DID YOU KNOW?

Troy is celebrating its 25th season as an FBS member in 2025 ... during its run at the highest level of college football, Troy has won eight conference titles and six bowl games

Tray Taylor became the first Troy receiver to rush for a touchdown and catch a touchdown pass sinceKaylon Geiger against Arkansas State on Sept. 28,2019, when he did so at ULM

Troy forced four turnovers -- all in the second half -- in the victory at ULM after not forcing a

turnover in its previous three games. The first three turnovers came within a 5-play span for the Warhawks and in nine total plays

Troy became one of just 16 teams since 2000 to win overtime games in consecutive weeks --

- Virginia did so earlier this year (Florida State & Louisville) and Georgia did so last year (Ga Tech & Texas)
- Troy has forced a three-and-out on 29.9 percent of its opponent's possessions (23-of-77)

Since the start of the fourth quarter at Buffalo (last 13 quarters), Tucker Kilcrease has completed 65-of-97 passes for 932 yards and nine touchdowns, while rushing for 140 yards and two touchdowns



Troy's GAMEDAY Program will be produced in a digital format only for the 2025 season; fans will be able to visit TroyTrojans.com/Program to view each week's edition.

EMERGENCY INFORMATION

If a situation arises which requires evacuation of Veterans Memorial Stadium, we request your cooperation and assistance to exit the facility in an orderly manner. Once an evacuation announcement has been given please proceed to the nearest stairway or exit. Outside the stadium follow the directions of the event staff and do not attempt to re-enter the stadium. In the case of an adverse weather situation please seek immediate shelter.

PROHIBITED ITEMS

Food, drink containers, bottles, artificial noise makers, cans, thermo-bottles, ice bags, ice chests, umbrellas, strollers, video cameras, large flags, weapons or any object deemed HAZARDOUS by stadium management. Game management personnel reserve the right to inspect patrons entering the stadium for the purpose of fan safety. All purses, backpacks or other bags must fit within the assigned seating area for each patron. Game management personnel reserve the right to inspect all bags and to prohibit oversize bags from admission to the stadium.

PROHIBITED BEHAVIOR

Examples of prohibited behavior include, but are not limited to, throwing of objects of any kind; demonstrating unruly behavior; attempting to enter the field of play; engaging in behavior that endangers the safety of student-athletes, coaches, officials or other guests; removing stadium turf; and/or taunting public service officials. Consequences for guests exhibiting prohibited behavior include, but are not limited to, loss of ticket buying privileges, ejection from the stadium, and/or arrest.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

Alcohol is sold within the venue. Only those who are of age and have proper identification are permitted to purchase alcohol. No outside alcohol is permitted. Beer will be available to purchase at five locations throughout Veterans Memorial Stadium (2 West Concourse, 2 North Plaza, 1 East Concourse).

Upon providing proper identification at the point of sale, a band will be placed on the customer's wrist, identifying that individual is of legal drinking age.


Customers are permitted to purchase no more than two beers at a time.





ELI RUSS

From the Oil Fields to the Offensive Line

For most kids, childhood memories are filled with playgrounds and video games. For Troy offensive lineman Eli Russ, they were built from red dirt, diesel fumes and the steady hum of a bulldozer.

Russ grew up in southwest Oklahoma, where work came before everything else. His father, Ken Russ, spent decades in the oil field, working two weeks on and two weeks off. When he was home, the younger Russ was right there beside him.

"I used to skip school just to hang out with Dad when he was home," Russ said. "He'd be gone so long that I just wanted to spend time with him. If I wasn't at school, I was running around that bulldozer, feeding cows, or helping my uncle on the farm."

When Ken was away, Russ stayed with his grandmother, Helen Russ, or his aunt and uncle, Pat and Krista Shirley. They helped raise him, along with his cousins, Creed and Bailey.

"I call my grandma my mom more than anything," Russ said. "They all raised me together."

Ken provided the example that shaped Russ's work ethic. He grew up "dirt poor," one of six children, helping his own father train quarter horses. He started his own businesses from scratch and never shied away from long days or dirty hands.

"He's my best friend," Russ said.
"Everything I've learned about working hard came from him."

Sports didn't enter the picture until later. After Ken remarried when Eli was in fifth grade, his stepmother's family introduced him to athletics. "I was terrible," Russ said, laughing. "I was soft. I didn't know anything about football."

That changed in high school. Russ began to realize he might have something special when college coaches started calling.

"I didn't even understand how recruiting worked," he said. "I told schools no when they asked me to visit because I didn't think anything of it."

Eventually, he caught on. He began his college career at Oklahoma State but faced setbacks, including a series of concussions that made him question whether to keep playing.

"There was a time I thought about hanging it up," he said. "But I talked to Dad, prayed about it, and decided to keep going. Something's going to happen anyway, so why not keep trying?"

That decision eventually led him to Troy.

Initially, Russ was drawn to the program by offensive line coach Cole Popovich, whose résumé includes a Super Bowl ring with Tom Brady and the New England Patriots. But once he arrived in Troy, he found something deeper.

"I didn't know much about Troy when I got recruited," he said. "But when I got here, it blew me away. The people, the program, the culture, it felt like home right away." Russ quickly bought in, embracing a program that mirrors the same blue-collar mentality he was raised with.

"Troy isn't about flash," he said. "But if you just want to play football, this is the place."

That mindset carried him through the ups and downs of the past two seasons. After the 2024 campaign brought its share of changes and challenges, Russ was one of several veterans who stayed committed.

"Troy's done so much for me," he said.
"Why give up now? They've given me every opportunity, and I owe it to them to stick with it. The guys who stayed are the ones who are fully bought in. We don't give up. That's who we are."

Off the field, Russ remains grounded in the lessons that shaped him growing up. When football ends, he plans to return to Oklahoma, help his dad's business, and stay close to his agricultural roots.

"I'd like to stay around the ag side of things," he said. "It's what I know."

For now, his focus is on Troy, his teammates, and continuing the work that began long before football ever entered the picture.

IT'S ALL ON YOU

Although he was ranked among the top 85 defensive ends coming out of Cardinal Gibbons High School, Jah-Mal Williams took a long road to earn a starting role in college football.

"Nobody is going to force you to be great," Williams said. "It's all on you. I've realized nobody is going to push you — you've got to do it yourself."

Williams, a three-star prospect from Carver Ranches, Florida, committed to Cincinnati over offers from Mississippi State and Arizona State. Despite the hype, he started his career on the Bearcats' scout team.

"I wasn't a guy who played early, so sticking to the process was important," Williams said. "I knew I had to stay committed and see it through. My day would come, but playing and getting reps would come later."

That patience paid off. Williams made his collegiate debut against Eastern Kentucky and appeared in 10 games during the 2023 season, recording three tackles. After two years at Cincinnati, he sought a new opportunity and found it in Troy under head coach Gerad Parker.

"Troy was one of the only schools that reached out and showed me love," Williams said. "Troy made me feel like I was at home."

The fit was immediate. Williams played the 10th most snaps on defense for the Trojans last season, finishing with 30 tackles and a sack. Through this season's midway point, he has already totaled

3.5 sacks, showing the growth that comes from persistence and trust in the process.

As a bandit — Troy's hybrid defensive end/ linebacker position — Williams thrives on getting after the quarterback. His passion for pass rushing began long before college.

"I initially wanted to play defensive end and wide receiver," Williams said. "One game, I had a sack, and I just knew I'd play defense for sure. After that, I stuck with defensive end instead of receiver."

Football has always been a family affair for Williams. His love for the game started by watching his older cousins play, and now it fuels his desire to be a role model for his younger siblings.

"I would see my bigger cousins play football and always watched and enjoyed their games," Williams said. "I finally started playing at 11 years old."

Williams, who has two older sisters and two younger brothers, said his family remains his biggest source of motivation.

"At the end of the day, I just want to set an example for my little brothers," he said. "Family means everything — that's why I'm here."

That drive extends beyond family ties. Williams said his motivation also comes from competing against himself and constantly pushing to improve.


"It's also me going against myself and my confidence," he said. "I try to tell myself I can do whatever I want out there instead of laying down and not doing it."

At Troy, Williams said he has benefited from being surrounded by talented teammates in his position group, learning from veterans and peers alike.

"I was here with Phillip Lee last year, and there are other guys like Donnie Smith and Jabril McNeill," Williams said. "Everybody has their own type of style and strengths. Whatever I see that I think I'm capable of doing, I try to do it here and there."

With two seasons of experience under his belt and his best football still ahead, Williams said his goals are clear — both personal and team-oriented.

"I just want to pull off a conference championship win," Williams said. "I want to share that with Troy and the rest of the family here."

FULL CIRCLE MOMENT

When Troy wide receiver RaRa Thomas steps onto the field at Veterans Memorial Stadium, he takes pride in making Trojan fans proud as his football journey comes full circle — returning to the place that first saw potential in him years ago.

Troy was Thomas' first college offer, extended after a seven-on-seven camp early in his high school career. Back then, he was just a multi-sport athlete from Eufaula, Alabama, more focused on basketball than football. He couldn't have imagined that one day, after stops in the SEC at Mississippi State and Georgia, he would finish his college career where it all began — wearing a Trojan uniform.

"Troy was my first offer ever," Thomas said.
"I came to a seven-on-seven camp up here,
and Chip Lindsey offered me. It's crazy to
think they were my first offer, and now I'm
here."

That full-circle moment was shaped largely by Jerrell Jernigan, one of the most iconic names in Troy football history. A seven-time All-Sun Belt Conference selection and NFL veteran, Jernigan's name is etched across the program's record books. But to Thomas, he's much more than a legend — he's family.

"Jerrell's the reason I'm where I am today,"
Thomas said. "He took me under his wing
when I was in high school. He was my
assistant basketball coach, and after we
lost the state championship my junior year,
he asked if I wanted to play football. I told
him no, but he signed me up for camps
anyway. Once he did that, I knew I had to
take it seriously."

That decision changed everything. With Jernigan's mentorship and encouragement, Thomas began to attract attention from college coaches, and soon his

recruitment took off. His senior year brought offers from SEC programs such as Mississippi State and South Carolina.

Through the challenges of transitioning from high school to the SEC, Jernigan continued to be Thomas' anchor.

"When I first got to Mississippi State, I wanted to leave," Thomas said. "Moving away from home and figuring out college was overwhelming. I thought there would be no more me and Jerrell. But Jerrell called me every day. He was like my dad through it all."

Now in his final collegiate season, Thomas said playing at Troy isn't much different from his time in the SEC.

"Mississippi State and Georgia were big schools, but it's all the same at the end of the day," Thomas said. "I don't look at this receiver room any different. Our receivers can do the same thing — they have the potential and the skill set to play at the next level. We go out there and compete just the same."

Thomas now wears the same uniform Jernigan once did, chasing similar goals and continuing the legacy of Troy receivers who came before him.

"When I came to Troy, I wanted to break Jerrell's records," Thomas said with a smile.

Even if that doesn't happen, Thomas said he's thankful for the man who helped him get to this point. He knows he can call Jernigan anytime — and he already knows what that conversation would sound like.

"If I called Jerrell before a game, I'd probably cry," Thomas said. "I'd thank him for everything. If it wasn't for him, I wouldn't be here. And he'd probably just tell me to stop crying and go play — that he loves me and to give it my all."

From his first college offer to his final college snaps, Thomas' journey represents a true full-circle moment — one built on mentorship, gratitude and perseverance.

"It's been a blessing," Thomas said. "I'm so thankful for Troy through it all."

STAY THE COURSE

Change. Adversity. Triumph. Senior offensive lineman Zerian Hudson has experienced them all throughout his football journey.

Recruited out of Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College in 2023, Hudson committed to Troy after a campus visit that season. Just days later, former head coach Jon Sumrall announced his departure, and on Dec. 18, 2023, Troy introduced Gerad Parker as its new head coach. Despite the uncertainty, Hudson officially signed with the Trojans two days later

"When I talked with Coach Parker, he kept things very honest with me," Hudson said. "He said even though the staff had changed, the mission remained the same. If I wanted to succeed, I'd need to put my head down and work."

Hard work was nothing new for Hudson. After two years at junior college, he knew what it would take to reach the Division I level.

"JUCO helped me develop that mindset and process of training to get better and better," Hudson said. "It helped me prepare for Division I, but even more, it helped me learn and understand the game itself."

The Brookhaven, Mississippi, native has always believed in the value of patience and persistence — a philosophy captured in a saying he often repeats: Mi hora llegará, or "my time will come."

"To me, it means that even though you never know when it is, my time will come," Hudson said. "You just have to always be prepared for when the opportunity arrives." Now a senior and one of the leaders of Troy's offensive line, Hudson works to instill that same mindset in his teammates.

"I try to bring a level of excitement with my guys when I can," he said. "I know what it's like to deal with the down moments, and I try to remind them that everything will be all right — that all the training will pay off."

That payoff began to show for both Hudson and the Trojans last season. In Parker's first year at the helm — and Hudson's first at Troy — the Trojans started 1-7 before finishing November with a 3-1 record. They carried that late-season surge into 2025, opening the new campaign with renewed energy and focus.

"We've really just tried to stick with the process that we started last year," Hudson said. "Our team kept getting better every day, even when the results didn't show at first. The big thing was everyone buying in and realizing that championships from the past don't keep happening unless we keep preparing ourselves the best we can every day."

As Hudson approaches the end of his final season, he said the people around him — not the accolades — are what have made the experience special.

"I remember every person I've played with," Hudson said. "The relationships I've built with my coaches and teammates mean everything to me. One day I won't see these guys as often, so the memories I make now mean a lot." Hudson hopes to pursue a career in the NFL after his time at Troy. But through his interdisciplinary studies, he's also preparing for life beyond football, with ambitions of becoming an entrepreneur.

Regardless of what the future holds, Hudson said his approach to life and football remains the same: stay patient, stay grateful and stay the course.

"One thing is for sure," Hudson said. "No matter what adversity I face, I'll always keep pushing forward."

TROY UNIVERSITY

From its roots as a college to train educators for Alabama's public schools, Troy University has grown into a dynamic, international university with an emphasis on academic excellence, technological advancement, outreach and research.

At the heart of TROY's mission is a student-centered philosophy that harkens back to the University's 1887 founding motto: "Educate the mind to think, the body to act and the heart to feel." With an average student to teacher ratio of 19 to 1, students benefit from a setting where they are known not by a number but by name. That personalized attention helps to ensure that students are prepared with the skills and tools necessary to be successful in the global marketplace.

TROY's educational value and excellence has been recognized by national publications and websites such as Forbes magazine, U.S. News & World Report, Niche, and the Princeton Review among others. In 2024, TROY was named among the best colleges and universities in the Southern United States by the Princeton Review for the 20th consecutive year. TROY has also been consistently recognized for its service to the military by publications such as G.I. Jobs magazine, Military Times and Military Advanced Education.

Troy University's recognition as a "best value" university has been enhanced in recent years with major capital improvements, new academic programs and an emphasis on research and innovation.

In 2023, the Alabama Commission on Higher Education approved an instructional role change for TROY, designating the University as a doctoral institution and allowing for the addition of other doctoral degree options. In 2025, TROY has added a Ph.D. in Criminology and a concentration in Global Healthcare Leadership in the Global Leadership Ph.D. program. Those new options join the University's portfolio of doctoral degree programs that include the Doctor of Nursing Practice and the Ph.D. in Sport Management.

"This role change benefits not only Troy University, but the entire state," said Dr. Jack Hawkins, Jr., Chancellor. "We have shown that we can recruit, retain and graduate students at the doctoral level. Ultimately, this change in instructional role will benefit the state of Alabama and the Wiregrass in particular in terms of opportunities for potential students as well as employers in the area."

An increased focus on research opportunities for both faculty and students has been at the forefront of TROY's mission of academic excellence. In 2025, TROY was designated as a Carnegie Research University,



a new designation created to recognize research efforts at smaller institutions. To qualify as an RCU, an institution must spend at least \$2.5 million on research and development on average in a single year. TROY is among 218 institutions to receive the designation.

"Achieving Carnegie Research University status is a remarkable recognition of TROY's commitment to advancing research and development," said Dr. Kerry Palmer, Senior Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs. "This designation highlights the strides we've made in securing substantial funding for groundbreaking initiatives, positioning us alongside the nation's top research institutions."

In fall 2024, TROY cut the ribbon on the Center for Materials and Manufacturing Sciences, the University's building dedicated solely to research.

"This building reflects the future. I'm proud that Troy University stands on the threshold of this next level of growth," Dr. Hawkins said during the ribbon-cutting ceremony. "The next level of maturation occurs when you are fully engaged in the forming of solutions to major problems, and that's what this building represents. This building is not just a building—it is the future."

TROY also officially opened the new home to the College of Health Sciences in May, cutting the ribbon on Jones Hall. Named in honor of Billy Jones, a Troy University alumnus and president of Crowne Management, LLC, Jones Hall includes modern classrooms, collaborative spaces and lab space featuring cutting-edge technology.

In addition, TROY advanced its commitment to research and innovation in March as it launched the new College of Science and Engineering and a new degree program in electrical and electronics engineering. On March 14, the Alabama Commission on Higher Education approved the addition of the Bachelor of Science in Electrical and Electronics Engineering (BSEEE). This new program provides a cutting-edge curriculum that integrates theory, hands-on learning and industry-driven innovation.

The new College of Science and Engineering was part of a broader reorganization of the University's college structure. Programs that were previously part of the College of Arts and Sciences, including history, philosophy, anthropology, sociology, criminology, political science and the Army and Air Force ROTC programs, were reassigned to other colleges.

The College of Communication and Fine Arts was renamed the College of Arts and Humanities and

absorbed the Department of History and Philosophy. The College of Education became the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences and took on the Department of Anthropology, Sociology and Criminology, the Department of Political Science and both the Army and Air Force ROTC programs.

In 2025, the University also launched a business-first approach to artificial intelligence with the opening of the Sorrell College of Business Center for Artificial Intelligence Research and Education on TROY's Montgomery Campus. The Center seeks to equip business professionals, executives and organizations with the knowledge to evaluate Al opportunities, implement machine learning models and manage Al-driven transformation.

Research-based programs – including academic programs — will be available to Alabama business, industry and government organizations to meet the growing demand for Al expertise in executive leadership, workforce development and organizational management.

TROY also offers a vast exposure to the historical and cultural arts. On the Montgomery Campus, students, faculty and the general public can visit the Rosa Parks Museum, which celebrates the legacy of the late Civil Rights leader whose refusal to give up her seat on a city bus to a white male led to Montgomery Bus Boycott. On Dec. 1, 2025, the museum will celebrate its 25th anniversary.

On the Troy Campus, the Janice Hawkins Cultural Arts Parks, named for the University's First Lady, is home to an amphitheater, walking trails and a collection of outdoor sculpture, including 200 terracotta warriors by the late sculptor Huo Bao Zhu. The park is also home to the International Arts Center, which includes the Huo Bao Zhu Gallery, the Fred Nall Hollis Museum, and Warriors Unearthed, an interpretive center explaining the significance and design of the terracotta warrior exhibit. The center is also home to studio and classroom space for the University's Graphic Design program.

TROY's College of Arts and Humanities is home to degree programs in the performing and fine arts and provides more than 200 public performances and artistic presentations each year to an audience of more than 250,000 people.

Dr. Jack Hawkins, Jr., a native of Mobile, Alabama, was named Chancellor of Troy University Sept. 1, 1989. He earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Montevallo and his doctorate from the University of Alabama. Dr. Hawkins is the longest-serving chief executive officer of a public university in the United States.

Upon completion of his bachelor's degree in 1967, Hawkins was commissioned a lieutenant in the U.S. Marine Corps and served as a platoon leader during the Vietnam War. For his combat duty, he received the Bronze Star, the Purple Heart and a citation from the Korean Marine Corps.

Hawkins has overseen an era of change and growth at TROY, as he led the merger of the worldwide Troy State University System into the unified Troy University, an initiative called "One Great University." More than \$375 million has been invested in capital improvements by the Hawkins Administration, including new academic buildings on each of TROY's Alabama campuses. Chancellor Hawkins served as the catalyst for the University's evolution to an international institution, as TROY has attracted record numbers of students from other nations and established teaching sites around the world. During his tenure, academic standards for admission have been increased, new degree programs were established in all academic colleges, and intercollegiate athletics joined the highest level of NCAA competition.

Hawkins' professional background includes his service as an assistant dean at the University of Alabama at Birmingham (1971-1979) and as president of the Alabama Institute for Deaf and Blind in Talladega (1979-1989).

In 1985, he was honored by the University of Montevallo as Distinguished Alumnus of the Year, and was the recipient of the 2003 All-American Football Foundation's "Top College President" Award. In 2005 he was inducted into the Hall of Fame of Murphy High School in Mobile, Alabama. In 2007 he was recognized as the "Alabama Citizen of the Year" by the Alabama Broadcasters Association. In 2011, Dr. Hawkins was recognized with the Chief Executive Leadership Award presented by the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) and as the March of Dimes River Region Citizen of the Year. In 2012 he received the Distinguished Public Service Award from the Secretary


of the Air Force for his service on the Air University Board of Visitors from 2004-2012. In 2014 he was one of nine university presidents/chancellors worldwide—and the only one in North America—to receive the World Confucius Institute's Individual Performance Excellence Award. In October 2016 Dr. Hawkins was inducted into the Alabama Academy of Honor. In 2024, Dr. Hawkins was the recipient of the Armed Forces Merit Award, presented by the Football Writers Association of America.

Three buildings are named in his honor: the "Jack and Janice Hawkins Chapel" at the Alabama Institute for Deaf and Blind, the "Hawkins-Adams-Long Hall of Honor" and "Jack Hawkins, Jr. Hall" which serves the College of Education of Troy University. Hawkins was profiled as part of two books published in 2004: "Above and Beyond: Former Marines Conquer the Civilian World" by Rudy Socha and Carolyn Darrow and "The Entrepreneurial College President" by James L. Fisher and James V. Koch.

Hawkins serves on the board of directors of the Daniel Foundation, the Bennie Adkins Foundation, Business Council of Alabama, the American Village Trust, College Football Playoff Board of Managers,

and Troy Bank and Trust Company. He has served as chairman of the Governor's Committee on Employment of the Disabled, Board of Visitors of Marine Corps University, Better Business Bureau of Central Alabama, and past President of the Sun Belt Conference. He has also served on the Board of Directors of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU), as Chairman of the Council of University Presidents in Alabama, as President of the Southland Football League, as chairman of the Air University Board of Visitors, as a trustee of Talladega College, the Helen Keller Eye Research Foundation, and the American Foundation for the Blind. He is a member of the Troy Rotary Club.

Dr. Hawkins is married to Janice Hawkins, and they have two daughters, Katie, a former officer in the USAF who is married to Air Force Col. Dan Beall; and Kelly, an attorney and member of the Troy University faculty who is married to Adam Godwin, a former professional baseball player and a member of the Troy University baseball staff. Dr. and Mrs. Hawkins are the proud grandparents of Noah and Ellyotte, who live in Maryland, and Micah Mae and Griffey Jack, who live in Troy.

HEAD COACH GERAD PARKER

Gerad Parker returns for his second season as Troy's head coach in 2025 following a run as one of the nation's top offensive coordinators, including the 2023 season at Notre Dame.

In his first season at Troy, the Trojans produced the first 1,000-yard rushing and receiving duo in more than a decade and just the third in program history as Damien Taylor rushed for 1,010 yards and Devonte Ross recorded 1,043 receiving yards; Troy's first since 2012.

Parker guided Troy to one of the best months of November in the country, as the Trojans won three of their final four games of the season and ranked as the nation's 19th-best offense and 25th-best defense that month.

His first season saw him inherit one of the most inexperienced teams in the country and then the loss of his starting quarterback after just 11 quarters of play. Troy's 12 players in their final year of eligibility were the fewest in the country, while Troy's 46 scholarship newcomers ranked as the third most nationally.

Ross finished the regular season fifth nationally with 11 touchdown catches and 15th in receiving yards. Additionally, Troy was one of the most efficient teams in the country, ranking second in the red zone and fifth on third downs.

Ten Trojans landed on All-Sun Belt Teams, highlighted by Ross' inclusion thrice, as a first team receiver and all-purpose selection and as the return specialist on the second team. Eight of Troy's 10 All-SBC picks had remaining eligibility.

The Trojans landed the Sun Belt's top recruiting class in Dec. 2024, signing 15 players with an 83.54 average per industry leader On3.

Parker led a Notre Dame offense in 2023 that ranked eighth nationally, averaging 39.1 points per game, in addition to ranking 12th in passing efficiency and 29th in total offense. Audric Estime was one of the nation's

elite running backs, ranking third in rushing touchdowns (18), eighth in rushing yards per game (111.8) and ninth in rushing yards (1,341).

Behind Parker's offense, the Fighting Irish posted a 9-3 record against one of the nation's most challenging schedules, including four straight games against ranked opponents. Offensive tackle Joe Alt was a consensus All-America selection, while Estime was named to the Associated Press All-America Team.



Notre Dame's offense increased production across the board in Parker's lone season calling the plays in South Bend. The Irish improved their scoring by more than a touchdown per game, in addition to seeing increases in yards per game, passing yards per game, yards per play and red zone scoring.

In his first season at Notre Dame, Parker coached the Irish tight ends and helped guide Michael Mayer to a consensus All-America season, as Mayer finished his career as the most prolific pass catching end in school history. Mayer led the Irish with 67 catches for 809 yards and nine touchdowns in 2022, finishing his time at Notre Dame first on the program charts for tight end catches (180), receiving yards (2,099) and touchdowns (18).

Parker joined the Notre Dame staff following two seasons with former Troy head coach Neal Brown at West Virginia, where he was the offensive coordinator and receivers coach.

In his final season with the Mountaineers, WVU knocked off Texas and No. 15 Virginia Tech en route to an appearance in the Guaranteed Rate Bowl. In 2020, despite having to deal with the COVID-19 pandemic, West Virginia had one of the most improved offenses in the nation in terms of total yards, showing

gains of more than 60 yards rushing per game, almost 30 yards passing a game, more than 90 yards of total offense and almost seven more points a game.

The offensive line had a productive year, with Leddie Brown rushing for 1,010 yards and nine touchdowns and Jarret Doege throwing for more than 2,500 yards and 14 touchdowns.

As Penn State's receivers coach and passing game coordinator in 2019, the Nittany Lions' offense averaged 35.8 points per game, ranking 15th nationally. Additionally, Penn State ranked 21st in red zone offense (90.4) and averaged 13.3 yards per completion, ranking No. 33 nationally.

Parker spent two years on the football staff at Duke (2017-18). During the 2018 season, his wide receivers accounted for 2,252 passing yards of the Blue Devils' 3,199 total offensive yards (70.4%).

He served his first year as the football operations assistant working with the offense in 2017. The Blue Devils offense had three All-ACC selections and, for the first time in program history, had three players with 500 or more rushing yards and a quarterback throw for more than 2,500 yards. Parker spent the spring as the running backs coach at Cincinnati before heading to Duke.

Prior to that, Parker spent four seasons at Purdue, where he coached the tight ends (2013-14) and wide receivers (2015-16). He was the recruiting coordinator and served as the interim head coach for the final six weeks of the 2016 season.

Parker spent two years as the wide receivers coach at Marshall (2011-12). The Thundering Herd led the nation in passing offense, averaging 365.1 yards per game. Receiver Tommy Shuler led the country and set the school record for receptions (110), ranking 18th nationally in yards per game (94.8).

Parker spent three seasons at UT-Martin as the running backs coach (2008), wide receivers coach (2009-10) and the passing game coordinator and recruiting coordinator (2010). He started his coaching career at Raceland High School in Raceland, Kentucky, and spent the 2007 season as a graduate assistant coach at Kentucky.

Parker earned two degrees from Kentucky, his bachelor's degree in business management in 2003 and his master's in education in 2005. He was a four-year letterwinner for the Wildcats, where he was a Southeastern Conference Scholar Athlete Honor Roll selection (2002-03) and CoSIDA Academic All-District IV Second Team honoree (2004).

A native of Louisa, Kentucky, Parker played at Lawrence County High School and set state receiving records with 238 catches, 4,814 yards and 52 touchdowns.

He and his wife, Kandi, have three daughters, Kolbi, Gwyneth and Rosalyn, and a son, Oliver.

Trojan great Gary Banks begins his fifth season on the Troy staff in 2024 and fourth coaching the Trojan receivers after coaching the outside receivers in 2021. Banks won a pair of Sun Belt titles and played in two bowl games during his playing career for the Trojans before going on to a career in the NFL.

Troy has won a pair of Sun Belt championships during his fouryear tenure, and four of his players have earned All-SBC honors. Banks has been tested during his Troy career having to replace the Trojans' leading receiver in three of his four seasons.

Under Banks' leadership, back-to-back Trojans have totaled at least 999 yards, with Jabre Barber hitting the mark in 2023 and Devote Ross becoming just the sixth Trojan to reach the 1,000-yard threshold when he did it in 2024.

Ross finished the regular season leading the Sun Belt and ranking fifth nationally with 11 touchdown reception; he finished the season with 76 catches for 1,043 yards, the sixth and fourth most in a season in Troy history, respectively.

Chris Boone begins his second season as Troy's outside linebackers coach in 2025 following a successful two-year run as defensive coordinator and safeties coach at Samford, where the Bulldogs won 17 games, the most by Samford in consecutive seasons since the 1991-92 campaigns.

Boone oversees both the Trojans' bandits and spear positions, which produced at a high level in his first season, led by Devin Lafayette, who was rated as Troy's top defender by Pro Football Focus. Lafayette earned All-Sun Belt honors in his first season with the program, while Phillip Lee and Jah-Mal Williams combined for 13 tackles for loss and six sacks from the bandit spot.

Lee, Williams and Lafayette all ranked among Troy's top four in coverage rating on the team, as the Trojans won three of their final four games of the season and finished November as a top 25 defense nationally.

Re'quan Boyette returns for his second season as Troy's running backs coach in 2025 following two seasons at East Carolina and a 10-year career at Duke, where he was a two-time team captain as a player for the Blue Devils.

In his first season, Damien Taylor burst on to the scene as one of the nation's top running backs as he became the 11th player in program history (13th overall time) to reach the 1,000-yard mark. After rushing for 376 yards and two touchdowns in his career, Taylor finished as the Sun Belt's second-leading rusher with 1,010 yards and seven touchdowns in 2023.

Taylor ranked 12th in the country (min. 170 carries), averaging 3.99 yards after contact (third among G5 backs). Additionally, Gerald Green rushed for 545 yards and three touchdowns, as the pair combined to top the 100-yard mark seven times on the season.

Boyette coached the Pirates' outside receivers in 2022 and mentored a group that tallied 134 receptions for 1,689 yards (12.6 ypc) with 10 touchdowns before coaching ECU's running backs in 2023.

Boyette was named to the 2008 American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team.

Nathan Burton returns Troy in 2025 for his second season as the Trojans' co-defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach.

In his inaugural campaign, Brendan Jackson led all Sun Belt linebackers with 16 tackles for loss, which ranked third overall in the league, while Jordan Stringer added 7.5 from his weakside linebacker position.

The pair finished with identical tackle totals, to finish tied for 15th in the league and both earned All-Sun Belt honors. Jackson recorded 4.5 tackles for loss at South Alabama, 0.5 off the single-game record, and added four in the finale victory over Southern Miss.

Burton came to Troy with more than 16 years of coaching experience after spending last season at Kennesaw State, plus stops at Georgia Tech, Temple, NC State and Oklahoma State. Additionally, he has experience in the state coaching at West Alabama and began his career under head coach Chan Gailey, who won a National Championship at Troy, as a graduate assistant at Georgia Tech.

Carbine had one of the most challenging coaching jobs in the country in his first season, as the Trojans deployed six different starting offensive line units over the team's first eight games of the season. Once able to field a stable unit, Carbine's offensive line gelled into one of the tops in the Group of Five.

The Trojans allowed just four sacks in November, the fewest in the Sun Belt, and the offensive line paved the way for Damien Taylor to rush for 1,010 yards, the 13th 1,000-yard season in program history.

Carbine's unit blocked for three different starting quarterbacks throughout the 2024 season and allowed for just the third 1,000-yard rushing/receiving combo in program history, as Devonte Ross joined Taylor in the 1,000-yard club.

The Trojans closed out his first season third in the Sun Belt, allowing just 143.3 rushing yards per game and led the league, allowing 122.5 rushing yards in league contests.

Manning's defense ranked 14th nationally in 2023, allowing just 250.8 yards per game, 13th yielding just 145.2 yards per game through the air and fifth in first down defense (137). The Jumbos allowed 19 or fewer points in 8-of-9 games during regulation; one game went into five overtimes.

Manning graduated from North Carolina Central in 2011 with a degree in business administration and was a four-year letterwinner as a fullback with the Eagles.

The duo became just the third in program history to reach their respective 1,000-yard marks in the same season (2012, 1984).

Brendan Jackson led all Sun Belt linebackers with 16 tackles for loss in his first season with the program as Wright had to replace 10 starters on defense from the 2023 squad.

Additionally, the Trojans led the Sun Belt allowing just 32 third-down conversions during league play and allowed just 13 passing touchdowns all season, the second fewest in the league and 24th fewest nationally.

West Virginia was coming off its first nine-win season since 2016, highlighted by a victory over North Carolina in the Duke's Mayo Bowl, where West Virginia yielded just 10 points to a Tar Heel team that entered the game with the nation's seventh-best offense.

The Troy University Band Program enjoys nationwide recognition as one of the finest and most comprehensive musical organizations of its kind.

Troy instrumentalists not only have the opportunity to participate in the renowned "Sound of the South" Marching Band, but also have the opportunity to perform in the Symphony Band, four concert bands, jazz Ensembles, the Basketball Pep Band and various small ensembles.

The 2025 - 2026 year marked the 60th Anniversary of The "Sound of the South" Marching Band. Dr. John M. Long created the band in its current form in the fall of 1965. The "Sound of the South" Marching Band entertains audiences regularly at all Troy home games and several away games. Recent away appearances include Troy University's bowl appearances at the Silicon Valley Classic in San Jose, Calif., the GMAC Bowl in Mobile, Ala., and appearances at the New Orleans Bowl in the Louisiana Superdome and the Cure Bowl in Orlando, Florida. Other honors which the "Sound of the South" has received is the representation of the State of Alabama at the Inaugural Parades of President Richard Nixon (1969 and 1973), President Ronald Reagan (1985), and President George Bush (1989). The "Sound" has also performed halftime shows with Grammy Award-winning artists Brian McKnight, Lee Greenwood, The Temptations and Rock and Roll Hall of Fame member, Chubby Checker.

The "Sound of the South" Pep Band performs at all men's and women's basketball home games. Comprised of 30 musicians from all academic disciplines, the pep band entertains the home crowd with great music and irreverent, energetic cheering. This group travels with men's and women's basketball to the Sun Belt Conference Tournament, as well as the NCAA Tournaments. Membership in the basketball pep band is by audition, and it performs from Mid-October to April each academic year.

The "Sound of the South" is the largest student organization on campus and


its members have produced leaders in academics, student government, and athletics, as well as other areas of campus life.






