COACHING STAFF



HEAD COACH

Rob Ambrose



Over the last four years, Rob Ambrose has led Towson football to 33 wins, a pair of CAA championships and two NCAA FCS playoff appearances. Heading into his seventh season at the helm of the Tiger football program in 2015, Ambrose has his sights set on a return to the NCAA FCS National Championship game.

Coming off an NCAA FCS Championship game appearance the year before, the Tigers battled a plethora of injuries during the 2014 season. However, for the second straight year, a Tiger was selected in the NFL Draft. Just one year after running back Terrance West was selected by the Cleveland Browns in the third round, cornerback Tye Smith went in the fifth round of the 2015 NFL Draft to the Seattle Seahawks.

You don't have to look very far back to find Ambrose's impact in the wins and losses column. In 2013, he guided the Tigers to a magical season as Towson reached the NCAA FCS championship game by beating No. 9 Fordham, No. 2 Eastern Illinois and No. 3 Eastern Washington in consecutive weeks. Towson finished the campaign with a 13-3 record; the 13 wins were a school record.

Ranked second in the final NCAA FCS polls, Towson won the Lambert/Meadowlands Award as the top FCS team in the East. The Tigers were also honored as the ECAC FCS Team of the Year.

During the 2012 season, Ambrose led the Tigers to a 7-4 record against an extremely difficult schedule. The Tigers lost to a pair of nationally-ranked FBS programs in Kent State and LSU. But, Towson finished the season with a 6-2 CAA record as the Tigers shared the league title.

In 2011, just his third season as the Tigers' head coach, Ambrose guided Towson to one of the most dramatic turnarounds in college football history. Only one season removed from a 1-10 record, the 2011 team became the "Turnaround Tigers" by going

9-3. Their 7.5-game improvement was the most dramatic improvement in NCAA Division I history.

Towson posted a 9-2 regular season record, beat six nationally-ranked teams and won the CAA championship outright with a 7-1 record in 2011. The Tigers also made their first appearance in the NCAA FCS playoffs, becoming the first program to earn playoff berths at the Division III, Division II and FCS (I-AA) levels.

Once the season ended, Ambrose was honored as the 2011 CAA Coach of the Year, the AFCA District Coach of the Year and was a finalist for the Liberty Mutual Coach of the Year. In January 2012, he was the recipient of the Eddie Robinson Award as the top coach in FCS football.

The UConn years (2002-08)

Ambrose joined the staff at UConn as the Huskies grew from an NCAA Division I-AA program into a major college contender. During his seven seasons in Storrs, Connecticut, the Huskies were 49-36 with just two losing seasons. UConn made three bowl appearances in five years, debuted in the AP national rankings at 16th, and won a share of the Big East title in 2007.

Joining the staff as the quarterbacks coach, Ambrose played a major role in the development of Dan Orlovsky, the first UConn quarterback to play in the NFL as a fifth-round draft pick by the Detroit Lions. In 2008 as the offensive coordinator, Ambrose coached Donald Brown, an All-American and the 2008 BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year. Brown led the nation with 2,083 yards on 367 carries and became the first UConn player to be selected in the first round of the NFL draft.

His first head coaching job - Catholic (2001)

Ambrose left Towson after the 2000 season to become the head coach at Catholic University, a Division III program in Washington, D.C. In one year at Catholic, Ambrose led the Cardinals to a 3-7 record.

As a Tiger assistant (1992-2000)

In nine years as a Tiger assistant, the team went 54-36 with only two losing seasons. Ambrose started as a student-assistant before being promoted to wide receivers coach in 1993, offensive coordinator in 1997 and then to associate head coach in 2000.

He coached four All-Americans in running back Tony Vinson, quarterback Dan Crowley, and wide receivers Mark Orlando and Jamal White. Vinson led the nation in rushing yards (2,016), all-purpose yards (2,073) and points scored (138) in 1993. Vinson went on to be a fifth-round draft pick of the San Diego Chargers. Orlando earned All-America notice by catching 55 passes for 1,223 yards and 12 touchdowns.

In 1999, Towson led the nation in passing yardage, averaging 381.2 passing yards per game.

His collegiate playing career

As a player at Towson, Ambrose started his career as a quarterback but moved to wide receiver as a sophomore. In 1990, he caught four passes for 20 yards. As a junior, he had four catches for 35 yards. Three of those receptions were touchdown passes from Dan Crowley. He caught an 11-yard TD pass at James Madison, a seven-yard TD toss at Liberty and a 14-yard TD pass against Hofstra. An injury in the spring before his senior year forced Ambrose to the sidelines.

The Ambrose family

The Tigers' coach is the son of one of the most successful high school football coaches in Maryland. His father, Tim, was the head coach at Middletown for 31 years and won 249 games, leading the Knights to 14 Monocacy Valley League championships. He retired in 2013, just in time to follow the Tigers' march to the NCAA championship game. The former athletic director at Middletown, he stepped down as football coach after the 2004 season. Coach Ambrose's brother, Jared, was an assistant football coach at Delaware for two years before joining the Tigers' staff. He is currently the program's offensive coordinator.

Ambrose and his wife, Melissa, have two children: Grace and Riley.

Defensive Coordinator Matt Hachmann has helped the Tigers reach impressive levels of success during his tenure with Towson.

Over the last four years, the Tiger defense helped Towson post a 33-18 record, win two Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) championships, reach the FCS National Championship game and finish as high as second in the FCS national rankings (2013).

Over the last three years, 17 member of the Tiger defense have earned All-CAA honors. In 2014, defensive end Ryan Delaire and cornerback Tye Smith were named first team All-CAA and FCS All-American's. Smith was drafted by the Seattle Seahawks in the fifth round of the 2015 NFL Draft and Delaire signed a rookie free

agent contract with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

In 2014, Towson's defense ranked fifth in the CAA in total defense allowing 356.5 yards per game. The Tigers also ranked third in the league in passing defense, allowing just 196.2 yards per game through the air.

In 2013, the Tiger defense played a key role in Towson's drive to the FCS championship game. In the playoffs, the defense faced three of the most explosive offenses in

three consecutive Patriot League championships. In 2004, the Leopards won the Patriot League title but lost to national championship-bound Delaware in the first round of the NCAA FCS playoffs.

In 2005, Lafayette had an 8-4 record for the second year in a row and won its second straight Patriot League title. The Leopards lost to Appalachian State in the NCAA FCS playoffs. They won their third straight Patriot League title in 2006 and finished with a 6-6 record, dropping a first round game to Massachusetts in the NCAA FCS playoffs.

Hachmann helped the Leopards' defense finish the 2007 season as the top-ranked defense in the nation, allowing just 260.9 yards of offense per game. He coached linebacker Andy Romans, a three-time All-Patriot League pick and the Patriot League Defensive Player of the Year twice. He also coached linebacker Maurice Bennett, an All-American selection in 2005. A finalist for the Buck Buchanan Award, he had a free agent tryout with the Chicago Bears.

During his tenure as the linebackers coach, nine linebackers received All-Patriot League honors.

At Maryland (1999), Oklahoma (1997-98), Northern Illinois (1995-96) and Northwestern (1994)

Prior to his years at Lafayette, Hachmann was on the coaching staff at four different NCAA Division I FBS programs. In 1999, he was a member of Coach Ron Vanderlinden's staff at the University of Maryland, serving as the director of football operations. In 1997 and 1998, Hachmann coached at the University of Oklahoma. For two years, he was a graduate assistant coach. He spent the 1995 and 1996 seasons at Northern Illinois University where he was a graduate assistant coach with the offensive line.

Coach Hachmann is a board member of "Lauren's First and Goal Football Camp" which raises money for pediatric brain tumor research, cancer services and family support. For the last 10 years, he has participated in the camp and has gotten many of his colleagues to join him. Created in 2004, the camp has raised more than a million dollars for brain tumor research.

A 1993 graduate of the University of St. Thomas in Minnesota, he was a three-year letter winner for the football team. In 1990, he was part of a team that reached the NCAA Division III quarterfinals. He also played for the baseball team, earning Most Improved Player honors as a senior.

After earning his bachelor's degree in marketing management, he served as a recruiting assistant at Northwestern University for the 1994 season. While working at Oklahoma and Northern Illinois, he pursued a master's degree in sport management.

Born in Queens, New York, he grew up in Chicago. He and his wife, Kimberly, have three children, Rien, Jake and Justin.

FCS football: Fordham, Eastern Illinois and Eastern Washington. The Tiger defense held each team well below its season scoring average.

While helping the Tigers finish as national runners-up, Telvion Clark and Jordan Love earned All-America honors. In 2013, the Tiger defense scored five touchdowns and generated 34 turnovers, fourth in NCAA FCS.

At Lafayette College (2000-08)

Coach Hachmann joined the Tigers' staff prior to the 2009 season. He spent the nine previous seasons at Lafayette College.

A native of Chicago, he joined the Lafayette staff in the 2000 season. After working with the Leopard running backs for one year, he became the linebackers coach in 2001, a position he held for eight years. From 2003 to 2006, he also served as Lafayette's special teams coordinator. In 2008 and 2009, he added recruiting coordinator responsibilities.

At Lafayette, he helped build the Leopards into one of the top teams in the Patriot League. During his nine years, he was part of a coaching staff that helped the Leopards compile a 52-50 record.

From 2004 to 2006, the Leopards won

Jared begins his third season as Towson's offensive coordinator in 2015.

After a record-setting year for Tigers offense in 2013, Towson brought back just two starters in 2014. The Tigers still managed to rank fourth in the CAA in rushing offense by averaging 163.4 yards per game on the ground.

Despite running behind a youthful offensive line, Darius Victor rushed for 1,305 yards and 12 touchdowns en route to being named First Team All-CAA.

Ambrose made his first season as Towson's offensive in 2013 a memorable one.

The Tigers were 13-3 - setting a school record for wins - and reached the NCAA FCS championship game. Towson's offense was superb behind Ambrose's leadership and the team broke nearly every offensive record. The 2013 season also marked the first time in school history the offense passed and rushed for over 3500 yards in the same season.

The Tigers finished 12th in the country (first in the CAA) in total offense and 19th in the country in scoring. Towson had the most potent offense in the NCAA



tournament, averaging 483 total yards per game while averaging 35 points per game.

In 2013, Ambrose coached Peter Athens to become the 10th-leading passer in program history and to lead the Tigers to their first three FCS playoffs victories.

Ambrose took over as offensive coordinator during the second half of the 2012 season. Over the final six games, the Tiger offense averaged over 500 yards of total offense as Towson finished the season as CAA co-champions. In addition, quarterback Grant Enders became the most efficient passer in Towson football history, completing 66 percent of his passes.

After coaching the Tigers' tight ends for his first two seasons, he became the quarterbacks coach in 2011.

During the 2011 season, Ambrose guided a very effective Tiger offense that helped Towson win the CAA championship outright while averaging just under 35 points per game. In 12 games, the Tigers scored 30 or more points 10 times. Enders led the CAA in passing efficiency and was named as the CAA Offensive Player of the Week twice.

At the University of Delaware (2007-08)

In 2007, Ambrose joined the football coaching staff at the University of Delaware. As a graduate assistant coach, Ambrose worked with the Blue Hens' offense for two seasons. In his first season at Delaware, he helped the Blue Hens' high-powered offense average 36.2 points and 460.6 total yards per game.

Led by All-American quarterback Joe Flacco, the Blue Hens reached the NCAA FCS championship game where they lost to Appalachian State. En route to the championship game, Delaware upset number one-ranked Northern Iowa and fourth-ranked Illinois State. In his two years, he helped the Blue Hens compile a 15-12 record.

At Shepherd University (2004-06)

A native of Middletown, Md., Ambrose is a 2007 graduate of Shepherd University. He started his coaching career during his undergraduate years at the school.

After one year as a player at Shepherd, he joined the coaching staff in 2004 and served as an assistant coach for three seasons. He helped the Rams compile a 29-5 record and win three straight West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (WVIAC) titles. During his tenure at Shepherd, he served as an offensive assistant coach working with the quarterbacks, wide receivers and tight ends. Shepherd had a 28-game regular season winning streak during his years on the staff.

During the 2004 season, Coach Ambrose helped Shepherd post a 7-3 record and win the WVIAC title with a 7-0 league record. In 2005, the Rams enjoyed one of the best seasons in school history as they compiled an 11-1 record that included a second straight WVIAC championship. After an undefeated regular season, the Rams earned a berth in the NCAA Division II playoffs where they lost to C.W. Post in the first round.

In 2006, Shepherd had a second straight undefeated regular season and won its third WVIAC title in a row. In their second consecutive NCAA Division II playoff appearance, the Rams beat Merrimack before losing to sixth-ranked Bloomsburg.

Jared and his wife, Ashley, have two daughters: Evie and Sawyer.

John Donatelli begins his 19th season at Towson in 2015.

Despite losing all five starters from Towson's 2013 offensive line, the Tigers ranked fourth in the CAA in rushing offense in 2014 by

averaging 163.4 yards per game on the ground.

In 2013, Donatelli coached one of the best offensive lines in NCAA FCS history. His offensive line included four seniors who blocked for the nation's leading rusher and allowed only seven sacks in 16 games. He helped the Tigers post a 13-3 record and finish as NCAA FCS runners-up.

Tackle Eric Pike, a four-year starter, was named as a consensus first team All-American in 2013. Pike earned All-CAA first team honors in 2012 and 2013. The Tigers' other tackle, Randall Harris, was also a two-time All-CAA first team selection. Offensive center Doug Shaw was a second team All-CAA honoree in 2012 and '13.

From 2011-13, the Tiger offensive line led Towson to a 29-10 overall record, two CAA championships, two NCAA FCS playoff appearances and a 3-2 record in NCAA FCS playoff action. Towson also posted a 19-5 CAA record over that time.

In 2011, Donatelli's offensive line played a vital role in the Tigers' climb to the top of the CAA standings. The Tigers' offensive line helped the Towson offense average 34.6 points per game in addition to leading the CAA with 229.9 rushing yards per game.

After the conclusion of the Tigers' season, two of his offensive linemen, Henry Glackin and Pike, earned All-CAA honors. Since becoming the Tigers' offensive line coach, Donatelli has coached nine All-CAA linemen, five All-Americans, 17 Capital

One Academic All-Americans and seven All-Patriot League selections.

Tiger tackle Jermon Bushrod has played in the NFL for eight years. A fourth-round draft pick by the New Orleans Saints in 2007, he is a two-time All-Pro tackle who currently plays for the Chicago Bears. In his first season as an NFL starter, he contributed to the top-ranked offense in the NFL as the Saints upset Indianapolis to win their first Super Bowl title.

Donatelli joined the Tigers' coaching staff in 1997, the program's first season as a member of the Patriot League. A part-time member of the coaching staff, he was the team's assistant offensive line coach. In 1998, he served as the Tigers' tight ends coach and became the offensive line coach in 1999. While he was a part-time coach at Towson, he co-owned a business with his brother, Dan, leading Chesapeake Crane Service, Inc.

At Calvert Hall College High School (1991-96)

Donatelli's coaching career began at his alma mater where he was an assistant coach at Calvert Hall for six years. During those years, he was the offensive line coach, special teams coordinator and strength coach.

A Baltimore, Maryland native and a graduate of Calvert Hall High School, Donatelli graduated from Frostburg State in 1988, earning a bachelor's degree in business management. A three-year starter at offensive center, he was honored as the Bobcats' Lineman of the Year in 1987.

In 1995, he began work on a degree in kinesiology. In 1997, he earned a second undergraduate degree when he graduated from Towson University with a degree in sport management.

Coach Donatelli is a member of the American Football Coaches Association. He and his wife, Maria, a 1995 Towson graduate, have two children, Samantha and Luca.





Reno Ferri

After three seasons serving as Towson's running backs coach, Reno Ferri took over coaching the fullbacks and tight ends in 2014.

He also serves as the Tigers' recruiting coordinator.

During Ferri's three seasons working with the Tiger running backs, Towson averaged more than 230 rushing yards per game. En route to the 2013 FCS championship game, Towson averaged more than 240 yards per game.

He coached two running backs who have been the CAA Offensive Rookie of the Year: Terrance West in 2011 and Darius Victor in 2013. During that time frame, Tyler Wharton, Emmanuel Holder and West were named as All-CAA performers.

In 2013, he coached West, who set NCAA FCS single season records for rushing yards and touchdowns in a season. While West was the CAA Offensive Player of the Year, Victor was the CAA Offensive Rookie of the Year. West and Holder have earned All-America honors under his guidance.

While helping the Tigers post a 29-10 record from 2011-13, Ferri coached a Tiger running game that has rushed for more than 200 yards in 24 games, winning 22 of those contests. The Tigers topped the 300-yard mark eight times and went over 400 yards twice. In the 2013 FCS quarterfinals at Eastern Illinois, Towson ran for a school-record 472 yards in a 49-39 victory.

Under Ferri's guidance, the Tiger running game shattered virtually every school record. In 2013, Towson ran for a school record 3,830 yards and scored 55 rushing touchdowns.

His first season as a member of the Tigers' staff was certainly a memorable one. As the Tigers' running backs coach in 2011, he mentored a group that rushed for 229.9 yards per game, a mark that led the CAA.

He also coached two players who earned All-America notice (Wharton and West). West, who led NCAA FCS with 29 rushing touchdowns, was named as the winner of the Jerry Rice Award as the top freshman in FCS football.



At Akron (2004-2009)

In 2004, he joined the staff at Akron as a graduate assistant who worked with the offense. In 2005, he was Akron's director of football operations, overseeing all administrative duties with the staff. During the 2005, he was part of an Akron team that earned a berth in the Motor City Bowl where the Zips lost a 38-31 thriller to Memphis.

He was promoted to wide receivers coach in 2006 and worked with Jabari Arthur, who became an all-league performer, and David Harvey, All-MAC performer and a freshman All-American. In 2006, Harvey led the MAC in kickoff returns and was second in the nation.

In 2007, he was named as the running backs coach, a position he held for three years. Led by Bryan Williams and Alex Allen, the Zips averaged 127.8 rushing yards per game in 2007. That same season, he averaged 31.9 yards per kickoff return as he led the MAC and was second nationally; in 2008 he ranked sixth nationally with a 29.0 yards per return average. Williams, who ran for 728 yards, was named third team All-Mid-American Conference. In 2008, Ferri turned to Dennis Kennedy, who responded with a record-setting season. Kennedy, who rushed for 1,321 yards, produced the third-best single season rushing total in Akron history. He also set school records with 17 rushing touchdowns and 18 overall TDs.

During his tenure at Akron, he also served as the program's recruiting coordinator. From 2005 to 2007, Akron landed the Mid-American Conference's top recruiting classes. The Zips also had three players named as freshman All-Americans from those classes.

A native of Youngstown, Ohio, Coach Ferri is a 2000 graduate of the United States Military Academy. A three-year letter winner at running back for the Black Knights, he was part of Army's first team to compete in Conference USA. In 1996, he was a member of Army's nationally ranked team that posted a 10-2 record and lost to Auburn in the Independence Bowl. He was a senior game captain in a game against Air Force.

After earning his bachelor's degree in general management with a minor in systems engineering, he started his coaching career at West Point. During the 2000 season, he served as a graduate assistant on the Army coaching staff.

A first lieutenant in the United States Army from May 2000 to March 2002, he served as a fire direction officer and a battalion survey officer.

He has also worked as a consultant for British Petroleum working in the Gulf of Mexico. A systems engineer, he and his team designed and implemented a software solution to decontaminate and re-deliver 16,000 vessels.

Derrick Johnson begins his eighth season at Towson in 2015.

Johnson coached one of the Tigers' strongest units in 2014. Towson's defense

ranked fifth in the CAA in total defense last year, allowing 356.5 yards per game. The Tigers also ranked third in the league in passing defense, allowing just 196.2 yards per game through the air.

Johnson coached Tye Smith, who was named First Team All-CAA and was chosen as an FCS All-American in 2014. Smith was selected in the fifth round of the 2015 NFL Draft by the Seattle Seahawks.

From 2011-13, Johnson helped Towson post an impressive 29-10 record en route to winning a pair of conference championships. The Tigers also made two NCAA FCS post-season appearances and reached the NCAA championship game in 2013.

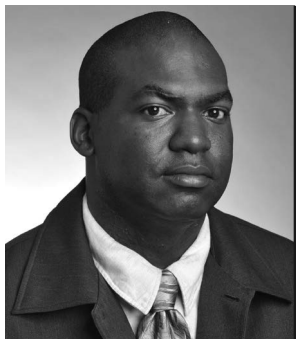

OUTLOOK



Quarterback

The Tigers enter the 2015 season with a battle taking place for the starting quarterback spot. The competition is between the incumbent, senior **Connor Frazier**, and redshirt freshman **Ellis Knudson**.

Frazier started all 12 games for the Tigers a season ago, throwing for 1,499 yards and nine touchdowns. He also rushed for 475 yards and two more scores. His best game came against Elon when he threw for 187 yards and two touchdowns in the victory.

Knudson boasts a strong arm, but lacks the experience of Frazier. Knudson was a two-time all-district selection at Hayfield High School, and was rated a two-star prospect by Rivals.com.

Junior **Heath Dahlgren** and freshman **Ryan Bowles** will add depth to the quarterback position.

Running Back

The main driving force behind the success of the Towson football game has been contingent upon its strong running game. Two years ago, Terrance West established a new benchmark.

The torch has since been past to All-CAA running back **Darius Victor**. After earning CAA Rookie of the Year honors in 2013, Victor emerged as one of the premier running backs in the FCS in 2014.

In his first season as the feature back, Victor led the CAA in rushing yards with 1,305 yards and 12 touchdowns. He eclipsed the 100-yard mark in eight games, including a career-best 194 yards and three touchdowns in a victory over North Carolina Central.

The efforts of Victor have not gone unnoticed as he is one of 22 players on the STATS FCS Offense Player of the Year watch list.

The Tigers backfield will have a great compliment to Victor with the emergence of speedy, sophomore back **Marquel Dickerson**.

Dickerson appeared in eight games as a freshman, rushing for 162 yards on 34 carries. His best game of the season came when he rushed for 68 yards against Maine.

Sophomore **Evan Greenwood** looks to push to become the the third running back. Greenwood carried the ball six times as a freshman, with four of those carries coming against William & Mary.

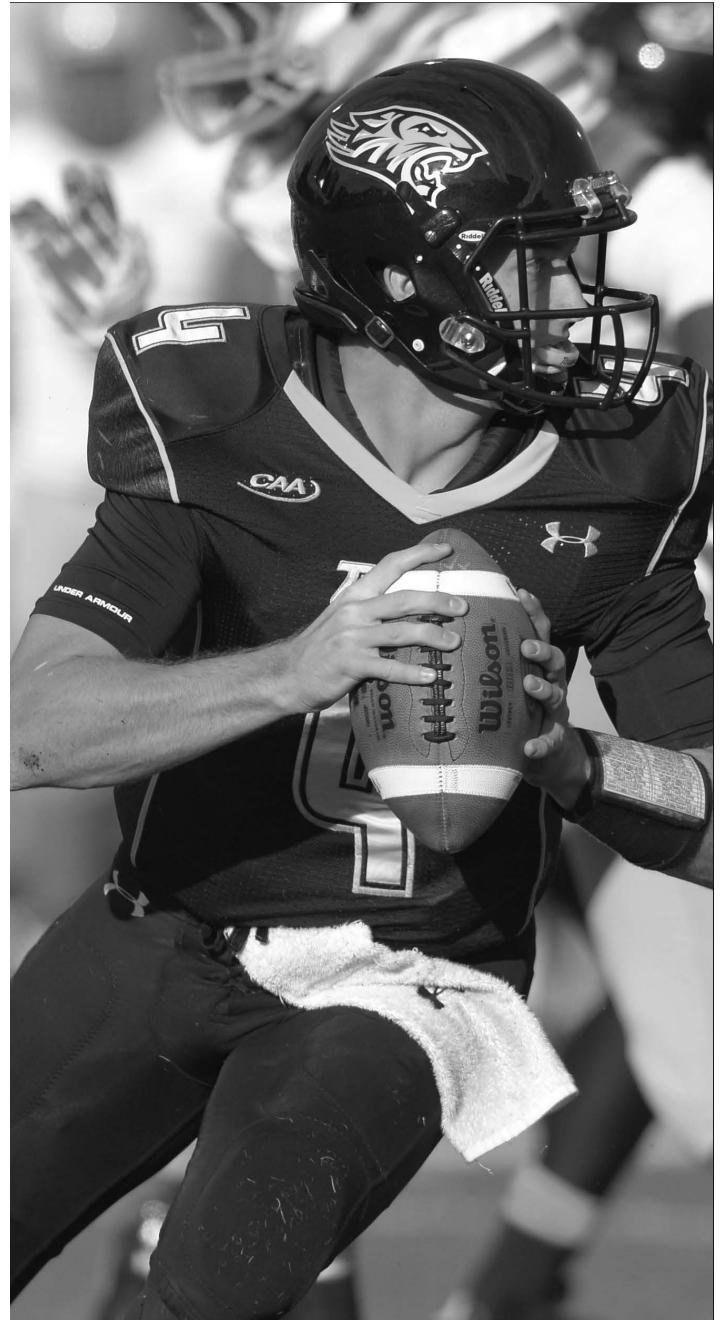
Colby Grant will look for time in the backfield after spending the 2014 season as a red-shirt.

Fullback/Tight End

The fullback position was one of the most hard-hit positions by the injury bug in 2014. The Tigers had four players suffer season-ending injuries during the early part of the season.

Junior **Emmanuel Holder** is looking to come back after missing last season with injury. Holder caught two passes and carried the ball one time through the first two games.

Holder made 13 starts during the 2013 season and was named a Second-Team All-America by the *The Sports Network*.



Senior **Dreon Johnson** returns for his fourth season with the Tigers. Johnson appeared in four games last season before an injury cut his season short. He has been a key for the Tigers as a blocking back, as well as on special teams.

Redshirt freshman **Grayson Boyce** will add solid depth to fullback spot. Boyce was an all-state running back at Poquoson High School running for 1,465 yards his senior season.

Junior **Tanner Vallely** looks to solidify a starting spot at tight end. He started 11 games last season and tied for the team lead with three receiving touchdowns.

Redshirt sophomore **Tre' Bowens**, along with redshirt freshman **Caleb Hebron** and **Marquise Watts** will give the Tigers plenty of options at tight end.



Wide Receiver

Despite losing three of its top four pass catchers from last season, the Tigers may boast one of their most dynamic receiving corps in recent years.

The leader of the group is junior **Andre Dessenberg**. He ranked third on the team in receptions last year, while tying for the team lead with three touchdown receptions.

He caught at least four passes in five games last season, including hauling in two touchdowns in a victory over Elon.

Redshirt senior **Brian Dowling** returns to the lineup after missing 2014 with injury. During the 2013 season, Dowling caught 32 passes for 419 yards and a touchdown. He had a career-best 88 yards receiving against Eastern Washington, including a key 22-yard reception that set up the game-winning touchdown.

Redshirt freshman **Sam Gallahan** had a strong spring campaign and has positioned himself for playing time on the outside. He was an all-state selection as a senior. Gallahan caught 63 passes and scored 12 touchdowns over his final two years of high school.

Junior **Christian Summers** joins the Tigers after two years at Valley Forge Military College. The biggest receiver on the roster, Summers caught 98 passes for 1,854 yards and 20 touchdowns in junior college.

Transfer **Jacquille Veii** brings the speed element to the outside. Veii came to Towson after playing two seasons at Maryland. Over his two years, Veii was used as a wide receiver and running back. He caught 15 passes last season, while rushing for 105 yards and two touchdowns.

Freshman **Shane Simpson** will start the season as a wide receiver after a record-setting career as a running back in high school. He was a first-team all-state selection at Easton High School after scoring 41 touchdowns his senior year. He finished his career with over 6,000 yards and 85 touchdowns.

Fellow freshman **Keon Paye** could make an immediate impact for the Tigers. Paye earned first-team all-state honors at Good Counsel High School after catching 64 passes for 893 yards and 10 touchdowns his senior season.

Offensive Line

The 2014 season saw the Tigers offensive line get decimated with injuries. By the time the last game of the season rolled around, the team was down to just six healthy bodies.

Players were able to get valuable game experience through the process, something that will pay dividends in 2015.

The anchor of the offensive line is senior right guard **Jake Schunke**. He started 10 games last season, with nine of those games coming at right guard. He also earned starts at right guard in each of the previous two seasons.

Junior **Sam Evans** looks to hold down the starting spot at left guard. He started six games at that position a season ago, after starting 11 games at right guard as a true freshman.

Junior **Amos Campbell** will push for playing time at either guard position. He started two games last season, six at center and two at left guard.

Junior **Brady Stup** will battle for the starting spot at center. Stup made six starts at center last season.

Sophomore **Shawn Flaherty** is another option for the Tigers in the center of the line. He did not see action last season.

Sophomore **Antonio Harris** looks to return to the starting lineup along the front line. He started seven games at right tackle last season, but could make the switch over to the left side in 2015.

Junior **Shayne Sullivan** started six games at left tackle last season, can could see action at either tackle spot this season.

Junior **Fred Santarelli** and freshman **Matt Kauffman** are both coming off redshirt seasons. Both are possible candidates to fill the starting spot at right tackle.

Junior college transfer **Samuel Edmondson** comes to Towson after earning All-America honors at Mt. San Antonio College.

Defensive Line

The Tigers will have a different look this season as they switch to a 3-4 scheme. The front will be anchored by preseason All-CAA defensive lineman **Jon Desir**.

Desir started all 12 games last season and ranked fourth in the CAA among defensive linemen with 61 tackles. He registered a season-best 12 tackles in the season opener against Central Connecticut State.

Junior **Max Tejada** returns for his third season along the defensive front. He appeared in all 12 games last season, recording 19 tackles. His best game came against William & Mary where he made six stops.

Senior **Tungie Coker** returns for his final season after starting nine games at defensive end a season ago. He made a season-best eight tackles against Central Connecticut State, while adding a sack against Maine.

Junior transfer **Kanyia Anderson** will battle for the starting spot opposite of Coker. Anderson came to Towson after spending the previous two seasons at Old Dominion.

Redshirt freshman **Niquekko Cook** is competing with Anderson for the starting spot on the left side. Cook was an all-state selection as a senior at Meade High School.

Junior **Ean Katz** should see plenty of playing time at defensive end this season. Katz came to Towson after spending last season at Los Angeles Pierce College.

Sophomore **Zain Harps Upshur** and junior **Clifton Jones** will add depth along the defensive front.

Linebacker

The linebacking corps will be bolstered this season with the return of outside linebacker **Bryton Barr**.

Barr started all 11 games as a true freshman in 2012 before missing the greater part of the last two seasons with injury. He missed all of the 2014 season after having his 2013 season cut short after just two games. As a true freshman, Barr started all 11 games and recorded 74 tackles.



Junior **Jordan Mynatt** will push Barr for playing time on the outside. Mynatt started 10 games (nine at linebacker and one at safety) last season and finished with 61 tackles.

Sophomore **James Simms** returns after putting together one of the best freshman seasons in the country. Last year, Simms led the Tigers in tackles with 99. He had five double-digit tackle games, including a career-best 14 stops against Central Connecticut State.

Senior **Greg Grant** will see extended playing time on the outside this season. Grant appeared in seven games last season, finishing with 12 tackles. He posted a season-best three tackles and a sack at Villanova.

Senior **Eddie Releford** will challenge Grant for playing time on the outside. He posted 12 tackles last season, including a season-high four against North Carolina Central.

Sophomore **Jordan Waite** is poised to make an impact this season. Waite is considered one of the best edge rushers on the roster.

Junior **Eric Handy** returns as one of the top tacklers from last year's team. Handy recorded 80 tackles, including six tackles-for-loss and two interceptions. He recorded a season-best 14 tackles in the season finale at Rhode Island.

Junior **Malik Jackson** will hold down one of the starting inside linebacker spots in the 3-4 scheme. The local product appeared in two games last season.

Senior **Vince DePaola** and freshman **Diondre Wallace** are locked in a battle for one of the backup spots.

DePaola recorded eight tackles last season, while Wallace was earning all-state honors at Arundel High School.

Redshirt freshman **James Scott** is also a contender for playing time on the inside. Scott earned conference player of the year honors at Gloucester High School as a senior.

Defensive Back

The back end of the Tigers defense will need to replace All-American cornerback, Tye Smith, who was drafted in the fifth round by the Seattle Seahawks.

Despite the departure of Smith, many inside the program believe that this year's secondary could be much improved this season.

The leader of the secondary will be strong safety **Donnell Lewis**. The Second-Team All-CAA selection started all 12 games last season, finishing second on the team with 85 tackles. He began the season by making 14 tackles at West Virginia.

Iowa transfer **Nico Law** is the frontrunner to start opposite of Lewis at free safety. Law appeared in 38 games during his Hawkeye career and posted a career-best eight tackles against Indiana during the 2012 season.

Redshirt freshman **Monty Fenner** continues to make strides for playing time in the secondary. Fenner starred at Oscar Smith High School, earning all-state honors in leading the Tigers to the state championship game as a senior.

Junior transfer **Romell Haley** will look to earn the backup spot at strong safety. He came to Towson after earning second-team all-conference honors at West Virginia State.

Junior **Jahmahl Pardner** looks to lock down a starting spot at cornerback. Pardner appeared in all 12 games for the Tigers last season after transferring from Pittsburgh. He posted season-high three tackles against William & Mary and Rhode Island.

Sophomore **Alfonso Augustine** is emerging as a strong candidate to start at the other cornerback spot. Last season, Augustine recorded 41 tackles and had three pass break-ups. He also blocked a punt at North Carolina Central.

Southern Miss transfer **Troy Jeter** will see plenty of action at cornerback and nickel back this season. Jeter made a pair of starts for the Golden Eagles last season, recording six tackles and forcing a fumble.

True freshman **Lyrics Klugh** is expected to make an immediate impact at cornerback and as a return specialist. Klugh was a three-star recruit that helped Byrnes High School to a state championship.

Fellow true freshman **Justice Pettus-Dixon** hopes to make an immediate impact this season. He was a three-star prospect and was ranked as the No. 3 ranked corner in the state of Maryland.

Special Teams

Sometimes the difference between winning and losing comes down to special teams. To have a successful 2015 season, the Tigers will need to improve their special teams.

The Tigers will have some experience in the kicking game this season as they return both their kicker and punter.

Senior **Sam Hurwitz** returns for his second season as the Tigers' place kicker. Hurwitz connected on six field goals last season, including a season-long 39-yarder against North Carolina Central. He was also 22-of-23 on extra points.

Junior **Jake Ryder** and sophomore **Pat Toomey** shared the punting duties in 2014.

Ryder averaged 38.2 yards on 48 punts. He had 13 punts downed inside the 20-yard line, and booted a career-long 72-yarder at Delaware State.

Toomey averaged 40.1 yards on his 15 punts. Three of his punts traveled more than 50 yards, and three of them were downed inside the 20-yard line.

Sophomore **Will Hayes** will handle the snapping duties for the second-straight year. He recorded a pair of tackles a season ago.

Senior **Donnell Lewis** returns as the team's primary punt returner. He returned 11 punts last season, with a season long of 23 yards.

Freshman **Lyrics Klugh** will also be a key returner for the Tigers this season. Klugh had over 2,000 return yards in his high school career, including running back 10 kickoffs for touchdowns.

Junior **Jacquille Veii** will look to be a primary kick returner this season. Veii averaged 17.2 yards on four kickoff returns last season at Maryland.

Tiger Nickname

Towson University is one of 28 NCAA member institutions using the tiger as its mascot. The Tiger is the most popular mascot among American colleges and universities.

However, its obvious popularity was not the real reason the Tiger was selected to represent Towson.

When Towson was a two-year normal school the Baltimore media referred to its teams as the "Teachers." As the school expanded to three and four year programs, the newspapers granted Towson student athletes tenure, calling them the "Professors" and even shortening it to "Profs." Later, it was changed again to the "Schoolmasters."

The "Indians" and "Golden Knights" were other nicknames used over the years. But as the tale goes, the moniker was finally decided after a soccer match.

One autumn afternoon a sportswriter was covering the Towson soccer team in an uphill struggle. The next day the writer wrote that although the team had lost the game, "...they played like tigers."

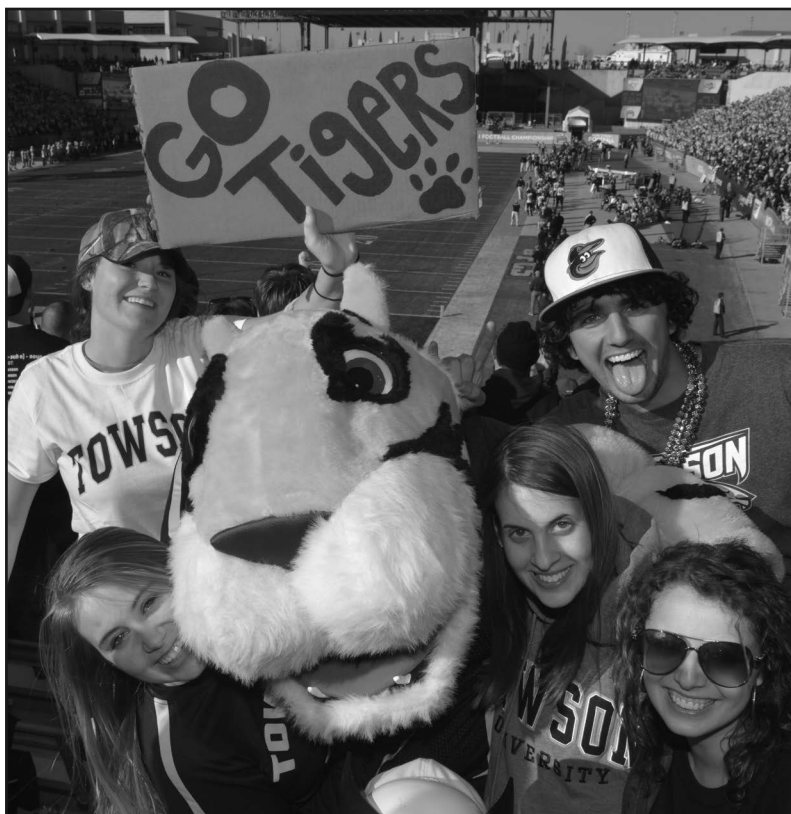
The soccer team appreciated the comment and adopted "Tigers" as its nickname. Enthusiasm for it spread throughout the campus and the tiger eventually became the official designated mascot.

The Towson Tiger logo has also experienced change. Several years ago, the new "stylistic" tiger was unveiled, replacing the upright caricature that had been used since the mid-80's. That took the place of the old block tiger which served as the logo from 1979. The present logo was altered slightly this past July, deleting the word "State" in keeping with the University's renaming of Towson University from Towson State University.

The Towson logo is registered. Approval for its use commercially is required. For color reproduction purposes, please contact the Towson University Athletic Media Relations Office for separation instructions.

Other schools across the country who are also members of the "Tiger" fraternity include Auburn, Bishop, Clemson, Colorado College, DePauw, Doane, Grambling, Hampden-Sydney, Jackson State, Lincoln (Mo.), Livingston, LSU, Memphis, Missouri, Morehouse, Occidental, Pacific, Princeton, Rochester Tech, St. Paul's, Savannah State, Sewanee, Tennessee State, Texas Southern, Trinity (Tex.), Tuskegee and Wittenberg.

According to the NCAA, other popular nicknames include Bears (16), Wildcats (12) and Eagles (12).

TOWSON, Md. -- Despite getting a pair of rushing touchdowns from junior quarterback Connor Frazier, the Towson football team fell 31-27 to Central Connecticut in both team's season opener.

With the Tigers down 24-21 and 10:54 left in the game, senior Derrick Joseph brought a kickoff back 30 yards to the Towson 33. A pair of Darius Victor rushes and a quarterback keeper got the Tigers near midfield. Frazier took it from there, finding a seam and breaking open a 49-yard TD run that put Towson in front, 27-24. The teams then traded drives that ended in punts.

The Blue Devils got the ball back with 4:52 remaining and drove to the Tiger 30-yardline before senior defensive end Ryan Delaire sacked CCSU's Nick SanGiacomo to set up a fourth-and-13. However, SanGiacomo completed a 34-yard pass to Joey Fields, and Rob Hollomon ran in for the go-ahead score two plays later.

Frazier rushed for 80 yards and a pair of TD's. Victor tied his career-high with 105 rushing yards on 19 carries. Victor rushed for a seven-yard touchdown in the third quarter that put the Tigers ahead, 14-13. It was the sophomore's eighth career touchdown.

Joseph had a team-high five receptions, while Spencer Wilkins led the squad in receiving yards with 31 on three catches. Tight end Tanner Vallely had two catches for 30 yards with a touchdown that tied the game 21-21 late in the third quarter.

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. -- Towson's remarkable 12-game road winning streak came to an abrupt end as the Tigers suffered a 54-0 setback against West Virginia in front of 56,414 fans at Milan Puskar Stadium.

The loss, Towson's first on the road since October 6, 2012, dropped the Tigers to 0-2 for the first time since 1991. West Virginia, which fell 33-23 to No. 2 Alabama in its season opener, improved to 1-1 on the year.

Prior to this loss, Towson hadn't been shutout since November 6, 2010 at Delaware.

Towson sophomore Darius Victor led the Tigers in rushing with 29 yards on just eight carries. Senior Derrick Joseph had a team-high three catches, while sophomore Andre Dessenberg had two grabs for a team-high 30 yards receiving.

Junior Donnell Lewis recorded a career-high 15 tackles and in his first action of the season, junior Christian Carpenter had 12 tackles. Delaire registered a sack for the second straight week and he also forced the only turnover of the game, a fumble that sophomore Syd Holt recovered. The Tigers have no turnovers through their first two games.

Towson, which won 33-18 at the UConn last season, falls to 1-7 all-time against FBS programs. West Virginia improves to 15-0 against FCS foes.

Trailing 7-6 in the fourth quarter, sophomore Jordan Mynatt blocked a Delaware State punt that senior Fred Overstreet recovered in the end zone to give the Tigers a lead they would not relinquish. Later in the quarter, senior Derrick Joseph returned a punt 81 yards for a touchdown to seal Towson's 21-7 win.

TOWSON, Md. -- Sophomore linebacker Jordan Mynatt became the first Towson football player in the Rob Ambrose era (2009-pres.) to record a sack, a forced fumble and an interception in the same game. However, it wasn't enough, as Stony Brook held the Tigers out of the end zone and escaped Johnny Unitas® Stadium with a 14-3 win.

Stony Brook took advantage of a Towson red zone turnover in the first quarter as Davonte Anderson intercepted a pass at the one-yard line and returned it 52 yards. The Seawolves made the Tigers pay by marching 47 yards on 11 plays and scoring the lone touchdown of the opening half on a Stacey Bedell plunge from one yard out.

Towson appeared to get the equalizer in the second quarter on a Darius Victor run, but an illegal formation penalty forced the Tigers to settle for a 26-yard Sam Hurwitz field goal.

The second half started with seven punts, a Stony Brook interception and a Towson field goal that was blocked. Still leading 7-3 with less than two minutes remaining in the game, the Seawolves put the game away with a 10-play scoring drive that was capped by a two-yard touchdown run from James Kenner.

James Simms paced the Tiger defense with 11 tackles, while Christian Carpenter added 10 stops. Tye Smith added nine tackles while also registering his first interception of the season.

The Tigers offense managed 242 yards of total offense. Quarterback Connor Frazier threw for 137 yards, while also picking up 39 on the ground.

NEWARK, Del. -- Towson scored 14 points in the final 5:23, including a Darius Victor 17-yard touchdown run with 49 seconds remaining, to propel the Tigers to a 24-17 win against Delaware.

Trailing 17-10 with 8:23 left in the fourth quarter, quarterback Connor Frazier led the Tigers down the field for a game-tying drive. VILLANOVA, Pa. -- Seventh-ranked Villanova scored 21 unanswered points in the fourth quarter to break open a close game and cruise to a 42-14 Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) victory over Towson on Saturday night at Villanova Stadium.

The loss snaps Towson's two-game win streak and drops the Tigers to 4-6 overall and 2-4 in CAA play. Villanova improves to 8-2 on the year and 5-1 in league play.

Despite the loss, sophomore Darius Victor reached a pair of major milestones in the game. In the first half, he became the ninth player, and just the third sophomore, in Towson history to surpass 1,000 rushing yards in a season. In the second half, Victor moved past David Meggett into 10th place on Towson's all-time career rushing yardage list.

On their next 32 offensive plays, the Wildcats racked up 241 yards and scored three touchdowns to go into halftime with a 21-7 lead. The Tigers scored on their first drive of the second half to make it 21-14 but would get no closer the rest of the way.

KINGSTON, R.I. -- Sophomore running back Darius Victor scoring his 12th rushing touchdown of the season, but that proved to be the lone offensive bright spot as Towson dropped its season finale at Rhode Island, 13-7, at Meade Stadium.

Failed scoring chances in the red zone doomed the Tigers, who close the season 4-8 overall and 2-6 in the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA). Towson scored just one touchdown despite advancing into the URI red zone on four different occasions.

The lone drive that resulted in points for the Tigers occurred midway through the second quarter. Towson ran the ball on nine straight plays, netting 50 yards and Victor scored from six yards out to tie the game, 7-7, with less than two minutes remaining in the opening half.

Sophomore Eric Handy paced the Tiger defense with a career-high 14 tackles, including three for a loss. Senior Tye Smith made six tackles in his final collegiate game to end his career with 312 tackles, fifth most in Towson football history.

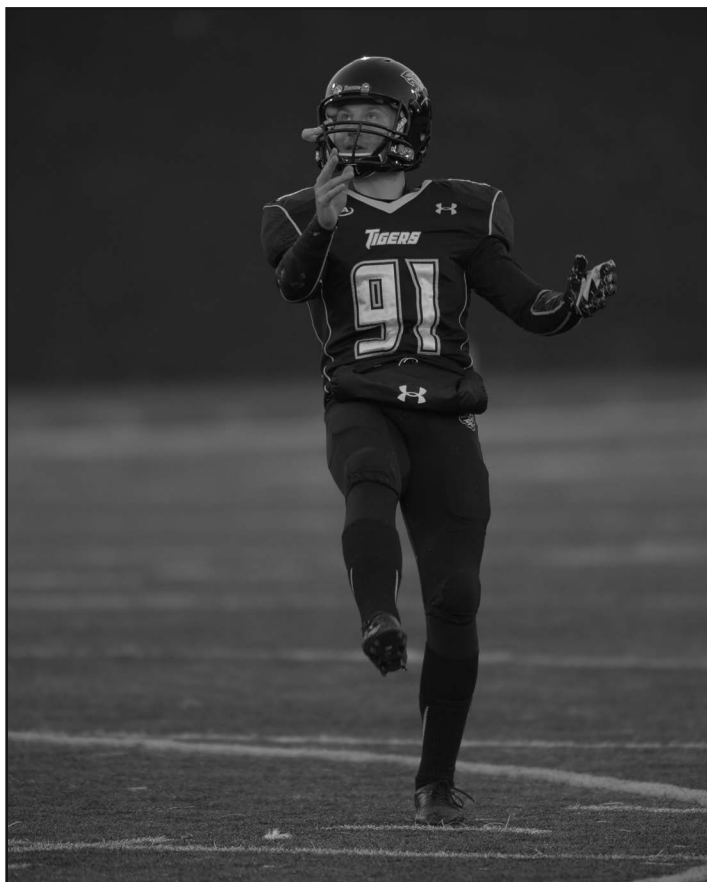

MINNEGAN FIELD AT JOHNNY UNITAS® STADIUM

Home of the Tigers



Unitas Stadium welcomed its first sell-out crowd when 11,196 spectators saw the Tigers host Lehigh University in an NCAA FCS playoff game in December, 2011.



Minnegan Field at Johnny Unitas® Stadium is home to Towson's football, field hockey, men's lacrosse, women's lacrosse and track and field programs.

Over the last four seasons, Unitas Stadium has become the place to be when the Tigers play at home.

The Tiger football team shattered attendance records in 2011 as near-capacity crowds became the weekly tradition. On Dec. 3, 2011, Unitas Stadium had its first sellout crowd when the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) champions hosted Lehigh in an NCAA FCS playoff game.

During the 2011 season, a record 62,645 fans attended football games at Unitas Stadium. Towson averaged 8,949 fans per home game. In 2011, the Tigers drew five of the top 11 crowds to attend a Tiger football game at Unitas Stadium.

Last season, the Tigers averaged 7,288 fans for its six home games.



**Doc the Tiger**

The sports complex, which underwent a \$32 million renovation over a three-year span, seats 11,198 spectators. It ranks as the third-largest outdoor venue in the metropolitan area, behind M&T Bank Stadium where the NFL's Baltimore Ravens play and Oriole Park at Camden Yards, home of the Baltimore Orioles.

Stadium renovations, which were completed in 2002, included an addition of 6,000 seats, artificial turf, an entry-level plaza, concession stands, new restrooms, ticket booths, a four-tier press box, a field house and a promenade that conveniently connects the northside and southside seating areas. Prior to the 2012 season, the stadium received a new playing surface as the FieldTurf was replaced with FieldTurf Revolution, the latest innovation in artificial surfaces.

The four-story, 48,000 square-foot field house provides Towson's student-athletes with an excellent collegiate facility. It includes spacious, modern locker rooms for each of its sports, an impressive athletic training facility, classrooms, conference rooms, an upscale equipment room, an academic resource center, a video-editing room and offices for the coaches.

Over the last two years, all of the teams that play in Unitas Stadium received notable improvements to their locker room facilities.

Designed to maximize exterior scenic looks, the field house includes windows that provide a stunning view of the adjacent playing area. A rooftop patio, known as the Dunn Terrace, treats guests to a bird's-eye view of the athletic contests.

The stadium is lighted for night play.

The Minnegan Room accommodates up to 200 guests at functions ranging from pre-game and post-game parties and banquets to fund-raising events.

A four-level press box rises high above the stadium on its south side. The Comcast Suite, a separate VIP level, is just below the main media floor. The media level can accommodate 35 working members of the press, two radio stations and

coaches booths. Each booth can comfortably seat six people. The stadium operations booth is located on the VIP level. The top floor, or camera deck, is the primary location for television broadcasts and game filming.

The complex is named in honor of two legends: one a coach and educator who served the university for over 40 years and another a former pro football player who many consider the greatest quarterback in NFL history.

Donald "Doc" Minnegan was a teacher, coach, physical education department chairman and director of athletics at Towson for more than four decades. He arrived at Towson in 1927, and he coached its soccer team until 1966.

Doc's soccer teams were very successful, winning a total of 156 games, and 66 of 77 between 1930 and 1936, including a school-record 34 straight. He also coached Towson to championships in baseball, basketball, track and swimming, in addition to soccer.

Doc is the only American to publish an article in the British Football Annual on soccer theory. He was inducted into the National Soccer Coaches Association of America's Hall of Fame in 1992. During his tenure as director of athletics, Doc established football as an intercollegiate sport at Towson in 1969. He died in 2002, just two weeks shy of his 100th birthday.

The stadium bore his name from 1983 until 2002. In accordance with that tribute, the playing surface remains Minnegan Field in his memory.

Johnny Unitas had a deep connection with the university. The former Baltimore Colts legend was the parent of three Towson students.

Several weeks prior to his untimely passing, Johnny U. began serving as a community liaison for Tiger Athletics. His role was to assist the school in obtaining a naming rights partner for the university's new stadium. The legendary Golden Arm died suddenly, less than a week after tossing his last pass to commemorate the opening of Towson's new stadium at pre-game ceremonies on September 5, 2002. When Sandy Unitas chose to assume her husband's role with Towson, she

sought to memorialize her husband's legacy on campus by having the stadium named Johnny Unitas® Stadium.

In addition to serving as the home for the Tiger football, lacrosse, field hockey and track and field teams, Unitas Stadium has hosted many special events.

Unitas Stadium was the host site for the 2008, 2009, 2010 and 2014 NCAA Division I Women's Lacrosse Championships, drawing record crowds each year.

In the 2014 NCAA Championship game, a crowd of 10,311 fans saw Maryland beat Syracuse, setting a record for the largest crowd to watch a women's lacrosse national championship game in the United States.

In addition, Unitas Stadium has hosted the annual Under Armour lacrosse all-star game the last five summers while the Maryland Intercollegiate Athletic Association (MIAA) has been playing its football and lacrosse championship games in Unitas Stadium for the last few years.

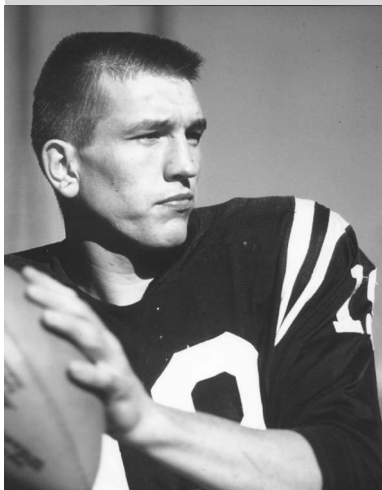

Johnny Unitas, The Golden Arm



Unitas Stadium is named in honor of Hall of Fame quarterback Johnny Unitas, who achieved legendary status during his career with the Baltimore Colts from 1956 to 1972. During his seasons as the Colts' quarterback, he changed the way the game was played as he turned Baltimore into a high-powered passing offense.

As the Colts' quarterback, he was named as the National Football League MVP three times. In 1958, he guided the Colts to an overtime victory over the New York Giants in the NFL Championship known as the "Greatest Game Ever Played."

He also led the Colts to the 1959 NFL championship and the championship of Super Bowl V when Baltimore beat Dallas.

A 10-time Pro Bowler, he also guided the Colts to the NFL championship game in 1964 and Super Bowl III.

A product of Louisville, Kentucky, "Johnny U" was the NFL Player of the Year three times. At his retirement, he owned NFL career records for pass completions (2,830), pass attempts (5,186), passing yardage (40,329) and touchdown passes (290).

In his career, he threw a touchdown pass in 47 straight games, setting a record that was broken by Drew Brees in 2012. Unitas' record had stood since 1960.

He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1979. He died on Sept. 11, 2002.



Football Chronology

SEPT. 20, 1969: The Tigers played their first game in program history and fall to Washington & Lee, 14-13.

OCT. 11, 1969: The Tigers won their first game in program history, a 53-16 victory over Frostburg State.

NOV. 1, 1969: The Tigers played the first tie game in school history as they battled to a 34-34 tie at Ursinus.

SEPT. 19, 1970: Posting the first shutout in school history, the Tigers opened their second season of play with a 29-0 victory over Gallaudet.

NOV. 14, 1970: With a 10-0 victory over Shepherd College, the Tigers concluded the first winning season in school history with a 6-2 record.

SEPT. 25, 1971: The Tigers edged Washington & Lee, 10-7, in their home opener. The victory turned out to be Coach Carl Runk's final win as the Tigers' head football coach as he resigned at the end of the season. Assistant Coach Phil Albert was promoted to head coach for the 1972 season.

OCT. 28, 1972: The Tigers celebrated Homecoming with a 20-8 victory over Johns Hopkins, presenting Coach Phil Albert with his first win as a college head coach.

NOV. 16, 1974: Larry Jones set a school record with 177 yards rushing as the Tigers ended the season with a 32-14 win over Federal City, enabling the Tigers to complete the first undefeated season in history with a 10-0 record.

NOV. 15, 1975: With a 14-7 season-ending win over Cheyney State, the Tigers clinched their second straight winning season with a 6-4 record.

NOV. 6, 1976: With a 26-7 upset win over ninth-ranked Hampden-Sydney, the Tigers earned a national ranking in Division III for the first time.

NOV. 13, 1976: By rushing for a school-record 304 yards, the Tigers ended the regular season with a 32-14 win over Cheyney State, earning an NCAA Division III playoff bid.

NOV. 20, 1976: Making their first appearance in the NCAA Division III playoffs, the Tigers pulled off a stunning 14-10 upset over C.W. Post on the Pioneers' home field. Mike Maloney scored the winning touchdown on a one-yard run with 4:01 left after a Randy Bielski fumble recovery gave the Tigers possession on the Post 23-yard line. An inter-

ception by Paul White with 10 seconds left clinched the win.

NOV. 27, 1976: Dan Dullea threw four touchdown passes as he led the Tigers into the national championship game with a 38-36 win over St. Lawrence. The Tigers jumped out to a 17-0 lead in the first quarter and never trailed.

DEC. 3, 1976: Playing before a national TV audience, the Tigers dropped a 31-28 heart-breaker to St. John's of Minnesota in the Stagg Bowl in Pheonix City, Ala. Trailing by 28-0 in the fourth quarter, the Tigers staged an amazing comeback to tie the game at 28-28 in the final minute. Quarterback Dan Dullea sparked the comeback by throwing four TD passes in the fourth quarter. But, a 19-yard field goal by Jeff Norman as time expired enabled the Johnnies to win the national title.

SEPT. 9, 1978: Before a crowd of 4,126 on Dedication Night at Towson Stadium, the Tigers rolled up 489 yards of total offense in a 37-6 win over Mansfield.

SEPT. 1, 1979: The Tigers' debut as an NCAA Division II program was ruined by crosstown rival Morgan State as the Bears pulled out a 34-7 win in the first meeting between the schools.

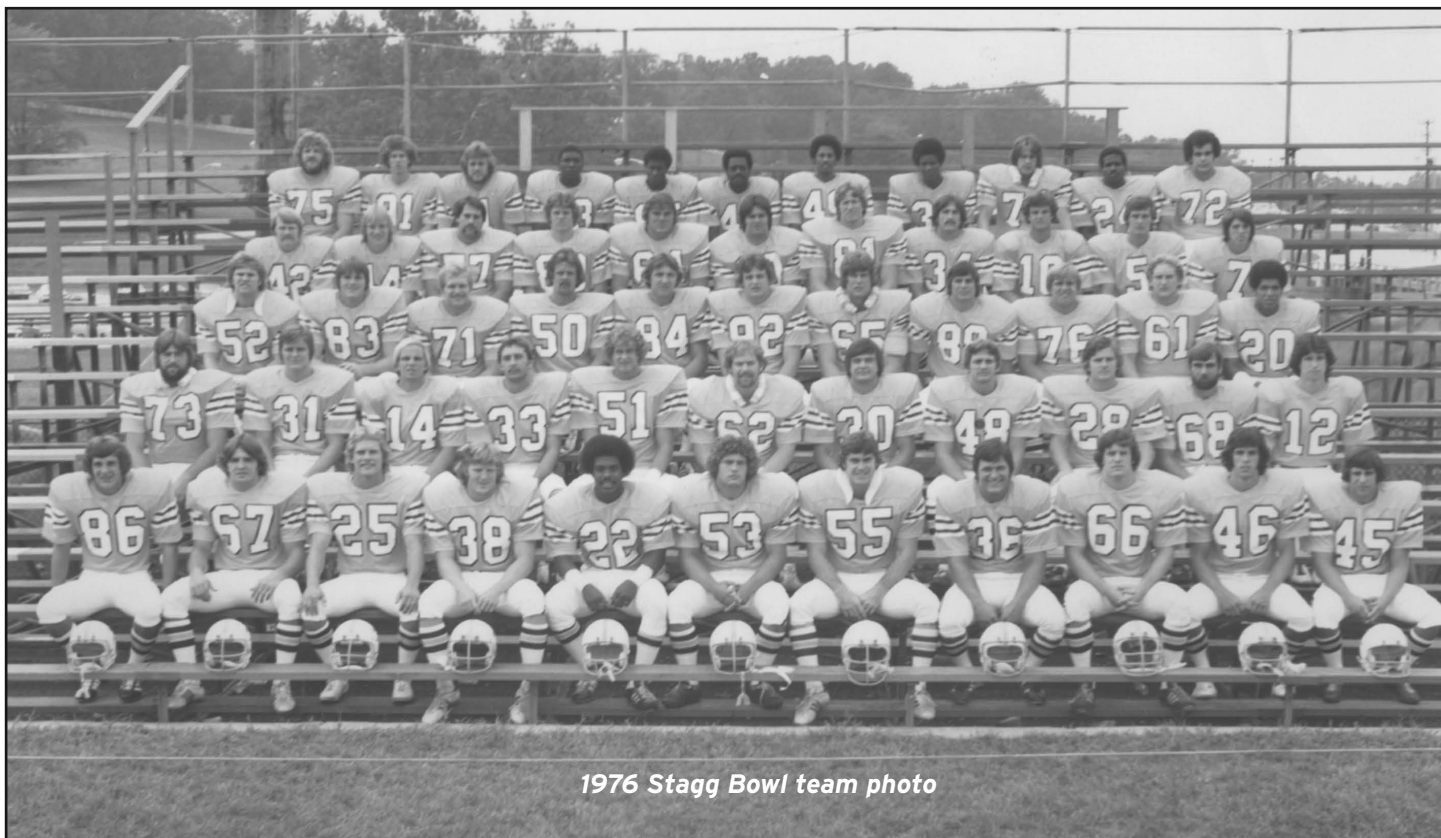
SEPT. 8, 1979: Playing their first game against an NCAA Division I-AA opponent, the Tigers travelled north and shocked Maine, 13-7. Freshman Ray Walsh gave the Tigers a 13-7 lead on a five-yard TD run in the fourth quarter. John Haywood's sack with four minutes left sealed the win.

OCT. 27, 1979: The Tigers presented Coach Phil Albert with his 50th career victory when they traveled to Ashland College and edged the Eagles, 21-15.

NOV. 17, 1979: Closing out their first season as a Division II program, the Tigers won their ninth consecutive game, a 27-14 win over Merchant Marine. With the victory, the Tigers finished the season with a 9-1 record and barely missed an NCAA playoff berth in their first year in Division II.

NOV. 1, 1980: Place kicker Sean Landeta kicked three field goals, including a school record 57-yarder, as the Tigers shut out Delaware State, 30-0. Landeta's 57-yard field goal was the longest kicked in the state of Maryland at any level.

NOV. 15, 1980: In his final college game, Ron Meehan passed for 367 yards and 4

TD's to lead the Tigers to a 40-20 win over C.W. Post. With the win, the Tigers finished the season with a 5-5-0 record as Meehan was named as the ECAC Division II Offensive Player of the Week for the third time.

OCT. 9, 1982: For the third game in a row, the Tigers staged a fourth quarter comeback as they rallied from a 10-3 deficit to edge Morgan State for the first time ever, 17-10. Before a Homecoming crowd of 6,835, the Tigers scored 14 points in the final ten minutes to win. A 10-yard TD run by Paul Cillo with 6:05 remaining put the Tigers ahead to stay.

JAN 4, 1983: All-American punter Sean Landeta was drafted in the 14th round of the first United States Football League (USFL) draft by the Philadelphia Stars. It marked the beginning of a 21-year career in pro football.

SEPT. 10, 1983: Holding New York Tech to 46 yards of total offense and one first down, the Tigers opened the season with a dominating 60-0 win over the Bears. Jeff Beathard led the Tigers by scoring three touchdowns.

OCT. 15, 1983: Greg Rogers intercepted a pass and returned it 21 yards for a touchdown as the Tigers forced nine turnovers en route to a stunning 13-4 win at Delaware. A pair of field goals by Jerome Nolan allowed the Tigers to take a 13-0 into the final minutes before Delaware avoided the shutout by scoring on a pair of safeties.

OCT. 22, 1983: Bret Rogers completed 19 of 22 passes for 292 yards and four touchdowns as the Tigers posted their fourth shutout of the season with a 37-0 win over Mansfield in a game that was televised regionally on CBS-TV. Rogers was named as the CBS Player of the Game.

NOV. 19, 1983: Closing out a 10-1 regular season, the Tigers built a 10-0 halftime lead and held on to edge James Madison by 10-3 in the final regular season game for both teams. With the win, the Tigers clinched a berth in the NCAA Division II playoffs for the first time.

NOV. 26, 1983: In their first Division II playoff game, the Tigers lost to eventual national champion North Dakota State in snowy Fargo, North Dakota. After spotting the Bison a 14-0 lead in the first quarter, the Tigers tried to rally from behind but they fell short in the final minutes.

OCT. 13, 1984: For the 13th year in a row, the Tigers won their Homecoming Game as they shut out District of Columbia, 31-0. The victory enabled the Tigers to open the season with seven wins in a row.

NOV. 10, 1984: Nearly clinching their second straight NCAA Division II playoff berth, the Tigers improved their record to 8-2 with a 38-7 victory over Morgan State.

NOV. 24, 1984: Facing Norfolk State in the quarterfinals of the NCAA Division II playoffs, the Tigers rushed for 295 yards en route to a 31-21 win at Foreman Field. Less than two minutes into the game, linebacker Joe Gamble blocked a punt and scored a touchdown to put the Tigers ahead to stay.

SEPT. 7, 1985: Quarterback Kurt Beathard passed for 263 yards and two touchdowns to lead the Tigers to a 28-10 victory over Shepherd in their season opener. The victory was the 100th in the history of Towson football.

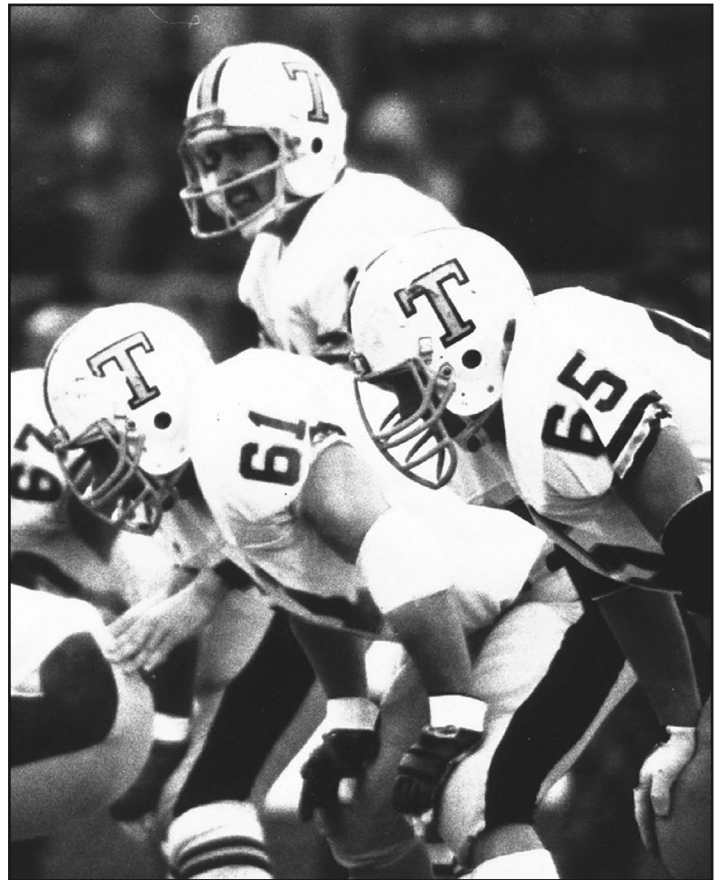
SEPT. 29, 1985: In a rare Sunday game necessitated by Hurricane Gloria, the Tigers staged a last-second rally to edge American International, 27-23. Kurt Beathard's 15-yard TD pass to Sean Murphy with six seconds left capped a 70-yard drive in the last minute. In the fourth quarter, Mike Barth returned a kickoff 96 yards for a TD, marking the first time a Tiger player had returned a kickoff for a TD.

OCT. 26, 1985: Led by quarterback Kurt Beathard, who passed for 267 yards and four touchdowns, the Tigers upped their record to 6-0-1 with a stunning 51-26 victory over Delaware State, a team that was the eighth-ranked team in NCAA Division I-AA.

NOV. 2, 1985: For the second week in a row, Kurt Beathard threw four touchdown passes as the Tigers came from behind to edge Lafayette, 27-24. The Tigers trailed by 17-7 in the third quarter before Beathard took over. He set an NCAA Division II record by completing 40 of 51 passes without an interception. He passed for a school record 466 yards as the Tigers upped their record to 7-0-1.

OCT. 11, 1986: Jim Lidowski's interception in the end zone in the fourth quarter led the Tigers to a 12-10 win over Liberty as Coach Phil Albert earned his 100th career win.

NOV. 15, 1986: With a 21-13 win at Indiana of Pa., the Tigers clinched a berth in the

NCAA Division II playoffs for the third time in four years. Jay McMichael led the Tigers by passing for 237 yards and two touchdowns.

SEPT. 12, 1987: Despite a 320-yard passing effort from freshman quarterback Chris Goetz, the Tigers lost to Northeastern in their first game as an NCAA Division I-AA program. The Huskies overcame a 22-17 third quarter deficit to pull out a 39-22 victory.

OCT. 3, 1987: David Meggett ran for 128 yards and scored two touchdowns to lead the Tigers to their first win as an NCAA Division I-AA team, a 17-14 win over third-ranked Maine in Orono. Maine came into the game with a 4-0 record and went on to win the Yankee Conference title.

SEPT. 12, 1988: In the Tigers' season opener, David Meggett returned a kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown and scored three other TD's, leading Towson to a 45-34 victory over Northeastern.

NOV. 5, 1988: David Meggett set a school record by rushing for 221 yards on 32 carries to lead the Tigers to a 31-17 win over New Haven.

DEC. 17, 1988: All-American tailback and kick returner David Meggett was named as the winner of the Walter Payton Award, given to the top player in Division I-AA.

APRIL 23, 1989: In the fifth round of the National Football League draft, David Meggett was drafted by the New York Giants.

NOV. 9, 1991: Quarterback Dan Crowley threw a 38-yard TD pass to Brian McCarty on a fourth down play with 8:02 remaining as the Tigers edged Howard, 13-7. The victory was the 117th career win for Coach Phil Albert - and it was the final win of his career.

FEB. 24, 1992: After 20 seasons as the Tigers' head coach, Phil Albert resigned. A four-time regional Coach of the Year, he had a record of 117-91-3 while coaching the Tigers at three different levels of NCAA football. He led Towson to 11 winning seasons

and four NCAA post-season berths.

FEB. 25, 1992: Long-time Tiger assistant coach Gordy Combs was named Towson's third head coach.

SEPT. 19, 1992: Thanks to a 140-yard rushing performance by Tony Vinson, the Tigers presented Gordy Combs with his first victory as head coach with a 24-21 come-from-behind win over Bucknell.

OCT. 24, 1992: Tony Vinson set a school record by rushing for 264 yards on 41 carries to lead Towson to a 28-21 Homecoming win over James Madison. He scored two TD's, including the game-winner with 13:33 remaining.

OCT. 31, 1992: Trailing by 33-13 at Indiana (Pa.) with less than six minutes remaining, the Tigers scored three touchdowns and recovered two onside kicks in the final 5:34 of the game. A four-yard TD run by Brian McCarty with 1:06 left gave the Tigers a lead and a 35-33 win. The victory ended IUP's 29-game home winning streak.

NOV. 14, 1992: For the second game in a row, the Tigers staged a wild finish as they edged Northeastern, 33-32. The Huskies had taken a 32-27 lead on a TD run by Henry Rogan with four seconds left. On the ensuing kickoff, the Tigers used several laterals before Julian Blair was tackled at the Northeastern 20-yard line. However, several Northeastern players had charged the field prematurely, giving the Tigers one untimed play from the ten-yard line. When Dan Crowley tossed a 10-yard TD pass to Mark Orlando, the Tigers pulled out the memorable win. The wild finish was honored by ESPN as its Wildest Finish of the 1992 season.

NOV. 6, 1993: A one-yard plunge by Tony Vinson on fourth down with ten seconds left enabled the Tigers to come from behind and upset 14th-ranked Delaware, 32-30. After the Blue Hens took a 30-26 lead with 2:22 left, the Tigers marched 60 yards in 11 plays for the win. Vinson's touchdown was his fourth of the game, tying a Delaware Stadium record.

NOV. 13, 1993: In his final home game, Tony Vinson set the NCAA Division I-AA rushing record with 364 yards and scored four touchdowns to lead the Tigers to a 49-21 win over Bucknell. On his final carry of the game, he sprinted 80 yards for a TD and the NCAA record.

NOV. 20, 1993: In his final game, All-American Tony Vinson ran for 327 yards and a school record 5 touchdowns to lead the Tigers to a 56-12 win at Morgan State. With 691 yards in 2 games, Vinson ended the season with an NCAA record 2,016 yards. With the win, the Tigers finished the year with an 8-2 record and barely missed an NCAA post-season appearance.

OCT. 29, 1994: Dan Crowley threw two long touchdown passes and Marco Calise blocked a key conversion kick as the Tigers pulled out a 24-21 win over unbeaten Hofstra, ranked 20th in the nation. Crowley's 80-yard TD pass to Shawn Ward in the third quarter gave the Tigers a 24-7 lead.

SEPT. 13, 1995: Commissioner Connie Hurlburt announced that Towson will join the Patriot League as an associate member for the 1997 season. Towson joined Bucknell, Colgate, Fordham, Holy Cross, Lafayette and Lehigh as members of the Patriot League.

OCT. 26, 1996: Towson retired Sean Landeta's number 5 jersey at halftime of a 54-14 win over St. Francis (Pa.).

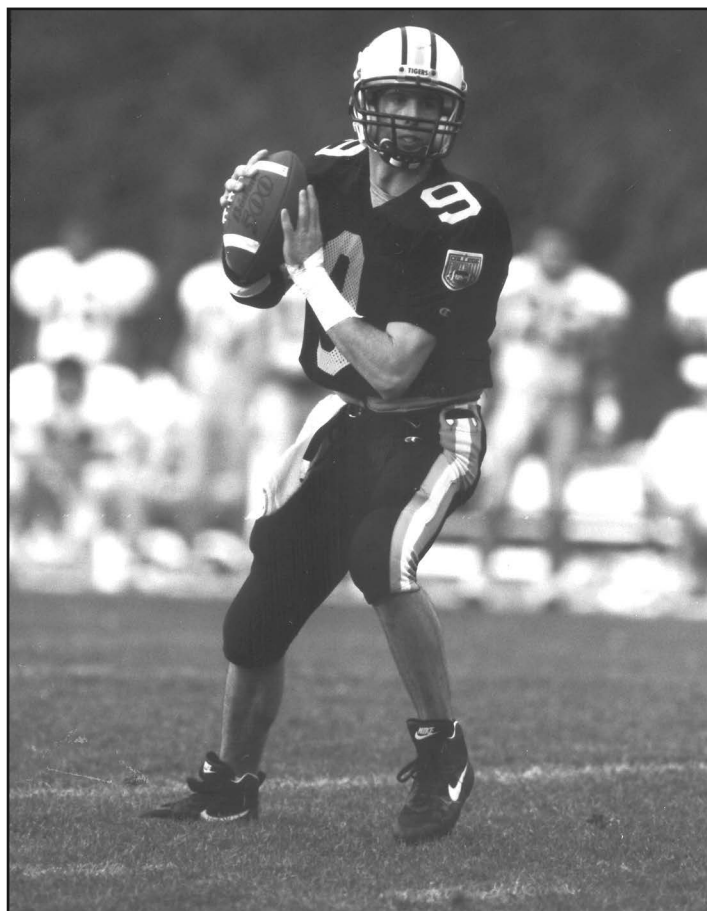
NOV. 2, 1996: Kevin Smith threw a 25-yard touchdown pass to Maurice Sydnor in the third overtime period as the Tigers won the longest game in school history, edging Marist in three overtimes, 33-32. Smith passed for a school record 471 yards in the win.

SEPT. 3, 1998: Before a record crowd of 8,056 at Minnegan Stadium, the Tigers used a tremendous defensive effort to win their season opener with a 15-10 victory over Morgan State. Linebacker Aaron Sakevich led Towson with 13 tackles.

SEPT. 11, 1999: In their Patriot League season opener, Jason Corle broke TU's career rushing record by running for 135 yards on 28 carries and scoring two touchdowns to lead the Tigers to a convincing 35-7 win over Lafayette.

OCT. 23, 1999: A 24-yard field goal by Ed Kulic with 26 seconds left lifted the Tigers to a 25-23 win over Fordham as they upped their Patriot League mark to 4-0. Kulic's field goal ended a game that featured seven lead changes.

SEPT. 9, 2000: Quarterback Kris Blake passed for 276 yards and 3 TD's to lead the Tigers to a 42-20 win over Lafayette. With the win, they presented Coach Gordy Combs with his 50th career victory as the Towson coach.

OCT. 14, 2000: Led by Noah Read, who scored four touchdowns, the Tigers snapped a three-game losing streak with a 38-6 Homecoming win over Howard. Read ran for 134 yards, his 7th straight 100-yard game of the year.

SEPT. 8, 2001: A six-yard touchdown run by Noah Read in overtime enabled the Tigers to post a 16-13 come-from-behind victory over Lafayette in their home opener. Read ran for a career high 218 yards on 38 carries to become the fourth Towson player to rush for more than 2,000 career yards.

AUG. 22, 2002: Towson University accepted an invitation to join the Atlantic 10 Football Conference for the 2004 season. Towson joined Delaware, Hofstra, James Madison, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Northeastern, Rhode Island, Richmond, Villanova and William & Mary in the A-10.

SEPT. 5, 2002: Before a record crowd of 8,517 in their new 11,000-seat stadium, the Tigers opened their season with a convincing 49-28 win over Morgan State. Playing in his first game for the Tigers, Mikal Lundy picked up 177 all-purpose yards and scored three touchdowns.

SEPT. 21, 2002: Matt Romeo scored on a 32-yard run and P.D. Moore intercepted a pass and returned it 24 yards for a touchdown as the Tigers pulled out a wild 56-42 victory over Brown. By scoring twice in the final 9:29, the Tigers snapped a 42-42 tie and overcame a five-TD performance by Brown quarterback Kyle Slager. Jay Amer passed for 309 yards and four TD's to lead the Tigers to a win in the highest-scoring game in school history.

OCT. 11, 2003: With Maryland Governor Bob Ehrlich and a host of former Baltimore Colt legends among the distinguished guests, Towson University officially dedicated Johnny Unitas® Stadium in honor of the late NFL quarterback. With a crowd of 8,125 in attendance, quarterback Anthony Melzi passed for 186 yards and two touchdowns while leading the Tigers to a 30-13 win over Holy Cross.

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Marcus Lee caught a pass in all 45 games of his career from 2005 -2008, setting an NCAA FCS record.

NOV. 8, 2003: Cornerback Devon Telp intercepted 2 passes and returned them for touchdowns in the final 2:10 to lead the Tigers to a 27-6 win at Georgetown. With the Tigers clinging to a 14-6 lead and 2:10 left, Telp intercepted a pass and returned 49 yards for a touchdown to give the Tigers a 20-6 lead. With 12 seconds left, he picked off another pass and ran 95 yards for a TD. His 144 interception return yards set a Patriot League record. The win was Towson's final Patriot League victory.

OCT. 2, 2004: Freshman quarterback Andrew Goldbeck passed for 285 yards and a pair of touchdowns as he led the Tigers to the 200th victory in school history, a 21-11 win over Cornell.

SEPT. 10, 2005: Winning their second game in a row, the Tigers set a school record by scoring 70 points in a 70-0 victory over Lock Haven. The Tigers raced to a 56-0 halftime lead before substituting liberally. Towson rolled up 601 yards of total offense as Eugene King ran for 127 yards on 7 carries and scored three TD's.

OCT. 1, 2005: Before a record Homecoming crowd of 10,778, the Tigers earned their first-ever Atlantic 10 victory with a 35-31 comeback win over 5th-ranked Delaware. Tailback Nick Williams scored the game-winning touchdown on a 3-yard run with 38 seconds left to cap off a 69-yard drive.

NOV. 5, 2005: En route to their third Atlantic 10 win of the season, the Tigers took advantage of four turnovers and a blocked punt to hand Villanova a 40-19 loss. Sparked by a 28-yard blocked punt return from Josh Corle just 100 seconds into the game, the Tigers jumped out to a stunning 38-6 halftime lead.

SEPT. 23, 2006: Sean Schaefer completed 43 of 60 passes for 458 yards and 3 touchdowns, leading the Tigers to a 33-30 win at Hofstra as they opened the season with a 4-0 record. Schaefer's 11-yard TD pass to Eric Yancey with 24 seconds left clinched the win. With the win, the Tigers rose to 17th in the nation, their highest national ranking at the Division I-AA level.

OCT. 28, 2006: Quarterback Sean Schaefer passed for 435 yards and tied the school record with five touchdown passes as the Tigers outscored Delaware, 49-35. Eric Yancey turned in a solid effort as he caught 9 passes for 140 yards and three touchdowns. The Tigers pulled out the win by scoring on four straight possessions in the second half as they beat the Blue Hens for the second year in a row.

APR. 29, 2007: Offensive tackle Jermon Bushrod was drafted by the New Orleans Saints of the NFL in the fourth round. His selection made him the Tigers' earliest draft NFL draft selection ever to date.

OCT. 6, 2007: Quarterback Sean Schaefer led the Tigers on a 67-yard, 4-play drive in the final 22 seconds as they earned a dramatic 23-21 victory over No. 14 Richmond. Schaefer completed 29 of 33 passes for 287 yards, setting a record for completion percentage (.879). Named as the National Player of the Week, he threw a game-win-

ning 14-yard TD pass to Demetrius Harrison on the final play of the game.

SEPT. 6, 2008: On his way to becoming the Tigers' career passing leader, Sean Schaefer rallied Towson from a 16-7 deficit for a 21-16 win over Morgan State. Schaefer, who completed 18 of 25 passes for 243 yards and 3 TD's, broke Dan Crowley's record with a 40-yard pass to Hakeem Moore in the fourth quarter.

OCT. 11, 2008: Sean Schaefer became the 20th quarterback in NCAA FCS history to pass for more than 10,000 career yards when he led the Tigers to a 37-32 Homecoming win over Rhode Island. When he threw a 64-yard TD pass to David Newsom, he gave Towson a 16-9 lead and went over the 10,000-yard mark.

NOV. 22, 2008: In his final college game, Marcus Lee became Towson's career receiving leader, catching six passes for 58 yards against No. 1 James Madison. Lee, set an NCAA FCS record by catching a pass in all 45 career games. Quarterback Sean Schaefer ended his career with 11,644 passing yards, eighth on the NCAA FCS list. He finished second in NCAA FCS history with 1,044 completions and set school records for attempts, completions, completion percentage and yards.

JAN. 6, 2009: A 1993 Towson graduate and former Tiger assistant coach, Rob Ambrose was introduced as the fourth head coach in Towson football history. He came to Towson from Connecticut where he was an assistant coach for seven years.

SEPT. 19, 2009: In their home opener, before a crowd of 7,682 at Unitas Stadium, the Tigers presented Rob Ambrose with his first victory as the Tiger coach, a 21-17 win over Coastal Carolina.

SEPT. 11, 2010: The Tigers won one of the longest games in NCAA FCS annals when they edged Coastal Carolina, 47-45, in the fifth overtime. The Tigers overcame a 21-7 fourth quarter deficit and tied the game when Tom Ryan caught a two-yard TD pass with 25 seconds left in regulation. A 25-yard TD catch by Hakeem Moore and a conversion run by Chris Hart gave Towson 47-39 lead in the fifth overtime. After Coastal scored a touchdown, Jordan Dangerfield knocked down a potential game-tying conversion pass to secure the win.

SEPT. 10, 2011: In their Colonial Athletic Association opener, the Tigers handed No. 20 Villanova a 31-10 loss. The Tigers took a 14-0 halftime lead and never trailed while beating the Wildcats for the first time since 2006.

OCT. 22, 2011: The Tigers improved to 4-0 in the CAA with a 38-27 win at William & Mary, Towson's fourth straight win over a nationally-ranked team. The Tigers scored

on their first four possessions and built a 28-17 lead. Terrance West scored three touchdowns to lead Towson while Grant Enders threw two TD passes.

NOV. 19, 2011: In the regular season finale, the Tigers clinched their first CAA championship with a 28-17 win at Rhode Island. The Tigers overcame a 10-0 first half deficit and led by 14-10 at the half. After Grant Enders threw two TD passes to Tom Ryan in the second half, the Tiger defense shut down URI, clinching the CAA title.

NOV. 26, 2011: At halftime of the Tigers' basketball game against Oregon State, the football team was honored for winning the CAA title. Sitting in his front-row seat, President Barack Obama joined the celebration and posed for pictures with the team.

DEC. 3, 2011: Before a sell-out crowd at Unitas Stadium, the No. 8 Tigers hosted No. 6 Lehigh in their first NCAA FCS playoff game. In a wild game that was tied six times, Lehigh pulled out a 40-38 victory on a fourth quarter safety. The most-improved team in NCAA Division I, Towson posted a 9-3 record, one season after going 1-10.

JAN. 5, 2012: At The Sports Network's annual FCS awards dinner in Frisco, Texas, Rob Ambrose was honored as the winner of the Eddie Robinson Award, presented to the FCS National Coach of the Year. The Tigers' Terrance West was also honored as the winner of the inaugural Jerry Rice Award, presented to the top freshman in NCAA FCS.

SEPT. 15, 2012: In the first CAA game televised by the NBC Sports Network, the Tigers opened their CAA title defense with a 20-17 win over William & Mary at Unitas Stadium. Terrance West led the Tigers by rushing for 153 yards on 27 carries.

SEPT. 29, 2012: Facing the third-ranked FBS teams the Tigers battled against Louisiana State and took a 9-7 lead in the second quarter. The Tigers surprised a national television audience on ESPNU by rolling up 291 yards of offense against LSU's highly-rated defense.

NOV 10, 2012: Playing in the final home game of his college career, senior Dominique Booker ran for a career high 181 yards on seven carries and scored a touchdown to lead the Tigers to a 41-10 win over Rhode Island. With the Tigers leading by 20-10, Booker ran for an 83-yard touchdown on the first play of the second half as the Tigers pulled away for an easy win, their third straight victory.

NOV 17, 2012: The Tigers piled up 660 yards of offense as they stunned No. 7 New Hampshire, 64-35. Towson's fourth straight win earned the Tigers a share of the

Colonial Athletic Association championship.

AUG. 30, 2013: Towson opened the season with a 33-18 win at UConn - the program's first win over an FBS opponent.

DEC. 7, 2013: Towson won its first FCS play-off game with a 48-28 victory over Fordham at the "U".

DEC. 13, 2013: Towson earned a 49-39 road win over Eastern Illinois in the FCS quarterfinals on an FCS playoff record 354 rushing yards on 39 carries by Terrance West.

DEC. 21, 2013: Towson reached the FCS National title game after a 35-31 comeback win over Eastern Washington. The Tigers were propelled by a 10-play, 71-yard touchdown drive directed by back-up quarterback Connor Frazier. The sophomore QB culminated the drive with a short rushing touchdown with 17 seconds remaining that led the Tigers to the national championship game.

JAN. 4, 2014: Towson faced North Dakota State in the FCS title game in Frisco, Texas, falling to the Bison, 35-7.

JAN. 12, 2014: Towson finished the year ranked No. 2 in the NCAA FCS Coaches Poll, the Tigers highest final ranking at the Division I FCS level.

MAY 10, 2014: Terrance West selected in the third round of the NFL Draft. West was selected by the Cleveland Browns with the 94th overall pick, the highest Tiger selection to date.

MAY 2, 2015: Tye Smith was selected by the Seattle Seahawks in the fifth round of the NFL Draft. Smith, the sixth player from Towson to be chosen in the NFL Draft, was selected 170th overall.

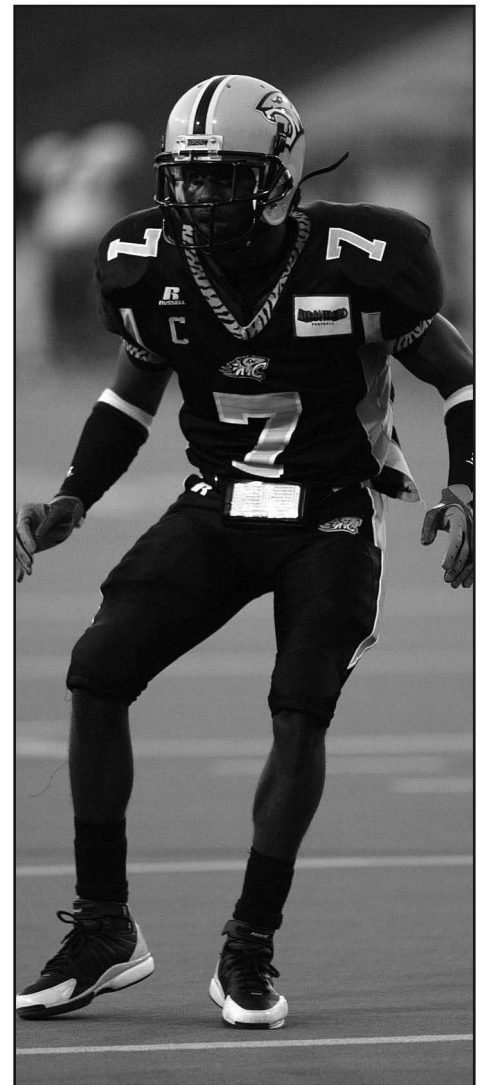

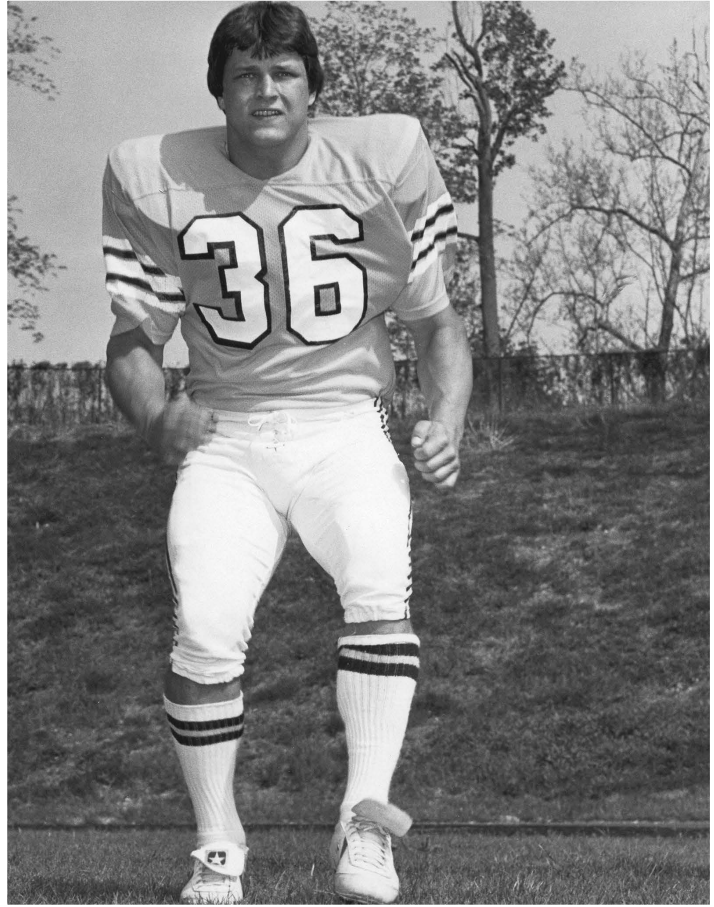

Overtime Games

Since the NCAA instituted overtime in football in 1996, Towson has been involved in eight overtime games. The Tigers are 6-2 in those contests. From 2002 to 2011, Towson went 86 games without playing an overtime contest.

The Tigers' streak without an overtime game ended on September 11, 2010 when they edged Coastal Carolina in five overtimes. The Tigers and the Chanticleers scored a total of 50 points during the overtimes.

The Tigers have played four overtime games at home where they are 3-1. Towson has won three of its four OT games on the road.

The 2001 season was the only season when the Tigers played two overtime games in the same year. After a 16-13 win over Lafayette on Sept. 8, they played another overtime game at Morgan State three weeks later. The Tigers pulled out a 20-17 overtime victory over the Bears.

The Coastal Carolina game was the Tigers' longest-ever game and one of the longest games ever played in NCAA FCS.

Nov. 2, 1996: TIGERS 33, Marist 32 3 OT

Towson rolled up some big numbers in its first overtime game. Quarterback **Kevin Smith** completed 36 of 57 passes for a school record 471 yards and a game-winning 25-yard TD pass to **Maurice Sydnor**. His 16-yard strike to **Shawn Ward** with nine seconds left in regulation sent the game into overtime. After Sydnor's TD, Marist responded with **J.J. Allen** rushing nine straight times and scoring a TD to pull Marist within 33-32. A penalty moved the ball to the one yard line for the conversion try. Marist went to Allen for a 10th time but linebackers **Lamont Dumas** and **Chris Beaumier** stopped him short, enabling Towson to preserve the win, ending the longest game in the history of both schools after three overtimes.

Sept. 26, 1998: TIGERS 35, Fordham 34 1 OT

Tailback **Jason Corle** ran for a career high 239 yards and scored three TD's, including the game-tying score in overtime, as the Tigers rallied for a 35-34 win over the Rams. After Corle tied the game on a one-yard plunge in overtime, freshman place-kicker **Ed Kulic** booted the game winning extra point as the Tigers claimed their first-ever win in the Patriot League, snapping a 7-game losing streak in league play. **Jon Carroll** scored the go-ahead TD for Fordham on a three yard run for a 34-28 Ram lead. But **Dan LaForese's** extra point kick missed wide left. Corle then carried eight times and finally punched it in from the one-yard line on a third and goal. Kulic finished it off with a perfect conversion kick.

Sept. 30, 2000: Colgate 30, TIGERS 27 1 OT

Colgate turned three blocked punts into TD's, ran a blocked extra point back for a defensive PAT and came up with an interception in overtime to stop the Tigers, sealing a 30-27 win. **Brandon Tinson's** third blocked punt of the game resulted in a Raider score late in the game that tied it at 27-27. With 2:35 left, Colgate put together a 13-play drive that ended when **Russ Abrams'** 47-yard field goal attempt hit the crossbar, falling short. The Tigers took possession first but Colgate's **Sean McCune** intercepted **Kris Blake** in the end zone. After five running plays by **Randall Joseph**, Abrams booted a 22-yard field goal for the victory.

Sept. 8, 2001: TIGERS 16, Lafayette 13 1 OT

Noah Read's six-yard touchdown run in overtime gave Towson a 16-13 come-from-behind win over Lafayette. Read ran for a career high 218 yards on 38 carries. The Leopards scored 16 seconds into the game when **Andrew May** returned the opening kickoff 93 yards. A 20-yard field goal by **Martin Brecht** made it 10-0. Towson was shut out until the fourth quarter. Read, who picked up 81 yards in the final period and overtime, pulled Towson to within 10-7 on an 11-yard TD run. A 22-yard field goal by **Ed Kulic** with 8:01 left in regulation tied the game at 10-10. In overtime, Brecht gave the Leopards a lead with a 28-yard field goal. But, the Tigers won it on the ground when Read scored on the fourth play of the drive.

Sept. 29, 2001: TIGERS 20, Morgan State 17 1 OT

Ed Kulic's 18-yard field goal, along with a game winning defensive play by linebackers **Sean Hendricks** and **Steve Hessler**, lifted the Tigers to a 20-17 victory that spoiled the debut of night football at Hughes Stadium for crosstown rival Morgan State. A 35-yard field goal by the Bears' **Jon Voroxholin** with just 1.4 seconds left in regulation sent the game into overtime deadlocked at 17-17. Towson took possession first but stalled on the 11-yard line where Kulic made his seventh field goal in as many tries. On Morgan's first play, **Ali Culpepper** ran to the right where he was met by Hendricks, who stripped him of the ball that was recovered by Hessler.

Oct. 5, 2002: Cornell 34, TIGERS 31 1 OT

Trailing by 24-0, the Tigers picked themselves up, dusted themselves off and rallied to tie the game before losing in the second overtime on a 19-yard field goal by Cornell. In the fourth quarter, the Tigers came alive as **Jason Amer** completed 9 of 11 passes for 165 yards and 3 TD's, enabling Towson to tie the game with 2:17 to play. Each team scored a TD in the first overtime. Cornell stopped the Tigers in the second overtime by blocking a **Ben Whitacre** field goal try. The Big Red won the game when **Trevor MacMeekin** kicked a 19-yard field goal to win it for Cornell.

Sept. 11, 2010: TIGERS 47, Coastal Carolina 45 5 OT

In the longest game in school history and one of the longest contests ever played in NCAA FCS, the Tigers edged Coastal Carolina in five overtimes, 47-45. The Tigers overcame a 21-7 fourth quarter deficit to tie the game. **Tom Ryan's** two-yard touchdown catch with 25 seconds left sent the game into the overtime. After the teams matched scores through 4 overtimes, the Tigers took a 45-39 lead in the 5th overtime when **Hakeem Moore** scored on a 25-yard touchdown pass. Then, **Chris Hart** scored on a two-point conversion to give the Tigers a 47-39 advantage. After Coastal scored a TD to make it 47-45, **Jordan Dangerfield** saved the win by knocking down the conversion pass in the end zone.

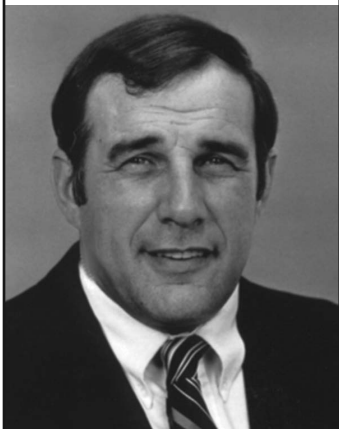
Nov. 3, 2012: TIGERS 34, Delaware 27 1 OT

Terrance West scored the game-winning touchdown on a three-yard run in overtime and **Jordan Love** intercepted a pass to end the game as the Tigers earned a 34-27 win over Delaware. The Tigers rallied from a 24-20 deficit to grab a 27-24 lead with 44 seconds left on a touchdown pass from **Grant Enders** to **Emmanuel Holder**, completing a 15-play, 80-yard drive. A 40-yard field goal by Delaware's **Sean Baner** with two seconds remaining tied the score at 27-27 and forced the overtime. After West's TD run put the Tigers ahead, Love stopped the Blue Hens' scoring try when he intercepted a pass. West led the Tigers by rushing for 113 yards on 30 carries with two touchdowns.

CARL RUNK (1969-71) 11-14-1



Carl Runk was Towson's first head football coach. A Baltimore native who graduated from the University of Arizona, he also served as the Tigers' head men's lacrosse coach. After leading Towson to an 11-14-1 record after three seasons, he gave up his football position to concentrate on the Tigers lacrosse program. Carl coached the men's lacrosse squad for 31 years, compiling a 262-161 record. He retired after the 1997 season. The 1974 Tigers captured the NCAA College Division National Championship. To this day, that is Towson's only national championship in a men's sport. When Towson's program moved up to the NCAA Division I level, he guided the Tigers to NCAA Tournament berths in 1989, 1991, 1992, 1994 and 1996. In 1991, he led Towson to NCAA Tournament wins over Virginia, Princeton and Maryland as the Tigers reached the national championship game where they lost to undefeated North Carolina in a game played in the Carrier Dome at Syracuse University.

PHIL ALBERT (1972-91) 117-91-3

Phil Albert, an assistant to Carl Runk, took over as head coach in 1972 and led the Tigers for the next 20 years, compiling a 117-91-3 record. In 1974, he led the Tigers to a 10-0 record, the only unbeaten season in program history. His 1976 team participated in the NCAA Division III Playoffs, advancing to the Stagg Bowl. Three of his Division II teams were NCAA Playoff squads. Coach Albert was named as AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year three times. After resigning, he remained on the faculty while scouting for the San Diego Chargers. He returned to the Tiger program in 2003 as offensive coordinator - a position he held until 2008.

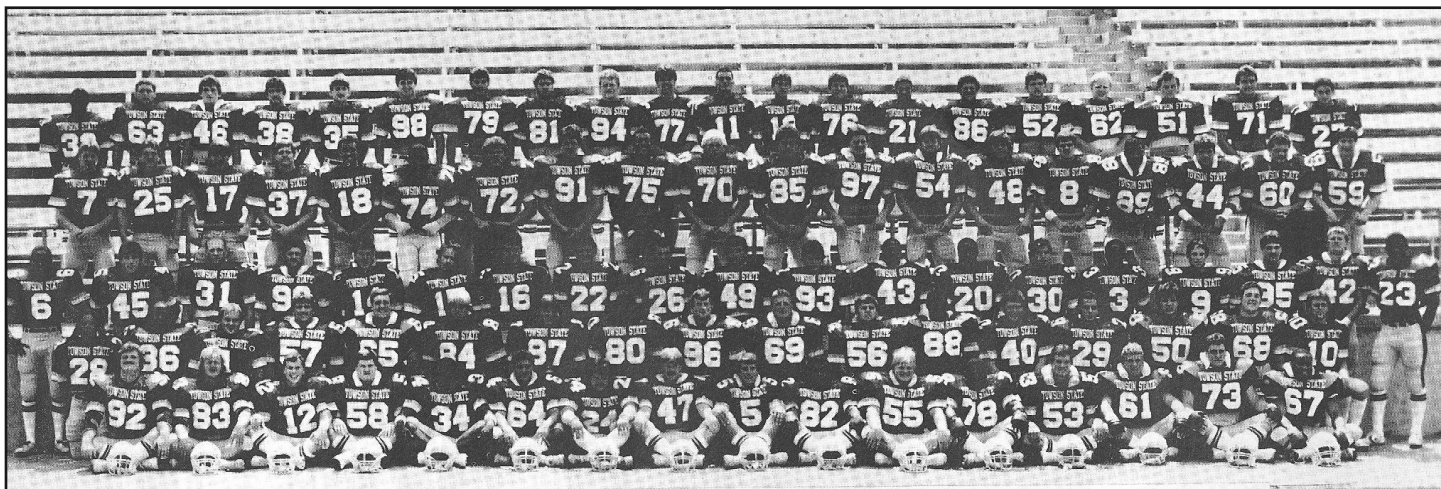

The 1984 Tigers reached the semi-finals of the NCAA Division II playoffs and won Towson's second straight Lambert/Meadowlands Award, presented to the top Division II team in the East. The Tigers finished the season with a 9-4 record after beating Norfolk State in the first round of the NCAA playoffs.

A 1973 Towson graduate, he led the Tigers to a 33-17 record in his first five seasons before Towson joined the Patriot League. After leading the Tigers to a 5-5 record in 1992, he coached Towson to back-to-back 8-2 records in 1993 and 1994. Those are the best two records the Tigers have had at the NCAA Division I-AA (FCS) level. In the Tigers' third season as members of the Patriot League, he led Towson to a 7-4 record and a third place finish in the league. He was named Patriot League Coach of the Year in 1999. Coach Combs led Towson through a transitional period as the program joined the Atlantic 10 Football Conference in 2004. In the Tigers' third season in the A-10, he coached them to a 7-4 record and a second place finish in their division.

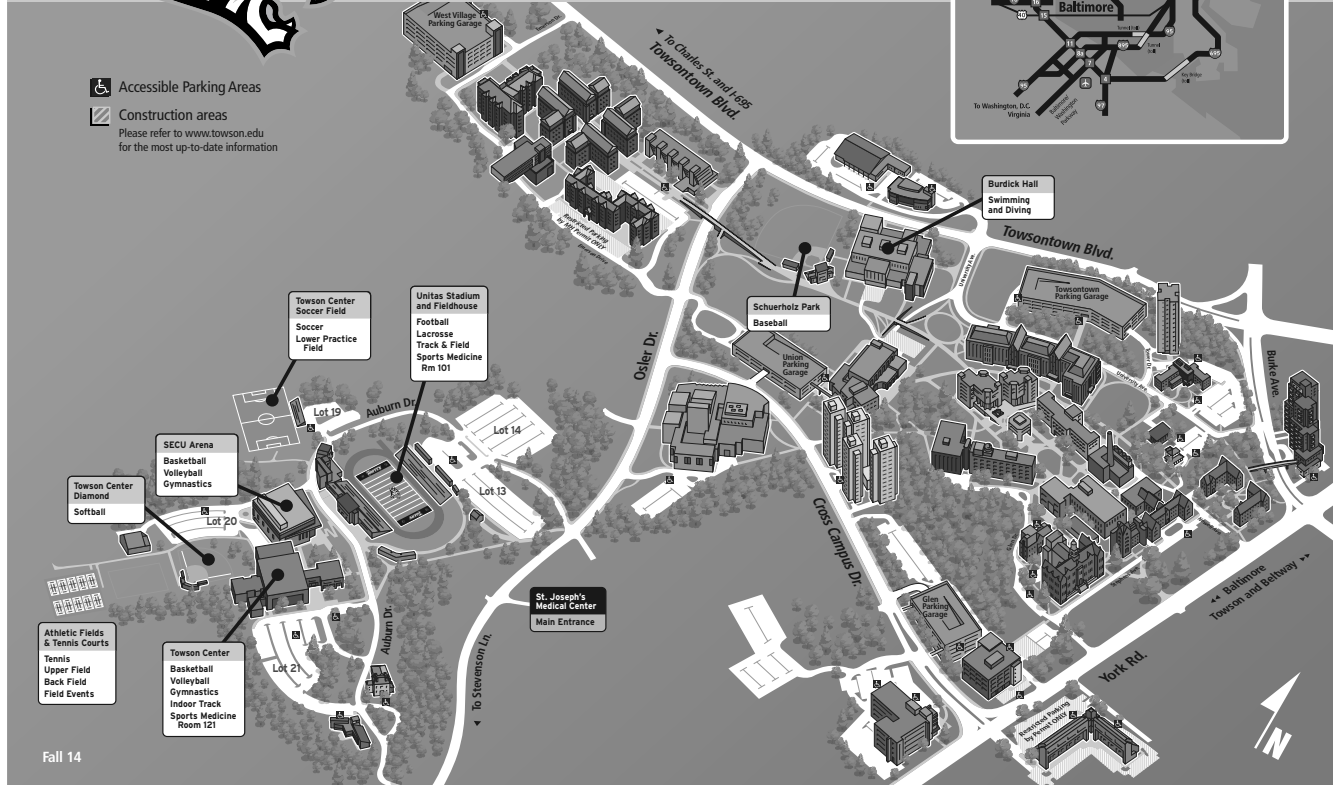
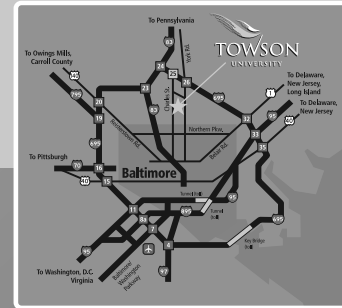

Towson University is located in the northern suburbs of Baltimore City, just 20 minutes from the nationally acclaimed Inner Harbor, and five minutes from the picturesque Maryland countryside. Towson is the county seat for Baltimore County. As a result, all interstates intersecting the Baltimore Beltway I-695 are signed indicating an easterly or westerly direction to "Towson."

The 328-acre campus is within reasonable driving distances from most major cities on the East Coast. The campus is approximately six hours by car (330 miles) from Upstate New York, four hours (190 miles) from New York City, two hours (90 miles) from Philadelphia, 45 minutes (40 miles) from Washington, D.C., and 25 minutes from Annapolis, the state capital of Maryland.

From Upstate New York and Eastern Pennsylvania

Follow I-81 South until it intersects with I-83 in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. Follow I-83 South until you see signs for the Baltimore Beltway, I-695. Take the I-695 Towson ramp, staying in the right lane to exit immediately onto Charles Street. Bearing right off the ramp, follow Charles Street south for 1.5 miles (from first traffic light) to Towsontowne Boulevard. Turn left at the traffic signal (you can't turn right because Towsontowne dead ends into Charles Street). Proceed on Towsontowne Boulevard seven-tenths of a mile to the next traffic light. Turn right on to Osler Drive and proceed one-half mile to Auburn Drive. Take a right onto Auburn. The Towson Center is just over the hill on the right and Johnny Unitas® Stadium is on left.

From New York City, New Jersey, Philadelphia and Delaware

Follow I-95 South to the Baltimore Beltway, I-695 West (extreme right lane as you approach I-695). Follow I-695 towards Towson (this is clearly marked) to Exit 25 Charles Street. At the end of the ramp at the stop sign, turn left and then make another left at the roundabout on to Charles Street. Follow Charles Street south for 1.7 miles to Towsontowne Boulevard. Turn left at the traffic signal (you can't turn right because Towsontowne dead ends into Charles Street). Proceed on Towsontowne Boulevard seven-tenths of a mile to the next traffic light. Turn right on to Osler Drive and proceed one-half mile to Auburn Drive. Take a right onto Auburn. The Towson Center is just over the hill on the right and Johnny Unitas® Stadium is on left.

From Washington, D.C., Richmond

Proceed on I-95 North to the Baltimore Beltway, I-695. Exit left (exit is on left) on to I-695 towards Towson to Charles Street (Exit 25 off I-695). Bear right on to Charles Street coming off the ramp. Follow Charles Street south for 1.5 miles (from first traffic light) to Towsontowne Boulevard. Turn left at the traffic signal (you can't turn right because Towsontowne dead ends into Charles St). Proceed on Towsontowne Boulevard seven-tenths of a mile to the next traffic light. Turn right on to Osler Drive and proceed one-half mile to Auburn Drive. Take a right onto Auburn. The Towson Center is just over the hill on the right and Johnny Unitas® Stadium is on left.

From Pittsburgh and Western Pennsylvania

Follow Interstate 70 East past Hagerstown and Frederick. I-70 dead-ends at the Baltimore Beltway I-695. Eventually bear left towards Towson (signs clearly indicate direction to Towson) as you approach I-695. Proceed on I-695 to Charles Street (Exit 25 off I-695). Bear right off the ramp on to Charles Street. Follow Charles Street south for 1.5 miles (from first traffic light) to Towsontowne Boulevard. Turn left at the traffic signal (you can't turn right because Towsontowne dead ends into Charles St). Proceed on Towsontowne Boulevard seven-tenths of a mile to the next traffic light. Turn right on to Osler Dr. and proceed one-half mile to Auburn Dr. Take a right onto Auburn. The Towson Center is just over the hill on the right and Johnny Unitas® Stadium is on left.

From Baltimore-Washington International Airport

Exit the airport via I-195. Follow the signs for the Baltimore Beltway, I-695 to Towson. Proceed on I-695 to Charles Street (Exit 25 off I-695). Bear right off the ramp on to Charles Street. Follow Charles St. south for 1.5 miles (from first traffic light) to Towsontowne Boulevard. Turn left at the traffic signal (you can't turn right because Towsontowne dead ends into Charles St). Proceed on Towsontowne Boulevard seven-tenths of a mile to the next traffic light. Turn right on to Osler Dr. and proceed one-half mile to Auburn Dr. Take a right onto Auburn. The Towson Center is just over the hill on the right and Johnny Unitas® Stadium is on left.

OBTAINING CREDENTIALS

Media credentials are issued to accredited members of the media only. Requests for credentials should be made via phone, mail, e-mail or fax to John Brush in the Towson University Office of Athletics Media Relations. Please be sure to follow up your request with a phone call to ensure it has been received.

Space in the press box of Johnny Unitas @ Stadium is limited, so requests should be made no later than 48 hours prior to game time. Should space become a problem, preference will be given to the primary media outlets of each school and then, to media who their requests earlier in the week.

Photographers must show their credentials in order to gain access to the playing field area. All photographers are limited to the areas along the perimeter of the field but may not enter the team bench areas at any time.

Local television stations shooting the game for highlight footage may do so from the sideline (except in team areas) or from the stands on the south (press box) side of the stadium.

Credentials may be picked up in the press box lobby beginning two hours prior to game time. In addition, they may be picked up from the Office of Athletics Media Relations from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on the day prior to the game.

RADIO BROADCAST INFORMATION

Broadcast positions for visiting radio stations are available in the Unitas Stadium press box. Phone lines (POTS and ISDN) may be rented from the Office of Athletics Media Relations. Stations wishing to broadcast a game from Unitas Stadium should contact Towson at least two weeks prior to game day. Credential and parking requests for radio staff should be submitted along with the request for phone lines.

MEDIA PARKING

Parking around Unitas Stadium is limited on gameday. Media parking will be available in the Osler Medical Center parking lot, which is located near Unitas Stadium on Osler Drive. Requests for parking passes should be made at the same time as credential requests. If you do not make arrangements in advance for parking, you will not be able to receive a parking pass for the game.

ROAD GAME REQUESTS

Local members of the media who wish to cover a Towson road football game should contact the host school's sports information director to obtain credentials. Contact information for the football SID's of all 2015 Towson opponents can be found in the opponents section of this guide.



INTERVIEW POLICIES

PRE-SEASON: Tiger football coaches and players are available for interviews after each practice session. Visiting media must call ahead to receive credentials to cover practice.

IN-SEASON: Due to time constraints, access to Tiger football players is limited once the season starts. All player interviews must be conducted by 7 p.m. on Wednesday during a normal practice week. All interviews should be scheduled for post-practice time prior to 7 p.m.

Telephone interviews must be arranged through the Athletics Media Relations Office. No player phone numbers will be made available.

Coach Rob Ambrose will be available on Thursday and Friday during game week.

IN-SEASON TV INTERVIEWS: All television interviews with players and coach may be conducted in the 30-minute period prior to the start of practice. These interviews must be conducted on Tuesday and Wednesday. No TV interviews will be conducted on Thursday and Friday. All television crews are restricted to shooting practice footage for the first 10 minutes of practice.

Requests for specific Towson players should be made to Dustin Semonavick during the fourth quarter. Interviews with opposing players should be coordinated through the visiting SID.

The locker rooms for both teams are closed at all times.

POST-GAME INTERVIEW POLICIES

Coach Rob Ambrose and selected Tiger football players will be available in the post-game interview room located in the Field View Room on the top floor of the Field House.

After a ten-minute cooling off period, the visiting team coaches and players will appear in the interview room.

After the visiting team finishes, Coach Rob Ambrose and selected players will appear in the interview room. No Tiger first-year freshmen will appear in the interview room.

IN-GAME MEDIA SERVICES

Pre-game notes, flip cards and game programs are distributed in the press box before each game. Quickie statistics will be provided after each quarter with a full statistics packet available approximately 20 minutes after the game. There are a limited number of phone lines available in the press box, but wireless internet is available for media to use. Food and beverages will be provided in the press box approximately 60 minutes before game time.
