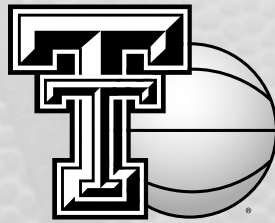

Dr. Donald Haragan

Interim Chancellor, Texas Tech University System

Donald R. Haragan was appointed Interim Chancellor of the Texas Tech University System by the Board of Regents and began serving in the position on March 1, 2006.

Dr. Haragan, who has served Texas Tech for 37 years, has also served the university as president, executive vice president and provost, vice president for academic affairs and research, associate dean and interim dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, chair of the Department of Geosciences and as a professor.

He founded the Atmospheric Science Program in 1970 and was an early participant in the cooperative efforts that led to the establishment of the Wind Science and Engineering Institute at Texas Tech. His research accomplishments are in the area of water resources and conservation with a focus on global pre-

cipitation climatology. As Provost for ten years and President for five years, he is credited with molding

much of the current administrative and academic structure at the university including the establishment

of the University Honors College, the International Cultural Center, the Center for Teaching, Learning and Technology, the University Writing Center, the Texas Tech Press, the Texas Tech Regional Centers in Houston, Dallas, Austin, and San Antonio, and led the effort to establish the Texas Tech University Center in Seville, Spain.

Dr. Haragan is a native of Houston. He received his Bachelor of Science degree from the College of Engineering at the University of Texas, his Master of Science degree in meteorology from Texas A&M University and a doctorate in civil engineering from the University of Texas at Austin.

In 2001, Dr. Haragan was named a Distinguished Graduate of the College of Engineering at the University of Texas at Austin and in 2003 became a charter member and member of the Board of Directors of the Civil and Architectural Engineering Academy of Distinguished Graduates at the University of Texas.

Dr. Haragan's wife, Willie O'Berry Haragan, is also a UT graduate. The Haragans are the parents of two adult daughters.

Dr. Jon S. Whitmore

University President

Jon Whitmore begins his fourth year as President of Texas Tech University on September 1, 2006. In four years he has pursued an agenda to increase academic excellence by focusing on the people of Texas Tech. "I believe that if you put people first, they will produce long-term excellence for the university," he says.

The focus on human capital has resulted in 48 new faculty positions, multiple new funded chairs and professorships, a significant increase in academic advisors, and a steady schedule of merit raises for faculty and staff.

Since coming to Texas Tech, Dr. Whitmore has also implemented the Graduate on Time

Contract with entering freshmen. The contract guarantees on time graduation with availability of required courses for every student who takes an average of 15 hours per semester.

Dr. Whitmore has also set an ambitious agenda for increasing minority faculty at the university and accomplished the goals set forth in the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board's Closing the Gap initiatives to encourage 500,000 more students to enter college in the coming years in the state.

Before coming to Texas Tech, Dr. Whitmore served as Provost and Professor of Theatre Arts at the University of Iowa from 1996 until 2003. That position followed six years as Dean of the College of Fine Arts at the University of Texas at Austin.

Dr. Whitmore earned his B.A. and M.A. in Speech from Washington State University in 1967 and 1968, respectively. In 1974 he earned the Ph.D. in Dramatic Arts from the University of California, Santa Barbara, where he began his

research into and wrote his dissertation on the dramatic writings of William Saroyan.

At West Virginia University, Dr. Whitmore served as Chair of the Division of Theater from 1979 to 1983, Assistant to the President from 1983 to 1984, and Interim Dean of the College of Creative Arts from 1984 to 1985. He be-

came Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Letters at the State University of New York at Buffalo in 1985, and moved to Texas in 1990.

Dr. Whitmore has directed more

than 60 theatrical performances, produced over 50 main stage and 80 second season productions.

Jon Whitmore and his wife Jennifer are the parents of two teenage children.

BERNHARD T. MITTEMEYER, M.D.

President, Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center

Dr. Bernhard T. Mitemeyer currently serves as Interim President of Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center (TTUHSC) and Professor of Urological Surgery in the Department of Urology at the TTUHSC, School of Medicine.

Dr. Mitemeyer previously served the institution in several positions, most recently as Interim

Dean of the School of Medicine. Prior to that, he served 10 years as Executive Vice President and Provost. During this 10-year span he also served concomitantly as Dean of the School of Medicine for three years.

Before coming to Texas Tech in 1986, Dr. Mitemeyer served 28 years in the Army, rising to the rank of Lieutenant General and retiring in 1985 as Army Surgeon General, the highest position open to Army physicians.

As Surgeon General of the Army from 1981 to 1985, he was Chief Executive Officer of the Army Medical Department and Senior Medical Staff Advisor to the Chief of Staff of the Army and the Secretary of the Army.

Prior to his assignment as the Army Surgeon General, Dr. Mitemeyer served as the Commander and Chief Executive Officer of Walter Reed Army Medical Center, the military's largest tertiary care, research and teaching hospital.

Other key Army assignments have included Division Surgeon and Medical Battalion Commander

of the 101st Airborne Division in Vietnam; Commander of the U.S. Army Medical Command in Korea; Chairman of the Department of Surgery and Chief of the Urological Residency Training Program at Walter Reed Army Medical Center.

Dr. Mitemeyer holds numerous military decorations and citations, including the Distinguished Service Medal, the Army's highest peacetime award, as well as the Distinguished Flying Cross for valor in combat and the Bronze Star Medal.

After retiring from the Army and before coming to the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center, he was Senior Vice President and Corporate Medical Director of Whittaker Health Services in Los Angeles.

Dr. Mitemeyer received his Doctor of Medicine Degree from the Temple University School of Medicine in Philadelphia. He has authored or co-authored more than 40 publications and has made numerous presentations in the areas of Urology, Surgery, Health Care Administration and Leadership over his more than 50-year career in medicine.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



Gerald Myers was named Texas Tech's 12th athletic director on February 17, 1997, after serving as interim director beginning on June 11, 1996. Prior to that, he was in his first year as associate athletic director for sports programs. The previous five years

Myers served his alma mater as an assistant and associate athletic director, overseeing various aspects of the athletic department.

Gerald Myers has been at the forefront in leading the Texas Tech athletic program through a time of change, growth, and transition. With direction from an aggressive effort from the university administration and under Myers' watch, Texas Tech continues to emerge as a leader in the Big 12 Conference and national college athletics in the new millennium.

In 2004, Texas Tech was one of only four schools to earn a berth in the NCAA

postseason for four major sports — football, men's and women's basketball, and baseball. Half of those coaches (Mike Leach and Bob Knight) were hired by Myers. Additionally, Texas Tech was the only school in the country during the 2004-2005 academic year to win a bowl game and send both basketball programs to the "Sweet Sixteen" in the NCAA Tournament.

Bob Knight has guided the Red Raiders to 105 wins in five seasons — the most victories in any five-year period. Mike Leach has guided the Raiders to bowl games in six consecutive seasons and for the first time in school history. Upon Marsha Sharp's resignation in March, Myers brought in one of the nation's finest young coaching talents in Kristy Curry.

Basketball and football, though, aren't the only sports enjoying success at Texas Tech. Wes Kittley's track and field squad won the men's Big 12 Conference Championship and had a record number of men and women track and field athletes (31) compete at the 2005 Championships. Tim Siegel guided the men's tennis team to its first NCAA Championships appearance in school history after hosting first- and second-round matches for the first time in 2005.

The men's golf team, led by fifth-year coach Greg Sands, reached the NCAA Championships in 2006, the second time under Sands' brief tenure. Sands has brought the Raiders to the regional tournament in his other three seasons, including 2005. Additionally, the team's 2002 appearance was the first in 26 years. Stacey Totman, head coach of the women's golf team, led the Lady Raiders to the regional tournament in her first season four years ago, and they made a return trip in 2005.

Bob Knight and Gerald Myers, who have great respect for each other, have produced many positive results off the court. With the help of Myers and Knight, all of the men's basketball scholarships are being funded through the Knight Scholarship Foundation, Inc. without using university monies.

Revenue also has seen a dramatic increase under Myers. The annual operating budget for the Athletics Department has grown from \$9 million in 1996 to \$42 million in 2006.

The success of Tech, though, doesn't lie in wins and losses or dollars and cents. Texas Tech's success is seen arguably where it counts most — in the classroom. While Myers might not directly affect whether a student graduates, his support has led to an increase in Texas Tech's graduation rates.

In the year prior to Myers' first year as AD, 44 percent of Texas Tech athletes graduated (freshman scholarship athletes only). Student-athlete graduation rates have grown steadily since the inception of the Big 12 Conference with a 2005 graduation rate of 65% for all student-athletes, the second highest student-athlete graduation rate in the Big 12 Conference.

Myers' success at Texas Tech also has led to national recognition and responsibilities. He served on the NCAA golf committee, was a past president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches, and has just completed a two-year stint on the men's basketball selection committee.

Myers also has been recognized by the All-American Football Foundation, which recently presented him with the Gen. Robert R. Neyland Outstanding Athletic Director Award. The National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) honored Myers at the Final Four in San Antonio with the Metropolitan Award for his contributions to college basketball.

Gerald Myers, the winningest men's basketball coach in Texas Tech history, served as Red Raider head basketball coach for 20 years (1971-91). After taking over midway through the 1970-1971 season, he posted a 326-261 record and led the Red Raiders to 16 winning records, three conference championships, and four NCAA Tournament berths.

Myers also earned three letters as a member of the Texas Tech basketball team from 1956-59. His 86.9 free throw percentage in 1957-1958 is still second on the all-time Texas Tech career charts.

A native of Borger, Texas, Myers coached at Lubbock Monterey High School and Houston Baptist before returning to Texas Tech in 1970 as an assistant coach. He earned his degree in education from Texas Tech in 1959 and a master's degree from Tech in 1965.

Gerald Myers is a member of the Texas Tech Athletic Hall of Honor, the Texas High School Basketball Hall of Fame, and the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame. He also served as president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches.

He served on the NCAA Division I Men's Golf Committee from 2001 through the summer of 2003 and served on the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee for two years.

He and his wife, Carol, have a daughter and son-in-law, Laurie and Todd McKee, and two grandsons, Matthew and Connor.

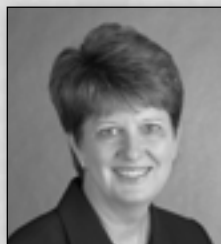
