TIGERS HOPE FOR

Better Health, Better Results

Starting his 17th season as the Tigers' coach, Gordy Combs is hoping that his team can shake off a frustrating 2007 season and re-establish itself as a legitimate CAA contender.

Coming off what he terms "a frustrating season," Coach Gordy Combs is anxious for the start of the 2008 season.

"It will be nice to have everyone healthy again," he says. "Last season was frustrating because of injuries - not the number of injuries as much as the fact that we kept getting injuries in the same place. Injuries really hurt our offense because they were all on the offensive line and among our receivers."

While Coach Combs is thrilled about the return of so many healthy players on a potent offense, the Tigers have to replace a lot of experience on the defensive side of the ball.

Last year, the Tiger defense performed at a very high level. By the end of the season, Towson had the second-best scoring defense in the Colonial Athletic Association. However, graduation claimed seven starters off that unit, leaving some vacancies to fill.

"We have a lot of spots to fill on defense," admits Combs. "We lost a lot of players who logged a lot of playing time over the last few years."

But the challenge of replacing three linebackers, two defensive linemen and two defensive backs excites the Tiger coach.

"There are a lot of good players in the program who are inexperienced," says Combs. "I don't want to say they are young. But, they have the talent - they just lack the playing time."

Last season, the linebacking corps was the heart of the Tiger defense. However, All-American **Brian Bradford**, **John Webb** and **Maurice Wilkins** are gone, leaving senior **Jordan Manning** as the only holdover.

The Tigers' leading tackler as a freshman and sophomore, Manning is a Tiger co-captain this season. In his career, he has made 233 tackles and ranks 17th on the Tigers' all-time list.

“Jordan Manning is a very explosive linebacker with great intensity,” says Combs. “We are counting on him to be one of the leaders of our defense.”

While Manning will be a fixture at one of the outside linebacker positions, **Donte Blakey** is the front-runner to start at the other outside spot. As a “red shirt” freshman, Blakey appeared in eight games and did well. He made seven tackles and had 1.5 tackles for lost yardage.

A highly-touted “red shirt” freshman, **Josh McCants** will also be part of the competition for playing time at outside linebacker.

According to Coach Combs, there will be a very intense competition for the starting positions at the inside linebacker positions.

Juniors **Josh Root** and **Alex Butt** enter the pre-season as the Tigers’ most experienced inside linebackers. Both players have seen extensive action as reserves and have played very well on special teams.

Last year, Root appeared in all 11 games and made 11 tackles. He also forced a fumble and blocked a field goal attempt at Morgan State. He is vying for the starting position at the “mike” linebacker spot with sophomore **Trey Dale** and junior **Miguel Dean**.

Dale saw playing time as a reserve last season while Dean sat out the 2007 season after transferring from Bowie State. In 2006, Dean led Bowie with 60 tackles while forcing a fumble and intercepting a pass.

Butt also played in all 11 games as a sophomore and made six tackles. He is a strong candidate to start at the weakside linebacker position.

Butt will be competing with “red shirt” freshman **Chris Patterson** for the starting spot.

Both Root and Butt did very well in the Spring. In fact, they were two of the standouts of the Black-Gold Game in May. Root made five tackles and intercepted a pass while Butt had three tackles and an interception.

The Tigers’ linebacking situation improved over the summer when highly-regarded **Paul Stefanick** transferred from Kent State University.

Junior **Richard Lee** is the Tigers’ lone returning starter on the defensive line. A 6-4, 267-pound tackle, Lee started all 11 games as a sophomore. He made 27 tackles and had three quarterback sacks.

“Richard is our most experienced defensive lineman,” says Combs. “He is big and quick and had a strong sophomore year.”

Lee will be backed up by **Armen Melikion**, a “red shirt” freshman who stands at 6-3, 250 pounds.

Senior **Scott Bullock** was competing with a “red shirt” freshman, **Ben Hunolt**, for the starting spot at the other defensive tackle spot. However, Hunolt suffered a season-ending knee injury in the Black-Gold Game in May.

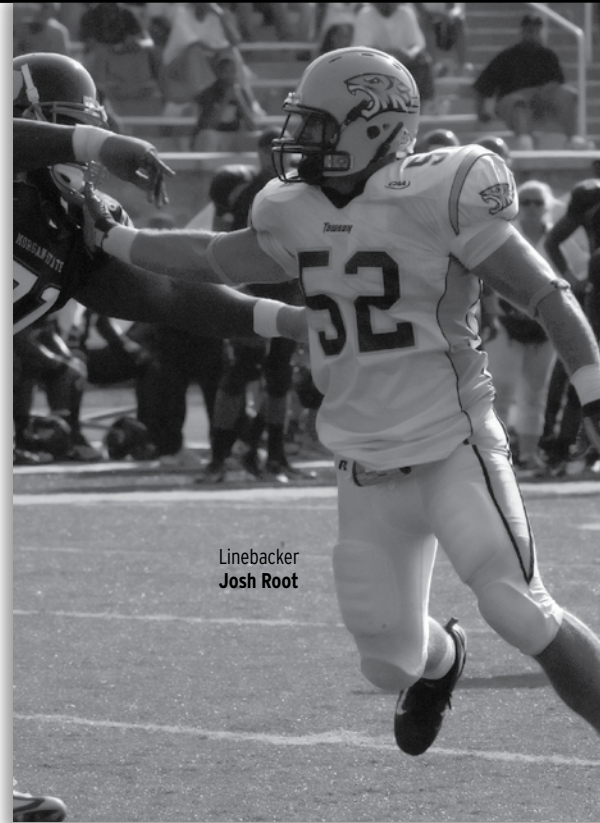
According to Coach Combs, Bullock “made great strides for us last year. He even started a few games. We need him to play well as a senior.”

A 6-3, 265-pound veteran, Bullock played in all 11 games last season and started twice. He made 18 tackles and had one fumble recovery.

The only true freshman to play for the Tigers last year, sophomore **Yaky Ibia** is the probable starter at nose guard. At 6-2, 295 pounds, Ibia played in all 11 games last season as a reserve and made 15 tackles.

Marcus Valentine, a 6-2, 274-pound freshman “red shirt,” also figures to see playing time at nose guard while sophomore **Brian Benjamin** will also rate a long look.

“We were very pleased with what we saw from our younger players in the spring,” says Combs. “They have a lot of ability and we are finding out what they can do.”

Despite the loss of two starters, the Tigers have a lot of talent in their secondary.

One of the Tiger co-captains, senior **Drew Mack** is a top returnee at strong safety. As a junior, Mack earned third team All-CAA honors. He started 10 games before missing the season finale at James Madison.

Despite missing the final game of the season, Mack was fourth on the team with 74 tackles, including four tackles for lost yardage. He also recovered three fumbles to tie for the CAA lead. In addition, he intercepted a pass and broke up four passes.

“Drew is a very physical player with a nose for the ball,” says Combs. “He will be a tremendous leader on our defense.”

Mack will be backed up by sophomore **Raymond White** and freshman **Devon Brown**. White saw a lot of playing time last year as he played in all 11 games and made 27 tackles. He also had three sacks and intercepted two passes.

While Mack is a fixture at strong safety, the free safety position is wide open. A pair of “red shirt” freshmen, **Danny Collins** and **Matt Ray**, did very well in the spring. Senior **Jeff Snow** will also compete for the position.

According to Combs, the Tigers have three very talented cornerbacks who are “great coverage guys.”

Senior **Jimmy McClam**, the Tigers' kickoff return specialist, is also a strong candidate for a starting role. Last season, he played in ten games and made 22 tackles.

A pair of very talented sophomores, **Jeremy Gardner** and **Ollie Thomas**, should hold down the starting positions at cornerback.

A starter in eight games last year, Gardner was having a tremendous season until he broke his hand at Colgate. He made 30 tackles and intercepted a pass. Gardner also broke up four passes.

An outstanding student, he should be a strong candidate for Academic All-America® honors.

Thomas played in all 11 games in 2007 and started four times. He made 31 tackles and broke up two passes.

Junior **Kenny Rackers**, a transfer from West Point, will also see action at cornerback.

"All of our defensive backs will get plenty of experience," says Combs. "We always use a lot of people in the secondary so we need a lot of depth."

Last season, the Tigers had high expectations for their offensive unit. However, injuries took their toll on the offensive line and injuries left the Tigers thin at wide receiver.

However, the good news is that senior **Sean Schaefer** returns for his fourth year as the team's starting quarterback.

"Our offensive problems last year had very little to do with Sean Schaefer," says Coach Combs. "He is very grounded and he

knows that. Our offense will be more productive if we do a better job protecting the quarterback and if our receivers don't drop as many passes."

A Tiger co-captain for the second year in a row, Schaefer will enter his senior season as the NCAA FCS passing yardage leader among active quarterbacks. In his career, he has completed 741 of 1162 passes for 8,358 yards and 51 touchdowns.

He needs 543 more passing yards to become the Tigers' career passing yardage leader. Dan Crowley currently holds the record with 8,900 passing yards.

Schaefer will be backed up by **Andrew Daley**, a "red shirt" freshman, and sophomore **Jeremy Jayne**, a transfer from Temple. The Tigers' depth at quarterback was improved during the summer when **Blair Peterson** transferred from the University of New Mexico.

Senior **Marcus Lee** returns as the Tigers' top receiver and he will present Schaefer with a very familiar target. A second team All-CAA selection last year, he was the third-leading receiver in the CAA with 66 receptions for 680 yards and a pair of touchdowns. One of the Tiger co-captains, he enters his senior season as the fourth-leading receiver in school history with 167 receptions for 1,928 yards and seven touchdowns.

"Marcus isn't a flashy receiver," says Combs. "He runs great routes and he rarely drops any passes. Marcus is also very tough and durable. He should be a pre-season

All-CAA pick and he should be an All-America candidate."

The Tigers will also be expecting big things from junior **Casey Cegles**. Last season, Cegles took advantage of the injuries to the Tigers' receiving corps and impressed the coaching staff. He caught 21 passes for 317 yards and two touchdowns. Cegles could be a starter this season.

When **Hakeem Moore** and **Tommy Breaux** went down with season-ending injuries last September, it crippled the Tigers' passing game.

As a "red shirt" freshman, Moore was expected to play a prominent role in the passing attack. However, he suffered a dislocated ankle in the season opener and missed the rest of the season. He did catch four passes for 25 yards in the one game he played.

"We will be happy to have Hakeem back in the lineup," says Combs. "He did very well in his first game and we were counting on him to be a deep threat."

Breaux, a 6-8 senior receiver, was on his way to an outstanding season when he suffered a foot injury in the third game of the season, a loss at Massachusetts. The injury sidelined him for the rest of the football season and kept him on the sidelines for the Tigers' basketball season.

In three games, Breaux caught 11 passes for 166 yards. He is a strong candidate for a starting spot.

Junior **Tamba Tongu** and "red shirt" freshman **Nick Oates** impressed the coaching staff during the spring.

Junior **David Newsom**, a transfer from Nassau Community College, also had a productive Spring. In the Black-Gold Game, he was one of the offensive stars as he caught seven passes for 60 yards and two touchdowns.

Sophomore **Derek Waddy** has been battling injuries in his career but he could help the Tigers when healthy.

"We have a lot of wide receivers but we will use all of them," says Coach Combs. "We use a lot of four-receiver sets so almost everyone gets a chance."

Junior **John Godlasky** is the Tigers' returning starter at tight end. Last season, Godlasky caught five passes for 42 yards and scored two touchdowns, including a game-winning TD at Morgan State.

Godlasky will be backed up by junior **Wes White** and senior **Anthony Fair**. White will also see action as a second tight end in short-yardage situations.

Coach Combs is happy to have a healthy offensive line once again. Injuries ravaged the Tigers' line last season and disrupted the offense all year.

With junior **Dan Bridges** (6-6, 290) and sophomore **Leon Stevenson** (6-4, 296) returning, the Tigers are set at the offensive tackle positions.

A two-year starter at right tackle, Bridges has started 22 games in a row. **John Esposito** (6-5, 300), a "red shirt" freshman, will be his back-up.

"Dan is a very aggressive offensive lineman who has done a great job for us," says Combs. "He should be a strong candidate for All-CAA honors."

Stevenson missed most of the 2007 season with a dislocated ankle that he suffered in the Tigers' third game of the season, a loss at Massachusetts. His injury started a chain

reaction of injuries that disrupted the offensive line for the rest of the season. However, he is healthy once again and the Tigers are glad to have him as a returning starter at left tackle.

Junior **Steve Coda** (6-4, 290) is likely to be his backup.

Senior **Jeremy Williams** (6-2, 265) is a returning starter at left guard. He came on strong last season and did a great job. Senior **Austin Weibley** (6-2, 298) and sophomore **Chris Ritter** (6-3, 275) are also competing for playing time.

According to Coach Combs, the Tigers have a huge void to fill at right guard where Jeff Tyler's graduation has created a vacancy.

Sophomore **Antonio Logan-El** (6-5, 308), a converted tackle, is one of the top candidates to become the starter. Sophomore **Ryan Hanley** (6-2, 298) is also competing for the spot while Weibley or Ritter could also receive a look.

At offensive center, sophomore **Steve Jordan** (6-3, 280) became the starter for the final two games of last season when Nick Bradway was injured. He is back to compete for the starting position. **Dan Hurley** (6-2, 275), a "red shirt" freshman, is also a candidate for playing time at center.

With the graduation of the Tigers' top two tailbacks, junior **Matt Castor** and sophomore **Jas Lee Rouson** are the Tigers' most experienced running backs. Castor was the Tigers' third-leading rusher last year as he ran for 116 yards on 22 carries, averaging 5.3 yards per attempt. Rouson had an injury-plagued season but did well on special teams.

"I am pretty excited about seeing what Matt Castor can do," says Combs. "He has tremendous speed and quickness and he is the type of back who can make you miss. Matt is one of the strongest players on our team and he has demonstrated that he can do the job."

Rouson is the son of former NFL running back Lee Rouson and he gives the Tigers a very strong running back with good speed.

With the return of senior place kicker **Mark Bencivengo** and junior punter **Bill Shears**, the Tigers' special teams are in capable hands.

Bencivengo did a great job as the Tigers' place kicker last year, hitting 12 of 18 field goal attempts and all 15 conversion tries. He also averaged 61.1 yards per kickoff.

While Shears averaged 37.4 yards per punt, he was more effective than his average would suggest. He punted 48 times and 17

of his punts resulted in a fair catch. Another 17 punts were placed inside the 20-yard line.

Thanks to the hang time on his punts, the Tigers led the CAA in net punting. Tiger opponents averaged only 4.8 yards per punt return and the longest punt return they allowed was 16 yards.

McClam also returns to handle kickoffs after averaging 22.2 yards per kickoff return last season. Moore and Newsom could also contribute as kick returners.

Marcus Lee is also back as the punt return specialist. He averaged 5.9 yards per punt return. Moore could also contribute as a return specialist.

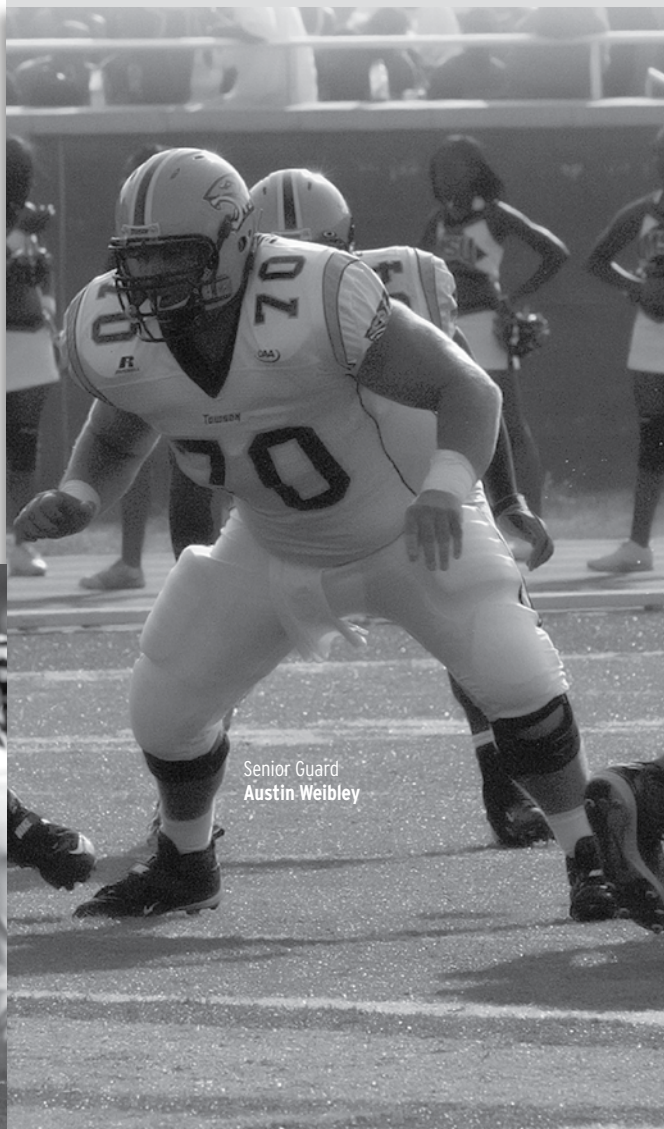

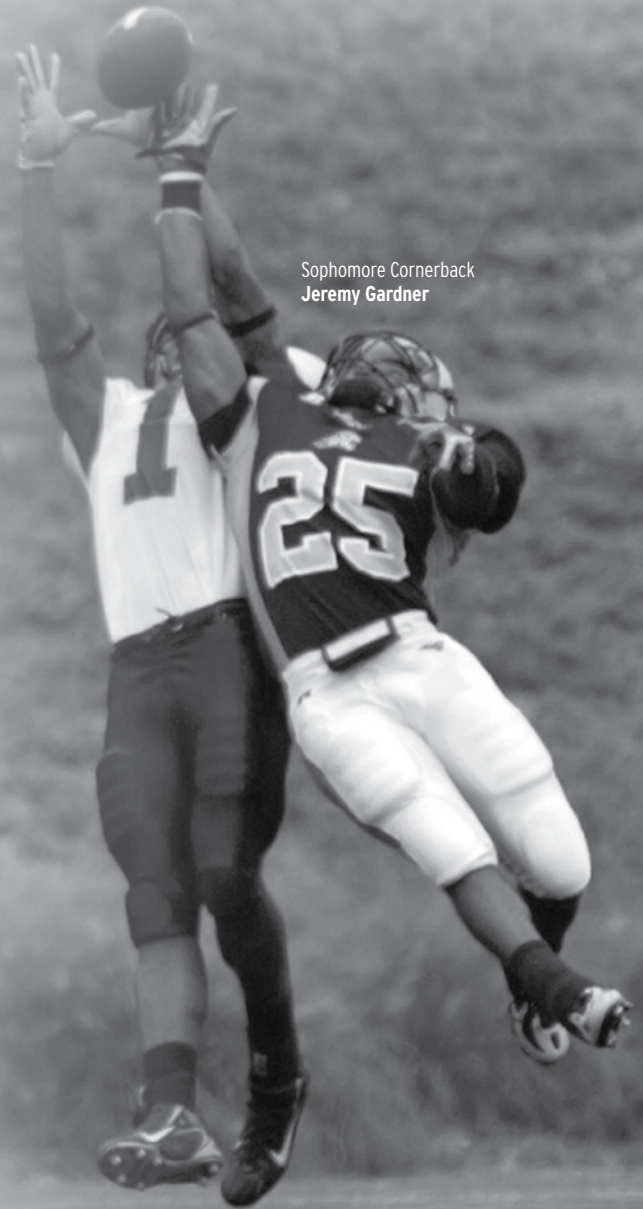

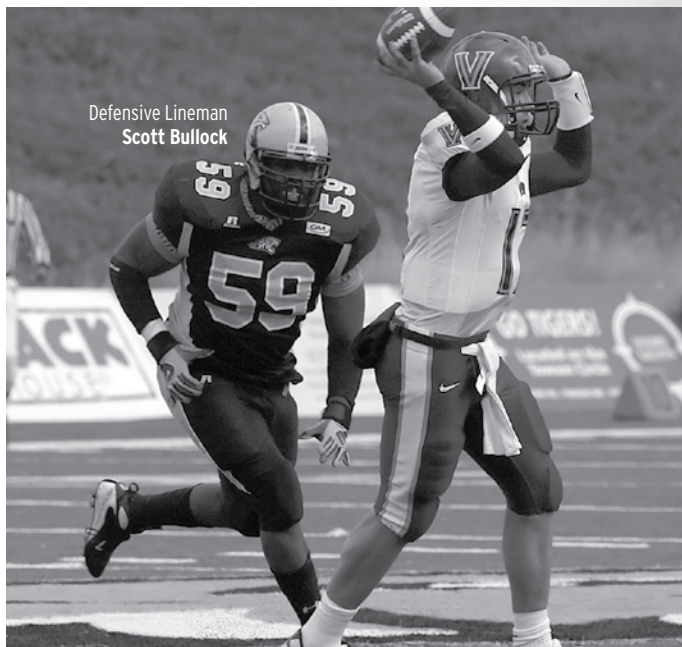

Tiger Football - 1 Through 40

1- Number worn by former All-American David Meggett, one of only two retired numbers at Towson University. Meggett won the Walter Payton Award as the top Division I-AA player in the nation in 1988.

2- Number of former Tiger football players who played for the Super Bowl XXV champion New York Giants. Punter Sean Landeta and running back David Meggett represented Towson on the team that edged Buffalo in Tampa, 20-19.

3- Number of Lambert/Meadowlands Awards won by the Tigers as the top NCAA Division II team in the East. Towson won the Lambert awards in 1983, 1984 and 1986.

4- Number of NCAA post-season appearances made by the Tigers. Towson went to the NCAA Division III playoffs in 1976 when the Tigers were national runners-up. In 1983, 1984 and 1986, the Tigers were selected to play in the NCAA Division II playoffs. Towson reached the NCAA semi-finals in 1984.

5- Number worn by former All-American punter and place kicker Sean Landeta from 1979 to 1982. Landeta went on to play in the NFL for more than 20 years. It is one of only two numbers retired by Towson.

6- Number of overtime games played by the Tigers in their first 39 years of existence. The Tigers, who have not played an overtime game since 2002, are 4-2 in overtime games with wins over Marist (1996), Fordham (1998), Lafayette (2001) and Morgan State (2001). The Tigers' lone overtime losses have been to Colgate (2000) and Cornell (2002).

7- Number of consecutive wins to open the 1984 season by the Tigers, who earned their second straight trip to the NCAA Division II playoffs. The Tigers ended the year with a 9-4 record and reached the NCAA semi-finals where they lost to Troy State.

8- Number of seasons that the Tigers played at the NCAA Division II level. Towson compiled a 60-28-2 record as a Division II program from 1979 to 1986.

9- Number worn by record-setting quarterback Dan Crowley. The Tigers' quarterback from 1991 to 1994, Crowley passed for a school record 8,900 yards and threw 81 TD passes. Crowley went on to have a successful career in the Canadian Football League.

10- School record for wins in a season. The Tigers won 10 games for the first time in 1974 when they posted a 10-0 record for the only unbeaten season in school history. Towson also won 10 games in 1976 (10-3) and 1983 (10-2).

11- Number of victories posted by Carl Runk, the Tigers' first-ever football coach. From 1969 to 1971, Coach Runk led the brand-new program to an 11-14 record during his three-year tenure.

12- Number of touchdown passes caught in a single season to set the school record. Mike Smith set the record in 1989 and Mark Orlando matched that mark with 12 TD catches in 1993.

13- Number of interceptions by All-American Gary Rubeling in 1983 when he set a school record. Rubeling led the Tigers to a 10-2 record when he led NCAA Division II in interceptions. He had two games in which he intercepted three passes.

14- Number of field goals kicked by Sean Landeta in 1980, a mark that led NCAA Division II and set a Towson single season record. Landeta was 14-for-28 on the season.

15- Number of consecutive passes completed by quarterback Sean Schaefer en route to the Tigers' 23-21 win over Richmond in 2007. While breaking the school record of 12 straight completions, Schaefer completed 29 of 33 passes for 267 yards and two TD's.

16- Number of seasons that Gordy Combs has been the Tigers' head coach. Coach Combs was named as the Tigers' head coach in 1992 and has led Towson to an 89-81 record in 16 years.

17- Number worn by wide receiver Dale Chipps when he was named as the ECAC Division II Player of the Year in 1986. Chipps caught 63 passes for 1,135 yards and six TD's in 1986 to become the only Tiger to be named as ECAC Player of the Year.

18- Number of sacks by Andrew Hollingsworth in the 2000 season, a mark that set a school record and led the nation. An All-American selection, Hollingsworth was the Patriot League Defensive Player of the Year in 2000.

19- Number made famous by the namesake of Johnny Unitas Stadium, Hall of Fame quarterback Johnny Unitas. The legendary Unitas played for the Baltimore Colts for 17 seasons and set an NFL record by throwing a TD pass in 47 consecutive games. In his career, he completed 2830 of 5186 passes for 40,239 yards with 290 touchdown passes.

20- Number of years that Phil Albert served as the Tigers' head coach. From 1972 to 1991, "Coach A" led Towson to a record of 117-91-3 over 20 years. He coached the Tigers to 4 NCAA playoff berths, an unbeaten season and 11 winning seasons.

21- Number of games that will have been played between Towson and Morgan State when the two teams meet in the Tigers' home opener on September 6. The Tigers hold a 15-5 series lead over Morgan. Since losing the first three games in the series, Towson has won 15 of 17 contests.

22- Number worn by Jason Corle, the Tigers' all-time leading rusher. From 1996 to 1999, Corle rushed for 3,601 yards on 781 carries and scored 33 touchdowns. He also holds the school record by scoring 47 touchdowns in his career.

23- Number of rushing touchdowns scored by Tony Vinson during his senior year in 1993. Vinson led NCAA Division I-AA in rushing yards (2,106), all-purpose yards (2,073) and TD's in 1993.

24- Number of tackles by Randy Bielski against Ithaca in 1978, setting the school record for tackles in a game.

25- Number of interceptions by former All-American Gary Rubeling during his college career, setting a school record that may never be broken. Since he set the record with 25 interceptions, no Tiger has intercepted more than 13 passes in their career.

26- Number of wins for the Tigers from 1974 to 1976, setting a record for victories in a three-year period. The Tigers were 26-7 from 1974 to 1976, including 10-0 in 1974. Towson also had a 26-10 from 1982 to 1984. From 1983 to 1985, the Tigers had a 26-8-1 record.

27- Number of interceptions in the 1983 season by the Tigers, setting a school record. All-American Gary Rubeling led the team with 13 interceptions while cornerback Greg Rogers and linebacker Jeff Kihn had three interceptions each.

28- Number of touchdown passes thrown by All-American quarterback Dan Crowley during the 1994 season when he led the Tigers to an 8-2 record.

29- Number of kickoff returns by All-American David Meggett in his two-year career with the Tigers. Meggett had 29 kickoff returns for 745 yards, setting a school record with a 25.5 average. He returned two kickoffs for touchdowns.

30- Number of Tigers who have made 200 tackles in their college career. Linebacker Jordan Manning became the 30th Tiger to reach the 200-tackle plateau last season.

31- Number of touchdown passes caught by All-American Mark Orlando during his college career, a school record. Orlando also holds the school record with 3,460 career receiving yards.

32- Number of career field goals kicked by Randy Bielski from 1976 to 1979, setting a school record. Bielski's record stood until Ed Kulic matched the record by making 32 field goals from 1998 to 2001.

33- Number of kickoff returns by Julian Blair in 1990, a school record. Blair finished his career as the Tigers' all-time leader for kickoff returns (94) and kickoff return yardage (2,177).

34- Number of the Tigers' turnover ratio during the 1983 season. En route to a 10-2 record, the Tigers forced 55 turnovers (27 interceptions, 28 fumble recoveries) while turning the ball over only 21 times.

35- Number of points scored in one quarter, setting a school record. In 1984, the Tigers erupted for 35 points in the second quarter on their way to a 52-27 win over California (Pa.). In 2005, the Tigers scored 35 points in the second quarter of a 70-0 victory over Lock Haven.

36- Number of first downs by the Tigers in a win over American International in 1994, setting a school record for first downs in a game.

37- Number of Tigers who have earned All-ECAC honors since 1979 at the Division II and Division I-AA.

38- Number of seasons that Associate Head Coach Rich Bader has been part of the Tigers' coaching staff. Coach Bader joined the staff in 1970 for the second year of Tiger football and has filled almost every role imaginable on the coaching staff.

39- Number worn by All-American linebacker Bubby Hammond, who made 248 tackles in his career. Hammond also set a school record with nine fumble recoveries in his career.

40- The 2008 football season is the Tigers' 40th season of inter-collegiate football.

When Director of Athletics Mike Hermann announced a contract extension for Coach Gordy Combs on the eve of the Tigers' final home game of the 2007 season, he left little doubt about his feelings for the immediate future of Towson University football.

"Throughout Gordy's years at Towson, he has created a culture of winning within the football program, even as the program has moved from conference to conference," said the Athletic Director. "The success the program has enjoyed in the CAA over the previous two seasons exceeded expectations for such a young program. Now, as the program continues to mature, I know that Gordy and his staff are committed to leading the Tigers to the top of the CAA.

"Gordy has shown great loyalty to Towson," Hermann added. "He is a Towson alum and he has been a member of the Towson football staff for 35 years, including 19 seasons as an assistant coach. During my short time in Baltimore, I've been impressed with how well respected he is within the community. He is a man of terrific character as well as an outstanding football coach."

One of 21 NCAA FCS coaches who serve as the head coach at their alma mater, Combs is one of only two NCAA FCS head coaches who have never coached anywhere else. Bobby Lamb of Furman is the other.

Of those 21 coaches, he has the second-longest tenure at his alma mater, trailing only Jimmie Laycock of William & Mary.

Ironically, seven of the coaches who are leading the football programs at their alma mater reside in the Colonial Athletic Association. That means that more than half of the CAA programs (7 of 12) are coached by alumni.

This fall marks the 39th year of association with the Tigers' 40-year old football program for Coach Combs. His tenure breaks down to three years as a player, 19 as an assistant and 16 as Towson's head coach.

The Baltimore native joined the Tigers in their second year of existence as a varsity program. Of the 407 games Towson has played entering the 2008 season, Coach Combs has been part of 398 of them.

He joined the program as a transfer student from the University of Dayton prior to the Tigers' second season of football. That was a very difficult season for him as he watched from the sidelines as a "red shirt" due to NCAA transfer rules.

Coach Combs graduated from nearby Calvert Hall High School in 1968. After two seasons at Dayton, he transferred to Towson.

In 1971, he joined the team as a linebacker where he started for two years. In his first season as a member of the team, Combs made quite an impression and was named as a team co-captain for the 1972 season.

His senior season was Coach Phil Albert's first year as the Tigers' head coach and it began a long association between the two that has continued over the years.

After Combs earned a Bachelor's degree in physical education from Towson, Coach Albert added him to the Towson football staff as a part-time assistant. Coach Combs completed work on a Master's degree in secondary education in 1975.

In 1979, when Towson moved its program from Division III to Division II, he became the football program's first full-time assistant. He served in that capacity for 19 years, the final ten as defensive coordinator.

In 1982, he was promoted to the role of defensive coordinator. He was named as the Tigers' Assistant Head Coach in 1983.

The Tigers enjoyed tremendous growth and tremendous success during Coach Combs' years as an assistant coach and defensive coordinator. After reaching the pinnacle of Division III football in 1976 with an appearance in the Stagg Bowl, Towson made an impressive name for itself in Division II football.

From 1983 to 1986, he helped Coach Albert establish the Tigers as one of the top NCAA Division II programs in the nation. In 1983, the Combs-coached defense was ranked number one in the nation, allowing only 5.8 points per game. Towson also had an amazing plus-34 turnover ratio. The 1983 Tigers posted a 10-2 record and earned a berth in the NCAA Division II playoffs.

The 1983 Tigers also won the first of three Lambert/Meadowlands awards as the top Division II team in the East.

In 1984, the Tigers had a 9-4 record and reached the semi-finals of the NCAA Division II playoffs. In 1986, Towson posted an 8-3-1 record in their final season as a Division II program, making their third Division II playoff appearance.

In eight seasons as a Division II program, Towson had an impressive record of 60-28-1.

After the Tigers moved up to NCAA Division I-AA status in 1987, Coach Combs served as the team's defensive coordinator until Coach Albert resigned on Feb. 24, 1992.

One day later, Athletic Director Bill Hunter introduced Combs as the new head coach, saying "Phil Albert and I agreed that the person most qualified to continue the tradition of Towson football is Gordy Combs."

In his first season as the Tigers' head coach, Coach Combs guided the Tigers to a 5-5-0 finish against their toughest schedule ever, earning as many victories that year as Towson had in the previous three seasons combined.

The Tigers went over 4,000 yards in total offense for the first time. Included among their five wins were victories over Northeastern, James Madison and Indiana of Pa. Each of those opponents scored at least 50 points against the Tigers the year before.

The wins over Northeastern and Indiana of Pa. were accomplished with very impressive comebacks.

The following year, powered by a record-setting rushing attack, the Tigers surpassed all expectations, breaking or tying 46 school records en route to an 8-2 record and the 24th spot in the national rankings. That 1993 team came up with big road wins at Connecticut and Delaware. A desperation pass on the game's final play gave Howard a come-from-behind win. Both Howard and Delaware went to the NCAA playoffs while the Tigers stayed home.

In 1994, after losing 27 seniors including All-American running back Tony Vinson (5th round NFL draft choice of the San Diego Chargers), Coach Combs rallied the Tigers to a second straight 8-2 record. Another 38 school records fell as his squad threw for more yards than ever before. The season was highlighted by wins at Delaware State and Hofstra. The loss was the only defeat of the year for the Pride and kept Hofstra out of the NCAA playoffs. It was the third straight year the Tigers went over 4,000 yards in total offense.

Although the Tigers posted identical 6-4 records in his fourth and fifth years, those were perhaps his best as a coach because he was left with only a handful of seniors and no scholarships. Towson had discontinued its scholarship program for football, joining a group

known as the ECAC Intercollegiate Football Conference that included Wagner, Monmouth, Central Connecticut, St. Francis (Pa.), Robert Morris and Marist.

In 1997, the Tigers' program changed course again and began a seven-year associate membership in the Patriot League. By the 2003 season, Towson's last in the league, Gordy was its winningest active coach with a 64-50 record.

In the 1999 Patriot League pre-season poll, the coaches predicted that the Tigers were going to finish last. But in November, when it came time for them to select the Coach of the Year, that same group unanimously chose Combs for its Coach of the Year honor. The Tiger coach had kept his team in contention for a conference championship right up to the last game of the campaign.

Under Coach Combs' direction, the Tiger football program had been improving each year and in 1999, yielded positive results. It was Towson's first winning season since 1996, thanks in a big way to a powerful offense that produced over 5,200 yards of total offense. Several of the team's heroes were recognized with All-Patriot League and All-American accolades. One, Jason Corle, played in the annual Hula Bowl.

That same kind of performance repeated itself in 2000 as the Tigers led the Patriot League in both total offense and defense. This time, the marquee player came from the defense in the form of Andrew Hollingsworth, a consensus All-American defensive end who was the Patriot League Player of the Year and Defensive Player of the Year.

Hit hard by graduation and a rash of injuries, the Tigers were 3-7 in 2001. In 2002, Towson improved to 6-5 with a first-ever victory over Lehigh highlighting the winning record. In 2003, the Tigers were 5-1 at home as they celebrated the dedication of the 11,198-seat Johnny Unitas® Stadium.

The start of the 2004 season produced the fourth change of direction for Towson football during the Gordy Combs Era. The Tigers joined the Atlantic 10 Football Conference, marking the return of scholarship football to Towson. It also presented the Tigers with an enormous challenge.

While the Tigers were phasing in their complement of scholarship players over a several year period, Coach Combs led the league's youngest offense into battle. The Tigers emerged battered and bruised with an 0-8 conference record that included losses to the defending NCAA I-AA national champion (Delaware) as well as the eventual national champ for 2004 (James Madison). They were 3-0 against non-league opponents.

In 2005, the football staff's tireless efforts started to pay dividends. In their second season of Atlantic 10 Football, Towson showed remarkable improvement by posting a 6-5 record. Included among the Tigers' six victories were conference wins over Delaware, Villanova and Rhode Island.

The highlight of the 2005 season came when the Tigers rallied from behind to pull out a 35-31 win over Delaware before a record Homecoming crowd of 10,778 at Johnny Unitas® Stadium.

In 2006, the Tigers continued to surprise Atlantic 10 opponents. The Tigers had one of the most exciting offensive teams in the league and compiled a 7-4 overall record with a 4-4 league mark. Along the way, the Tigers went 5-0 on the road and pulled out a dramatic come-from-behind win at Hofstra.

When the season was over, senior offensive tackle Jermon Bushrod was drafted in the fourth round of the NFL draft by the New Orleans Saints, becoming Towson's highest draft pick ever.

The Tigers entered the 2007 season with high expectations and were nationally-ranked in the pre-season. After a 2-0 start, the Tigers fell victim to a rash of injuries and suffered through their first losing season in four years. Highlighting the season was a 23-21 come-from-behind win over 14th-ranked Richmond, a game the Tigers won on the final play. Richmond went on to reach the national semi-finals.

In 16 seasons as the Tigers' head coach, Coach Combs has led Towson to nine winning seasons and two .500 campaigns.

Coach Combs has been honored as Towson University's Coach of the Year for men's sports five times. He was on the board of directors for the Greater Baltimore Chapter of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame as well as the National Junior Lacrosse Association. He was recognized by the NFF in 1994 and 2000 with special achievement awards. In 2003, he was honored with the Baltimore Touchdown Club's George Young Lifetime Achievement Award and by the All-American Football Foundation with its Johnny Vaught Head Coach Award.

Gordy has three children and three grandchildren. His oldest daughter, Meredith, is a graduate of the University of Maryland who resides in Severna Park, Md. with her husband, John Miller. They are parents of a two-year old son, Luke, and a one-year old daughter, McKenna.

An Interview With Coach Combs

QUESTION: College football coaching is such a transient profession. How do you explain your longevity with the Tiger football program?

GORDY COMBS: *"In a word - fortunate! In many ways, I am a dinosaur. I never imagined that I would be here this long because of the nature of this profession. I've had the opportunity to coach on every level of college football with the exception of Division I-A. It's been interesting to start out as a part-time coach and move to a full-time assistant to a coordinator to assistant head coach and now entering my 17th year as head coach. Plus, we have been successful at each level."*

Q: What are the advantages of being a part of the same football program for such a long time?

GC: *"It's an advantage in the daily operations, making the day-to-day business activities run in a smooth manner. It helps to know the people in athletic administration, financial aid, admissions and University departments when you need assistance. It's also helpful to be a graduate in both of my degrees. I believe the faculty wants me to be successful, partly because I am a product of the University."*

Q: What does it mean to coach the Tiger football program in its 40th anniversary season?

GC: *"It's quite an honor to coach at your alma mater, especially since we are celebrating this special time in our football history. This will be my 36th year of coaching college football at Towson and every season has been unique and rewarding. Kicking it off with our first game against a BCS opponent (Navy) makes me realize how far we have come during this time span."*



Q: What makes Phil Albert and Rich Bader so special to Tiger football?

GC: *"They are both the cornerstones of our football program. They have devoted so much time and effort towards the accomplishments that we have experienced. When "Coach A" was the head coach, we hit the top of Division III football when we competed for the national championship in 1976. During the Division II years, we went to the national playoffs three times and lost to the national champions twice (North Dakota State in 1983, Troy State in 1984). During those times, the NCAA only selected eight teams to compete for the national championship so that was really quite an achievement. Rich Bader has served all three Towson head coaches in some type of coaching capacity. Both Coach A and Rich have been preparing players for life for quite a few years. The best testimony to their efforts is the success that many of our former players have achieved in life."*

Q: What did you learn from Phil Albert that prepared you to be a head coach?

GC: *"Preparation meets opportunity. "Coach A" is always preaching about being prepared and it doesn't just relate to football. On a larger scale, it relates to life. I cherish the apprenticeship that I had under him as both a player and position coach for 19 years. He is such a huge family man. I firmly believe that many of the things I've learned from him have helped me become a better coach, and more importantly, a better father for my three children. I'm very proud of the fact that I was his first captain. It's quite an honor."*

Q: What makes the Tiger football program unique?

GC: *"The "ABC's" of the program make it unique. That stands for Albert, Bader and Combs. Even though "Coach A" and Rich were absent for a few stretches, they have made a tremendous impact on our players and they still do. Because of them, former players always feel they have a connection to the program. They feel positive about*





coming back to the University because there is someone they can relate to. The success we achieved as a Division III program, a Division II program and a I-AA program also makes this unique.”

Q: What has Rich Bader meant to Tiger football?

GC: “When I came to Towson as a player in 1970, it coincided with Rich’s first season of coaching at Towson. Besides being a football coach, he has worked in the athletic administration and the financial aid office. These experiences have given him a good perspective on more than just our football program. He is someone that our assistant coaches can seek out when there is a problem to be solved. Having coached the offensive line for his first ten years and the defensive line for over 20 years, he has touched the lives of many Tiger football players. He is synonymous with football at Towson.”

Q: What do you look for when you are recruiting a high school prospect?

GC: “Passion and competitiveness are the most important qualities we look for. We want football to be important to a player in our program. He needs to feel this way because it takes a complete 12-month commitment to be a Division I football player. Our players need to compete on a daily basis - both on and off the field. We want them to excel in their academic endeavors - just like they do in the weight room, practice field and during games each Saturday.”

Q: How much of an impact has Johnny Unitas® Stadium made on the Tiger football program?

GC: “Personally, I grew up as a Baltimore Colts fan. I attended my first Colts game when I was eight years old and I grew up about two miles from Memorial Stadium. As a young fan, I watched the career of Johnny Unitas unfold. I had many opportunities to get to know him since my son, Buggs, and his son, Chad, played football, ice hockey and lacrosse together through the years. It’s an honor to coach in a stadium named for Johnny Unitas and it’s the only college football stadium named after a pro football player - and that’s very significant because he deserves to be honored in this fashion.”

Q: How do you account for the rapid progress that your program has made while competing in the toughest I-AA conference in the nation?

GC: “We’ve had positive support from the athletic administration and the direction that our president, Dr. Robert Caret, has given us. In order to be successful, a coach needs to have these two specific areas to assist the program and to know their expectations. I believe we have the blueprint of how to move from one classification to the next and be successful. We have moved from I-AA independent scholarship football to need-based scholarship football to the best I-AA conference in the nation and that has provided us with the experience to change in a positive manner.”

Q: Who are the teams to beat in the CAA this season?

GC: “All five of the CAA teams that competed in the NCAA playoffs last year (Delaware, James Madison, Richmond, Massachusetts, New Hampshire) have a strong nucleus returning. UMass in the North and Richmond in the South will probably be the favorites going into the 2008 season. As always, there will be a few surprises. Injuries and matchups will be a determining factor. Productivity from the quarterback position is always a key element in each game. It seems like every CAA game plays a role in the determination of the CAA champion.”

COACHING STAFF

Q: Many of your former players are coaching football at the high school and college levels. Do you think this is a positive reflection on your program?

GC: *"We have many former players that have chosen the coaching profession and it makes us proud. Joe Vitt is currently the Assistant Head Coach and Linebacker Coach with the New Orleans Saints so we have an alum coaching in the NFL. In addition, Mike Locksley and Kurt Beathard are assistant coaches at the University of Illinois while Rob Ambrose is the offensive coordinator at UConn. Those three all played and coached in our program. We gave them an idea about our profession and they chose to be part of it."*

Q: You've been the head coach of the Tiger football program for 16 years and won 89 games. What are the most memorable wins?

GC: *"Every win that we've had against the University of Delaware has been very special because we have developed so much respect for their program over the years. Our come-from-behind win over Richmond last season also ranks right up there. Sean Schaefer was terrific. In 1992, my first year as head coach, we had two very memorable victories - a Homecoming win over James Madison and a last-second win over Northeastern."*

Q: Last year, you entered the season with high expectations and things didn't work out. How is the approach different this year?

GC: *"Those high expectations are certainly not there because of our In 2005 and 2006, we were coming off winning seasons and we had a seasoned quarterback and a lot of veterans returning on both sides of the ball. The CAA is so competitive so there isn't much margin of error. Our only CAA win last year was over Richmond - and that was Richmond's only league loss. But we feel good about this season. The CAA is a Quarterback League - so we've got a chance because we have one of the best quarterbacks in the CAA in Sean Schaefer."*

Q: How much change will there be since you have a new Defensive Coordinator?

GC: *"When Coach (Bob) Benson departed, he left us with a good scheme that our staff had taught and our players understood. We didn't want a new defensive coordinator to come in and 're-invent the wheel.' We wanted someone who was familiar with our defensive system and had some understanding of the CAA. Jeff McDonald was involved with a similar defensive scheme during his six seasons at Yale. He also coached at New Hampshire and has coached against Columbia in the Ivy League. Our players responded to his leadership in the Spring in a very positive way. We are confident that Jeff McDonald will continue to build on the solid foundation that Bob Benson started."*

Q: How do you feel about facing Navy in the season opener?

GC: *"I believe the Navy game creates a huge opportunity for our football program. It's amazing how far this program has advanced in such a short period of time. The Towson-Navy game is the type of exposure that we need so that people in the Baltimore area understand how far we have advanced. CAA teams play BCS team on an annual basis and the CAA teams have won their share. I understand that the atmosphere at a Navy football game is terrific. Our football*

team is working very hard to meet this challenge and we are looking forward to it."

Q: Last season, Delaware quarterback Joe Flacco used his success in the CAA to become a first round draft pick in the NFL? Can Sean Schaefer follow the same path this season and earn a chance to play in the NFL?

GC: *"Joe Flacco had an outstanding senior year and he did very well at the NFL combine so his stock kept rising. He fit the mold in terms of size and arm strength that the NFL scouts love to see. In our game at Delaware in 2006, Sean Schaefer outplayed Joe and we beat Delaware, 49-35. Sean threw for more than 400 yards and had five touchdown passes. I think all of our touchdowns came off drives that were at least 60 yards. Led by Sean, we had more than 600 yards of total offense, about 200 yards more than Delaware."*

Sean is one of the best quarterbacks we've had at Towson. Our program has always been able to attract and develop quality quarterbacks from the early 1970's to the present time. Dan Crowley is currently the leading collegiate passer in the state of Maryland and that includes all of the great quarterbacks from the University of Maryland who went on to play professionally. Under the guidance of Phil Albert, Sean will probably surpass all of Dan Crowley's records."

We need to have a big year and Sean has to lead us for him to get the opportunity to play at the next level. It comes down to performance and exposure. I am certain that he has the qualities that it takes to play at the next level. All he needs is the opportunity."





Rich Bader

Associate Head Coach
39th Season
Central Connecticut '69

Entering his 39th season as a member of the Tiger football coaching staff, Rich Bader has been the Tigers' Associate Head Coach for the last

seven years.

On a coaching staff that is filled with experience and longevity, Rich is the dean of the staff. He has been part of every Tiger football season since 1970.

Since joining the Tigers' football staff in 1970, he is the only coach to have worked for all three of Towson's head football coaches, Carl Runk, Phil Albert and Gordy Combs.

In 1970, he joined the Tiger staff as the offensive line coach for Runk and worked for him in 1970 and 1971. When Albert became the Tigers' head coach in 1972, he began a long tenure with Coach Albert, serving as an assistant coach for each of his 20 seasons as the Tigers' head coach.

When Combs was named as the Tigers' head coach in 1992, Bader immediately became the new coach's most trusted assistant. In 1997, Combs named him as the Tigers' defensive coordinator. In 2001, he was promoted to the role of Associate Head Coach.

From 1970 to 1986, Coach Bader served as the Tigers' offensive line coach. In 1974, he helped the Tigers post a perfect 10-0-0 record for their first and only undefeated season. In 1976, he helped the Tigers reach the NCAA Division III championship game, the Stagg Bowl.

For the first ten years that he was an assistant coach at Towson, Bader worked as a part-time coach. In addition to his football duties with the Tigers, he was a faculty member at Bay College in Baltimore for six years. In addition to his teaching duties in the Business Department, Coach Bader also served as the chairman of the Department of Recreation. After Bay College closed its doors in 1978, he held a position in the Department of Financial Aid at Towson until he became a full-time member of the coaching staff in 1981.

From 1979 to 1986, Coach Bader played a vital role in the Tigers' rise to prominence in the ranks of NCAA Division II football. In the Tigers' eight years in Division II, he helped the team compile a record of 60-28-2 while making three NCAA playoff appearances. The Tigers also won the Lambert/Meadowlands award as the top Division II team in the East in 1983, 1984 and 1986.

For 11 years, he also served as the coordinator for the National Football Clinic in Atlantic City, New Jersey.

In his role as the Tigers' offensive line coach, the New Hyde Park, N.Y. native worked with a number of prominent linemen, including four All-Americans. Offensive center Greg Boller earned All-American honors in 1982 while offensive guard Terrance Brooks was a two-time All-American, earning the honor in 1983 and 1984.

A first team All-American in 1985, Stan Eisenhooth went on to play three seasons in the NFL, two with the Seattle Seahawks and one season with the Indianapolis Colts.



In 1986, offensive center John Gaburick was also named as an All-American.

When the Tigers moved up to NCAA Division I-AA status in 1987, Coach Albert moved Coach Bader to the other side of the ball as the Tigers' defensive line coach.

In 1997, the Tigers joined the Patriot League and Coach Bader was named as the team's defensive coordinator. In that role, he coached All-American defensive end Andrew Hollingsworth. In the 2000 season, Hollingsworth was named as the Patriot League's Player of the Year as the Tiger defense finished 11th nationally.

A 35-year member of the American Football Coaches Association, Coach Bader was honored by the Baltimore Touchdown Club as the 2002 winner of its Service To Football award.

A 1969 graduate of Central Connecticut, he began his coaching career at an early age. After two injury-plagued seasons as an offensive lineman, he retired as a player. His coaching career started in 1968 when he was a student assistant coach for Bill Loika.

After earning his B.A. degree in Business Administration from Central Connecticut, he was an assistant coach at Western Connecticut for one year.

Coach Bader is one of many Central Connecticut alumni who have gone on to enjoy very productive coaching careers. In fact, Dave Campo, '73 and Mike Sherman, '78 have been head coaches in the National Football League. Currently the assistant head coach of the Jacksonville Jaguars, Campo was the head coach of the Dallas Cowboys from 2000 to 2002. Sherman, who is now the head coach at Texas A&M, was the head coach of the Green Bay Packers from 2000 to 2004. In addition, Al Bagnola, the head coach at Pennsylvania, is also a Central Connecticut graduate.

Coach Bader, who earned his Master's degree from Morgan State, recruits northern New Jersey and metropolitan New York. Locally, he recruits the MIAA schools, as well as all junior colleges and prep schools.

Rich is the father of two children, Ryan and Shaeleen, who are both graduates of Gettysburg College. Ryan works in an Emmy Award-winning television production in New York City who has done extensive work for ESPN and the Madison Square Garden Network. Shaeleen is a teacher in Howard County and coaches girls' lacrosse in Howard County.

Coach Bader and his wife, Joan, reside in the Reisterstown area.

Phil Albert

Offensive Coordinator
27th Season
Arizona '66

The winningest football coach in Towson University history, Phil Albert returned to the Tiger coaching staff as its offensive coordinator in 2003.

Although this is his sixth season as the Tigers' offensive coordinator, this marks the 27th year that Coach Albert has been associated with the Tiger football program

From 1972 to 1991, Coach Albert was the Tigers' head coach. In 20 years as the Tigers' coach, he compiled a record of 117-91-3. After the 1991 season, he retired as the Tigers' head coach as long-time assistant Gordy Combs took over leadership of the program.

A 1966 graduate of the University of Arizona, the Johnstown, Pa. native became the Tigers' head coach at the age of 28. At the time, he was one of the youngest college head football coaches in the nation and was guiding one of the youngest football programs in the nation. Towson was starting just its fourth season of college football.

Over the next 20 years, he directed the very young program to success at three different levels of NCAA competition. His teams advanced to the NCAA post-season four times and played for one national championship.

In 1972, he posted a 1-9 record in his first season as the Tigers' coach. In his second year, the Tigers had a 4-4 record. The 1973 season started a streak of

14 consecutive non-losing seasons. In 1974, Coach Albert guided Towson to the only unbeaten season (10-0) in school history. He was honored by the American Football Coaches Association as its Region 3 Coach of the Year, the first of five regional Coach of the Year awards he would earn in his career.

In 1976, the Tigers made their first NCAA post-season appearance in the Division III playoffs. After wins over C.W. Post and St. Lawrence, Towson reached the national championship game, the Stagg

Bowl, in Phenix City, Alabama. In a very wild game, the Tigers rallied from a 28-0 deficit before dropping a last-second 31-28 decision to St. John's in an ABC nationally televised game.

After ten seasons as a Division III program, Coach Albert led Towson into the ranks of Division II in 1979. After dropping their season opener, the first meeting with Morgan State, the Tigers ran the table and finished the season with a 9-1 record, barely missing out on a Division II playoff berth. In eight seasons as a Division II football program, the Tigers compiled an overall record of 60-26-2 and had six winning seasons.

In 1982, the Tigers posted a 7-4 record with wins over Bucknell and Maine. In 1983, Towson enjoyed an outstanding season by compiling a 10-1 regular season record. Ranked as high as fourth in the nation, the Tigers owned wins over Delaware, Delaware State and James Madison. In the first round of the Division II playoffs, Towson dropped a 24-17 contest at North Dakota State. The Tigers won the first of three Lambert/Meadowlands awards as the top Division II program in the East while their coach was named as the Kodak regional coach of the year.

In 1984, the Tigers finished the season with a 9-4 record and reached the semi-finals of the Division II Tournament with a 31-21 win over Norfolk State. After barely missing a third straight Division II playoff appearance in 1985, the Tigers returned to the national playoffs in 1986 when they had an 8-3-1 record in their final season at the Division II level. Towson also won its third Lambert/Meadowlands Award in 1986.

In 1987, the Tiger football program made another move forward when Towson joined the ranks of NCAA Division I-AA football. After leading the Tigers through their first five I-AA seasons, Coach Albert stepped down on February 24, 1992.

The third-winningest coach in the history of Maryland college football, he remains the only coach in college football to coach the same school at three different levels of NCAA competition. In his years as the Tigers' boss, he coached 28 All-Americans. Four players were selected in the National Football League draft and one of his players, David Meggett, was the winner of the 1988 Walter Payton Award as the top player in NCAA Division I-AA. Both Meggett and former Towson punter, Sean Landeta, went on to enjoy All-Pro careers in the NFL.

From 1994 to 2001, Coach "A" was the advance game day scout for the NFL San Diego Chargers. In 2001 and 2002, he served as the offensive coordinator at nearby Calvert Hall College High School. The Cardinals were 17-4 during his two years with the program.

With the Tigers embarking upon their first season as members of the Atlantic 10 Football Conference in 2003, Coach Albert returned to the football program as its offensive coordinator. Since his return, the Tiger offense has become one of the most explosive units in the NCAA FCS.

Inducted into the Towson University Athletic Hall of Fame in 1994, "Coach A" was also inducted into the Cambria County (Pa.) Hall of Fame last year.

Coach Albert and his wife, Kay, reside in Parkville, Md. They are the parents of two daughters, Becky and Tracy, and a son, Christian. Phil and Kay have seven grandchildren.



Jeff McDonald

Defensive Coordinator
1st Season
South Florida '95

The newest member of the Tigers' coaching staff, Jeff McDonald was named as the Tigers' Defensive Coordinator in March.

An assistant coach at Yale University for the last six years, he served as the Bulldogs' Recruiting Coordinator and coached the defensive ends for Coach Jack Siedlecki.

During his seasons as part of the Yale coaching staff, the Bulldogs won 38 of 60 games and had four winning seasons.

In 2006, Coach McDonald helped Yale post an 8-2 record and win the Ivy League championship.

Last year, McDonald was part of a defensive coaching staff that led the Bulldogs to a memorable season. Led by a very stingy defensive unit, the Bulldogs won their first nine games and entered the season finale against Harvard with a perfect 9-0 record. In their first nine games, the Bulldogs allowed only 100 points, an 11.1 average. Along the way, Yale allowed seven points or less in wins over Columbia, Brown and Princeton.

However, the Bulldogs' hopes for a perfect season were ruined by arch-rival Harvard as the Crimson stunned Yale, 37-6.

Despite allowing 37 points in the season finale, Yale led NCAA FCS in scoring defense by a wide margin, allowing only 13.7 points per game. The Bulldogs also finished seventh in NCAA FCS in total defense, allowing 287.8 yards per game.

During his years at Yale, McDonald coached five defensive ends who earned All-Ivy League honors. Most notably, he coached Harry Flaster, who led the Ivy League in sacks in 2002.

"We are very pleased to have Jeff joining our staff," said Tiger Coach Gordy Combs. "What we like about Jeff is his familiarity with the defense we play. It's the same defense he coached at Yale. He is also very familiar with our league (Colonial Athletic Association) because of his experience at the University of New Hampshire. He will also enhance our recruiting efforts due to his experience as the Recruiting Coordinator at Yale. At Yale, his recruiting area was the Middle Atlantic area, one of our top recruiting spots.

"Jeff is a bright young coach with a tremendous future ahead of him," he added.

A Florida native, McDonald graduated from the University of South Florida in 1995.

An offensive lineman who played his freshman year at Western Connecticut State, he transferred to South Florida after an injury ended his football career. A three-year performer for the track and field program at South Florida, he threw the shot put and the discus.

After graduation from USF, he began his coaching career at Ridgewood High School in Florida where he served as an assistant football coach for three years. In addition to teaching History, he was also the

head coach of the track and field team at Ridgewood and led the team to the Pasco County championship.

He entered the collegiate coaching ranks in 1998 when he was named as an assistant football at Quincy University in Illinois. During his first year at Quincy, he was the defensive line coach. In 1999, he coached the linebackers. He was Quincy's Defensive Coordinator and Recruiting Coordinator in his final season at Quincy.

In 2001, he joined the University of New Hampshire staff as a linebackers coach. After one year at UNH, he joined Coach Jack Siedlicki's staff at Yale.

He earned his Master's degree in Educational Leadership from Quincy in 2004.

Coach McDonald and his wife, Rebecca, a native of St. Louis, reside in the Towson area. They have been married for seven years.

Running Backs/Special Teams

8th Season
Towson '99

Starting his eighth season as a member of the football coaching staff at his alma mater, Mike McGlinchey is following in the legacy of his father, an outstanding college football coach in his own right.

A 1999 graduate of Towson University, Coach McGlinchey is in his eighth season as running backs coach with the Tigers. He has also served as the Tigers' Recruiting Coordinator for the last four years.

Prior to the start of the 2007 season, he was named as the Tigers' Special Teams Coordinator.

When the position opened up in the Winter of 2001, Coach Gordy Combs quickly turned to one of his former players to fill the role.

Originally recruited as an offensive lineman, Coach McGlinchey moved to the tight end spot as a sophomore. Used mostly for his outstanding blocking ability, he caught nine passes for 88 yards and two touchdowns during his career.

In his freshman season at Towson, the Salisbury, Md. native was a reserve offensive guard who started four games when Jason Maier was injured. As a sophomore, he appeared in ten games at tight end. He also caught three passes for 36 yards and scored a touchdown. His first career reception was a nine-yard touchdown catch against Holy Cross.

As a junior, he played in all 11 games and caught one pass for seven yards. In his senior year, he was part of the Tigers' very impressive passing game which accounted for 4,193 yards and 23 touchdowns. A starting tight end who helped the Tigers post a 7-4 record, McGlinchey caught five passes for 45 yards and a touchdown. He scored the second TD of his career in the Tigers' win at Howard.

In March of 2000, he took a position with the University of New Hampshire as tight ends coach. After spending a spring instructing the Wildcats, Coach McGlinchey made his sideline coaching debut with the Princeton Tigers. In the 2000 season, Princeton posted a 3-7 record with a 3-4 Ivy League mark.

Following the 2000 season, he returned to his alma mater as the running backs coach.

In his role as the Tigers' running backs coach, he has worked with some of the top backs ever to play for Towson, including Noah Read, Matt Romeo and Nick Williams.

In addition to his work with the running backs, Coach McGlinchey coordinates the punt, kickoff return, extra point and field goal squads.

Coach McGlinchey recruits Virginia, Delaware, Maryland's Eastern Shore and Western Maryland.

A graduate of Beall High School in Western Maryland, he was a two-time All-Area selection at offensive guard. As a junior, he helped Beall reach the state championship game while finishing the season with an 11-1 record. As a senior, he was team captain as Beall posted



its second straight undefeated regular season. In his final two seasons at Beall, he helped the team post a 23-2 record. He earned second team All-State honors in his senior season. Coach McGlinchey also played high school basketball.

Mike, who graduated from Towson with a degree in Sports Communication, wanted to be a coach even when he was playing college football. His late father, Mike McGlinchey Sr., was a graduate of the University of Delaware who coached college football at Salisbury State, Central Connecticut, and Frostburg State. In 1986, he directed Salisbury State to the NCAA Division III national championship game.

Mike and his wife, Victoria, reside in the Parkville area. They are the proud parents of a young daughter, Ashley.



John Donatelli

Offensive Line
12th Season
Frostburg '88

In his 12th season as a member of the Tiger football staff, John Donatelli is starting his fifth year as a full-time assistant coach.

The Tigers' offensive line coach for the last eight years, Coach Donatelli enjoyed one of the highlights of his career on April 28. That's when one of his prize pupils, offensive tackle Jermon Bushrod, was selected in the fourth round of the National Football League draft by the New Orleans Saints.

Coach Donatelli joined the Tigers' coaching staff in 1997, the program's first season as a member of the Patriot League. A part-time member of the coaching staff, he served as the team's offensive line coach. In 1998, he became the Tigers' tight end coach.

In 1999, Coach Donatelli became the Tigers' Offensive Line coach. For the next four years, he was the nation's only Division I football coach to serve as offensive line coach as a part-timer.

With Towson preparing to join the Atlantic 10 Football Conference, Coach Donatelli became a full-time member of the coaching staff in 2003. Over the past nine years, he has excelled in his role as the Tigers' Offensive Line coach, mentoring eight all-league offensive linemen, including the highest NFL draft pick in school history.

While serving as a part-time coach for six years, he was a business owner with his brother, Dan, directing Chesapeake Crane Service, Inc. of Rosedale, Md.

A Baltimore native, Coach Donatelli earned a B.S. degree in Business Management from Frostburg State University in 1988. He was a three-year starter at center for the Bobcat football team. In 1987, he was the winner of the Bobcats' Top Offensive Lineman award. In 1995, Coach Donatelli began pursuing a degree in Kinesiology. In 1997, he earned a second undergraduate degree in Sports Management from Towson.

A 1983 graduate of nearby Calvert Hall High School, Coach Donatelli started his coaching career at Calvert Hall. Prior to joining the Towson staff, he served as the Cardinals' offensive line coach, special teams coordinator and strength coach for six years.

During his high school career, he was honored as a first team All-Metro offensive tackle. In his four seasons at Calvert Hall, the Cardinals were the Maryland Scholastic Association champions three times. The Cardinals lost only three games in his final three seasons and were unbeaten in 1981.

Coach Donatelli is a member of the American Football Coaches Association. He and his wife, Maria, a 1995 Towson graduate, reside in the Fallston area with their two young children, Samantha and Luca.



Guilian Gary

Receivers/Passing Game Coordinator
4th Season
Maryland '03

Starting his fourth season as the wide receivers coach for the Tigers, Guilian Gary has had a dramatic effect on the Tigers' passing game. In his first three

seasons working with the Tigers' receivers, three different receivers have been named all-conference, including Marcus Lee.

At the conclusion of the spring season, he was named as the Tigers' passing game coordinator.

In 2005, Andrae Brown was a first team all-conference selection. Last year, with Brown battling injuries, senior Eric Yancey filled the void and was named first team all-conference.



In his first season as the Tigers' receivers' coach, the Towson receivers caught 238 passes for 2,968 yards. Last year, they improved to 275 receptions for 3,161 yards and 19 touchdowns.

A three-year starter at wide receiver at the University of Maryland, he led the Terrapins in receiving three years in a row. A member of Maryland's Orange Bowl team that posted a 10-2 record, Guilian finished his career with 113 catches for 1,552 yards and 13 touchdowns.

He stands fifth on Maryland's all-time receptions list, eighth in receiving yards and third in TD's.

Coach Gary also shares Maryland's single game record for most TD receptions at three with former Baltimore Raven Jermaine Lewis.

In addition to his pass catching abilities, Coach Gary also returned punts at Maryland. He is third all-time at Maryland with 577 career return yards and he became the first Terrapin to lead the team in punt returns for three consecutive seasons.

A second team All-Atlantic Coast Conference selection as a senior, he was also an All-ACC Academic team selection in his junior year.

A graduate of Shippensburg, Chris Leavenworth is starting his third season as a member of the Towson staff.

After spending two seasons working with the Tigers' outside linebackers, he will be the team's linebacker coach this season.

As one of the Tigers' linebacker coaches the last two years, he has worked with two of the top linebackers in school history, Brian Bradford and John Webb. A consensus first team All-American, Bradford graduated as the third-leading tackler in school history. An all-conference linebacker, Webb finished his career as the fourth-leading tackler in the history of the program.

Coach Leavenworth attended Athens High School in Milan, Pa. where he was an All-State linebacker and tight end.

Upon arriving at Shippensburg, he was moved to offensive guard where he eventually earned All-American and All-Region honors. As a senior, Leavenworth was named first team All-PSAC as he helped Shippensburg establish a new school record for rushing yards in a single-season with 3,112 yards. The Red Raiders also almost set new single-season records for total offense and points with 4,882 yards of total offense and 392 points. The offensive line yielded only 18 sacks in 223 passing attempts this season, an average of one every 12 attempts.

The Red Raiders were 10-2 in his senior year, advancing to the second round of the 2004 NCAA Division II Football playoffs.

He also competed in track and field for the Red Raiders, throwing the 35 pound weight and the discus.

Coach Leavenworth is single and resides in Perry Hall, Md.



Jay Robinson

Tight Ends
21st Season
Towson '81

A key member of the Tigers' coaching staff from 1979 to 1997, Jay Robinson returned to his alma mater prior to last season. For the second year in a row,

he will be the Tigers' tight ends coach.

Prior to last season, Coach Robinson was the head football coach at nearby Calvert Hall High School. During eight seasons as the Cardinals' head coach, he led them to a 45-37 record. He enjoyed his best seasons as the Cardinals' coach from 2000 to 2002. During that three-year period, the Cardinals compiled a 26-5 record, including a 10-1 record in 2002 when they were the third-ranked team in the Baltimore area. Calvert Hall also had a 9-1 record in the 2000 season.

Coach Robinson left the Towson coaching staff in 1997 and spent one season on the coaching staff at the University of Maryland.

A 1979 graduate of Towson University, Coach Robinson was a four-year performer at tight end for the Tigers. He was a member of the Tigers' undefeated team in 1974 that posted a 10-0 record and also played for the Tigers' Stagg Bowl team in 1976, a squad that finished the season as the NCAA Division III runners-up.

He joined the Tigers' coaching staff as a part-time assistant coach, initially helping Rich Bader work with the offensive line. In 1982, he was named as the Tigers' secondary coach and later became the special teams coach. In 1983, he coached All-American defensive back Gary Rubeling, who led NCAA Division II with 13 interceptions.

Coach Robinson became a full-time member of the Tiger coaching staff in 1984.

In 1992, when Gordy Combs was named as the Tigers' new head coach, Coach Robinson made a career switch as he became the Tigers' offensive coordinator. During his years as the Tigers' offensive coordinator, the Tigers displayed a very explosive offense.

In 1993, the Tigers posted an 8-2 record, led by All-American tailback Tony Vinson. Vinson, who rushed for a school record 2,016 yards, helped the Tigers average 490.3 yards per game of total offense. With the graduation of Vinson, the 1994 Tigers shifted the emphasis to the passing game. All-American quarterback Dan Crowley passed for just under 3,000 yards, helping the Tigers to another 8-2 record.

A graduate of Calvert Hall High School, Coach Robinson will continue to serve as a faculty member at his alma mater while coaching for the Tigers.

Coach Robinson and his wife, Diane, reside in nearby Stoneleigh with their 11-year old son, Jack, and their seven-year old daughter, Ayden.

Terrance Brooks, a 1991 Towson graduate and a member of the University's Athletic Hall of Fame, was named as a Strength and Condition-

ing Coach at Towson University in January of 2008.

A two-sport standout who was a member of the Tiger football and track and field teams, Brooks returned to his alma mater after three years at Kalamazoo College where he was the Hornets' head football coach and the strength and conditioning coordinator.

Prior to his stint at Kalamazoo, he spent three years in the dual role of Strength and Conditioning Coordinator and assistant football coach at Shenandoah College. In three years, he helped the football team post a 20-11 record. From 1996 to 1998, Brooks held three positions at Bridgewater College. In addition to his role as the Strength and Conditioning Coordinator, he was the offensive coordinator for the football team and he was an assistant track and field coach.

A strength and conditioning specialist certified by the National Strength and Conditioning Association, he is a four-time World and five-time National Drug Free Powerlifting Champion. He is a member of the American Football Coaches Association, the NFL Alumni Association, the National Strength and Conditioning Association and the United States Weightlifting Association. He is also a certified club coach by USA Weightlifting.

During his career, he has coached 11 National Strength and Conditioning All-Americans.

He worked with three Old Dominion Athletic Conference championship teams during his years at Bridgewater, including the women's basketball team and the men's and women's track squads.

In addition, he has six years of experience as a high school football coach in Maryland as well as one year as an assistant track coach.

A two-time All-American offensive lineman for the Tiger football team, Brooks was a three-year starter at right guard. As a junior, he was a first team All-ECAC selection and earned honorable mention All-American honors while leading the 1983 Tigers to a 10-2 record, an NCAA Division II playoff berth and the Lambert/Meadowlands Award as the top Division II team in the East.

A senior co-captain, Brooks led the Tigers to a 9-4 record and a second straight NCAA Division II playoff berth. The 1984 Tigers reached the semi-finals of the Division II playoffs. A first team Associated Press All-American, the Union Bridge, Md. native helped the Tigers win their second Lambert/Meadowlands Award. A two-time All-ECAC pick, he was Towson's Senior Athlete of the Year.

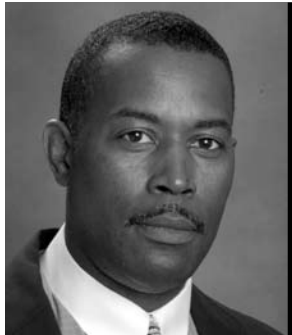

In 1979, he earned a Master's degree in Athletic Training from Virginia. He interned at the University of Richmond before becoming Towson's head athletics trainer in 1980.

O'Brien directs a Sports Medicine staff of six certified trainers and over 30 student trainers. He is active in state, regional and national athletics trainers' associations. He is the Chair of the College and University Athletic Trainers' Committee and serves as a member of the National Athletic Trainers Association's Board of Directors.

In 1992, he was inducted into the Towson Athletic Hall of Fame and has served on its Board of Directors.

His 20-year old son, Kyle, is a sophomore at the College of William & Mary where he plays football. His 18-year old daughter, Sarah, is a freshman at Towson University.

Success With "Walk-Ons"

Over the past few seasons, Coach Gordy Combs and his staff have enjoyed tremendous success with "walk on" football players who have earned scholarships. Last season, two of the Tigers' co-captains, defensive back Kenny Scott and wide receiver Demetrius Harrison, were former "walk ons" who have earned scholarships through their hard work and dedication.

"College football players have different timetables for development," says Coach Combs. "Many times a player who isn't heavily recruited slips through the cracks and blossoms when he reaches the collegiate level. We have been fortunate to have many significant players join our program as non-scholarship players and do very well.

"In terms of awarding scholarships, this is something we have to do," said Coach Combs. "We can tell a recruit we've done this before, and we've rewarded guys who came into this program without receiving any scholarship aid."

Offensive tackle Jermon Bushrod may be the most prominent "walk-on" ever to play for the Tigers. A four-year starter at tackle, the King George, Va. native was a three-time all-conference performer who was drafted in the fourth round of the 2007 NFL draft by the New Orleans Saints.

"Jermon was an outstanding individual for our program," Combs said. "We're very happy for him that he has been given a chance to play in the NFL. We know he'll make the most of his opportunity."

Ironically, another recent graduate, wide receiver Eric Yancey, was also a prominent "walk-on" who earned a scholarship. Yancey was the Tigers' top pass receiver as a senior with 68 receptions for 826

yards and ten touchdowns. He also earned first team all-conference honors. Yancey finished his career as the eighth-leading receiver in school history with 138 catches for 1,814 yards and 16 touchdowns.

In addition to Harrison and Scott, senior quarterback Andrew Goldbeck and senior wide receiver Dayron Arnold are former "walk-ons" who earned scholarships.

Junior defensive tackle Richard Lee is the Tigers' most prominent former "walk-on" this season. However, he is hardly a typical "walk on."

Prior to his senior season at Old Mill High School, Lee was receiving attention from several major college football programs. However, when he was diagnosed with non-Hodgkins lymphoma, the focus turned to overcoming cancer.

"I knew it was cancer," Lee recalls. "But, I didn't just sit down and think I could die. It was there, but it was almost not real. I didn't take in the severity of the situation until after I was out of the hospital and had so many people supporting me."

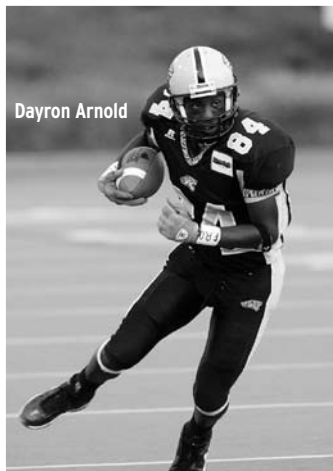
Mike Marcus, his coach at Old Mill High School, steered Lee towards Towson University. He recalled, "I talked Richard through the whole process. At the end, he said, 'I beat this and I want to play bad.'"

After three months of chemotherapy, Lee enrolled at Towson University and joined the football program.

He earned a scholarship after a solid freshman season. As a sophomore, he started all 11 games and made 27 tackles.

Towson University Nickname

Towson University is one of 28 NCAA member institutions using The tiger is the most popular mascot among American colleges and universities.

However, its obvious popularity was not the real reason the Tiger was selected to represent Towson.

When Towson was a two-year normal school the Baltimore media referred to its teams as the "Teachers." As the school expanded to three and four year programs, the newspapers granted Towson student athletes tenure, calling them the "Professors" and even shortening it to "Profs." Later, it was changed again to the "Schoolmasters."

The "Indians" and "Golden Knights" were other nicknames used over the years. But as the tale goes, the moniker was finally decided after a soccer match.

One autumn afternoon a sportswriter was covering the Towson soccer team in an uphill struggle. The next day the writer wrote that although the team had lost the game, "...they played like tigers."

The soccer team appreciated the comment and adopted "Tigers" as its nickname. Enthusiasm for it spread throughout the campus and the tiger eventually became the official designated

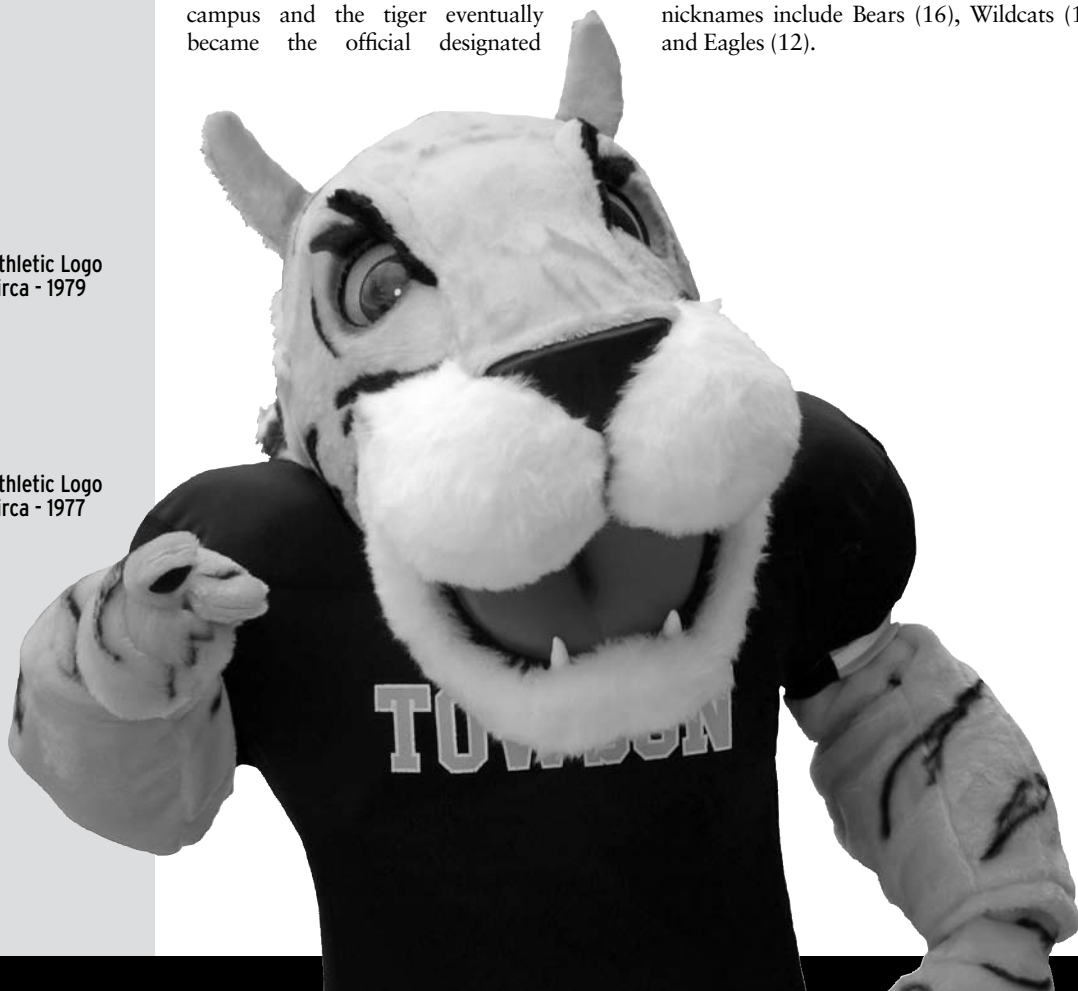
mascot.

The Towson Tiger logo has also experienced change. Several years ago, the new "stylistic" tiger was unveiled, replacing the upright caricature that had been used since the mid-80's. That took the place of the old block tiger which served as the logo from 1979. The present logo was altered slightly this past July, deleting the word "State" in keeping with the University's renaming of Towson University from Towson State University.

The Towson logo is registered. Approval for its use commercially is required. For color reproduction purposes, please contact the Towson Sports Information Office for separation instructions.

Other schools across the country who are also members of the "Tiger" fraternity include Auburn, Bishop, Clemson, Colorado College, DePauw, Doane, Grambling, Hampden-Sydney, Jackson State, Lincoln (Mo.), Livingston, LSU, Memphis, Missouri, Morehouse, Occidental, Pacific, Princeton, Rochester Tech, St. Paul's, Savannah State, Sewanee, Tennessee State, Texas Southern, Trinity (Tex.), Tuskegee and Wittenberg.

According to the NCAA, other popular nicknames include Bears (16), Wildcats (12) and Eagles (12).

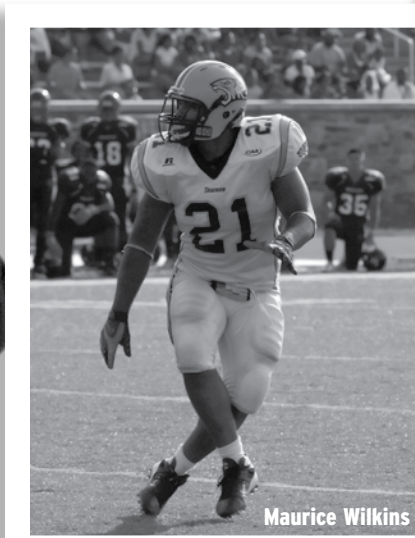




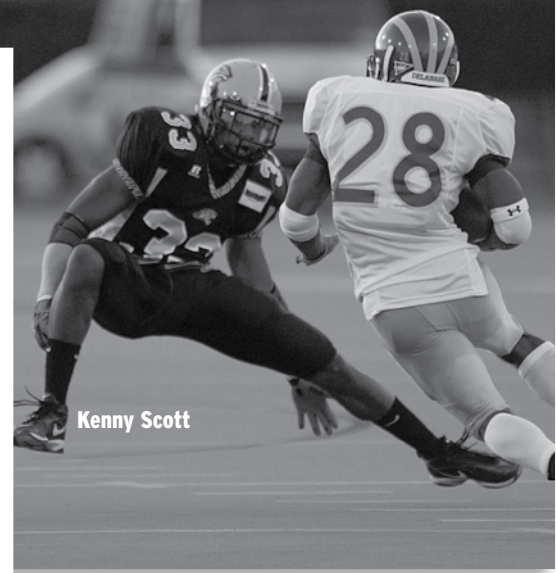

2007 TIGERS **Stingy on Defense**

Despite a rash of injuries in key positions, the Tigers were very competitive while facing one of the hardest schedules in the nation.

Although their highly-touted offense never got untracked, the Tigers used a stingy defense to overcome a rash of injuries and remain competitive while facing a very tough difficult schedule.

Nationally-ranked in the pre-season, the Tigers opened the season by winning their first two games, edging non-conference opponents Central Connecticut and Morgan State. However, injuries started to mount and the Tigers dropped three games in a row. Highlighting the season was a dramatic 23-21 win over Richmond on October 6.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE 2007 SEASON:

All-American: Senior linebacker Brian Bradford had an award-filled post-season. In addition to be named first team All-Colonial Athletic Association, he was named as a first team All-American by Associated Press, the American Football Coaches Association and The Sports Network. An all-conference pick for the third year in a row, he was also named first team All-ECAC. With 149 tackles in 11 games, he led the CAA in tackles by a wide margin. Bradford had 30 tackles more than anyone else in the CAA. Bradford finished

second in NCAA FCS with 149 tackles in 11 games, a 13.55 average. He was national runner-up to linebacker Ronnie McCullough of Bethune-Cookman. A four-year starter at linebackers, he ended his career with 328 tackles, third on Towson's all-time list.

Tough Schedule: The Tigers faced one of the toughest schedules in the NCAA FCS in 2007. According to FullySports.com, Towson played the sixth-toughest schedule in NCAA FCS last year. Prior to their game at Maine, Towson's schedule was ranked as the toughest in NCAA FCS. Of the teams that played the ten toughest schedules in NCAA FCS, six were Colonial Athletic Association teams ... National runner-up Delaware played the second-toughest schedule in the nation while William & Mary was fourth. Massachusetts was fifth, just ahead of Towson. Of the 11 teams on the Tigers' schedule, eight of them posted winning records. Four of the Tigers' 11 opponents qualified for the NCAA FCS Playoffs and two (Delaware, Richmond) of them reached the national semi-finals.

Keeping Them Close: The Tigers played more than their fair share of close games in 2007. In fact, eight of the 11 games were decided by 10 points or less. The Tigers' three wins came by a total of 19 points while five of their loss were decided by a total of 30 points. The Tigers' 23-21 win over Richmond was decided on the final play while the losses to Maine and Villanova were determined by two-point conversions in the final minutes.

Turnover Troubles: Turnovers contributed greatly to ruining the Tigers' hopes for a winning season. Not only did the Tigers have a minus-11 turnover ratio, they were out-scored on turnovers by a 92-16 margin. Opponents scored 92 points on the Tigers' 26 turnovers while the Tigers scored only 16 points on 15 turnovers by their opponents. Towson scored just one TD after a turnover (at Morgan).

All-Time Tackle Leaders: Linebackers Brian Bradford and John Webb were ranked among the Tigers' all-time tackle leaders. Bradford finished third on the Tigers' career list with 328 tackles. He reached the 300-tackle level with 19 tackles against Villanova. Webb made 6 tackles against Villanova to reach the 300-level. He finished fourth on Towson's career list (308). Only 5 players in school history have made 300 tackles. Former All-American Jeff Boller, '83 holds the school record with 382 tackles while Mike Arburtina, '95 is second on the list. Jim Colongo, '98 ranks fifth with 302 tackles.

Packing Them In: In their five home games last season, the Tigers set an attendance record at Johnny Unitas® Stadium. By drawing 3,959 fans to their home finale against Villanova, the Tigers drew a record 35,693 fans, breaking the mark of 31,847 set in 2005. Towson averaged 7,139 fans in 5 games last year, breaking the mark of 5,308 set in the 2005 season. In addition, the Tigers drew 3 of the largest crowds in the history of Johnny Unitas® Stadium. In September, the Tigers drew the largest crowd in stadium history when 10,856 fans attended the Towson-Delaware game.

Academic All-Star: Linebacker John Webb of the Tigers was named to the tenth annual Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) Athletic Directors Association Academic All-Star team. A Biology major with a 3.31 Grade Point Average, Webb was one of 51 scholar-athletes named to the Academic All-Star team. Football players from all Football Championship Subdivision institutions are eligible for these prestigious awards. Each of the nominees was required to have a minimum grade point average of 3.20 (on a 4.00 scale) in undergraduate study and have been a starter or key player with legitimate athletics credentials.

2nd-Leading Passer: After throwing for 2,563 yards as a junior, quarterback Sean Schaefer will enter his senior year ranked second on the Tigers' list of career passing leaders with 8,358 yards. He threw for 242 yards against Villanova to move into second place ahead of Chris Goetz, '90. Goetz passed for 7,882 yards from 1987-1990. He trails the all-time leader, Dan Crowley, '95 by 542 yards.

What A Comeback: On October 6, the Tigers staged a very memorable comeback against 14th-ranked Richmond. After the Spiders took a 21-17 lead with 29 seconds left, the Tigers staged a near-miraculous comeback. After Jimmy McClam returned the ensuing kickoff to the Tiger 33-yard line with 22 seconds left, Sean Schaefer directed an amazing touchdown drive. He completed four straight passes for 67 yards, including a game-winning 14-yard TD pass to Demetrius Harrison on the final play of the game. The game-winning touchdown pass was selected as one of the top plays of the day by ESPN.

2nd-Best Defense: Led by Brian Bradford, the Tigers had the second-best scoring defense in the CAA last year. Towson allowed 22.0 points per game, the second-best mark behind Massachusetts. UMass allowed 19.2 points per game. Towson's scoring defense was 28th in NCAA FCS. The Tigers also had the second-best pass defense in the CAA, giving up 175.3 yards per contest. The Tigers gave up only 7 touchdown passes in 11 games, by far the lowest mark in the CAA. Towson ranked 21st in NCAA FCS in fewest passing yards allowed.

CAA Academic Honorees: Led by seniors Andrew Goldbeck, Kenny Scott, Jeff Tyler and John Webb, a contingent of 8 Tiger football players were named to the first Colonial Athletic Association Football Academic All-Conference team. Junior Mark Bencivengo, sophomore Casey Cegles, red-shirt freshman Jeremy Gardner and sophomore Josh Root joined the four seniors as part of the CAA's 110-member Academic All-Conference team.



2007 IN REVIEW

TOWSON, Md. – Led by a 300-yard passing performance from quarterback Sean Schaefer, the Tigers rallied for ten points in the fourth quarter as they opened their season with a 20-10 non-conference victory over Central Connecticut in Johnny Unitas Stadium. For the Tigers, it was their 12th straight win over a non-league opponent.

With the win, the Tigers also improved their record in season openers at home to 10-0 under the direction of Coach Gordy Combs. It was Towson's 100th all-time victory on Minnegan Field.

An enthusiastic crowd of 7,276 attended the season opener, the fifth-largest home crowd in the history of the program.

With the score tied at 10-10 in the fourth quarter, Schaefer directed a 58-yard drive that resulted in a 39-yard field goal by sophomore Mark Bencivengo with 9:24 left. Bencivengo's field goal gave the Tigers a 13-10 advantage, a lead they did not relinquish.

The Tigers put the game out of reach later in the fourth quarter when they drove 75 yards on 12 plays for the clinching touchdown. Senior Rasheed McClaude, who ran for a career high 111 yards on 16 carries, gave the Tigers a 20-10 lead when he scored on a one-yard run with 2:51 remaining.

"It was a typical first game of the year," said Coach Combs. "The bottom line is that we made the plays when we had to make them."

He added, "We reacted very well to adversity and I was pleased by that. There were times in the game when we could have gone in the tank - but we played with resolve. We have a lot of mistakes that we need to eliminate - especially the penalties. Many coaches have said teams make the most improvement from the first game to the second game and I'm hoping that happens."

Schaefer notched the eighth 300-yard passing game of his career as the Tigers overcame a pounding rushing attack that netted Central Connecticut 246 yards on the ground.

Towson wasted no time in lighting up its side of the scoreboard, driving 53 yards in six plays on its first possession with Bencivengo capping it off with a 34-yard field

goal for a 3-0 Tigers' lead. The drive was helped handsomely by McClaude, who broke off a career long 39-yard run that moved the Tigers deep into Blue Devils' territory.

Central Connecticut grabbed a 7-3 lead late in the first quarter after an exchange of turnovers. It took the Blue Devils nine plays before they scored when Jo Jo Freeman's five-yard TD run gave CCSU a 7-3 lead with 4:24 left in the first period.

With time winding down in the first half, the Tigers took possession after a Chris Rose 54-yard punt rolled dead at their six-yard line with 2:03 left on the clock and no timeouts.

Over the next 68 seconds, Schaefer completed 7 of 8 passes for 94 yards as he gave the Tigers a 10-7 lead with a 19-yard TD pass to junior Marcus Lee just 55 seconds before halftime. Bencivengo's conversion gave the Tigers a 10-7 lead at the break.

"That drive was a killer," said Central Coach Jeff McNerney after the game. "Then, we had a broken coverage on the touchdown pass. But Towson can do that to you. They have a lot of speed and they play fast. Schaefer is a great quarterback and he can hurt you at any time."

Senior linebacker Brian Bradford led the Tiger defense with a career high 17 tackles and a forced fumble. Senior John Webb added 14 tackles while Maurice Willkins made 13 tackles.

"We had a little trouble with their option game," said Bradford. "But we stayed excited and stayed focus. For the most part, we made the plays when we needed them."

Schaefer completed 30 of 40 passes for 300 yards and one TD to lead the Tigers' passing game. He completed passes to eight different receivers. Junior wide receiver Tommy Breaux, making his first appearance in a Towson uniform, hauled in a game-high seven receptions for 109 yards. Breaux is also the starting center for the Tigers' basketball team.

In a wild game that featured an exciting interception return, a safety, a pair of blocked field goals, a blocked punt and a handful of penalties, Schaefer stood tall for the Tigers, shaking off 2 interceptions and 4 sacks to complete 20 of 40 attempts for 213 yards as Towson beat Morgan for the 15th time in 20 meetings. The victory also extended Towson's win streak over non-conference opponents to 13 straight games.

With his performance, Schaefer upped his career passing yardage total to 6,318 yards, moving into 4th place on the Tigers' all-time passing list ahead of Ron Meehan, currently Schaefer's quarterback coach.

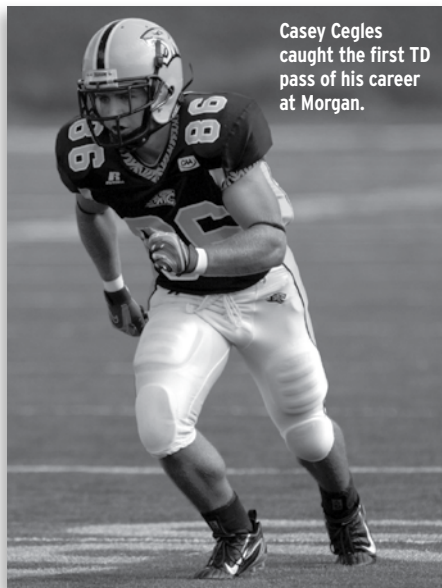
Although the Tigers never trailed in the game, they did not grab the lead for good until 9:53 remained in the game. Scott intercepted a pass at the Towson 30-yard line and returned it to the Morgan 2-yard line. On the next play, Schaefer gave the Tigers a lead they would never relinquish with a 2-yard TD pass to John Godlasky.

"This was a victory for perseverance," said Coach Gordy Combs. "We had a lot of things go against us - bad snaps, dropped passes, penalties, injuries and a safety. But we hung in there and fought through it. We made the plays we needed to make and we stopped them when we had to."

The Tigers jumped out to a 7-0 lead but it took most of the first quarter to secure it. The drive turned into a marathon, taking 18 plays and over eight minutes to travel 66 yards. Schaefer passed the last 10 yards to wide receiver Dayron Arnold for the TD.

Jonathan Skeete put points on the scoreboard for the Bears with a 32-yard field goal early in the second quarter.

Towson answered with another long drive that went 76 yards in 4:05. Schaefer finished it with a 10 yard toss to Demetrius Harrison as the Tigers increased their lead to 14-3 with 6:29 left in the half.



Casey Cegles caught the first TD pass of his career at Morgan.

The Bears cut their deficit to 14-10 just before halftime when Mario Melton threw a 9-yard TD pass to Robert Surratt with five second left. Early in the third quarter, a 28-yard field goal by Skeete pulled Morgan to within 14-13.

The Bears made a bid to take a lead midway through the third quarter when Skeete tried a 45-yard field goal. However, linebacker Brian Bradford blocked the kick to preserve the lead.

With 2:20 left in the third quarter, Schaefer fired a 22-yard TD pass to sophomore Casey Cegles, giving the Tigers a 21-13 lead.

But, Chad Simpson kept Morgan alive with a 56-yard TD run that cut the lead to 21-19 with 13:57 left. John Webb stopped Melton on his two-point conversion try.

Moments later, Schaefer was sacked in the end zone as Morgan tied the game at 21-21.

After the free kick, the Bears matched to the Tigers' 31-yard line. But. Melton served up an interception to Scott, who returned it 68 yards to the Morgan two-yard line. On the next play, Schaefer threw his fourth touchdown pass, a 2-yard toss to Godlasky.

The Tiger defense held Morgan without a first down the rest of the way. When Marcus Lee made a fair catch at the Towson 22-yard line with 4:49 remaining, the Bears' offense was finished for the evening.

Using the running ability of Nick Williams and sophomore Matt Castor, Schaefer directed a 51-yard, nine-play drive that ate up the fine 4:49 of the game. Williams finished the game with 91 yards on 15 carries.

AMHERST, Mass. – Third-ranked Massachusetts (3-0) overcame an early 10-3 deficit and turned back an upset bid by the 23rd-ranked Tigers as the Minutemen beat the Tigers 36-13 in the Colonial Athletic Association opener for both teams in McGuirk Alumni Stadium.

The loss was the first of the season for the Tigers and snapped a 6-game road winning streak the Tigers had. It was the Tigers' first road loss since the season finale in 2005, a loss at James Madison.

The defending conference champion Minutemen won their 9th straight home game.

"All week we were very aware of how good UMass is," said Coach Gordy Combs. "They didn't disappoint in that regard. Despite that, we had some very good opportunities and we didn't cash in. Meanwhile, UMass took advantage of our mistakes. When you're playing a team like UMass, you have to take advantage of everything they give you."

Despite facing a tremendous amount of pressure, quarterback Sean Schaefer completed 27 of 44 passes for 262 yards. Due to the pressure of UMass, he was sacked 4 times, hurried many other times and threw three interceptions.

"We were aware that UMass likes to blitz," said Schaefer. "My O-Line did a good job blocking but there was still a lot of pressure."

Both teams demonstrated their offensive prowess in the first quarter as points were scored on each possession. Schaefer came out throwing the ball. On the first drive, he connected with Paul Perry for a 59-yard play that moved Towson to the UMass 15-yard line. Two plays later, Rasheed McClaude finished off the drive with a one-yard TD plunge. Mark Bencivengo's conversion gave the Tigers a 7-0 lead just 2:55 into the contest.

The Minutemen answered on their first possession by driving to the Tiger 23 where they settled for a 40 yard Chris Koeplin field goal at the 8:40 mark.

Towson got those points right back on its next drive. Schaefer hit Marcus Lee with a 39-yard pass that put the Tigers in UMass territory. A 34-yard field goal by Bencivengo gave them a 10-3 lead with 5:31 left.

UMass tied the game with a 63-yard drive that produced a 10-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Liam Coen to Michael Omar to knot the score at 10-10.

A costly error enabled UMass take the lead a minute later. A bad snap over the head of punter Bill Shears went for a safety and a 12-10 UMass lead.

In the second period, Michael Meggett blocked a 34-yard field goal attempt by Bencivengo to halt a Tiger threat. The Minutemen promptly drove 77 yards to take a 19-10 lead when Coen threw a 35-yard TD toss to Rasheed Rancher, who made a spectacular one-handed catch.

The Tigers cut their deficit to 19-13 when Bencivengo kicked a 30-yard field goal with 8:50 left in the third period.

From that point on, it was all UMass as Koeplin kicked a 21-yard field goal late in the third quarter for a 22-13 lead.

With 14:05 left in the game, Sean Smalls made a game-turning play as he intercepted a pass and returned it 90 yards for a touchdown and a 29-13 lead.

The Tiger defense turned in a solid effort against UMass' highly-regarded running game. The Minutemen came into the contest, averaging 171.5 yards rushing per game. Towson held them to 81 yards rushing, only 33 yards in the second half.

Maurice Wilkins and Drew Mack led the Tigers with 10 tackles each.

TOWSON, Md. – Playing before a record crowd of 10,856, the Tigers were hoping to post a victory over rival Delaware for the third year in a row. However, senior running back Omar Cuff scored 3 touchdowns and rushed for 109 yards to lead the 11th-ranked and unbeaten Blue Hens (4-0) to a 27-7 Colonial Athletic Association win at Johnny Unitas® Stadium.

Cuff got plenty of help from quarterback Joe Flacco. Flacco, who was destined to become the Baltimore Ravens' first round draft pick in seven months, completed 22 of 33 passes for 274 yards with 1 interception. Although he didn't put any points on the board with his passing, Flacco hit 7 different receivers to keep the Tigers' defense off balance and put Cuff in a finishing position.

The Tigers got a terrific opportunity on the first play of the game when senior John Sutherland tipped Flacco's first pass attempt. It was intercepted by junior Drew Mack at the Blue Hen 48-yard line. But the drive stalled when quarterback Sean Schaefer was sacked on back-to-back plays as Towson gave up the ball on downs.

Inspired by the defensive stand, Delaware moved downfield, grinding it out until Flacco found Jon Heydt for a 30-yard completion to the Towson 2-yard line. The Blue Hens scored when Cuff nosed in from a yard out for his 13th TD of the year to give Delaware the 7-0 lead.

The Tigers threatened on the next series but again came up empty when Mark Benvenuto's 44-yard field goal attempt was wide.

Starting at their 27-yard line, the Blue Hens methodically marched toward paydirt again. The Tigers stopped them at the 9-yard line where they settled for a 26-yard field goal by Jon Steifsky and a 10-0 lead.

The Blue Hens added to their lead with the half winding down. They drove 76 yards as Cuff broke loose for a 16-yard TD and a 17-0 lead at intermission.

On their first possession of the second half, the Tigers scored their only TD of the game. Jimmy McClam returned the second half kickoff to midfield. On the fifth play of the

drive, Schaefer found a streaking Paul Perry down the sideline for a 45-yard touchdown pass as the Tigers cut into Delaware's lead, 17-7, just 2:20 into the second half.

Later in the quarter, an interception by Marvin McKinnie gave the Blue Hens the ball at midfield. Cuff capped off a 51-yard drive by scoring from 13 yards out, giving Delaware a 24-7 advantage.

Delaware used a time-consuming drive in the fourth quarter to take a 27-7 lead on a 20-yard field goal by Striefsky with 10:09 left. The Blue Hens marched 82 yards on 17 plays and consumed 7:22 of the clock.

"Our defense played very well," said Delaware Coach K.C. Keeler. "Our defense was maligned early in the season but they played very well against an outstanding Towson team."

He added, "We have so much respect for Sean Schaefer. He has the ability to pick a defense apart but we kept them off-balance. We knew they were having some problems on the offensive line and had been juggling guys. We kept them back on their heels and took control of the game."

Keeler concluded, "This was a very big game for us. Towson had beaten us twice in a row and we needed a win like this to get our swagger back."

Led by defensive end Matt Marcorelle, the Blue Hens sacked Schaefer five times and hurried him most of the time. Marcorelle had three sacks for Delaware.

The Blue Hens held the Tigers to 11 first downs and 157 yards of total offense. The Tigers were limited to minus-16 yards rushing.

Senior linebacker Maurice Wilkins led Towson's defense with a career high 15 tackles.

The Tribe was able to beat the Tigers despite being dominated for most of the game. Towson piled up 422 yards of total offense while the Tribe had 284 yards. Towson doubled the Tribe with 24 first downs. The Tigers ran 84 offensive plays while the Tribe had 56 plays. Towson also dominated the time of possession at 33:58.

In the first half, the Tigers staged three impressive drives and came away with only 13 points, scoring one TD and 2 field goals.

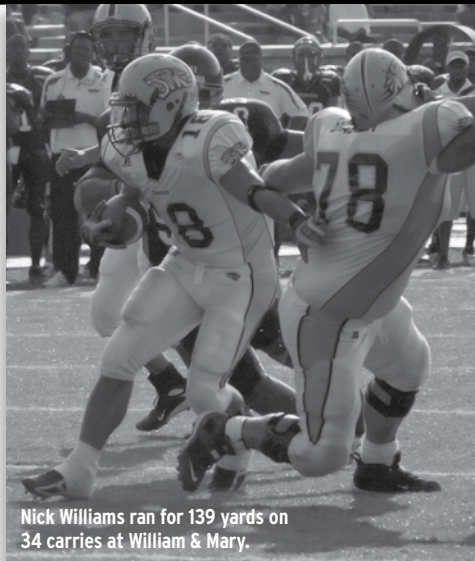

TOWSON, Md. – Junior quarterback Sean Schaefer directed a remarkable 67-yard drive for the game-winning touchdown on the last play of the game to lead the Tigers (3-3, 1-3) to a stunning 23-21 come-from-behind victory over 14th-ranked Richmond (3-2, 2-1) in a Colonial Athletic Association game at Johnny Unitas® Stadium. On the final play, Schaefer lofted a 14-yard TD pass to senior Demetrius Harrison in the corner of the end zone for the win.

The Spiders, who trailed all afternoon, took a 21-17 lead on a 14-yard TD run by senior Tim Hightower with 29 seconds left. Hightower's run capped a 66-yard, 10-play drive.

After Jimmy McClam returned the ensuing kickoff to the Tigers' 33-yard line, Schaefer went to work. With 22 seconds left, he completed a 22-yard pass to Harrison who went out-of-bounds at the Richmond 45-yard line. On the next play, he completed a 7-yard pass to Harrison at the Richmond 38-yard line.

With 10 seconds left, he completed a 24-yard pass to Paul Perry at the Spiders' 14-yard line. After a Tiger time out, he threw the game-winning 14-yard TD pass to Har-

risson in the right corner of the end zone, touching off a wild celebration.

"All I could think about when the ball was coming was 'don't drop it,'" said Harrison, who had 10 catches for 112 yards. "I was having trouble breathing before the play. After the play was over, I was having trouble breathing for a different reason. All of my teammates were on top of me."

Schaefer said, "When we came on the field for the last drive, we were very focused. We knew we needed to make some plays and we needed to do them quickly. My offensive line did a great job blocking all game long and that really helped me. I wasn't sure if we had enough time at the end. We practice the one-minute drill every day - but we've never practiced a 22-second drill."

In one of the top performances of his career, Schaefer completed 29 of 33 passes for 287 yards and 2 touchdowns without an interception. In the third quarter, he completed 15 consecutive passes to break the school record for completions in a row. By completing 29 of 33 passes, he set a school record for completion percentage (.879).

The Tiger defense came up with a big effort against the Spiders, who were averaging 39.0 points per game. Towson held Richmond to a pair of TD's and 354 yards of offense.

Linebacker Brian Bradford, the CAA leader, made 14 tackles while John Webb and Maurice Wilkins had 12 tackles each.

On their first drive, the Tigers marched 80 yards in a 15-play drive that took 7:43. Nick Williams scored the go-ahead TD on a one-yard run for a 7-0 lead. In the second quarter, Andrew Howard kicked a pair of field goals to pull Richmond to within 7-6 at halftime.

At the start of the second half, Schaefer put together another long drive. He finished off an 87-yard drive with a 17-yard TD pass to Casey Cegles, giving Towson a 14-6 lead with 9:54 left in the third quarter.

The Spiders tied the game at 14-14 with 10:48 left when Eric Ward scored on a quarterback draw on a 4-yard run on fourth down. Then, he completed the 2-point conversion pass to Scot Riddell to tie the game.

Towson responded by driving to the Spiders' 28-yard line where Bencivengo gave the Tigers a 17-14 lead when he kicked a 38-yard field goal with 5:29 remaining.

"This was a heart-breaking loss," said Richmond Coach Dave Clawson. "When you score the go-ahead touchdown with 29 seconds left, you expect to win. But all credit goes to Towson. They came through and they executed when they had to."

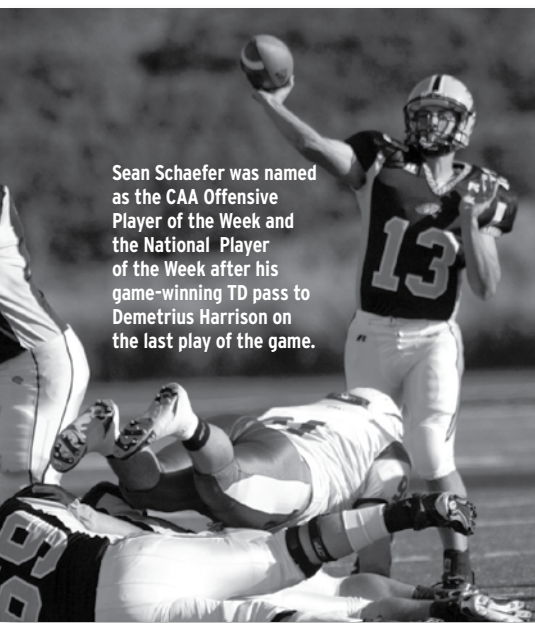

2007 IN REVIEW

TOWSON, Md. – Facing an undefeated, tenth-ranked Hofstra squad in their Homecoming Game, the Tigers knew it would take a monumental performance to pull out a win. However, Hofstra's defense came up with its own monumental effort, holding the Tigers to three points and 193 yards of total offense en route to a 20-3 victory over Towson at Johnny Unitas® Stadium.

With the win, Hofstra upped its record to 6-0 overall and 3-0 in the Colonial Athletic Association. The Tigers fell to 3-4 overall and 1-4 in the CAA.

While senior tailback Kareem Huggins provided Hofstra with a career high 186 yards and two second half touchdown runs, the Pride's defense was the story of the game.

"We were lethargic," said Towson Coach Gordy Combs. "But sometimes the other team can make you look lethargic. All credit goes to Hofstra. They came in here with a solid defensive plan and they executed it very well."

After the Pride took a 3-0 lead on a 21-yard field goal by senior Rob Zarrilli midway through the first quarter, the Tigers were shut out until midway through the second period.

A remarkable interception by senior linebacker Brian Bradford gave the Tigers a first down at the Hofstra 17-yard line. Bradford intercepted his first pass of the season when he wrestled a short pass away from Hofstra tight end Phil Riley.

But, the Hofstra defense came up with a defensive stop, forcing the Tigers to settle for a 37-yard field goal by junior Mark Bencivengo and a 3-3 tie with 7:29 left in the first half.

Later in the quarter, the Tigers drove to the Hofstra 22-yard line where the drive stalled. Bencivengo came on try a 39-yard field goal which was blocked by defensive tackle Ken Sussman.

"We were down at halftime because we had dominated the first half but the score was tied at 3-3," said Hofstra Coach Dave Cohen. "I think we had twice the yardage that Towson had – but we kept shooting ourselves in the foot. We felt the team was over-anxious so we just told everyone to calm down and

keep playing hard."

On the opening drive of the second half, the Tigers moved to the Hofstra 44-yard line where a Sean Schaefer pass was intercepted by senior linebacker Stanley Gutierrez. The Pride responded by marching down the field for the first touchdown of the game.

Huggins capped off the 61-yard, 9-play drive by scoring on a 4-yard touchdown run.

Early in the fourth quarter, the Pride capitalized on another Tiger turnover. After cornerback DeWayne Whitaker recovered a fumble at the Pride 43-yard line, Hofstra marched to the Tiger 18-yard line. Zarrilli's second field goal of the game, a 35-yarder, gave Hofstra a 13-3 lead with 9:12 left in the game.

The Pride added an insurance touchdown in the final minutes after an interception by free safety David Darby at the Hofstra 32-yard line. Two plays later, Huggins scampered 66 yards for a touchdown to give the Pride a 20-3 lead with 2:25 left.

While shutting down the Tigers' passing game, the Hofstra defense held Schaefer to a career low 123 yards passing. Hofstra intercepted him twice and sacked him 4 times.

"We spent a lot of time working on our defense against Towson's spread formation this week," said Cohen. "Last year, Schaefer really hurt us and we wanted to make sure it didn't happen again."

Bradford led the Tigers with 13 tackles, a quarterback sack, two forced fumbles and an interception.

Senior linebacker Maurice Wilkins made 10 tackles while freshman cornerback Jeremy Gardner had a career high nine tackles.

Senior linebacker John Webb had 8 tackles and a sack against Hofstra. With his 8 tackles, he moved into fifth place on Towson's career list with 275 tackles.

The Raiders responded by marching 83 yards on 12 plays as they converted three third downs to take a 7-0 lead. 2007 IN REVIEW

ORONO, Maine – The Tigers overcame bad weather, a slow start and several turnovers only to have a rare two-point play spell the difference in their 16-13 Colonial Athletic Association loss to Maine at rainy, windy Alfond Stadium.

The game was played under deteriorating weather conditions as the remnants of Hurricane Noel moved up the East Coast.

Maine tallied a go-ahead touchdown to take a 14-7 lead with 3:38 left to play, making it seem almost impossible for Towson to recover, considering the conditions.

But the Tigers put together the perfect drive as junior quarterback Sean Schaefer moved the Tigers 53 yards in five plays to score with 2:02 left to play.

Towson Coach Gordy Combs made the decision to try for the two-point conversion and escape Orono with a victory. But defensive back Troy Harris ruined the scheme by stepping in front of receiver Marcus Lee on a Schaefer pass attempt. Harris gathered in the ball and raced 100 yards the other way for 2 Maine points and a 16-13 lead.

After the game, Combs refused to second-guess the decision to go for two points and the lead.

“Going for two points was the right move,” he said. “We had a chance to get the lead with one play from the three-yard line. That was a better chance for us than kicking the extra point and trying to win in overtime. I liked our chances when we went for the two-point conversion. Their defensive back (Harris) just made a great play.”

After the teams battled through a scoreless first half, the weather turned worse for the second half with the arrival of rain. Like the weather, Towson’s start to the third quarter was not pleasant. On the first play from scrimmage, the Tigers fumbled and the Black Bears’ Andrew Downey recovered at the 14-yard line, giving Maine a scoring opportunity the Black Bears did not waste.

Four plays later, Jhamal Fluellen scooted four yards into the end zone for the game’s first points and a 7-0 Maine lead.

Towson fumbled again on its next possession with Jonathan Pirruccello recovering at the Tigers’ 49-yard line. Maine was on its

way to another scoring chance when Brian Bradford forced a fumble that was recovered by Raymond White at the Tigers’ 17-yard line.

Early in the fourth quarter, the Tigers ignored the weather and drove for the game-tying touchdown. After gaining possession at their own 25-yard line, Schaefer went airborne, hitting Lee, Dayron Arnold and Demetrius Harrison for gains to Maine’s 21-yard line.

Facing a fourth down-and-one, Schaefer faked the run, pulled the ball out, rolled right and completed a 21-yard TD pass to tight end John Godlasky, only his third catch of the year. Mark Bencivengo’s kick tied the game at 7-7 with 10:17 left in the game.

With the momentum switching, the Tigers had apparently stopped Maine, forcing a punt. But punter Kash Kiefer scrambled to make a play out of a bad center snap and ran 17 yards to midfield for a first down. With the help of two personal foul penalties, the Black Bears advanced to the Tiger 11-yard line. Three plays later, Jermaine Henderson ran 5 yards for a TD and a 14-7 lead.

Undaunted, the Tigers came right back. Matt Castor returned the kickoff to the Tiger 47-yard line. Then, Schaefer hit Casey Cegles with a long pass to Maine’s 13-yard line.

For the second week in a row, the Tigers failed to convert the two-pointer and they lost another close CAA decision as Villanova (6-4, 4-3) held on for a 14-12 victory over Towson (3-7, 1-6) at Johnny Unitas Stadium.

The Wildcats used a time-consuming running game to keep the Tigers' offense off the field. Villanova controlled the ball for 38:56 and ran 83 offensive plays while the Tigers had 56 offensive plays in 21:04 of possession. The Wildcats, who rushed for 194 yards, were especially effective in the second half when they owned the ball for 21:15.

"It was the kind of game I thought it would be," said Villanova Coach Andy Talley. "We knew what we had to do to win. I felt more comfortable when we had the ball because I was scared to death of Sean Schaefer. If he got hot, I knew we would be in trouble."

Trailing by 14-6 with 1:51 remaining, Schaefer did get hot. He completed 4 of 5 passes for 53 yards on an efficient touchdown drive. His 7-yard TD pass to senior Demetrius Harrison with 52 seconds remaining pulled the Tigers to within 14-12.

Needing a two-point conversion to tie the game, Schaefer lobbed a pass to Harrison in the end zone. With John Dempsey defending him, Harrison couldn't hold on to the pass.

The Tigers' attempted onsides kick was recovered by Villanova's Michael Bradway at the Tiger 43-yard line, ending the game.

"I am sure I sound redundant but we missed too many opportunities," said Towson Coach Gordy Combs. "We didn't finish drives and we dropped too many passes. Villanova did a great job controlling the clock. They did what they had to do – and we came up short."

The Tigers' defense dominated the first half as they owned a 3-0 lead at intermission.

"Our defense played very well again," said Combs. "This was the second week in a row when we shut out a team in the first half."

The Tigers took a 3-0 lead midway through the second quarter with some trickery. On second down at their own 47-yard line, the

Tigers used a flea flicker as tailback Nick Williams took the handoff and lateralled the ball back to Schaefer who found Harrison for a 34-yard gain to the Wildcats' 19-yard line. That play led to a 32-yard field goal by Mark Bencivengo for a 3-0 lead with 5:19 left.

In the opening minutes of the second half, Villanova marched 68 yards for the first touchdown of the game. Aaron Ball scored his first career TD on a 2-yard run to put the Wildcats on top, 7-3.

The Tigers responded to their 7-3 deficit by driving to the Wildcats' 11-yard line. After the drive stalled, Bencivengo kicked a 28-yard field goal with 3:30 left.

With their lead cut to 7-6, Villanova put together an impressive drive. The Wildcats drove 71 yards and converted 4 third-downs en route to a score. Chris Whitney gave them a 14-6 lead with 12:01 left by throwing a 10-yard TD pass to Phil Atkinson.

The Wildcat defense did a great job protecting the lead. Villanova stopped the Tigers without a first down on 3 possessions before the touchdown drive in the last minute.

One of 19 seniors playing in his final home game, linebacker Brian Bradford led the Tiger defense with a career high 19 tackles. The CAA leader in tackles, Bradford moved into 3rd place on the Tigers' career tackle list with 313 tackles.

Senior John Webb made 6 tackles to become the 5th Tiger with 300 career tackles while senior safety Kenny Scott had 10 tackles, surpassing the 200-tackle level.

HARRISONBURG, Va. – Hoping to thrive in the role of spoiler and prevent James Madison University from earning an NCAA FCS playoff berth, the Tigers fell short and dropped a 23-13 CAA decision to the 14th-ranked Dukes at Bridgeforth Stadium in the regular season finale for both teams.

With the win, the NCAA Playoff-bound Dukes improved to 8-3 on the season and 6-2 in the CAA while the Tigers ended the year with a 3-8 record and a 1-7 CAA mark.

Despite losing their regular season finale, the Tigers did a lot of things well in their upset bid against the Dukes.

Quarterback Sean Schaefer completed 40 of 59 passes for a season high 349 yards and a touchdown. The Tigers controlled the clock with 33:37 in time of possession.

Towson had 24 first downs to 14 by the Dukes and the Tigers outgained JMU, 349 to 331 yards. Towson also ran 88 plays while JMU had only 60 plays. But it wasn't enough.

"This game was just like the story of our season," said Coach Gordy Combs. "We did a lot of things well – but we didn't get the play we needed at the right time. We kept on fighting – just like we did all season. JMU is one of the best teams in the country and we gave them all they could handle in a game they had to win."

Scott McGee stunned the Tigers and whipped the crowd into a frenzy when he took the opening kickoff 5 yards deep in his end zone and returned it 100 yards for a TD to set a school record and give the Dukes a 7-0 lead just 16 seconds into the game.

The Tigers shook off their quick deficit and marched 65 yards down the field, mostly on the arm of Schaefer, who was 6-of-8 for 47 yards. On the 15th play of the drive, Rasheed McClaude silenced the JMU faithful, by nosing in for the TD. Mark Bencivengo's conversion tied it at 7-7.

JMU came right back to take a 10-7 lead when Dave Stannard kicked a 36-yard field goal with 2:11 left in the first quarter.

With 1:18 left in the half, the Dukes took possession at their own 14-yard line. Quarterback Rodney Landers led JMU on a drive that gave JMU a 16-7 lead with 21 seconds left in

the half. Landers capped off the drive by scrambling 18 yards for a TD, finishing an 86-yard drive that consumed only 57 seconds. A bad snap led to a failed conversion as JMU took a 16-7 lead into halftime.

Late in the third quarter, the Dukes put together their second touchdown drive. With 13:51 left in the fourth quarter, Landers ran for his second TD on a 21-yard scamper to give JMU a 23-7 lead. The Dukes went 79 yards while running just 2:01 off the clock.

The Tigers served notice that they would not go quietly on the next possession. Schaefer drove the Tigers 82 yards and threw a 16-yard TD pass to Marcus Lee with 11:35 left. They went for the 2-point conversion and failed.

After the defense forced a JMU punt with 7:30 left, the offense was on the move again. The Tigers drove to the JMU 34-yard line where the only turnover of the game stopped them.

Despite being sacked 9 times, Schaefer completed a seasonal high 40 passes and did not throw an interception.

"We did a good job moving the ball," said Coach Combs. "We know that if we give Sean Schaefer time, we can throw the ball downfield. But the offensive line we had out there was very young."

Coach Combs was also pleased with the performance of his defense. The Tigers held JMU to 331 yards of offense and 23 points.

Even JMU Coach Mickey Matthews was impressed by the Tigers' defensive effort. He said, "Towson did a great job defensively. But we expected that. They came in here second in the CAA in scoring defense. We only had two touchdown drives the entire game."

In his final game, linebacker Brian Bradford made a game high 15 tackles. The CAA leader, he finished the season with 149 tackles in 11 games.

The inaugural season of CAA Football kicked off in 2007 with plans to take the nation's premier conference in the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS, formerly I-AA) to even greater heights and the mission was accomplished.

The CAA boasted as many as seven teams ranked among the national Top-25 during the season, logged 15 national player of the week honorees and culminated the regular season success by advancing a record five squads to the NCAA Playoffs field of 16.

The success did not stop on Selection Sunday. CAA Football came within four points of all five squads advancing to the quarterfinal round of the NCAA Championships. Both Delaware and Richmond moved on to the final four marking the eighth time in 11 years a CAA Football squad has competed in the semifinals.

Delaware logged a win in the semifinals to earn the league its fourth National Final berth in five seasons while Richmond fell to the eventual national champions.

Following the season, the league notched a total of 67 All-America honors. James Madison safety Tony LeZotte became the first player in conference history to earn All-America honors in every year of his career, while New Hampshire quarterback Ricky Santos left his name among the NCAA's career Top-3 in touchdown passes, passing yards and total offense.

The quality and depth of CAA Football is unmatched in the FCS. Ten of the league's 12 teams have participated in the NCAA playoffs over the past seven seasons and at least one team has advanced to the national semifinals in eight of the last 11 years.

In 2004, James Madison claimed the national championship with a 31-21 triumph over Montana, becoming the first team to reach the title game by winning three road playoff contests since the field expanded to 16 teams in 1986.

Delaware rolled past Colgate 40-0 to capture the national championship in 2003, becoming the first team to ever post a shutout

in the title game. No other conference has had two different teams win national titles in back-to-back years. Massachusetts earned a national championship in 1998, beating perennial power Georgia Southern, 55-43.

Along with the team accomplishments, the conference has accumulated numerous individual accolades. Santos (2006), William & Mary quarterback Lang Campbell (2004), Villanova running back Brian Westbrook (2001), Villanova wide receiver Brian Finneran (1997), New Hampshire running back Jerry Azumah (1998) and Towson running back Dave Meggett (1988) all have won the prestigious Walter Payton Award under the league banner. James Madison linebacker Derrick Lloyd received the Buck Buchanan Award in 2001. New Hampshire's Sean McDonnell (2005), James Madison's Mickey Matthews (1999), Villanova's Andy Talley (1997) and Boston University's Dan Allen (1993) have earned the Eddie Robinson Award as the top coach in the FCS.

The CAA Football geographic footprint encompasses much of the East Coast with schools located from Maine to Virginia. Members include Delaware, Hofstra, James

Madison, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Northeastern, Rhode Island, Richmond, Towson, Villanova and William & Mary. While CAA Football officially began March 1, 2007, its roots date back more than 60 years.

On December 3, 1946, the Code of the Yankee Conference went into effect. Established as an all-sports conference for the New England land grant colleges, the six charter members included Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Vermont. Upon the formation of Division I-AA football in 1978, the league disbanded all sports except football. Delaware and Richmond were admitted to the conference in 1986, Villanova was added in 1988 and James Madison, Northeastern and William & Mary joined the league in 1993.

The Atlantic 10 assumed operation control of the conference from 1997-2006, with Hofstra becoming part of the league in 2001 and Towson joining the group in 2004.

Since 1978, CAA Football members have accumulated 69 playoff berths, 18 Lambert Cups, 82 final top 25 rankings and 40 final top 10 rankings.

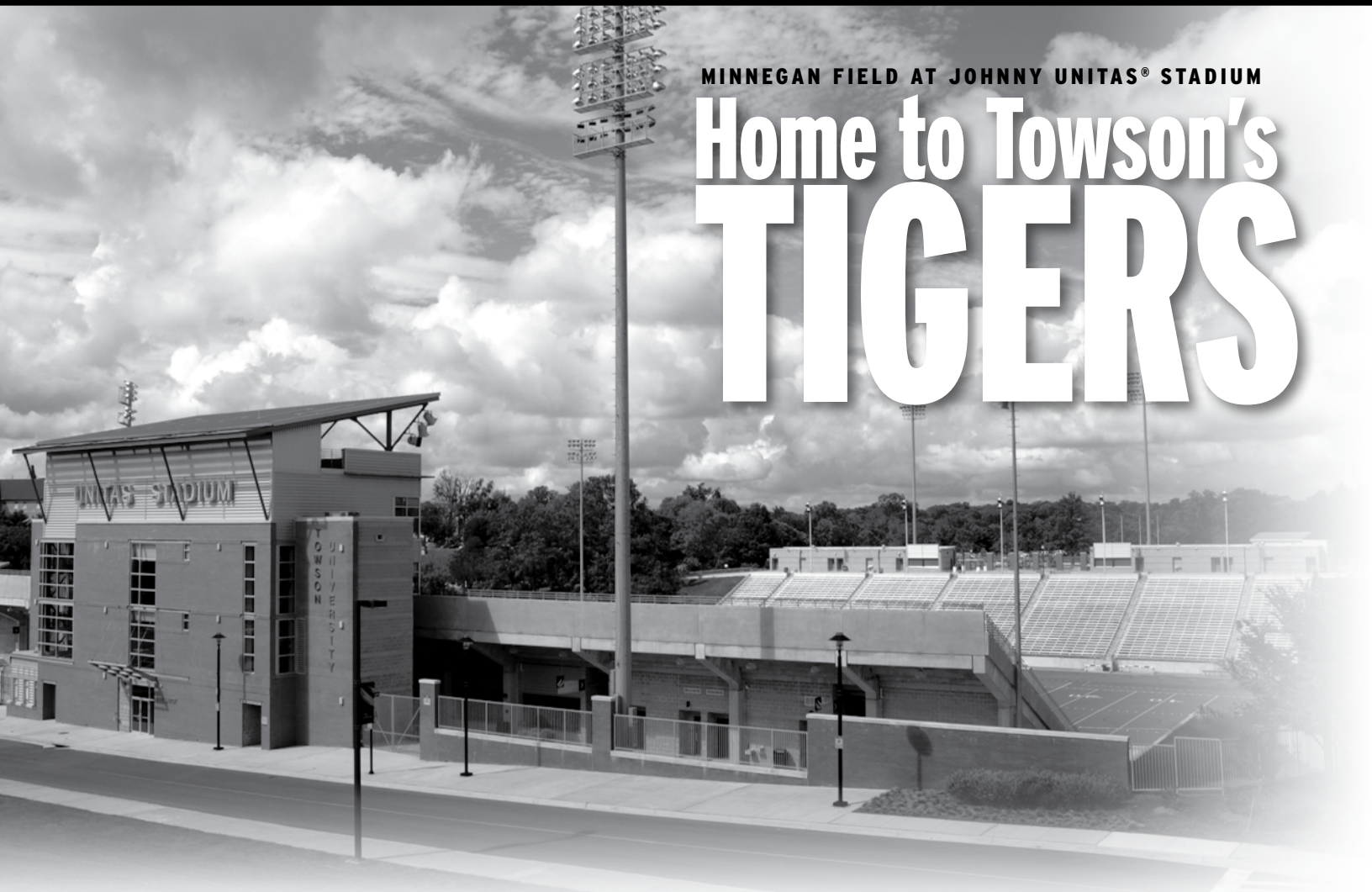

Home to Towson's TIGERS

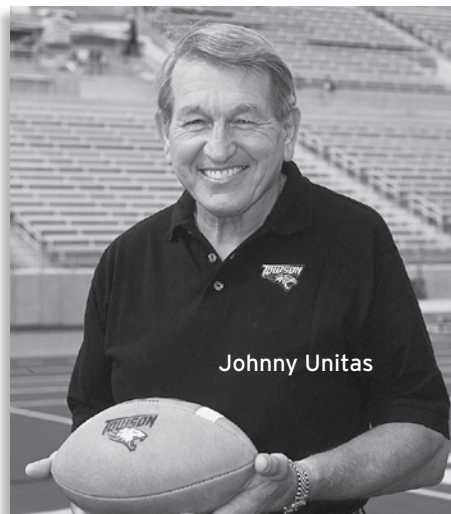


Minnegan Field at Johnny Unitas® Stadium is home to Towson's football, men's lacrosse and women's lacrosse programs.

The sports complex, which underwent a \$32 million renovation over a three-year span, seats 11,198 spectators. It ranks as the third largest outdoor venue in the metropolitan area after M&T Bank Stadium where the NFL Ravens play, and Oriole Park at Camden Yards, home to Baltimore's Major League Baseball franchise.

Stadium renovations included an addition of 6,000 seats, an artificial turf, entry level plaza, concession stands, new restrooms, ticket booths, a four-tier press box, an elaborate field house and a promenade that conveniently connects the northside and southside seating areas. Prior to last season, the stadium's Astroturf surface was replaced with FieldTurf.

The four-story, 48,000 square-foot field house provides Towson's student-athletes with an excellent collegiate facility. It includes

spacious, modern lockerooms for each of its sports, an impressive athletic training facility, classrooms, conference rooms, an upscale equipment room, an academic resource center, a video-editing room and coaches offices. Designed to maximize exterior scenic looks, the field house includes windows that provide a stunning view of the adjacent playing area. A rooftop patio treats guests to a bird's-eye view of the athletic contests. The stadium is lighted for night play.

The Minnegan Room can accommodate up to 200 guests at social functions ranging from pre-game and post-game parties and sports banquets to fund-raising events.

A four-level press box rises high above the stadium on its south side. A separate VIP level is just below the main media floor, which can accommodate 35 working members of the press, two radio stations and coaches booths. Each booth can comfortably seat six persons. Two additional booths for either radio or television are located on the VIP level along with the stadium's operations booth. The top floor, or camera deck, is the primary location for television broadcasts and game filming.

The complex is named in honor of two legends - one a coach and educator who served Towson University for over 40 years, and the other a former professional football player who is widely considered as the greatest NFL quarterback of all time.

Donald "Doc" Minnegan was a teacher, coach, physical education department chairman and Director of Athletics at Towson for more than four decades. He arrived at

Towson in 1927. He coached its soccer team until 1966.

Doc's soccer teams were highly successful, winning a total of 156 games, and 66 of 77 between 1930 and 1936, including a school record 34 straight. His coaching led to Towson championships in baseball, basketball, track and swimming, as well as soccer.

Doc is the only American to publish an article in the British Football Annual on soccer theory. He was inducted into the National Soccer Coaches Association of America's Hall of Fame in 1992.

During his tenure as Director of Athletics, Doc established football as an intercollegiate sport at Towson in 1969. He died in 2002, just two weeks shy of his 100th birthday.

The stadium carried his name from its opening in 1978 until the renovation. In accordance with that tribute, the field remains Minnegan Field in his memory.

Johnny Unitas, too, had a deep connection with the University. The former Baltimore Colts great was the parent of three Towson students.

Several weeks prior to his untimely passing, Johnny began serving as community liaison for Tiger Athletics. His role was to assist the university in obtaining a naming rights partner for the University's new stadium. The legendary Golden Arm died suddenly, less than a week after tossing his last pass to commemorate the opening of Towson's new stadium at ceremonies on September 5, 2002.

High spirits returned when Sandy Unitas chose to assume her husband's role with Towson. With Johnny's two youngest children as Towson students, Sandy sought to memorialize her husband's legacy on campus

by having the stadium named Johnny Unitas® Stadium.

Unitas Stadium served as the host for the 2008 NCAA Division I Women's Lacrosse Championship, drawing a record crowd of 6,125 to the national championship game.

The NCAA Championship will return to Towson in May for the second year in a row.

Packing Them In

During the 2007 season, the Tigers attracted three of the largest crowds in Unitas Stadium history, including a record crowd of 10,856 on Sept. 22. In five home games, the Tigers drew 35,693 fans, shattering Stadium attendance records. Towson averaged 7,139 fans per home game, by far the highest per-game average ever.

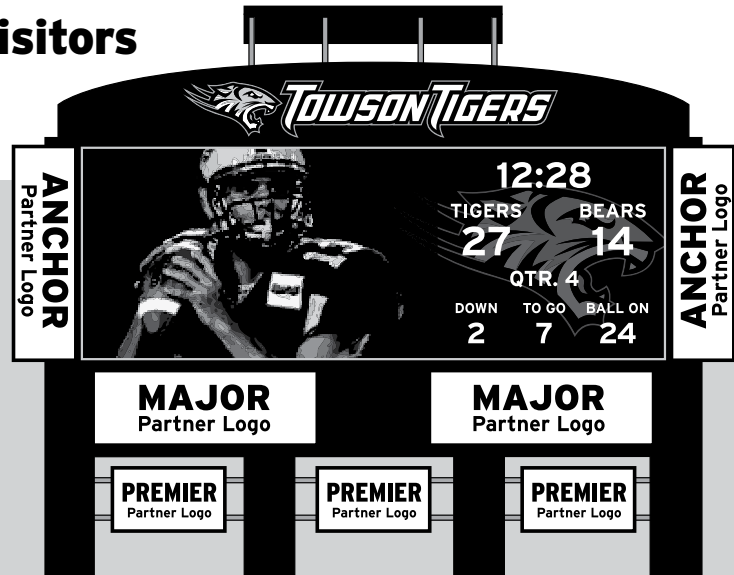

Unitas Stadium To Feature High-Definition Video Display

The best mid-sized sports venue in the Mid-Atlantic region has gotten a lot better. For the 2008 season, Towson University will be the first NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) school to feature a high-definition light emitting diode (LED) video and scoring system.

The state-of-the-art, Daktronics HD video board system was installed in the west end zone of Johnny Unitas® Stadium, the Tigers' 11,198-seat jewel. Administrators at the University and industry experts see the video board as the final piece to making Unitas Stadium the premier place to see a game in the region.

"There's no question that Johnny Unitas® Stadium is the best stadium of its size (under 30,000 seats) in the Mid-Atlantic region," says Bob Leffler, president of the Leffler Agency, a nationally recognized advertising agency located in Baltimore. "From the fan amenities, wide concourses, spacious press box, Fieldturf playing surface, parking availability and accessibility for the community - it's the best. This video board will only enhance an already great experience for fans. It's going to blow people away."

The project consisted of installing two new scoreboards on each end of the stadium and building a production control room in the press box to house the equipment and personnel needed to produce the in-game show. Additionally, locker room clocks and delay of game clocks were installed.

The cornerstone of the project is a nearly 45-foot by 60-foot structure on the west end of the Stadium that consists of an HD LED video display scoreboard, backlit sponsor displays and backlit identification display. On the east side of the stadium is a new 20-foot by 40-foot structure which houses an auxiliary scoreboard that notifies players and fans of the score, time and period.

The main board on the west end will feature a massive 17-feet by 47-feet LED display that utilizes the cutting-edge Daktronics HD-16 technology.

According to Daktronics' Rob Zeller, "Unitas Stadium is the only college facility on the east coast with this kind of technology. The clarity and resolution are incredible. The closest sports facility with comparable video technology would be the NFL's Pittsburgh Steelers. Daktronics is very excited about having the opportunity to work with Towson University to have a showcase video display in the Mid-Atlantic region to show to future east coast customers."

"What better way to highlight the tradition and excitement of Towson football and lacrosse than with this state-of-the-art video system," says Mike Hermann, Towson's Director of Athletics. "When viewing Daktronics' other HD products around the country, there was no question it was the brightest and best-looking product to showcase our student-athletes, corporate partners and university. Our fans will be impressed."

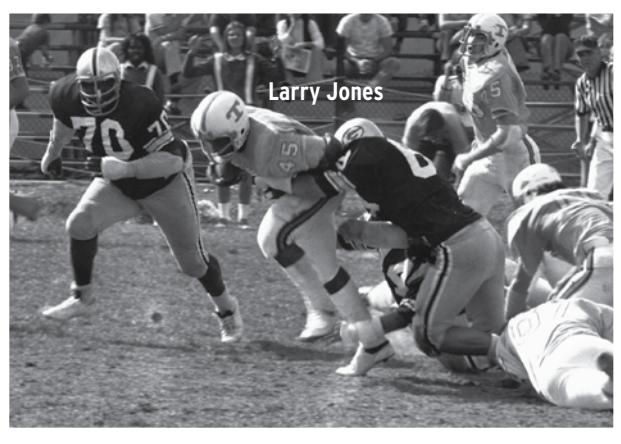

HISTORY

Through the Years



Towson University is celebrating its 40th season with a history that spans 39 seasons, only three head coaches and three different levels of NCAA football. In the 40th season of varsity football, the Tigers are in their second season in the CAA Football Conference.

Over their first 39 seasons, the Tigers have compiled a 217-186-4 record. There have been 20 winning seasons in 39 years. Towson competed at the Division III level from 1969 to 1978. The Tigers played in Division II from 1979 to 1987. They are in their 22nd season at the NCAA Division I-AA level.

They have competed in post-season play-offs at both the Division III and Division II levels. If they qualify for the I-AA playoffs, the Tigers will become the first school ever to participate in the NCAA football tournaments at all three levels.

Most amazingly, there have only been three head coaches at Towson University. Carl Runk coached the Tigers for the first three seasons before Phil Albert took over in 1972. He coached the Tigers for 20 years before Gordy Combs took over in 1992.

DIVISION III YEARS (1969-78)

The Tiger football program made its inter-collegiate debut in 1969 with Carl Runk in charge. That first Tiger team posted a 4-4-1 record, winning four of its final six games. The first win in Tiger history came in the fourth game of the season when quarterback Al Dodds led the team to a 53-16 win over Frostburg State.

In 1970, the Tigers came up with their first winning season with a 6-2 record. After splitting its first four games, Towson won the last four to post a winning record. Playing a tougher schedule in 1971, the Tigers struggled to a 1-8 record, losing their last seven games in a row.

In 1972, the Tigers had a new head coach as Phil Albert, an assistant to Coach Runk,



was named as head coach. His first season as the Tigers' coach was hardly a foreshadowing of his career. The Tigers went 1-9 under their new skipper, beating Johns Hopkins 20-8 for their only win. However, they would not have another losing season for 15 years.

In 1973, the Tigers won four of their first five games but finished the season with a 4-4 record. That set the stage for the 1974 season, a year in which the program turned the corner. The 1974 Tigers went 10-0-0 for the program's only unbeaten season. Towson nearly earned an NCAA playoff berth as sophomore quarterback Dan Dullea threw for 18 touchdowns while linebacker Jim Sandusky led a talented defense that surrendered just 9.7 points per game.

Dullea became Towson's first All-American in 1975, leading the Tigers to a 6-4 record. The four losses came by a total of 26 points.

In 1976, the Tigers made their first NCAA post-season appearance and they made it an appearance to remember. After splitting their first four games, the Tigers finished the regular season with an 8-2 record, earning a Division III playoff berth. In the quarter-finals, they stunned a strong C.W. Post team 14-10 on Long Island. In the semi-finals, Dullea threw four touchdown passes in a 38-36 win over St. Lawrence, earning a berth in the Stagg Bowl, the Division III championship game.

In the Stagg Bowl, televised by ABC-TV, Towson trailed St. John's of Minnesota 28-0 in the fourth quarter. Dullea triggered a rally to tie it at 28-28 with a minute left. But, the Johnnies won the title on a 19 yard field goal with three seconds, 31-28. Tight end Skip Chase became Towson's second All-American while Dullea finished his stellar career with 6,006 yards passing and 49 TD's.

The 1977 Tigers jumped off to a 3-0 start and an early season national ranking. However, a late season slump dropped the final record to 5-4-1 despite the efforts of sophomore defensive back Randy Bielski, the first Tiger defensive player named All-American.

In 1978, Towson played its final season at the Division III level and its first season in Minnegan Stadium. The Tigers christened the lighted 5,000-seat facility with a 38-6 win over Mansfield before a crowd of 4,126 fans. The Tigers contended for another NCAA playoff berth but a late-season loss to Ithaca dropped them out of contention. Towson went 7-3 in its last Division III season, ending the era with a 54-41-2 record.

DIVISION II YEARS (1979-86)

In 1979, the Tigers opened their Division II era by initiating a rivalry with nearby Morgan State. An overflow crowd of 6,311 turned out for the game, a 34-7 win by Morgan. A week later, the Tigers pulled off a major upset when they beat the University of Maine in Orono, 13-7. That victory started a nine-game winning streak which put the Tigers into playoff contention in their first Division II season. Bielski earned All-American honors for the second time and became the first Tiger player drafted when the Baltimore Colts picked him in the 12th round of the NFL draft.

The 1980 Tigers bounced back from an 0-2 start to finish with a 5-5 record. Senior quarterback Ron Meehan and sophomore linebacker Jeff Boller earned All-American notice. Meehan, a three-time pick as ECAC Offensive Player of the Week, broke Dullea's career passing record by throwing for 6,164 yards. Sophomore Sean Landeta also had a big season, leading Division II in punting (43.4 average) and field goals (14).

The 1981 Tigers may have been the most injury-riddled team in school history. Quarterbacks Bret Rogers and Joe Anderson were both sidelined with season-ending injuries. But the Tigers managed a 5-5 record, winning four mid-season games in a row.

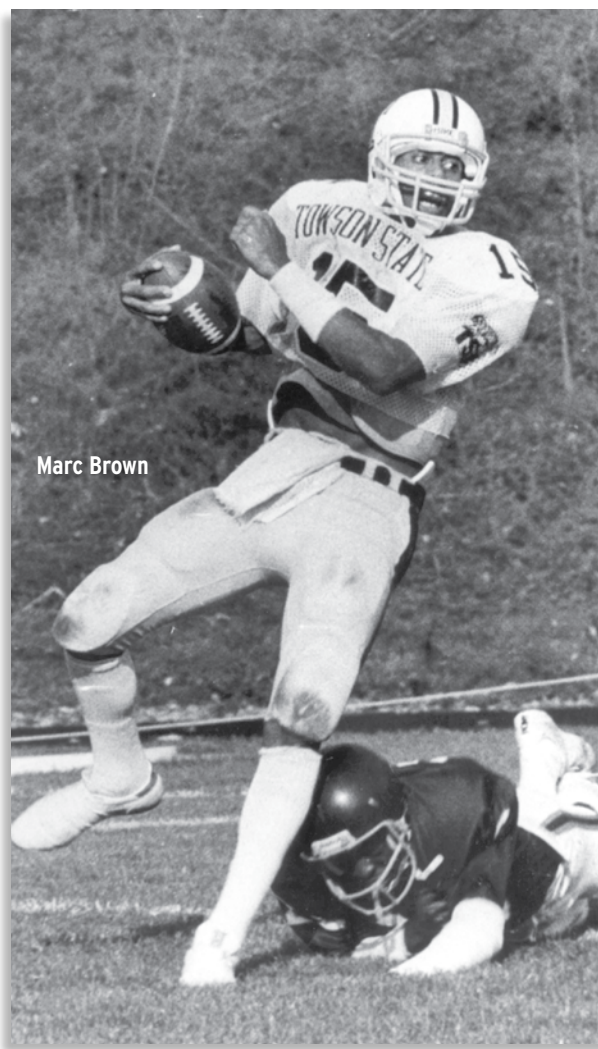
In 1982, the Tigers established themselves as a Division II power in the East. With Anderson running a high-powered passing game, the Tigers went 7-4 against the toughest schedule in school history. In successive weeks, the Tigers beat Bucknell, Maine and Morgan State. In the win at Bucknell, Anderson threw for a school record 408 yards and hit Eric Crocker with the game-winning touchdown in the final minutes. Landeta provided the margin of victory in the come-from-behind win over Maine, kicking the winning field goal with one second remaining. Wide receiver Marc Brown, Boller and Landeta were all named to various All-American teams.

Many Tiger football fans consider the 1983 team to be the best in school history. Led by a defense that allowed a Division II-leading 5.8 points per game, the Tigers went 10-1 in the regular season to earn a Division II playoff berth. Highlighting the regular season was a 13-4 win at the University of Delaware, a victory that avenged a 51-7 loss the year before.

The Tigers' first appearance in the Division II playoffs was short-lived as North Dakota State edged them 24-17 on its way to the national title. Senior Gary Rubeling, the national leader with 13 interceptions, was a first team All-American while guard Terrance Brooks, tight end Hernando Mejia, linebacker Bubby Hammond and quarterback Bret Rogers were honorable mention picks. The Tigers, who finished with a 10-2 record, were honored as the ECAC Division II Team of the Year while winning the Lambert/Meadowlands Award as the top Division II team in the East. Coach Albert was also named as Kodak Region 3 "Coach of the Year."

In 1984, the Tigers made it two straight NCAA appearances, and back-to-back Lambert Meadowlands Awards and ECAC Team of the Year trophies.

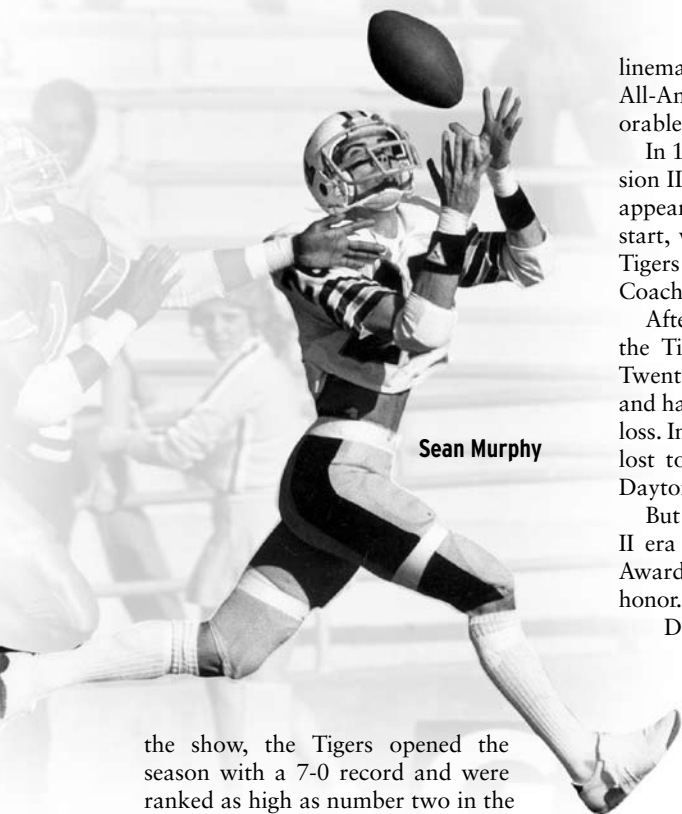

the show, the Tigers opened the season with a 7-0 record and were ranked as high as number two in the nation. Towson finished the season with an 8-3 record, losing three games to Division I-AA opponents. But their record was good enough for another playoff berth.

In their second Division II playoff game, the Tigers rolled up nearly 300 yards on the ground in ripping Norfolk State, 31-21. However, for the second straight year, the Tigers lost to the eventual national champion as Troy State ended the Tigers' season in the semi-finals. Brooks was named as a first team All-American while Sean Murphy earned honorable mention notice.

The 1985 campaign opened with the 100th victory in school history, a season-opening 28-10 win over Shepherd. The Tigers ran their regular season winning streak against Division II teams to 20 in a row before Indiana of Pa. rallied for a 21-21 tie. Beathard led the Tigers to back-to-back one-sided wins over Delaware State and Lafayette. At Lafayette, Beathard completed 40 of 51 passes for a school record 466 yards and four TD's without an interception in a 27-24 win at Lafayette, lifting the Tigers' mark to 7-0-1. But back-to-back losses at New Haven and James Madison ended the Tigers' season short of the playoffs with a 7-2-1 record.

The Tigers finished the year as the tenth-ranked team in Division II as offensive

lineman Stan Eisenhooth was a first team All-American and Beathard was named honorable mention.

In 1986, the Tigers played their final Division II season and earned their third playoff appearance. Towson got off to another fast start, winning its first six games. When the Tigers beat Liberty by 12-10, they presented Coach Albert with his 100th career victory.

After losses to Delaware State and Lehigh, the Tigers bear a pair of Division II Top Twenty teams, routing New Haven by 47-7 and handing Indiana of Pa. a rare home field loss. In their final Division II game, the Tigers lost to unbeaten Central State of Ohio in Dayton, 31-0.

But the Tigers closed out their Division II era with a third Lambert/Meadowlands Award and a third ECAC Team of the Year honor. Linebacker Dave Haden, wide receiver

Dale Chipps and offensive center John Gaburick were named as All-Americans while Chipps was named as the ECAC Player of the Year. Albert also picked up his third Kodak Region 3 Coach of the Year award.

The Tigers closed out their Division II era with a 60-28-2 (.698) record, four Division II top ten finishes, three playoff appearances and three Lambert-Meadowlands trophies. During eight years, 17 different Tigers were named as All-Americans.

DIVISION I-AA (1987-Present)

In their third game as a Division I-AA program, the Tigers made a name for themselves with their first I-AA win, a 17-14 win at Maine when the Black Bears were ranked fourth in the nation. The Tigers also surprised Howard University with a 30-14 victory, the Bison's only loss of the year. Their first I-AA season also showcased the talents of tailback David Meggett. A transfer from Morgan State where he played defensive back, he was switched to tailback, providing the Tigers with explosive speed. Meggett scored a school record 16 touchdowns and led Division I-AA in all-purpose yardage, averaging 199 yards per game.

In 1988, the Tigers showed improvement against a rugged schedule, finishing with a 5-5 record as Meggett continued to make headlines. In the season opener, he scored four touchdowns, including a 100-yard

kickoff return for a touchdown in a 45-34 win over Northeastern. Later in the season, he rushed for a school record 220 yards in a win over New Haven.

He finished his career as the most decorated player in Towson football history, winning the Walter Payton Award and earning a spot on several All-American teams. Meggett also became the first Tiger to play in the Senior Bowl and was named as the Most Valuable Player for the North squad.

In 1989, the Tigers struggled to find their place in Division I-AA. Despite terrific individual performances from All-Americans Rodney Smith and Mike Smith, the Tigers were only 2-8 on the year, their worst record since 1972. In 1990, the Tigers continued to struggle with a 2-9 record.

In 1991, the Tigers finished the season with a 1-10 record, losing ten games for the first time ever. Towson avoided a winless season when the Tigers beat Howard, 13-7, in the next-to-last game of the year. The win was also Coach Albert's final victory as the Towson coach. He resigned after leading Towson to a 117-91-3 record in 20 seasons.

The Tigers opened the 1992 season with a new coach as long-time assistant Gordy Combs inherited Albert's position. In their first season under their new head coach, the Tigers showed resiliency as they posted several come-from-behind wins in a 5-5 season. The Tigers rallied from a 33-14 deficit with eight minutes left for a 35-33 win at Indiana of Pa. and enjoyed a 33-32 comeback win over Northeastern, scoring on the game's final play.

The 1992 season also featured the talents of running back Tony Vinson, who ran for more than 1,000 yards in just eight games.

In 1993, the Tigers became legitimate NCAA I-AA playoff contenders for the first time. With 27 seniors on the roster, the Tigers celebrated their 25th season of football in style. Towson went 8-2 on the season and broke or tied 46 school records. Vinson, who led the Tigers to a 32-30 win at Delaware by scoring his fourth TD of the game with ten seconds left, set 15 Towson records and 11 NCAA records.

In a win over Bucknell, he ran for 364 yards, an NCAA I-AA record. His 2,016 yards on the season were a record as the All-American won the I-AA "Triple Crown," leading the division in rushing, scoring and all-purpose yards. The second Tiger to appear in the Senior Bowl, Vinson was a fifth round



draft pick by the San Diego Chargers.

The 1994 season was virtually a carbon copy of 1993 as Towson went 8-2 and broke 36 more records. It signaled the end of record-breaking careers by quarterback Dan Crowley and wide receiver Mark Orlando. Orlando was a first team All-American and caught a career record 178 passes for a record 3,460 yards and 31 TD's. Crowley finished his career with 8,900 yards passing and 81 TD passes.

The 1994 season also marked the end of scholarship football. In 1995, the Tigers posted a 6-4 record competing in the ECAC-IFC.

In 1996, the biggest news came off the field. It was announced the Tigers would join the Patriot League for the 1997 season, providing the program with an emotional lift. On the field, the Tigers had their fourth straight winning season. The Tigers won the final four games of the season to compile a 6-4 record. Highlighting the season was a 33-32 triple overtime win at Marist, a game in which Kevin Smith threw for a school record 471 yards.

Towson's first year in the Patriot League was a rough one. The Tigers were 2-8 with their only two victories coming against non-

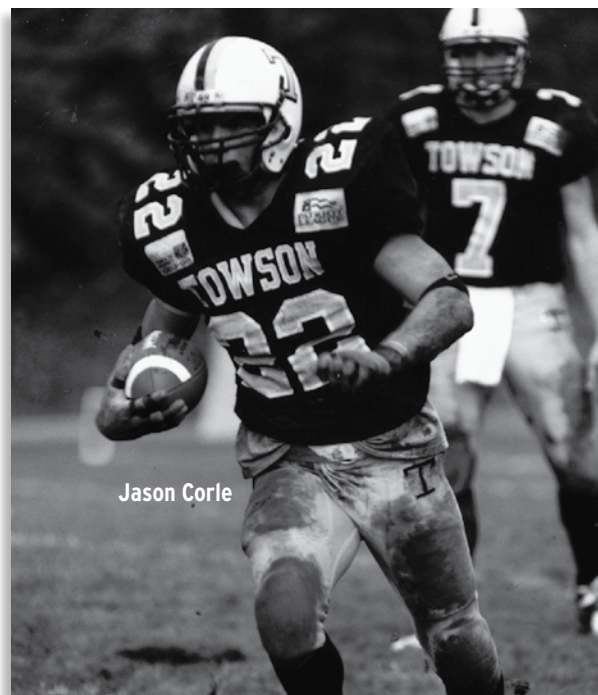
league opponents. Defensive backs Khalid McLeod and Jabari Garrett were both named first team All-Patriot League.

In 1998, Towson's 30th season of college football, the Tigers showed signs of improvement. The Tigers got off to a 2-0 start, beating local rival Morgan State in the opener. They later claimed the first Patriot League win, beating Fordham in overtime. After a midseason slump against the league's heavyweights the Tigers came back to beat St. Mary's and Drake.

Garrett was a first team All-Patriot League selection at defensive back for a second straight year. Jason Corle led the league in rushing, scoring and all-purpose yards.

For the third straight year, the 1999 Tigers were picked to finish dead last in the Patriot League. But, the Tigers surprised everyone by going 7-4 overall and 4-2 in the league. Towson was playing for the Patriot League title right up to its season finale at Colgate. Instead of seventh, Towson finished third.

The emergence of Joe Lee at quarterback propelled Towson. Lee, who had competed just 23 of 40 passes for 285 yards and 2 TD's in his three previous years combined as a backup, opened the season with 467 passing yards as the Tigers beat Monmouth, 34-7. He

would go on to break numerous school and Patriot League passing records with 4,168 yards. He was the only quarterback at any NCAA level to throw for over 4,000 yards in

Great Comebacks... and Close Calls

A handful of games come to mind when thinking about Towson comebacks and disappointing losses. One game in particular could fit both categories.

The top choice among the coaching staff for the greatest comeback is the 35-33 victory at IUP in 1992. After spotting the Big Indians a 20-0 lead early, the Tigers scored three TD's in the final 5:34 of the game to erase a 33-13 deficit. Brian McCarty ran four yards for the game winner with 1:06 left on the clock. It was the Big Indians' first loss at home in 30 games, spanning six years, or since the same Tigers beat them 21-13 in 1986.

The 1976 Stagg Bowl game for the Division III National Championship was a great comeback and, at the same time, a huge disappointment. Down 28-0 to St. John's (Minn.) with just under 13 minutes left in the game, the Tigers rallied with four touchdowns to tie it with one minute to play. St. John's

then kicked a 19-yard field goal as time expired to win, 31-28.

The 1993 Howard game in Minnegan Stadium was just as deflating. The Bison completed a nine-yard pass for a touchdown as the final horn sounded to eke out a 44-41 victory. That loss kept the Tigers out of the NCAA Playoffs and put undefeated Howard into the tournament.

But without question, the most thrilling victory goes to the 1992 win over Northeastern the week after the IUP comeback. It was the most bizarre finish to a college football game since the 1982 kickoff play in the California-Stanford game.

Dan Crowley's untimed touchdown pass to Mark Orlando lifted the Tigers to a win over a stunned Northeastern team that only seconds before had players spill onto the field in wild celebration.

The Huskies appeared to have won

the game on a 32-yard run by quarterback Ralph Barone with just four seconds left to play in the game.

Orlando received the kickoff at the Tigers' 30-yard line and ran to his left (the near sideline) and the Towson bench.

At the 45 yard line he encountered heavy traffic so he lateraled to Dedin Witherspoon, who immediately gave the ball to lineman Jeff Law. Law didn't want it either so he shoveled it back to Julian Blair, the Tigers' regular and all-time leading deep man on kickoff returns, at the Towson 40 yard line. Julian took off across midfield and was surprised on his way to the goal line when he was met by celebrating Huskies thinking the play had died somewhere in front of Towson's bench and that their victory had been preserved.

Much to their chagrin, it had not. While Northeastern players and

coaches alike were beating a hasty retreat and trying to sneak back to their sideline, Julian was tackled at the Huskies' 20 yard line.

Officials then penalized Northeastern 10 yards for illegal participation. The clock had run down to zero, but the defensive penalty gave the Tigers one last untimed play. Crowley hit Orlando, who was single covered, on a timing throw for the 33-32 win. It was an ESPN Play of the Year.

Last year, the Tigers' 23-21 win over Richmond provided another noteworthy finish as Sean Schaefer drove the Tigers 67 yards in 22 seconds for the game-winning touchdown. On the final play of the game, he fired a 14-yard TD pass to Demetrius Harrison, lifting the Tigers to a stunning victory over the Spiders.

1999. Corle finished his career as Towson's all-time rushing, receiving, scoring and all-purpose yardage leader. He became the first Towson player to accept an invitation to play in the Hula Bowl.

Sophomore wide receiver Jamal White set numerous receiving records and was named to several All-American first teams. Lee, White, Garrett, defensive end Andrew Hollingsworth and safety Ricky Crestwell were selected to All-League first teams.

The Tigers posted a second straight 7-4 record in 2000. The running of Noah Read at tailback led Towson. Read led the Patriot League in rushing with 1,422 yards, second most ever in a single season for a Towson back. He rushed for over 100 yards in 10 of the 11 games.

Meanwhile, Hollingsworth had a tremendous season at defensive end. Although sidelined for most of the last three games with an

ankle injury, he led the nation with 18 sacks. He became Towson's first consensus first team All-American and was named Defensive Player of the Year and Player of the Year in the Patriot League.

In 2001, the Tigers struggled offensively due to an unsettled situation at quarterback. On their way to a 3-7 record, the Tigers went scoreless in the first quarter throughout the season until the final game when they racked up 13 points at Georgetown. Sporty Evans was the only first team All-Patriot League selection.

Prior to the start of the 2002 season, it was announced that Towson would be joining the Atlantic-10 Football Conference as the A-10's 12th member. The move would be effective for the 2004 season.

The Tigers were in the process of having a great year in 2002 when the injury bug hit, derailing the offense and turning an impressive 5-2 start into a very disappointing 1-3 finish. By the eighth game, the Tigers had lost 60 per cent of their starting offensive line to season ending injuries. The Tigers lost three of their last four games after getting off to a 5-2 start that included a first-ever win over Lehigh and a big road victory at Holy Cross.

The final game marked the end of Jamal White's record-breaking career. White closed out his career as Towson's all-time leading receiver as well as the Patriot League's all-time leader with 219 receptions. Safety Edmund Carazo led the Patriot League with seven interceptions.

Highlighting the 2003 season was the official dedication of Johnny Unitas® Stadium at Towson University. In October, the Tigers entertained a crowd of more than 8,000 that included many former Baltimore Colts with a 30-13 win over Holy Cross. The Tigers, who were 5-1 at home, finished the season with a 6-6 record. Towson went 3-4 in its final Patriot League season. Senior offensive lineman Jason Gunning was named first team All-PL for the second year in a row while defensive standout P.D. Moore earned first team All-Patriot League for the second time.

The 2004 season marked Towson's entry into the Atlantic 10 Football Conference where the Tigers found it to be tough plowing. P.D. Moore was named to the league's first team as Towson failed to notch a conference win, going 0-8 in A-10 play. Moore was named to the A-10's first team defense.

After taking their lumps the first year, the Tigers were much more competitive in

2005, beating Delaware, Rhode Island and Villanova in the league. Non-league wins over Morgan State, Lock Haven and Liberty gave Towson a winning 6-5 record. Allante Harrison was a first team All-A10 pick at cornerback.

In 2006, the Tigers enjoyed one of their finest seasons at the Division I-AA level. Led by Sean Schaefer, the Tigers had one of the top passing games in the nation and compiled a 7-4 record. Their 4-4 record in conference play included wins over Delaware, Villanova, Richmond and Hofstra.

The Tigers were nationally ranked for six weeks and achieved their highest I-AA ranking ever when they were 17th in the nation in late September.

In April of 2007, offensive lineman Jermon Bushrod became the fourth Towson football player drafted by an NFL team when he was selected by the New Orleans Saints in the fourth round. Bushrod was a three-time all-conference selection in the A-10.

In 2007, the Tigers were ranked in the top 25 in the pre-season and got off to a 2-0 start. However, a rash of injuries took their toll and Towson finished with a 3-8 record.

Senior linebacker Brian Bradford had a stellar season as he finished second in the nation with 149 tackles in 11 games. In addition to earning first team All-CAA notice, he was a consensus first team All-American.

Football Chronology

SEPT. 20, 1969: The Tigers play their first game in program history and fall to Washington & Lee, 14-13.

OCT. 11, 1969: After opening their first season with three straight losses, the Tigers win their first game, a 53-16 victory over Frostburg State.

NOV. 1, 1969: The Tigers play the first tie game in school history as they battle to a 34-34 tie at Ursinus.

NOV. 15, 1969: The Tigers closed out their first season with a 4-4-1 record despite losing to Bridgewater State, 18-16.

SEPT. 19, 1970: Posting the first shutout in school history, the Tigers open their second season of play with a 29-0 victory over Gallaudet.

NOV. 7, 1970: Facing Johns Hopkins University for the first time ever, the Tigers beat the Blue Jays, 33-6.

NOV. 14, 1970: With a 10-0 victory over Shepherd College, the Tigers conclude the first winning season in school history with a 6-2 record.

SEPT. 25, 1971: The Tigers edge Washington & Lee, 10-7, in their home opener. The victory turns out to be Coach Carl Runk's final win as the Tigers' football coach as he resigns at the end of the season. Assistant Coach Phil Albert is promoted to head coach for the 1972 season.

OCT. 28, 1972: After six straight losses to open the season, the Tigers celebrate Homecoming with a 20-8 victory over Johns Hopkins, presenting Coach Phil Albert with his first win as a college head coach.

SEPT. 14, 1974: The Tigers open the season with a 15-12 win at Mansfield State, ending a 14-game road losing streak.

NOV. 16, 1974: Larry Jones sets a school record with 177 yards rushing as the Tigers end the season with a 32-14 win over Federal City. The victory enables the Tigers to complete the first undefeated season in history with a 10-0 record.

SEPT. 13, 1975: The Tigers opened the season with their 11th straight win, a 27-15 victory over Mansfield State.

SEPT. 20, 1975: The Tigers had their 11-game winning streak snapped with a 16-7 loss to Kentucky State.

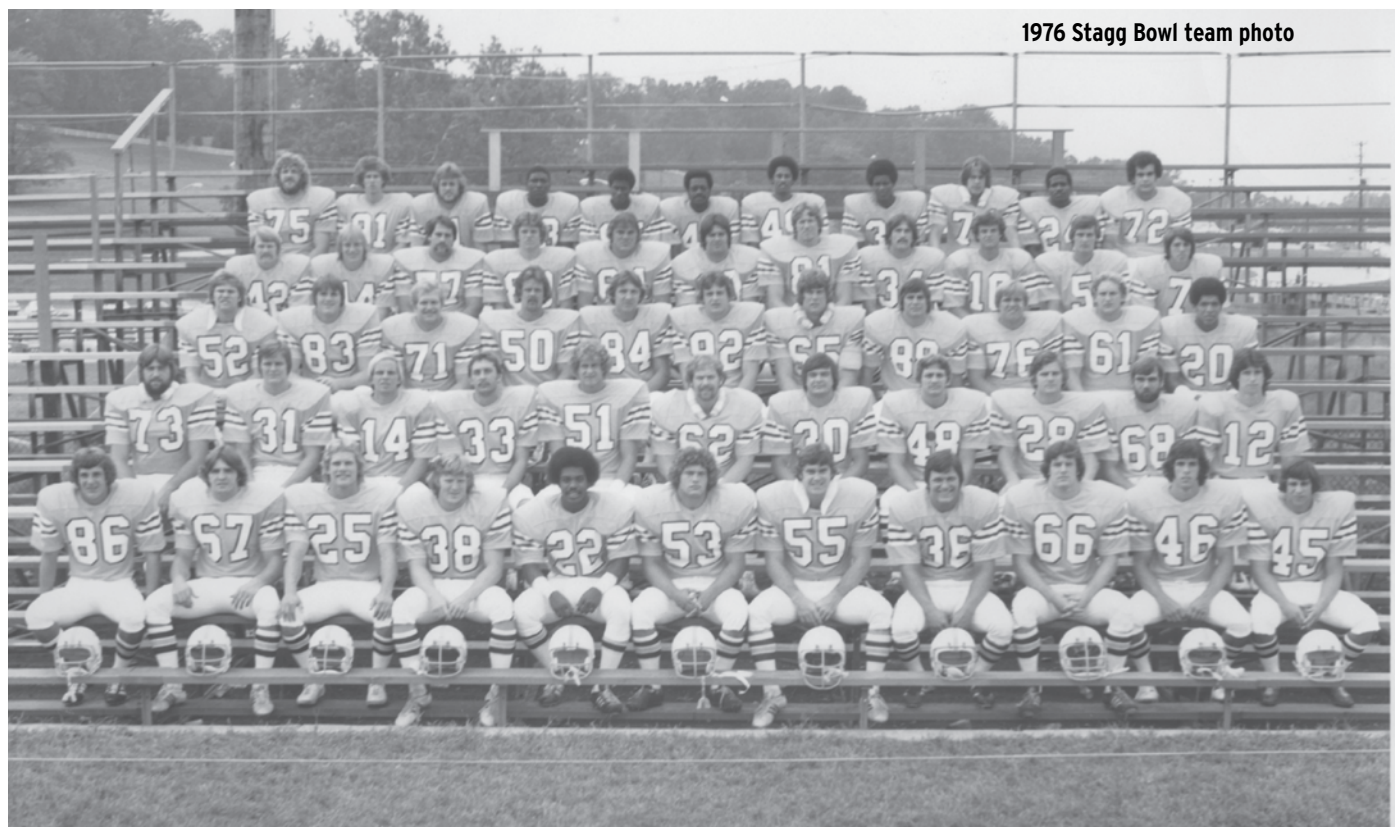
NOV. 15, 1975: With a 14-7 season-ending win over Cheyney State, the Tigers clinched their second straight winning season with a 6-4 record.

OCT. 9, 1976: Senior Mike Mahoney scored the only touchdown of the game as the Tigers shut out Frostburg State, 12-0, starting a season-ending six-game winning streak.

NOV. 6, 1976: With a 26-7 upset win over 9th-ranked Hampden-Sydney, the Tigers earned a national ranking in NCAA Division III for the first time.

NOV. 13, 1976: By rushing for a school record 304 yards, the Tigers ended the regular season with a 32-14 win over Cheyney State, earning an NCAA Division III playoff bid.

NOV. 20, 1976: Making their first appearance in the NCAA Division III playoffs, the Tigers pulled off a stunning 14-10 upset over C.W. Post on the Pioneers' home field. Mike Maloney scored the winning

touchdown on a one-yard run with 4:01 left after a Randy Bielski fumble recovery gave the Tigers possession on the Post 23-yard line. An interception by Paul White with 10 seconds left clinched the win.

NOV. 27, 1976: Dan Dullea threw four touchdown passes as he led the Tigers into the national championship game with a 38-36 win over St. Lawrence. The Tigers jumped out to a 17-0 lead in the first quarter and never trailed.

DEC. 3, 1976: Playing before a national television audience, the Tigers dropped a 31-28 heart-breaker to St. John's of Minnesota in the Stagg Bowl in Phenix City, Ala. Trailing by 28-0 entering the fourth quarter, the Tigers staged an amazing comeback to tie the game at 28-28 in the final minute. However, a 19-yard field goal by Jeff Norman as time expired enabled the Johnnies to win the national title.

SEPT. 24, 1977: Place kicker Randy Bielski booted a game-winning 22-yard field goal with 6 seconds remaining to lift the Tigers to a 3-0 win at Randolph-Macon as they opened the season with a 3-0 record.

SEPT. 9, 1978: Before a crowd of 4,126 on Dedication Night at Towson Stadium, the Tigers rolled up 489 yards of total offense in a 37-6 win over Mansfield.

OCT. 14, 1978: Defensive back Ron Nichols set a school record with three interceptions and returned one for a touchdown to lead the Tigers to a 14-0 win at Frostburg State.

NOV. 4, 1978: Before a record crowd of 4,536 at Towson Stadium, the Tigers posted their third shutout of the year with a 27-0 win over Salisbury. The Tigers held the Sea Gulls to 130 yards of offense and forced five turnovers.

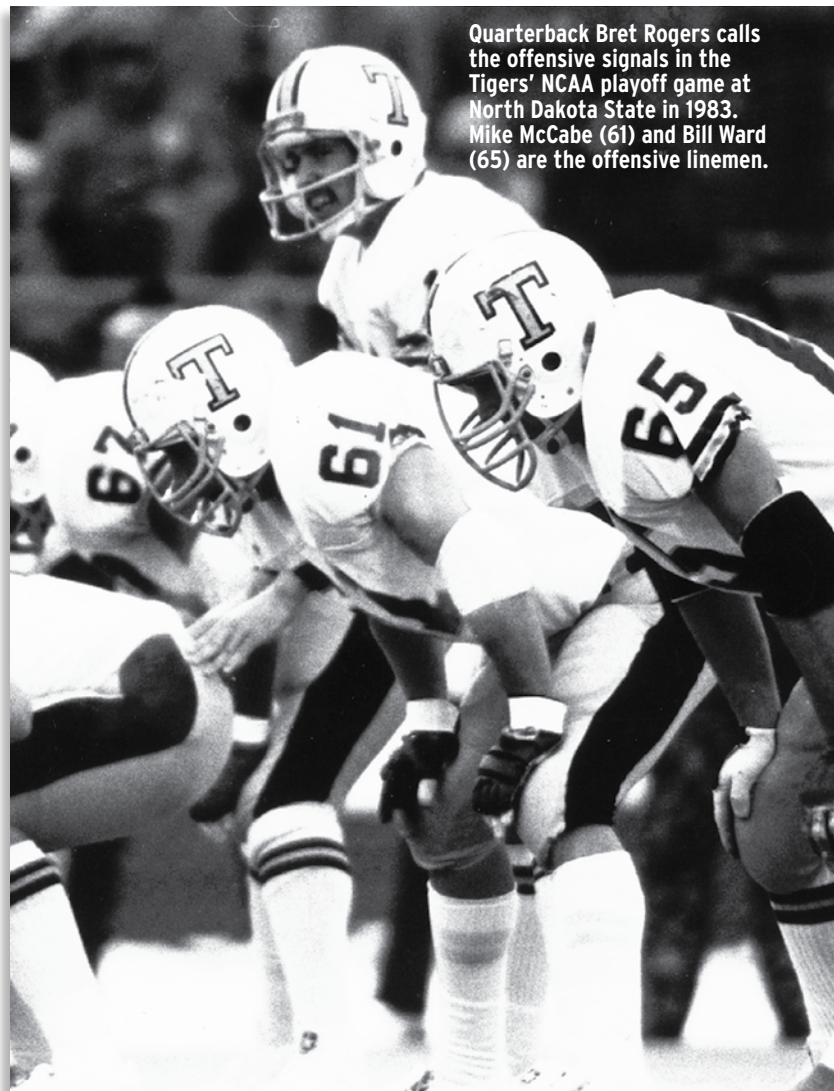
SEPT. 1, 1979: The Tigers' debut as an NCAA Division II program was ruined by crosstown rival Morgan State as the Bears pulled out a 34-7 win in the first meeting between the schools. After the Tigers took a 7-0 lead on a three-yard run by John Henry Clayton, Morgan scored 34 straight points. The game was played before a record crowd of 6,311.

SEPT. 8, 1979: Playing their first game ever against an NCAA Division I-AA opponent, the Tigers travelled north and shocked Maine, 13-7. Freshman Ray Walsh gave the Tigers a 13-7 lead on a five-yard TD run in the fourth quarter before John Haywood's sack with four minutes left sealed the win.

OCT. 27, 1979: The Tigers presented Coach Phil Albert with his 50th career victory when they travelled to Ashland College and edged the Eagles, 21-15.

NOV. 17, 1979: Closing out their first season as a Division II program, the Tigers won their ninth consecutive game, a 27-14 win over Merchant Marine. With the victory, the Tigers finished the season with a 9-1 record and barely missed an NCAA playoff berth in their first year in Division II.

OCT. 4, 1980: Quarterback Ron Meehan completed 28 of 38 passes for 307 yards and two touchdowns as the Tigers overcame an early 15-0 deficit to beat Central Connecticut, 28-22. Meehan was named as the ECAC Division II Offensive Player of the Week for his performance.

NOV. 1, 1980: Place kicker Sean Landeta kicked three field goals, including a school record 57-yarder, as the Tigers shut out Delaware State, 30-0. Landeta's 57-yard field goal was the longest kicked in the state of Maryland at any level.

NOV. 15, 1980: In his final college game, Ron Meehan passed for 367 yards and 4 TD's to lead the Tigers to a 40-20 win over C.W. Post. With the win, the Tigers finished the season with a 5-5-0 record as Meehan was named as the ECAC Division II Offensive Player of the Week for the third time.

SEPT. 12, 1981: Paul Cillo ran for 112 yards and a school record four touchdowns to lead the Tigers to a 42-20 victory at Millersville.

OCT. 24, 1981: Leading the Tigers to a 24-0 win at Merchant Marine Academy, Paul Cillo set a school record by rushing for 187 yards on 29 carries. After a scoreless first half, the Tigers exploded for 24 points to earn the win.

SEPT. 25, 1982: Joe Anderson passed for a school record 408 yards and three touchdowns to lead the Tigers to a 22-18 come-from-behind win at Bucknell. Anderson's 42-yard TD pass to Eric Crocker with 3:54 remaining put the Tigers ahead to stay. Wide receiver Marc Brown caught nine passes for a school record 233 yards in the win.

OCT. 2, 1982: Sean Landeta's third field goal of the game, a 22-yarder with one second remaining, lifted the Tigers to a 35-32 come-from-behind win over Maine. Joe Anderson tied a school record with four touchdown passes.

OCT. 9, 1982: For the third game in a row, the Tigers staged a fourth quarter comeback as they rallied from a 10-3 deficit to edge Morgan State for the first time ever, 17-10. Before a Homecoming crowd of 6,835, the Tigers scored 14 points in the final ten minutes to win. A 10-yard TD run by Paul Cillo with 6:05 remaining put the Tigers ahead to stay.

OCT. 23, 1982: Playing before a crowd of 20,232, the Tigers faced Delaware for the first time and lost to the eventual national runners-up, 51-7. After the Tigers tied the score at 7-7 in the first quarter, Delaware took a 15-7 halftime lead en route to the win.

JAN 4, 1983: All-American punter Sean Landeta is drafted in the 14th round of the first United States Football League (USFL) draft by

the Philadelphia Stars. For Sean, it marked the beginning of a 21-year career in pro football.

SEPT. 10, 1983: Holding New York Tech to 46 yards of total offense and one first down, the Tigers opened the season with a dominating 60-0 win over the Bears. Jeff Beathard led the Tigers by scoring three touchdowns.

SEPT. 24, 1983: Bret Rogers threw four touchdown passes as the Tigers won their third game in a row with a 28-0 victory at Slippery Rock.

OCT. 8, 1983: With another dominating performance by the Tiger defense, the Tigers routed Morgan State, 48-0, for their 12th straight Homecoming win.

OCT. 15, 1983: Greg Rogers intercepted a pass and returned it 21 yards for a touchdown as the Tigers forced nine turnovers en route to a stunning 13-4 win at Delaware. A pair of field goals by Jerome Nolan allowed the Tigers to take a 13-0 into the final minutes before Delaware avoided the shutout by scoring on a pair of safeties.

OCT. 22, 1983: Bret Rogers completed 19 of 22 passes for 292 yards and four touchdowns as the Tigers posted their fourth shutout of the season with a 37-0 win over Mansfield in a game that was televised regionally on CBS-TV. Rogers was named as the CBS Player of the Game.

OCT. 29, 1983: Gary Rubeling intercepted three passes in a game for the second time in two weeks as he led the Tigers to a 23-15 come-from-behind win at Delaware State.

NOV. 19, 1983: Closing out a 10-1 regular season, the Tigers built a 10-0 halftime lead and held on to edge James Madison by 10-3 in the final regular season game for both teams. With the win, the Tigers clinched a berth in the NCAA Division II playoffs for the first time.

NOV. 26, 1983: In their first Division II playoff game, the Tigers lost to eventual national champion North Dakota State in snowy Fargo, North Dakota. After spotting the Bison a 14-0 lead in the first quarter, the Tigers tried to rally from behind but they fell short in the final minutes. A 94-yard drive for a TD with 1:10 left pulled the Tigers to within 24-17 but the Bison recovered the ensuing onside kick.

SEPT. 15, 1984: Kurt Beathard threw for 314 yards and four touchdowns as the Tigers scored 35 points in the second quarter in a 52-27 victory over California of Pa. The Vulcans went on to win the Pennsylvania Conference championship.

OCT. 13, 1984: For the 13th year in a row, the Tigers won their Homecoming Game as they shut out District of Columbia, 31-0. The victory enabled the Tigers to open the season with seven wins in a row.

NOV. 10, 1984: All but clinching their second straight NCAA Division II playoff berth, the Tigers improved their record to 8-2 with a 38-7 victory over Morgan State.

NOV. 24, 1984: Facing Norfolk State in the quarter-finals of the NCAA Division II playoffs, the Tigers rushed for 295 yards en route to a 31-21 win over the Spartans at Foreman Field. Less than two minutes into the game, linebacker Joe Gamble blocked a punt and scored a touchdown to put the Tigers ahead to stay. Dan Ricker led the Tigers by rushing for 128 yards with one touchdown.

DEC. 1, 1984: For the second year in a row, the Tigers were eliminated from the Division II playoffs by the eventual national champions as Troy State handed Towson a 45-3 loss in Alabama.

SEPT. 7, 1985: Quarterback Kurt Beathard passed for 263 and a pair of touchdowns to lead the Tigers to a 28-10 victory over Shepherd in their season opener. The victory was the 100th win in the history of Towson football.

SEPT. 29, 1985: In a rare Sunday game necessitated by Hurricane Gloria, the Tigers staged a remarkable last-second rally to edge American International, 27-23. Kurt Beathard's 15-yard touchdown pass to Sean Murphy with six seconds left capped a 70-yard game-winning drive in the final minute. Earlier in the fourth quarter, Mike Barth returned a kickoff 96 yards for a Tiger touchdown, marking the first time a Tiger player had returned a kickoff for a TD.

OCT. 26, 1985: Led by quarterback Kurt Beathard, who passed for 267 yards and four touchdowns, the Tigers upped their record to 6-0-1 with a stunning 51-26 victory over Delaware State, a team that entered the game as the 8th-ranked team in NCAA Division I-AA.

NOV. 2, 1985: For the second week in a row, Kurt Beathard threw four touchdown passes as the Tigers came from behind to edge Lafayette College, 27-24. The Tigers trailed by 17-7 in the third quarter before Beathard went to work. He set an NCAA Division II record

by completing 40 of 51 passes without an interception. He set a school record by passing for 466 yards as the Tigers upped their record to 7-0-1.

SEPT. 13, 1986: Quarterback Theron Richards passed for 418 yards and four touchdowns as the Tiger defense forced six turnovers, leading Towson to a 35-14 win over Rhode Island in Kingston, R.I. Joe Lizana caught two TD passes in the win.

OCT. 4, 1986: Tailback Dan Ricker rushed for 112 yards on 25 carries and caught five passes for 128 yards while scoring two touchdowns to lead the Tigers to fourth consecutive win, a 28-7 victory over Bucknell University.

OCT. 11, 1986: Jim Lidowski's interception in the end zone in the fourth quarter lifted the Tigers to a 12-10 win over Liberty as Coach Phil Albert earned his 100th career victory.

NOV. 15, 1986: With a 21-13 win at Indiana of Pa., the Tigers clinched a berth in the NCAA Division II playoffs for the third time in four years. Quarterback Jay McMichael led the Tigers to the win by passing for 237 yards and two touchdowns.

NOV. 28, 1986: In their final game as a Division II program, the Tigers lost to Central State of Ohio by a 31-0 margin in Dayton, Ohio.

SEPT. 12, 1987: Despite a 320-yard passing performance from quarterback Chris Goetz, the Tigers lost to Northeastern in their first game as an NCAA Division I-AA program in Boston. The Huskies overcame a 22-17 third quarter deficit to pull out a 39-22 victory.

OCT. 3, 1987: David Meggett ran for 128 yards and scored two touchdowns to lead the Tigers to their first win as an NCAA Division I-AA program, a 17-14 win over third-ranked Maine in Orono. Maine came into the game with a 4-0 record and went on to win the Yankee Conference title.

NOV. 21, 1987: Despite a 19-16 win over Rhode Island in the season finale, the Tigers finished their first season as an NCAA Division I-AA program with a 4-6 record. Towson's 4-6 mark was its first losing season since 1972.

SEPT. 12, 1988: In the Tigers' season opener, David Meggett returned a kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown and scored three other TD's, leading Towson to a 45-34 victory over Northeastern.

OCT. 8, 1988: David Meggett returned the opening kickoff of the second half 84 yards for a touchdown, leading the Tigers to a 31-28 come-from-behind win at Howard University. After trailing by 21-3 in the second quarter, the Tigers pulled out the victory when Chris Goetz threw a 14-yard TD pass to Mike Smith with 34 seconds remaining in the game.

OCT. 29, 1988: Before a Homecoming crowd of more than 5,000, the Tigers beat James Madison, 34-6. Rodney Smith led a terrific defensive effort by the Tigers with four quarterback sacks.

NOV. 5, 1988: David Meggett set a school record by rushing for 221 yards on 32 carries to lead the Tigers to a 31-17 win over New Haven.

DEC. 17, 1988: The Tigers' All-American tailback and kick returner, David Meggett, is named as the winner of the Walter Payton Award, given to the top player in Division I-AA. He receives his award in a

ceremony at The Sporting Club in New York City.

APRIL 23, 1989: In the fifth round of the National Football League draft, Dave Meggett is drafted by the New York Giants.

NOV. 11, 1989: Leading the Tigers to a 35-17 victory over 13th-ranked Delaware State, quarterback Chris Goetz passed for 299 yards and four touchdowns.

OCT. 27, 1990: Tailback Robbie Jackson rushed for 98 yards on eight carries as the Tigers jumped out to a 17-0 first quarter lead en route to a 17-7 win over Howard that ended a seven-game losing streak.

NOV. 9, 1991: Quarterback Dan Crowley threw a 38-yard touchdown pass to Brian McCarty on a fourth down play with 8:02 remaining as the Tigers edged Howard, 13-7. The victory was the 117th career win for Coach Phil Albert - and it was the final win of his career.

FEB. 24, 1992: After 20 seasons as the Tigers' head coach, Phil Albert resigned as the Towson coach. A four-time regional Coach of the Year, he had a record of 117-91-3 while coaching the Tigers at three different levels of NCAA football. He led Towson to 11 winning seasons and four NCAA post-season berths.

FEB. 25, 1992: Less than 24 hours after Phil Albert resigned, long-time Tiger assistant coach Gordy Combs was introduced as the Tigers' new coach. In making the announcement, Athletic Director Bill Hunter said, "Phil Albert and I agreed that the person most qualified to continue the tradition of Towson football is Gordy Combs." Gordy had spent 19 seasons as one of Coach Albert's assistant coaches.

SEPT. 12, 1992: The debut of Gordy Combs as the Tigers' head coach was ruined by Rhode Island as the Rams beat the Tigers in the season opener, 36-19.

SEPT. 19, 1992: Thanks to a 140-yard rushing performance by Tony Vinson, the Tigers presented Gordy Combs with his first victory as the Towson head coach with a 24-21 come-from-behind win over Bucknell. Vinson scored the game-winning touchdown on a 25-yard run with 7:27 left in the game.

OCT. 24, 1992: Tony Vinson set a school record by rushing for 264 yards on 41 carries to lead the Tigers to a 28-21 Homecoming victory over James Madison. Vinson scored two touchdowns in the game, including the game-winner with 13:33 remaining.

OCT. 31, 1992: Trailing by 33-13 to Indiana of Pa. with less than six minutes remaining, the Tigers staged an improbable comeback as they scored three touchdowns and recovered two onside kicks in the final 5:34 of the game. A four-yard TD run by Brian McCarty with 1:06 left gave the Tigers a lead and a 35-33 win. The victory ended IUP's 29-game home winning streak.

NOV. 14, 1992: For the second game in a row, the Tigers had a wild finish as they edged Northeastern, 33-32. The Huskies had taken a 32-27 lead on a TD run by Henry Rogan with four seconds left. On the ensuing kickoff, the Tigers used several laterals before Julian Blair was tackled at the Northeastern 20-yard line. However, several Northeastern players had charged the field prematurely, giving the Tigers one untimed play from the ten-yard line. When Dan Crowley tossed a 10-yard TD pass to Mark Orlando, the Tigers pulled out the memorable win. The wild finish was honored by ESPN as its Wildest Finish of the 1992 season.

OCT. 2, 1993: All-American Tony Vinson rushed for 196 yards and scored four touchdowns as the Tigers edged the University of Connecticut on the road, 28-27. Vinson's fourth TD of the game, a one-yard run with 2:34 left, gave the Tigers a 28-21 lead. However, UConn scored with three seconds remaining and elected to go for the two-point conversion. When it failed, the Tigers had a 28-27 win.

NOV. 6, 1993: A one-yard plunge by Tony Vinson on fourth down with ten seconds remaining enabled the Tigers to come from behind and upset 14th-ranked Delaware, 32-30. After the Blue Hens took a 30-26 lead with 2:22 remaining, the Tigers marched 60 yards in 11



plays for the win. Vinson's TD was his fourth of the game, tying a Delaware Stadium record.

NOV. 13, 1993: In his final home appearance, Tony Vinson set the NCAA Division I-AA rushing record with 364 yards and scored four touchdowns to lead the Tigers to an impressive 49-21 win over Bucknell. With the Tigers leading by 42-21 in the fourth quarter, Vinson had rushed for 284 yards. On his final carry of the game, he sprinted 80 yards for a TD and the NCAA record.

NOV. 20, 1993: In his final college game, All-American Tony Vinson ran for 327 yards and scored a school record five touchdowns to lead the Tigers to a 56-12 win at Morgan State. With 691 yards in two games, Vinson set another school record as he finished the season with an NCAA record 2,016 yards. With the win, the Tigers finished the season with an 8-2 record and barely missed an NCAA post-season appearance.

OCT. 29, 1994: Dan Crowley threw two long touchdown passes and Marco Calise blocked an important conversion attempt as the Tigers pulled off a 24-21 win over previously undefeated Hofstra, the 20th-ranked team in the nation. Crowley's 80-yard TD pass to Shawn Ward in the third quarter gave the Tigers a 24-7 lead.

NOV. 19, 1994: Senior Brian McCarty rushed for 237 yards and scored three touchdowns to lead the Tigers to a 42-7 win over Morgan State in their seasonal finale. The three-TD rushing performance enabled McCarty to finish his career as Towson's all-time scoring leader. Towson finished the season with an 8-2 record for the second year in a row.

SEPT. 13, 1995: Patriot League Commissioner Connie Hurlburt announces that Towson will join the Patriot League as an associate member for the 1997 season. Towson will join Bucknell, Colgate, Fordham, Holy Cross, Lafayette and Lehigh as members of the Patriot League.

SEPT. 30, 1995: Led by Larry Washington, who rushed for 292 yards and scored two touchdowns, the Tigers beat Monmouth, 31-15.

NOV. 11, 1995: Closing out their third straight winning season, the Tigers ripped Southern Connecticut in their season finale to cap off a 6-4 campaign. Larry Washington showed the way by rushing for 205 yards on 25 carries with three touchdowns.

OCT. 5, 1996: After retiring David Meggett's number 1 jersey in pre-game ceremonies, the Tigers snapped a three-game losing streak with a 49-28 win over Central Connecticut. Quarterback Kevin Smith led the Tigers by passing for 307 yards and three touchdowns.

OCT. 26, 1996: While setting a school record with 670 yards of total offense, the Tigers routed St. Francis of Pa., 54-14. Jason Corle led the Tigers with 150 yards on 11 carries. The Tigers retired Sean Landeta's number 5 jersey at halftime.

NOV. 2, 1996: Kevin Smith threw a 25-yard touchdown pass to Maurice Sydnor in the third overtime period as the Tigers won the longest game in school history, edging Marist in three overtimes, 33-32. Smith passed for a school record 471 yards in the win.

SEPT. 13, 1997: Playing their first Patriot League game ever, the Tigers rolled to a 27-7 victory over Holy Cross. Towson built a 27-0 lead after three quarters as Jason Corle ran for 173 yards on 31 carries with one touchdown. However, the Tigers were later forced

to forfeit the victory when it was discovered that they had used an ineligible player.

OCT. 17, 1997: Led by a 217-yard performance by Jason Corle, the Tigers celebrated Homecoming with a 33-30 victory over Robert Morris. Corle also caught seven passes for 126 yards as he scored four touchdowns in the win.

SEPT. 3, 1998: Before a record crowd of 8,056 at Minnegan Stadium, the Tigers turned in a tremendous defensive effort as they won their season opener with a 15-10 victory over Morgan State. Linebacker Aaron Sakevich led Towson with 13 tackles.

SEPT. 26, 1998: The Tigers won their second overtime game ever when Jason Corle scored on a one-yard touchdown run in overtime and Ed Franco converted the point-after kick to give the Tigers a 35-34 win over Fordham. Corle ran for a career high 239 yards and scored three touchdowns. A 71-yard punt return for a touchdown by Dennis Cliggett gave Towson a 28-14 lead in the fourth quarter.

SEPT. 11, 1999: In their Patriot League opener, Jason Corle ran for 135 yards on 28 carries and scored two touchdowns to lead the Tigers to a convincing 35-7 win over Lafayette. With his performance, Corle broke the Tigers' career rushing record set by Tony Vinson.



HISTORY

SEPT. 18, 1999: Quarterback Joe Lee threw for 407 yards and two touchdowns to lead the Tigers to a 27-20 win at Bucknell as the Tigers improved to 3-0 on the year. Lee engineered an 80-yard scoring drive in the final minutes that culminated with a game-winning touchdown run by Jason Corle with 26 seconds left.

OCT. 2, 1999: Quarterback Joe Lee passed for a school record 481 yards and two touchdowns as the Tigers shut out Holy Cross, 14-0. Andrew Hollingsworth led the Tigers' defensive performance with three quarterback sacks.

OCT. 23, 1999: A 24-yard field goal by Ed Kulic with 26 seconds remaining lifted the Tigers to a 25-23 win over Fordham as they upped their Patriot League record to 4-0. Kulic's field goal capped off a tight game that featured seven lead changes.

OCT. 30, 1999: Despite a record-setting performance by Joe Lee, the Tigers dropped a wild 44-39 Patriot League showdown with Lehigh. Lee completed 47 of 77 passes for 567 yards. His 15-yard TD pass to Jason Corle gave the Tigers a 39-37 lead with 5:02 remaining but Lehigh rallied to win.

NOV. 6, 1999: Wide receiver Jamal White caught 13 passes for 172 yards and three touchdowns as the Tigers upped their record to 7-3 with a 30-27 come-from-behind win over Dayton. White's 13 catches and three TD receptions tied the school records in both categories.

SEPT. 9, 2000: Quarterback Kris Blake passed for 276 yards and three touchdowns to lead the Tigers to a 42-20 win over Lafayette as the Tigers presented Coach Gordy Combs with his 50th career victory as the Towson coach.

OCT. 14, 2000: Led by Noah Read, who scored four touchdowns, the Tigers snapped their three-game losing streak with a 38-6 Homecoming victory over Howard. Read rushed for 134 yards, his seventh straight 100-yard rushing performance of the season.

NOV. 4, 2000: Despite a 484-yard passing effort by Val Troiani, the Tigers lost to St. Mary's in California, 45-33. In the loss, three Tiger receivers caught 100 yards worth of passes from Troiani (Adam Overbey, Brandon White and Jamal White.)

NOV. 18, 2000: Led by Noah Read, who rushed for 142 yards on 27 carries and scored two touchdowns, the Tigers closed out their second straight 7-4 season with a 30-23 victory at Drake University.

SEPT. 8, 2001: A six-yard touchdown run by Noah Read in the overtime period enabled the Tigers to post a 16-13 come-from-behind victory over Lafayette in their home opener. Read rushed for a career high 218 yards on 38 carries to become the fourth Towson player to rush for more than 2,000 yards in a career.

NOV. 17, 2001: Led by Matt Romeo, who ran for 158 yards and two touchdowns, the Tigers closed out the season with a 27-9 win at Georgetown. Senior Sporty Evans also had a big game as he intercepted a pass and returned it 51 yards for a TD. He also picked up a fumble and raced 70 yards for a touchdown.

AUG. 22, 2002: At a press conference in Towson University Stadium, Towson University officially accepted an invitation to join the Atlantic 10 Football Conference as a member in time for the 2004 season. Linda Bruno, the A-10 Commissioner, said "We are extremely pleased that Towson has accepted our invitation to become a member of the

A-10. When our directors of athletics first agreed to explore expansion, Towson was an obvious choice." The Tigers joined Delaware, Hofstra, James Madison, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Northeastern, Rhode Island, Richmond, Villanova and William & Mary in the A-10.

SEPT. 5, 2002: Before a record crowd of 8,517 in their new 11,000-seat stadium, the Tigers opened their season with a convincing 49-28 win over Morgan State. Playing in his first game for the Tigers, Mikal Lundy picked up 177 all-purpose yards and scored three touchdowns.

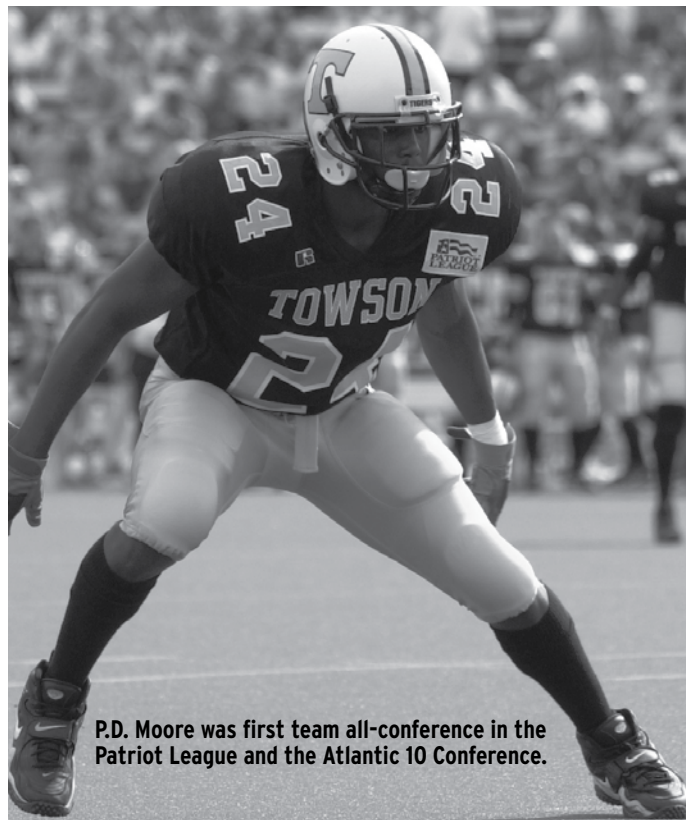
SEPT. 21, 2002: Matt Romeo scored on a 32-yard run and P.D. Moore intercepted a pass and returned it 24 yards for a touchdown as the Tigers pulled out a wild 56-42 victory over Brown. By scoring twice in the final 9:29, the Tigers snapped a 42-42 tie and overcame a five-TD performance by Kyle Slager. Jay Amer passed for 309 yards and four TD's to lead the Tigers who blew a 35-14 lead in the third quarter.

SEPT. 28, 2002: Selected as the Johnny Turco Game MVP, Jay Amer threw for 229 yards and two touchdowns to lead the Tigers to an impressive 42-10 win at Holy Cross.

OCT. 12, 2002: P.D. Moore made 14 tackles as the Tigers used a solid defensive effort to upset 9th-ranked Lehigh, 23-19. Defensive end Jason Troilo made a tackle on fourth down at the five-yard line with seven seconds left to clinch the Tigers' first win over Lehigh.

SEPT. 13, 2003: Linebacker Steve Hessler made 11 tackles and intercepted two passes to lead the Tigers to a 19-13 win over Lafayette. En route to the win, the Tigers forced five turnovers.

OCT. 11, 2003: With Maryland Governor Bob Ehrlich on hand, along with a host of former Baltimore Colts, Towson University officially

dedicated Johnny Unitas® Stadium in honor of the late NFL quarterback. With a crowd of 8,125 in attendance, Anthony Melzi passed for 186 yards and two touchdowns while leading the Tigers to a 30-13 win over Holy Cross.

OCT. 25, 2003: Jason Galloway caught eight passes for a career high 174 yards and two touchdowns as the Tigers won their fourth straight home game with a 24-7 victory over Elon.

NOV. 8, 2003: Cornerback Devon Telp intercepted two passes and returned them for touchdowns in the final 2:10 to lead the Tigers to a 27-6 win at Georgetown. With the Tigers clinging to a 14-6 lead and 2:10 remaining, Telp intercepted a pass and brought it back 49 yards for a touchdown to give the Tigers a 20-6 lead. With 12 seconds left, he picked off another pass and returned it 95 yards for a TD. With 144 interception return yards, he set a Patriot League record. The win over the Hoyas was Towson's final Patriot League victory

SEPT. 11, 2004: Playing their first game as a member of the Atlantic 10, the Tigers gave defending national champion Delaware all they could handle before dropping a 21-17 verdict to the Blue Hens. After taking a 7-0 halftime lead, the Tigers found themselves trailing by 14-10 in the fourth quarter. However, Allante Harrison intercepted a pass and returned it 54 yards for a TD to give Towson a 17-14 lead. The Blue Hens came back to score the winning TD with 7:26 remaining after a Tiger fumble. Harrison tied a school record with three interceptions in the game.

OCT. 2, 2004: Freshman quarterback Andrew Goldbeck passed for 285 yards and a pair of touchdowns as he led the Tigers to the 200th victory in school history, a 21-11 win over Cornell.

SEPT. 1, 2005: Rallying from a 13-point deficit and overcoming a seven-turnover performance, the Tigers edged Morgan State by 29-26 on a Ron Halbruner field goal with one second remaining. Nick Williams led the Tigers' ground game by rushing for 141 yards and scoring a touchdown.

SEPT. 10, 2005: Winning their second game in a row, the Tigers scored a school record 70 points in a 70-0 victory over Lock Haven. The Tigers raced to a 56-0 halftime lead before substituting liberally the rest of the way. Towson rolled up 601 yards of total offense as Eugene King ran for 127 yards on 7 carries and scored three TD's.

SEPT. 24, 2005: Junior Andrae Brown enjoyed a record-setting performance by catching 9 passes for 222 yards and an Atlantic 10

record five touchdowns in the Tigers' 56-41 loss at Northeastern. Sean Schaefer passed for 383 yards and five TD's as the Tigers tried to rally from a 41-7 deficit but came up short.

OCT. 1, 2005: Before a record crowd of 10,778, the Tigers earned their first-ever Atlantic 10 victory with a 35-31 comeback win over 5th-ranked Delaware. Tailback Nick Williams scored the game-winning touchdown on a 3-yard run with 38 seconds left to cap off a 69-yard drive. Williams ran for 169 yards and scored two TD's in the final 4:15.

OCT. 8, 2005: Andrae Brown scored 2 touchdowns as the Tigers earned their second straight Atlantic 10 victory with a 23-14 win at Rhode Island. Brown scored on a 14-yard run in the second quarter and caught a 14-yard TD pass in the third period to lead the Tigers.

NOV. 5, 2005: En route to their third Atlantic 10 win of the season, the Tigers took advantage of four turnovers and a blocked punt to hand Villanova a 40-19 loss. Sparked by a 28-yard blocked punt return from Josh Corle just 100 seconds into the game, the Tigers jumped out to a stunning 38-6 halftime lead.

SEPT. 23, 2006: Sean Schaefer completed 43 of 60 passes for 458 yards and three touchdowns, leading the Tigers to a 33-30 come-from-behind win at Hofstra as Towson opened the season with a 4-0 record. Schaefer's 11-yard TD pass to Eric Yancey with 24 seconds left clinched the win. With the win, the Tigers rose to 17th in the nation, their highest national ranking at the Division I-AA level.

OCT. 28, 2006: Quarterback Sean Schaefer passed for 435 yards and tied the school record with five touchdown passes as the Tigers out-scored Delaware, 49-35. Eric Yancey turned in a solid performance as he caught 9 passes for 140 yards and three touchdowns. The Tigers pulled out the win by scoring on four straight possessions in the second half as they beat the Blue Hens for the second year in a row.

NOV. 11, 2006: Winning their fifth straight road game, the Tigers won their seventh game of the season with a convincing 31-7 victory at Richmond. Drew Mack led the Tiger defense with seven tackles and two interceptions, returning one 49 yards for a TD. The win enabled the Tigers to finish third in the Atlantic 10 Southern Division with a 4-4 record.

APR. 29, 2007: Offensive tackle Jermon Bushrod was drafted by the New Orleans Saints of the NFL in the fourth round. His selection made him the Tigers' earliest draft NFL draft selection.

SEPT. 22, 2007: Before a Unitas Stadium record crowd of 10,856, the Tigers dropped a 27-7 decision to 11th-ranked Delaware. The Blue Hens, who went on to reach the national championship game, jumped to a 17-0 halftime lead en route to the win.

OCT. 6, 2007: Quarterback Sean Schaefer directed the Tigers on a 67-yard, 4-play drive in the final 22 seconds that lifted Towson to a dramatic 23-21 win over 14th-ranked Richmond. Schaefer set a school record with 15 consecutive completions and completed 29 of 33 passes for 287 yards, setting a record for completion percentage (.879). Honored as the National Player of the Week, Schaefer threw a game-winning 14-yard TD pass to Demetrius Harrison on the final play of the game.



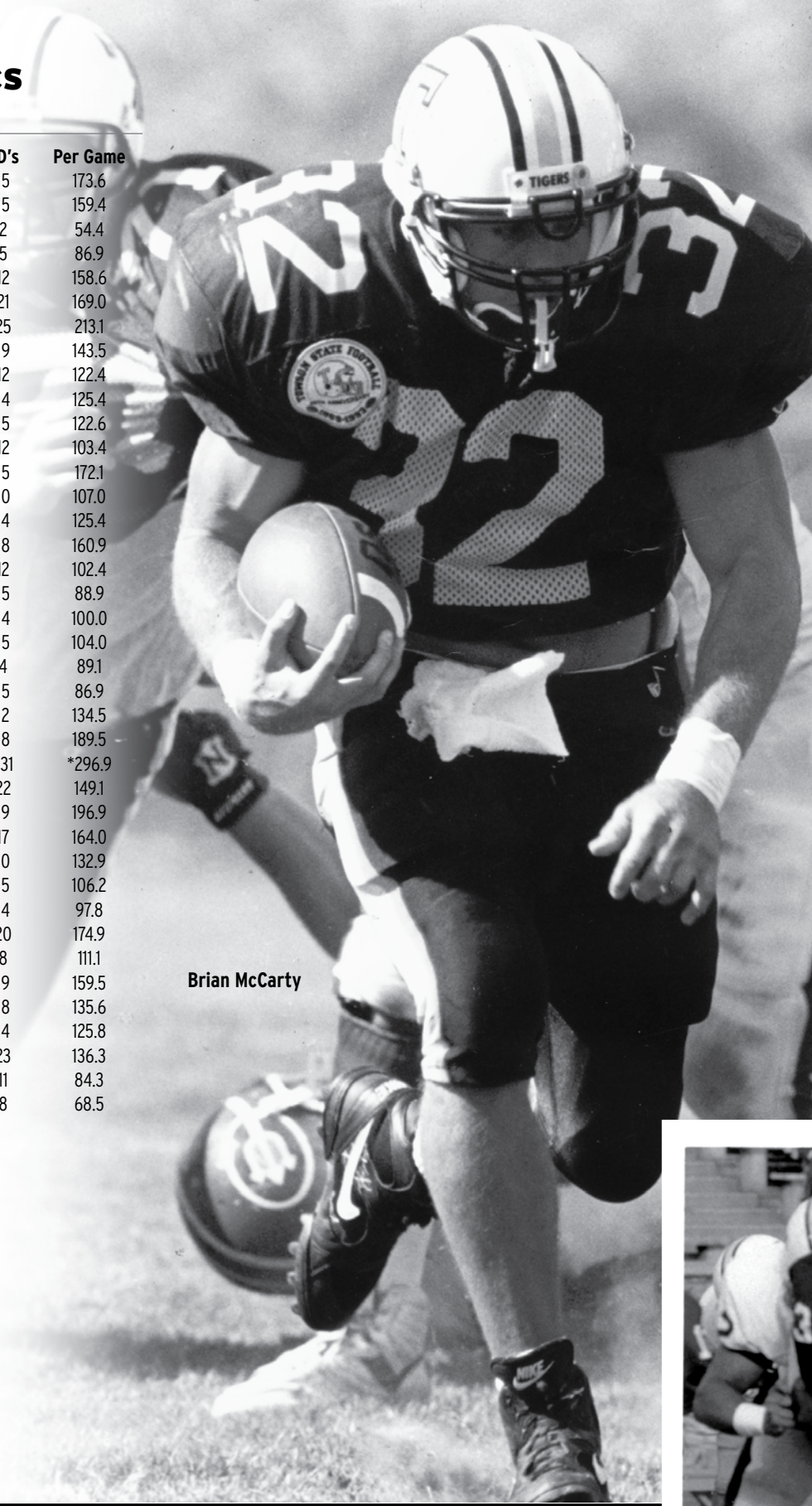

Sean Landeta Retires



On March 6, 2008, Sean Landeta, one of the most prolific punters in NFL history, announced his retirement, ending a professional career that spanned 25 years.

An All-American punter and place kicker at Towson from 1979 to 1982, he led NCAA Division II in punting and field goals in 1982. He finished his career with a 42.0 punting average at Towson, a school record that still stands. In his career, he punted 225 times for 9,452 yards with a school record 72-yard punt at James Madison.

In his senior season, he also set a school record with a 44.7 punting average.

A three-time All-ECAC selection, Landeta scored 148 points in his career for the Tigers. He connected on 26 of 54 field goal attempts and made 70 of 74 conversion kicks. As a sophomore, he kicked a 57-yard field goal against Delaware State to set a school record.

Landeta, who got his start in the USFL and played on both of the Giants' Super Bowl championship teams under Bill Parcells, played for the Giants from 1985-92. The five-time All-Pro also was briefly on the Giants roster in 2006.

"The Giants organization is where I spent the most of my time as a professional. Their ownership, front office and fans were so instrumental in many of the great things that happened to me then, and even to this day," Landeta, 46, said in a statement issued by the Giants.

"To be part of two Super Bowl winning teams with a franchise that has their history is very special to me," he added. "I will always appreciate everything the Giant franchise and their fans have done for me in the past, and as I stated earlier, I still do to this day."

Landeta played with six NFL teams during his career.

During his Giants tenure, Landeta had 526 punts for 22,806 yards in 111 regular season games.

His NFL career totals of 1,401 punts,

60,707 yards and 381 punts inside the 20 leave him second in league history in all three categories, behind only current Giants punter Jeff Feagles.

Landeta's last game action came with the Philadelphia Eagles in 2005. The Giants signed him for one game in 2006 after Feagles hurt his knee, but Feagles was able to play and Landeta did not suit up.

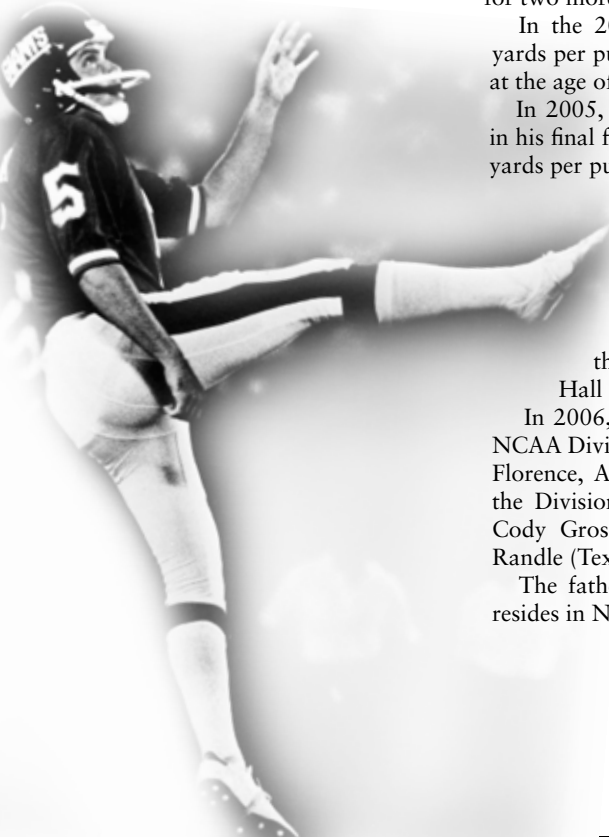
Landeta made his announcement on March 6 because it marked the 25th anniversary of the first game played in the United States Football League (USFL), between Landeta's Philadelphia Stars and the Denver Gold.

During his three seasons in the USFL, Landeta earned All-USFL honors twice and punted in all three USFL championship games. In 1984, he was part of the Philadelphia Stars team that beat Arizona in the championship game. In 1985, he punted for the Stars, who beat Oakland in the final USFL championship game.

In three seasons in the USFL, he punted 204 times and averaged 41.6 yards per punt. He never had a punt blocked in the USFL.

After the Stars' final season ended in July, he signed with the NFL's New York Giants.

He was the last USFL player to retire from football. For several years, Landeta and Doug Flutie were the only USFL alumni who were active in the NFL.



In his second year with the Giants, he averaged 44.8 yards per punt as he helped the Giants win the National Football Conference title and advance to Super Bowl XXI where they beat Denver, 39-20.

In 1990, Landeta averaged 44.1 yards per punt as the Giants won Super Bowl XXV with a 20-19 victory over the Buffalo Bills.

He punted for the Giants until the middle of the 1993 season when they released him. Almost immediately, he signed with the Los Angeles Rams. Punting for the Rams, he averaged 43.5 yards per punt the rest of the season.

He went on to punt for the Rams for three more seasons and moved with the team when they relocated to St. Louis in 1995.

He spent the 1997 season with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, averaging 42.1 yards per punt. In 1998, he punted for the Green Bay Packers and averaged 42.9 yards per punt.

When Packers' Assistant Coach Andy Reid was named as the Philadelphia Eagles' head coach before the 1999 season, he brought Landeta with to Philadelphia. In 1999, Landeta punted 107 times for the Eagles and averaged 42.3 yards per kick. He spent four years with the Eagles and averaged 43.5 yards per punt in the 2001 season.

He returned to St. Louis for the 2003 and 2004 season where he was the Rams' punter for two more years.

In the 2004 season, he averaged 43.3 yards per punt for the Rams while punting at the age of 42.

In 2005, Landeta punted for the Eagles in his final full NFL season, averaging 43.6 yards per punt.

Last year, he was selected as the punter on the Eagles' 50th anniversary team.

A Baltimore native who attended Loch Raven High School, he was inducted into the Towson University Athletic Hall of Fame in 2005.

In 2006, he was also inducted into the NCAA Division II Football Hall of Fame in Florence, Alabama. He was inducted into the Division II Hall of Fame along with Cody Gross (North Alabama) and John Randle (Texas A&M - Kingsville).

The father of a young son, Joseph, he resides in New York.

HISTORY

Overtime Games

Since the NCAA instituted overtime in football in 1996, Towson has been involved in six overtime games going into the 2006 season. The Tigers are 4-2 in those contests. It should be noted that the Tigers have not played an overtime game since the 2002 season - a stretch of 62 games.

Nov. 2, 1996: TIGERS 33, Marist 32 **3 OT**

Towson rolled up some big numbers in its first-ever overtime game. Quarterback Kevin Smith completed 36 of a then-school record 57 attempts for a then school record 471 yards and a game winning TD pass to Maurice Sydnor. His 16 yard strike to Shawn Ward with nine seconds left in regulation sent the game into overtime. After Sydnor's TD reception Marist responded with J.J. Allen rushing nine straight times and scoring a TD to put the score at 33-32. A penalty against Towson moved the ball to the one yard line for the conversion attempt. Marist went with Allen for a 10th time but linebackers Lamont Dumas and Chris Beaumier stopped him short, enabling Towson to preserve the victory and put an end to the longest game in the history of both schools after three overtimes.

Sept. 26, 1998: TIGERS 35, Fordham 34 **1 OT**

Tailback Jason Corle ran for a career high 239 yards and scored three TD's, including the game tying score in overtime, as the Tigers rallied for a 35-34 win over the Rams. After Corle tied the game on a one-yard plunge in overtime, freshman placekicker Ed Kulic booted the game winning extra point as the Tigers claimed their first-ever win in the Patriot League, snapping a 7-game losing streak in league play. Jon Carroll scored the go-ahead TD for Fordham on a three yard run for a 34-28 Ram lead. But Dan LaForese's extra point kick missed wide left. Corle then carried eight times and finally punched it in from the one-yard line on a third and goal. Kulic finished it off with a perfect conversion kick.

Sept. 30, 2000: Colgate 30, TIGERS 27 **1 OT**

Colgate turned three blocked punts into TD's, ran a blocked extra point back for a defensive PAT and came up with an interception in overtime to stop the Tigers and go on to win 30-27 off the foot of a freshman placekicker. The loss ended Towson's eight-game winning streak at home. It was the Tigers' first loss in an overtime game. Brandon Tinson's third blocked punt of the contest resulted in a Raider score late in the game that tied it at 27-27. With 2:35 left in regulation, Colgate put together a 13-play drive that ended when Russ Abrams' 47 yard field goal attempt hit the crossbar, falling short. The Tigers took possession first but Colgate's Sean McCune intercepted Kris Blake in the end zone to end TU's attack. After five straight running plays by Randall Joseph, the Raiders were set up right in front of the goal posts where Abrams booted the 22 yarder for the victory.

Sept. 8, 2001: TIGERS 16, Lafayette 13 **1 OT**

Noah Read's six yard TD run in overtime gave Towson a 16-13 come-from-behind win over Lafayette. Read rushed for a career high 218 yards on 38 carries. The Leopards scored just 16 seconds into the game when Andrew May returned the opening kickoff 93 yards. Lafayette went up 10-0 on a Martin Brecht 20 yard field goal. The Tigers were scoreless until the fourth quarter. Read, who picked

up 81 of his 218 yards in the final period and overtime, pulled the Tigers to within 10-7 on an 11 yard run. Towson tied the score when Ed Kulic kicked a 22 yard field goal with 8:01 remaining in regulation. In the overtime, Brecht gave the Leopards the lead with a 28-yard field goal. But, the Tigers won it on the ground with Read scoring on the fourth play of the drive.

Sept. 29, 2001: TIGERS 20, Morgan State 17 **1 OT**

Ed Kulic's 18 yard field goal along with a game winning defensive play by linebackers Sean Hendricks and Steve Hessler lifted the Tigers to a 20-17 victory that spoiled the debut of night football at Hughes Stadium for crosstown rival Morgan State. A 35 yard field goal by the Bears' Jon Voroxholin with just 1.4 seconds left in regulation sent the game into overtime with the score deadlocked at 17-17. Towson took possession first but stalled on the 11 yard line where Kulic made his 7th field goal in as many tries up to that point in the 2001 season. Morgan then lined up for its first possession at the 25 yard line. The Bears' Ali Culpepper took the handoff and ran to the right where he was met by Hendricks, who stripped him of the ball that was recovered by Hessler. The play ended the game.

Oct. 5, 2002: Cornell 34, TIGERS 31 **1 OT**

After falling behind by 24 points, the Tigers picked themselves up, dusted themselves off and rallied to tie game before losing in the second overtime on a 19-yard field goal by Cornell. The loss was disheartening for Towson which had come back from a 24-0 deficit only to lose on the final play (4th and goal) of the 2nd overtime. The Tigers came alive as Jason Amer completed 9 of 11 passes for 165 yards and 3 TD's in the 4th quarter, enabling Towson to tie the game with 2:17 to play. Each team scored a TD in the first overtime. Cornell stopped the Tigers in the second overtime by blocking a Ben Whitacre field goal attempt. The Big Red then drove to the Towson two-yard line where Trevor MacMeekin kicked a 19-yard field goal to win it for Cornell.

CARL RUNK (1969-71) 11-14-1: Carl Runk was Towson's first head football coach. At the time he also served as the Tigers' head men's lacrosse coach. He gave up his football position after the 1971 season to concentrate on lacrosse. Carl went on to coach the men's lacrosse squad for 31 years, compiling a 262-161 record. His 1974 squad captured the NCAA College Division National Championship. That remains Towson's only national title in men's sports. His 1991 team played North Carolina for the Division I title.

PHIL ALBERT (1972-91) 117-91-3: Phil Albert, an assistant on Carl Runk's staff, took over as head coach in 1972 and directed the Tigers for the next 20 seasons, compiling a 117-91 record. In 1974 he guided the Tigers to a 10-0 record, the only unbeaten season in the program's history. His 1976 team participated in the NCAA Division III Playoffs, advancing all the way to the Stagg Bowl. Three of his Division II teams were NCAA Playoff squads. Phil was honored as an AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year three times. After resigning as the Tigers' head coach, he remained on the faculty while serving as the advance scout for the NFL's San Diego Chargers. He also coached at Calvert Hall High School. "Coach A" returned to the program in 2003 as the Tigers' offensive coordinator.

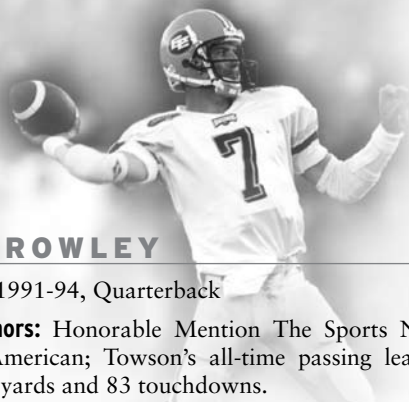

The Two That Got Away

Two former Tiger defensive backs left Towson after their sophomore years and transferred to the University of Maryland where they became instant starters. Both were taken in the National Football League's annual college draft.

Chad Scott was a member of Towson's 1993 and 1994 teams that combined for a 16-4 record and two national rankings. Chad was a nickel back as a freshman and then started at left cornerback in 1994 when he led the Tigers with five interceptions.

In 1995 Towson retreated to non-scholarship football, forcing several players, i.e. Scott, to leave Towson. Chad walked on at Maryland where he started as a junior and senior, eventually earning a scholarship. He became a Terrapin captain also.

The Pittsburgh Steelers made him the 24th player

taken in the first round of the 1997 NFL draft. He spent eight years with the Steelers. He signed with the New England Patriots in 2005 and has been a three-year standout for the Patriots.

In 11 NFL seasons, Scott has made 468 tackles with 21 interceptions and four touchdowns.

Madiou Williams followed in Scott's footsteps. After the 1999 and 2000 seasons during which he appeared in 22 games with 11 starts, he transferred to Maryland. He redshirted in 2001 then started at safety for the 2002 and 2003 seasons. Madiou was drafted in the second round by the Cincinnati Bengals and has been a fixture in the Bengals' secondary the last three years.

In four years with the Bengals, he made 103 tackles with nine interceptions.

After the 2007 season, he signed as a free agent with the Minnesota Vikings.

Tigers and Mel Kiper

Since 1984, Mel Kiper Jr. has served as an expert analyst for ESPN's annual NFL draft coverage, providing in-depth information on the nation's most talented college football players. His pre-draft predictions are frequently the most accurate in the business, often as much as 80 percent correct on first-round selections. He also has a Web page (www.espn.go.com/melkiper), linked off of ESPN.com, that launched in 2000.

For the last five years, Mel Kiper Jr. and ESPN have used the Towson Tiger football locker room to tape portions of his draft analysis for the upcoming NFL draft.

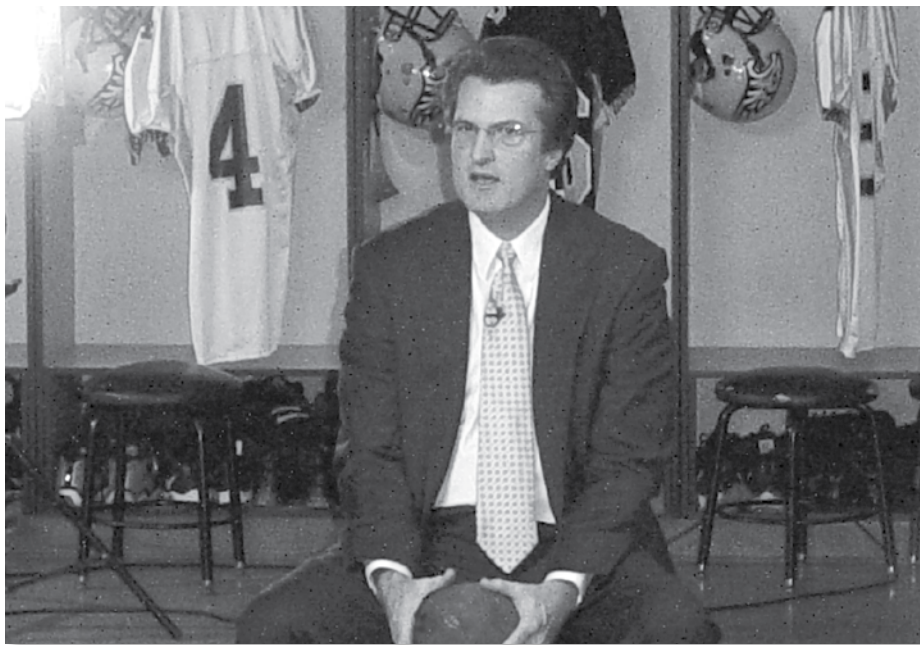
In the weeks leading up to the draft, these reports are regularly shown on ESPN SportsCenter.

With the football lockers as his backdrop, Mel has spoken about several key players in each draft, citing their highlights and predicting which teams may select the players.

Last year, offensive tackle Jermon Bushrod of the Tigers was one of the top rated linemen on Mel's draft board. He was a fourth round draft pick by the New Orleans Saints.

Kiper, who is also an analyst for "College GameDay" on ESPN Radio, has used the Towson football locker room because of its proximity to his home in Baltimore.

His association with Towson goes back nearly thirty years. A childhood friend and little league teammate of All-Pro punter Sean



Landeta, Mel followed Landeta's career at Towson and into the United States Football League, and later the NFL.

A 1978 graduate of Calvert Hall High School in Towson, he tracks his fellow Cardinals' alumni that have played for the Tigers.

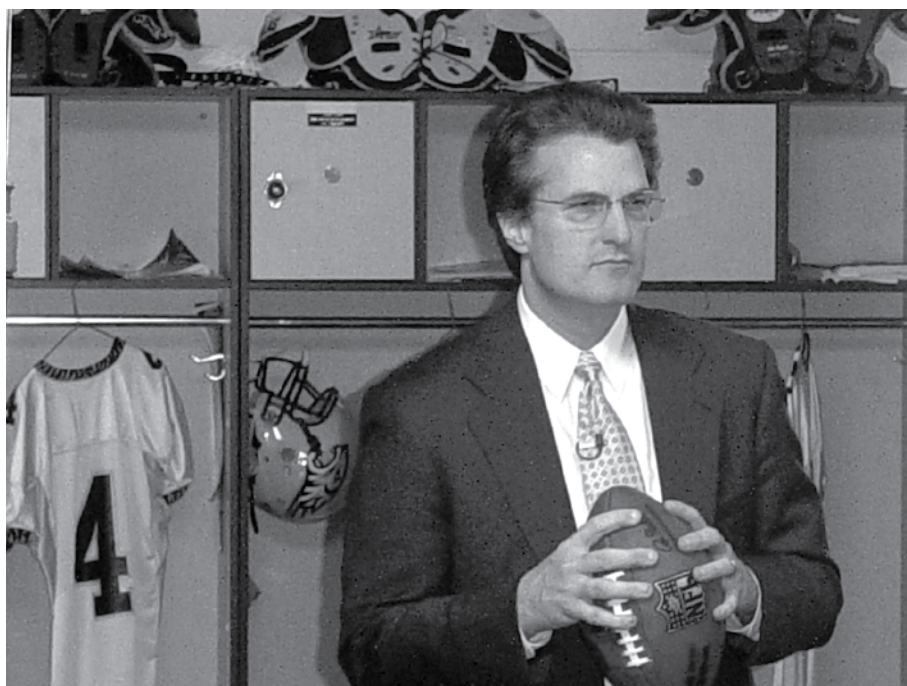
Tiger Coach Gordy Combs is also a graduate of Calvert Hall High School.

When Dave Meggett was setting all sorts of records at Towson in 1987 and 1988, it was Mel Kiper who touted him as an NFL draft pick. Mel was not surprised when the Giants selected Meggett in the fifth round. He said, "He is so quick hitting the hole and he accelerates past defenders. Then it's off to the races. When he's in the open field, nobody can catch him."

Mel's continuous, year-round research is aided by an office equipped with satellite dishes allowing him to pick up 20 to 25 college games each week. This adds to his in-depth knowledge gathered from lengthy discussions with coaches, players and team executives.

Mel is a frequent contributor to ESPN's award-winning "SportsCenter" during the NFL and college football seasons and provides occasional updates throughout the year.

He is also the president of Kiper Enterprises, which he founded in 1981 while in college. It is responsible for all aspects of a series of annual publications including the "NFL Draft Report" and "Draft Preview."

Has been a college football coach for 18 years, including stints at Louisville, James Madison, Pacific, Towson and Western Carolina ... GORDY COMBS (LB, 1970-72)

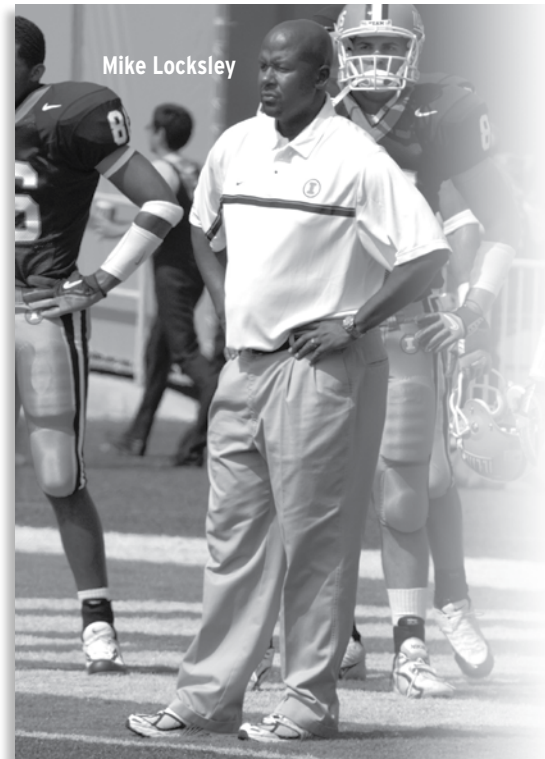

TU FOOTBALL ON WNST RADIO

Towson University and WNST (1570 AM) Radio are in the second year of a three-year marketing and broadcast agreement that will have the local station broadcasting all of the Tigers' football games through the 2009 season.

WNST, a commercial station, replaces the Tigers' longtime football radio partner, WTMD-FM, TU's 10,000-watt public radio station. WTMD will continue to be a part of Tigers basketball and lacrosse.

In addition to the actual broadcasts, other key elements of the agreement include regular appearances of head coach Gordy Combs on the station and an expanded one-hour pre-game show for home contests, broadcast live from the Minnegan Room overlooking Unitas Stadium.



TELEVISED GAMES

Three of Towson's Colonial Athletic Association leagues games during the 2008 season are scheduled to be televised. After playing in five televised games last year, the Tigers will make three appearances on television during the 2008 season beginning with their season opener at Navy on August 30. The first-ever meeting between the Midshipmen and the Tigers will air on CBS College Sports Network at 3:30 p.m.

In addition, the Tigers will make a pair of appearances on Comcast SportsNet when they host Northeastern on October 4 and William & Mary on November 1 at Unitas Stadium.

The only away telecast is on September 15 at Massachusetts on CN8. The ensuing four telecasts are at home on Comcast Sports Net (CSN).

CN8 out of Philadelphia reaches 7.5 million TV households (TVHH) in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, eastern Massachusetts and Washington, D.C.

The CSN telecasts will be shown in the Mid-Atlantic Region with a viewing audience of 4.7 million TVHH in Delaware, Maryland, Virginia and Washington D.C. It is also available on DirecTV channel 629.

CSN Philadelphia reaches 3 million homes in Philadelphia, southern New Jersey and Delaware.

SPIRO MOREKAS

Spiro Morekas, in his 18th year, is the radio voice of the Towson University Tigers, calling football, men's basketball and men's lacrosse action.

A 1983 Towson graduate, Spiro got his professional start on radio station WSBY in Salisbury, serving as its sports director from 1985 to 1988.

In 1988, he returned to the Baltimore area as sports director at WGRX, serving in that capacity until 1990. In 1988-89, he launched his college sports broadcasting career by doing the play-by-play for Loyola College basketball.

At the same time he became involved in sports talk radio, serving as host of a sports talk show on WCBM. He later hosted a sports talk show on WLJ Radio.

In 1991, Spiro signed on with his alma mater, working for the Tigers as their play-by-play talent on WTMD-FM, the University's 10,000 watt station.

From 1998-2002, he was a sports talk show host on WNST. He has also been the play-by-play voice of the Baltimore Bayhawks of the Major League Lacrosse

Spiro is unique as a sportcaster in the metropolitan Baltimore area and is one of just a few nationally who works Division I football, basketball and lacrosse, calling the action for almost 50 collegiate events a year.



In 2005, Spiro was honored with the department's highest award, the Doc Minnegan Award, symbolic of outstanding contribution to the university's athletic program.
