# COACHING STAFF

*Pat Kennedy's charge is to direct Towson to the head of the line in what is arguably the most competitive mid-major conference in the land, a league that has sent two of its teams into the NCAA Tournament each of the last two years including one Final Four appearance in 2006.*

## Pat Kennedy

**HEAD COACH - 4TH SEASON**

**King's College (Pa.), '75**

**28th Season Overall**

When Pat arrived at Towson for the 2004-05 season the Tigers' program was at the bottom of the 12-team Colonial Athletic Association, a very long way from the top. In three years the Tigers have moved up to the middle of the pack. Two back-to-back double overtime losses spelled the difference between a fifth and seventh place finish last year.

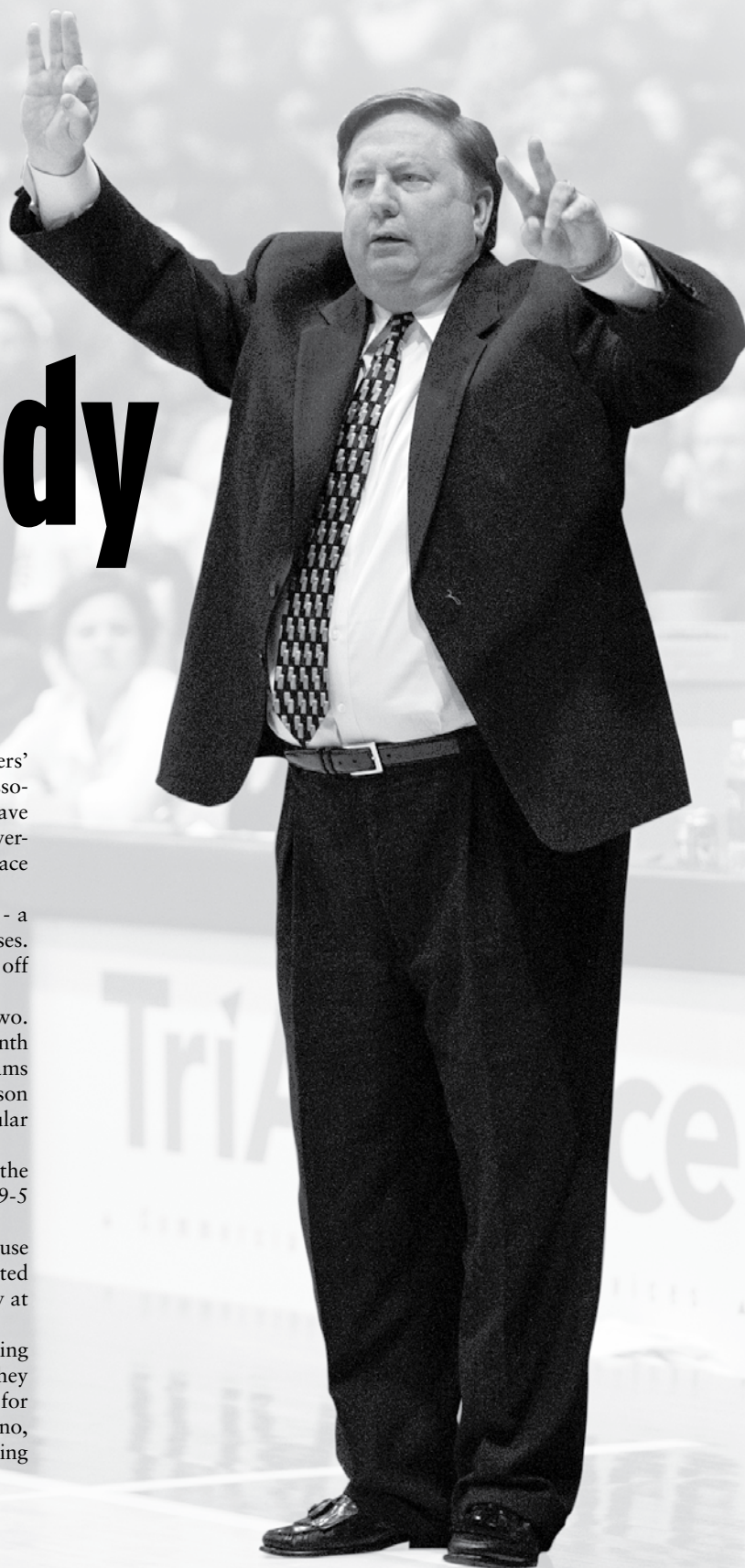
His first season at Towson was a bust in terms of the record - a career low 6 wins (one was a forfeit) against a career high 24 losses. Despite the dismal results, however, Pat and his staff scored big off the court.

Those behind-the-scene efforts paid huge dividends in year two. The Tigers rose from the ashes of the CAA's last place to finish seventh in a league that expanded to 12 schools and sent four of its teams (two to the NCAA, two to the NIT) into post-season play. Towson was the most improved team in the CAA for the 2005-06 regular season with a plus seven.

Last season, year three for Pat at Towson, yielded 15 victories, the most in a single season for Towson in 11 years. The Tigers were 9-5 in the Towson Center, their best home record in seven years.

This is year number four for him. Expectations remain high because Kennedy, through recruiting and aggressive scheduling, has created an exciting atmosphere for basketball at Towson. With Kennedy at the controls it promises to be another interesting campaign.

Most coaches go through an extensive development stage, serving apprenticeships as assistants before landing a head job, or they work in the Division III and II ranks prior to moving up. Not so for Kennedy. After two years as an assistant to the legendary Jim Valvano, he was hired as a Division I head coach. Pat has never been anything but a Division I head coach since.





Kennedy continues to rank among the top 25 active winningest Division I coaches with his 449 career victories. His previous 27 years have been more kind to him than not, leaving him with much success and little disappointment.

Each of Pat's prior coaching assignments presented him with different challenges. He hurdled over all of them at Iona, Florida State, DePaul and Montana, leading his teams to eight NCAA Tournament appearances and five National Invitation Tournaments.

At Florida State, he reached the NCAA's Elite Eight in 1993 and the NIT championship game in 1987. Eleven of his former players have gone to the NBA, including Sam Cassell, a local Baltimore product from the storied Dunbar High School program. A number of his former assistants are now head coaches themselves, perhaps most notable among them Tim Welsh at Providence College.

Kennedy is experienced. There isn't a level of Division I college basketball he hasn't coached on, from the MAAC while at Iona, to the Metro Conference and Atlantic Coast Conference at Florida State, through Conference USA at DePaul to the Big Sky at Montana.

Now the task he has accepted is to raise the Tigers to a competitive level in the CAA where Towson's conference record is 30-78 after six years in the league. Over half of those wins, 16, have been earned in the last two years under Kennedy.

The 2004-05 season was Pat's first at Towson. And, it was his most dismal ever. The Tigers struggled to a 5-24 record, their second worst in 25 seasons as a Division I school.

Because he wasn't hired until the spring, Pat was able to bring in just two recruits, a junior college transfer point guard that started 23 of 28 games, and a freshman wing who averaged just 5.9 minutes in 22 games. Three of the returning veterans, with a combined 94 career starts, were sidelined with knee injuries. One of those vets was a 6-10 center who was a member of the CAA's All-Defensive Team after leading the league in blocked shots the year before. That trio played a total of 205 minutes of the entire 2004-05 season.

Midway in the season a fourth player who was starting on the wing went down with a knee injury, missing eight games and forcing Kennedy to play a walk-on in his stead. The Tigers never recovered from that final blow, losing the last 13 games of the season.

But if one factor has loomed larger than any other in Pat's career, it has been his ability to recruit. His last three incoming groups are testimony to that fact.

Kennedy was introduced to coaching by Ed Donohue while he was an undergraduate attending King's College of Pa. on a basketball scholarship. After two years on the Monarchs' squad, Donohue coaxed Pat out of his uniform to coach King's junior varsity, which

he did to a 17-4 record. In his senior year Kennedy was elevated to the top assistant on the varsity. From that point on Pat knew what he wanted to do in his life - coach college basketball.

After graduating from King's in 1975, Kennedy took a similar position at Lehigh for one year. Then the Keyport, N.J. native joined the late Jim Valvano's staff at Iona College in New Rochelle, N.Y. He served two years as Valvano's assistant. After the 1979-80 season Valvano moved on to North Carolina State. Kennedy moved up and became the Gaels' head coach at the age of 28.

In six seasons at Iona, Pat led the Gaels to a 124-60 record, two trips to the NCAA Tournament and two NIT appearances. His very first career victory, an upset over South Carolina, was an indication of what was ahead for the Gaels.

Iona posted a 15-14 record in Kennedy's first year. The next four were all 20 plus win seasons and included two NIT appearances plus two trips to the NCAA tournament. He became just the fourth coach in NCAA Division I history to win 100 games in his first five seasons as a head coach.

One of his finest teams was the 1983-84 squad that posted a 23-8 record. That performance put him into the NCAA Tournament for the first time as a head coach. It also earned him his first recognition when he was selected the New York Metro Area Coach of the Year. The following year his Gaels were 26-5 and made another trip to the NCAA Tournament.

Kennedy was a Heineken Award recipient, an honor symbolic of excellence in college coaching. He followed Valvano, St. John's Lou Carneseca and North Carolina's Dean Smith as an honoree of the prestigious award.

Over 95 percent of his recruits at Iona graduated. USAToday cited Kennedy's program at Iona as having one of the most outstanding graduation rates in college athletics.

While at Iona, Pat developed a penchant for administration, serving five years in the dual role of head basketball coach and associate athletics director. He was also president of the MAAC Coaches' Association and a member of the NCAA Tournament Selection Committee for the Eastern Region.

Kennedy resigned his position at Iona following the 1985-86 season to accept the head coach's job at Florida State. Prior to his arrival, the Seminoles had made only four trips to the NCAA tournament in the previous 39 seasons. During Kennedy's 11 years at the Tallahassee school, FSU appeared in the NCAA tournament five times, reaching the Sweet Sixteen in 1992 and the Elite Eight in 1993.

The NIT figured into FSU's post-season history as well while Kennedy was at the helm. In his first season Florida State advanced to the NIT second round. In his last season the Seminoles were 20-12. They reached the NIT finals where they eventually bowed to Michigan.

Up until Kennedy's arrival at Florida State, the Seminoles had never won a conference championship - regular season or postseason. In 1990-91, FSU's last year in the Metro Conference, the Seminoles cleared that hurdle by winning the school's first post-season tournament with a stunning comeback victory against Louisville.

During his tenure at FSU, Kennedy engineered the Seminoles' transition from the Metro Conference to the Atlantic Coast Conference. In 1992 the Seminoles made their ACC debut, finishing with an impressive 22-10 record that included an 11-5 league mark, good enough for a second place finish behind eventual national champion Duke. FSU went to the NCAA tournament where it beat Montana

and Georgetown before falling to Indiana in the Sweet Sixteen.

The following year, Kennedy's seventh with the Seminoles, Florida State won a school record 25 games. The 11th-ranked Seminoles (they had been ranked as high as 6th) beat Evansville, Tulane and Western Kentucky to advance to the NCAA regional championship where the best season in Florida State history ended with a loss to Kentucky.

After compiling a 202-131 record at Florida State, Kennedy left to accept the task of rebuilding the basketball program at DePaul. The year before he arrived (1996-97) the Blue Demons were 3-23.

The 1997-98 season was dismal as the Blue Demons were 7-23. But they opened the campaign with a victory that stopped a 13-game DePaul losing streak. They also beat Memphis and UAB, which were the first and second place finishers in the National Division of Conference USA, on the road.

The following year Kennedy rallied the Blue Demons to the biggest one-season turnaround in DePaul history. They finished with an 18-13 record and participated in the NIT, downing Northwestern before bowing to California in a one-point loss.

The turnaround continued in 1999-2000 when the Blue Demons posted a 21-12 record. They returned to the NCAA tournament for the first time in eight years where they were beaten in overtime by Kansas.

Over a two year period Kennedy was faced with a situation he had never experienced - players leaving early for the NBA. Five of his Blue Demons opted to end their college careers for the professional ranks, including first round picks Quentin Richardson and Steven Hunter. Additionally, high school star Eddy Curry, who had made a verbal commitment to DePaul, opted to enter the draft and was selected fourth overall.

In his final season at the Chicago school, he suspended three of his team's top four scorers for academic reasons. They were eligible by DePaul and NCAA standards, but not by Kennedy's.

After the 2001-02 season, Kennedy resigned from DePaul with a 67-85 record and moved to the Big Sky country, accepting the head

coach's job at Montana.

Kennedy coached the Grizzlies to a two-year record of 23-35. He picked up his 400th career victory when Montana downed Portland State 61-49 on January 11, 2003. Montana finished third in the Big Sky Conference in 2004-05 year but won the league's tournament title to earn its sixth appearance in the NCAA Tournament. Four of the five starters for the Grizzlies were Kennedy's recruits. The Grizzlies returned to the NCAA Tournament last year.

Pat has never restricted his work in college basketball to coaching. For over a decade he has served on the National Association of Basketball Coaches board of directors. He served as the NABC's president during the 2004-05 year. He has another year remaining on the board as a past president. He is in his fourth year of serving on the NABC's committee for recruiting and access.

Pat was honored by the Metropolitan Intercollegiate Basketball Association with its prestigious 2004 NIT-NABC Coaches Award, presented in conjunction with the National Invitation Tournament.

Kennedy is the son of an immigrant father, Joseph William Kennedy who came to this country from Tralee, Ireland. Pat has never forgotten those roots. He was one of several coaches who raised money for former NBA commissioner Walter Kennedy to build the first basketball arena in Dublin, Ireland. Pat has done three tours of basketball clinics and has lectured throughout Ireland during his coaching career. He was also one of the owners of the Burger Land Team of Cork, one of Ireland's first professional teams.

Pat attended Red Bank (N.J.) Catholic High School, home of the Fighting Caseys. He completed his undergraduate education at King's College in Wilkes-Barre, Pa., a sister school to the University of Notre Dame in South Bend, Ind.

Pat and his wife, Jeannie, are the parents of a son, Joey, who is a recent graduate of Northwestern where he played guard for the Wildcats and was a team captain in his senior year, and two daughters, Kimberly and Kathryn.

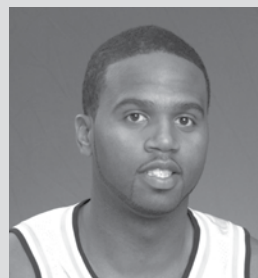

### Tigers in Europe

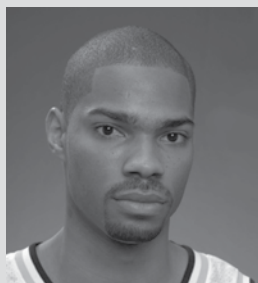

Lawrence Hamm (2002-06), a four-year starter and 1,000-point career scorer for the Tigers, is in his second year with Aris Friesland in Holland. Gary Neal, who scored over 2,000 points in his college career and led the Colonial Athletic Association in scoring in 2006-07 with a 25.3 average, signed with Pinar Karsiyka in Turkish Basketball League. 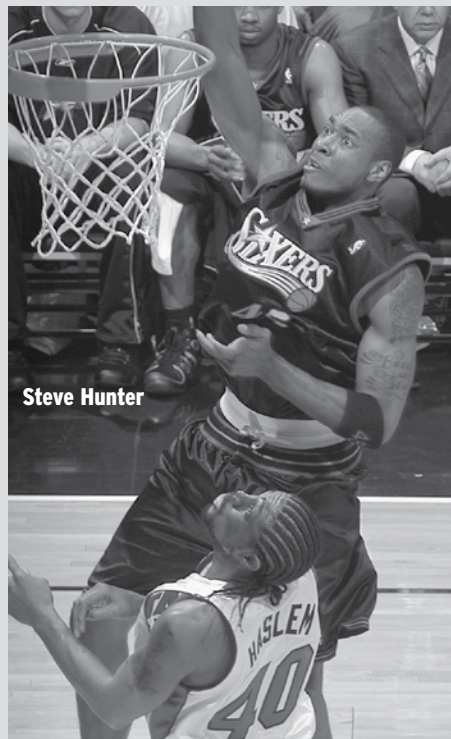
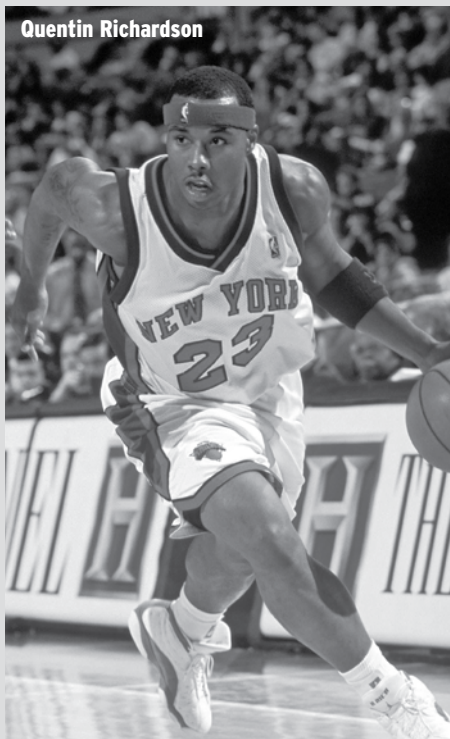

## Kennedy Ranks 6th Nationally in Tenure

Towson coach Pat Kennedy is one of only six active college basketball coaches who have served at least 25 consecutive seasons as a Division I head coach. Connecticut's Jim Calhoun leads the way with 35 straight years at the helm. Pat, who is in his 28th consecutive year as a Division I head coach (Iona 1980-86, Florida State 1986-97, DePaul 1997-2002, Montana 2002-04, Towson 2004-present) is sixth. In addition to that list, Pat is 13th among active Division I coaches in most seasons as a head coach (27), and 11th among that group for most games (816).

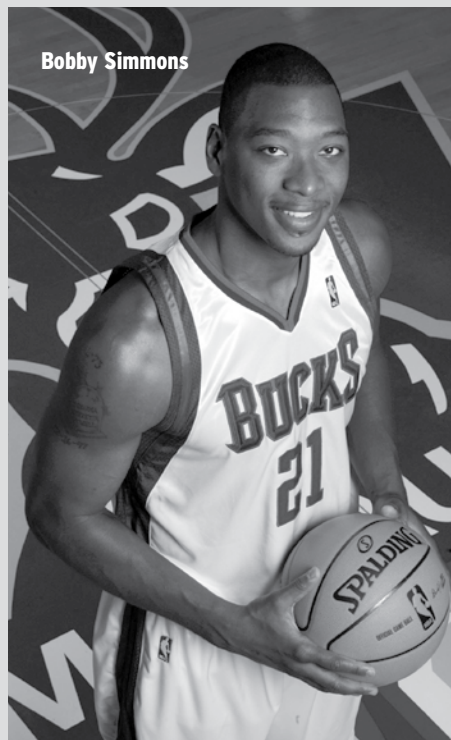

## Assistant Coaches



### Eric Skeeters

Assistant Coach  
Coppin State, '97 · 4th Season

When head coach Pat Kennedy began filling his staff positions, Baltimore native son Eric Skeeters was his first hire.

Skeets' background stretches from the Catonsville Midget League to the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Skeets came to Towson from Virginia Tech where he was an assistant under Seth Greenberg for the 2003-04 season as the Hokies enjoyed their first winning record (15-14) in four years. He left the Blacksburg, Va. school just as it finished recruiting for its first ACC season. The Hokies' incoming class was rated 23rd by Rivals Hoop. Skeets' top recruit, Deron Washington, was named to the ACC All-Rookie team that year.

A 1986 graduate of Woodlawn High School, Skeets got his start as the junior varsity coach and assistant varsity coach at Baltimore's St. Frances Academy from 1992-96 under coach William Wells. While there he coached Mark Karcher, a former standout at Temple who was a 1997 USA TODAY first team All-American, a McDonald's All-American and a two-time Baltimore Sun Player of the Year. In Skeets' final season at St. Frances, the team was 30-4 and ranked 14th nationally in the USA TODAY final poll. The ball-boy for the Panthers that year was Carmelo Anthony, the 2003 Big East Rookie of the Year and the third pick in the 2003 NBA Draft. He and Skeets have maintained a close relationship through the years.

From 1992-96 Skeets served three seasons as an assistant coach to Ron "Fang" Mitchell at Coppin State. With the Eagles, Skeets assisted in all areas for the team and served as Coppin State's chief recruiter. While at Coppin State, Skeets helped the Eagles to a three-year record of 58-30 and three Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference regular-season championships. In 1997, Coppin State earned a bid to the NCAA Tournament where the Eagles scored a huge upset, beating second-seed South Carolina 78-65.

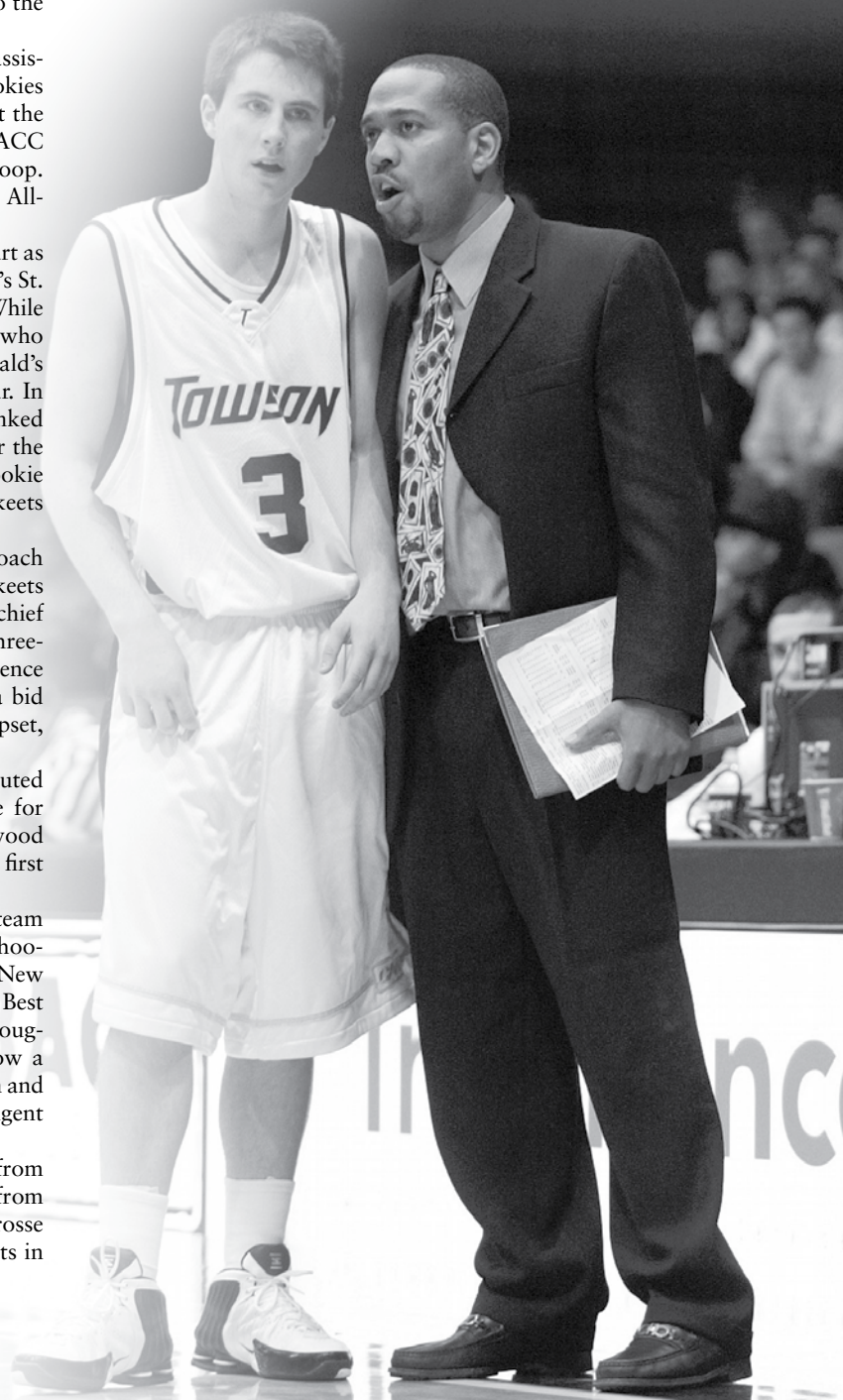
Skeets left Coppin for Youngstown State where he contributed immediately to the Penguins' recruiting. He was responsible for signing Doug Underwood out of Meade High School. Underwood was named to the Horizon League All-Rookie Team and then first team All-Conference.

In 1994 Skeets directed a team called Baltimore's Best to a 56-team tournament championship, the Midwest Future Showdown & Shootout in Columbus, Ohio. His squad beat defending champion New York Riverside, 65-59 for the title. Members of Baltimore's Best included Shawnta Rogers of Lake Clifton, Alphonso Jones of Douglass, Guy Butler of Woodlawn, Tommy Polley of Dunbar (now a linebacker with the New Orleans Saints), Colin Jones of Patterson and Marvis Thornton of Dunbar plus a St. Frances Academy contingent of Karcher, Keon Chavez, Greg Billups and Tavares Graham.

Skeets was awarded a bachelor's in management science from Coppin State in 1997. He earned an associate's degree in 1991 from Catonsville Community College. At Catonsville, he played lacrosse and basketball for two seasons where he led his region in assists in

1990. He was a standout point guard in basketball and midfielder in lacrosse at Woodlawn High School, earning All-County honors in lacrosse. Skeets played both basketball and lacrosse throughout his competitive career that began as a youngster at St. Mark's School in the Catonsville Midget League. A knee injury that he suffered while at Catonsville C.C. eventually ended his playing career.

Eric and his wife, Marie, a University of Maryland graduate, have two sons, Evan and Miles.







## Jay Eck

**Assistant Coach**  
**Xavier, '73 · 4th Season**

A former head coach at the college and professional levels, Jay Eck is in his fourth year on the Towson University staff.

A native of Madison, Wis., Jay is a graduate of Xavier University. He started his coaching career as an assistant at Bradley from 1979 to 1983. In four years with the Braves, he helped Coach Dick Versace win two Missouri Valley Conference championships as Bradley compiled an 83-42 record. In 1980, Bradley played in the NCAA Division I Tournament. The 1982 Braves had a 26-10 overall record and won the National Invitational Tournament championship.

From 1983 to 1985, Jay worked as an assistant coach at Pittsburgh under Roy Chipman. In 1983-84, the Panthers were 18-13 and earned a berth in the NIT. In 1984-85, Pitt posted a 17-12 record and advanced to the NCAA Tournament. During his tenure at Pittsburgh, he coached All-Americans Charles Smith and Jerome Lane.

Jay became a collegiate head coach for the first time in 1985 when he was appointed at Wisconsin-Stevens Point. In his two years at UWSP, the Pointers were one of the top teams in NCAA Division III with a 45-13 record. They won back-to-back Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championships. Jay was honored as the WIAC Coach of the Year in 1986.

In 1987, Jay was named as the head coach at the University of Toledo. In four years at Toledo, he compiled a 62-57 record with three winning seasons. During his tenure, the Rockets earned victories over Minnesota, Pittsburgh, Houston and Cincinnati. In 1991, the Rockets were runners-up in the Mid-American Conference Tournament, losing to Eastern Michigan in the championship game, 67-66.

In six seasons as a collegiate head coach, Jay was 107-70.

In 1991, he became vice-president of basketball operations for the Louisville Shooters of the Global Basketball Association. He also spent one season as the coach of the South Georgia Blues.

In addition to his basketball coaching experience, Jay has an extensive background in broadcasting. He founded his own production company in 1991 called "Championship Coach's Corner." Over the years, he has been part of national and regional broadcasts and has done a variety of sports, ranging from college basketball to major league baseball. His programs have been broadcast on Fox Sportsnet, Comcast and WGN-Radio in Chicago.

In 1995, Eck returned to college basketball coaching when he joined Ken Burmeister's staff at Loyola University in Chicago. He spent four seasons with the Ramblers and played a major role in the rebuilding of Loyola's program.

He began his association with Coach Kennedy in 1999 at DePaul. Jay was the Director of Basketball Camps at DePaul while handling the Blue Demons' television and radio shows.

Coach Eck and his wife, Mary Beth, are the parents of four children. Their oldest son, Jason, is a 2000 graduate of the University of Wisconsin and a former football player for the Badgers. He is currently the tight ends coach at the University of Idaho on Dennis Erickson's staff.

Their second son, Brian, is an elementary school teacher and high school basketball coach in the Chicago area. A recent graduate of DePaul, he served as Coach Kennedy's basketball manager as an undergraduate. Their oldest daughter, Jenny, is a graduate of the University of Notre Dame while their youngest daughter, Meggie, is a graduate and former women's basketball team captain at Eastern Illinois University.

### Jim Meil

Assistant Coach  
Lehigh '82 • 16th Season

Jim Meil, an assistant coach at Towson University for 15 years before continuing his career at the University of Miami and Wagner College, has returned to the Tigers' basketball staff.

"Jim's overall background and success make him a great addition to an already strong coaching staff," says head coach Pat Kennedy. "He also gives us another very familiar face in the metropolitan Baltimore area. Jim was successful at Towson earlier because of his many local connections. He continued to maintain that presence here while at Miami and Wagner."

A Baltimore native, Jim is a 1978 graduate of The McDonogh School where he was a four-year starter and 1,000-point career scorer for the Eagles under Paul Smith. He was an assistant coach at Towson from 1982 to 1997. He began his stint under Vince Angotti and remained with the program when Terry Truax was hired in 1983.

From 1988 to 1994 Towson posted six straight winning seasons with a record of 112-65 (.633) that included three consecutive East Coast Conference championships, a school record 22-game home win streak and the Tigers' only two trips to the NCAA Division I Tournament.

The success coincided with the appearance of local Baltimore products Kurk Lee, Devin Boyd, Kelly Williamson, Kennell Jones and Terrance Jacobs, among many others, whom Jim was instrumental in recruiting.

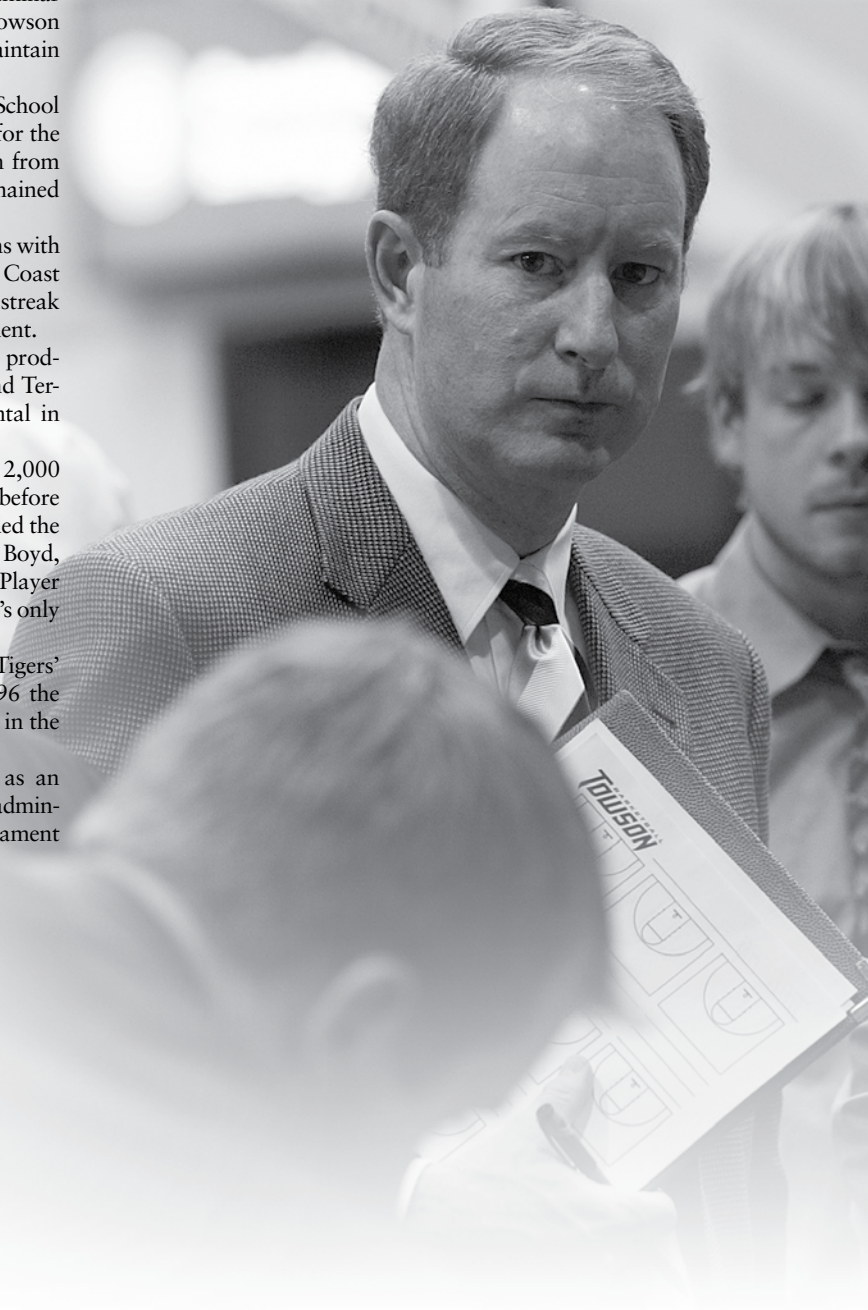
Boyd ended his career as Towson's all-time leading scorer with 2,000 points. Lee went on to play in the NBA with the New Jersey Nets before enjoying a lengthy professional career in Finland. Jones was named the ECC's 1990 Scholar-Athlete of the Year for men's basketball. Boyd, Lee and Jacobs, another European leaguer, each won the ECC Player of the Year award during their careers. Boyd and Lee are Towson's only Division I players to receive All-American honors.

Towson finished the 1993-94 seasons with a 21-9 record, the Tigers' only 20-win season thus far on the Division I level. In 1995-96 the Tigers were 16-12 to mark the only winning record for Towson in the last 11 seasons.

In 1997, Jim joined Leonard Hamilton's Hurricanes staff as an administrative assistant while earning a Master's degree in sports administration at Miami. The Hurricanes went to the NCAA Tournament both years he was associated with the program.

In 1999, Meil moved on to Wagner where he has served on the staff for the past seven years, four as an assistant coach and the last three as associate head coach. He was an assistant coach for Dereck Whittenburg for four seasons and Mike Deane for three years. Meil helped the Seahawks win three straight Northeast Conference scoring titles, along with three straight winning seasons, a 2002 NIT berth and the school's first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance in 2003.

Jim is a 1982 graduate of Lehigh where he earned a degree in marketing. He actually got his start in coaching while an undergraduate. After his freshman year, Jim became a student assistant under Brian Hill, currently the head coach of the NBA's Orlando Magic. As a senior, he was named head jayvee coach and directed the Engineers to a 12-6 record that year.

### Shaun Morris

**Coordinator of Basketball Operations**  
Lycoming, '05 • 3rd Season

Shaun is in his third year with the program and his second as its Coordinator of Basketball Operations.

Shaun's hails from a basketball family. His dad, John Morris, was a two-year starter at nearby Loyola College. Shaun's three brothers each

helped Trinity H.S. to a Pennsylvania State Class AA championship, and were 1,000-point career scorers in high school.

All have played college basketball. John, a 6-2 shooting guard, just finished his career at Old Dominion. Kevin is a 6-6 senior small forward at Lycoming and Brian is a 6-6 sophomore point guard who has transferred to Towson after an impressive freshman year at Richmond. He is sitting out the 2007-08 season due to the NCAA transfer rule.

Shaun was captain of Trinity's 29-4 team that won the 2001 state title, averaging 13.0 points, 7.0 assists and 5.0 rebounds. He was named to the All-Conference and All-District teams. On its way to the state title that year, Trinity beat a Gerry McNamara led Bishop Hannan squad in the Eastern Finals. John, as a junior, was the Shamrocks' leading scorer. Kevin was a freshman member of that team as well.

After a freshman year at Wheeling Jesuit University, Shaun transferred to Lycoming where he was a three-year starter, helping the Warriors to a 53-27 record, a MAC Freedom Conference championship and a trip to the 2004 NCAA Tournament. He finished his college career as the Warriors' all-time career assist leader with 355. His 154 assists in 2004-05 are a single season program record. He also holds the school mark for assists in a game with 12 against Delaware Valley.

Shaun was a captain in his senior year at Lycoming when he received the school's Academic Achievement Award for Men's Basketball. In his junior year the marketing major was the Dutch Burch Award winner. A Dean's List student, he was also an active member of the Institute of Management Studies

Brian came to Towson from the Baltimore Orioles Baseball Club. He was employed as a trainer at the Orioles' spring training facility in Sarasota, Fla.

where he was primarily responsible for long term rehabilitation and post-surgical care of the players in the organization.

In 2003 Brian was assigned by Orioles owner Peter Angelos to serve as the head athletic trainer for the Greek Olympic Baseball Team during the Athens Games. Angelos was the principal organizer and chief financial supporter for the Greek team.

A 2002 graduate of Salisbury University (Dean's List student) with a BS in Athletic Training, Brian went on to earn a Master of Science in Education with a concentration in Health Promotions at Virginia Tech. As a sports medicine graduate assistant he was assigned to the Virginia Tech football training staff.

In addition to his teaching experience ("Shoulder: Anatomy, Related Injuries, Assessments and Treatments") Brian has lectured at symposiums for various athletic trainers associations. His area of concentration has been the shoulder.

Brian is certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association, the Commonwealth of Virginia, the State of Florida and the American Heart Association Health Care Provider.

His association with Towson began long before he arrived on campus to join the athletic training staff. Both of Brian's parents, who continue to teach in Baltimore County middle schools, are Towson graduates. His sister, Megan, a Boston University graduate, served a one-year internship in Towson's athletic media relations office covering volleyball, women's basketball and women's lacrosse. After a year at Villanova, Megan has returned to BU as the Men's Basketball contact.



### Jon Korellis

Jon Korellis is the most recent addition to Pat Kennedy's staff, filling the position of volunteer assistant.

"What impresses you most about Jon immediately is his enthusiasm," Kennedy said. "He's anxious to learn and we're anxious to teach him."

Korellis is a 2005 graduate of Monmouth University where he earned a degree in history and education. He did not play collegiately, electing to get an early start on his coaching career which began when he was 18-years-old.

In his first year out of Middletown (N.J.) High School South he returned to his alma mater where he coached the Eagles' freshman team to 17 wins, matching their most victories ever in a season. While attending Middletown he was a two-year starter at point guard.

Jon then moved on to Metuchen High School as an assistant varsity coach under Rich Stoner. The Bulldogs had not posted a winning record since 1988. He helped guide them to three consecutive winning seasons, compiling a 54-22 record that included two state runner up finishes and a banner 22-3 record in 2005-06. That team was led by Marqus Blakely who averaged 19.4 points and 10.0 rebounds per game. Blakely is a sophomore at Vermont where he started 15 games as a freshman last year for the Catamounts.

Korellis also has coaching experience on the AAU circuit. He was an assistant to Joe Stein for the under 16 New Jersey ShoreShots. This past summer he was affiliated with Hoop Group working such events as the West Virginia Jamfest, Reebok Summer Classic and the Eastern Invitational Basketball Clinic.

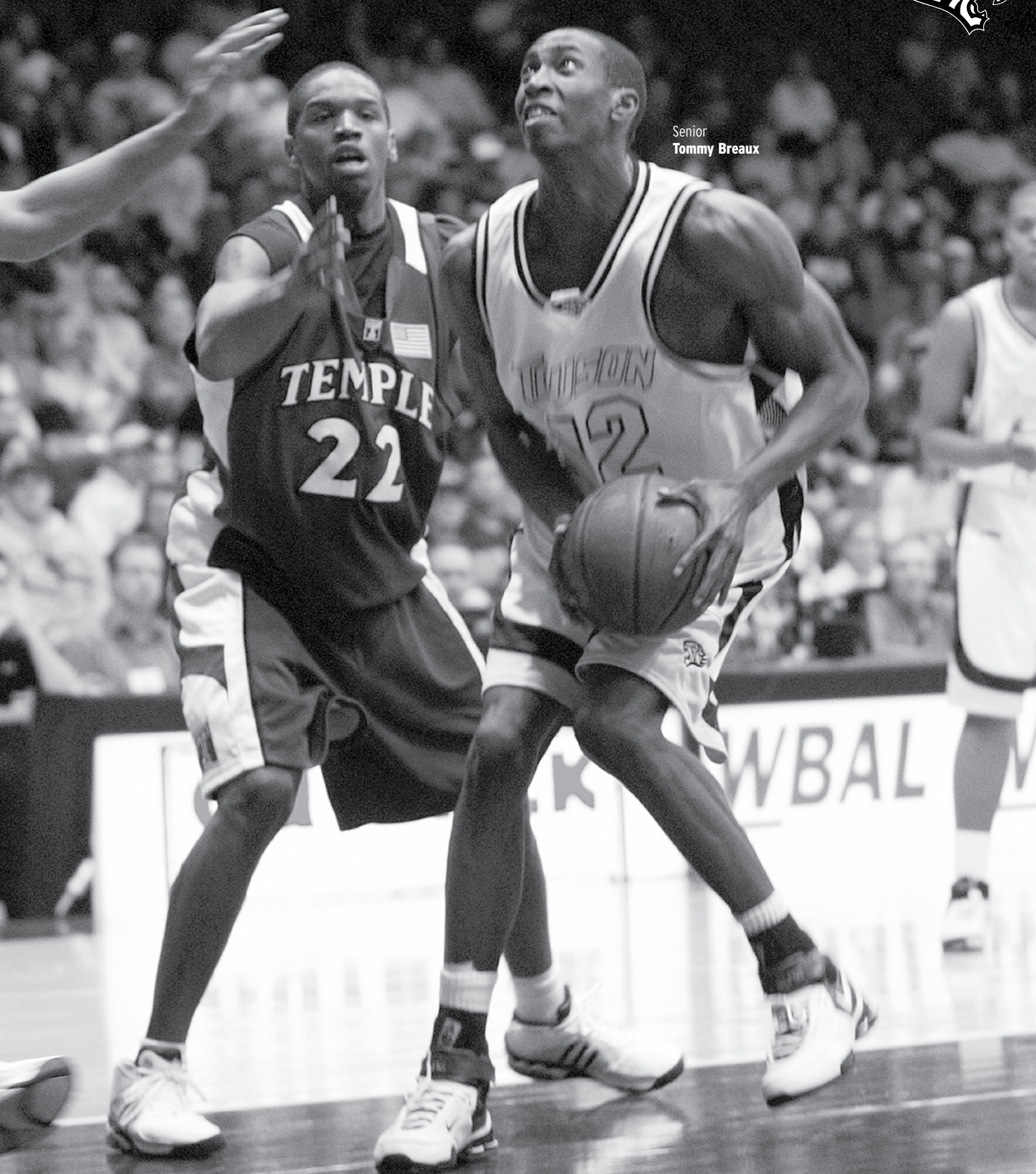

*Towson's ascent in the Colonial Athletic Association basketball standings is moving forward. How much higher the Tigers' climb takes them in 2007-08 depends upon how well they recover from the absence of their two highest scorers and top rebounder ...*

## STILL Climbing

In particular, the graduation of shooting guard Gary Neal, a 2,295 career-point scorer who pumped in a program record 810 points last year, means Towson's offense will experience change.

Gary accounted for 37% of the team's points last season, 49.2% of all made three-pointers and 40% of all made free throws while averaging a gaudy 25.6 ppg to rank among the top five nationally in scoring. He led the CAA in scoring by about a mile.

Coming up with a plan to distribute Neal's work load will be a top task for head coach Pat Kennedy, who must also deal with the loss of power forward Dennard Abraham, Towson's second leading scorer (11.2) and top rebounder (6.3). Abraham and Neal, who were the only players to average double figures, together accounted for 53% of the Tigers' points last year.

"Most coaches don't like to look on a stat sheet after the first eight games or so and see only two guys in double figures," says Kennedy. "Now we're looking to get back to that balance to be very good with four to five guys in double digits."

Towson's bench suffered a loss too with the graduation of forward Winstonn Tubbs who set a school record by appearing in 117 games (44 starts) over his career.

"We have some unknowns," says Kennedy. "There's a lot of productivity to make up for but we feel confident the group of newcomers will fill those voids."

Given the experience, balance, strength, speed and scoring ability of this year's group, perhaps the best plan is to run, wear down the opponents, and get everyone involved in the offense.

### BACKCOURT:

After three years, Kennedy knows how crucial good guard play is to achieving success in the CAA. But despite the loss of Neal, the Tigers happened to be loaded in the backcourt. Kennedy just has to figure out the winning combinations.

The bragging begins with the return of senior point guard C.C. Williams (6-0, 170). He was last year's third leading scorer (6.0) and led the Tigers in assists with many of his 131 dishes aimed at Neal.

"We had to depend on C.C. to be more of a play maker last year," says Kennedy. "That's going to change. We've seen in prac-

tice he can be much more. He'll become a more complete player this season."

The arrival of junior Vernon Carr (6-2, 200) out of Detroit's Redford H.S. is a definite boost. Carr played one season at Texas-El Paso before moving on to Pensacola (Fla.) Junior College where he averaged 15.0 points and 6.0 assists for the Pirates.

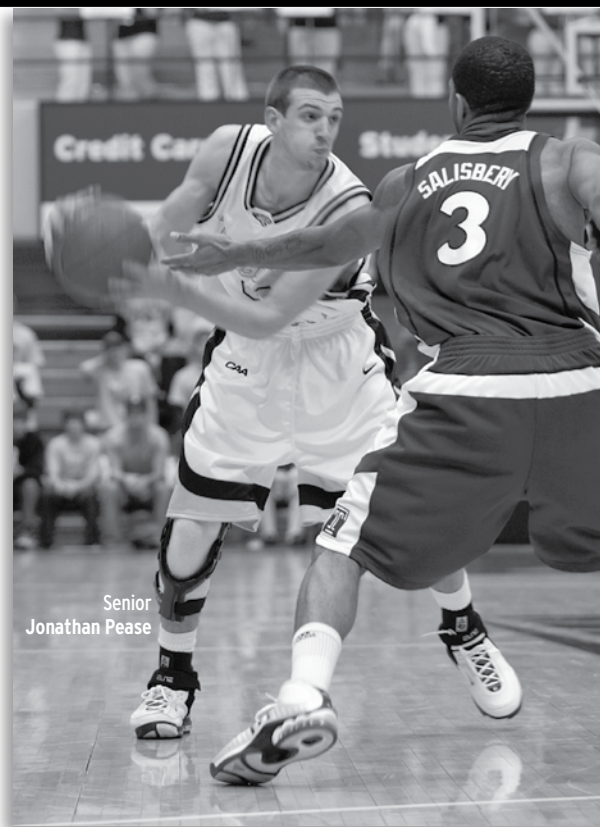
"Vernon can play the lead or off guard," says Kennedy. "He's a mature, solid mid-major Division I player. He shoots well and can score off the dribble."

Kennedy sees juniors Tim Crossin (6-1, 175) and Rocky Coleman (6-3, 185) shaking the sophomore slumps they suffered through last year.

"Both Timmy and Rocky give us quality experience," says the coach. "At times last year our guys would stand around watching Gary. When Gary didn't play they gave us a lot more. Now they can bring that attitude from day one."

Crossin and Coleman had excellent freshman years. Crossin was the only player to start all 28 games. Coleman was a starter 17 times. The sophomore jinx affected their playing time, cutting their minutes in 2006-07 almost in half.

Certain to have an immediate impact is

sophomore Josh Thornton (6-1, 175), a transfer from Georgetown who won't be eligible until the end of the 2007 Fall semester. Thornton was a prolific scorer at Caesar Rodney H.S. where he remains the all-time career points leader.

"He's a scorer," says Kennedy. "He's a very good shooter with excellent range on his jump shot. He's not a Gary Neal type - we see him more as an all purpose guard. He competed on a high level at Georgetown day in and day out. He gives us depth and experience."

### FRONTCOURT:

Towson's frontcourt has a little size, a little quickness and a little bulk. Sprinkle in a little experience and the Tigers just might have enough right stuff to stand up to anyone in the CAA.

The wing, or small forward, spot is once again the most competitive position on the squad. The talent runs deep here.

The early nod goes to returning starter, senior Jonathan Pease (6-6, 190) whose career has been stymied by knee problems. He sat out 2005-06 following surgery. After a slow start Jonathan became a fixture in the lineup last year. He's a shooter who expends a lot of energy on the floor. "Jonathan has had a very good offseason," says Kennedy.

"He worked hard in the strength program and has gained weight in the right places. He's fought through his injuries. I think he's ready to give us a big year."

Because of his size the coaching staff isn't sure where Junior Hairston (6-8, 205) is going to play. They're certain of one thing though - the junior College of Charleston transfer is going to play.

"Junior can play both inside and on the perimeter," says Kennedy. "At 6-8 he's going to pose problems for the opponents. He can post up and almost be a four (power forward) in our league."

A third contender for the wing position is sophomore Rodney Spruill (6-4, 210) a lefthander who showed a glimpse of his ability in last year's CAA tournament when he had back-to-back double digit games against UNC Wilmington and Old Dominion. In the final six games he averaged 7.4 points and 22.8 minutes.

"Rodney has lots of potential," says Kennedy, "and he'll continue to improve."

Further down the lane the Tigers are

counting on senior Tommy Breaux (6-8, 210) to have a monster year. Breaux had an immediate impact last year after a two-year junior college career. In his first year against Division I competition Tommy started 22 of 31 games, averaged 5.9 points and 4.5 rebounds. He shot .614 from the field and finished second in the CAA with 66 blocks. "A lot of our success is going to come down to the play of Tommy Breaux," says Kennedy. "We need him to give us more on offense. With more consistent minutes he can become a very great force in our league because of his defensive skills."

Kennedy, however, will have to wait see if Breaux recovers from a football injury. His participation this year is uncertain.

Breaux's late arrival might be just the break junior Tony Durant (6-8, 230) was looking for. This junior college transfer is sure to get plenty of early work, giving him time to build his case. "Tony, physically, is the prototype we're starting to see in the CAA," says Kennedy. "He also gives us the option of going big if we need to."



Durant led Butler (Kan.) Community College in scoring last year with a 15.8 clip, and in rebounding with a 7.1 average.

Returning for a fourth year in the program is senior Sean Raboin (6-7, 204) who has been a valuable contributor off the bench. "Sean works extremely hard," says Kennedy. "Whenever you call on him he doesn't back away."

Kennedy says freshman Robert Nwankwo (6-7, 210) is in the mix too. With the uncertainty of Tommy Breaux's availability for the season, Nwankwo has an opportunity to prove himself very early in his career.

## NON-CONFERENCE SCHEDULE

Two local rivalries along with six recent NCAA Tournament level teams highlight Towson's 2007-08 non-conference men's basketball schedule.

The Tigers and Loyola Greyhounds will tangle for the 58th time in Towson's season opener. It is the Tigers' longest standing local rivalry. In the last 21 years the Tigers and Greyhounds have met 20 times with the Tigers winning 14 of those contests. Fourteen of the last 15 games have been decided by 10 points or less in this intense, close neighborhood rivalry.

Bucknell is returning an ESPN BracketBuster game. The Bison beat the Tigers in Sojka Pavillion last year where they are almost unbeatable (47-9 up to game day). Towson and Bucknell were East Coast Conference rivals from 1982 to 1990 and have played a total of 24 times. Bucknell holds a 16-8 series lead. Twenty years ago, the two teams met for the ECC Championship at the Towson Center, with the Bison prevailing 86-74 to earn their first NCAA Tournament bid in program history.

Samford, an annual contender for the Ohio Valley Conference title, hosts Towson on November 20 in Birmingham, Ala. The Tigers beat the Bulldogs 69-62 in the first meeting ever between the two teams last season.

The Tigers remain on the road for the following game, traveling to Burlington where they'll face a former America East rival, Vermont on November 24. The two renewed their acquaintance last year in the Towson Center where the Tigers prevailed 67-54. They hadn't met since the 2000-01 regular season finale when the Catamounts won 77-72 to even the series at 7-7. The following year Towson left the America East league along with Delaware, Drexel and Hofstra for the Colonial Athletic Association, making room at the top for the Catamounts move up the America East ladder. Since then Vermont has appeared in five straight league tournament

championships, earning three NCAA bids and a berth in last year's NIT. This will be the 16th meeting with the Catamounts.

Towson is back home on November 27 to host first time opponent North Carolina Central out of the MEAC.

The Tigers then travel to Annapolis for their sixth game of the month to take on the Midshipmen on November 29. Navy and Towson haven't met since 1996. The Tigers are 6-1 in the series that began in 1987.

Temple, which escaped the Towson Center with a 75-70 win over the Tigers last year, will be tough at home in the Liacouras Center on December 6.

Niagara, another first-time opponent, visits the Towson Center on December 9. The Purple Eagles were 23-12 overall and 13-5 in the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference last year. They earned their second NCAA Tournament berth in the last three years by winning the MAAC Tournament title. Their 12-game winning streak in the stretch was the fourth longest winning streak in Division I last year.

The Tigers close out the home portion of their 2007 schedule by hosting another former ECC opponent, Lafayette, on December 19 in the 19th meeting between the two schools. The Tigers and Leopards last met in 1999 when Towson escaped Easton with a 59-57 win. Lafayette won Patriot League titles in 1999 and 2000, advancing to the NCAA Tournament each year.

Towson ends 2007 on the road at Auburn on December 29. Towson and Auburn met once before, 27 years ago, with the guys in burnt orange and navy blue winning 87-63.

On February 23 Towson will serve as a first-time host in the 6th Annual ESPN BracketBuster.

# 2006-07 Game-by-Game

## GAME 1: TIGERS TAKE SEASON OPENER, DOWN HARTFORD 78-64

TOWSON, Md. - Winstonn Tubbs gave Towson a lead it would not relinquish when he scored a layup for a 5-4 advantage at the 14:56 mark of the first half and then went on to record his first career double-double to show the way for the Tigers in a 78-64 season opening victory over visiting Hartford.

Hartford was determined to stay with the Tigers by shooting three-pointers. By the final whistle they had attempted 39 shots from beyond the arc, sinking a school record 12 of them. But the Tigers collected a lot of the misses, dominating the Hawks 43-32 off the boards with 29 of Towson's rebounds coming at the defensive end.

Towson led by as many as 15 points, 30-17, in the first half. The Hawks opened the second half with a 12-3 run that cut the Tigers' lead to one, 40-39. The Tigers then got six of those points back. Hartford could get no closer than three points, 56-53, with 7:54 to play. From there the Tigers steadily pulled away with their biggest lead of 14 points resulting in the final score.

Tubbs, a sometimes starter over his four-year career with the Tigers, hauled in a career high 13 rebounds and matched his career high with 15 points. He was one of four Towson players to register double figures.

Gary Neal, the leading returning scorer in Division I after averaging 26.1 points per game as a junior, was closely watched by the Hawks but managed a game high 20 points.

Tim Crossin was a perfect 4-4 from the floor, including three treys, to finish with 13 points. Junior guard C.C. Williams, seeing his first action in a Towson uniform after an outstanding career at Brunswick (N.C.) Community College, came off the bench to notch 11 points and dished out a team high four assists.

The Hawks' Joe Zeglinski led Hartford with 15 points. He was the big three-point shooter, attempting a school record 15 of them. He made four. Bob Taylor and Brian Glowiak each chipped in 12 points.

## GAME 2: NEAL'S 41 POINTS LEAD TIGERS TO 69-62 WIN OVER SAMFORD

TOWSON, Md. - Gary Neal continued his assault on the record books by scoring a career high 41 points to lead Towson to a 69-62 victory over Samford.

The win gets the Tigers, who led from the outset, off to their first 2-0 start since 1989, and it was accomplished against a Bulldogs team tabbed as the pre-season favorite to win the Ohio Valley Conference.

Neal's career high earned him another spot in Towson's record book. His 41 points set a new single game scoring high for a Tiger in the Towson Center, erasing the old mark of 39 points owned by Terrance Jacobs since 1992. Neal was 7-12 on three-pointers, matching the program's single game record he already owned. It was the second 40-point game of his career (40 vs. James Madison last year). He is only the second Towson player to have accomplished that feat.

The Tigers jumped off to a 9-1 lead ignited by Rocky Coleman's game opening three-pointer. Towson would spring to double-digit leads but the stubborn Bulldogs, who run a deliberate Princeton-style offense, would not go away.

Towson took a comfortable 38-25 lead at halftime and pushed it to 15, its largest margin, at the start of the second half on Tommy Breaux's slam dunk. But that's where Samford, now 1-2 on the year with its other loss coming at the hands of the defending national champion Florida Gators, drew the line. By the 16:03 mark of the second half the Tigers were clinging to a five-point lead, 41-36. The Bulldogs stayed within reach the rest of the way, trimming Towson's lead to just three, 59-56 with 1:33 remaining.

But that's when Neal turned it on. He hit his seventh three-pointer to put the Tigers up by six and scored nine of Towson's last 10 points, going 6 of 6 from the charity stripe. Over the last two years, Neal is 61 of 64 from the free throw line in the game's final four minutes.

Sophomore guard Tim Crossin was the only other Towson player in double figures, netting 10 points. He added a game high six assists too. Senior forward Winstonn Tubbs showed the way on the boards for the Tigers with eight rebounds.

## GAME 3: KANSAS HANDS TIGERS FIRST LOSS OF SEASON, 87-61

LAWRENCE, Kan. - Towson's hopes for its first 3-0 start in over three decades were dashed when Kansas tagged the Tigers with an 87-61 loss in Allen Fieldhouse in the first leg of the Las Vegas Invitational.

The loss dropped the Tigers to 2-1 while the Jayhawks, who were upset 78-71 by Oral Roberts four nights ago, improved to 2-1.

The Tigers hung tough with the No. 3-ranked Jayhawks until Kansas began sinking three pointers. Six of KU's last 10 baskets of the first half were treys. That barrage enabled the Jayhawks to go on a 20-6 run and break away from an 18-17 score at the 9:26 mark. The run helped Kansas to a 42-25 lead at the half.

Oddly enough those were the last points Kansas would score from beyond the arc.

The situation didn't improve for the Tigers in the second half. With the Jayhawks all over Towson's leading scorer, Gary Neal, the Tigers' offense sputtered. Meanwhile the Jayhawks were warming to the sellout crowd of 16,300. In the process their lead over Towson ballooned to 26 points. Kansas led by as many as 29 points (79-50) with 3:34 remaining to play.

With Towson's main force in the middle, Dennard Abraham, on the bench nursing an injury the Jayhawks, in particular freshman sensation Darrell Arthur, had a field day. Arthur led all scorers with 26 points off 10 of 12 shooting from the field. Many of those were layups and dunks. He also collected eight rebounds.

Neal was the only Tiger in double figures with 17 points. His production came the hard way with Kansas players draped all over him.

# SEASON REVIEW

## GAME 4: WESTERN KENTUCKY CATCHES TIGERS FLAT, WINS 95-72

**BOWLING GREEN, Ky.** - For the second time on their eight day trip in the Findlay Toyota Las Vegas Invitational the Tigers ran into a quick, sharp shooting opponent as Western Kentucky downed Towson 95-72.

The loss evened the Tigers' record at 2-2 while the win extended the Hilltoppers' unbeaten record to 4-0, a mark that includes a 70-67 victory at Georgia.

The 95 points were the most ever allowed by a Pat Kennedy coached Towson team.

The Hilltoppers, who are favored to win the Sun Belt Conference title this season, had a double digit lead over the Tigers by the 10:44 mark of the first half. The Tigers cut that to eight points but Western Kentucky shot its way to double digits again a little over three minutes later. The Hilltoppers eventually worked to a 15-point lead, 43-28, at the break.

The Tigers would get no closer than 13 points the rest of the way. The Hilltoppers led by as many as 25 late in the contest. It seemed every time Towson would register a two-point basket the Hilltoppers would answer with a three-point play, either sinking a trey from beyond the arc or converting it the old fashion way with a free throw after a made bucket.

Both teams shot over 50 per cent for the game. The Tigers hit 10 of their first 12 shots in the second half on the way to a 68.2% performance from the floor in the final 20 minutes but they couldn't overcome WKU's 11 of 27 showing from three-point territory or a 38-24 Hilltopper advantage off the boards. Fourteen of WKU's boards were offensive.

**Tommy Breaux** led Towson with a career high 14 points. **Gary Neal** had another tough evening, scoring 13 points with seven of those coming at the charity stripe. **Winston Tubbs** scored 10 points and grabbed a game high eight rebounds. **Rocky Coleman** added 10 points too.

Thirteen different Hilltoppers scored led by their All-American candidate, **Courtney Lee** with 21 points.

## GAME 5: DOESN'T GET ANY CLOSER AS TIGERS OUTLAST UTC 56-55

**LAS VEGAS, Nev.** - There were 24 lead changes and 10 ties before **Gary Neal's** driving layup with 7.9 seconds left in the game decided the final as Towson edged Tennessee-Chattanooga 56-55 in third round play of the Findlay Toyota Las Vegas Invitational in the Orleans Arena.

The victory snapped a two-game losing streak for the Tigers who improved to 3-2 on the year. The Mocs dropped to 2-3 with the loss.

The largest lead in the game was five points, once in the first half by Towson at 12-7 and once by the Mocs at 48-43 in the second half.

The Mocs managed a 30-28 halftime lead to set up a back-and-forth second half.

### GAME 6: TENNESSEE STATE CATCHES TIGERS ON A COLD DAY

LAS VEGAS, Nev. - It never gets cold in Las Vegas but the Tigers couldn't warm up and suffered through their worst single game shooting performance in program history as Tennessee State handed them a 49-47 setback in their final game of the Las Vegas Invitational in the Orleans Arena.

Towson made just 14 of 57 field goal attempts for a school record low 24.6 FG%. Tennessee State didn't shoot a whole lot better but those Tigers made them when it counted.

The cold spell hit the Tigers right from the outset. Tennessee State owned the lead for most of the first half, but not by more than five points. **Tim Crossin's** three-pointer at the 6:36 mark put Towson out front for the rest of the period. Tennessee St. kept Towson in its sights and trailed Towson 25-24 at halftime.

Towson's shooting slump continued in the second half when they made only 20 per cent of their attempts, resulting in a 32-25 lead for Tennessee State early in the period. The Tigers tried to work their way through the cold spell and eventually knotted the score at 34-34 on another Crossin trey. From that point there were six lead changes and four ties.

Two **Gary Neal** free throws with 2:42 left to play gave Towson its biggest lead of the second half, 47-43. But those proved to be the Tigers' final points of the contest. Towson's final six shots of the game missed the mark, the last was rejected.

With 2:06 left TSU's **Courtney Bohannon** sank his only shot of the game, a three-pointer, to pull his Tigers within one, 47-46. Towson made several stops on defense but couldn't find the bucket.

TSU's **Moray Ivy** finally got loose for a layup to put his team up 48-47 with 50 seconds remaining.

Towson had several looks at the basket but the ball just wouldn't drop for the Tigers. Tennessee State's **Clarence Matthews** made the play of the game when he blocked a **Dennard Abraham's** short jumper that surely would have scored with three seconds left. The Tigers then had to foul **LaDarious Weaver** with 2.3 seconds on the clock. Weaver made the front end of the one-and-one.

Neal and C.C. Williams shared scoring honors for the Tigers with 10 points each. Abraham collected a career high 13 rebounds with **Winstonn Tubbs** hauling in another 10.

### GAME 7: DEFENSE KEYS TIGERS' 67-54 VICTORY OVER VERMONT

TOWSON, Md. - Towson broke from the gate and never looked back, powered by a game high 29 points from senior guard **Gary Neal** and a defense that blocked 12 shots, one short of the school record, in a 67-54 victory over Vermont.

The victory pushed the Tigers to 4-3 on the year, 3-0 at home while the Catamounts, still tingling over a 77-63 win at Boston College in mid-December, dropped to 3-4. It was the first meeting between the two teams in five years when both were members of the America East Conference. The win gives Towson the advantage, 8-7, in the series.

Junior guard **C.C. Williams** got the Tigers going early when he scored on a put back just 32 seconds into the contest for a 2-0 lead. The Catamounts could not wrestle the lead away from Towson. There were no ties.

Neal's three-pointer a couple of minutes later put the Tigers ahead 5-0. **Kyle Cieplicki** and **Joe Trapani** answered for Vermont to close to 5-4 but that's as close as the Catamounts would come to the Tigers the rest of the way. Towson took a four-point lead (26-22) into the locker room at halftime.

The Catamounts hung around for most of the second period until Neal took over in the last seven minutes when he registered 12 of his 21-second half points. He started his run with two free throws that gave the Tigers a 50-40 lead. He scored 12 of Towson's last 17 points. Towson biggest lead was 17, 67-50, that came off a **Tommy Breau** dunk.

While Neal was handling a lot of the scoring chores his teammates were piling up the defensive kudos with **Breaux** and junior forward **Jonathan Pease** showing the way. **Breaux** had half of Towson's 12 blocks. **Pease** had a near game breaker when he hustled down the floor on a Catamount fast break to block **Trapani's** layup. Towson hustled the ball down the floor where sophomore guard **Tim Crossin** hit a three-pointer for a five-point swing with 11:24 left in the game and a 48-35 Tiger lead.

Crossin came off the bench and scored 13 points. He was the only other Towson player in double figures. It was the first time in his high school and college career he had not started a game, year.

### GAME 8: TU EARNS 1ST WIN OVER W&M IN WILLIAMSBURG, 73-60

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. - **Gary Neal** scored a game high 26 points and got plenty of help from his teammates as the Tigers opened play in the Colonial Athletic Association with a first-ever victory over William & Mary in Williamsburg, beating the Tribe 73-60.

The win improved the Tigers to 5-3 on the year and 1-0 in the league. It was Towson's first win at William & Mary in eight tries.

The Tribe scored first to go up 2-0 but Neal answered a minute later with a three-pointer to give Towson a lead it would not relinquish but would have to play hard to keep.

William & Mary kept the Tigers within reach until a pair of Neal free throws ignited an 8-0 run that put Towson ahead 32-21 with 4:04 left in the first half. Neal then scored eight of Towson's last 10 points of the period to send the Tigers into the locker room with a 17-point lead, 42-25. The Tigers shot 55 per cent in the opening period with Neal and **Rocky Coleman** combining for 9 of 13 from the floor and 25 of Towson's 42 points.

The Tribe quickly cut into Towson's lead at the outset of the second half with a 10-2 run fueled by **David Schneider's** three-pointers. The Tigers opened it up again to 11 but the Tribe came right back on a third **Schneider** trey to cut it to six, 53-47 at the 10:45 mark.

Layups by **C.C. Williams** and **Jonathan Pease** put the Tigers back on top by 10 points. The Tribe was able to trim Towson's lead to eight points, twice, in the next two minutes. **Rodney Spruill** drained a baseline jumper with 3:58 left to play to stretch the lead to double digits for most of the rest of the contest.

The Tigers, who shot 53 per cent from the floor for the game, out muscled the Tribe on the boards, 37-26, with **Dennard Abraham's** eight rebounds showing the way. **Abraham** tossed in 14 points as he registered his best effort of the season thus far.

# SEASON REVIEW

## GAME 9: SLOW START GIVES TEMPLE EARLY LEAD IN 75-70 WIN

TOWSON, Md. - Temple built an 18-point lead then spent the rest of the game keeping Towson from erasing it as the Owls held on for a 75-70 win handing the Tigers their first setback of the season in the Towson Center.

The loss dropped the Tigers to 5-4 on the year and 3-1 at home and ended a modest two-game win streak. The Atlantic 10 Owls improved to 4-3 with the victory in their first meeting ever with the Tigers.

Mark Tyndale's three-pointer with 4:45 left in the first half gave Temple its biggest lead of the contest, 32-14. Towson closed the period with a 16-6 run that cut the deficit to eight, 38-30, by halftime.

The Tigers scored the first five points of the second half with Gary Neal's trey trimming Temple's lead to just three points, 38-35. The Owls went on a 7-0 tear to raise Towson's deficit to double digits again. After that each time the Tigers threatened to narrow the gap into low single digits the Owls would answer with enough offense to turn their lead back up to 10, 11 and 12 points.

Two Dennard Abraham free throws with 6:26 remaining in the contest cut Temple's lead to nine, 64-55. From there the Owls exhibited a defensive posture, playing more to protect their advantage. Towson came within three points four times in the final two minutes.

With time running out the Tigers were forced to foul. Temple scored its last seven points from the charity stripe. Tim Crossin's three-pointer with four seconds remaining made it a 73-70 contest but Tyndale converted both ensuing free throws when fouled on the inbound.

Temple was led by sophomore Dionte Christmas who pumped in a career high 29 points. He also paced the Owls with five assists. Senior Dustin Salisbury racked up a double-double with 14 points and 12 rebounds. Tyndale finished with 14 points.

Abraham paced the Tigers with 25 points, just two points shy of his career high. He also grabbed nine rebounds. Neal, the leading scorer in the Colonial Athletic Association, registered 20 points. Junior guard C.C. Williams matched his career high with 11 points and added a career high six assists.

## GAME 10: GEORGETOWN TOUGH INSIDE, HANDS TIGERS 69-41 LOSS

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Georgetown used its decisive size advantage to bully the Tigers inside and added some sharp shooting on the perimeter on its way to a 69-41 victory over TU in the Verizon Center.

The 41 points were the lowest for Towson in a game since a 76-37 loss at UNC Wilmington in 2002.

Georgetown's front line of 7-2 Roy Hibbert, 6-9 Jeff Green and 6-8 DaJuan Summers, combined for 38 points on 15-23 shooting. Junior guard Jonathan Wallace led the Hoyas' outside game, going 5 of 5 from the field including a perfect 4-4 from beyond the arc. For the game the Hoyas shot 59 per cent from floor and were 12 of 21 from three point land.

There were four lead changes and one tie before the Hoyas broke to the front for good on Hibbert's dunk at the 12:55 mark for an 11-9 advantage. Both teams relied on perimeter shooting in the opening session. Five of Towson's six first half field goals were treys while seven of Georgetown's 13 shots were launched from way out.

What kept the Tigers in the game early was their free throw shooting. Towson was nine of 10 at the charity stripe. The Hoyas couldn't buy a free throw but they couldn't miss much from the three-point circle, sinking four of them in the final four minutes to give them their biggest lead of the half, 11 points. But Gary Neal's trey with four seconds left cut Georgetown's margin to eight, 34-26, at the break. That would be as close as the Tigers would come the rest of the contest.

Georgetown picked up the pace in the second half, sprinting to a 17-point lead at the midway mark. Towson scored only 15 points in the second half.

The Tigers shot 26.1 per cent, the fifth lowest field goal percentage for a game in program history. The Hoyas posted a 58.7 per cent mark. The Tigers were outboarded 36-21.

Neal scored over half of Towson's points, netting a game high 26. All of his field goals were 3-pointers as he tied the school single game record by making seven of them. Tommy Breaux was the Tigers' second leading scorer with six points. He added three blocks.

## GAME 11: BREAU SPARKS 80-59 VICTORY OVER WINSTON-SALEM

TOWSON, Md. - Leading scorer Gary Neal put up his average but he got plenty of help from Tommy Breaux who pitched in with a career high 20 points as Towson snapped a two-game losing streak with a convincing 80-59 victory over Winston-Salem State Friday night in the Towson Center.

The win boosted the Tigers to 6-5 overall and 4-1 at home this season. The Rams suffered their 13th straight loss and dropped to 1-16 on the year.

Neal, the Colonial Athletic Association's leading scorer, registered a game high 26 points, added seven assists, five rebounds and claimed all three team steals for the Tigers who tallied a season high with their 80 points.

But it was Breaux's play that ignited the Tigers. Breaux, a junior college transfer making just his fourth start for Towson, was a perfect six of six from the field, a performance that included four spectacular dunks. He added another eight points from the free throw line and recorded four blocks in 28 minutes of play.

There were two lead changes and a tie before the Tigers turned it on. Neal sparked a 15-0 run with two three-pointers and a couple of free throws that helped to open up a 32-16 lead with 4:26 left in the first half.

After Towson had assumed a 40-28 lead at the break the Rams opened the second half with an 8-4 run that cut the Tigers' lead to eight, 44-36. But that's as close as the Rams would get the rest of the evening. Breaux's dunk in the waning moments put the Tigers up by 24, their largest lead.

Breaux also finished the game with a career high eight rebounds. Dennard Abraham and Rocky Coleman each had 12 points. The Tigers shot a season high 54 per cent from the floor and outboarded the Rams 41-35.

Freshman guard Brian Fisher paced Winston-Salem with a career high 27 points and a team high five rebounds. His 27 points are a single game high for the Rams thus far this season.

### GAME 12: VCU RALLIES, FORCES 2 OT'S TO SUBDUDE TIGERS 84-80

TOWSON, Md. - Towson entered its home Colonial Athletic Association contest against Virginia Commonwealth as the best free throw shooting team in the league but misses at the charity stripe added up helping the Rams come from behind to beat the Tigers 84-80 in double overtime.

The Tigers, tops in the CAA free throw standings and 11th nationally with a .759 clip, were 18 of 31 in the game and 14 of 24 at the end of regulation when the score was knotted at 58-58.

Towson overcame an early second half 10-point deficit (34-24 at 17:01) and grabbed the lead 44-43 on a Dennard Abraham layup with 9:23 left. The Tigers kept VCU at bay for the next 16 minutes and 44 seconds, fighting off two ties.

The Rams forced both overtimes with last second heroics by Jesse Pellot-Rosa (two free throws with three seconds left in regulation) and Eric Maynor (running jumper with eight seconds left to end the first overtime tied at 70-70).

With 38 seconds left in the second overtime B.A. Walker put the Rams on top 82-80 with a three-pointer. Walker had the hot hand for the Rams in the late going. He scored just two points in the first half. He finished with a team high 23, netting eight in the overtimes.

The Tigers waited for the clock to run down. Gary Neal drove the lane and missed with a floater. The Rams' Jamal Shuler was fouled on the rebound with four seconds left. He hit both free throws to end the scoring and the longest game for the Tigers since a 71-69 win over Morgan State in the Guardians Classic on November 16, 2004.

It was the Rams' 11th victory over the Tigers in the 12-game series.

Neal, the CAA's leading scorer, paced Towson with a game high 36 points, including 13 in the overtimes. Abraham recorded his fifth career double-double with 16 points and a game high 12 rebounds. Tommy Breaux grabbed a career high 11 rebounds and added six blocked shots. Tim Crossin chipped in 12 points off four treys and dished out seven assists.

Walker led four players in double figures for the Rams, who entered the game as the CAA's top scoring team.

### GAME 13: TIGERS DROP 2ND STRAIGHT DOUBLE OVERTIMER

ATLANTA, Ga. - For the first time in school history the Tigers played a second straight double-overtime game, with similar results, falling 87-81 at Georgia State.

Towson was fresh off an 84-80 double overtime loss at home to VCU. The Panthers made Towson relive the disappointment.

It took the Tigers a while to warm up. Rocky Coleman opened the game's scoring by hitting the front end of a two-shot free throw just 20 seconds into the contest. The Tigers then suffered through a scoring drought that lasted nearly 5:00. Meanwhile the Panthers were on a 9-0 run. Tommy Breaux's dunk stopped it. Even though the Panthers had a 10-point lead twice in the next several minutes Towson had found the range and began its comeback.

Leading scorer Gary Neal tallied to get into the act. A limbered up Neal combined with Coleman to score 19 of Towson's last 26 points in the half. Coleman's trey at the 5:44 mark knotted the score for the first time at 24-24. A pair of made free throws by Neal put the Tigers out front for the first time, 33-32. C.C. Williams gave Towson its largest lead of the first half when he scored on a short bank shot with two seconds left to send the Tigers into the locker room with a 35-32 advantage.

The second half was played much closer, featuring eight lead changes and three ties. A Coleman three-pointer with 5:15 left in regulation gave the Tigers their largest lead of the game, 62-56. But GSU was persistent and kept the Tigers in sight until Rashad Chase's three-pointer with 11.4 seconds left forced the first overtime by ending regulation 64-64.

Coleman's two free throws gave TU the early advantage in the first overtime but the Panthers' Chase answered quickly to tie it up. Towson would not lead again.

Neal's floater in the lane with 26 seconds left knotted the score at 72-72. The Panthers then missed twice, necessitating a second overtime.

Lance Perique then scored seven of his team high 26 points in the second overtime to show the way. But it was another Chase three-pointer with 28.6 seconds left for an 87-79 lead that sealed it.

Coleman registered a career high 21 points and added seven rebounds.

### GAME 14: TIGERS SET FG% RECORD IN 75-68 VICTORY OVER DELAWARE

NEWARK, Del. - The Tigers were determined not to endure a third straight double-overtime affair and played hard so as not to three-peat, earning a 75-68 win at Delaware.

The Tigers accomplished the task with flair, setting a Carpenter Center record for field goal percentage by shooting 62.5% for the contest. That's the best field goal shooting for Towson in 366 days, or since Jan. 7, 2006 when they posted a similar percentage in a 99-84 win at James Madison.

Towson also overcame its free throw woes of the past two games when the Tigers missed a total of 23, connecting on 20 of 23 attempts from the charity stripe.

The Blue Hens owned the first half. A 5-0 run to end the period allowed the Tigers to cut Delaware's lead to 37-33 at the break.

Coming out of the locker room to start the second half, the Tigers exploded for an 18-7 run over the first five minutes to turn their four-point deficit into a seven-point lead at 51-44. Tommy Breaux and Dennard Abraham combined for 12 points during the run while Crossin had three points and two assists.

However, the Blue Hens stuck around and tied things up at 53-53, and held a brief lead, 63-62, with 5:45 left on the clock. But the Tigers got the advantage right back and never trailed again as Dennard Abraham and Gary Neal combined for 11 stretch run points.

Neal showed the way for Towson by hitting 9 of 18 shots from the floor along with a perfect 8-for-8 performance at the free throw line for 27 points, marking his eighth straight game with 20 points. Abraham added his sixth career "double double" with 13 points and 10 rebounds while Tommy Breaux posted 10 points.

Herb Courtney led the Blue Hens in the first half with 20 points. He finished with a game and career high 29 points.

The wins was only Towson's 5th in 18 trips to the Carpenter Center. It was Delaware's 7th straight loss at home, tying a home loss record set in 1964-65.

# SEASON REVIEW

## GAME 15: GEORGE MASON CLICKS, TAMES TIGERS 73-44

TOWSON, Md. - George Mason started an avalanche that Towson couldn't stop as the Patriots handed the Tigers their worst home loss in four years, 73-44, in a Colonial Athletic Association contest.

It was George Mason's 10th straight win over the Tigers since Towson joined the league six years ago. The win improved the Patriots' record to 8-7 overall and 2-3 in the CAA. GMU has won its last two games since opening its league schedule with three losses. TU dropped to 7-8 and 2-3 in conference play.

The Patriots, an NCAA Final Four team last year, never trailed. Freshman **Rodney Spruill** scored on a layup with 10:09 left in the first half to pull the Tigers to within two, 15-13. But that's as close as Towson would come the rest of the way.

After stopping the Patriots on their next trip down the floor, **Jordan Carter** blocked Spruill's three-point attempt. Carter gathered in the ball and raced down court for the layup and a 17-13 lead. That play ignited a 12-2 run for George Mason. The Patriots maintained at least a 10-point cushion over the Tigers for the rest of the half. **Folarin Campbell**'s jumper with two seconds left in the first period sent the Patriots into the locker room with a 33-19 lead.

The situation slowly deteriorated for Towson in the second half. The Tigers' shots just wouldn't fall as they continued to lose ground on the Patriots who shot 52.5 per cent from the floor including a 9 for 19 effort from three-point range. George Mason steadily increased its lead to 35 points (73-38) with 2:51 left in the game.

Campbell showed the way for the Patriots with 18 points. Junior forward **Will Thomas**, a product of Baltimore's Mt. St. Joseph H.S., registered 16 points in his homecoming appearance.

Towson, suffering its worst defeat in the Towson Center since an 82-47 loss to Virginia Commonwealth in 2003, was paced by **Gary Neal**'s 18 points. Junior forward **Tommy Breaux** chipped in a game high nine rebounds.

## GAME 16: TIGERS' RALLY FALLS SHORT, VCU HANGS ON FOR WIN

RICHMOND, Va. - It was fortunate for Virginia Commonwealth that it shot well from the free throw line because the Rams needed every one they made to subdue a stubborn Towson team 85-77.

The situation looked bleak for the Tigers in the early going. It appeared the league leading Rams might just run Towson out of the gym. Towson skipper **Pat Kennedy**, working his 800th game as a Division I college head coach, drew on every coaching trick he knew to get his Tigers back on track. With 4:39 left in the first half Towson was out of time outs. Kennedy had used them all in an effort to settle his squad down. That strategy, and a lecture at halftime, turned the Tigers around as they played an outstanding second half, just falling short.

The Rams, who needed double overtime to beat the Tigers just 10 days ago in the Towson Center, were 28 of 38 from the charity stripe. They scored 17 of their last 20 points in the game from the free throw line to hold off Towson's furious rally.

Towson outscored VCU 51-46, shot 58 per cent from the floor, made all 11 free throws and twice cut VCU's lead to three points - all in the second half in an effort to overcome woeful first period when the Tigers had fallen behind by as many as 18 points.

Both teams struggled early to find the basket. Eight minutes into the contest the Rams led 12-3.

VCU was the first to warm up. Powered by a 9-0 run the Rams sprinted to a 23-8 lead three minutes later. TU outscored the Rams 18-16 the rest of the way to trail 39-26 at the break.

The Rams' largest lead was 18 points, 32-14, in the first half. By the 16:11 mark of the second half the Tigers had trimmed that margin to five points.

VCU tried time and again to distance itself from Towson but the pesky Tigers hung around. Winstonn Tubbs' putback with 4:51 left to play narrowed the gap to three, 71-68. The Tigers stayed right on VCU's heels but from there the Rams were unstoppable at the charity stripe, making 14 of their last 15.

Gary Neal led the Tigers with 33 points on 12 for 19 shooting from the field and a 6 for 6 performance at the charity stripe. He also added a team high five assists. Tubbs finished with 12 points and **Dennard Abraham** tossed in 10. **Tommy Breaux**'s six rebounds were a Towson high.

### GAME 17: TIGERS NEVER TRAIL IN 70-62 WIN OVER LOYOLA

BALTIMORE, Md. - Playing three games in five days can be tough for any team, but the Tigers showed no signs of fatigue as they snapped a two-game losing skid with a 70-62 victory over local rival Loyola at Reitz Arena in the 57th meeting between the two schools. The win also stopped a four-game winning streak the Greyhounds had going.

Gary Neal scored a game-high 33 points to show the way for the Tigers, who never trailed in the game and twice turned back the Greyhounds when the score was tied.

Led by Neal, the Tigers jumped out to a 21-13 lead in the first 10 minutes of the game. He scored 10 of the Tigers' first 16 points to open the game.

The Tigers built their advantage to 30-18 before the Greyhounds responded with 10 straight points, including a pair of three-point baskets by sophomore Marquis Sullivan, to cut the margin to 30-28 with 1:40 remaining. But, a lay-up by senior Dennard Abraham and a pair of free throws by Neal extended the advantage back to 34-28. A three-pointer by Loyola senior Gerald Brown as the first half ended gave Towson a 34-31 cushion at the intermission.

After Abraham opened the second period with a lay-up, LC ran off six straight points to cut the deficit to 36-35 on a Brown lay-up with 18:05 left in the stanza. However, the Tigers scored five of the next seven points to regain a four-point advantage.

The Tigers scored 12 of the next 13 points to take a 49-38 advantage with 11:43 remaining. However, Loyola answered by tallying 11 of the next 14 points over the next three minutes to narrow the gap to 52-49 with 5:43 left.

Neal led the Tigers on a brief five-point run by scoring three of the points and assisting on junior C.C. Williams' lay-up before Sullivan hit his fourth three-pointer of the game for a 57-52 margin. After the Greyhounds closed to within 63-59, the Tigers hit six straight free throws for a 10-point advantage, sealing the victory.

Neal, ranked fifth among NCAA Division I scorers, made 9 of 15 shots from the floor to lead three Tigers in double figures as Williams added 13 points along with 11 points from Abraham. Sophomore Tim Crossin went scoreless for the first time in his college career. Brown, the 7th-ranked scorer nationally, paced Loyola with 26 points.

### GAME 18: HOFSTRA PROTECTS HOME COURT WIN STREAK

HEMPSTEAD, N.Y. - Hofstra played hard from wire to wire to protect its regular season 24-home game victory streak and had to come up with some final second heroics to hold off the Tigers for a 79-74 victory. There were 13 lead changes and nine ties before the outcome was decided.

### GAME 19: TIGERS DOWN DEFENDING LEAGUE CHAMPION UNCW 75-61

TOWSON, Md. - Before their CAA meeting with UNC Wilmington, Towson coach Pat Kennedy reminded his players of the 32-point shellacking the Seahawks put on the Tigers last year. The memory of that loss, and solid play on Towson's part, boosted the Tigers to a convincing 75-61 win over UNCW in 2006-07.

"You look at this series over the years and they've sort of had our number," Kennedy said after his Tigers forced 24 Seahawk turnovers while shooting 52% from the floor to gain just their sixth win over UNC Wilmington in the 17-game series. It was only Towson's second win over the Seahawks in the last 10 games while the Tigers have been members of the CAA.

Except for 33 seconds in the first half, the Tigers led the entire way, leading by as many as 18 points twice in the second half.

Gary Neal, the CAA's leading scorer who is ranked fifth nationally, put up the first points of the game 26 seconds into the contest when he buried a three-pointer. The Seahawks stayed close for the opening nine minutes and actually took a one-point lead, 10-9, at the 11:39 mark when Vladimir Kuljanin converted two free throws.

A three-pointer 33 seconds later by Jonathan Pease gave back to the Tigers the lead that they would not relinquish again. By the break Towson was on top, 35-29.

TU's improved shooting continued in the second half when the Tigers shot 60% and the Seahawks 44% after a 50% showing in the opening period. The Tigers raced to a double-digit lead just 2:16 into the second half. The Seahawks would come no closer than 10 points the rest of the way. Neal finished with 19 points, ending a streak of three games in which he had scored at least 31 points. It was also the first time this season Neal was not Towson's leading scorer in a victory. Neal did add a career high nine assists.

Top scoring honors went to Towson's Dennard Abraham who registered a game high 20 points. C.C. Williams handed out a career high 10 assists. T h e Tigers put four players in double figures with Pease adding 11 points and junior forward Tommy Breaux scoring 10.

# SEASON REVIEW

## GAME 20: NEAL REACHES 2,000 CAREER POINTS, BLUE HENS FALL

TOWSON, Md. - Gary Neal needed 36 points to reach 2,000 for his college career. He got every one of them in leading the Tigers to an 85-63 CAA win over Delaware, marking the largest margin of victory for Towson in the 57-game series.

With 2:56 remaining Neal sank a trey to record his 36th point in 31 minutes of play. The game was well in hand for the Tigers who led by as many as 34 points (78-44) with 5:46 left in the contest.

Led by Neal, who scored 13 points in the first half, the Tigers raced to a 13-0 lead in the opening 5:21 of the game. Back-to-back three-point baskets by Tim Crossin, who snapped a 3-game scoring slump, enabled the Tigers to stretch their lead to 27-9 with 7:36 left in the half.

Rodney Spruill, who scored a career high 10 points in the win, scored the final five points of the half as the Tigers went to halftime with a 44-21 lead.

In the opening minutes of the second half, the Tigers stretched their lead to 55-23 on a basket by senior Dennard Abraham. When junior Tommy Breau made a pair of free throws with 5:46 left, the Tigers opened up a 78-44 lead, their largest lead of the game.

After Coach Pat Kennedy emptied his bench in the final minutes, the Blue Hens pulled to within 20 points before the Tigers cruised to the win. Towson played a school record 16 players in the game.

Neal, the fifth-leading scorer in NCAA Division I, shot 14-for-24 from the floor while playing 31 minutes in his 36-point performance. He was 6-for-12 from three-point range and had four rebounds, four assists and three steals. He is now averaging 25.8 points per game.

C.C. Williams paced the Tigers' offense as he tied a school record with 13 assists. The Tigers' point guard, he committed only two turnovers in the game.

Abraham, who scored 13 points in the first half, scored 17 points on 8-for-10 shooting from the floor.

As a team, the Tigers shot 55.9 per cent from the floor and made 13 of 26 three-point baskets, tying the program record for made three-pointers set in 1997 against Michigan.

## GAME 21: HOFSTRA RALLIES TO HOLD OFF TIGERS, 64-60

TOWSON, Md. - Hofstra outscored the CAA's leading scorer 11-6 in the final four minutes to come from behind and hand Towson a disappointing 64-60 league loss, earning a sweep of the Tigers for the 2006-07 regular season.

Gary Neal tallied a game high 29 points, including the last six for the Tigers, but the Pride's high scoring backcourt of Loren Stokes, Antoine Agudio and Carlos Rivera ganged up on him with each contributing to the final 11-6 run that catapulted Hofstra from a 54-53 deficit to the win.

Towson grabbed an early 11-3 lead but that slowly evaporated and by 10:03 of the first half it was tied 12-12. From that point on there would be 15 lead changes and eight ties before the Pride could pull it out in the last 33 seconds of the contest.

The Tigers duplicated their effort in the second half when they worked to an eight-point lead, 45-37, with 10:40 left to play. But once again the Pride, holding on strong to second place in the CAA and right on the heels of the league leading and unbeaten Virginia Commonwealth Rams, rallied to pass the Tigers on a Stokes' three-pointer. The trey gave the Pride a lead, 56-54, it would not relinquish.

Rivera's jumper upped the Pride's margin to 58-54. Neal, the CAA's leading scorer with a 25.8 average, answered with two free throws. Then it was Stokes with a pair of baskets for a 62-56 Pride lead at the 2:00 mark. Neal answered that with a layup and a jumper of his own to close the gap to 62-60 with just 33 ticks left on the clock. Agudio chipped in making the front end of a two shot foul. The Tigers had two good looks on their last trip down the floor but two three-point tries that would have tied the score missed.

Rivera picked up the defensive rebound on the last miss and was fouled with three seconds remaining. He hit one of his free throws to seal it.

Stokes led the Pride with 25 points. He, Agudio and Rivera combined for 50 of Hofstra's total points. Chris Gadley came off the bench to register a double-double, 12 points and a game high 11 rebounds.

Neal got scoring help from C.C. Williams with 11 points and Dennard Abraham with 10 points.

## GAME 22: NEAL MAKES NCAA HISTORY AS TIGERS BEAT DUKES

HARRISONBURG, Va. - Gary Neal needed 12 points to become the 22nd player to join Towson's 1,000-point club and make NCAA college basketball history. He got those, and nine more to score a team high 21 points to lead the Tigers to a 69-60 Colonial Athletic Association victory over James Madison in the 25th meeting between the two teams.

With his 21 points Neal became just the third player in NCAA history to score 1,000 or more points at two different Division I schools. Neal, who scored 1,041 points in two years at La Salle, joins Kenny Battle (Northern Illinois and University of Illinois, 1989) and Jon Manning (Oklahoma City and North Texas State, 1979). But it took a better second half effort to pull out the victory. The Dukes jumped out front early and held the lead for most of the first half, twice building to a nine-point margin. Dennard Abraham's free throw gave Towson a 3-2 lead but Juwann James drove the lane and laid it up for the Dukes and a 4-3 advantage. The Tigers would not lead again until Jonathan Pease's three-pointer from the deep corner with five seconds left in the first period sent Towson into the locker room with a 27-26 lead.

The Tigers opened the second half with an 18-5 run that vaulted them to a 45-31 advantage at the 11:13 mark. Although they continued to work hard (shooting 57.9% from the floor), the Tigers were never threatened again, maintaining a double-digit lead until the final 40 seconds when a couple of JMU treys narrowed the gap to seven points, 67-60, with 20 ticks remaining.

But the Dukes got into a fouling mode, allowing Towson to spend the final 6:67 at the free throw where they scored their last 17 points. Towson finished the game 24 of 34 from the charity stripe. The Tigers attempted 27 free throws in the second half.

Neal, who dished out a game high five assists, got scoring help from Winston Tubbs who registered a season high 14 points. Abraham knocked in 10 more.

Terrance Carter paced the Dukes with a double-double, scoring 19 points and collecting 10 rebounds.

### GAME 23: TIGERS PUT 5 IN DOUBLE FIGURES AS NORTHEASTERN FALLS

TOWSON, Md. - Towson's starting five all scored in double figures as the Tigers won for the fifth time in their last seven outings by beating Northeastern 74-61.

The win improved the Tigers' record to 12-11, marking the first time since 1995-96 they have been above .500 after the first 23 games of the season.

Towson upped its league record to 6-6.

With the win, the Tigers equaled last year's victory total.

Northeastern, losing its 13th straight on the road, dropped to 7-16 and 5-7 in CAA play.

For just the fourth time this season, the nation's fifth leading scorer (25.7 ppg), Gary Neal, was not Towson's high point man. Neal finished the game with 11 points, six rebounds and eight assists.

Top scoring honors went to senior forward Dennard Abraham with 16 points and a team high seven rebounds. Junior guard C.C. Williams poured in a career high 15 points. Junior forwards Tommy Breaux and Jonathan Pease each added 10 points as the Tigers shot 52.6 per cent from the floor.

Towson broke to a 9-0 lead and never looked back. The Huskies twice trimmed Towson's margin to three points but the Tigers were able to turn them back each time. Towson assumed a 40-27 halftime lead.

The Tigers led by as many as 16 points in the second half. The Huskies, who lead the CAA with 458 three-point attempts, made a living off the trey. They hit 7 of 13 attempts in the second half to pull within five points, 56-51, with 6:16 left but missed four of their last five tries from beyond the arc as the Tigers outscored them 18-10 the rest of the way. Northeastern was 11 of 23 from three-point range for the game.

### GAME 24: DRAGONS HOLD OFF TWO TOWSON RALLIES FOR 66-56 WIN

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. - Drexel held off two Towson rallies and put on a burst in the closing minutes to register the last nine points of the game as the Dragons beat the Tigers 66-56.

The loss ended a two-game winning streak for Towson. It was Drexel coach Bruiser Flint's 100th career win for the Dragons at the school.

Towson's C.C. Williams scored on a breakaway layup after a steal that capped a 19-6 run and cut Drexel's lead to 57-56 with 4:23 left in the contest. But that was the Tigers' final score of the game. The Dragons answered with a 9-0 run to go on to beat the Tigers for the 17th time in 21 meetings on their home court in the Daskalakis Center.

The Tigers hit a snag about midway in the first period when Drexel went on a 14-0 run that lasted over six minutes and erased a seven-point Towson lead. Towson recovered, however, and put together a 9-0 run that cut the deficit to one. Chaz Crawford's putback with five seconds left sent the Dragons into the lockerroom with a 34-31 lead at the break.

Drexel got hot in the second half, shooting 56 per cent from the floor, and broke to its biggest lead, 51-37, to start the period. The Tigers slowly chipped away at Drexel's advantage and whittled it down to a point on Williams' layup. But the Tigers went stone cold in the final 4:23 of the game. Combined with the cold spell in the first half, Towson went over 10 minutes in the contest without scoring.

The Dragons relied on their two big men, Crawford and Frank Elegar, to deliver the blows. The two combined for 35 of Drexel's 66 points and 16 of its 32 rebounds. Elegar showed the way with 21 points on six for 10 shooting and a 9 for 15 performance at the free throw line.

The Tigers were led by Gary Neal who pumped in a game high 23 points. He also added six rebounds and three assists. It was the 19th time Neal has led Towson in scoring. Dennard Abraham chipped in 10 points and six rebounds before fouling out.

### GAME 25: HUSKIES GET THEIR REVENGE, TIGERS FALL 65-55

BOSTON, Mass. - Northeastern had revenge on its mind and that motivated the Huskies as they battled hard not to surrender a slim lead in a 65-55 Colonial Athletic Association victory over the Tigers.

The victory avenged a 74-61 loss to Towson just eight days ago in the Towson Center and enabled the Huskies to tie the Tigers for sixth place in the league.

# SEASON REVIEW

## GAME 26: NEAL SCORES 37 AS TIGERS DOWN GEORGIA STATE

TOWSON, Md. - Towson broke on top right at the outset and never looked back as senior guard Gary Neal led the charge with 37 points in the Tigers' 92-65 CAA victory over visiting Georgia State.

The 92 points were a season high for Towson.

After junior forward Tommy Breaux canned a pair of free throws and junior forward Jonathan Pease sank a three-pointer for a 5-0 Towson start, Neal connected on three treys to give the Tigers a 14-5 lead just 3:30 into the game. It was a sample of things to come from Neal, who entered the game as the nation's sixth leading scorer with a 25.0 average.

By halftime Neal had nearly outscored Georgia State with his 28 points and the Tigers were up 50-31, scoring a season high for the first half. Neal finished with 37 points, registering his eighth 30-point game of the season.

The Panthers tried to put a halt to Towson's fast getaway but could never quite catch the Tigers. A 10-2 run cut Towson's lead to 20-19 at the 10:37 mark of the opening period. After a Winstonn Tubbs layup Justin Billingslea answered for Georgia State to trim the Tigers' lead to one again, 22-21. Towson then shifted into high gear, sprinting to a 34-21 lead on the strength of a 12-0 run.

Georgia State never got closer than 11 points the rest of the way. The Tigers maintained at lead a 20-point advantage for most of the second half, leading by as many as 31 in the final three minutes of the contest.

Neal's 37-point performance in 28 minutes of play included a Towson program record eight three-pointers. Neal broke his own record of seven treys in a single game that he had set three times. He was 13 of 20 overall from the floor.

Junior point guard C.C. Williams snapped the school's single game assist record, which he co-held, with 14 assists. He also contributed six steals.

Senior forward Dennard Abraham tossed in 14 points and grabbed a team high seven rebounds. Breaux chipped in 10 points.

## GAME 27: TIGERS EARN FIRST SWEEP OF DUKES, WINNING 76-62

TOWSON, Md. - The Tigers swept James Madison for the first time in the 26-game series as Gary Neal scored 17 of his game high 26 points in the second half to show the way in a 76-62 Tigers' victory.

By winning their 14th game of the season, the Tigers have recorded their highest single season victory total since they had a 16-12 record in 1995-96.

After the Dukes pulled to within 68-62 with 1:51 remaining Dennard Abraham scored on a rebound layup, giving Towson a 70-62 lead. C.C. Williams, who scored six points in the final 57 seconds of the game, made one of two free throws to extend the Tigers' lead to 71-62 with under a minute remaining.

With 27 seconds left to play, Williams made a steal, scored on a breakaway slam dunk and was fouled. When he converted the free throw, the Tigers owned a 74-62 edge. Williams added a pair of free throws with 12 seconds remaining to end the scoring and give Towson its largest lead of the contest.

The Dukes opened the game by grabbing a 6-0 lead. However, the Tigers rallied behind a ten-point first half effort from Winstonn Tubbs and owned a 33-31 lead at halftime.

The fifth-leading scorer in the nation with a 25.5 average, Neal shot 9-for-19 from the floor and made five of six free throws. He also grabbed four rebounds with four assists and two steals.

# SEASON REVIEW

## GAME 31: TIGERS DROP SEAHAWKS TO ADVANCE IN CAA TOURNAMENT

RICHMOND, Va. - The Tigers ended UNC Wilmington's amazing streak of 23 straight quarterfinal appearances in the CAA Basketball Tournament by defeating the defending champion Seahawks 67-52 in first round action in the Richmond Coliseum, propelling Towson into the quarterfinals for just the second time.

It was the 17th meeting between the Tigers and 10th-seeded Seahawks (7-22) in a series UNCW leads 11-7. It was Towson's second win over UNCW this season.

The Tigers were hot from behind the three point line in the first half. Five of their nine field goals were treys and a main reason they were able to go up by as many as 15 points on the Seahawks. A 14-0 run pulled the Tigers away from a 6-6 tie to a 20-6 lead at the 9:02 mark.

But then it was UNCW's turn. The Seahawks finished the half outscoring Towson 19-9, cutting the Tigers' lead to 29-25 at the break.

It was tough sledding for the Tigers in the second half but they played through it to outscore the Seahawks 10-2 in the first nine minutes for a 39-27 lead. The Seahawks had one last gasp, trimming Towson's lead to 47-40 with 7:12 remaining. But Rocky Coleman's three-pointer lifted the Tigers back to a 10-point advantage. Towson maintained a double-digit lead the rest of the way.

The final two minutes of the contest took an eternity with the Seahawks fouling in desperation. The Tigers scored their last 11 points of the game from the free throw line where they made 21 of 28 attempts.

Gary Neal showed the way with his 19 points, 9 rebounds and 3 steals. Dennard Abraham tallied 13 points and grabbed 6 rebounds. Rodney Spruill registered a career high 12 points off the bench. And C.C. Williams, who hails from Clinton, N.C., not far from Wilmington, added 11 points and 6 assists.

Tommy Breaux had a sensational defensive game, blocking 5 shots and recording three steals.

The Tigers advance to the CAA quarterfinals for just the second time. In 2004 a 70-65 win over William & Mary put Towson up against top seeded Virginia Commonwealth.

## GAME 32: ODU ENDS TIGERS' SEASON IN CAA QUARTERFINALS

RICHMOND, Va. - The longest season in Towson's program history came to an abrupt end when 2nd seeded Old Dominion came from behind to beat the Tigers 58-55 in the quarterfinals of the CAA's Men's Championship Basketball Tournament.

The 7th-seeded Tigers finish the year with a record of 15-17 marking the first time Towson has played 32 games in a single season. The Monarchs, who have beaten the Tigers in 17 of the 18 meetings between the two schools, improved to 24-7 and advance to tomorrow's semifinals.

The Tigers gave the Monarchs a lot to think about at halftime. After falling behind early due to an 8-0 ODU start, the Tigers slowly climbed back into it, finally grabbing the lead 12-11 on C.C. Williams' driving layup at the 12:05 mark. His bucket was part of an 18-2 Towson run that stunned the Monarchs.

Towson eventually stretched the lead to 13, 30-17 with 3:12 left in the half, on 50 per cent shooting from the floor and some outstanding defensive play that limited the Monarchs to just two baskets within a 15-minute period. But then the Tigers went stone cold and didn't score again. Meanwhile ODU's Brian Henderson was warming up, sinking three-pointers. He hit two of them to help the Monarchs close the gap to 30-25 at the break.

Old Dominion opened the second half with a 15-3 run that erased the deficit and lifted the Monarchs to a seven-point lead. The Tigers once again clawed their way back and captured the lead, 45-44, on Rocky Coleman's three-pointer. But back-to-back treys by Henderson quickly put ODU up by five.

A Dennard Abraham putback and a three-point play by Gary Neal knotted the score at 50-50 with 4:15 left but several turnovers and missed shots stalled the rally. ODU went on a 6-0 run to open it up to 56-50 with 2:10 to play. After Neal scored on a running floater Henderson stole the ball and tallied ODU's last points on a layup with 1:12 remaining.

The Tigers came right back with a Neal three-pointer from the corner with 50 seconds left but that was to be the final score of the game. Towson had possession of the ball with 14 seconds remaining but couldn't get the look it needed to get off a decent shot.

Henderson was the main culprit, scoring a game high 24 points.

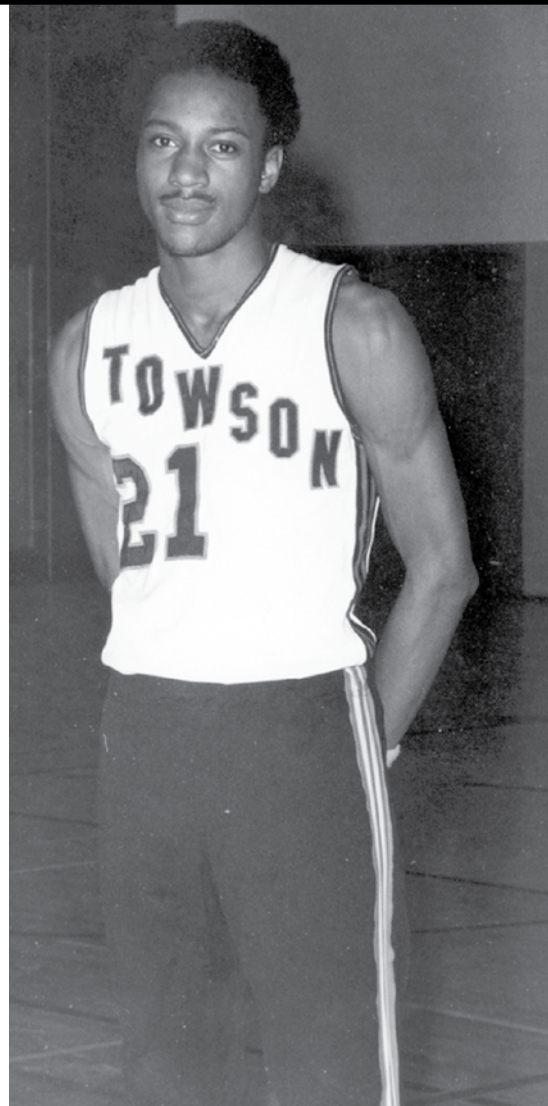

## 1990 NCAA Tournament

Since joining the NCAA Division I ranks in 1979-80, the Tigers have made two trips to the "Big Dance," participating in the NCAA Tournament two years in a row.

As East Coast Conference champions, Coach **Terry Truax** and the Tigers qualified for the NCAA Tournament in 1990 and 1991, facing nationally-ranked teams on each occasion. During both seasons, the Tigers won the conference championship in the Towson Center before a large crowd and a national audience on ESPN. In 1990, the Tigers beat Lehigh before a crowd of 4,435 in the Towson Center. In 1991, the Tigers earned their NCAA berth with a win over Rider College before a crowd of 3,425.

On March 14, 1990, the Tigers played number one-ranked Oklahoma at the Erwin Center at the University of Texas. Towson entered the game as a decided underdog to the Sooners, who were 27-4, the top seed in the regional and had a NCAA-leading 101.3 scoring average.

However, the Tigers represented themselves well in their first NCAA Tournament game. Rallying from a 14-point halftime deficit, they cut the lead to two points

several times in the final six minutes before the Sooners held on for the win. In his final college game, **Kurk Lee** scored 30 points against the Sooners. Lee, the 13th-leading scorer in Division I, averaged 26.0 points and was the ECC Player of the Year as well as the ECC tourney MVP.

The Tigers' performance impressed Oklahoma's colorful coach, **Billy Tubbs**. After the 77-68 OU victory, he said "they outhustled us, they outfought us, and we were lucky to hang on. Late in the game, I was confused as to who was the number one seed. I thought they had it backward."

The 1990 Tigers were led by Lee, who captained the team along with **Kennell Jones** and **Kelly Williamson**. Jones, who had 11 points and 10 rebounds in the loss to Oklahoma, was the ECC Scholar-Athlete for basketball and averaged 8.7 points with a team high 6.8 rebounds. Williamson averaged 10.9 points while 6-8 **Mike Morin** averaged 4.0 points.

Sophomore guard **Devin Boyd** was the team's second-leading scorer with an 11.7 average while averaging 2.9 assists and 1.9 steals. Off the bench, sophomore forward **Chuck Lightening** averaged 8.5 points with

a .502 field goal percentage and junior guard **Lewis Waller** was a very valuable "sixth man," averaging 7.1 points.

## 1991 NCAA Tournament

Despite the loss of four senior starters, the Tigers returned to the NCAA Tournament in 1991. For the second year in a row, the Tigers won the ECC regular season championship as well as the tournament crown in the Towson Center.

While a trio of seniors led the 1990 Tigers to the NCAA's, it was a trio of juniors that sparked the return trip. **Devin Boyd**, the only returning starter from the first NCAA Tournament team, led Towson and the ECC with a 20.7 scoring average. He was the league's Player of the Year and was named to the ECC Championship all-tournament team for the second straight year. **Chuck Lightening** was the team's second-leading scorer with a 16.1 average and led the Tigers with 6.3 rebounds. He joined Boyd on the All-ECC first team. **Terrance Jacobs**, a junior guard who transferred in from Allegany Junior College, earned all-tourney honors and provided outstanding defense while averaging 15.9 points. Coach **Terry Truax**, the ECC Coach of the Year, also received strong efforts from a pair of freshmen, **Matt Campbell** and **John James**. They were each named to the ECC All-Rookie team.

For the second year in a row, the Tigers found themselves matched up with a national power in the NCAA Tournament.

Sent to the Midwest regionals for the second straight year, the Tigers went up against Big Ten Conference champion Ohio State. The Buckeyes were ranked second in the nation behind Nevada-Las Vegas and were led by **Jim Jackson**, a future NBA all-star. On top of that, the game was played in Dayton, Ohio.

But for the second year in a row, the Tigers made an excellent accounting of themselves. The Buckeyes led most of the way, but were hard-pressed to pull out a 97-86 victory. Ohio State led by 45-37 at halftime and opened up a 64-46 lead with 12:36 remaining. But Lightening, who was the high scorer for the game with 26 points, led a 24-11 run that trimmed the Buckeyes' lead to 75-70 with five minutes remaining. However, the Tiger comeback fell short when Boyd fouled out after scoring 17 points in just 21 minutes due to foul trouble. Lightening was named as the CBS-TV Player of the Game while Jacobs chipped in with 22 points.

Despite the loss, the Tigers impressed

Jackson. He said, "They could have given up when they were down but they really stuck with it. I have a lot of respect for the way they played us and attacked us offensively."

## Tigers in Division I

This is the 29th season for Towson University as a member of the ranks of NCAA Division I.

Since becoming a Division I program, the Towson basketball team has enjoyed much success that includes seven winning seasons against challenging schedules, five national television appearances, three conference championships, three regular season league titles, two NCAA Tournament bids, a Pre-Season NIT win and some other dramatic moments.

During that time, the Tigers have been affiliated with five different conferences. Three different players were conference players of the year. One of those players went on to compete in the National Basketball Association.

The Tigers have hosted four ESPN telecasts from the Towson Center. They appeared in the first game ever broadcast on ESPN2.

Along the way, the Tigers have thrived in the role as an underdog, and even come out on top once in a while, i.e. wins over St. John's in the Pre-Season NIT, Louisville in the Towson Center and West Virginia. They've fallen short too as they did against top-ranked Oklahoma in the 1990 NCAA Tournament, Syracuse, North Carolina, Virginia, Maryland and Michigan before a record crowd in the Towson Center.

After several seasons at the top of Division II basketball, the Tigers made their Division I debut on December 1, 1979 against American University. Vince Angotti, the winningest coach in Towson history, returned from a sabbatical leave to lead the Tigers. Towson lost its Division I debut to American, 66-63.

In the second season, there was more improvement. Led by Tony Odrick, the Tigers posted a 13-14 record.

After the Tigers' first season in the East Coast Conference, Angotti announced his retirement from coaching, with a 16 year 231-178 career record.

Terry Truax succeeded Angotti as the head coach and set about establishing the Tigers in the ECC. Although Towson struggled to a 10-19 record in his first season, freshman guard Bill Leonard brought hope for the future as he was named ECC Rookie of the Year. Leonard would go on to score 1,469 points in his career and earn all-conference honors twice.

Progress came slowly in Truax's first three years as head coach. However, in 1986-87, the addition of Marty Johnson, a transfer

from the University of Richmond, helped Towson post its best Division I record with a 14-16 mark. The Tigers, who finished sixth in the ECC, came up just short of their first trip to the NCAA Tournament as they beat Rider and Lafayette in the conference tourney. However, Bucknell beat Towson in the championship game.

In 1987-88, Johnson was honored as the ECC Defensive Player of the Year while averaging 17.6 points and 5.0 assists per game. He also led the Tigers to their second straight appearance in the ECC Championship Game. Before a near-sellout crowd and a national audience on ESPN, the Tigers dropped an 84-78 decision to Lehigh as they finished as ECC runners-up for the second year in a row.

The 1988-89 season was pivotal for the Towson basketball program. The addition of transfers Kurk Lee, Kennell Jones and Kelly Williamson, all Baltimore area high school stars who came home, plus freshman guard Devin Boyd enabled Towson to post its first winning season at the Division I level. TU went 19-10 and finished second in the ECC, but an overtime loss to Lafayette in the ECC semi-finals ended it abruptly. Lee was honored as the ECC Player of the Year after leading the conference in scoring with a 25.4 average. Boyd was the ECC Rookie of the Year and Truax was Coach of the Year.

In 1989-90, Towson won its first ECC championship earning its first NCAA Tournament trip. Led by Lee, a repeat selection as ECC Player of the Year, the Tigers rolled through the ECC Tournament, beating Rider, Delaware and Lehigh by a total of 38 points. Lee was the tournament MVP, scoring 83 points in the tournament. Making its first appearance in the NCAA Tournament, Towson was paired with top-ranked Oklahoma. Led by Lee's 30-points, the Tigers gave the Sooners all they could handle before falling 77-68.

The Tigers won their second straight ECC title in 1990-91 led by ECC Player of the Year Devin Boyd and first team All-ECC Chuck Lightening. Towson dropped a 97-86 verdict to Big Ten champion Ohio State despite a 29-point performance from Lightening, the CBS-TV Player of the Game.

With the breakup of the ECC, the 1991-92 season found the Tigers in the Big South Conference. Towson rolled through the regular season and won the regular season title with a 14-2 Big South record as Boyd and sopho-

Senior Kennell Jones, the 1990 ECC's Scholar Athlete of the Year for men's basketball, had a "double double" for the Tigers with 11 points and 10 rebounds. The Tigers trailed by just 70-68 with a minute to go before the Sooners put the game away at the foul line.

**NOVEMBER 24, 1997 -  
MICHIGAN 75, TOWSON 72:**

Before a Towson Center record crowd of 5,086 and a regional television audience on WMAR-TV, the Tigers nearly pulled off an upset of the Wolverines. The game marked the Towson Center debut of Coach Mike Jaskulski. In a game which saw 18 ties and eight lead changes, Michigan trailed most of the way before pulling out the win. The Tigers set a school record by making 13 of 25 three-point field goal tries as Raul dePablo led the way with six three-pointers in an 18-point effort.

more Terrance Alexander were named first team all-conference. However, the Tigers' 18-9 season ended with a shocking loss to eighth-seeded Winthrop in the Big South quarter-finals. Boyd ended his career as Towson's scoring leader with 2,000 points.

Towson further enhanced its improving national image in November of 1993 when the Tigers pulled off a stunning 66-65 upset win at St. John's in the Pre-Season NIT. Towson ended St. John's streak of 23 straight wins in Alumni Hall and its 62-game Alumni Hall winning streak against non-Big East teams. The win earned Towson a trip to the University of Massachusetts for a quarter-final game against the Minutemen. The game was the first basketball game to be broadcast on the new ESPN2 network. Towson went on



to win its second straight Big South regular season title and post only the third 20-win season in school history. But a semi-final loss to Liberty in the Big South Tournament ended that year at 21-9.

In their final Big South season, the Tigers struggled to a 12-15 finish, ending a streak of six straight winning seasons. It was a strange season with wins over West Virginia and Louisville among the dozen victories. The highlight was the 81-69 win over the Cardinals, one of the biggest upsets during the college basketball season.

Towson entered the North Atlantic Conference in 1995-96, posting a 16-12 record that included an 11-7 league mark, good for a third place tie. The Tigers reached the semi-finals of the NAC Tournament before losing to Drexel. The NAC became America East prior the 1996-97 season, Truax's last as the Tiger head coach. Towson had its worst season in 11 years with a 9-19 record.

The 1997-98 season was the first for coach Mike Jaskulski, who debuted with a 51-48 come-from-behind win at American University. Two nights later, Towson battled Michigan to the wire before dropping a 75-72 decision.

In 2001, Towson took another step up in terms of conference affiliation with its move to the Colonial Athletic Association, ending a six-year relationship with America East. The Tigers moved to the new league with long-time rivals Delaware, Drexel and Hofstra.

In May, 2004, the Tigers hired veteran Coach Pat Kennedy to lead them to success in the CAA. Coach Kennedy came to Towson as an experienced Division I coach with more than 400 victories on his resume. This past season the Tigers posted a 15-17 record, recording their most wins in a single season in 11 years.
