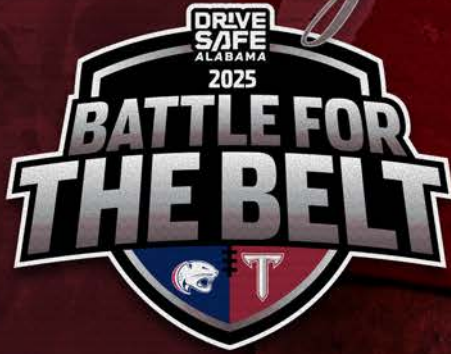

TROY FOOTBALL GAMEDAY

DID YOU KNOW?

- ✗ Troy is celebrating its 25th season as an FBS member in 2025 ... during its run at the highest level of college football, Troy has won eight conference titles and six bowl games
- ✗ This is the first time since 2021 that the "Battle for the Belt" will be played on a Saturday; it's just the third time since 2016 that the game has been on a Saturday. Troy is 4-1 in Saturday games against South Alabama
- ✗ Troy allowed seven sacks in the win at Buffalo, the most in a Trojan victory in the program's Division I history. It's the most sacks allowed by a FBS team in a victory this season; in fact, last season only three teams won when allowing seven or more sacks in a game
- ✗ Troy has won six of the last seven games against South Alabama, including three straight at home
- ✗ Troy rushed for 163 yards at Buffalo despite the seven sacks; the Trojans improved to 43-4 since 2015 when rushing for 150-plus yards
- ✗ Troy scored a defensive touchdown in back-to-back games (Clemson & Memphis) for the first time since 2023

Special announcements on the public address system are limited to medical and police emergencies. In addition, Veterans Memorial Stadium does not display birthday, anniversary or other personal messages on the scoreboard.

GAME PROGRAM

Troy's GAMEDAY Program will be produced in a digital format only for the 2025 season; fans will be able to visit TroyTrojans.com/Program to view each week's edition.

EMERGENCY INFORMATION

If a situation arises which requires evacuation of Veterans Memorial Stadium, we request your cooperation and assistance to exit the facility in an orderly manner. Once an evacuation announcement has been given please proceed to the nearest stairway or exit. Outside the stadium follow the directions of the event staff and do not attempt to re-enter the stadium. In the case of an adverse weather situation please seek immediate shelter.

PROHIBITED ITEMS

Food, drink containers, bottles, artificial noise makers, cans, thermo-bottles, ice bags, ice chests, umbrellas, strollers, video cameras, large flags, weapons or any object deemed HAZARDOUS by stadium management. Game management personnel reserve the right to inspect patrons entering the stadium for the purpose of fan safety. All purses, backpacks or other bags must fit within the assigned seating area for each patron. Game management personnel reserve the right to inspect all bags and to prohibit oversize bags from admission to the stadium.

PROHIBITED BEHAVIOR

Examples of prohibited behavior include, but are not limited to, throwing of objects of any kind; demonstrating unruly behavior; attempting to enter the field of play; engaging in behavior that endangers the safety of student-athletes, coaches, officials or other guests; removing stadium turf; and/or taunting public service officials. Consequences for guests exhibiting prohibited behavior include, but are not limited to, loss of ticket buying privileges, ejection from the stadium, and/or arrest.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

Alcohol is sold within the venue. Only those who are of age and have proper identification are permitted to purchase alcohol. No outside alcohol is permitted. Beer will be available to purchase at five locations throughout Veterans Memorial Stadium (2 West Concourse, 2 North Plaza, 1 East Concourse).

Upon providing proper identification at the point of sale, a band will be placed on the customer's wrist, identifying that individual is of legal drinking age.

Customers are permitted to purchase no more than two beers at a time.

Beer sales will be halted at the end of the third quarter.

Sodexo Food Services, law enforcement personnel, and game management officials reserve to the right to refuse the sale of alcohol to anyone.

Any athlete with a suspected concussion should immediately be removed from play and activity, evaluated right away by a doctor or healthcare professional, monitored and not left alone and not drive a motor vehicle.

JORDAN STRINGER

J-ROCK IS A MINDSET

Growing up in Augusta, Georgia, Jordan Stringer's childhood was defined by family, football, and spending some time at one of the top sporting events in the country – The Master's.

Stringer was a kid hustling outside Augusta National, selling water bottles to patrons who flocked to the tournament each spring. He remembers his time on the course well, saying he will never forget the day that a man gave him a crisp \$100 bill for two waters and told him to keep the change.

"I realized then it was just a different level out here," Stringer said. "That made my whole day."

From a kid just selling water bottles at The Master's, even though he admittedly sucks at golf, to now one of the biggest names in the Troy community, must people around here know him affectionately as "J-Rock."

The name first surfaced in fifth grade. Stringer, then a stockier kid playing defensive end, had a big game. His recreation league coach knew his family called him "J," and after watching him dominate, the coach added his own twist.

"He was like, I'm gonna start calling you J-Rock. Your family calls you J, and you know how to hit," Stringer said.

The nickname stuck. By the time Snapchat and high school rolled around, "J-Rock" became not just a handle but an identity. By the time he arrived at Troy, it was the only name people knew.

And in many ways, it fits perfectly. For Stringer, being "solid" is more than a nickname — it's a mindset.

"I'm always gonna be solid and make sure this team's solid," Stringer said. "You never have to question that. That's what being J-Rock means."

On the field, he's become exactly that: the rock of Troy's defense. Teammates know they can count on him to show up every day, even if it is him having a bad day.

"I know how it is to have a bad day," Stringer said. "But being a leader means I can't really show it. My team needs me to be that guy for a few hours, and I can deal with my stuff later. The one thing I never want is for a teammate to say they can't count on me. I make sure they can."

His influence doesn't stop at the locker room doors. Around Troy, "J-Rock" has become more than a player — he's a staple of the community. From fans to faculty, everyone knows his name, and that support means the world to him.

"The Troy community took me in from day one," he said. "They've been with me through everything, and I couldn't ask for a better atmosphere to be in. Troy will always have a special place in my heart."

Even on his toughest days, he finds strength in his circle. Sometimes it's a phone call home to his mom or brother. Other times, it's just being in the locker room with teammates, laughing and unwinding.

"It's really these guys [that are my rock], like, whenever I'm having a bad day, the thing I want to do the most is come up here. I just know when I'm up here, around these guys, we got so many different personalities to take my mind off things. Coming up here, really is my it's my relaxing point. I get to be, I get to be who I really am. I get to be the chill guy. I get to be the rock, but these guys are my rock. They make me who I am."

When his time at Troy is over, Stringer hopes people will remember more than just his tackles or his leadership on the field. He hopes people remember him as someone this community could count on.

"I want people to say I showed up every day and did my job," he said. "That I kept my team together and never gave up on Troy. Because I never did."

JARRIS WILLIAMS

FOUNDATION OF GRIT AND PERSEVERANCE

From Blount High School to the Sun Belt Championship Game, Troy senior running back Jarris Williams has built his career on grit and perseverance. For Williams, hard work is not optional—it's his foundation.

"The atmosphere at Troy is different," Williams said. "We don't always have as much as everybody else, but we're going to work and grind for it. Nothing is given. Troy is the perfect spot for me."

That work-first mentality has carried him through the highs and lows of football. While football wasn't a family tradition, Williams was introduced to the game by his uncle, who remains a guiding influence.

"Football isn't really in my genes, but my uncle taught me how to play," Williams said. "I fell in love with it around seventh grade."

The Mobile, Ala., native said his relationship with his uncle remains strong.

"We have a good bond, and he's like a dad to me," Williams said. "He always told me to be better and try to stand out. Whether it's offense, defense or special teams, he would always tell me to put my name in the papers."

For Williams, special teams became the stage where he embraced that advice. As a redshirt freshman and sophomore, he carved out a role on special teams and quickly recognized its value.

"I hate that I didn't get on special teams my freshman year," Williams said. "I care about special teams more than offense and defense, because special teams win games."

Williams also believes those snaps shaped him into a more complete player.

"If you just play one side of the ball, I feel like scouts and recruiters are just going to get somebody else that can run the ball and play special teams over somebody that just plays one side of the ball," he said.

Adversity has been a constant challenge for Williams. In 2024, he suffered a season-ending injury after just two carries against Iowa. Instead of allowing it to derail his mindset, he leaned on the lessons instilled by his family.

"I never put my head down or got down about it," Williams said. "My mom and my grandma always told me that stuff happens for a reason, and I believe that. I don't panic, I don't give up and I don't fall out. I just get back to work."

That resilience has also fueled his leadership. Williams said one of his biggest motivations is mentoring younger players, guiding them through the same challenges he once faced.

"What motivates me is seeing younger kids do the same things I used to do, because I was once that kid," Williams said. "I'm able to tell them all my wrongdoings and let them know exactly how it goes. I had to

learn a lot, and I've been through a lot of ups and downs."

Adjusting to the college game was one of those challenges. Williams rushed for 1,352 yards and 13 touchdowns as a senior at Blount but quickly discovered that success at the next level required patience.

"The biggest challenge is coming from high school where you're 'that guy,'" Williams said. "You have to realize that when you come to college and you're a freshman, you have to work to get that role again. You have to start on the scout team and work your way up."

Now a senior, Williams has grown into his role as a veteran leader who values the relationships he's built as much as the plays he's made.

"The mark I want to leave is being one of a kind," Williams said. "It doesn't even have to be on the field—when you say my name, I want people to remember my personality and how I interact with people, even if I just met you."

For Williams, that mark is less about yards and touchdowns and more about the impression he leaves as a teammate, leader and person. His story at Troy isn't just about football—it's about resilience, mentorship and the relentless pursuit of growth.

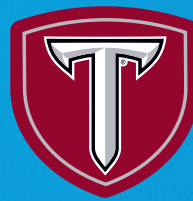

Finding His Voice Through Football: The Quiet Leadership of David Daniel-Sisavanh

Some athletes fill a room with their words. David Daniel-Sisavanh fills it with his presence. Reserved by nature, the senior safety would rather let his play do the talking. Yet, behind his quiet demeanor lies a story of resilience, growth, and a vision for the future that extends far beyond the gridiron.

Daniel-Sisavanh's journey began in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, where sports weren't just a pastime but a necessity. From the time he could walk, he carried more energy than his teachers could handle.

"I used to get in trouble in school for having too much energy," he admitted.

His mother quickly found a solution, enrolling him in every sport possible. Basketball? Too physical. Baseball? Hand-eye coordination wasn't his strength. Tennis and golf didn't stick either. But football was different. From the age of three, it was his outlet.

The sport became more than a game when his family moved during his eighth-grade year. His father, a project manager, relocated the family to Georgia. For a 13-year-old still trying to figure out who he was, the transition wasn't easy.

"I wouldn't say I felt like an oddball, but I didn't feel like I necessarily fit in," Daniel-Sisavanh said.

Football gave him a bridge. It was where he could belong, compete, and let the quiet kid inside him find a voice.

On the field, Daniel developed into a fierce competitor, initially playing running back before transitioning to defensive back in high school. He modeled his game after legends like Brian Dawkins and Ray Lewis, players known for their intensity and fearlessness.

"I don't have Dawkins' size," he said, "but that physicality, that mindset, is there."

That mindset carried him through countless injuries that might have ended other careers—concussions, hamstring pulls, turf toe, wrist injuries, even surgeries.

Each setback tested his love for the game, but none of them broke it. If anything, they sharpened his understanding of what football truly meant to him. When forced to spend time away from the sport, he found clarity.

"Being taken out of football was heartbreaking, considering I'd been playing since I was a newborn," Daniel-Sisavanh said. "But it taught me a lot about myself."

Back on the field now, Daniel-Sisavanh remains his own harshest critic. He rarely allows himself to feel satisfied, always believing he can be better. That standard fuels his preparation and performance, but it also reflects the lessons he wants to carry forward once his playing days are done. His vision of the future is not about leaving the game behind but giving it back.

"I want to become a coach of some sort," he said. "Whether that's high school, college, NFL, maybe a position coach, maybe a head coach one day. I've been in the game too long. It's going to be hard to let it go."

Coaching appeals to him not just as a career but as a calling. For a man of few words, teaching offers a way to connect deeply. He wants to help the next generation understand not only how to play the game but also how to use it, as he did, as an outlet, a compass, and a place to belong.

Off the field, Daniel-Sisavanh's life is as steady as his demeanor. He enjoys cars, video games, and cooking, proudly pointing to his chicken Alfredo as his signature dish. He's grounded by family, especially his parents, Nikki and Rocky, his three younger sisters, and a brother-like friend who started football with him years ago. He describes himself in simple but powerful terms: **"Real, raw, authentic. Straight up."**

David Daniel-Sisavanh doesn't seek the spotlight, but in many ways, that's what makes him shine. Football gave the quiet kid a voice, and when the day comes that he puts down his helmet, he plans to use that voice to teach, guide, and lead the next generation of athletes authentically and on his own terms.

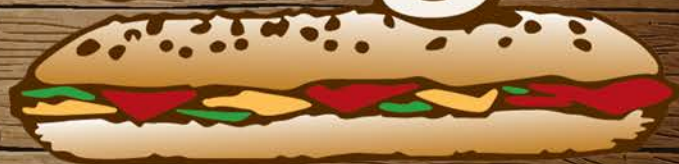

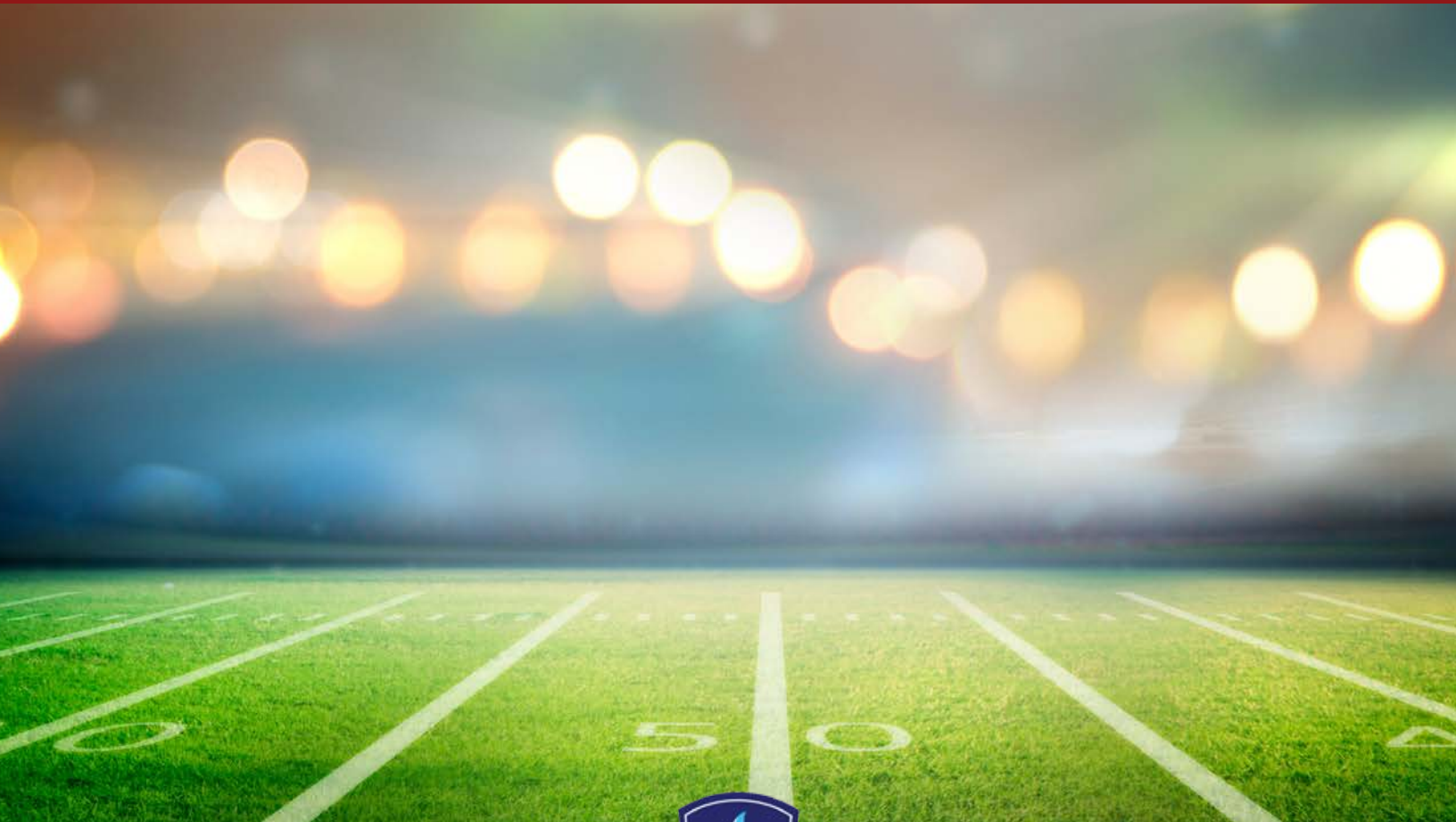

From its roots as a college to train educators for Alabama's public schools, Troy University has grown into a dynamic, international university with an emphasis on academic excellence, technological advancement, outreach and research.

At the heart of TROY's mission is a student-centered philosophy that harkens back to the University's 1887 founding motto: "Educate the mind to think, the body to act and the heart to feel." With an average student to teacher ratio of 19 to 1, students benefit from a setting where they are known not by a number but by name. That personalized attention helps to ensure that students are prepared with the skills and tools necessary to be successful in the global marketplace.

TROY's educational value and excellence has been recognized by national publications and websites such as Forbes magazine, U.S. News & World Report, Niche, and the Princeton Review among others. In 2024, TROY was named among the best colleges and universities in the Southern United States by the Princeton Review for the 20th consecutive year. TROY has also been consistently recognized for its service to the military by publications such as G.I. Jobs magazine, Military Times and Military Advanced Education.

Troy University's recognition as a "best value" university has been enhanced in recent years with major capital improvements, new academic programs and an emphasis on research and innovation.

In 2023, the Alabama Commission on Higher Education approved an instructional role change for TROY, designating the University as a doctoral institution and allowing for the addition of other doctoral degree options. In 2025, TROY has added a Ph.D. in Criminology and a concentration in Global Healthcare Leadership in the Global Leadership Ph.D. program. Those new options join the University's portfolio of doctoral degree programs that include the Doctor of Nursing Practice and the Ph.D. in Sport Management.

"This role change benefits not only Troy University, but the entire state," said Dr. Jack Hawkins, Jr., Chancellor. "We have shown that we can recruit, retain and graduate students at the doctoral level. Ultimately, this change in instructional role will benefit the state of Alabama and the Wiregrass in particular in terms of opportunities for potential students as well as employers in the area."

An increased focus on research opportunities for both faculty and students has been at the forefront of TROY's mission of academic excellence. In 2025, TROY was designated as a Carnegie Research University,



a new designation created to recognize research efforts at smaller institutions. To qualify as an RCU, an institution must spend at least \$2.5 million on research and development on average in a single year. TROY is among 218 institutions to receive the designation.

"Achieving Carnegie Research University status is a remarkable recognition of TROY's commitment to advancing research and development," said Dr. Kerry Palmer, Senior Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs. "This designation highlights the strides we've made in securing substantial funding for groundbreaking initiatives, positioning us alongside the nation's top research institutions."

In fall 2024, TROY cut the ribbon on the Center for Materials and Manufacturing Sciences, the University's building dedicated solely to research.

"This building reflects the future. I'm proud that Troy University stands on the threshold of this next level of growth," Dr. Hawkins said during the ribbon-cutting ceremony. "The next level of maturation occurs when you are fully engaged in the forming of solutions to major problems, and that's what this building represents. This building is not just a building—it is the future."

TROY also officially opened the new home to the College of Health Sciences in May, cutting the ribbon on Jones Hall. Named in honor of Billy Jones, a Troy University alumnus and president of Crowne Management, LLC, Jones Hall includes modern classrooms, collaborative spaces and lab space featuring cutting-edge technology.

In addition, TROY advanced its commitment to research and innovation in March as it launched the new College of Science and Engineering and a new degree program in electrical and electronics engineering. On March 14, the Alabama Commission on Higher Education approved the addition of the Bachelor of Science in Electrical and Electronics Engineering (BSEEE). This new program provides a cutting-edge curriculum that integrates theory, hands-on learning and industry-driven innovation.

The new College of Science and Engineering was part of a broader reorganization of the University's college structure. Programs that were previously part of the College of Arts and Sciences, including history, philosophy, anthropology, sociology, criminology, political science and the Army and Air Force ROTC programs, were reassigned to other colleges.

The College of Communication and Fine Arts was renamed the College of Arts and Humanities and

absorbed the Department of History and Philosophy. The College of Education became the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences and took on the Department of Anthropology, Sociology and Criminology, the Department of Political Science and both the Army and Air Force ROTC programs.

In 2025, the University also launched a business-first approach to artificial intelligence with the opening of the Sorrell College of Business Center for Artificial Intelligence Research and Education on TROY's Montgomery Campus. The Center seeks to equip business professionals, executives and organizations with the knowledge to evaluate AI opportunities, implement machine learning models and manage AI-driven transformation.

Research-based programs – including academic programs — will be available to Alabama business, industry and government organizations to meet the growing demand for AI expertise in executive leadership, workforce development and organizational management.

TROY also offers a vast exposure to the historical and cultural arts. On the Montgomery Campus, students, faculty and the general public can visit the Rosa Parks Museum, which celebrates the legacy of the late Civil Rights leader whose refusal to give up her seat on a city bus to a white male led to Montgomery Bus Boycott. On Dec. 1, 2025, the museum will celebrate its 25th anniversary.

On the Troy Campus, the Janice Hawkins Cultural Arts Parks, named for the University's First Lady, is home to an amphitheater, walking trails and a collection of outdoor sculpture, including 200 terracotta warriors by the late sculptor Huo Bao Zhu. The park is also home to the International Arts Center, which includes the Huo Bao Zhu Gallery, the Fred Nall Hollis Museum, and Warriors Unearthed, an interpretive center explaining the significance and design of the terracotta warrior exhibit. The center is also home to studio and classroom space for the University's Graphic Design program.

TROY's College of Arts and Humanities is home to degree programs in the performing and fine arts and provides more than 200 public performances and artistic presentations each year to an audience of more than 250,000 people.

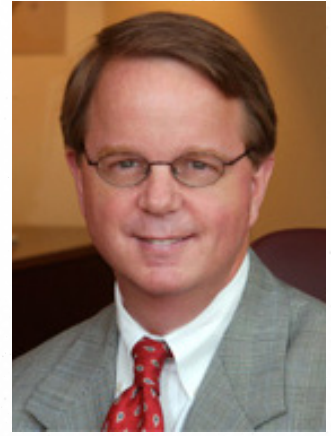

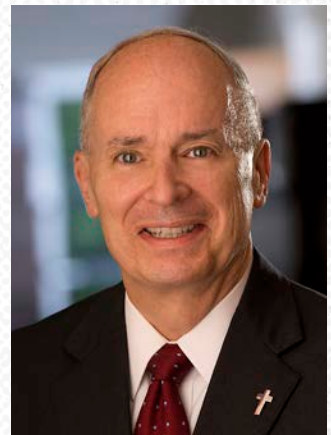

DR. JACK HAWKINS, JR.

UNIVERSITY CHANCELLOR

36TH YEAR

UNIVERSITY OF MONTEVALLO, '67

Dr. Jack Hawkins, Jr., a native of Mobile, Alabama, was named Chancellor of Troy University Sept. 1, 1989. He earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Montevallo and his doctorate from the University of Alabama. Dr. Hawkins is the longest-serving chief executive officer of a public university in the United States.

Upon completion of his bachelor's degree in 1967, Hawkins was commissioned a lieutenant in the U.S. Marine Corps and served as a platoon leader during the Vietnam War. For his combat duty, he received the Bronze Star, the Purple Heart and a citation from the Korean Marine Corps.

Hawkins has overseen an era of change and growth at TROY, as he led the merger of the worldwide Troy State University System into the unified Troy University, an initiative called "One Great University." More than \$375 million has been invested in capital improvements by the Hawkins Administration, including new academic buildings on each of TROY's Alabama campuses. Chancellor Hawkins served as the catalyst for the University's evolution to an international institution, as TROY has attracted record numbers of students from other nations and established teaching sites around the world. During his tenure, academic standards for admission have been increased, new degree programs were established in all academic colleges, and intercollegiate athletics joined the highest level of NCAA competition.

Hawkins' professional background includes his service as an assistant dean at the University of Alabama at Birmingham (1971-1979) and as president of the Alabama Institute for Deaf and Blind in Talladega (1979-1989).

In 1985, he was honored by the University of Montevallo as Distinguished Alumnus of the Year, and was the recipient of the 2003 All-American Football Foundation's "Top College President" Award. In 2005 he was inducted into the Hall of Fame of Murphy High School in Mobile, Alabama. In 2007 he was recognized as the "Alabama Citizen of the Year" by the Alabama Broadcasters Association. In 2011, Dr. Hawkins was recognized with the Chief Executive Leadership Award presented by the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) and as the March of Dimes River Region Citizen of the Year. In 2012 he received the Distinguished Public Service Award from the Secretary

of the Air Force for his service on the Air University Board of Visitors from 2004-2012. In 2014 he was one of nine university presidents/chancellors worldwide—and the only one in North America—to receive the World Confucius Institute's Individual Performance Excellence Award. In October 2016 Dr. Hawkins was inducted into the Alabama Academy of Honor. In 2024, Dr. Hawkins was the recipient of the Armed Forces Merit Award, presented by the Football Writers Association of America.

Three buildings are named in his honor: the "Jack and Janice Hawkins Chapel" at the Alabama Institute for Deaf and Blind, the "Hawkins-Adams-Long Hall of Honor" and "Jack Hawkins, Jr. Hall" which serves the College of Education of Troy University. Hawkins was profiled as part of two books published in 2004: "Above and Beyond: Former Marines Conquer the Civilian World" by Rudy Socha and Carolyn Darrow and "The Entrepreneurial College President" by James L. Fisher and James V. Koch.

Hawkins serves on the board of directors of the Daniel Foundation, the Bennie Adkins Foundation, Business Council of Alabama, the American Village Trust, College Football Playoff Board of Managers,

and Troy Bank and Trust Company. He has served as chairman of the Governor's Committee on Employment of the Disabled, Board of Visitors of Marine Corps University, Better Business Bureau of Central Alabama, and past President of the Sun Belt Conference. He has also served on the Board of Directors of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU), as Chairman of the Council of University Presidents in Alabama, as President of the Southland Football League, as chairman of the Air University Board of Visitors, as a trustee of Talladega College, the Helen Keller Eye Research Foundation, and the American Foundation for the Blind. He is a member of the Troy Rotary Club.

Dr. Hawkins is married to Janice Hawkins, and they have two daughters, Katie, a former officer in the USAF who is married to Air Force Col. Dan Beall; and Kelly, an attorney and member of the Troy University faculty who is married to Adam Godwin, a former professional baseball player and a member of the Troy University baseball staff. Dr. and Mrs. Hawkins are the proud grandparents of Noah and Ellyotte, who live in Maryland, and Micah Mae and Griffey Jack, who live in Troy.

HEAD COACH GERAD PARKER

Gerad Parker returns for his second season as Troy's head coach in 2025 following a run as one of the nation's top offensive coordinators, including the 2023 season at Notre Dame.

In his first season at Troy, the Trojans produced the first 1,000-yard rushing and receiving duo in more than a decade and just the third in program history as Damien Taylor rushed for 1,010 yards and Devonte Ross recorded 1,043 receiving yards; Troy's first since 2012.

Parker guided Troy to one of the best months of November in the country, as the Trojans won three of their final four games of the season and ranked as the nation's 19th-best offense and 25th-best defense that month.

His first season saw him inherit one of the most inexperienced teams in the country and then the loss of his starting quarterback after just 11 quarters of play. Troy's 12 players in their final year of eligibility were the fewest in the country, while Troy's 46 scholarship newcomers ranked as the third most nationally.

Ross finished the regular season fifth nationally with 11 touchdown catches and 15th in receiving yards. Additionally, Troy was one of the most efficient teams in the country, ranking second in the red zone and fifth on third downs.

Ten Trojans landed on All-Sun Belt Teams, highlighted by Ross' inclusion thrice, as a first team receiver and all-purpose selection and as the return specialist on the second team. Eight of Troy's 10 All-SBC picks had remaining eligibility.

The Trojans landed the Sun Belt's top recruiting class in Dec. 2024, signing 15 players with an 83.54 average per industry leader On3.

Parker led a Notre Dame offense in 2023 that ranked eighth nationally, averaging 39.1 points per game, in addition to ranking 12th in passing efficiency and 29th in total offense. Audric Estime was one of the nation's

elite running backs, ranking third in rushing touchdowns (18), eighth in rushing yards per game (111.8) and ninth in rushing yards (1,341).

Behind Parker's offense, the Fighting Irish posted a 9-3 record against one of the nation's most challenging schedules, including four straight games against ranked opponents. Offensive tackle Joe Alt was a consensus All-America selection, while Estime was named to the Associated Press All-America Team.



Notre Dame's offense increased production across the board in Parker's lone season calling the plays in South Bend. The Irish improved their scoring by more than a touchdown per game, in addition to seeing increases in yards per game, passing yards per game, yards per play and red zone scoring.

In his first season at Notre Dame, Parker coached the Irish tight ends and helped guide Michael Mayer to a consensus All-America season, as Mayer finished his career as the most prolific pass catching end in school history. Mayer led the Irish with 67 catches for 809 yards and nine touchdowns in 2022, finishing his time at Notre Dame first on the program charts for tight end catches (180), receiving yards (2,099) and touchdowns (18).

Parker joined the Notre Dame staff following two seasons with former Troy head coach Neal Brown at West Virginia, where he was the offensive coordinator and receivers coach.

In his final season with the Mountaineers, WVU knocked off Texas and No. 15 Virginia Tech en route to an appearance in the Guaranteed Rate Bowl. In 2020, despite having to deal with the COVID-19 pandemic, West Virginia had one of the most improved offenses in the nation in terms of total yards, showing gains of more than 60 yards rushing per game, almost 30 yards passing a game, more than 90 yards of total offense and almost seven more points a game.

The offensive line had a productive year, with Lедdie Brown rushing for 1,010 yards and nine touchdowns and Jarret Doege throwing for more than 2,500 yards and 14 touchdowns.

As Penn State's receivers coach and passing game coordinator in 2019, the Nittany Lions' offense averaged 35.8 points per game, ranking 15th nationally. Additionally, Penn State ranked 21st in red zone offense (90.4) and averaged 13.3 yards per completion, ranking No. 33 nationally.

Parker spent two years on the football staff at Duke (2017-18). During the 2018 season, his wide receivers accounted for 2,252 passing yards of the Blue Devils' 3,199 total offensive yards (70.4%).

He served his first year as the football operations assistant working with the offense in 2017. The Blue Devils offense had three All-ACC selections and, for the first time in program history, had three players with 500 or more rushing yards and a quarterback throw for more than 2,500 yards. Parker spent the spring as the running backs coach at Cincinnati before heading to Duke.

Prior to that, Parker spent four seasons at Purdue, where he coached the tight ends (2013-14) and wide receivers (2015-16). He was the recruiting coordinator and served as the interim head coach for the final six weeks of the 2016 season.

Parker spent two years as the wide receivers coach at Marshall (2011-12). The Thundering Herd led the nation in passing offense, averaging 365.1 yards per game. Receiver Tommy Shuler led the country and set the school record for receptions (110), ranking 18th nationally in yards per game (94.8).

Parker spent three seasons at UT-Martin as the running backs coach (2008), wide receivers coach (2009-10) and the passing game coordinator and recruiting coordinator (2010). He started his coaching career at Raceland High School in Raceland, Kentucky, and spent the 2007 season as a graduate assistant coach at Kentucky.

Parker earned two degrees from Kentucky, his bachelor's degree in business management in 2003 and his master's in education in 2005. He was a four-year letterwinner for the Wildcats, where he was a Southeastern Conference Scholar Athlete Honor Roll selection (2002-03) and CoSIDA Academic All-District IV Second Team honoree (2004).

A native of Louisa, Kentucky, Parker played at Lawrence County High School and set state receiving records with 238 catches, 4,814 yards and 52 touchdowns.

He and his wife, Kandi, have three daughters, Kolbi, Gwyneth and Rosalyn, and a son, Oliver.

Trojan great Gary Banks begins his fifth season on the Troy staff in 2024 and fourth coaching the Trojan receivers after coaching the outside receivers in 2021. Banks won a pair of Sun Belt titles and played in two bowl games during his playing career for the Trojans before going on to a career in the NFL.

Troy has won a pair of Sun Belt championships during his four-year tenure, and four of his players have earned All-SBC honors. Banks has been tested during his Troy career having to replace the Trojans' leading receiver in three of his four seasons.

Under Banks' leadership, back-to-back Trojans have totaled at least 999 yards, with Jabre Barber hitting the mark in 2023 and Devote Ross becoming just the sixth Trojan to reach the 1,000-yard threshold when he did it in 2024.

Ross finished the regular season leading the Sun Belt and ranking fifth nationally with 11 touchdown reception; he finished the season with 76 catches for 1,043 yards, the sixth and fourth most in a season in Troy history, respectively.

Chris Boone begins his second season as Troy's outside linebackers coach in 2025 following a successful two-year run as defensive coordinator and safeties coach at Samford, where the Bulldogs won 17 games, the most by Samford in consecutive seasons since the 1991-92 campaigns.

Boone oversees both the Trojans' bandits and spear positions, which produced at a high level in his first season, led by Devin Lafayette, who was rated as Troy's top defender by Pro Football Focus. Lafayette earned All-Sun Belt honors in his first season with the program, while Phillip Lee and Jah-Mal Williams combined for 13 tackles for loss and six sacks from the bandit spot.

Lee, Williams and Lafayette all ranked among Troy's top four in coverage rating on the team, as the Trojans won three of their final four games of the season and finished November as a top 25 defense nationally.

Re'quan Boyette returns for his second season as Troy's running backs coach in 2025 following two seasons at East Carolina and a 10-year career at Duke, where he was a two-time team captain as a player for the Blue Devils.

In his first season, Damien Taylor burst on to the scene as one of the nation's top running backs as he became the 11th player in program history (13th overall time) to reach the 1,000-yard mark. After rushing for 376 yards and two touchdowns in his career, Taylor finished as the Sun Belt's second-leading rusher with 1,010 yards and seven touchdowns in 2023.

Taylor ranked 12th in the country (min. 170 carries), averaging 3.99 yards after contact (third among G5 backs). Additionally, Gerald Green rushed for 545 yards and three touchdowns, as the pair combined to top the 100-yard mark seven times on the season.

Boyette coached the Pirates' outside receivers in 2022 and mentored a group that tallied 134 receptions for 1,689 yards (12.6 ypc) with 10 touchdowns before coaching ECU's running backs in 2023.

Boyette was named to the 2008 American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team.

In his inaugural campaign, Brendan Jackson led all Sun Belt linebackers with 16 tackles for loss, which ranked third overall in the league, while Jordan Stringer added 7.5 from his weakside linebacker position.

The pair finished with identical tackle totals, to finish tied for 15th in the league and both earned All-Sun Belt honors. Jackson recorded 4.5 tackles for loss at South Alabama, 0.5 off the single-game record, and added four in the finale victory over Southern Miss.

Burton came to Troy with more than 16 years of coaching experience after spending last season at Kennesaw State, plus stops at Georgia Tech, Temple, NC State and Oklahoma State. Additionally, he has experience in the state coaching at West Alabama and began his career under head coach Chan Gailley, who won a National Championship at Troy, as a graduate assistant at Georgia Tech.

Once able to field a stable unit, Carbine's offensive line gelled into one of the tops in the Group of Five.

The Trojans allowed just four sacks in November, the fewest in the Sun Belt, and the offensive line paved the way for Damien Taylor to rush for 1,010 yards, the 13th 1,000-yard season in program history.

Carbine's unit blocked for three different starting quarterbacks throughout the 2024 season and allowed for just the third 1,000-yard rushing/receiving combo in program history, as Devonte Ross joined Taylor in the 1,000-yard club.

At Samford, Cooper was promoted to defensive coordinator in January of 2025 season, following three seasons coaching the Bulldogs' linebackers.

The Bulldogs ranked fourth nationally in sacks, 10th in tackles for loss, ninth in first downs allowed and 11th in rushing defense during Cooper's final season in Birmingham.

In 2023 and 2024, linebacker Noah Martin landed All-American honors. The Trojans closed out his first season third in the Sun Belt, allowing just 143.3 rushing yards per game and led the league, allowing 122.5 rushing yards in league contests.

Manning's defense ranked 14th nationally in 2023, allowing just 250.8 yards per game, 13th yielding just 145.2 yards per game through the air and fifth in first down defense (137). The Jumbos allowed 19 or fewer points in 8-of-9 games during regulation; one game went into five overtimes.

Manning graduated from North Carolina Central in 2011 with a degree in business administration and was a four-year letterwinner as a fullback with the Eagles.

Brendan Jackson led all Sun Belt linebackers with 16 tackles for loss in his first season with the program as Wright had to replace 10 starters on defense from the 2023 squad.

Additionally, the Trojans led the Sun Belt allowing just 32 third-down conversions during league play and allowed just 13 passing touchdowns all season, the second fewest in the league and 24th fewest nationally.

West Virginia was coming off its first nine-win season since 2016, highlighted by a victory over North Carolina in the Duke's Mayo Bowl, where West Virginia yielded just 10 points to a Tar Heel team that entered the game with the nation's seventh-best offense.

TEAM NOTES

- With the belt in its possession for the first time since 2017, the Jaguars will be looking to defeat the Trojans in back-to-back seasons for the first time since 2014-15. The Jaguars defended their home field in 2014 by beating Troy 27-13, then visited the Trojans and earned a 24-18 victory the next year in 2015. If South Alabama is able to secure a victory Saturday night, it will be the team's first victory at Veterans Memorial Stadium since 2017.

- Saturday's rivalry game will serve as South's first conference road game of the season. The Jags have won two of their last three conference road openers, including a 48-14 victory over App State last season.

- South Alabama and Troy play annually in the Battle for the Belt. While Troy holds a 9-4 series lead in the rivalry, South Alabama defeated the Trojans in 2024 by a score of 25-9 to win back the belt for the first time since 2017.

- After making 13 career tackles through his first-three seasons, safety Christopher Wallace Jr. has made 35 tackles in 2025 and currently leads the team in that category. Wallace's 35 tackles are the sixth-most in the Sun Belt Conference.

- Wide receiver Devin Voisin's 457 receiving yards currently rank second in the Sun Belt Conference and eighth in all of college football.

- Running back Kentrel Bullock currently leads the Sun Belt Conference in rushing touchdowns with five on the season. Bullock has scored 16 career touchdowns at South Alabama, which is the fifth-most in school history.

The Troy University Band Program enjoys nationwide recognition as one of the finest and most comprehensive musical organizations of its kind. Troy instrumentalists not only have the opportunity to participate in the renowned "Sound of the South" Marching Band, but also have the opportunity to perform in the Symphony Band, four concert bands, jazz Ensembles, the Basketball Pep Band and various small ensembles.

The 2025 - 2026 year marked the 60th Anniversary of The "Sound of the South" Marching Band. Dr. John M. Long created the band in its current form in the fall of 1965. The "Sound of the South" Marching Band entertains audiences regularly at all Troy home games and several away games. Recent away appearances include Troy University's bowl appearances at the Silicon Valley Classic in San Jose, Calif., the GMAC Bowl in Mobile, Ala., and appearances at the New Orleans Bowl in the Louisiana Superdome and the Cure Bowl in Orlando, Florida. In fact, over the past few years, the "South of the South" Marching Band has traveled tens of thousands of miles entertaining audiences literally from coast to coast.

Additionally, the "Sound" has been featured on all major broadcast and sports networks including ESPN, Fox Sports South and USA television networks. Other honors which the "Sound of the South" has received is the representation of the State of Alabama at the Inaugural Parades of President Richard Nixon (1969 and 1973), President Ronald Reagan (1985), and President George Bush (1989). The "Sound" has also performed halftime shows with Grammy Award-winning artists Brian McKnight, Lee Greenwood, The Temptations and Rock and Roll Hall of Fame member, Chubby Checker.

The "Sound of the South" Pep Band performs at all men's and women's basketball home games. Comprised of 30 musicians from all academic disciplines, the pep band entertains the home crowd with great music and irreverent, energetic cheering. This group travels with men's and women's basketball to the Sun Belt Conference Tournament, as well as the NCAA Tournaments. Membership in the basketball pep band is by audition, and it performs from Mid-October to April each academic year. The "Sound of the South" is the largest student organization on campus and

its members have produced leaders in academics, student government, and athletics, as well as other areas of campus life.

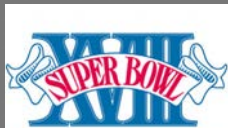

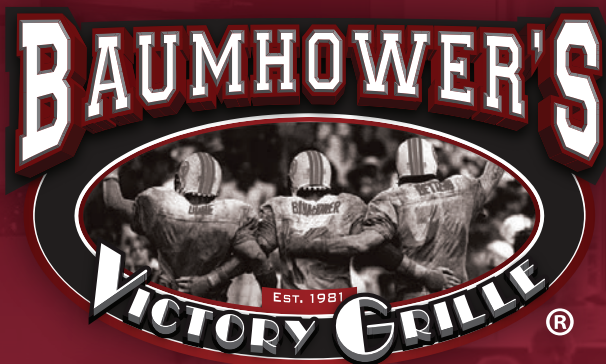

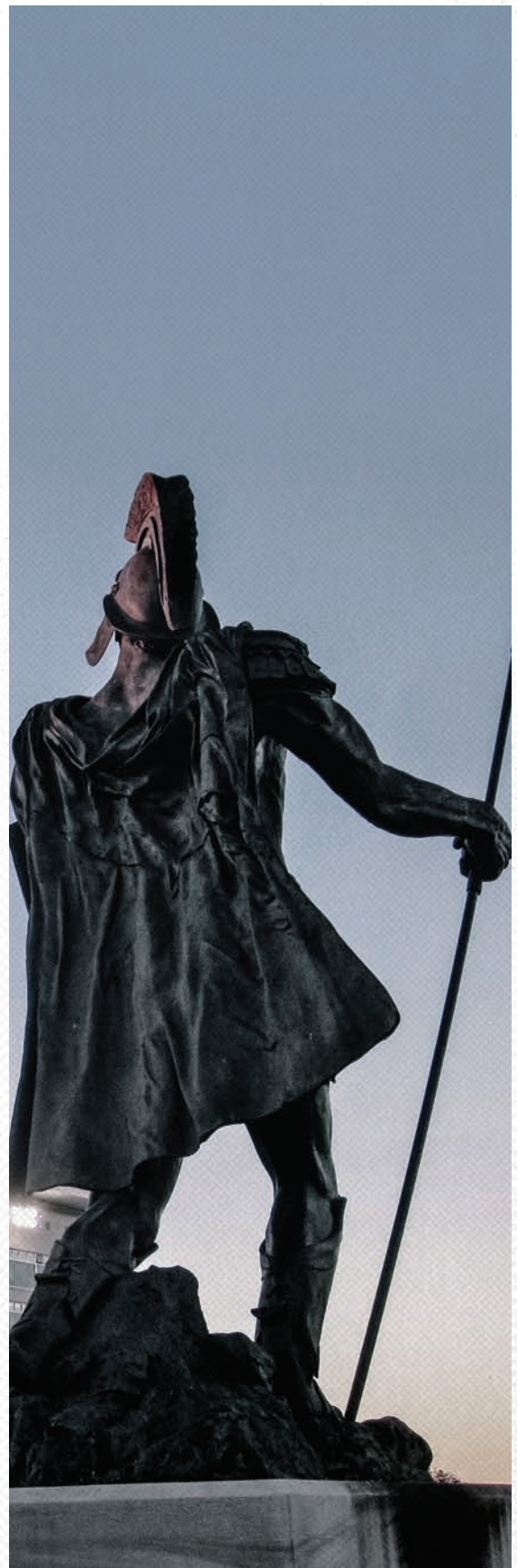
