IN MEMORANDUM: TOMMY MCVAY

Texas Tech Athletics suffered a deep loss prior to the 2020 season with the passing of longtime Director of Football Operations Tommy McVay. The Red Raiders will wear a helmet sticker in all 10 games this year to honor the late McVay, who passed suddenly on Aug. 13 at the age of 76.

McVay was always a familiar face on the Red Raider sidelines where he spent 23 full seasons under five different head coaches. He was among the first hires for head coach Matt Wells shortly after he touched down in Lubbock for the first time. McVay was responsible for Texas Tech landing future Red Raider standout and NFL great Wes Welker during his career as he convinced then head coach Mike Leach to use the program's last scholarship on the relatively-unknown recruit out of McVay's native Oklahoma. McVay was a standout basketball and track and field athlete at Southeastern Oklahoma State where he was inducted into its Hall of Fame in 2009. He was honored for his work locally in 2017 when the Texas Tech chapter of the National Football Foundation presented him the award for outstanding contribution to amateur football at its annual banquet.

SATURDAY STORYLINES



TEXAS TECH, TEXAS MEET FOR 70TH TIME

- Texas Tech will look for its third win over Texas in the last six seasons and its first at home since 2008 on Saturday when the Red Raiders and Longhorns open Big 12 play at Jones AT&T Stadium. It will be the 70th all-time meeting between the two in-state rivals, who will be opening their Big 12 slate against each other for the fourth time in history.
- A win over Texas would mark Texas Tech's first over a top-10 team since routing No. 4 West Virginia, 49-14, during the 2012 season. The Red Raiders will be looking for their first win over a ranked Texas team since the Red Raiders' magical win over the top-ranked Longhorns in 2008.



BOWMAN RETURNS WITH 400-YARD GAME

- Alan Bowman made his return behind center against Houston Baptist, throwing for 430 yards and a pair of touchdowns in Texas Tech's 35-33 victory over the Huskies. Bowman's performance marked his fourth career game with at least 400 passing yards and seventh with 300 yards through the air as he completed 73.1 percent of his passes to help the Red Raiders start the season with a win for the 17th time in the past 18 years.
- Despite two seasons as a Red Raider and 11 career starts at quarterback, this will be Bowman's first ever appearance against Texas as he was held out of each of the two previous meetings due to injury.



RUSH DEFENSES ON DISPLAY SATURDAY

- Both Texas Tech and Texas will put two strong rushing defenses on display Saturday as both teams allowed less than 50 yards on the ground in their respective season openers against Houston Baptist and UTEP. The Red Raiders surrendered only 28 rushing yards to Houston Baptist, their fewest since the 2012 season opener versus Northwestern State.
- The Red Raiders will look to limit a Texas offense that strung together 689 yards of total offense against the Miners, the highest single-game total so far in college football this season. The Longhorns recorded 208 of those yards on the ground en route to a 59-3 rout over UTEP.

SERIES HISTORY

- Texas Tech and Texas will meet for the 70th time in history and the 61st-consecutive year Saturday afternoon. The Longhorns control a 52-17 all-time advantage in the series, which includes a 21-10 mark in games played in Lubbock.
- The Red Raiders will be looking for their first win over the Longhorns at home since the 2008 season when **Graham Harrell** found **Michael Crabtree** for the game-winning touchdown with only a second remaining in regulation. Four of Texas Tech's five home losses to Texas since that memorable game have come by 10 points or less.
- Outside of last year's meeting in Austin, the two in-state rivals have gone to the wire over the past five years as four of those meetings have been determined by a touchdown or less. Lil'**Jordan Humphrey** hauled in a 29-yard touchdown grab to give Texas the victory with only 21 seconds remaining in 2018, while **Justus Parker**, a year earlier, picked off a **Sam Ehlinger** pass with just over two minutes remaining, setting up a **Cameron Batson** touchdown grab from **Nic Shimonek** that was followed by a **Douglas Coleman** III interception to seal the victory.
- The Red Raiders used a trick play to defeat the Longhorns in the closing minutes of the 2015 meeting as **Jakeem Grant** hid behind the offensive line before scampering 40 yards around the left side to the end zone to give Texas Tech a 48-38 lead with 2:41 remaining. It was the first of back-to-back wins in Austin for the Red Raiders, who had not done so previously in school history.
- **Matt Wells** is looking to become only the fourth head coach in program history to top Texas in his first two seasons, joining **Steve Sloan** (1976), **David McWilliams** (1986, his only season) and **Spike Dykes** (1988).

FAMILY TIES

- There are several ties between the Texas Tech and Texas programs, none possibly more noticeable than Red Raider senior linebacker **Colin Schooler** and his brother **Brenden Schooler**, a senior wide receiver for the Longhorns. The Schooler brothers were previously slated to play their final collegiate season together at Arizona before both deciding to transfer after the Pac-12 delayed its season. Brenden Schooler played his first three seasons at Oregon before transferring to Arizona and then Texas.
- The Schooler brothers have split the previous two meetings against each other as Brenden and the Ducks topped Arizona, 48-28, in 2017 before Colin the Wildcats routed Oregon, 44-15, in 2018. Brenden Schooler is the older of the two brothers.

TEXAS TECH-TEXAS CONNECTIONS

- Texas Tech inside receivers and tight ends coach **Luke Wells'** relationship with Texas head coach **Tom Herman** dates back to their time together at Big 12 counterpart Iowa State from 2009-11. Wells held a similar position with the Cyclones as now, while Herman was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. Texas first-year defensive coordinator **Chris Ash** was also the defensive backs coach and recruiting coordinator in Ames for the 2009 season before moving on to Wisconsin.
- Texas co-offensive coordinator and offensive line coach **Herb**

Hand worked alongside both Texas Tech defensive coordinator **Keith Patterson** and defensive line coach **Paul Randolph** for three seasons at the University of Tulsa. Hand was in the same exact position with the Golden Hurricanes as he is now at Texas from 2007-09, while Patterson was Tulsa's co-defensive coordinator and linebackers coach and Randolph was executive senior associate head coach and the other co-defensive coordinator.

- First-year Texas Tech linebackers coach **Kevin Cosgrove** and Texas co-defensive coordinator and linebackers coach **Coleman Hutzler** spent two seasons on the same staff together at New Mexico from 2012-13. Cosgrove was the inside linebackers coach for the Lobos those two seasons, while Hutzler was the special teams coordinator and outside linebackers coach.

TEXAS TECH IN BIG 12 OPENERS

- Texas Tech enters this weekend with a 14-10 all-time record in Big 12 openers. The Red Raiders have won five of their last eight Big 12 openers thanks to victories over TCU (2013), Iowa State (2012), Kansas (2011, 2016) and Oklahoma State (2018).
- This will be the fourth time in school history where the Red Raiders have kicked off league play against the Longhorns as Texas is a perfect 3-0 in those games with wins in 2001, 2009 and 2010. Texas was ranked among the top-five teams nationally entering each of those three seasons.
- The Red Raiders will be facing a ranked opponent to open Big 12 play for the seventh time in the past eight years. Texas Tech is 2-5 during that span with a 20-10 victory over No. 24 TCU in 2013 and a 41-17 rout over No. 5 Oklahoma State in 2018. Tech is 3-8 all-time in Big 12 openers versus ranked foes.

RED RAIDERS VERSUS RANKED FOES

- The Red Raiders will be looking to knock off a top-25 opponent for a third-consecutive season Saturday after topping a ranked Oklahoma State program each of the last two years. Oklahoma State was No. 15 in the country two years ago when the Red Raiders handed the Cowboys a 41-17 rout in Stillwater. Texas Tech followed with a 45-35 victory over the No. 21-ranked Cowboys in 2019, marking their first top-25 win under **Matt Wells**.
- Texas Tech will be looking for its first win over a top-10 team since dropping West Virginia at home, 49-14, midway through the 2012 season. The Mountaineers came into that game ranked No. 4 nationally before Tech delivered its largest margin of victory over a top-five team in school history.
- Texas Tech has recorded seven wins over top-10 foes since moving to a spread offense in 2000. Additionally, the Red Raiders have knocked off at least one ranked opponent in nine of the past 13 years dating back to the start of the 2007 season.
- With a win Saturday, **Matt Wells** will become only the second Texas Tech head coach to record a top-25 win in each of his first two seasons, joining **Tommy Tuberville** (2010-11). Wells is 4-9 over his career against ranked opponents.
- This will be the first time Texas Tech will face a ranked opponent within its first two games of a season since opening the 2002 campaign at No. 12 Ohio State. The Red Raiders had not previously faced a top-10 team this early in a season since the 1997 opener at No. 5 Tennessee.

NEWS & NOTES FROM WEEK 1

- Texas Tech opened its season with a win for the 17th time in the past 18 years after topping Houston Baptist, 35-33, on Sept. 12. It also marked the 21-consecutive season where the Red Raiders have won their home opener.
- **Zech McPhearson** recorded his first career interception in the win over Houston Baptist as he picked off a trick play pass from Jarreth Sterns in the end zone early in the second quarter. McPhearson has now started in all 13 games of his Tech career.
- Texas Tech boasted a 100-yard rusher in its season opener for the second-consecutive year as **SaRodorick Thompson** carried 22 times for 118 yards and a pair of touchdowns. It followed the 125 yards on the ground **Armand Shyne** posted in Texas Tech's 2019 opener against Montana State. Dating back to the 2000 campaign, this is the first time Texas Tech has had a 100-yard rusher in back-to-back season openers.
- Thompson found the end zone twice against Houston Baptist, marking the sixth multi-touchdown game of his career. It was also

the second-straight year he has rushed for multiple touchdowns in a season opener.

- **KeSean Carter** picked up where he left off from the 2019 season as the junior caught six passes for a team-leading 86 yards versus Houston Baptist. Dating back to the 2019 season finale at Texas, Carter has now caught 17 passes for 236 yards and two touchdowns over his last two games.
- **Ja'Lynn Polk** caught five passes for 56 yards versus Houston Baptist, marking the first time a true freshman has recorded five or more receptions in a season opener since two-time Biletnikoff Award winner **Michael Crabtree** in 2007.
- **Krishon Merriweather** was tabbed the Big 12 Defensive Player of the Week following an impressive debut where he led the Red Raiders with 12 tackles, including a key fourth-down stop at the goal line just before halftime. He is the first Red Raider newcomer dating back to 2000 to record double digits for tackles in a season opener. The award marked the fourth-consecutive season a Red Raider linebacker had garnered the Big 12's top weekly defensive honor as a pair of NFL linebackers in **Dakota Allen** (2017-18) and **Jordyn Brooks** previously earned the honor.
- Houston Baptist was limited to only 28 rushing yards in the loss, the fewest for a Texas Tech opponent since Northwestern State recorded only 13 yards on the ground to open the 2012 season. Merriweather recorded eight of his 12 tackles on the night via running plays.
- **Brandon Bouyer-Randle** put together a strong debut as a Red Raider with six tackles, a quarterback hurry and three pass break-ups. It marked the most for a Texas Tech linebacker since John Saldi knocked down four passes in the 2002 Tangerine Bowl versus Clemson.
- Houston Baptist was limited to only 28 rushing yards in the loss, the fewest for an opponent since Northwestern State recorded only 13 yards on the ground to open the 2012 season.
- The win over Houston Baptist marked Texas Tech's first in a game determined by a possession or less (8 points) since going on the road to top TCU, 17-14, in 2018. The Red Raiders had dropped six straight one-possession games since that win, including all four from a year ago.

POTENT NOTABLES...

- Following its win over Houston Baptist, Texas Tech received 11 points in the USA Today Coaches' poll and five points in the Associated Press rankings. It marked the first time the Red Raiders had received votes under **Matt Wells**. The Red Raiders are again receiving votes points in this week's Associated Press poll.
- Texas Tech has led or been tied with Texas following the opening quarter in each of the last six meetings as the Red Raiders have outscored the Longhorns, 50-30, during the first 15 minutes over those six games.
- The Texas Tech offensive line did not allow a sack in the season opener against Houston Baptist despite two new starters at the tackle spots in sophomore **Ethan Carde** and senior transfer **Josh Burger**. The Red Raiders closed the 2019 season ranked tied for 25th nationally in fewest sacks allowed despite being one of the most active teams in the country through the air.
- Texas Tech kept Houston Baptist off the board in two of its three appearances in the red zone, an early improvement on a year ago where the Red Raiders closed the season tied for 86th nationally in red zone defense. The Red Raiders are currently tied for sixth nationally and fourth in the Big 12 for red zone defense.
- The Red Raiders had 11 different receivers catch a pass in the win over Houston Baptist, marking the eighth time under **Matt Wells** where Texas Tech had 10 or more players haul in at least one reception in a game.
- Following the season-opening win over Houston Baptist, Matt Wells is now 39-6 during his career when scoring at least 30 points overall. That record includes a 5-3 mark during his time at Texas Tech.
- Additionally, **Matt Wells** is 26-6 in his career and 2-1 at Texas Tech when boasting a 100-yard rusher. **SaRodorick Thompson** has recorded two of the three 100-yard performances in the 13 games under Wells thus far.
- Texas Tech boasts four players with 20 or more starts in the career as **DaMarcus Fields** leads the group with 32 followed by **Eli Howard** with 31, **Jack Anderson** with 29 and **T.J. Vasher** with 22.

WHAT RETURNS FOR THE RED RAIDERS

■ Texas Tech returns the bulk of its starters from a year ago, including its leading rusher in **SaRodorick Thompson** and leading receiver **Erik Ezukanma**. The Red Raiders boast six starters returning on the offensive side of the ball and eight more on defense. Texas Tech also brings back each of its three specialists as well.

THE SIXTH-YEAR VETERANS

■ Texas Tech will have two veterans on each side of the ball this year with a pair of sixth-year players in wide receiver **Seth Collins** and defensive lineman **Eli Howard**. Collins was granted an extra year after missing the entire 2019 season with a shoulder injury. Howard, meanwhile, was returned a year of eligibility following the 2017 season due to the nature of his transfer from North Texas.

■ The NCAA has already declared all fall sport student-athletes will not lose a year of eligibility this year due to the COVID-19 pandemic, meanwhile both Collins and Howard could return in 2021 for a seventh season. Texas Tech had a seventh-year senior only a few years ago in offensive lineman **Tony Morales**, who was with the Red Raiders from 2011-17.

(MULTIPLE) DEGREES IN HAND

■ **Eli Howard** is not only one of the top returning sack leaders in college football but also a rarity in the fact that he is already a two-time college graduate from Texas Tech. Howard, who arrived in Lubbock as a walk-on transfer from North Texas prior to the 2016 season, earned his undergraduate degree in management at Texas Tech prior to his 2017 sophomore season and then added his master's in personal financial planning this spring.

■ The 2020 season will be Howard's sixth as a collegiate student-athlete as he was awarded an extension to his five-year clock prior to the 2017 campaign. A native of San Angelo, Texas, Howard will pursue multiple certificates through the Rawls College of Business during the 2020 football season.



GETTING OLDER...

■ One of the goals for **Matt Wells** and his staff upon their arrival in Dec. 2018 was making the Red Raiders older as a roster. They have done just that, bringing in 12 graduate transfers during that span, including eight who appear on this year's roster.

■ One area Wells has taken advantage of is graduate transfers with multiple years of eligibility remaining. **Zech McPhearson** and **Ja'Marcus Ingram** are entering their second year with the Red Raiders, while **Brandon Bouyer-Randle** and **Chadarius Townsend** both arrived in Lubbock as juniors this offseason.

■ Of the 12 graduate transfers to arrive under Wells, eight have come from power-five schools, including five in this year's class alone.

■ Wells' first class of graduate transfers provided an immediate impact in several ways a year ago as McPhearson started in all 12 games at cornerback, while **Armand Shyne** and **RJ Turner** ranked as the Red Raiders' second-leading rusher and receiver, respectively. Ingram also appeared in all 12 games, while **Evan Rambo** made two starts at linebacker before medically retiring.

CHAMPIONSHIP EXPERIENCE

■ Among Texas Tech's graduate transfers, two already own national championship rings in former Alabama running back **Chadarius Townsend** and LSU safety **Eric Monroe**. Townsend was a redshirt on Alabama's 2017 national championship team and later played in the Crimson Tide's College Football Playoff run in 2018. Monroe, meanwhile, saw action in 12 games during the 2019 campaign, including both of LSU's victories in the College Football Playoff.

■ Texas Tech linebackers coach **Kevin Cosgrove** was also part of LSU's national championship run in 2019 as he was a senior defensive analyst for the Tigers.

PATTERSON CONTINUES TO BUILD #806D

■ The Red Raiders will look to build on the defensive improvements from a year ago under second-year coordinator **Keith Patterson**, who returns eight starters on his side of the ball. Patterson's first year leading the defense was highlighted by an aggressive scheme that had Texas Tech force 19 turnovers while allowing 30.3 points per game, its lowest average since 2009.

■ Patterson's defenses have long been known for their ability to create turnovers as Utah State led the nation with 32 takeaways in 2018 prior to hire his hire at Texas Tech. Patterson's unit has created 52 takeaways the past two-plus seasons alone, which is third nationally among active defensive coordinators. He only trails Clemson's Brent Venables and UCF's Randy Shannon in the category during that span.

■ Patterson, who will oversee the entire defense and assist with the secondary this season, mentored **Jordyn Brooks** into one of the top linebackers in the country a year ago as the now Seattle Seahawk garnered second team All-America honors by multiple publications. He later became the first Red Raider defensive player to be drafted in the first round of the NFL Draft since College Football Hall of Famer **Gabe Rivera** in 1983.

■ Brooks joined a long list of defensive standouts to record at least 100 tackles in a season under Patterson as he finished with 108 on the year, including 20.0 that went for a loss, despite missing a considerable amount of playing time in November due to injury. Patterson, who is assisting with the secondary this year after overseeing Texas Tech's linebackers in 2019, has now mentored 10 players who have recorded 100 or more tackles in a season since he became the defensive coordinator at Tulsa in 2006.

YEAR TWO IN THE YOST OFFENSE

■ Texas Tech has long been known for its ability to annually produce one of the nation's top offenses, a feat it continued a year ago under a new offensive coordinator in **David Yost**. The Red Raiders ranked seventh nationally in passing yards per game (324.7) and 11th in total offense per game (474.3) but finished only 53rd in scoring offense with 30.5 points per game.

■ Since becoming Texas Tech's offensive coordinator, Yost as well as head coach **Matt Wells** have stressed the Red Raiders will find their most success beginning in year two in the offense, similar to what Utah State discovered in 2018. The Aggies went from averaging a similar 30.2 points per game in their first season under Yost in 2017 to posting an impressive 47.5 points per game in 2018, which ranked second nationally only behind Oklahoma.

■ Texas Tech brings back its leading rusher (**SaRodrick Thompson**) and leading receiver (**Erik Ezukanma**) from a year ago plus three starters on the offensive line and a quarterback in **Alan Bowman**, who already boasts 11 starts over his career. Yost will be able to work with all three for the foreseeable future as they are all listed as sophomores entering this year.

BACK TO SCHOOL(ER)

■ It's not everyday a school can add a three-time All-Conference selection to its roster leading up to the season. The Red Raiders did just that, however, in August when Arizona graduate transfer **Colin Schooler** chose to play his final season in Lubbock.

■ Schooler, a Freshman All-America honoree and the Pac-12 Freshman Defensive Player of the Year in 2017, recorded at least 90 tackles in all three seasons with the Wildcats, including a career-high 119 in 2018. He has totaled 312 career takedowns over his career, which trails only Northwestern's Paddy Fisher for the most among active FBS players entering the 2020 campaign.

■ Schooler leads all active FBS players in tackles for a loss as he has posted 46.0 knockdowns behind the line of scrimmage entering this season, including 9.0 that have gone for sacks. He needs 10.0 additional tackles for a loss this season to match Cincinnati's Antwan Peek (2000-02) and Michigan's Brandon Graham (2006-09) for 24th all-time in FBS history.

■ Schooler hails from a football family as his father, Tom, played at Eastern Michigan, while his older brother, Brendan, played at Oregon before joining him at Arizona for one season. His mother, Christine, was also a collegiate athlete as part of the Cal State Los Angeles volleyball program.

ANDERSON, DEATON BOOST O-LINE

■ Texas Tech will lean on the experience of juniors **Jack Anderson** and **Dawson Deaton** this season as the Red Raiders navigate the loss of three longtime starters along the offensive line. Anderson boasts 29 starts at right guard over his career, while his former Frisco High School teammate has made 15 starts at center.

■ An early injury to Anderson paved the way for extra playing time for sophomore **Weston Wright**, who made eight starts a year ago at guard. **Casey Verhulst** also made three starts as a sophomore, giving Texas Tech 56 career starts among its returners up front.

■ Anderson remains one of the top signees in Texas Tech history as the junior is a likely NFL Draft selection over the next two years. Anderson has started in 29 games over his Red Raider career after signing with Texas Tech as a consensus four-star prospect and a top-50 prospect by ESPN.

■ Texas Tech's biggest loss came at the two tackle spots with the departure of **Travis Bruffy** and **Terence Steele**, both NFL free agent signees with the Green Bay Packers and Dallas Cowboys, respectively. The duo accounted for 81 starts alone over their Red Raider careers. The 2019 season also marked the end of Madison Akamnonu's career as the veteran guard closed his tenure with 39 starts primarily at left guard. Steele has already started in both games this year for the Cowboys.

QB ALAN BOWMAN

BOWMAN RETURNS AS QB1 FOR TECH

- **Alan Bowman** will make his 12th career start Saturday and his first against Texas. He returned behind center against Houston Baptist, marking his first appearance since suffering an injury at Arizona early in the 2019 campaign.
- The Red Raider offense has proven to be more effective with Bowman under center the past two-plus seasons as Texas Tech is averaging roughly 15 more points per game when he plays. Injuries have unfortunately sidelined Bowman for 13 games over his first two seasons as a Red Raider.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Bowman became the sixth true freshman in school history to start a game at quarterback in 2018, joining a list that includes **Ron Reeves** (1978), **Aaron Keesee** (1984), **Baker Mayfield** (2013), **Davis Webb** (2013) and **Patrick Mahomes II** (2014).
- Bowman turned in one of the most impressive performances by a freshman in NCAA history in Texas Tech's victory over Houston in 2018 as he completed 43-of-59 passes for 605 yards and five touchdowns. Bowman's 605 yards through the air marked the most by a freshman in Big 12 history, snapping the previous record of 598 yards set by **Patrick Mahomes II** against Baylor in 2014.
- Bowman's performance versus Houston finished only six passing yards shy of the NCAA freshman record that was set in 1998 by Nevada's **David Neill** against New Mexico State. It marked only the third time in FBS history where a freshman has thrown for at least 600 yards in a game (second time by a true freshman).
- Bowman wrapped the 2018 season with 2,638 yards through the air, finishing only 80 yards shy of the Texas Tech freshman passing record that was set by **Davis Webb** in 2013.

JUST A SOPHOMORE BUT EXPERIENCED

- This will be **Alan Bowman's** seventh-straight year to be named the starting quarterback dating back to his time at Grapevine High School in the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex. It took only three games into Bowman's high school freshman season for him to

CHASE DANIEL | MISSOURI

Daniel has experienced quite the professional career since playing for Yost at Missouri. A former undrafted free agent, the former Heisman Trophy finalist will enter his 12th season of NFL duty in 2020 after already appearing in 65 games over his pro career.



BLAINE GABBERT | MISSOURI

Gabbert followed a long line of successful Missouri quarterbacks under Yost as he was selected 10th overall in the 2011 NFL Draft. The 2020 campaign will mark Gabbert's 10th season at the pro level as he will enter his second year with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.



JUSTIN HERBERT | OREGON

Yost spent one season as Herbert's quarterbacks coach as he became the first Oregon true freshman to start behind center since 1983. Herbert was later selected sixth overall in the 2020 NFL Draft by the Los Angeles Chargers organization.



JORDAN LOVE | UTAH STATE

Yost mentored Love into one of the nation's top quarterbacks over the 2017-18 seasons, setting numerous Utah State school records in the process. The Green Bay Packers later used the 26th overall pick to select Love in the 2020 NFL Draft.



SPECIAL TEAMS WATCH

DIFFERENT LOOK TO SPECIAL TEAMS

■ **Mark Tommerdahl** entered the 2020 season with a lot different outlook than his first season at Texas Tech a year ago. The special teams coordinator inherited a depleted room a year ago that needed a new starter at every specialist position, namely place kicker and punter.

■ Tommerdahl found a starter at both of those spots and then some as place kicker **Trey Wolff** and punter **Austin McNamara** both ranked among the top specialists in the country. They both enter the 2020 season as preseason candidates for the Lou Groza and Ray Guy Awards, making Texas Tech one of only eight schools nationally represented on both watch lists.

■ Texas Tech's success on special teams in 2019 came despite all three of its specialists - McNamara, Wolff and long snapper **Luke Rizzo** - being classified as freshmen. During preseason camp this August, **Matt Wells** described all three of having the potential to play on Sundays.

MCNAMARA AMONG NATION'S BEST

■ McNamara, who garnered Freshman All-America honors by the FWAA and The Athletic, quickly turned heads in his first year as Texas Tech's punter as the then-true freshman averaged a booming 45.0 yards per punt, which ranked second among freshmen nationally and ranked 16th overall. He downed 20 kicks inside the 20 on the year and sailed 17 at least 50 yards.

■ Behind McNamara, Texas Tech ended 2019 ranked fourth nationally and first in the Big 12 for net punting as the Red Raider coverage unit averaged 42.5 yards over the course of the year.

ACCURACY KEY FOR WOLFF

■ Wolff, meanwhile, provided a reliable leg as Texas Tech's primary place kicker and kickoff specialist as he finished an impressive 20-of-22 on field goal attempts to rank seventh in the FBS in field goal percentage. Wolff closed the year with the most successful field goals by a freshman kicker all-time and the second-highest total in school history. He also ranked 14th nationally in field goals per game and 27th in points scored per game.

■ Both of Wolff's misses came from 40 yards or longer as he ended the year ranked seventh in field goal percentage (90.9). His percentage marked only the second time in school history a Red Raider had connected on 90 percent or higher of his field goal attempts of a season, joining **Clayton Hatfield** from 2016.

■ Wolff found the uprights on each of his first seven attempts prior to a miss against Oklahoma State, making him the first Red Raider dating back to 2000 to successfully find the uprights in each of his first seven career attempts. He enters this weekend having connected on each of his last eight attempts, which is five shy of Hatfield's record that was set in 2018.

GETTING TO THE KICKER

■ The Red Raiders were aggressive on special teams a year ago, ranking 14th in the FBS with three blocked kicks, their most in a season since 2008. It marked only the third time since 2000 where Texas Tech has blocked three or more kicks in a season.

■ **Zech McPhearson** got his hands on two of those blocked kicks, making him only the second Red Raider since 2000 to knock down multiple kicks in a season, joining current NFL defensive lineman **Kerry Hyder** from 2013.

TEXAS TECH KNOWS OFFENSE

■ One thing is certain when watching Texas Tech - the Red Raiders are going to find their way onto the scoreboard. Tech is currently riding a consecutive-game scoring streak that spans 283 games dating back to the 1997 season. The streak, which began against Texas A&M on Oct. 25, 1997, ranks tied for seventh nationally with Oklahoma and is the second-longest active streak in the Big 12 behind TCU.

■ Texas Tech's streak is now tied for the 12th longest in FBS history as the Red Raiders moved into a tie with Georgia Tech after scoring on their first drive against Houston Baptist. The touchdown pushed the Red Raiders past Texas' run of 282-consecutive games that spanned the 1980-2004 seasons.

■ Texas Tech is the only school in the country to rank among the top 16 teams for total offense and top 10 for passing offense in every season since 2002.

MAKING IT LOOK E-Z

■ Possibly no receiver emerged late into last season quite like sophomore **Erik Ezukanma**, who led the Red Raiders with 664 receiving yards, the majority of which came during Big 12 play. He became the first Red Raider since two-time Biletnikoff Award winner **Michael Crabtree** in 2007 to lead the team in receiving yards as only a freshman.

■ Ezukanma developed a knack for the big play as well, hauling in a team-leading 13 plays of 25 yards or longer. He was easily the team leader with six more plays that went that distance than any other Red Raider.

■ Ezukanma closed the 2019 season with his first career 100-yard outing at as he hauled in seven receptions for 135 yards, which included a 24-yard touchdown strike midway through the second quarter.

THOMPSON BACK TO ANCHOR RUN GAME

■ **Matt Wells** has made it no secret that the Red Raiders will look to flourish in the running game under his watch, giving Texas Tech a balanced approach that can score via both an explosive play and in the red zone. One key component to that approach will once again be through sophomore running back **SaRodorick Thompson**, who led the Red Raiders on the ground a year ago with 765 rushing yards and 12 touchdowns off 160 carries.

■ Thompson, who ended the year ranked third in the Big 12 and 27th nationally for rushing touchdowns, became only the eighth became only the eighth Red Raider to lead the team in rushing as

a freshman, joining the likes of **James Gray** (1986), **Byron "Bam" Morris** (1991), **Byron Hanspard** (1994), **Ricky Williams** (1997), **Shaud Williams** (1999), **Taurean Henderson** (2002) and **Da'Leon Ward** (2016).

■ Among that group, Thompson ranks second all-time, trailing only Henderson's 793 yards from the 2002 season. Two members of that group in Morris and Hanspard went on to win the prestigious Doak Walker Award later in their respective careers.

■ The bulk of Thompson's yardage came in Big 12 play a year ago as he ranked sixth after averaging 74.6 rushing yards per game against league foes. Thompson will look to carry that into this season when he looks to become only the fourth Red Raider in the Big 12 era to rush for 1,000 yards in a season, joining **DeAndre Washington** (2014-15), **Williams** (1998) and **Hanspard** (1996).

YOU'RE ON SCHOLARSHIP

■ **Matt Wells** has surprised two former walk-ons in sophomore place kicker **Trey Wolff** and sophomore running back **Xavier White** with scholarships since the end of the 2019 season. Wolff received a phone call from Wells on Christmas Day last December, while White was presented with his scholarship during a Zoom midway through preseason camp.

■ The use of Zoom has become a popular tool for the Red Raiders this summer as Texas Tech utilized the platform for many of its team meetings. White believed he was in the middle of a normal Sunday night meeting until Wells introduced his grandfather, Joe Washington, who proceeded to deliver the scholarship presentation. White, a local product out of Monterey High School, is a third generation student-athlete at Texas Tech as his grandfather and uncle, Josh Washington, were both members of the men's basketball program.

COLOMBI, WILSON GRANTED WAIVERS

■ Texas Tech junior quarterback **Henry Colombi** and sophomore defensive lineman **Tyree Wilson** have both been granted a NCAA waiver during preseason camp that make the two transfers immediately eligible this season. Colombi transferred to Texas Tech early in camp from Utah State where he previously played under both **Matt Wells** and offensive coordinator **David Yost**. Wilson, meanwhile, arrived in Lubbock following one season at Texas A&M.

A DIFFERENT TYPE OF SCHEDULE

■ As many around college football know by now, the 2020 season will be, well, different. Instead of its normal 12-game regular season, Texas Tech has adopted a 10-game schedule as part of the Big 12 Conference's "9+1" model.

■ Texas Tech had not opened a season as far back as Sept. 12 on the calendar since 1984 when the Red Raiders recorded a 44-7 victory over UT-Arlington on Sept. 15. Tech was slated to open its season Sept. 5 at UTEP as part of its original 2020 schedule.

■ Texas Tech's 10-game schedule marks its fewest regular-season contests since 1969 when the Red Raiders finished 5-5 overall under head coach **JT King**.

■ Texas Tech will open Big 12 play against Texas, marking the fourth time in league history where the two in-state rivals have kicked off league action against each other. It will also mark the first time since 2010 the two schools have met outside the month of November.

■ Texas Tech went from playing on the road on Halloween to hosting Oklahoma in the new schedule format. It will mark the first time since 2015 that the Red Raiders have played on Halloween and the first time that Tech has faced the Sooners on the date. Tech will be looking for its first win over Oklahoma since 2009.

■ The Red Raiders' regular-season finale was pushed back a week for a Dec. 5 kick at home versus Kansas. It marks the first

time Texas Tech has hosted a home game in the month of December since the Red Raiders clinched the 1976 Southwest Conference crown with a 24-21 victory over No. 18 Baylor on Dec. 4 of that year. Texas Tech has played two other regular-season games in December since then, facing Arkansas on the road in 1978 and then Oklahoma State in 1988 as part of a neutral-site contest in Japan dubbed the Coca-Cola Classic.

- Texas Tech will have open dates on Oct. 17 following its game at Iowa State and then again Nov. 21 after hosting Baylor. In both instances, Texas Tech will be playing an opponent the following week who did not share the same open date with the Red Raiders.

THEY'RE THE CAPTAINS NOW

- Matt Wells named 10 team captains to his leadership council in the day leading up to the season opener against Houston Baptist. The captains circle features three seniors, two seniors and five sophomores with one player representing the Red Raiders at the coin toss each week.

- Among the elected captains, six were selected for a second-consecutive season in seniors **Eli Howard** and **Riko Jeffers**, junior **Jack Anderson** and sophomores **Alan Bowman**, **Erik Ezukanma** and **SaRodorick Thompson**.

POLICE CHIEF, TONY BRADFORD JR.

- In the midst of a national conversation regarding social injustice in this country, Texas Tech has found a voice with a unique perspective - sophomore defensive lineman Tony Bradford Jr., who desires to join law enforcement once his playing career is over. Bradford's goal is to one day rise to the role of police chief where he says he “can make real change.”

- Bradford received a crash course in his future profession throughout the spring as he served as a security guard with the Texas Tech Police Department. Bradford, who was initially set to only work one week with TTPD during Spring Break, extended his internship through June due to the COVID-19 pandemic that ultimately canceled spring practice.

- Despite being in his second year on campus, Bradford has become a leader in the Red Raider locker room as he has helped organize peaceful walks on the Texas Tech campus and in East Lubbock throughout the summer and preseason camp.

GIVING BACK

- Since his hire at Texas Tech, **Matt Wells** has stressed the Red Raiders will be heavily involved in the community. That initiative was so important, in fact, that one of his first hires was a former teammate of his in **Troy Kema** as the football program's Associate Athletics Director for player development and student-ath-

lete services to work closely with the J.T. and Margaret Talkington Leadership Academy staff on integrating the Red Raiders with the Lubbock community.

- In only a year, that priority has already paid off as Texas Tech ranked 10th nationally and third among power-five football programs in community service hours logged, according to a survey of 60 athletics departments who utilize the Helper Helper app that was published this past May.

- The Red Raiders will remain a high presence in the Lubbock community this season with plans already in place to volunteer for Habitat for Humanity and other organizations. Texas Tech's plans focus primarily on East Lubbock where many of the Red Raiders have expressed their desire to volunteer.

- In recent weeks, the Red Raiders have worked voter registration booths, cleaned up a community center, organized an outreach program for local youth and participated in a Habitat for Humanity project in East Lubbock. Texas Tech will continue to volunteer in East Lubbock on Friday mornings of each home football weekend throughout the season. -

CRABTREE, HARRELL SET FOR HOF

- Red Raider greats **Michael Crabtree** and **Graham Harrell** will be inducted together into the Texas Tech Hall of Fame as part of the 2020 class that was announced this summer. Arguably the top quarterback-receiver duo in school history, Crabtree and Harrell are part of a seven-person class that also features All-America guard **Ronald Ross**, former discus national champion **D'Andra Carter**, golfer **Brooke Lowrance**, volleyball standout **Chris Martin** and All-American infielder **Jason Totman**. Induction plans for Texas Tech's 2020 class are still pending at this time.

CRABTREE NAMED TO RING OF HONOR

- In addition to the Texas Tech Hall of Fame, **Michael Crabtree** will soon be inducted into an even-more prestigious group, the Ring of Honor. The two-time Biletnikoff Award winner was named the sixth member of the Texas Tech Ring of Honor on Sept. 17 with his formal induction slated for the 2021 season.

- Crabtree will join the likes of fellow Red Raider greats **Donny Anderson**, **Gabe Rivera**, **E.J. Holub**, **Dave Parks** and **Zach Thomas** in the Ring of Honor as he will be the first Red Raider to play in the Big 12 era to be inducted.

- Crabtree departed Texas Tech as the school's career leader for receiving yards (3,127) and touchdown catches (41) as well as the single-season leader for receptions (134), receiving yards (1,962) and receiving touchdowns (22), all of which are still in place outside the career mark for receiving yards. Current Miami Dolphins wideout **Jakeem Grant** broke the career receiving yards record after totaling 3,289 over four seasons from 2011-15.

RED RAIDERS IN THE NFL

SPORTS LARGEST CONTRACT

- There isn't a bigger star in the NFL right now than Texas Tech's own **Patrick Mahomes II**. The one-time Red Raider gunslinger has transformed the NFL in only three professional seasons, claiming NFL MVP honors in 2018 before leading the Kansas City Chiefs to a win in Super Bowl LIV this past season.
- Mahomes finished with 286 yards through the air and accounted for three touchdowns on his way to becoming the youngest player in history to be named the NFL MVP and also win a Super Bowl. Mahomes, who at only 24 years of age, was also tabbed Super Bowl MVP after leading the Chiefs to only their second Super Bowl title in history and their first since 1970.
- In July, Mahomes signed the richest contract not only in NFL history but in all of sports as he and the Chiefs agreed on a 10-year extension worth up to \$503 million. It marked the second time in school history where a Red Raider has signed the richest NFL contract as Ring of Honor member **Donny Anderson** previously did so with the Green Bay Packers upon being drafted in 1965.
- Mahomes claimed NFL MVP honors in 2018 following a memorable debut where he became only the second quarterback in NFL history to throw for 5,000 yards and 50 touchdowns in a regular season. The season ended with Mahomes and the Chiefs falling just a win shy of a Super Bowl appearance.
- Dating back to his time as a Red Raider, the 2016 Sammy Baugh Trophy winner is the only quarterback in history to throw for 5,000 yards at both the collegiate and NFL levels. Mahomes threw for 5,052 yards in only 12 games as a junior in 2016, his final season as a Red Raider before being selected with the 10th overall pick of the 2017 NFL Draft.
- Mahomes is the first Red Raider in school history to garner NFL MVP honors as he was also an All-Pro selection and the AFC starter in the annual Pro Bowl game. He was also the first Kansas City Chief to be recognized with the NFL's top honor.

BROOKS SELECTED IN FIRST ROUND

- **Jordyn Brooks** joined the likes of Red Raiders now in the NFL as the four-year starter was selected 27th overall by the Seattle Seahawks this past April.
- Brooks became the eighth Red Raider all-time to go off the board in the opening round, joining an elite group that includes **Walter Schlackmann** (1945), **Dave Parks** (1964), **Donny Anderson** (1965), **Ted Watts** (1981), **Gabe Rivera** (1983), **Michael Crabtree** (2009) and **Patrick Mahomes II** (2017). Of that list, the late Rivera,

a College Football Hall of Famer and member of the Texas Tech Ring of Honor, was the last defensive player to be chosen in the first round as the Pittsburgh Steelers took **Señor Sack** with the 21st overall pick in 1983.

- **Broderick Washington Jr.** followed Brooks in hearing his name called in last year's draft as the Baltimore Ravens used the 170th overall pick to select the three-year starter.
- Brooks and Washington were two of 14 Red Raider alumni to find their way on NFL 53-man rosters as was fellow 2019 graduate **Terence Steele**, who earned his spot on the Dallas Cowboys offensive line despite signing as an undrafted free agent.

RED RAIDERS IN HEAD COACHING ROLES

- Texas Tech is one of only two FBS programs in the country to boast two former players as NFL head coaches this season as **Anthony Lynn** enters his third season leading the Los Angeles Chargers, while **Kliff Kingsbury** heads into his debut season with the Arizona Cardinals. The only other school in the FBS with multiple alumni as NFL head coaches is Miami of Ohio, which features John Harbaugh (Ravens) and Sean McVay (Rams). William and Mary at the FCS level also sports two of its former players roaming NFL sidelines in Sean McDermott (Bills) and Mike Tomlin (Steelers).
- Lynn, who earned the Chargers job after serving as the Bills' interim head coach to end the 2016 campaign, led the Chargers to a 12-4 record in 2018 and an appearance in the AFC Divisional round. He returned to Lubbock for a men's basketball game in recent year and took part in a Zoom chat with the Red Raiders this summer.
- In addition to the two head coaches, Texas Tech also has three former letterwinners in prominent assistant coach positions as **Kris Kocurek** and **Wes Welker** are in their second seasons with the San Francisco 49ers as the defensive line and wide receivers coaches, while Mike Smith is entering his second year as the outside linebackers coach with the Green Bay Packers.

MISCELLANEOUS NOTES

- **Danny Amendola** is in his 12th NFL season and second with the Detroit Lions as he has caught 547 passes for 5,362 yards and 21 touchdowns over his professional career. He is one of four Red Raiders all-time to win multiple Super Bowls.
- **Kerry Hyder** and **Cody Davis** both found new homes this offseason after signing with the San Francisco 49ers and New England Patriots, respectively. **Dakota Allen** found his way on a 53-man roster for the first time with the Jacksonville Jaguars.

HEAD COACH MATT WELLS

Matt Wells, a two-time conference Coach of the Year recipient, was named the 16th head football coach in Texas Tech history on Nov. 29, 2018.

The 2020 season will be Wells' eighth season as a collegiate head coach as he has compiled a 49-42 overall record following six seasons at his alma mater, Utah State, and one year leading the Red Raiders. He led the Aggies to five bowl appearances during his tenure, a feat he will look to accomplish frequently as he continues to build the Texas Tech program.

Despite missing bowl eligibility for only the second time in his career, Wells set the groundwork for future success at Texas Tech behind the efforts of a senior class that featured a pair of All-Big 12 first team selections in Jordyn Brooks and Douglas Coleman III. Both were strong candidates for national awards as well with Coleman a semifinalist for the Jim Thorpe Award and Brooks a finalist for the Butkus Award. They were joined on the All-Big 12 first team by punter Austin McNamara, who led all FBS freshmen after averaging 45.0 yards per punt.

National pundits also noticed Brooks' efforts as he was tabbed a second team All-American by multiple publications following the season. It marked the first time a Tech linebacker had earned first or second team All-America accolades since College Football Hall of Famer and Ring of Honor member Zach Thomas in 1995. The Seattle Seahawks agreed with many of the awards committees as well, selecting Brooks with the 27th overall pick of the 2020 NFL Draft. He became only the eighth Red Raider all-time to go off the board in the first round and just the third defensive player to do so, joining the likes of Ted Watts (1981) and another College Football Hall of Famer and Ring of Honor member in Gabe Rivera (1983).

Wells was tabbed the head coach for his alma mater on Dec. 20, 2012, following two seasons as an assistant coach on staff. Utah State experienced possibly its best stretch in history during Wells' tenure as the Aggies won 44 games and played in five bowl games under his guidance, quite the feat for a program that had only eight postseason trips to its record prior to his promotion.

Wells, the fourth-longest tenured coach in program history, departed Utah State as the only coach in school history to lead the Aggies to at least three bowl games as well as multiple bowl victories. In fact, Wells was a player (1993), a coordinator (2012) or the head coach (2013-14) for four of Utah State's five bowl wins in its history with the lone exception coming at the 2018 Gildan New Mexico Bowl after he had already accepting the job at Texas Tech.

Wells closed his tenure in Logan as the second-winningest coach in program history as his 44 victories trailed only the total of E. Lowell Romney, who accumulated 128 wins over a 29-year stretch from 1919-48. Additionally, Wells compiled a 30-18 record in Mountain West play, trailing only Romney in all-time conference wins among Utah State head coaches.

Wells, a quarterback for the Aggies from 1994-96, was a member of two conference championship teams as a student-athlete, which came as a redshirt freshman in 1993 and as a senior in 1996 when Utah State was a member of the Big West Conference.

A DEVELOPMENTAL PROGRAM

Since taking the reigns as Texas Tech's head coach, Matt Wells has stressed the importance in turning the Red Raiders into a "developmental program." Over his career, Wells and his staff have done just that with eight former players moving on to the NFL, including a pair of first-round draft picks last year in Jordyn Brooks and Jordan Love. Below is a look at several notable players under Wells who have moved on to the next level.



JORDYN BROOKS | LB

Brooks put together his best season of his career under Wells en route to being selected 27th overall by the Seattle Seahawks in 2020 NFL Draft. He became the first Red Raider defensive player to be chosen in the first round since Ring of Honor member Gabe Rivera in 1983.



KYLER FACKRELL | LB

Fackrell was one of seven Aggies who earned All-America honors under Wells before being selected in the third round of the 2016 NFL Draft. He enters his fifth NFL season this fall with the New York Giants after playing his first four years with the Green Bay Packers.



JORDAN LOVE | QB

Love set numerous school records on his way to establishing himself among the nation's top quarterback prospects under Wells and David Yost at Utah State in 2018. He was later selected 26th overall by the Green Bay Packers in the 2020 NFL Draft.



NICK VIGIL | LB

Vigil, a two-time first team All-Mountain West selection under Wells, heard his name called one pick before Fackrell in the third round of the 2016 NFL Draft. He played his first four NFL seasons with the Cincinnati Bengals before signing with the LA Chargers this offseason.

SECOND-YEAR HEAD COACHES ALL-TIME

- **Matt Wells** will look to become only the third head coach in program history this season to lead the Red Raiders to a bowl game in only his second season. **Steve Sloan** (1976) and **Mike Leach** (2001) previously guided the Red Raiders to a bowl appearance in their second season overseeing the program.
- Below is a look at how Texas Tech head coaches have fared in their second year leading the Red Raiders.

IN ELITE COMPANY

- Wells' reputation as a program builder was highly recognized during his Utah State tenure as he was twice named the Mountain West Conference Coach of the Year. He is one of only five coaches in the conference's history to earn the honor twice in a career, joining a list that also includes **Sonny Lubick**, **Rocky Long**, **Urban Meyer** and his now Big 12 counterpart, **Gary Patterson**.

STABILITY ON STAFF

- This is the third-consecutive season and second at Texas Tech where head coach **Matt Wells**, defensive coordinator **Keith Patterson** and offensive coordinator **David Yost** have all worked on the same staff. The trio began their time working together at Utah State in 2018 when Patterson was hired to oversee the Aggies' defense. Yost began his relationship with Wells a year earlier at Utah State.

TWO NEW FACES ON STAFF

- Texas Tech will have two new faces on its sideline this fall as coaching veterans **Kevin Cosgrove** and **Derek Jones** joined the staff prior to the start of spring practice. Cosgrove was hired to oversee the Red Raider linebackers as defensive coordinator **Keith Patterson** will transition to overseeing the entire unit while assisting Jones with the secondary.
- Jones was tabbed associate head coach and co-defensive coordinator as part of his hiring that reunites him with both Patterson and **Matt Wells**. The trio all coached together at Tulsa in 2006 before Jones departed for Memphis a year later and then 12 years at Duke, eventually rising to associate head coach. Duke had recorded only 10 wins in the previous eight seasons prior to Jones' arrival before eventually claiming the ACC Coastal Division title in 2013. The Blue Devils reached a bowl game in six of the final eight years Jones was on staff.
- Cosgrove, meanwhile, joined the Texas Tech staff fresh off winning a national championship ring as the lead defensive analyst at LSU. He arrived in Lubbock with 39 years of collegiate coaching experience, including 22 seasons as a defensive coordinator with stops at Wisconsin, Nebraska and Minnesota among others.

FAMILIARITY WITH STAFF

- When he interviewed with Director of Athletics **Kirby Hocutt** and President **Lawrence Schovanec** in November 2018, **Matt Wells** made it clear his hire wouldn't just bring the then Utah State head coach to Lubbock. It would, in fact, bring his entire program as Wells stressed the importance of hiring a staff that believed in the same philosophy.
- Wells has five members of his final Utah State staff entering their second year at Texas Tech, notably both of his coordinators in defensive coordinator **Keith Patterson** and offensive coordinator **David Yost**. Patterson led the Utah State defense during Wells' last season in Logan, while Yost coordinated the offense over the final two years. Wells also brought offensive line coach **Steve Farmer**, strength and conditioning coach **Dave Scholz**, running backs coach **DeAndre Smith** and inside receivers and tight ends coach **Luke Wells** with him from Utah State.
- For his special teams position, Wells went back to his Utah State roots, hiring veteran coordinator **Mark Tommerdahl** as his associate head coach. Tommerdahl, who also assists with the offensive line in addition to his role as special teams coordinator, previously served in a similar role at Utah State in 2017 where the Aggies led the Mountain West and ranked fourth nationally with four blocked punts. Utah State was also among the top-25 teams nationally for kick return defense after allowing only 18.1 yards per return.
- **Paul Randolph**, meanwhile, was quickly pursued for the defensive line position due to his ties to Patterson from their time together at Arizona State, Pittsburgh and Tulsa. Known as one of the top defensive line coaches in the country, Randolph served in a similar role at Memphis from 2016-18 and has also made similar stops at the likes of Alabama and West Virginia.
- Wells also tabbed a former Red Raider great to his staff in outside receivers coach **Joel Filani**, who starred at Texas Tech from 2003-06 and previously worked with Yost as a quality control assistant at Washington State in 2015.

IT'S NOT ONLY OFFENSE WITH WELLS

- Just because **Matt Wells** came up on the offensive side of the ball doesn't mean he doesn't know about defense. In fact, he boasted one of the nation's most disruptive defenses in the country during his tenure at Utah State, highlighted by 152 forced turnovers, which led the Mountain West and ranked tied for fifth nationally during that span.
- Utah State shared the FBS lead with 32 forced turnovers in 2018 on its way to an 11-2 season, which matched the most wins in program history. The Aggies also led the country in interceptions (22) as well as three-and-outs per game (5.7) and ranked third with six defensive touchdowns.
- In addition, the Aggies surrendered only 224 touchdowns during his six seasons, which ranked third nationally behind only TCU (218) and Utah (221). The Aggies ranked fourth in the country with 1,853 points allowed over his tenure, which trailed only Utah (1,834), TCU (1,834) and Minnesota (1,836).
- Utah State allowed only 23.9 points per game over Wells' tenure as opponents were held to 15 or less a total of 21 times.
- Defense wasn't the only area Wells stressed throughout his Utah State tenure as the Aggies also scored four touchdowns via special teams in 2018. Utah State ranked second in the FBS with 10 non-offensive touchdowns.

GIVING BACK TO WEST TEXAS

- In only their short time at Texas Tech, the Wells family has contributed significantly to the Lubbock community through non-profit organizations such as Voice for Hope through his Women's Football Clinic as well as the South Plains COVID-19 Relief Fund.

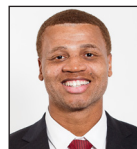

TEXAS TECH SPORTS PERFORMANCE CENTER

Texas Tech is in its fourth year utilizing the \$48 million Sports Performance Center, which officially opened in 2017 as one of the top indoor practice facilities in the country. The facility houses a 100-yard playing field that is within walking distance of the outdoor practice fields at the Football Training Facility, allowing Matt Wells and his staff to quickly transition indoors in the case of inclement weather.

In addition to supporting the Red Raider football program, the Sports Performance Center is also home to Texas Tech's national-champion track and field program. The facility houses a 200-meter bank track, which will allow Tech to host several of the nation's top collegiate and high school meets each year.

The Sports Performance Center, which funded entirely through philanthropic gifts to The Campaign for Fearless Champions, also includes 1,500 track seating for fans, a strength and conditioning area for many of Texas Tech's Olympic sports, the Becky and Kelly Joe Family Sports Medicine Center and the PlainsCapital Bank Nutrition Center.

The football program utilizes the Petersen Family Indoor Football Facility, which is named in honor of Gary Petersen, co-founder and managing partner of EnCap Investments and limited partner and minority owner of the NFL's Houston Texans and the Houston Astros of Major League Baseball.

JONES AT&T STADIUM | HOME OF THE RED RAIDERS



PROTECTING JONES AT&T STADIUM

■ Since his arrival at Texas Tech this past November, **Matt Wells** has stressed the importance in playing well inside Jones AT&T Stadium. In his words, teams that defend their home field elevate their season from “good” to “great,” a key message early in his tenure for a Red Raider program that hasn’t finished over .500 at home since the 2015 campaign.

■ The Red Raiders finished 3-3 overall at home in their first season under **Matt Wells**, who scored his first top-25 victory as Texas Tech’s head coach with a win over Oklahoma State. Tech won by an average of 26.7 points in its three victories en route to starting its home slate at 3-0 for the first time since 2016.

■ During his six seasons at Utah State, Wells compiled an impressive 27-7 record at home, an impressive .794 winning percentage. Wells led the Aggies to a .500 or better record at home in each of his six seasons and twice finished with a perfect 6-0 mark.

■ Texas Tech is looking to get back to its winning ways as the Red Raiders were 69-18 at home over the course of the first 14 years (1996-2009) in the Big 12 Conference (a .793 winning percentage). Tech boasted a .500 or better record at home in each of those seasons en route to playing in 12 bowl games with the two lone exceptions being a result of a self-imposed postseason ban in 1997 and the retirement of **Spike Dykes** in 1999. Tech was an impressive 29-4 during the final five years of that stretch, including a pair of percent 7-0 years (2005, 2008).

■ Since then, Texas Tech is only a combined 31-29 at home over the course of the past nine-plus seasons. The Red Raiders have lost at least two games at home each season during that time, including three years of 2-4 campaigns.

STADIUM HISTORY

■ Jones AT&T Stadium, home of Red Raider Football since Nov. 29, 1947, is arguably one of the most electric gameday atmospheres in all of college football. Armed with 60,000-plus rabid fans, Dave Curtis of The Sporting News proclaimed in May of 2010 that Jones AT&T Stadium was the best home field advantage in all of college football.

■ Overall, since 2003, Texas Tech has invested \$150 million over the past 15 years with four major renovations making Jones AT&T Stadium one of the best on-campus football facilities in the country. Included in the renovations, a \$34 million east side stadium building, including 29 luxury suites and 544 club seats. These renovations also include new concession areas and restrooms throughout the stadium as well as a newly enlarged Texas Tech Locker Room, the headquarters for all your Texas Tech gear and souvenirs. The West Side Stadium Building officially opened for the 2003 football season. The \$52 million dollar, 175,000 sq. ft. facility provides a large and accommodating press level for local and national media, more than 150 TVs and video screens, 47 comfortable and private suites, 1,070 club seats, and a spacious, inviting club level.

■ The stadium was officially renamed from Jones Stadium to Jones SBC Stadium in 2000 following major corporate gifts (in excess of \$25 million) from SBC Communications (now AT&T). The stadium was renamed again in 2006 to Jones AT&T Stadium after SBC Communications formally changed its name to AT&T. The “Jones” in Jones Stadium comes from former Texas Tech president Clifford B. Jones and his wife Aubrey. The stadium was named in their honor upon its opening in 1947.

Due to safety recommendations and space limitations, Texas Tech will only issue single-game credentials for the 2020 season. Credentialing priority for football will be given to professional media outlets that cover Texas Tech Athletics on an active basis. This includes weekly press conferences, post-practice availabilities and each of Texas Tech's other athletic programs. Additional information on approval guidelines can be found below.

Media will have until 5 p.m. each Tuesday of a home game to submit credential requests. Any request made after this time will not be granted and no exceptions will be made. Media members are welcome to request credentials for every home game as part of their initial application. Please note, however, that Texas Tech will not approve or deny any credential requests until after that 5 p.m. deadline each Tuesday.

Due to safety recommendations, Texas Tech has set a limit on the amount of media credentials it will issue per game in order to promote social distancing in the pressbox as well as to ensure safety of our student-athletes and coaches on the sidelines. Per Big 12 guidelines for this season, Texas Tech will only issue four pool photographer passes for sideline access.

Please note that direct contact with Texas Tech student-athletes and coaches will not be allowed this season. Members of the media will have access to head coach Matt Wells and student-athletes via virtual interviews only. As a result, approved media members inside Jones AT&T Stadium and those not at the venue will have the same ability to take part in virtual interviews with Wells and select student-athletes following each game.
