wrapped up the regular season with a 63-yard rushing effort vs. Arizona on Nov. 28.
- A senior who transferred to Texas from NC State in spring 2026, Smothers received Preseason All-SEC Third Team praise on July 24. He played two seasons at NC State from 2024-25 after beginning his collegiate career at Oklahoma in 2023. The Charlotte, N.C., native started in 11 games with the Wolfpack in 2025, totaling 160 carries for 939 yards and six touchdowns and averaging 5.9 ypc and 85.4 ypg. Smothers posted four 100-yard rushing performances en route to earning 2025 First-Team All-ACC honors. Smothers displayed his versatility after hauling in 37 passes for 189 yards and a score. In NC State's season opener on Aug. 28, 2025, Smothers rushed for 76 yards and a touchdown while adding four receptions for 30 yards, accounting for 106 yards of total offense. Smothers charted 17 carries for 140 yards (8.2 ypc) and a season-high two touchdowns to go along with two receptions for 13 yards vs. Virginia on Sept. 6. He followed up that performance with a career-high 164-yard rushing yards on 24 attempts (6.8 ypc) at Wake Forest on Sept. 11. Smothers recorded 17 rushes for 123 yards (7.2 ypc) and a score at Duke on Sept. 20, while he also registered five receptions for 41 yards to amass 164 yards of total offense against the Blue Devils. Smothers compiled his fourth 100-yard effort of the season after running for 123 yards on four attempts (30.8 ypc) and a touchdown vs. Campbell on Oct. 4. He also collected two catches for 30 yards and a touchdown vs. Campbell. Smothers ran for 46 yards on 12 attempts and gathered

WEAPONS AT WIDEOUT

• Junior wide receiver Ryan Wingo, who led Texas in receptions (54), receiving yards (834), touchdowns (7) and yards per game (64.2) in 2025, returns for his third season on the Forty Acres. Junior WR Emmett Mosley V also returns after playing in nine games last season. Mosley pulled in 28 receptions for 408 yards (14.6 ypc) and three touchdowns.

• Texas added junior WR Cam Coleman via transfer portal in the offseason.

• Sophomores Daylan McCutcheon (10 games, seven receptions, 74 yards) and Kaliq Lockett (five games, five receptions, 47 yards, 1 TD) return to Texas' wide receiver room as well.

• Coleman pulled in a team-high four receptions for 59 yards and two touchdowns in Texas' victory over UTSA on Sept. 12. It was Coleman's fourth career multi-touchdown performance and his second in three games with the Longhorns.

• Mosley led Texas with five receptions for 65 yards in the win against No. 1/1 Ohio State on Sept. 12. Coleman caught four passes for 49 yards, and Wingo had four receptions for 22 yards and a touchdown.

• Wingo had a monster season opener against Texas State on Sept. 5, reeling in seven receptions for 121 yards (17.2 ypc) and a touchdown. Wingo recorded 31 yards after catch. It was Wingo's third career 100-yard receiving effort.

• Wingo became the first Longhorn with 100 receiving yards in a season opener since former Texas WR Jordan Whittington had 113 yards on seven receptions in the 2021 season opener against No. 23/23 Louisiana.

• Wingo became the third Texas player in the last 30 years to have at least seven receptions and 120 receiving yards in a season opener. He joins Collin Johnson (2017) and Jordan Shipley (2009) in that category.

• Coleman, a junior, made his Texas debut against Texas State on Sept. 5. Coleman pulled in three receptions for 70 yards and two touchdowns vs. the Bobcats. It was Coleman's third career multi-touchdown effort and his first since Nov. 23, 2024, when he was a freshman at Auburn.

• Coleman was placed on the preseason watch list for the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award, Biletnikoff Award, Walter Camp Player of the Year Award and Maxwell Award. Coleman was tabbed to Walter Camp's All-America Preseason First Team and the SEC's Preseason First Team by the league's media and coaches.

Coleman, a first-year player at Texas, transferred to Texas from Auburn in spring 2026. Coleman appeared in 23 career games with 22 starts across two seasons at Auburn in 2024-25. As a sophomore in 2025, Coleman started all 12 games and led the Tigers with 708 receiving yards on 56 receptions and five touchdowns. He averaged 12.6 yards per catch and 59 receiving yards per contest.

• Coleman pulled in seven receptions for 77 yards (11 ypc) against Ball State on Sept. 6 and caught two passes for 49 yards (24.5 ypc) and a score against South

Alabama on Sept. 13. The Phenix City, Ala., product gathered three receptions for 88 yards (29.3 ypc) and a touchdown at Oklahoma on Sept. 20. He posted six receptions for 107 yards (18 ypc) vs. Missouri on Oct. 18.

Coleman had a career game at Vanderbilt on Nov. 8, recording career highs in receptions with 10 and receiving yards with 143 (14.3 avg) to go along with a touchdown. In the penultimate game of the 2025 season, Coleman grabbed five passes for 65 yards (13 ypc) and a touchdown vs. Mercer on Nov. 22. In the Iron Bowl vs. Alabama on Nov. 29, he snared four receptions for 26 yards (6.5 ypc).

• Wingo earned a spot on the Biletnikoff Award and was selected to the All-SEC preseason Third Team. Wingo is a third-year player who has seen action in 30 career games with 16 starts. The St. Louis native was a Coaches' All-SEC Second Team selection in 2025. As a sophomore in 2025, Wingo started in all 13 games and led Texas with 54 receptions for 834 yards (15.4 ypc) and seven touchdowns, averaging 64.2 yards per game. Wingo had five games with 70+ receiving yards, including a career-high 184-yard performance at Mississippi State on Oct. 25, 2025. Wingo snared four catches for 93 yards (23.2 ypc) and a career-best two touchdowns against Sam Houston on Sept. 20. Wingo also charted a 32-yard carry, manufacturing 125 yards of total offense

vs. the Bearkats. On the road at Florida on Oct. 4, Wingo caught four passes for 73 yards and a score, including a 38-yard receiving touchdown. At the Allstate Red River Rivalry vs. No. 6/6 Oklahoma, Wingo led the Horns with five receptions that totaled 35 receiving yards. On the road at Mississippi State on Oct. 25, Wingo gathered five receptions for a career-high 184 yards, including a then-season-long 62-yard reception. Wingo followed that performance with a two-catch, 89-yard outing with a touchdown vs. No. 9/11 Vanderbilt on Nov. 1. At No. 5/5 Georgia on Nov. 15, Wingo caught nine passes for 62 yards and a touchdown. In Texas' second-to-last regular season game of the year vs. Arkansas on Nov. 22, Wingo collected six receptions for 81 yards. In the Cotton Holdings Lone Star Showdown vs. No. 3/3 Texas A&M on Nov. 28, Wingo hauled in four receptions for 34 yards and pulled in a 29-yard touchdown from QB Arch Manning. Wingo finished the season with a four-reception, 64-yard effort against No. 18/17/18 Michigan in the Cheez-It Citrus Bowl on Dec. 31 in Orlando, Fla.

The Houston product had two receptions for seven yards and had a rushing TD against No. 3/2 Texas A&M in the Cotton Holdings Lone Star Showdown on Nov. 28, 2025.

- Winston has played in nine career games, including all three games with one start in 2026. Winston made his first career start against UTSA on Sept. 12. Winston had a career-high three receptions for 39 yards in the win vs. No. 1/1 Ohio State on Sept. 12. Winston caught two passes for 25 yards vs. Texas State on Sept. 5.
- Masunas transferred to Texas from Michigan State in spring 2026. Masunas saw his first action as a Longhorn in Texas' season opener vs. Texas State on Sept. 5 and has played in 27 career games across four seasons. Masunas played in 24 career games across three seasons at Michigan State. In 2025, Masunas played in all 12 games with eight starts. He posted a career-high 19 catches for 232 yards and three TDs last seasons. Against Boston College on Sept. 6, 2025, Masunas grabbed three receptions for 31 yards and a score. He followed that up with a 28-yard touchdown reception against Youngstown State on Sept. 13. At Michigan on Oct. 25, Masunas had a 21-yard TD reception. GOOSBY NAMED CAPITAL ONE ORANGE BOWL-FWAA COURAGE AWARD NOMINEE

- Goosby was announced as a nominee for the 2026 Capital One Orange Bowl-FWAA Courage Award, the FWAA announced on Sept. 16. Goosby, a fourth-year left tackle, has overcome open-heart surgery as a teenager, along with multiple other injuries, to become a leader for the now top-ranked Longhorns. Goosby underwent open-heart surgery as a 16-year-old after doctors noticed a heart murmur during a physical for athletes who had previously had COVID-19. Further testing uncovered Atrium Septal Defect, a birth condition in which a hole separates the heart's upper chambers. Goosby had previously shown no known signs of the condition outside of fatigue during basketball games.

- At SEC Media Days in Tampa, Fla., this summer, Goosby wore a pin lapel that said "Every 15 minutes," calling attention to the fact that a child is born with a heart condition every 15 minutes in America. Goosby held a camp that benefitted The Children's Heart Foundation (CHF), the nation's leading organization dedicated solely to funding research on congenital heart defects, in July 2026. As part of the initiative, Goosby personally matched donations made to The Children's Heart Foundation through the campaign.

- Goosby earned the Outland Trophy's National Player of the Week and Co-SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week following Texas' win over No. 1/1 Ohio State on Sept. 12.
- Texas has won two of the last three Outland Trophies and five overall. Former Longhorn left tackle Kelvin Banks Jr. won the prestigious award in 2024 and former Texas defensive tackle T'Vondre Sweat took home the trophy in 2023. Former Texas defensive tackle Scott Appleton (1963), linebacker Tommy Nobis (1965) and defensive tackle Brad Shearer (1977) have also won the award. Earlier this week, Goosby picked up his second career SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week honor.

- Goosby powered Texas to its first 20-plus-point comeback in the fourth quarter against a No. 1 team in 22 years in Texas' 24-23 win over No. 1/1 Ohio State at DKR-Texas Memorial Stadium on Sept. 12. It was the second-largest fourth-quarter comeback and the fourth-largest overall comeback in program history. The Longhorns moved to 2-0 and captured their 11th-consecutive victory at home, including their fourth-straight win at home against a ranked opponent, which leads the nation.

- Goosby was the top-graded offensive lineman and allowed no sacks and just one pressure on 46 pass blocks

against Ohio State. The Longhorns' offense manufactured three-consecutive touchdown drives to end the game.

Goosby's impact was most important in the fourth quarter, as each of the Longhorns' three-consecutive touchdown drives to end the game took at least 12 plays and covered at least 72 yards to overcome a 23-3 deficit.

The first two drives (15 and 13 plays) included clutch fourth-down conversions in Texas territory to keep the rally alive.

- In the fourth quarter alone, Goosby and the offensive line helped the Longhorns compile 150 yards of total offense – 83 passing and 67 rushing – in outgaining the Buckeyes, 150-52. Including the final drive of the third quarter, Texas totaled 236 total yards in the last 21 minutes of the game. The Longhorns became the only team in the past 15 years to close a victory with three-straight touchdown drives of 12 or more plays.

- Goosby was named to the preseason watch lists for the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award, Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy in addition to First-Team All-America honors from Walter Camp and preseason All-SEC First Team recognition from the league's media and coaches.

- With help from the offensive line, Texas carved up 400 yards of total offense against UTSA on Sept. 19. The Longhorns had a season-high 228 yards on the ground with five different players reaching 39+ yards. Texas did not turn the ball over all game.

- Behind the o-line in the comeback win against No. 1/1 Ohio State on Sept. 12, the Longhorns' offense manufactured three-consecutive touchdown drives to end the game (all of at least 12 plays and 72 yards) and rally from a 23-3 deficit. Texas became the only team in the past 15 years to close a victory with three-straight touchdown drives of 12 or more plays, which were 15, 13 and 12 plays, respectively. Those included fourth down conversions in Texas territory that kept the first two of the scoring drives alive. It marked the third-largest comeback win by any FBS team against an AP No. 1 team this century, while Texas became the first non-conference opponent this century to score 21-plus points in the fourth quarter against Ohio State (first overall team since Michigan on in 2022). During the fourth quarter, the Longhorns compiled 150 yards of total offense, including 83 in the air and 67 on the ground, outgaining the Buckeyes, 150-52. Including the final drive of the third quarter, Texas totaled 236 total yards in the last 21 minutes of the game.

- Behind the o-line, Texas produced 516 yards of total offense, averaging 7.0 yards per play in the 59-7 season opener against Texas State on Sept. 5. Texas' 59 points were the second-most the Horns have scored in a single game during the Sarkisian era.

- Goosby, Baker, Hutson and Robertson were starters on a 2025 offensive line that protected QB Arch Manning vs. No. 3/2 Ohio State on Aug. 30. Manning completed 17-of-30 passes for 170 yards and a touchdown against

the Buckeyes. In UT's home opener vs. San Jose State on Sept. 6, they paved the way for 472 yards of total offense and provided a clean pocket for Manning, who went 19-for-30 for 295 yards and four touchdowns while powering UT's run game to 155 yards on the ground. They helped Texas' offense generate 607 total offensive yards in the Week 4 win vs. Sam Houston on Sept. 20. They enabled Manning to complete 18-of-21 passes for 309 yards and three passing touchdowns. The offensive line also allowed for 264 rushing yards, including a 50-yard scramble by QB Matthew Caldwell, as well as four rushing touchdowns vs. Sam Houston. They contained the No. 6/6 Oklahoma defense on Oct. 11 to help Texas generate 302 yards of total offense in the win vs. the Sooners. Manning finished the game completing 21-of-27 passes for 166 yards and a score. They protected Manning, who completed 25-of-33 passes for 328 yards and three touchdowns against No. 9/11 Vanderbilt on Nov. 1. In Texas' home win vs. Arkansas on Nov. 22, the offensive line spearheaded Texas' offense to 52 points against the Razorbacks. Manning aired it out with 389 passing yards and four touchdowns vs. the Hogs. Goosby was named Co-SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week on Dec. 1 following his performance in Texas' 27-17 win over No. 3/3/3 Texas A&M. In that game, Goosby was the highest-graded offensive lineman and allowed no sacks and no pressures while helping pave the way for 218 rushing yards and 397 total yards of offense against the nation's 15th-ranked total defense. They blocked for RB Quintrevion Wisner, who ran for a season-high 155 rushing yards on 19 attempts while averaging 8.2 yards per carry. In the Cheez-It Citrus Bowl against Michigan, the o-line helped Texas put up 41 points and register 456 yards of total offense vs. the Wolverines. Manning ran for 155 yards and two scores, including a 60-yard rush in the fourth quarter. They provided a clean pocket for Manning, who threw for 221 yards and two touchdowns while the Texas run game amassed 235 yards on the ground.

CAN'T CONTAIN COLIN

- Junior EDGE Colin Simmons is back for his third season with the Longhorns. Across three seasons at Texas, Simmons has played in 32 career games with 16 starts and became the program's first winner of the Shaun Alexander Freshman of the Year Award in 2024.
- Seeing action in the first half vs. UTSA on Sept. 19, Simmons had a solo sack for a loss of five yards against the Roadrunners.
- Simmons finished with two tackles for a loss of nine yards, including a sack for a loss of eight yards, in Texas' win over No. 1/1 Ohio State on Sept. 12.
- Simmons opened the 2026 season with one tackle, including a 0.5 tackle for loss, a quarterback hurry and recovered a fumble against Texas State on Sept. 5.
- Simmons has recorded a sack in seven of his last eight games heading into Saturday vs. Tennessee. Simmons has 9.5 sacks in 10 career games against AP Top 10 opponents.
- The Dallas native was on the preseason watch lists for the Bednarik Award, Allstate Wuerffel Trophy, Lombardi Award and Bronko Nagurski Trophy. The Dallas native was recognized on the Walter Camp preseason First-Team All-America and was named a preseason First-Team All-SEC selection by the league's media and coaches.
- Simmons, a third-year EDGE, started in all 13 games for the Longhorns in 2025 and was tabbed to the Coaches' All-SEC First Team. Simmons led Texas with 15.5 tackles for loss, 12.0 sacks, 15 pressures, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. His 12.0 sacks led the SEC and ranked fifth in the FBS. Simmons hauled in four SEC weekly honors last season.
- Simmons 61 quarterback pressures last season were a single-season program record. His 12.0 sacks ranked eighth all-time in single-season program history.
- In the Cheez-It Citrus Bowl victory over No. 18/17/18 Michigan on Dec. 31, Simmons compiled 2.0 tackles for a loss of 10 yards, including a sack for a loss of eight yards.

- Against Texas A&M on Nov. 28, 2025, Simmons made three tackles (two solo), one sack for a loss of a yard, three pressures and a pass break-up.
- Simmons collected his fourth SEC Defensive Lineman of the Week honor of the season for his performance in the win over Arkansas on Nov. 22, 2025. Simmons recorded five tackles, 1.5 tackles for loss, one sack, a career-high four pressures and a forced fumble that was returned by Liona Lefau for a 52-yard touchdown in Texas' 52-37 win over Arkansas.
- Against No. 9/11 Vanderbilt on Nov. 1, 2025, Simmons produced a strip-sack and also made the recovery on the first Vanderbilt possession of the game to go along with five tackles, 1.5 tackles for loss and two pressures in Texas' 34-31 win over the No. 9 Commodores. The recovery set up the UT offense at the Vanderbilt 29-yard line, which it converted for field goal and a 10-0 lead on the way to the win. On the Commodore's next possession, Simmons pressured the quarterback into an incomplete pass on third-and-11 at midfield to force a punt. The Texas offense then drove 83 yards on that possession for a 17-0 lead. On the following Vanderbilt possession, Simmons registered a tackle for no gain and a half tackle for a four-yard loss, helping limit the Commodores to a field goal on the possession. Overall, Simmons' efforts helped the Texas defense post six sacks, twice as many as quarterback Diego Pavia has ever suffered in a game in his career.
- On the road at Mississippi State on Oct. 25, 2025, Simmons finished with six tackles and a quarterback hurry.
- Simmons was named the SEC Co-Defensive Lineman of the Week for the second-consecutive week on Oct. 20, 2025. He had four solo tackles, including 3.0 sacks for a loss of 10 yards and a forced fumble.
- He collected 2.5 sacks as part of five tackles to help the Texas defense keep rival No. 6 Oklahoma out the end zone in a 23-6 victory in the Allstate Red River Rivalry in Dallas on Oct. 11, 2025. Simmons' first sack came early in the second quarter with Oklahoma having reached the UT 24-yard line. It was for five yards and set the tone of the series that eventually ended in a stop by the Longhorns to hold the Sooners to just a field goal and a 6-0 lead. His next sack came in with 6:23 left in the fourth quarter and Texas leading 20-6. Oklahoma was at the UT 35-yard line with a 3rd-and-20 and it forced a fourth down that Oklahoma went for but failed to convert to give the ball back to Texas. His final half sack came on the Sooners' final drive for a loss of 12 yards resulting in a 3rd-and-22. Oklahoma would be limited to only 258 total yards in the game, including just 88 in the second half after entering the game averaging 415.2 yards per and 33.8 points per game.
- The sophomore had a monster game vs. Florida on Oct. 4, 2025, registering four tackles, one tackle for a loss of three yards, one pass break-up and two quarterback hurries.
- Simmons made one sack for a loss of two yards vs. Sam Houston on Sept. 20, 2025.
- Against San Jose State on Sept. 6, 2025, Simmons posted five tackles (two solo), two quarterback hurries and a 0.5 tackle for three yards.
- Simmons opened the 2025 campaign at Ohio State on Aug. 30, earning his first career start. He finished with two tackles (one solo) and a quarterback hurry vs. the Buckeyes.
- The Dallas native had a breakout year in his first season on the Forty Acres, emerging as a standout on an elite Texas defense. Simmons appeared in all 16 games last season, leading the team with 9.0 sacks for a loss of 64 yards and ranking second on the squad in tackles for loss (14.0-73), quarterback hurries (nine) and forced fumbles (three).
- Simmons compiled 48 total tackles (31 solo), an interception and two pass break-ups as a true freshman in 2024. Simmons led all FBS freshmen in total sacks, while his nine sacks are the third-most by a freshman in

program single-season history. During the postseason, Simmons carded 15 quarterback pressures, the third-most among all FBS defenders.

- With Simmons' help in 2024, the UT defense ranked No. 1 in the FBS in passes intercepted with 22. Texas also ranked second nationally in turnovers gained (30) and team passing efficiency defense (104.56), third in total defense (283.4 ypg) and red zone defense (0.692), fourth in scoring defense (15.3 ppg), seventh in passing yards allowed (173.8 ypg), ninth in third-down conversion percentage defense (0.314), 13th in rushing defense (109.6 ypg), 15th in team sacks (2.88) and 22nd in team tackles for loss (7.0). UT shut out opponents in the first half in three of the last four games to cap the regular season – all conference opponents. The Horns finished the regular season giving up just four passing touchdowns – which tied with Ohio State for the fewest in the FBS.

TALKIN' TURNOVERS

- In the first play of the game in the 30-6 victory over UTSA on Sept. 19, senior LB Rasheem Biles picked off UTSA QB Owen McCown. It was UTSA's first turnover during the 2026 season - heading into the game, UTSA was just one of only 20 turnover-free FBS teams. It was Biles' second interception in three games at Texas and his fifth career interception. Texas extended its streak to 26-consecutive home games with a takeaway which leads the FBS.
- Sophomore DB Graceson Littleton picked off Ohio State QB Julian Sayin' to clinch the win vs. No. 1/1 Ohio State on Sept. 12. With the interception, Texas has forced a turnover in 25-straight home games, which is the longest active streak in the FBS.
- The Longhorns defense didn't skip a beat in UT's 59-7 season opening win against Texas State on Sept. 5. Texas forced three Texas State turnovers (two fumbles, one interception).
- Texas has registered 59 takeaways since 2024, which ties for the second-most in the FBS during that period (60 - Notre Dame; 59-Texas; 59-BYU; 57-Indiana; 56-Texas Tech).
- Texas has forced a turnover in 38 of its last 39 games.
- Texas' 21 turnovers gained in 2025 led the SEC and

ranked 21st in the FBS.

- UT registered 16 interceptions in 2025, which ranked second in the SEC and 12th in the FBS.
- Texas' defense recorded at least 40 sacks and 15 interceptions in both 2024 and 2025. Prior to the Longhorns, the last FBS team to reach those marks in consecutive seasons was Miami-FL in 2017 and 2018.
- Texas led the SEC and ranked second in the FBS in turnovers gained with 31 in 2024.
- The Longhorns picked off Texas A&M QB Marcel Reed twice on Nov. 28, 2025, - both in the fourth quarter.
- Texas had two takeaways vs. Arkansas on Nov. 22, 2025 - DB Jelani McDonald recorded an interception and EDGE Colin Simmons forced a fumble that was returned for a 53-yard score by LB Liona Lefau.
- UT's three interceptions against Oklahoma on Oct. 11, 2025, were its most in the Red River Rivalry game since 2002.
- Texas had four takeaways in its home opener vs. San Jose State on Sept. 6, 2025, including three forced fumbles and an interception.
- The Horns' four first-half takeaways vs. the Spartans are tied for the most in any half of a game since accomplishing the feat against Kansas on Nov. 11, 2017.
- The Longhorns gained 31 turnovers (22 interceptions, 9 fumbles recovered) in 2024 - the second-most in the FBS.
- UT forced a turnover in all 16 games in 2024 and 24 games in a row overall before its streak was snapped in the 2025 season opener against Ohio State.
- In 16 games in 2024, Texas intercepted 22 passes - the most in the FBS. 13 different UT defenders registered an interception.

- 12 Longhorns return to the 2026 defensive line in Colin Simmons, Zina Umeozulu, Lance Jackson, Smith Orogbo, Colton Vasek, Justus Terry, Myron Charles, Isaiah Coleman, Maraad Watson, Josiah Sharma, Hero Kanu and Alex January.
- Freshman EDGE Richard Wesley led the d-line with three tackles, including a tackle for a loss of a yard, against UTSA on Sept. 19.
- In his Longhorn debut against Texas State on Sept. 5, DL Ian Geffrard led Texas' defensive line with four tackles (two solo). Fifth-year DL Hero Kanu had three stops (one solo), including a team-high 1.5 tackles for a loss of three yards.
- Texas added two defensive linemen via the transfer portal in Ian Geffrard (Arkansas) and Zion Williams (LSU). Texas also added five freshmen to their roster this season in James Johnson, Elijah Ali, Jamarion Carlton, Richard Wesley and Brinley Tita.
- Kanu totaled 30 tackles, 4.0 tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks, one pass breakup and four quarterback hurries across 13 games in 2025.
- Watson recorded 23 tackles (six solo), 1.5 tackles for loss and five quarterback hurries across 12 games in 2025.
- January notched 19 tackles, 2.5 tackles for loss, 1.5 sacks, one pass breakup, two quarterback hurries and a fumble recovery in 10 games in 2025.

GAME NOTES

KANU NAMED NFF CAMPBELL TROPHY SEMIFINALIST

• Fifth-year defensive lineman Hero Kanu was named a semifinalist for the 2026 William V. Campbell Trophy on Sept. 23. Celebrating its 37th year, the Campbell Trophy is a scholar-athlete award that annually recognizes an individual as the absolute best in the nation for his combined academic success, football performance and exemplary leadership.

• Texas has had back-to-back finalists for the Campbell Trophy as former Longhorn linebacker Trey Moore was selected as a finalist in 2025 and former center Jake Majors was named a finalist in 2024. Texas has had two previous winners of the Campbell Trophy in center Dallas Griffin (2007) and defensive end Sam Acho (2010).

• "Hero is an incredible team leader, an awesome teammate and an all-around tremendous student-athlete who we can count on to bring his best to everything he does, every single day," Texas head coach Steve Sarkisian said. "Who he is some of the time is who he is all of the time, and we love that about him. He's as dedicated in the classroom and to his education at Texas as he is as a football player, and he does both at an exceptionally high level. He's a great story of determination, has an amazing attitude and work ethic and sets a great example for all of his teammates. We're extremely proud to have him as our nominee for NFF Scholar Athlete and the William V. Campbell Trophy and certainly feel strongly that he's worthy of that recognition."

• Kanu will graduate in December 2026 with a Communication & Leadership degree and holds a 3.42 cumulative GPA. The Geltendorf, Germany, native was selected to the 2025-26 SEC Academic Honor Roll and was a 2025 member of the Texas Student-Athlete Advisory Committee.

• Over the past two years, Kanu has hosted eight free football camps in Germany and France to inspire young people ranging from six-year-olds to young adults, teaching them the game of American football as well as the discipline, dedication and work ethic necessary to succeed as student-athletes, with the hope they can one day follow in his footsteps and earn a college scholarship. Inspired by the Kicks for Kids program, he donated more than 100 pairs of shoes to local children in need and participated in promotional efforts to raise awareness to the charitable initiative. Kanu has volunteered at the Boys & Girls Club of Austin through Longhorn great and board member Jamaal Charles and served as a celebrity waiter at an event supporting College Football Hall of Famer Derrick Johnson's Defend the Dream Foundation, which provides low-income and inner-city youth with the opportunities and resources to reach their full potential in school and in life. Kanu has sponsored two aspiring student-athletes - one from Germany and one from Nigeria - on trips to America to attend college camps and pursue their athletic and educational dreams, just like he did. Kanu helps support club teams in Germany by providing access to minivans for travel to 9U and 11U flag football games across the country. In support of a UT student organization, Kanu provided free ice cream to students for two hours on campus to help raise awareness for the group and its community activities. Kanu is passionate about growing the game of American football and expanding flag football for opportunities boys and girls around the world.

• Kanu grew up in Geltendorf, Germany, a small community of just over 1,000 residents less than one hour west of Munich. His favorite sport growing up was soccer, where he played goalkeeper and center back at a high-level from age six to 16. As he continued to grow, Kanu eventually became too big for soccer and began transitioning to football. Kanu was first introduced to American football as a 15-year-old in Germany in 2019 by Brandon Collier, a former college football player who founded the international scouting and training organization Premier Prospects International (PPI). Kanu trained with Collier and PPI before taking a huge leap

toward pursuing his football dreams and moving to California in October 2020 as a high school junior. Kanu spoke broken English, had never played organized football and left his family and friends behind in Germany for the opportunity to eventually play college football in America. Kanu played organized football for the first time in the spring of 2021. His parents and siblings have been extremely supportive of his decision to leave home and chase his dream playing football in America. When he first arrived in the U.S., he lived with a host family in Ladera Ranch, Calif., -Seana and Michael Pierce and their son, Evan - and remains very close with them today.

Kanu is a second-year player who has played in 16 games with 15 starts across two seasons at Texas after transferring from Ohio State in spring 2025. Prior to the 2026 season, Kanu garnered preseason Fourth-Team All-America and Second-Team All-SEC honors from Phil Steele. In three starts this season, Kanu has compiled six tackles (four solo), 2.5 tackles for loss, two quarterback hurries and one pass break-up. His 2.5 tackles for loss and two quarterback hurries rank second on the team.

EVERYTHING IS BIGGER IN TEXAS

• ESPN's College GameDay scored its most-watched Week 2 episode ever on Sept. 12 when the show was on the University of Texas campus for the Texas vs. Ohio State matchup. The show averaged 2.7 million viewers and was the seventh most-watched regular season show all-time. The final hour drew 3.4 million viewers.

• A total of 14 million viewers, including a peak of 16.3 million viewers) watched Texas' 24-23 win over No. 1/1 Ohio State on Sept. 12. It was ESPN's most-watched college football game since 2016. It was the most-watched Week 2 game for any network on record.

• The matchup was the most-viewed regular season primetime game since 2012 (Notre Dame/USC).

ALL EYES ON TEXAS

• Texas Football was the second-most-watched program in college football in 2025, according to the Nielsen ratings released Friday. The Longhorns averaged 7.546 million viewers per game during the regular season.

• The Longhorns had a historical year of viewership starting with the most-watched season-opener in college football history (16.6 million at Ohio State) and closing with the most-watched weekday game ever with 13 million against Texas A&M in the Cotton Holdings Lone Star Showdown on Nov. 28. The game against the Aggies was also the third-most viewed game in college football this season.

• All total, Texas registered four of top 20 game audiences on the season, including the best Allstate Red River Rivalry viewing numbers (8.7 million) since 2009 and the best-ever in a Cotton Holdings Lone Star Showdown (13 million). Texas' third-most watched game of the season was on the road at Georgia on Nov. 15 with 10.4 million watching. Additionally, Texas' second-to-last game of regular season vs. Arkansas on Nov. 22 was the most-watched game of the week with 5.6 million tuning in. The Longhorns drew more than four million viewers in six of their 12 games in the regular season.

• Nielsen is the leader in audience measurement for live sports, with two recent enhancements further reinforcing its innovation in the space. Nielsen's Big Data + Panel measurement combines Nielsen's unique, high-quality representative panel measurement with data from cable, satellite set-top boxes and smart TVs across 45 million households and 75 million devices.

PRESEASON ALL-SEC LONGHORNS

• First-team honorees Rasheem Biles (LB), Cam Coleman (WR), Trevor Goosby (OL), Ryan Niblett (RS) and Colin Simmons (EDGE) headline 11 Texas Football standouts who earned 2026 Preseason Coaches All-SEC distinction.

• Texas and Georgia placed a league-leading 11 players on the 2026 Preseason Coaches All-SEC Team. Texas and LSU each had a conference-best five First-Team All-SEC representatives.

• QB Arch Manning was selected to the second team, while OL Brandon Baker, LS Trey Dubuc, WR/RB Ryan Niblett (all-purpose), DB Jelani McDonald, RB Hollywood Smothers and WR Ryan Wingo were placed on the third team. Niblett is one of five SEC players to earn recognition at multiple positions.

• It marks the second-straight year Simmons and Goosby received preseason All-SEC nods. Last year, Simmons was tabbed to the preseason first team and Goosby was placed on the third team. Following the 2025 regular season, Goosby and Simmons earned spots on the All-SEC Coaches First Team, while Wingo and Niblett were selected to the second team.

WELCOME BACK TO THE FORTY, COACH MUSCHAMP

• Will Muschamp is back on the Forty Acres as Defensive Coordinator. Muschamp previously directed some of the top defenses in Longhorn history during his tenure in Austin from 2008-10, playing a vital role as Texas finished the 2008 season ranked No. 3 before advancing to the BCS National Championship Game during the 2009 season.

• In Muschamp's time at Texas, the Longhorn defense ranked No. 1 in the nation with 119 sacks and ranked in the top-10 nationally allowing 2.9 yards per rushing attempt (third), 96.7 rushing yards per game (fourth) and 297.4 yards per game (seventh), all Big 12 bests during that span. Along with a BCS National Championship Game appearance in 2009, the Longhorns also won the Big 12 Championship. In the 2009-11 NFL Drafts, Muschamp had a combined 12 players drafted with 10 in the first four rounds.

• Muschamp served as the Defensive Coordinator at Georgia from 2022-23, helping guide the Bulldogs to a 28-1 record and 2022 National Championship (15-0).

• Muschamp was the Defensive Coordinator for the 2003 LSU National Championship Team along with working with two SEC Championship squads.

TEXAS IN THE TOP-5

• Texas opened the 2026 season at No. 5 in the Associated Press poll.

• Since 2000, Texas has recorded 15 top-10 preseason rankings in the AP poll. Overall, Texas has 37 preseason top-10 rankings.

• It is the ninth time in the last 10 seasons in which Texas has been ranked in the preseason AP Top 25. It is also Texas' third-consecutive preseason AP Top 10 ranking after UT opened the 2025 season ranked No. 1 and the 2024 season ranked No. 4.

• The Longhorns will face seven preseason AP Top 25 opponents this season, including No. 1 Ohio State, No. 8 Texas A&M, No. 9 Ole Miss, No. 10 Oklahoma, No. 11 LSU, No. 20 Tennessee and No. 25 Missouri. Texas goes on the road to face four of those teams while taking on Oklahoma in a neutral site game at the Allstate Red River Rivalry. Texas will host two Top 10 matchups at DKR-Texas Memorial Stadium against No. 1 Ohio State and No. 9 Ole Miss.

• According to ESPN, Texas has the second-hardest strength of schedule in 2026.

LONE STAR RIVALRY WIN

• Texas wrapped up the 2025 regular season with a 27-17 win over No. 3/3 Texas A&M in the Cotton Holdings Lone Star Showdown on Nov. 28, 2025, at DKR-Texas Memorial Stadium.

• It became the third time Texas has beaten an AP Top 10 opponent by double digits this century - the others were in 2008 vs. Oklahoma (45-35) and in 2023 vs. No. 3 Alabama (34-24).

• With the win, Texas has won three-straight games against the Aggies. UT leads the all-time series, 78-37-5, against the Aggies. It was the first Lone Star Showdown game in Austin since the 2010 season.

• The Longhorns scored on four of their first five possessions after the half time break, outscoring the Aggies, 24-7, across the final 30 minutes. With the victory, Texas became the first team with a trio of top-10 wins in a regular season since the 2019 LSU Tigers.

• Quarterback Arch Manning tallied 232 yards of total offense and a pair of touchdowns, scampering for the game-clinching 35-yard score midway through the fourth quarter. Quintrevion Wisner rushed for a season-high 155 yards, becoming the third Texas player with multiple 100-yard rushing games against Texas A&M this century, joining Cendric Benson (2003-04) and Cody Johnson (2008-09). Tight end Jack Endries also added a season-best 93 yards on four catches.

• The Longhorns secured interceptions on back-to-back defensive plays to cap off their 13th victory in the last 18 meetings against Texas A&M. In his final contest at DKR-TMS, defensive back Michael Taaffe picked off signal caller Marcel Reed at the 3-yard line to halt the Aggies' drive. Following the Longhorns' ensuing offensive stalled, defensive back Kobe Black recorded his first career interception on Reed's next throw.

• Ethan Burke posted a career-best nine tackles and blocked his second field goal attempt of the season.

• Dating back to the 2025 season, Texas has recorded an interception in five-straight games.

• Texas ranked second in the SEC and 12th in the FBS with 16 interceptions in 2025.

• In 2024, Texas led the nation in interceptions after totaling 22 through 16 games.

• UT produced its fourth multi-interception effort of the season after picking off No. 18/17/18 Michigan three times in the Cheez-It Citrus Bowl. It marked the second-consecutive game Texas tallied multiple interceptions after snaring two against No. 3/2 Texas A&M on Nov. 28, 2025.

• Texas posted its second multi-interception game in

the win over Oklahoma on Oct. 11, grabbing three interceptions, lead by Malik Muhammad's two picks.

• The Texas defense recorded its first multi-interception game vs. UTEP after Jelani McDonald and Graceson Littleton snagged one apiece.

• Senior DB Jaylon Guilbeau recorded Texas' first interception of the 2025 season after picking off San Jose State in the first quarter on Sept. 6. It was his first career interception.

• Texas had seven games with multiple interceptions in 2024, its most games in a single season since 2009 (seven). Since the start of the 2023 season, Texas tallied 41 total interceptions.

• For the seventh time in 2024, the Texas Longhorn defense was credited with multiple interceptions in the same game after picking off Kentucky twice on Nov. 23: Colorado State (2), at Michigan (2), ULM (2), Georgia (3), at Vanderbilt (2), Florida (2) and Kentucky (2). It total, UT recorded at least one interception in 12 different games last year.

• 13 different Longhorn defenders recorded an interception last year, led by DB Jahdae Barron and Andrew Mukuba, who registered five apiece.

• Texas' three interceptions vs. Georgia on Oct. 19, 2024, were its most against a team ranked in the top five of the AP Poll since having four against No. 2 Oklahoma on Oct. 12, 2002.

• Texas had the third-highest attendance in DKR-Texas Memorial Stadium history in the 24-23 victory against No. 1/1 Ohio State on Sept. 12 with 105,044 in attendance.

• With an announced attendance of 105,215 vs. No. 5/4 Georgia on Oct. 19, 2024, Texas set a new attendance record for a football game inside Darrell K. Royal - Texas Memorial Stadium. The previous record was 105,213 set when the Alabama Crimson Tide visited the Forty Acres on Saturday, Sept. 10, 2022.

• It was the second time during the 2024 season Texas had been involved in an attendance-breaking football game after the Longhorns played in front of a program-record 111,170 fans against then-No. 10/9 Michigan in Ann Arbor, Mich., on Sept. 7, 2024.

GAME NOTES

HOTTEST TICKET IN TOWN

- Season tickets and individual game tickets for all home games at Darrell K Royal-Texas Memorial Stadium are officially sold out through Texas Athletics.
- This marks the fifth-consecutive season that Texas Football has set an all-time season ticket record. While tickets for the general public are sold out, returning and incoming UT students can still purchase the Big Ticket student ticket package.
- The sellout continues the incredible momentum surrounding the program under Head Coach Steve Sarkisian and marks the fifth consecutive season that Texas fans have sold out DKR well before the opening kickoff of the season. While tickets available to the general public are sold out, returning and incoming UT students can still purchase the Big Ticket with Football student ticket package, providing access to 100+ Texas Athletics regular season home events during the 2026-27 season. Student tickets for football home games must be claimed during each game's mobile ticket claim process.
- In addition, Texas' allotment for the annual Allstate Red River Rivalry against Oklahoma on October 10 at the Cotton Bowl is sold out. Fans interested in attending the October matchup in Dallas may still find tickets available through SeatGeek.

NON-OFFENSIVE TOUCHDOWNS

- Texas has made scoring non-offensive touchdowns a habit, registering at least one in each of the last 10 seasons and in 17 of the last 18 seasons overall.
- The streak continued in Texas' 59-7 victory over Texas State on Sept. 5 when junior DL Maraad Watson forced a fumble that was returned for 59 yards by sophomore DB Graceson Littleton.
- WR Ryan Niblett's 75-yard punt return touchdown against Oklahoma on Oct. 11, 2025, extended the streak to nine-consecutive seasons.
- EDGE Ethan Burke kept the streak alive after recording UT's first non-offensive touchdown of the 2024 season in the victory against UTSA. Burke had a pick-six he returned for 30 yards in the waning minutes of the fourth quarter vs. the Road Runners, increasing the Longhorns' streak to eight-straight seasons with a non-offensive touchdown and tallying at least one in 15 of the last 16 seasons overall.
- The Horns scored five non-offensive touchdowns in 2023, the third time in the last 15 seasons that Texas has tallied at least five in a year and the most since 2017.
- UT picked up two in the win over Texas Tech, earning the first on a 95-yard kickoff return by Keilan Robinson to open the second half of play, then adding a second near the end of the third quarter when Jett Bush hauled in an interception after it bounced off the foot of a Red Raider and taking it 43 yards for the score.
- Xavier Worthy returned a BYU punt 74 yards for a touchdown for the first score of the game in Texas' victory over the Cougars.
- Malik Muhammad opened the scoring for Texas in the Red River Rivalry after recovered a Kitan Crawford blocked punt in the first quarter against Oklahoma.
- Jerrin Thompson clinched the Longhorns' week three victory over Wyoming with a 27-yard interception return.

- The Horns wasted no time in 2022 when Keilan Robinson scored on a D'Shawn Jamison blocked punt to close out the first drive of the season opener by ULM.
- Jamison secured a defensive score with a third-quarter, 69-yard interception return against ULM, giving UT multiple non-offensive touchdowns in a season for the fourth time in six years.
- UT added a third for the 2022 campaign when Jahdae Barron intercepted a pass against UTSA at the Roadrunner 44-yard line and took it to the house for the first interception return of his career. He followed that with a scoop-and-score fumble recovery against TCU.
- Josh Thompson tallied a 27-yard interception return against Texas Tech in 2021 that marked the fifth-straight season in which the Longhorns had a non-offensive touchdown.
- D'Shawn Jamison's 100-yard kickoff return against Oklahoma State in 2020 was the second of his career and fueled the Longhorns comeback from an 11-point deficit at the sixth-ranked Cowboys.
- UT finished 2017 with eight non-offensive touchdowns, tied for the most in the country. It was their most since registering 11 in 2009.

TEXAS IN THE SPOTLIGHT

- The 23-6 Red River Rivalry win over Oklahoma on Oct. 11 recorded 8.73 million viewers - the most of any Red River Rivalry matchup. It surpassed the previous record of 8.71 viewers in 2009.
- The Texas vs. Ohio State BIG NOON SATURDAY matchup on Aug. 30, 2025m was the most watched Week 1 game in history (any network) with 16.6 million viewers.
- The Texas-Georgia game on Oct. 19, 2024, averaged 12.9 million viewers and peaked at 14.1 million viewers. It was the most watched regular season game since 2016 and the second-largest regular season audience in 10 years.
- The Texas-Michigan BIG NOON SATURDAY matchup on FOX scored 9.35 million viewers.
- The Texas-Alabama broadcast on Sept. 9, 2023, was the most-viewed regular-season game for ESPN since 2015.
- The broadcast averaged 8.8 million viewers on ESPN and ESPN2, peaking at over 10.7 million viewers.
- UT-UA had the best Saturday viewership for an ESPN game since 2014.
- "Field Pass with The Pat McAfee Show" on ESPN2 had 799,000 viewers - the most-watched McAfee Alternate Telecast and most-viewed College Football Alternate Telecast since the 2018 CFP National Championship.
- Texas-Oklahoma had 8.1 million viewers on ABC - the second-highest mark ever for the Red River Rivalry (2009).
- Viewership peaked at 11.1 million viewers, while "Field Pass with The Pat McAfee Show" on ESPN2 had 559,000 viewers.

RYAN ON THE RUN

- Texas WR/RB Ryan Niblett was named to the All-America First Team as a return specialist by the FWAA in 2025 and has earned a spot on the preseason watch list for the 2026 Paul Hornung Award, which is awarded annually to the nation's most versatile player. Niblett is a 2026 Phil Steele Preseason First-Team All-American and Preseason First-Team All-SEC honoree. Niblett has played in 34 career games.
- Last season, Niblett led the SEC and ranked second in the FBS in combined kick returns (738) and punt returns (22.7 avg) while ranking second in the SEC and third nationally in punt return touchdowns with two.
- Niblett had a clutch, 79-yard punt return touchdown with 1:47 remaining in regulation against Mississippi State on Oct. 25, tying the game up at 38-38 and forcing overtime.
- Against Kentucky on Oct. 18, Niblett recorded a 43-yard

and a 45-yard punt return in the win. Niblett has five returns of at least 40 yards in the last five games.

- It was Texas-OU history for Niblett as he became just the third Longhorn ever to return a punt for a touchdown in 121 all-time Red River Rivalry games. Niblett recorded a 75-yard punt return touchdown vs. Oklahoma on Oct. 11. It was the first punt return touchdown for a Longhorn against OU since an 85-yard return by Daje Johnson on Oct. 12, 2013.

LOADED LINEBACKER ROOM

- Texas added two linebackers via the transfer portal in seniors Rasheem Biles and Justin Cryer.
- Biles registered his fifth career interception, including his second in three games at Texas, to go along with four tackles (three solo) and a quarterback hurry against UTSA on Sept. 19.
- Cryer logged two solo stops and a quarterback hurry vs. the Roadrunners.
- Cryer led Texas with nine tackles (two solo), a tackle for a loss of five yards, two quarterback hurries and a pass break-up against No. 1/1 Ohio State on Sept. 12.
- Biles had eight tackles (six solo) in the 24-23 victory over No. 1/1 Ohio State.
- Biles made his presence known in Texas victory against Texas State on Sept. 5, earning SEC Co-Defensive Player of the Week. Biles posted five tackles (two solo), an interception and a forced fumble. It was his fourth career interception and fourth career forced fumble. It was his first career game with an interception and forced fumble.
- In Cryer's first career game as a Longhorn vs. Texas State on Sept. 5, the senior logged three tackles (one solo).
- Biles is a senior linebacker who transferred to Texas from Pitt in spring 2026. The Columbus, Ohio, native played three seasons at Pitt (2023-25) and saw action in 31 games with 19 starts. Biles was a Second-Team All-ACC selection last season after making 10 starts at linebacker and led the nation with 1.70 tackles for loss per game. His 17.0 total tackles for loss tied for the eighth-most in the FBS last season. He led the Panthers with 101 tackles, 17.0 tackles for loss, 4.5 sacks, six pass break-ups, two interceptions (returned for 85 yards and two touchdowns) and forced two fumbles. Biles delivered 11 stops and broke up a pass against Central Michigan on Sept. 6. He contributed 14 tackles at West Virginia on Sept. 13 and made six tackles and returned an interception for 75 yards for a touchdown against Louisville on Sept. 27. Against Boston College on Oct. 4, Biles forced a fumble, had a sack and recorded three tackles. He had a split-sack among nine total tackles vs. Notre Dame on Nov. 15 and returned a 10-yard interception for a touchdown against the Irish. He posted 15 tackles at Georgia Tech on Nov. 22 followed by a career-high 16-tackle performance vs. East Carolina in the Go Bowling Military Bowl on Dec. 27. He also forced and recovered a fumble and broke up a pass in the bowl game.
- Cryer comes to the Forty Acres after playing three seasons at Florida State from 2023-25. Cryer, a Katy, Texas, native, appeared in all 12 games with career-high eight starts last season. He led FSU linebackers with 43 tackles, adding 5.0 tackles for loss and 1.0 sack. Cryer started and tied his career-high with seven tackles against Alabama Aug. 30. Cryer made six tackles against Virginia on Sept. 26 and followed that with a four-tackle effort against Miami on Oct. 4. Cryer had four tackles, including 2.0 tackles for a loss of two yards and one sack for a loss of one yard, and two quarterback hurries at Pitt on Oct. 11. Cryer registered five tackles and a 0.5 TFL at Clemson on Nov. 8.

DBU

- Derek Williams Jr., Jelani McDonald, Kobe Black, Kade Phillips, Xavier Filsaime, Warren Roberson, Graceson Littleton, Wardell Mack and Jonah Williams return to the Texas DBs room for the 2026 season. The Horns added Bo Mascoe (Rutgers) and Nick Hudson (Brown) via the transfer portal in addition to freshmen John Meredith III, Yaheim Riley, Toray Davis, Hayward Howard Jr. and Samari Matthews.
- Senior DB Jelani McDonald was named to the preseason watch list for the Jim Thorpe Award. McDonald, a preseason All-SEC Third Team honoree, is a fourth-year defensive back who has played in 42 career games with 20 starts. As a junior in 2025, McDonald started in all 13 games and led Texas in tackles with 80 (49 solo) and interceptions with three. The Waco, Texas, native also recorded 4.0 tackles for loss, three pass break-ups, one quarterback hurry and one fumble recovery. In Texas' home opener vs. San Jose State on Sept. 6, 2025, McDonald registered two tackles (one solo), a pass break-up and recovered a fumble for 24 yards against the Spartans. He snared his second career interception and first of the season, returning it 16 yards in the victory over UTEP on Sept. 13. He added six tackles (three solo) against the Miners. McDonald posted two solo tackles, including one tackle for a loss of three yards, and his second interception of the season in the win over Sam Houston on Sept. 20. In UT's SEC opener at Florida on Oct. 4, McDonald totaled eight tackles (three solo) and followed that performance with an eight-tackle outing in Texas' Allstate Red River Rivalry win vs. No. 6/6 Oklahoma on Oct. 11 in Dallas. McDonald racked up nine solo tackles, including 2.0 tackles for a loss of 12 yards in the Horns' road win at Kentucky on Oct. 18. He then tallied a career-high 14 tackles (five solo) at Mississippi State on Oct. 25. McDonald recorded five tackles (three solo) vs. Arkansas on Nov. 22, including 1.0 tackle for a loss of three yards, and logged an interception that he returned for 11 yards vs. the Razorbacks. McDonald made nine tackles (six solo) in UT's 27-17 win vs. No. 3/3 Texas A&M on Nov. 28. McDonald capped the season with a seven-tackle (six solo) performance in the Cheez-It Citrus Bowl against No. 18/17/18 Michigan on Dec. 31.
- Littleton played in all 13 games with eight starts as a freshman in 2025, compiling 47 tackles (33 solo), 4.0 tackles for loss, two interceptions, eight passes defended, and two forced fumbles.
- Phillips played in 12 games with three starts as a freshman in 2025. Phillips totaled 22 tackles (16 solo), 2.0 tackles for loss and six passes defended.
- Williams Jr. played in 12 games with two starts in 2025 after missing the 2024 season due to injury. Williams has played in 29 career games. In 2025, Williams posted 23 tackles (10 solo).
- Mascoe, a senior, transferred to Texas from Rutgers during spring 2026. Mascoe has played in 29 career games with 19 starts and was named 2025 Honorable Mention All-Big Ten according to the league's coaches and media. Mascoe started all 12 games at cornerback in 2025, accumulating 53 total tackles (30 solo), 2.0 tackles for loss, one interception, five passes defended and two forced fumbles.

GAME NOTES

Hailing from Lawrenceville, Ga., Atkinson was the recipient of the High School Butkus Award as a senior in 2025, which is awarded annually to the nation's top high school linebacker. Atkinson was named the Gatorade Georgia High School Player of the Year in 2025. Atkinson was listed as a five-star recruit by Rivals and ESPN and rated the No. 1 linebacker recruit and the No. 19 overall national recruit in his class by Rivals. As a senior at Grayson, Atkinson made 77 tackles (38 solo) including 25 tackles for loss, 10 sacks, two forced fumbles and one recovery. As a junior, he earned 2024 MaxPreps National Junior of the Year honors after helping Grayson finish 14-1 with a Georgia AAAAAAA championship win and No. 7 national ranking. He posted 153 tackles (70 solo) including 29 tackles for loss and 11 sacks. He logged 42 quarterback hurries, one interception, one blocked field goal, one pass defended, a forced fumble and fumble recovery. During his sophomore year, he was named a 2023 MaxPreps Sophomore All-American after setting a school record with 197 tackles (118 solo), 25 tackles for loss, 10.5 sacks, 23 quarterback hurries and three forced fumbles in the team's state AAAAAAA semifinal campaign.

• Bishop Jr. is from Willis, Texas, and early enrolled at Texas during spring 2026. A five-star recruit, the No. 2 athlete recruit and No. 16 overall recruit in his class by 247Sports, Bishop was named Dave Campbell's Mr. Texas Football winner as a senior, becoming the third Longhorn to win the prestigious award. Earning snaps at wideout, slot, running back and safety, Bishop had 86 receptions for 1,241 yards and 14 touchdowns (14.4 ypc) in addition to 34 rushes for 378 yards and four touchdowns. He had one of the best playoff games in Texas high school football history to guide Willis to a third round playoff win over Forney on Nov. 29, 2025, reeling in 15 receptions for 328 receiving yards, three touchdowns and also added seven carries for 19 yards and a rushing touchdown to go along with 2-for-3 passing for 42 yards, a 39-yard punt return and an interception. As a junior, he recorded 83 catches for 1,565 yards and 18 touchdowns (18.9 ypc). On the defensive side of the ball, he posted 26 tackles, three interceptions, two forced fumbles and six pass breakups. As a sophomore, he reeled in 80 passes for 1,414 yards and 17 touchdowns. He recorded 26 carries for 384 yards and seven touchdowns (14.8 ypc). Defensively, he had 37 tackles, two tackles for loss, five interceptions including one for a touchdown and one kick return touchdown.

• Wesley is from Sylmar, Calif., and early enrolled at Texas during spring 2026. Wesley was rated a five-star recruit by ESPN and Rivals and the No. 2 defensive end prospect in his class by ESPN. Wesley reclassified from the class of 2027 to the class of 2026. Across 34 varsity games, Wesley registered 27 sacks. In 2025 at Sierra Canyon, Wesley notched 29 tackles (23 solo), 12.5 tackles for loss, 8.5 sacks, 10 quarterback hurries, five interceptions, one pass defended and one forced fumble. Wesley earned snaps on offense, resulting in a 23-yard rushing touchdown and a 16-yard reception. Wesley was tabbed a MaxPreps Sophomore All-American after totaling 44 tackles, 16 tackles for loss, nine sacks, eight quarterback hurries and three forced fumbles. He had a 10-tackle, one-sack performance vs. Mater Dei.

SPOT ON SPETIC

• Senior K Gianni Spetic is 51-of-67 (76.1 percent) on field goals across four seasons, including 2-for-2 from 1-19 yards out, 19-for-20 from 20-29 yards out, 16-of-19 from 30-39 yards out, 8-of-16 from 40-49 yards out and 6-of-10 from 50 yards out.

• Since the beginning of the 2025 season, Spetic has made five 50+ field goals and gone 63-for-63 on PATs. He is the only FBS player to have made at least five field goals of 50+ yards and gone at least 60-for-60 on PATs during that span.

• Against UTSA on Sept. 19, Spetic matched his career high with three field goals made. Spetic delivered a

52-yard field goal in the first quarter, matching the third-longest of his career. The standout has now converted on seven of his last eight field goal attempts from at least 50 yards, dating back to the 2023 season. Spetic added a 37-yard field goal and 23-yard chip shot.

• Against No. 1/1 Ohio State on Sept. 12, Spetic went 1-for-1 with a 37-yard field goal in the second quarter to put the Horns on the board. Spetic's PAT with 00:25 remaining in the fourth quarter broke up the then-tied 23-23 ballgame, to put Texas in front 24-23.

• In his first career game as a Longhorn in the win against Texas State on Sept. 5, Spetic nailed a 48-yard field goal in the fourth quarter.

• Spetic was tabbed to the preseason watch list for the 2026 Lou Groza Award. A first-year player on the Forty Acres who transferred to Texas from Memphis during spring 2026, Spetic has played in 39 career games across three seasons at Memphis (2025) and Ohio (2023-24). Last season at Memphis, Spetic appeared in 13 games and made 15-of-20 field goal attempts (75 percent). The Chardon, Ohio, product was 3-for-3 from 20-29 yards out, 5-for-6 from 30-39 yards out, 3-for-6 from 40-49 yards out and 4-for-5 from 50+ yards with a long of 55 yards. Spetic was 49-of-49 on extra-point attempts. Spetic finished the season with a career-high 94 total points. Spetic garnered the American Conference's Special Teams Player of the Week on Oct. 6, 2025, after going 6-for-6 on PATs and nailing a 50-yard field goal en route to Memphis' 10th-straight win to claim bowl eligibility with a victory over Tulsa.

RETURN OF THE MAC

• Fifth-year P Mac Chiumento transferred to Texas from Florida State during spring 2026. Chiumento has played in 21 career games across five seasons. In 2025, Chiumento averaged 44.0 yards on 27 punts with one touchback. The Daytona Beach, Fla., product had 13 punts downed inside the 20-yard line and booted six for 50+ yards.

• Chiumento boomed three punts for 126 yards with a long of 52 yards against UTSA on Sept. 19.

• After not needing to punt against Texas State on Sept. 5, Chiumento saw his first action as a Longhorn against No. 1/1 Ohio State on Sept. 12. Chiumento booted three punts for 122 yards (40.7 avg) with a long of 43 yards.

LONGHORNS IN THE NFL

• The Longhorns' 34 NFL Draft picks in the last four years (2023-26) is a program-best four-year total in the Common Draft era (since 1967). The only other time Texas had that many in school history goes all the way back to 1942-45 when the Horns also had 34 draft picks in the pre-modern draft era.

• Texas has 34 NFL Draft picks in the last four years — compared to just 14 in the four years prior to Coach Sark's arrival. Additionally, Texas had 27 players drafted in the 10 years (2012-21) prior to his arrival.

• The 34 draft picks under Coach Sark includes 12 first- and second-round picks in the last five years. That compares to two such picks in the five years prior to his arrival and 10 total first- and second-round selections in the 14 years (2008-21) before Coach Sark.

• Texas has a current streak of three-straight years with at least six NFL Draft picks. That a program record in the Common Draft era (since 1967). Texas did that once before in school history in the pre-modern draft (1950-53).

• The Longhorns current streak of four-straight years with at least five NFL Draft picks in the best in Common Draft era history (since 1967). Texas did that once before in school history in the pre-modern draft (1950-53).

• Texas is one of only four programs that have had multiple first-round picks in the 2024 & 2025 NFL Drafts (Texas, Alabama, Georgia, Penn State).

• Texas had at least one first-round pick in three-straight drafts (2023-25), marking the fourth time in program history the Longhorns have accomplished that. It's the first time since doing that in four-straight drafts from 2004-07. UT also had four-straight years with a first-round selection in 1977-80 and three-straight in 1947-49.

• Texas has five players selected in the first two rounds of the 2025 draft, matching the program best established in 2024.

The Longhorns' 10 combined players selected in the first two rounds of the 2024 and 2025 Drafts are the most-ever in back-to-back drafts in UT history.

• The 10 combined first- and second-round picks over the 2024 and 2025 drafts were the most of any program (9, Georgia & Ohio State/7, Alabama & Michigan).

• Jack Endries' 2026 selection marked a program record third-straight year that Texas had a tight end selected, joining Gunnar Helm (2025) and Ja'Tavion Sanders (2024).

• With Malik Muhammad and Michael Taaffe being selected in 2026, Texas has now had five DBs selected in the last three NFL Drafts. It marks the fifth time in seven years that Texas had a DB drafted and first time the Longhorns had multiple DBs selected in consecutive drafts since 2006-07.

• After the 2026 Draft, 21 Texas DBs have had their names called over the last 21 drafts (since 2006). The Horns have had 29 selected since the draft went to seven rounds in 1994, and 55 in the Common Draft era.

• In 2026, DJ Campbell became Texas' fifth offensive lineman selected in the last three NFL Drafts, which marked the third-straight year a Longhorn offensive lineman had been drafted — matching the UT's longest such streak in the Common Draft era (since 1967). It's the first time UT accomplished that feat since 2006-08.

• Texas has had five offensive linemen selected in the last three NFL Drafts. The Longhorns had only two offensive linemen selected in the 15 Drafts from 2009-23.

• In 2025, Texas had three offensive linemen (Kelvin Banks, Cameron Williams, Hayden Conner) selected in the first seven rounds of an NFL Draft for the first time since 1982 (OT Terry Tausch/2nd Round/Vikings, C Mike Baab/5th Round/Browns, G Joe Shearin/7th Round/Rams).

• In 2024, Byron Murphy II (first round) and T'Vondre Sweat (second round) became the first Longhorn defensive tackle duo selected in the first two rounds of the draft since Casey Hampton (first round/Steelers) and Shaun Rogers (second round/Lions) in 2001.

• In 2024, Xavier Worthy (first round), Adonai Mitchell (second round) and Jordan Whittington (sixth round) were taken in the NFL Draft — the most-ever for UT at that position in a single common era NFL Draft (since 1967). The Horns previously had two wide receivers taken in 2020, 2004, 1991 & 1987.

HEAD COACH

One of the nation's premier coaches who has steadfastly returned Texas Football back to prominence, Steve Sarkisian is in his 26th year of coaching and 13th as a head coach. In his sixth season at Texas, his Longhorn rebuild has been patient, deliberate and highly successful, producing one of the nation's winningest programs over the past three seasons with two College Football Playoff appearances. Sarkisian's process and efforts include a steady growth of on-field results through player development and recruiting, combined with a strong team culture, both of which have positioned the program for continued long-term success. The Longhorns finished 5-7 in 2021 and improved to 8-5 with an Alamo Bowl bid in 2022 before turning in a historic season in 2023 with a 12-2 record, Big 12 Championship, No. 3 final ranking and College Football Playoff semifinal appearance. More history was made in year four in 2024. In UT's inaugural season in the SEC, Sarkisian led Texas to the best regular season record in the conference (7-1) and an SEC Championship Game berth, and the Longhorns became the only program to earn a spot in the CFP semifinals in both 2023 and 2024. Texas' 13-3 record in 2024 matched the school-record for wins and included a second-straight final top-five ranking (No. 3 Coaches Poll/No. 4 AP), marking the first consecutive top-five finishes for the Longhorns since 2008-09. In 2025, Sarkisian turned in a 10-3 season and Cheez-It Citrus Bowl victory over Michigan. It was UT's third-straight 10-win season and the first time Texas has put together three-consecutive 10-win seasons since recording nine-straight from 2001-09. He enters the 2026 season with a 48-20 record at Texas and a 94-55 mark in 12 seasons as a head coach.

A huge part of the Texas' success under Sarkisian is reflected in the program's recruiting, player development and historic numbers of Longhorns selected in the NFL Draft. Texas has produced top-five recruiting classes in each of the past five years, and the Longhorns have won the Shaun Alexander Freshman of the Year, Lombardi, Thorpe, and Doak Walker awards, along with the Outland and Wuerffel trophies, while having four consensus first-team All-Americans and 24 first-team all-conference picks during that time. Sarkisian's squad set a UT record for NFL Draft Picks (in a seven-round draft) in 2024 with 11 (second-most of any program) and eclipsed that mark with 12 (third-most of any program) in 2025, including a school-record-tying three first-round selections. The 12 picks in 2025 are tied for seventh-most of any program in the history of the seven-round NFL Draft, while 11 in 2024 is tied for 10th. The Longhorns set a school record with 11 players invited to the NFL Combine in 2024 and shattered that mark with 14 in 2025. For the third-straight year in 2026, Texas had at least six players drafted after having only four

previous draft of that many since the draft went to seven rounds in 1994. Texas' 29 draft picks over the last three years leads the country along with Georgia and Ohio State. Texas' 23 draft picks between 2024 and 2025 led the nation during that period. Texas had 32 players in the NFL when Sarkisian arrived in 2021, and in just five seasons under his leadership, 41 of his players are currently on NFL rosters, including 34 from just the 2023-25 teams alone.

Texas finished the 2025 season with a 10-3 record, highlighted by three wins over top-10 opponents in a season where the Longhorns faced five top-10 teams – both were the most of any FBS program. In addition to its third-straight 10-win season and top-15 ranking, the season featured a fourth-straight top-25 final ranking for the first time since 2006-09. It is also the first time Texas has put together three-consecutive 10-win seasons since 2007-09. Texas' 10 wins against top-25 opponents, including five against the top-10, over the last two seasons are the most of any FBS program. 2025 featured wins over Oklahoma, Texas A&M and Arkansas in the same season in back-to-back years for the first time since 1969-70. The Longhorns concluded the season winning seven of its last eight games. Texas took care of the ball and finished the season ranked fifth in turnover margin (1.08) and had the fifth-fewest turnovers lost (9). UT also ranked second nationally in fumbles lost with just two across 13 games. All-American returner Ryan Niblett helped Texas rank second nationally in punt returns with an average of 22 yards per return. Texas' defense totaled 16 interceptions, which stood 12th nationally. Eight players received All-SEC Coaches' Team selection, including three All-SEC First Team picks. Trevor Goosby, Colin Simmons and Michael Taaffe were named to the All-SEC First Team, while Ryan Wingo, Anthony Hill Jr., Malik Muhammad and Ryan Niblett were selected to the All-SEC Second Team. DJ Campbell was placed on the All-SEC Third Team. Four Longhorns garnered All-America status in Hill Jr., Niblett, Simmons and Taaffe. Two of those were first-team accolades with Taaffe's being from the AFCA and Niblett's from the FWAA. In his first season as an everyday start, QB Arch Manning completed 248-of-404 passes for 3,163 yards and 26 touchdowns, averaging 243.3 yards per game. Manning's 3,163 passing yards were the 10th-most in the program's single-season history. Manning was also second on the team with 399 rushing yards and 10 rushing scores. Simmons led Texas defensively with team-highs in sacks (12.0), tackles for loss (15.5), quarterback hurries (15) and forced fumbles (3) while compiling 43 tackles, two pass break-ups and one fumble recovery. Simmons' 12.0 sacks led the SEC and ranked fifth nationally.

In 2024, Texas posted school-record-tying 13 wins and earned a spot in the College Football Playoff semifinals for a second-straight year. It was just the third time in school history the Longhorns won 13 games and Sarkisian was again named a Bear Bryant and George Munger Coach of the Year finalist. Texas' 25 wins in 2023 and 2024 were the most for the Longhorns since matching that total in 2008-09 and Sarkisian led his squad to a No. 1 ranking in one of the major polls for four-straight weeks, marking the program's first No. 1 ranking at any point in a season since 2008. Texas ranked third in the FBS in both scoring defense at 15.3 ppg and total defense with an SEC-best 283.4 yards allowed per game. The Longhorn defense forced an SEC-leading 31 turnovers (2nd FBS) including an FBS-best 22 interceptions, and nearly three sacks (2.88/15th FBS) per game. Offensively, the balanced Longhorn attack averaged 278.8 passing yards (14th FBS), 158.8 rushing yards and 33 points (29th FBS) per game. Sarkisian's explosive offense produced 21 plays of 40 or more yards (10 of 50+) and saw running backs Jaydon Blue and Quintrevion Wisner each have a rush and reception of 40-plus yards. Wisner rushed for 1,064 yards, extending Sarkisian's streak to 13-straight seasons with a 1,000-yard rusher during his tenure as a head coach or offensive coordinator. Five players earned All-America honors (OT Kelvin Banks Jr., DB Jahdae Barron, DT Alfred Collins, LB Anthony Hill Jr., DB Michael Taaffe). Banks became the Longhorns' second-straight Outland Trophy winner and the first Texas player ever to sweep the Lombardi Award and Outland. Barron won the Thorpe Award as the nation's top defensive back (and was UT's first-ever defensive back to be a Nagurski Award finalist), EDGE Colin Simmons claimed the Shaun Alexander Freshman of the Year Award and was tabbed a Freshman All-American, while center Jake Majors was a National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete/Campbell Award finalist. Seven Longhorns earned All-SEC honors with QB Quinn Ewers, TE Gunnar Helm, RB Quintrevion Wisner and DB Andrew Mukuba joining Banks, Barron, and Hill. Banks earned the SEC's Jacob Blocking Trophy, which is given annual to the league's most outstanding blocker. Four different UT offensive linemen earned SEC Lineman of

the Week honors. The Longhorns had school record 14 players invited to the NFL Combine in February 2025, 12 of whom were later drafted.

The 2023 season had Texas Football attain heights not seen on the Forty Acres in over a decade. Sarkisian was named a finalist for the Bear Bryant, George Munger and Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year awards after leading the Longhorns to their first Big 12 Championship since 2009, winning 12 games for the first time since that season and reaching the College Football Playoff for the first time in program history. At that time, the 12 wins marked just the fourth time in school history that the Longhorns had 12 or more victories in a season. He was also tabbed the Big 12 Coach of the Year by The Associated Press. Texas earned a No. 3 final ranking in The Associated Press Poll, its highest finish in 15 years since earning the No. 2 spot in 2009. The Longhorns were one of only five Power-5 programs that ranked among the top 15 in scoring offense (35.8 ppg) and scoring defense (18.9 ppg), finishing 15th nationally in both. Sarkisian's versatile and balanced squad ranked ninth nationally in total offense (477.5 ypg), led the Big 12 in total defense (336.7 ypg/34th FBS) and was bolstered by one of the nation's top special team's units. Led by Outland Trophy winner and unanimous first-team All-American defensive tackle T'Vondre Sweat, Texas ranked third nationally in rushing defense (82.4 ypg). The Longhorns' ground game, which was led by Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award finalist Jonathon Brooks' 1,139 yards in 11 games, and three total backs with 100-yard rushing games, ranked 24th in the FBS (188.4 ypg). Texas averaged 289.1 yards per game passing (17th/FBS). Seven Longhorns earned first-team All-Big 12 honors with Sweat voted the league's defensive player of the year, defensive tackle Byron Murphy II selected defensive lineman of the year, wide receiver Adonai Mitchell chosen offensive newcomer of the year, and linebacker Anthony Hill Jr. tabbed defensive freshman of the year. The Longhorns had 11 players invited to the NFL Combine in February 2024, which at the time was the most ever in program history.

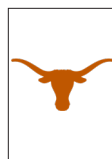
